Over \$600,000 Paid To Dawson Farmers By AAA

Checks Totaling \$100,000 Arrive During Last Week

Represents Payments For 1940 Participants In The Triple A Program

A total of \$271,708.23 in conservation checks has been received by the Treasurer of the Dawson County A. C. A. Over a hundred thousand dollars of this amount of checks were received by the Dawson County office during the past week. This means that checks are coming in in relatively large numbers and it will not be but a short while until approximately all checks will be paid. Including the 1940 parity payments, all 1940 payments to date will run well over six hundred thousand dollars for Dawson County.

Announcement is made in this issue that Kenneth Cox Implement Company has moved to their newly completed building on South Dallas Street, across from the CCC Camp.

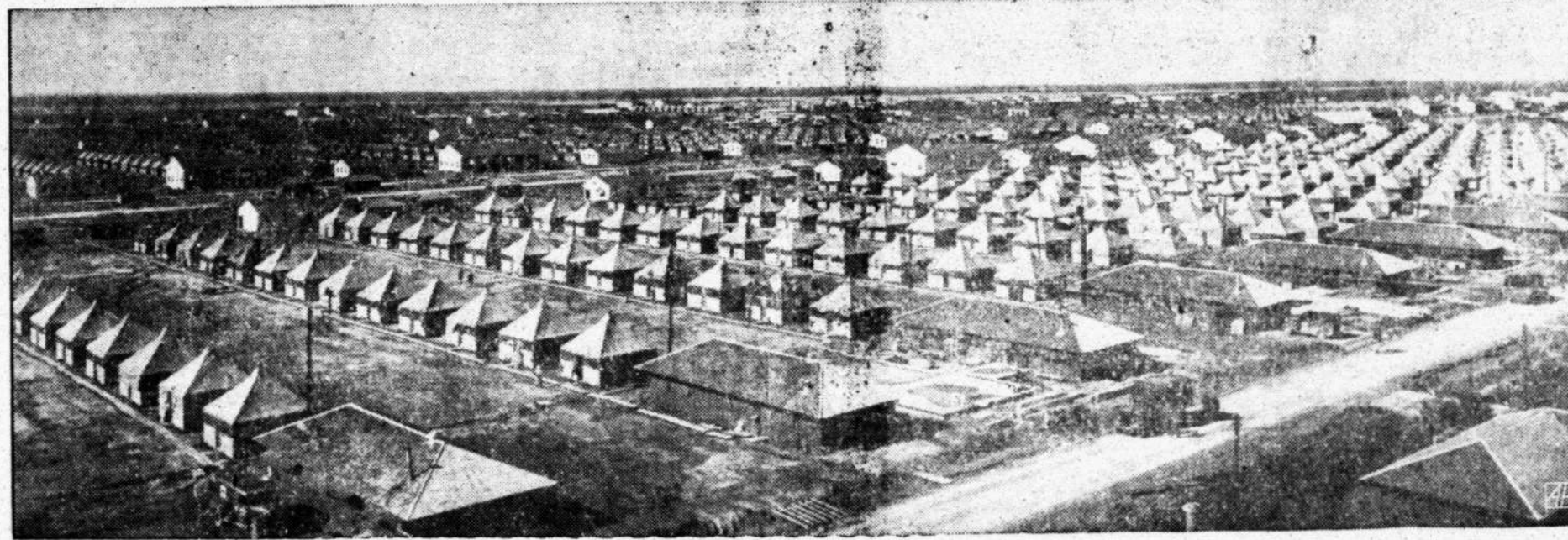

Lamesa-Dawson Health Unit To Bring Service To City And County Schools

The Dental Service Will Be Made Available To Schools Within Next Few Weeks It Is Announced

The services of the Lamesa-Dawson County Health Unit will be brought to the class room during the next few weeks by two special services which they are sponsoring. First, the county is being visited by the Dental Unit of the Health Department sometime during the next three weeks. The exact time will be announced in the next few days.

This is a complete dental office on wheels and will offer a health program and show in each school visited and will make corrections for as many students as time will permit.

The second service from the

health unit will come from a puppet show which will show in the county on February 10, 11 and 12. This is an entirely new show and is said to be equally as good as the one to come to the county some three years ago. It will deal entirely with health for school age children. Because only three days could be allotted to Dawson County several schools will have to combine in order for all children to have a chance to see it. Farmers Warned Report On Cotton Production Due When Last Bale Is Ginned

It is important that all farm operators get their "report of Cotton Produced and Seed Cotton Marketed" in to the county office as soon as they have finished their 1940 ginnings. This report is due within 15 days after the last cotton for the farm has been ginned. This report sheet was given to all cotton producers when the cotton marketing card was delivered. No 1941 cotton yields can be determined, neither can 1941 parity payments be made until this report is filled out and signed by the producer. The purpose of the report of cotton produced is to verify the ginners' report already turned in to the county office for the farmer. In a number of cases in past years it has been found that ginners have made unintentional errors in making out their reports of cotton ginned, therefore, if the farmer makes a list of all the cotton that he ginned, the county office can then be sure that no mistake is made in his 1940 cotton yields. If report sheets have been lost or destroyed additional forms may be furnished by the county office. Vernon Martin, Secretary, Dawson County A. C. A.

First Baptist Church Of Lamesa To Construct Modern New Building

Expect Work Will Get Underway In Next Sixty Days

Announcement is made this week that Arch Easterwood, architect for the new First Baptist Church building in Lamesa, has mailed bids to contractors for the construction of the new building here. The bids will be received in the

Lamesa offices of the First Baptist Church on Tuesday, January 28.

The proposed building will cost approximately \$60,000 and will be built on the same site as the present church on South First Street.

The new building will be of brick construction and will be modern in every respect. The main auditorium will be one story, with balcony, and will have a capacity of 1,000 to 1,200. The educational department will be two stories high and will have a seating arrangement to accommodate approximately 800. The

new building will be built entirely above the ground and will contain no basement.

It is hoped to be able to start construction on the building within the next thirty to sixty days, it was announced.

The people of this church have planned on this building for quite some time, realizing that the growth of their church demanded more adequate and comfortable facilities, and this announcement will be welcomed.

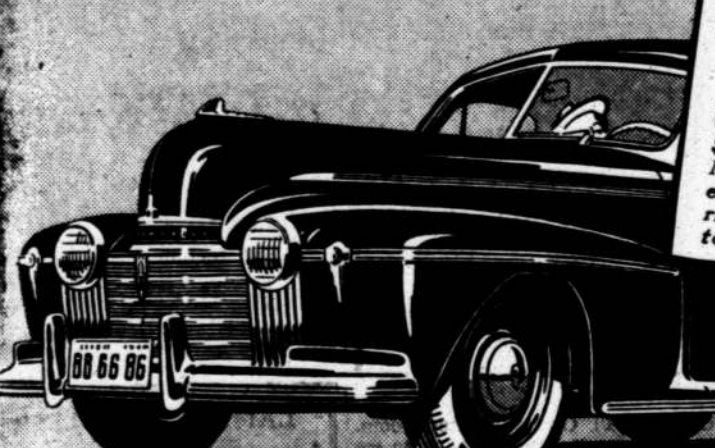

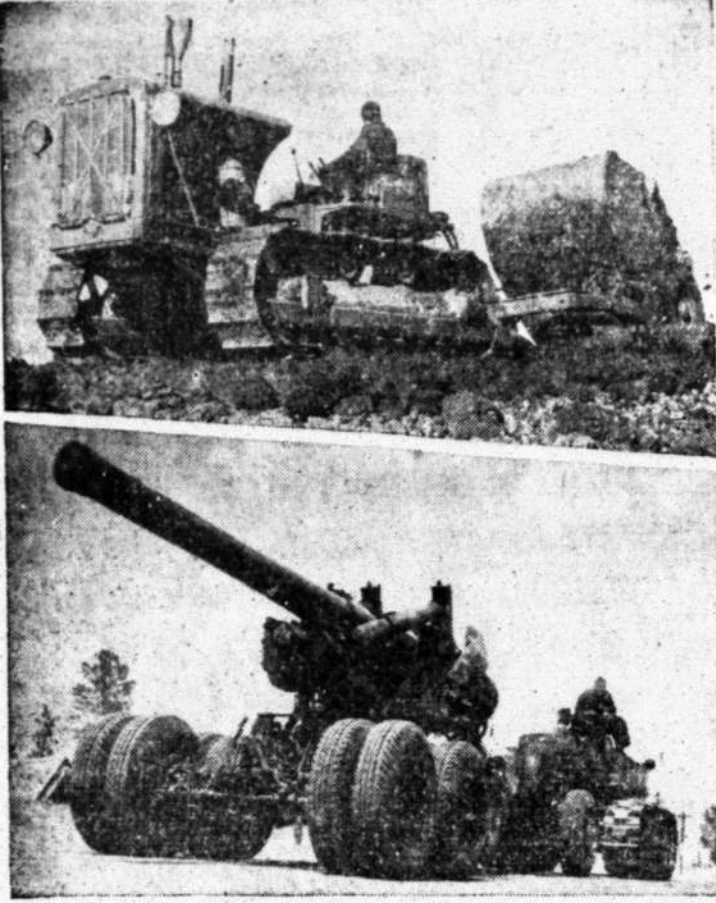

Health Unit Gives Summary Of Year's Work

The Five County Health Unit rounded out its first year's work, December 31, 1940. The Unit was set up January 1, 1940 by the Texas State Department of Health in cooperation with Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Gaines and Yoakum counties. The Unit has been very successful in setting up a type of health program which is and will be a great benefit to every citizen in the five county area. The following is a brief summary of the work done during the year by the Unit along the various health lines.

Communicable Disease Control
Since one of the chief purposes of public health is the prevention and control of communicable diseases, the Health Unit has during the year made a concerted effort to control all of the communicable diseases in the five counties. This program in brief is as follows:

Each disease reported was investigated to determine its origin so as to stop further spread. All cases of communicable diseases reported were quarantined or isolated and instructions were given on how to prevent family contacts from taking the disease. All contacts of the disease were immunized for the disease where ever possible. Immunizations were given by the Health Unit during the year were as follows:

Typhoid Fever	1984
Smallpox	1521
Diphtheria	149

These immunizations were limited in most cases to indigent people. There were many more persons immunized by the family physician, as a result of the educational program by the Health Unit.

School Health Program
The Health Unit has improved the health in schools by setting up a specific school health policy as drawn up by the Texas State Department of Health and State Department of Education. The nurses work closely with the teachers in trying to secure maximum health for each child. Many physical defects such as poor vision, poor hearing, diseased tonsils, and many others were discovered and corrected during the year. Pre-school clinic roundups were held by the Director and nurses during the spring and summer in an effort to obtain corrections of physical defects in the children before entering school. Over two thousand children were inspected and examined by the Director and nurses.

Maternal and Infant Health Program
Three hundred and seventy-six maternal cases were visited by the nurses during the year and a special effort was made to see that every expectant mother is under the care of a doctor as early in pregnancy as possible. In this way it is hoped that maternal and infant deaths as a result of child birth can be reduced. Two hundred and forty five infants have been admitted to the nursing service for care and supervision. The nurses have worked in close harmony with the family doctor to see that the expectant mother passes through the dangers of pregnancy with a minimum of mental and physical discomforts and a maximum of mental and physical health.

Veneral Disease Control
The Health Unit has set up a definite program by which veneral diseases will be brought under better control. An attempt has been made to inform the general public of the dangers of veneral diseases and on how to protect themselves from these diseases. Many Wasserman Tests were taken during the year and as a result several new cases of syphilis were discovered and placed under treatment. Many veneral disease patients were given treatment during the year by the Director at clinics held in Brownfield and Lamesa at the request of local doctors.

Sanitation Program
The Sanitarian conducted a wide-spread sanitation program through out the area which included periodic inspection of all food handling establishments, tourist camps, and school buildings. Two hundred and thirty-two visits were made to cafes and other food handling establishments and an effort was made to secure proper cleaning and sterilization of dishes and other food utensils. One hundred and seventy-seven visits were made to schools throughout the area and a great many improvements in sanitation about buildings and grounds were obtained. Several new water systems and excreta disposal systems were installed in the schools.

Milk Control Program
The Health Unit was instrumental in getting the City of Brownfield to pass a standard milk ordinance during the year. The sanitarian took over the work necessary to the enforcement of this ordinance. As a result eight new dairies were built and two other dairies extensively remodeled in the Brownfield territory in order to comply with this ordinance. All dairies in the five counties were inspected regularly in order to improve the quality and purity of milk sold to the public.

Sanitary Engineering Program
As a result of the work of the Sanitarian Engineer many improvements in the water supplies in the cities of the area have been made during the year. All the cities in the area were advised as to what improvements were necessary in the water supply system in order for them to obtain a state approved water rating. The sanitary engineer has worked with the Soil Conservation Service and other federal agencies to improve the water systems and excreta disposal systems in every farm home. The engineer was frequently consulted relative to improvements in many private water supply systems and

Washington Daybook

By Jack Stinnett
WASHINGTON — The foreman of a huge airplane factory walks through the shop, tapping this man and that on the shoulder. "As part of the defense program," he says, "we're having a camouflage drill. Get up on the roof and play a round of golf."

Sounds silly, doesn't it? But take the word of a group of Pittsburgh steel firm officials here to discuss plant construction possibilities with the National Defense Commission, something like that can happen in a few months in Texas. Here's how:

Work already has started at Hensley Field, near Dallas, according to J. Gordon Trumbull, steel company engineer, on a 20-acre, all-blackout, camouflaged plant for the North American Aviation Company. Construction plans call for a dummy golf course on the 20-acre roof. And what could make the camouflage so effective as having a couple of four-somes apparently dubbing around in case enemy scouting planes were out searching for possible objectives.

Walls of the plant are to be of pre-fabricated, corrugated, splinter-proof steel. There will not be a window in the building. Exits and entrances will have double doors like storm doors, so that under no circumstances can a light escape from the building. Inside the corrugation of the walls, will run the tubing for air conditioning, and wires for fluorescent lights which will illuminate the interior night and day.

The plant is the second structure built along these lines by the Pittsburgh firm, the other being the Allison airplane engine plant at Indianapolis. The company also has a number of plants in Liverpool, England, where the structures have been tested under actual war conditions.

According to cables reports from London, one of the chief benefits to the building under bomb-fire is that when direct or close hits blow out the walls, damaged sections can be replaced almost instantly.

The Texas plant, officials say, will be completed in 105 days from the time work started believed to be a record for construction of a factory of such size.

The Dallas plant is just another step in the use of pre-fabricated steel in the defense program. At Quantico, Va., the Marine Corps base, 100 enlisted men and their families will soon be occupying the first defense housing program homes built of prefabricated welded steel panels.

The same construction is being used in 100 twelve-family apartment units for shipyard employees at Newport News, Va.

These houses are demountable under roofs of sheet steel panels, and except for outer sidewalls of asbestos shingles over insulation board sheathing, are completely of steel. In the case of the Quantico two-family units, ten men working eight hours can get one ready for occupancy in a single day. Each side of the 48 by 28 foot buildings contains a living room, combination kitchen and dinette, two bedrooms and a bath.

All of these buildings are demountable and could be knocked down and transferred to other communities with little loss of time.

The Defense Commission has under consideration still a third prefabricated steel housing program, the designer of which declares he can house 700,000 persons in six months.

Indian Skeleton Uncovered By School Students

Henry Norris and Raymond Lee Johns have visited most of the rural schools of Dawson County and consulted them about progress they are making in the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce sponsored Dawson County History Contest, ending March 14.

Many of them are making rapid progress with their natural history exhibit. One community having uncovered a skeleton of what is supposed to have been an Indian. It will be placed on exhibit.

Participating merchants, who agree to abide by the findings of the committee, further agree to pay a "fine" of five dollars to the committee if they violate the rules. It is felt that this method will insure the program's success.

Any solicitor, under the rules laid down, must first submit his proposition to the Chamber of Commerce office, and the secret committee will be called in to investigate his proposition. If they

find it all right, they will issue him a card which will entitle him to solicit among the signers. Of course it is not compulsory that the signers buy from him just because the committee has okayed his proposition. He is at liberty to accept or reject the proposition, as he sees fit.

If the committee finds the proposition unworthy, they will refuse to issue a soliciting card, and those who have signed up on the proposition are obligated to turn down the solicitor's proposition, unless he has a card authorizing his deal. Merchants who are entering the plan are asked to request the solicitation card from anyone before giving any money or buying anything from him. If he hasn't a card, tell him he must make application at the Chamber of Commerce Office. This takes the burden off the merchant's back, of either accepting or rejecting the proposition.

This plan has been used in various forms in many cities, and everyone of them are highly pleased about it, according to Raymond Lee Johns, manager of the local organization, from these plans the local body has selected the best and put these plans together for a standard in Lamesa.

BOMBED-OUT LONDONERS THANKFUL FOR 'BUNDLES'



NEW YORK—Short-wave night broadcasts by air-raid wardens and patrol units in England frequently name Bundles for Britain in thanking Americans for relief supplies for the victims of total war.

Letters to Bundles for Britain tell of the safe arrival of shipments in England and point touching pictures of the comforts knitted goods and warm clothing provide for service men and bombed-out civilians.

"Thank Heaven For 'Bundles'"

"In London they are thanking heaven for Bundles for Britain, which are going direct to the naked and homeless people there," Valentine, Auckland, English poet, writes. "A girl told me of a family of ten, who'd lost everything and were in their night clothes, without money, food, clothes—even without shoes. They went to the centre where bundles were being given out and each got a bundle. Bundles for Britain has been a salvation to the people in London."

A case sent by Bundles for Britain to the Depot for Knitted Garments for the Royal Navy, London, arrived with a piece of a German shell in it, while another was partly empty as a result of "enemy action."

Grateful For Wonderful Help
"We are immensely grateful for all this wonderful help which is being given by your organization," the secretary of the depot writes. Similar letters of acknowledgment have come from the Soldier's, Sailor's & Airman's Families Association, and the Royal Air Force Comforts Committee.

Two Marine Officers Here Today To Enlist Lamesa Men In U. S. Marine Corps

Two recruiting officers of the United States Marines are in the city of Lamesa today, and they will remain through Friday, to take enlistments for that branch of service. They may be contacted at the Lamesa Post Office by those who are interested.

They are especially interested in men between the ages of 18 and 36 years, they stated, and an enlistment in the Marines offers a wide opportunity for education and travel. This branch of service also maintains two schools for the benefit of enlisted men. The Marine Corps and the Marine Vocational Schools.

They especially appealed to men who are familiar with the Dutch and Portuguese languages, stating that men with knowledge of these languages were offered a special opportunity for rapid advancement. They also stated that there were openings in the new tank units, as well as the Marine Aviation.

It was pointed out by the officers that any in the selective draft age who had volunteered for that service, but who had not been actually called, may enlist in the Marines.

A. Wyatt, Lamesa.

Dr. Cox Says:

While influenza is prevalent, the citizens of Texas are warned that they should not be in too big a hurry to return to their work following a stage of this disease. Influenza of itself is seldom fatal, but complications, principally pneumonia, are the cause of death, as-

"I had eight of your canteens in different parts of (a certain city). They did magnificently," Mrs. Ronald Tree from London says in her letter. "Your interest and generosity would have been amply repaid by the appreciation of those people to whom we were able to give their first hot drink or hot meal in forty-eight hours. They stood amidst the ruins of their homes, full of courage and cheerfulness. Tired women from the crowds flocked to help us with the washing up and serving. The town was crowded with exhausted firemen and soldiers clearing the debris."

Canteens A God Send

"Where people slept, I don't know, with loaves gone and shelters flooded. As there was neither light, gas, heat or water, you can imagine how welcome the canteens were to these thirsty people. I do hope you realize how appreciated American generosity is by people over here."

"It is magnificent the gifts you are sending over to our homeless people," writes Mrs. E. A. Rose of the Pembroke Depot, London. "If you can, put in a word that the clothes should be as warm as possible. The poor souls have only the one outfit given them. Often the outfit is very scanty and it is essential that what they get should be of good quality."

The number of cases of pneumonia reported last week was four times the usual incidence at this season of the year. The increase corresponds almost directly with the amount of influenza reported.

The termination of the acute symptoms of influenza does not indicate a complete recovery. Many persons believe this to be true and return to their daily routine, only to suffer a relapse. Others plod along in a weakened state, harbor a sub-acute cold, and by continuing to lower their resistance, invite prolonged trouble.

Past experience indicates that the longer an epidemic lasts, the more severe it becomes. The possibility of complications increases; therefore, early medical care in any suspected case of influenza is very important. Success in handling pneumonia depends on early recognition, and its onset may be unrecognized by the patient. In general a sharp pain in the chest on breathing and coughing may mean pneumonia has developed.

Proper medical care during attacks of influenza will prevent persons returning to work until it is safe to do so, and thus lessen the chances of having pneumonia.

DOES FORD PAY GOOD WAGES?

HERE ARE SOME FACTS about Ford Labor. During the year ended November 30th, 1940, the Ford Payroll throughout the United States averaged 113,628 hourly wage earners, not including office employees, students, or executives. They were paid \$185,105,639.12. On this basis, the average annual wage was \$1,629.05.

According to the latest available government figures, the annual average wage of all workers in employment covered by old age insurance law was \$841.00.

parison of compensation insurance costs: The national average rate in automotive manufacturing plants as computed by the National Association of Underwriters is in excess of \$1.50 premium on each \$100 payroll. The Ford cost of workmen's compensation is less than 50c.

This indicates that the chance of injury in a Ford plant is much less than in the average automobile plant.

The Ford Motor Company has no age limit for labor, and in fact deliberately attempts to keep older workers working. The average age of Ford workers at the Rouge and nearby plants is 38.7.

A recent check-up shows that nearly one-half the workers at these Ford plants were 40 or over, falling into these age groups:

25,819	between 40 and 50
14,731	between 50 and 60
3,377	between 60 and 70
417	between 70 and 80
12	between 80 and 90

In addition to the so-called regular employees, the Ford Motor Company has hired, and now has on the payroll, at the same regular hourly wage, thousands of workers who are blind, crippled or otherwise incapacitated for normal productive work. They are not selected for their ability to build cars or to maintain the plant. They are on the payroll because of Henry Ford's belief that the responsibility of a large company to labor goes beyond the point at which the unfortunate worker can no longer produce profitably.

The above are facts. They are open to anyone who really wants to deal in facts. Anyone who wants to get a job... buy a car... or place a national defense contract on the basis of fair labor treatment must place Ford at the top of his eligible list.

Summary Of Activities Of Dawson County Agent Are Given By Agent Baskin

Report Shows Agent Has Been Very Busy Man In A Wide And Versatile Variety Of Activities

During the year 1940 the county agent made 230 farm visits to 131 farms and ranches; received 1563 office calls and 529 telephone calls; wrote 83 news articles, 45 circular letters and 452 personal letters; made 3 radio talks; assisted in exhibiting Dawson County products and livestock at 4 fairs and fat stock shows; assisted the Dawson County Fair Association in putting on its annual fair; had 16 Club boys feed out 67 head of calves that sold for a total of \$5051.72; Dawson County 4-H Club boys and their calves won 8th place at San Angelo, 7th, 9th and 10th prizes at Odessa Show, 9th prize at the Lubbock Show and 22nd prize at the Dallas Fair.

Assisted the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Association in holding its annual show February 20-21, 1940; Held a two-day terracing school in January which was attended by 48 people that received instructions and field training in the use of the Farm Level; ran terrace lines on 1100 acres of land and contour lines on 600 acres of land; established pasture spreader terraces totaling 31,852 feet on one ranch; held 15 meetings on the proposed soil conservation district in explaining the provision of the State S. C. Law; carried 8 Club boys to the A. & M. Short Course, 25 Club Boys to the District Club Camp at Tankersley, and one club boy to the District 6 Club tour of 18000 miles, and acted as one of the leaders on this same trip;

Assisted the County Home Demonstration Council, the County Land Use Planning Committee, the Dawson County A. C. A. County Committee and the Commissioner's Court in setting up the Mattress Program; assisted O. F. Shofner, Commissioner, Precinct 1, in setting up a demonstration on the eradication of Johnson grass in Precinct 1; assisted two dairymen in joining Dairy Herd Improvement Association for the testing of their herds for milk and butter fat production; assisted the County Land Use Planning Committee in the holding of the third annual Dairy Day program that was attended by 200 people, and had 63 head of fine dairy cattle from five counties exhibited;

Cooperated with the Farm Security Administration in selecting their committees, putting over their Tenant Purchase Program and Water Facilities Program; cooperated with the Dawson County Agricultural Conservation Association in the holding of their educational meetings and other matters; worked with the County Land Use Planning Committee, and assisted in entertaining their representative at the State Land Use Planning meeting in July.

Bascom Giles Asks Time Extension Of Land Payments

AUSTIN, Jan. 15 — Stating that there is no investment on which School Funds could get a higher return, Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Saturday recommended to Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and members of the legislature that the time for payment of principal on all school land sales contracts which are due or will become due before November 1, 1951, should be extended to that date.

The extension would give the state the interest on \$12,410,939 principal on 17,904 accounts on purchases before 1911 for several more years. "Such an extension is good business for the state and its school fund," Commissioner Giles said, "and would also be of material assistance to many of the State's purchasers whose contracts will become due this period. We are now in the midst of a National emergency which will make it difficult for landowners to meet their principal payments, and the School Fund could not find a better source of revenue from its assets than interest on the sale of its lands," Commissioner Giles added.

The Commissioner made his recommendation as a result of numerous land holders asking for the extension and their assurance that they would avail themselves of it.

Commissioner Giles explained the work that has been done in the General Land Office the last two years in compiling the 404,000 state abstracts into compact, single-line entries from the previous sixty-three volumes, and suggested that an appropriation be made to print and bind the revised abstract volumes. The existing abstract volumes were last published in 1878 and since then changes in status and new abstracts have appeared in annual supplementary volumes.

The most efficient procedure to publish these abstracts would be to divide the state into eight districts, averaging about 32 counties to the district. Such a revision would be of untold benefit to the Comptroller of Public Accounts and to the tax collecting agencies of the state, in addition to abstracting plants and attorneys who do title work throughout the state. Much formerly unrendered land would be added to the tax rolls of the various counties by virtue of the information disclosed by these books, Commissioner Giles said.

Lord Halifax... Diplomat Extra-Ordinary

WASHINGTON — A reformed appeaser who publicly recanted his avowed friendship for Germany is Britain's choice for the "biggest job outside the British Isles"—Ambassador to the United States.

Capital speculation indicates the new envoy, Third Viscount Halifax, may even have been picked because he can and has supplied rebuttal argument to any who believe a negotiated peace with Germany is desirable.

Halifax approved the Munich deal with Hitler, guaranteeing Czechoslovakia. He counseled collaboration with Germany. Then Hitler marched into Prague and made a relentless enemy of Halifax. The Viscount promptly and publicly acknowledged error in advocating the Munich deal, urged last-ditch resistance to Nazi aggression.

What manner of man is Edward Frederick Lindley Wood, G. C. S. I., G. C. I. E., P. C., R. G., Viscount Halifax and First Baron Irwin of Kirby Underdale?

He is a contradiction. He has played the part of a religious mystic, reportedly sitting on the floor cross-legged to discuss abstract theology with Mahatma Gandhi. Short months later he was a tough, practical administrator who ruthlessly put down that same Gandhi's civil disobedience campaign with troops.

His concern with things spiritual is legendary. His father worked through the 94 years he lived for union of the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches. Father and son rose daily for 6 a. m. devotions, a custom Halifax still observes.

Yet this spiritual peer is also a man of action in the temporal world. His solid place in English aristocracy is bulwarked by alliances with other noble families. His sister married Baron Bingley, his daughter wed Lord Feversham. His wife is the daughter of the 11th Earl of Devon.

Halifax is a fox-hunting squire, who said he would rather be a master of fox hounds than a cabinet minister. He has been both. He was a member of Parliament from 1910 and only emerged from political obscurity in 1921 as Undersecretary of Colonies.

From then on he zoomed. He was President of the Board of Education — a cabinet post — in 1923, Minister of Agriculture in 1924, Viceroy to India 1926-31, President of the Board of Education again, Minister for War, Lord Privy Seal, Leader of the House of Lords, Lord President of the Council, and finally Foreign Secretary until he was named ambassador to the U. S.

His left arm has been virtually useless since birth, yet he has been an able athlete. He led his regiment as colonel of the Yorkshire Dragoons in the World War.

No complainer, this Halifax. Rather, in the words of former U. S. Ambassador Joseph Kennedy, "almost a saint." A man full of paradoxes, at any rate.

But says the Yorkshire Post of the home county boy sent to America: "It is no spellbinding orator we want in Washington, but a man of absolute integrity whom Americans can unreservedly trust. The worst ambassador we could have just now would be one liable to invite suspicion as an astute propagandist sent to wheedle America into the war."

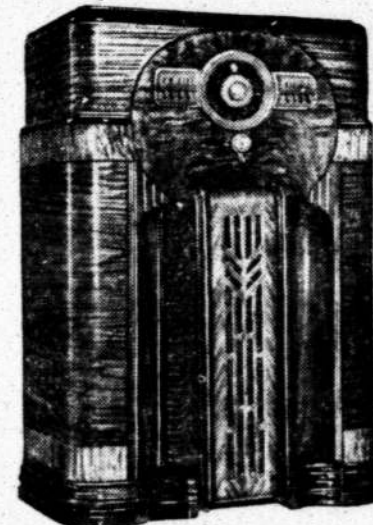

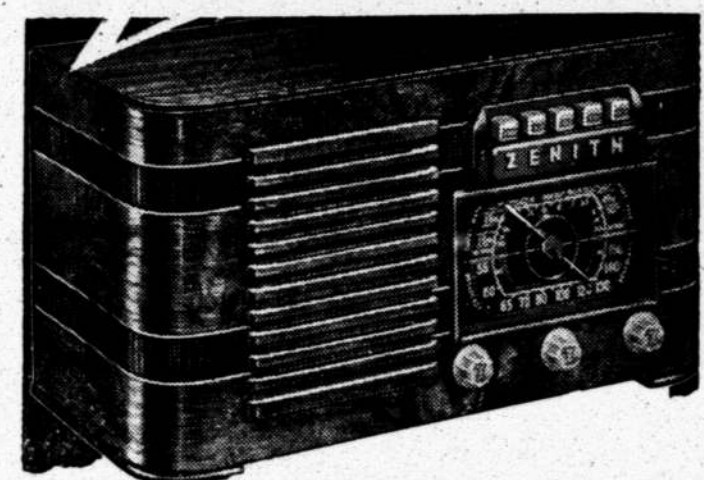

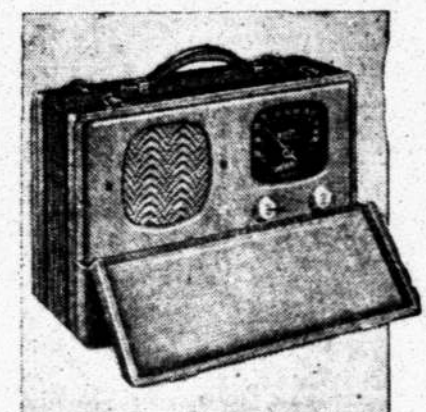
