IRRIGATION POSSIBILITIES.

At a recent election at Eagle Pass, according to the Eagle Pass Daily Guide, a few copies of which were recently mailed to The Eagle by Mr. C. W. Arlt, of Austin, a preliminary bond was voted in a proposed irrigation district, including the town of Eagle Pass, with only one dissenting vote.

Eagle Pass is a growing, and prosperous town of several thousand, and enjoys a good business with old Mexico, but the people of the town, progressive and awake, felt that there was a vast opportunity in irrigation and after going into the matter thoroughly with Mr. Arlt, who is a specialist in irrigation matters, they began to advocate the formation of an irrigation district, to be created under the new Texas irrigation law, and within a short time the overwhelming vote mentioned above was the result.

A similar project has already reached advanced stages near Cotulla and others are in process of organization. Irrigation is no longer an experiment. It is becoming more and more a necessity, where it is at all feasible, because of the increasing demand for more production, and with the unlimited water resources of this county, and with land that is proving every year that it will grow almost anything under the sun, irrigation offers Kimble County, or at least that part of the county lying along the river, an unlimited opportunity for development.

Of course it is a big proposition. Millions of dollars in bonds, seem impossible of ever being liquidated, but with the productiveness of the lands increased many times, and by following a well prepared plan, the cost of liquidating the bonds and including the water rights, would not amount to more than a few dollars per acre per year.

There may not be as much to an irrigation project for this county as we feel that there is, but, as we see it, we are losing a great opportunity. We may be able to delay the matter several years and still be in position to take advantage of our water possibilities, and we may not. The water rights may go unchallenged for years, or they may be acquired by outside interests that will take it beyond our reach for all time to come.

At any rate, it is worth thinking about and talking about, and at least thorough investigation.

CAR RAMS BRIDGE AND INJURES SEVERAL.

An accident that came near proving fatal occurred Sunday night a few miles east of Monday when a car driven by J. A. Gamble was driven head-on against the solid concrete banisters of a bridge near the W. R. Burrier place. J. A. Gamble, his wife and two children, and Miss Vera Wilkinson were in the car when the accident occurred. Mr. Gamble was pretty badly hurt by being thrown against the steering wheel, while his escaped practically uninjured. The two children received injuries, but not of a serious nature. Miss Vera Wilkinson possibly sustained the worst injuries. She was thrown through the windshield, and aside from being pretty severely bruised, sustained ugly flesh wounds on the face, and her jaw was dislocated.

The car struck this obstruction when it met another car. The impact of the heavy car naturally drove the concrete banister into the motor arrangement, but the force was not sufficient to throw the car over.

At this writing all who were in the accident are doing nicely and will likely recover in a short time.—Menard Messenger.

BUCKS TO AFRICA.

Somewhere between here and South Africa, the first exportation of American Angora goats to that country from which the goat men of this section have for years bought new blood for their flocks, is under way. Two of the four bred by B. M. Halbert and Fred Earwood, will bring \$1,000 each, while the other two, the property of Bob Davis and son, and J. A. Ward and son, are sent in exchange for two bucks from that country. The names of the two shipped by Halbert and Earwood are "Modern Gage" and "Baby Lee," both of the B type. The exchanged bucks are "Callow" and "American Gentleman." The cost of shipping has been about \$110 a head.

The animals left here by express the middle of June and left New York on the steamer Weats Islet, on June 24. They are consigned to J. H. Holson, president of South African Angora Goat Society. South African breeders brought a large number of bucks to this section last summer and sold them at Camp Wood. Mr. Halbert predicts that there will be a steady bit of traffic between the goat men of South Africa and of this country.—San Angelo Standard.

A number of Junction people and a great many from the east and northeast part of the county were in Mason Tuesday and Wednesday for the two big days at that place. Ben Hey, former Junctionite, now secretary of the Chamber of Commerce of the progressive town and doing innumerable details connected with the activities of the town's commercial body. Ben has been especially active in helping put over the picnic-barbecue there this week.

Rev. Dekle returned last week-end from Scallion where he and Rev. Oren C. Reid conducted a most successful revival, resulting in 12 additions to the church of which Rev. Reid is pastor.

It may be that he will leave this week-end for Elgin, where he will conduct a revival, but in the event he leaves, he will have some one to take his place at both morning and evening services.

LYNCH DAVIDSON FOR GOVERNOR.

(From the Houston Post, November 25, 1923.)

Ordinarily, The Post would hesitate to discuss the governorship with respect to candidates, and its own preference, at a time so far in advance of the primary election, when the people are concerned with their more imminent problems. In the past, The Post has preferred to await the entry of all aspirants with their formal statement of principle and policy, and choose from among them according to its conviction and its view of their respective merits and ability.

It is time for the taxpayers of Texas to know that the governorship is not a political honor to be bestowed upon some likeable person; not a reward even for previous public service; and, certainly not a responsibility to be confided to some demagogue who promises much and performs nothing. The facts fairly blaze in the faces of the taxpayers of this State, and they proclaim that Texas needs now a business doctor at the head of the government as at no other period of her history.

These facts and conditions render the candidacy of a clear-thinking, up-standing business man of known integrity and demonstrated worth and ability a matter of necessity.

Lynch Davidson is not only such a man, but the only man of these requisite qualifications in the race. His experience in the public service has acquainted him with the problems that are pressing for solution and the common sense administrative reform which are demanded in the very name of good government.

In his announcement, he states the conditions he pledges himself to correct, and he is known far and wide as a man who regards his pledge as obligations to be met at all hazards.

So it is not merely because Mr. Davidson is an esteemed neighbor that The Post supports him for governor; not alone because of his exalted character or his appealing personality; but because in the emergency of the time, and the urgent need of a re-adjustment of all the business of the State government in the direction of efficiency and economy, Texas needs him.

MEETING OF THE NEW HOTEL STOCKHOLDERS.

At a meeting last Friday in the directors' room of the National Bank, all the stockholders of the Junction Hotel Company except three that were out of town, discussed the present hotel situation.

Stockholders present were: Coke R. Stevenson, Walter G. Loeffler, J. A. Heyman, F. L. Wilson, H. G. Perry, Joe Fritz, George Braley, E. R. Borden, Frank Bissett, Arthur Simon, A. O. Lawler, A. G. Farmer, L. R. Hodges, Emil A. Loeffler, L. E. Pippin.

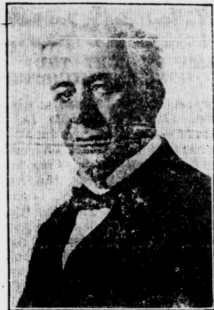
Emil A. Loeffler, who has been one of the prime movers in organizing the hotel company presided at the meeting and went into considerable details as to the efforts that had been put forth so far, and the obstacles that had been encountered.

Plans had been drawn originally with the expectation of getting several thousand dollars more in stock subscriptions than has been paid to date. Ten thousand dollars of this additional subscription was that of the Junction State Bank, subscribed by W. P. Riley as its president. Mr. Loeffler stated that the two or three months delay in the hotel matter had been caused by the fact that Mr. Riley had made one condition after another affecting the bank's subscription, and that he (Loeffler) and others had gone to no little trouble and expense in meeting, or attempting to meet these conditions in order that the money as subscribed, would be put into the hotel fund and that as one condition was met, another would be made, until at a meeting that occurred Thursday with Mr. Loeffler, Mr. Riley and Judge Stevenson present, Mr. Riley stated that he was not going to put another dollar of his money into any kind of public enterprise in Junction, reserving the right to change his mind.

After this conference with Mr. Riley, Mr. Loeffler called the stockholders together to have each one decide for himself if he desired to continue in the organization, pay the remaining 50 per cent of the stock subscription, and go on with the hotel organization and build the hotel of such a size as to come within the amounts in hand. The vote for this was unanimous, and that afternoon, Mr. Loeffler got in touch with Mr. G. W. Fry of the West Texas Utilities Company, who was passing through Junction on his way to San Angelo. Mr. Fry turned back, telephoned the San Antonio architect to meet him in Comfort and went over the proposition of revising the plans to meet the new conditions.

Within a few days the revised plans, similar to the first ones, fire-proof throughout, but size of structure reduced, will be ready. A meeting will soon be called for the purpose of electing directors and officers. The stock certificates will then be issued. Construction will begin about the middle of August, and the hotel will be completed about Jan. 1, 1927.

At the regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court Monday, two third class roads were designated. One leading from Joy Branch, about 14 miles east of town, leaving the Highway and going south along the present neighborhood road to the Blackmon ranch. The second was the present community road, leading from the Highway about 15 miles west of Junction to the river. This road is used in going to Bethel Church and by a number of families living in the Weaver community.

PARIS AT NIGHT, THE SEINE AND EXHIBITION

Paris is most radiant at night time. One would have to be callous indeed, not to have an accelerated heart-beat on crossing the Place de la Concorde, with its many vistas, the most impressive of which is the Champs Elysees with its magnificent width of gleaming pavement and in the far distance, the Arc de Triomphe under which, like an eternal soul, flames the torch to the Unknown Soldier.

Though late in the summer as it was, all Paris was still interested in the Exposition des Arts Decoratifs, which, after receiving international interest and unanimous approval from the whole world, was scheduled to close in the early autumn.

As we approached the ground the Seine was an alluring picture, reflecting myriad lights of brilliant colors from the innumerable buildings, exhibits and amusement stalls. Fountains, in all tones of the rainbow, vied with each other in elaborate splendor and like gay women with wind-tossed hair, threw their silvery spray into a rose, tinted night.

"Paul Poirot's love-boats are tres charmant," announced Barrington Pierce, lapsing into French. "As I said before, and I think a little different from any restaurant in which you've dined." So we made our way between laughing holiday people to the first of three boats,

designed by that most famous creator of feminine attire. We boarded the "Desiree" and I was tempted to stop at one of the inviting tables with its orange light and flamboyant umbrella which was the only separation between the guests and the starry sky. But Andre announced that they were reserved for the after-dinner crowd or for those who wished to sit and sip champagne, so to the sound of haunting music, we went below and found ourselves in surroundings typical of the most exclusive supper-clubs of the smart Parisien.

"This is attractive," declared Curtis, who was in his usual good humor once more.

"Or, as your friend Ellie Mitchell would say, 'It's the rat's rubbers,'" laughed Barry, turning to me.

I looked around; of course we had read about the intricate house-boats on the Seine, and I believed that of all the artistic things I had seen in Europe, right here was displayed the most original ideas. In the first place the small tables and chairs were painted mid-night blue and raspberry red; the walls were of rough-textured ceru linen with alterante stripes of blue and red, each little chair had its own little cushion and individual design; the walls were also covered with futuristic pictures representing in the most grotesque manner, all sorts of fruits, liquors and wines. But perhaps the most

charming touch of all was curtains which gave the boat the cozy atmosphere of a private dining room and shut out the night. They were made of hand-blocked natural-toned linen printed in huge poppies of vivid hue.

"Look at the ornaments around the walls!" I exclaimed, clapping my hands in delight.

"Yes, Poirot selected each of those himself with meticulous care," explained Andre. "They are as interesting as museum pieces, each bit of antique pottery being a study in itself."

I think perhaps the most temperamental touch of the entire place was that the dinner was served in appropriate and clever plates, each suited to its particular course.

"What adorable lights!" I cried, taking in the details of the room. I could not hide my joy as I examined the silver torchieres which were swathed in cream-tinted paper streamers that gave the effect of candle-light through lovely old lace. Dinner over, we sought the amusement section, and here indeed did we get a new perspective of the French people in festive mood. Many books have been written, and cleverly too, about the city of Paris and its big-hearted Parisiens, but at a play-place such as the Exposition, and at night-time, one could observe them unaffected by the superficialities of every day life. The amusements were all very different from ones at fairs and festivals at home.

There was one peep-show that Lemoyne said she had heard about, and around which stood both men and women apparently enjoying themselves, and laughing boisterously at what she saw.

"Let's go in here," suggested Barry, with the enthusiasm of a child. "Don't guess it will be too rough; I saw a conservative banker from Kokomo, Indiana, just ahead with his fat wife and daughters."

We all laughed and entered the exhibit. I couldn't believe

my eyes at what I saw on the interior. It was so absolutely typical of the French people, and so very different; however, almost simultaneously we entered into the spirit of the amusement.

MOODY VS. DAVIDSON.

There seems to be little doubt but that a good per cent of the 1,500 people who heard Dan Moody speak at the City Park Thursday afternoon of last week were Davidson supporters. These gentlemen seem to wonder at the exactness of Mr. Moody in seeing to it that the Davidson issues were not mentioned. It appears that he is exceedingly anxious to have Mr. Davidson eliminated in the first primary, believing he would have a much easier task in defeating Mrs. Ferguson.

The Tribune has no criticisms to offer against Mr. Moody, nor any who deem it wise to support him. Undoubtedly he is a man of some courage and from the sincerity he puts into his campaign is honest in his contentions. We are quite willing to concede to every voter the right to choose according to his better judgment.

Another point that is becoming very noticeable, is the fight the Moody organization is making to get the belief before the people of Texas that the race is between Moody and Ferguson. Apparently, they realize that should Davidson and Moody get in the run-off Moody will have to frame some new talking points, for about all the youthful attorney general has discussed in the campaign thus far is Jim Ferguson. He makes the plea that his only intent in entering the race was to rid Texas of Fergusonism. If this be his honest conviction then what will be his plea before the people in the second primary, in the event he is opposed by Mr. Davidson?

Texas is a mighty big state and the claim that has been promoted that Moody is a pos-

sible winner in the first primary is fallacy. As a matter of fact, this would be almost out of reason, and has not been taken seriously by the rank and file. No one can say how the vote will go. Talking to one man in a certain section who happens to be a Davidson supporter, it might appear that the Houston man would win in a walk. The same would hold true in most instances if talking to either Ferguson or Moody supporters. In other words, we are all prone to make the situation just as favorable as possible for our particular candidate.

As has been stated before, this paper is supporting Mr. Davidson simply because it is felt that he is the best qualified of the three. He is a tried executive and has been accustomed to dealing with big problems, choosing between right and wrong. In his younger days he surely must have made some costly errors. Any young successful man is the man who profits by his past experiences. This rule will hold true in all walks of life. The beaten path will have to be trod by Dan Moody or any other young man who aspires to a business or political career. The fundamentals are the same in either avocation.

In our humble judgment, there are too many good and valid reasons for support in favor of Mr. Davidson and we shall therefore consistently voice this sentiment until the end.—Stephenville Tribune.

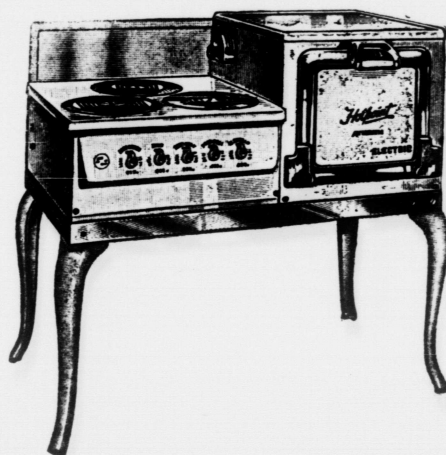

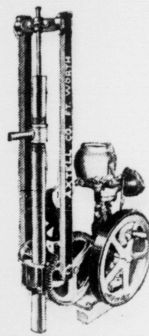

"THE HOUSE BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD."

The story of how Sam Walter Foss came to write that wonderful poem, "The House by the Side of the Road," is interesting and contains an appealing lesson in human kindness.

Who had placed these signs, there? Foss sought the owner and found a kindly faced old man.

"Well," said the old man, "we had water a plenty, and I thought it would be a good thing to share it with the thirsty travelers. This is a pleasant spot to rest, so I brought down an old bench from the attic. We have more apples than we can dispose of, so Ma and I thought it would be nice to divide with others, so we bring some down every day. It seems to do good, so we keep it up."

No matter how remote is your corner by the side of the road, you can be a friend to those who pass that way.—EX.

There are rumors abroad that the State Highway Department at Austin is considering designating the road from Fredericksburg to Junction a State Highway. Now if they are considering such a move it is high time that we keep them considering. Resorting for a moment to illustration, let us point out the importance of such a highway. There is a splendid highway from Austin to Fredericksburg, and there is a first class highway from Junction to El Paso, covering something like 600 miles. The line from Austin to Junction, thence to El Paso is a straight line, but there is a little stretch of something like 70 miles from Fredericksburg to Junction that breaks the chain. Really, it is but 25 miles for the road from Fredericksburg to Harper is in very good condition. This will leave the last link, the 25 miles of bad road from Harper to Segovia, where the Harper road meets the highway, to be the only obstacle in this highway straight westward from Austin to El Paso. With this little link of 25 miles forged into the chain this would put Fredericksburg, Harper and Junction on a highway that stretches something over 700 miles in an almost straight line. What is 25 when compared with 700? Let us get together with Junction and Fredericksburg and see what we can do towards keeping the State interested in building this little stretch of road.—Harper Herald.

NEWSPAPER SINS

After about twenty years in the newspaper business, this editor has come to the conclusion that the most of a newspaper's sins are those of omission, rather than commission.

If the editor writes up the achievements of one citizen, there are any number of citizens who think they deserve the same (if not greater) attention and prominence. If he boasts a local undertaking, others in like lines of endeavor think they, too, deserve a little boosting. All of which may be true in fact. Yet, at the same time, these same folks never put themselves out to call attention to their endeavors; never show the slightest sign of appreciation or notice of such little bits of publicity as they may have received, and, in fact, never call attention to the editor's lack of attention until after the 'beans have been burnt.'

There is not a newspaper man anywhere but who would rather tell a story correctly, than incorrectly; who would not rather tell a story completely, than incompletely; who would not rather deal in facts than fiction. He cannot scour the countryside in order to obtain all the different viewpoints on a question; neither can he hold up a matter of news indefinitely just because someone is waiting to be asked rather than to volunteer information. The newspaper man, if he be a newspaper man, must take the facts at hand, tell the story as fully, as completely and as correctly as the circum-

stances warrant or enable him to do, and tell the news, while while it's new.

So, if you have a news story worth the telling, don't expect the editor to be a Christopher Columbus, and discover your story. Tell it to him; show it to him; get him to see it from your own enthusiastic standpoint. If you can't become enthused enough over your own proposition to go to that much trouble, it is not likely that an editor will want to spend his time on it.—San Saba News.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof the following:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as land privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication of the election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9.

A Joint Resolution relating to the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners, providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature.

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas, and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1925, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the

amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9.

A resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section 3.)

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred \$100.00 dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year; and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws and all school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether the same be in one district or territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, for the erection and

equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified voters shall vote such tax not to exceed any one year \$100.00 dollar on the hundred dollar valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax heretofore levied on cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1925, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

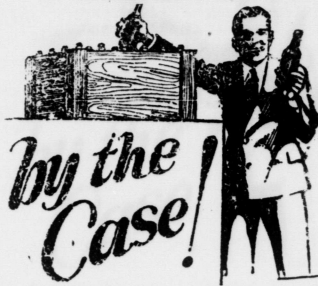
