RAGING MISSISSIPPI INCREASES ITS DEATH TOLL TO 119 VICTIMS

LEVEE CUT FAILS TO ATTAIN POWER ENGINEERS HOPED

FRESH BREAKS MENACE LIVES OF SEVERAL HUNDRED

DAMAGE APPALLING

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 29.—The toll of human life taken by the Arkansas flood leaped to 119 tonight. Three negroes were drowned near England when their boat capsized. Two white bodies were found floating in the water near Forrest City. A negro woman died of exposure at Davis hospital in Jefferson county and a negro died of exposure in Forrest City. Eleven persons had a narrow escape from drowning in St. Francis county when their truck turned off the highway into deep backwaters. Mollie Smith, 44, was slightly injured. Raymond, brother of Forrest City, rescued two white adults and one negro boy.

Levee Breaks

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 29.—(P)—Tearing through the levee at South Bend late today, the swollen Arkansas river again made mockery of man's heroic work to stem the raging tide. Set free by a 200 yard gap, rapidly widening, the flood waters will virtually complete the inundation of southeast Arkansas. Meanwhile the Mississippi river, on its recent rampage, threatened at least three levees as the torrents swept to the lower delta where an artificial levee was torn in the dyke at Paducah to save New Orleans from possible inundation. Several houses in McComb, Ark., already flooded and in the path of the new wave from the South Bend break on the Arkansas river have been crumbling and Red Cross workers labored feverishly tonight to evacuate the town. It was announced at headquarters here.

800 in Danger

The refugees there have been marooned for several days on upper floors of dwellings. More than 300 persons were reported in the town. The waters from the break will leave hardly a dry spot in southeast Arkansas except Monticello and Grady which already have 7,000 refugees. Pauper's Grave May Contain Rich Dealer

VICTORIA, Tex., April 29.—(P)—The mysterious disappearance of Louis E. Overstreet, prominent produce dealer of Lake Worth, Florida, may be solved by a pauper's grave here. A man dressed in cheap clothing was found dead along the Missouri Pacific railroad six miles north of Placedo in this county April 19. The only identifying marks on the body were an automobile key and initials on a pocket handkerchief. It is believed a leading produce dealer and tomato grower of Alamo and Brownsville, came here Friday to have his body exhumed in the belief that it is his brother. The brother disappeared April 6, after wiring from Florida that he was coming to Texas. Nothing further has been heard from him, and his relatives have been unable to locate him. Mr. Overstreet said his brother was a man of financial means, that he left Florida in an automobile and presumed that on account of the bad roads he discontinued the automobile trip at Houston. He said the description of the dead man answered that of his brother, but he was unable to account for the cheap clothing. The laundry marks were discovered to be "L.E.O." after Mr. Overstreet arrived here.

LINN WINS VERDICT IN DAMAGE HEARING

OVER THIRTEEN THOUSAND IS INVOLVED IN DECISION FOR PLAINTIFF

Verdict in favor of the plaintiff, involving total damages amounting to approximately \$13,575, was returned by the jury today in the damage suit brought by Robert Linn against J. R. Griffin, in connection with the sale of stock made in the American Mexican Land company, a development scheme in 1909 and 1910. The jury was out for three hours. Five special issues involved in the charge to the jury were all decided in favor of the plaintiff, it was stated. The plaintiff maintained that he purchased stock amounting to \$3,000 in the land company under representation that it was a going concern, with ownership of over fifty-three thousand acres of title-free land, which they could purchase for \$5 per acre, that the land in question actually did not have a clear title, and due to litigation and other matters, including alleged loss of entire stock to the promoters of the company whereby they gained control of it although not putting up as much money as the stockholders, caused the investors to lose their money. Defense maintained that investors were dealing with status of the land at the time that it became involved during the various revolutions in Old Mexico, and for reasons beyond the control of the organizers became an unprofitable enterprise. LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 29.—(P)—An open verdict was returned by a coroner's jury here today in the death of Tom Kerrick, movie cowboy, after Miss Anita Davis, film extra, and testified that "going to a drinking party was accidental. Further investigation of the case was ordered by the jury. Miss Davis said the gun was in the hands of Mrs. Sarah Kerrick, film double and wife of the slain man, and that it "went off" when she saw it and jerked Mrs. Kerrick's arm. The witness collapsed before completing her testimony of the all night drinking party at Kerrick's Hollywood home, which was attacked by four film extras, she was removed from the court room.

DODGE IS NOW FUGITIVE FROM SAN FRANCISCO OFFICERS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—(P)—Horace E. Dodge, Jr., heir to the Dodge motor millions, was a fugitive from justice today because he did not appear in police court to answer to two charges of battery and assault filed against him by San Francisco newspapers. Police Judge Joseph M. Golden declared forfeited the \$500 bail on which Dodge was released and issued a bench warrant for his arrest. The case was continued 30 days.

GOVERNOR GIVES ROAD GROUP HIS COMPLETE OKEH

VOICES SATISFACTION IN MEMBERS AND THEIR ACTIONS

APPROVES WORK

DENIES RUMORS THAT BACKING HAS BEEN WITHHELD

AUSTIN, April 29.—(P)—Unqualified endorsement of the highway commission today was voiced by Governor Dan Moody in a flare back to a tumultuous row between senators and highway commissioners yesterday in the senate finance committee room. The clash yesterday between Commissioner Con Johnson and Senator Archie Parr of Denairville, and others brought forth indirect statements from Parr that the highway commission will serve as a point of attack on Moody in the next governor's campaign. "Every member of the highway commission is serving at a tremendous personal sacrifice. I take pride in the fact that I was able to secure their services as members of the committee and, for my part, I expect to give them my support and cooperation."

Denies Backing Withheld

Moody denied newspaper stories this morning quoting the governor as saying the highway commission has a tremendous report by and should be borne with. He also discounted the statement that he criticized highway engineer E. A. Thompson for accepting private employment while holding official position.

"My attention has been called to a newspaper item with reference to highway matters. The language used does not properly define my position in the matter. I believe that the principle of selecting highway employees upon consideration of efficiency and integrity rather than solely upon political considerations is correct and commendable. My commendation of this principle is merely reiteration of my position both in the campaign and at the time I went into office when I committed to the heads of the department the selection of employees."

Faith in Commission

"I am positive of certain facts, among which are the following: That the people of Texas have a capable efficient highway commission which will give our state a comprehensive road building program; that the people will have their highway affairs administered efficiently and honestly; and that their money will not be wasted but that it will be judiciously and economically spent. The confidence of the people of Texas in the highway commission is greater today than it was when the commission took office."

Moody's statement endorsed Johnson's stand before the commission yesterday regarding distribution of positions. During the argument, the commissioner declared "no senator, no representative, chamber of commerce nor any man can dictate appointments."

SURVEY OF IRRIGATION SCHEME REQUESTED BY CABINET MAN

Moody Appoints Committee For Making Draft Of Tax Revision

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 29.—Remainder of a committee of 15 to make a tax survey of Texas and recommend measures to carry out the intent of the Stevenson proposed constitutional amendment adopted by the federal legislature, was appointed today by Governor Dan Moody. Eight citizens widely voted in tax matters and related subjects were named to work with the legislative committee of three from the senate and four from the house. Aim of the Stevenson measure is to direct all Valorem taxes, solely to counties and provide for support of the state government from intangible taxes, such as franchise and corporation levies. The measure, which is to be voted upon by the people as a constitutional amendment, is regarded as one of the most important legislative moves in years to equalize tax burdens in Texas and perhaps lower property taxes. The committee is to get to work soon on remedial tax propositions which can be incorporated into law if the Stevenson resolution is supported by popular vote. Appointment of the governor are: O. B. Colquhoun, Dallas, former governor, tax commissioner, member of the Texas senate, and author of tax legislation. A. P. CHAMBERLIN ILL, MOORE TRIAL IS RESET FOR JULY

FAULTY INDICTMENT IS SUGGESTED AS WAY TO QUASH CASE

WITNESS IS WORSE

DOCTORS STATE THAT HE COULD NOT APPEAR

AUSTIN, April 29.—Trial of H. H. Moore, Chamberlain, expelled from the Texas legislature and defeated for re-election, was unexpectedly cut short today and ordered continued to July 11, on a physician's testimony that W. W. Chamberlin, accusing witness, was to ill mentally and physically to make a satisfactory witness and avoid possible collapse on the stand. District Judge J. R. Hamilton, granted the state's motion for delay and overruled a defense motion to have the jury instructed to return a verdict of "not guilty" as pleaded.

Indictment in Doubt

Some doubt was raised as to whether Moore can be prosecuted further legally on the joint indictment of him and F. A. Dale of Bonham, also expelled from the house of representatives for alleged acceptance of \$1,000 from Chamberlin to get an unfavorable house committee action of Moore's Optometrist tax bill. Judge Hamilton, before granting the state motion to withdraw announcement of ready, reminded District Attorney J. D. Moore that renewed trial of the defendant later might be attacked as placing him in "jeopardy" a second time as forbidden by law.

The district attorney admitted the possibility but declared he felt it the "bounden duty of the state to recognize the witness' condition," and his apparent inability to testify properly if at all.

Witness Ill

Chamberlin was in such a high-strung, nervous state from weeks of apprehension and speculation on the trial that he could not give a coherent account of himself on the stand, in the opinion of Doctor F. C. Gregg, called as a witness by the state, this morning after Chamberlin had a relapse yesterday's condition that put him in an emergency hospital while court recessed for the day.

Meetings of the chapter are to be on the second and fourth Fridays of each month and a public program is to be given when the chapter charter is returned.

SIXTEEN CHILDREN HURT

Mrs. Chaplin Given Temporary Alimony

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—(P)—Lila Grey Chaplin today was awarded \$1,500 a month alimony pending her suit for divorce from Charlie Chaplin. Superior Judge Walter Guerin made the order retroactive, the payments to start from January 10, the date on which she filed her complaint. She also was awarded \$1,600 for attorneys fees and \$1,629.12 for legal expenses.

The award was won by Mrs. Chaplin after five hours in court during which she matched wits with Gavin McNabb, heading her comedian husband's battery of attorneys, and opposing counsel engaged in a scolding verbal exchange in which neither she nor Chamberlin were spared. Testimony for the consumption of the eager gallery which crowded into the courtroom on the heels of the fashionably gowned Mrs. Chaplin, her mother and attorneys, came with rapidity as McNabb began his cross examination.

Asked if she had bought \$5,629 worth of clothes just two days before she left her husband, Mrs. Chaplin promptly declared this was not true. The bill, she said, represented clothes for virtually the entire time she lived with the comedian.

LUBBOCK APPROVES OF RICKER RECITAL

MUSIC PATRONS PLEASED BY RENDITIONS OF SOPRANO AND MRS. RIX

Two hundreds of Lubbock's music lovers were treated to one of the most delightful musical performances of the season when Mrs. Rachel Ellen Ricker soprano, and Mrs. J. A. Rix, pianist, appeared in joint recital in the Hotel Lubbock ballroom last night. Mrs. Ricker opened her program with "Una Voce Poco Fa" from the Barber of Seville, and displayed wonderful ability in the realm of the coloratura. Her voice of exquisite quality was used with equal facility in all of her numbers. Her second group of songs consisted of "Chanson Triste" by Duparc and "The Year" by Babey, both of which were nicely done and followed by a Creole song, "Down by the Old Bayou" by Lily Strickland as an encore.

Mrs. Rix's numbers were Beethoven's Opus 10, Number 2 Sonata, Handel's Impromptu of a Librarian, Song by Chopin and Chopin's Third Ballade, all of which were played in the same artistic manner and attention to detail that have characterized her numerous appearances before home audiences. As an encore Mrs. Rix selected Liszt's "Dream of Love," which was beautifully presented.

WAS ONE OF CONVOY TO MAKE TRIP IN STORM

FRIENDS LOOKED ON

FELL UPSIDE DOWN AND OUT OF CONTROL AFTER SHOCK

NORFOLK, Va., April 29.—Four naval aviators were killed late today when lightning struck their plane and plunged it into Chesapeake Bay off New Point Comfort. The men were Lieutenant V. F. Marinelli, attached to the Hampton Roads naval air station, Lieutenant George W. Lehman, Chief Machinist Mate Poyner and Machinist Mate Second Class Michael. The plane was struck during a severe electric storm that swept this section. It was one of several flying from Philadelphia to the Hampton Roads station. News of the disaster was brought here by one of the other planes, the occupants of which witnessed it.

The plane wrecked was in front of them, those in the second plane said, when suddenly they saw it developed in a puff of smoke, then go out of control and plunge to the surface of the bay upside down. The second plane landed to attempt rescue, but could do nothing because of weather conditions and after an hour of fruitless efforts came on to Norfolk. The tender T-1 was dispatched to the scene, which is about the same spot at which Lieutenant Frank H. Conant, Schneider cup winner, was killed last fall. Both Lieutenants Marinelli and Lehman made their homes in Norfolk, the former being attached to the local air station and the latter to the scouting fleet, now at the local base. Both were married. Full identity of the men was not immediately available.

BEVERIDGE IS BURIED

Impressive Rites Feature Funeral Of Noted American Statesman Held Friday

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 29.—(P)—With impressive rites, the body of Albert J. Beveridge, former United States senator and noted biographer, was taken to its final resting place in Crownhill cemetery here today. Burial was preceded by a brief Episcopal service at the home and a simple "service" at the Meridian Street Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. Beveridge was a Methodist, while Mrs. Beveridge is of Episcopal denomination. Bishop Joseph M. Francis of the Indianapolis diocese of the Episcopal church, conducted the ritual in the home. The Rev. Virgin E. Baker led the church services. He was assisted by Bishop Francis.

Mrs. Beveridge, the son, Albert J. Beveridge, Jr., the daughter, stayed at the grave until the bronze casket had been lowered into the ground. The burial took place between rain showers.

HOUSE OF COMMONS REJECTS MATRIMONY-JOB REFORM

WILL MR. COOLIDGE RUN?

It is safe to say that the promised effort to force Mr. Coolidge to declare himself on the question of whether or not he intends to be a candidate for renomination, will not succeed. He is too canny to give up the great advantage of permitting that question to go unanswered for some time—probably until next spring. Events still to come may answer it for him, and it would be decidedly embarrassing were they to force him to change a decision already announced.

But with his decision reserved and with the Republican nomination apparently his for the asking, his strategic position is commanding. It prevents immature and provocative candidates of aspirants who would not think of posing as anti-Coolidge. It keeps dissent within the party at a minimum.

Not the least of the advantages of prolonging this uncertainty is the stronger position it will give the President in his relations with the new Congress, when it gathers in December. When Congress has to deal with a going President, a man whose power is limited in time and whose ability to grant favors is rapidly waning, his counsel and his requests are likely to get scant attention. The average Congressman has a keen appetite for favors to come, and small reverence for departing greatness—as Theodore Roosevelt once found to his great surprise.

On the other hand, a President who is openly a candidate for re-election is likely to find his freedom of executive action restricted by the conditions of that candidacy. He may find Congress taking advantage of his necessities, or embarrassing him with action intended to make his course difficult. Especially would this be the case in a Congress such as the Seventieth, with its House held by only a narrow majority in sympathy with his policies and a Senate balanced against him.

It is probable that Mr. Coolidge does not himself know whether he will be a candidate. It may be taken for granted that he wants to be. He would, no doubt, like to go down in history as the first President to serve longer than eight years. He enjoys the Presidency and bears its burdens with less personal worry than many of his predecessors. But he has no stomach for defeat, and his ultimate decision will undoubtedly be based on a careful analysis of his chances of success, when at last the moment for decision arrives.

Meanwhile, men in his confidence, like Senator Fess of Ohio, may predict his nomination and election freely, without actually committing him. No word of confirmation, we may be sure, will fall from those tight Yankee lips for quite some months to come.

MEXICAN IMMIGRATION

Immigration has been a bone of contention for centuries, and is still one of the problems that confronts the United States today. The Kansas City Star in a recent story on the question of immigration brings out the possibility of a restricted immigration from Mexico and discusses some of the problems when it says that the Commercial interests of Texas are manifesting concern over the proposed restriction of immigration from Mexico. The proposal however originated with a Texas member of Congress, who offered an amendment to the immigration laws of the United States, by putting a restriction or naming a certain number that may come here each year from Mexico.

The author of the amendment is Representative John C. Box, who is actively supported by Representative Black of Clarksville, Texas. A meeting of Southwestern Chambers of Commerce is soon to be held in Austin to protest against the proposed change.

The proponents of restriction declare their sympathy with those who use Mexican labor and with the aspirations of the State generally to have its agricultural lands and other natural resources developed. But they hold that the Mexicans are coming in undesirable numbers; that they do not and can not assimilate with Americans, and most important, that the greatest problem in our agriculture is overproduction, which would be increased by the extended use of Mexican labor and the development of virgin lands by Mexican owners or tenants.

On the other hand, the South, especially the cotton-growers, have an increasingly difficult labor problem. Many Southern negroes have come North in recent years, and more are coming. The success of cotton-growing in

the long run depends on comparatively cheap labor. This is true in a lesser degree of some other lines of agriculture. For these reasons Mexican labor generally has been welcomed in all the Southern States. Restriction of it, particularly if the restriction should be to a comparatively small quota, will be opposed by the South generally. The South probably will decide the matter. That is, Congress is not likely to oppose the manifest wishes of the South; or even the border States of the Southwest. In the matter, since the problem of Mexican immigration, if it is or becomes a problem, will be the problem of the Southern States. Representatives Black and Box would include Cuba and Porto Rico in the same restrictions with Mexico. But the relations of the United States to these islands, especially to Porto Rico, are such as to make embarrassing any racial restrictions that might not be agreeable to the peoples affected.

A TIN-CAN BRIGADE

While Texas is one of the most prosperous states in the Union, its prosperity would be greatly enhanced if the "Tin-Can Brigade" were eliminated, is the claim of Farm and Ranch, which asserts that if Texans would produce what they need at home, they would save an immense sum annually which would go to enhance the wealth of the state.

"The paper-sack and the tin-can brigade living on the farms of the Southwest are not a total loss to the country even though they do help glut the cotton market at the beginning of the season," the Farm and Ranch says. "They render considerable service to farmers in other sections of their own state and contribute to the railroads, the commission men, wholesalers and retailers. The Iowa farmer who grows corn and hogs would a whole lot rather sell the Southern farmers bacon and lard than to encourage them to produce these products themselves. Bean growers in New Mexico and other States would not propose three cheers and a tiger of they were to learn that farmers in Texas and other Southwestern States were going to produce their own beans in 1927. The Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa dairymen would rather sell butter and cheese to cotton farmers than to encourage them to produce their own. As a matter of fact, a surplus of cotton is to be considered by farmers who do not grow the staple. These farmers just naturally take but little interest in you. They are working for themselves, and while in a general way they would like to see you prosperous, they do not want that to come about by cutting down their market."

"The Southwest is capable of producing a great variety of food. There is a farm that could not be made to produce at the biggest banquet ever held in the Southwest. Dinners that cost the city man \$3 per plate could be produced on the farm for a few cents plus a little labor. Why send \$300,000,000 out of Texas and as much more out of other Southwestern States every year for the things that can be produced equally well right at home? Why go to the city to get a good meal when everything you eat in the city is produced in the country? The farm, first of all, should be a place to make a living. Specializing should be secondary."

In this section of the country where so many different kinds of vegetables and fruits can be raised it looks like there is little excuse for the people of this section of the State belonging to the tin-can brigade. We are glad to know however that the girls' clubs and the home demonstration work in this section is bringing about much canned goods of quality in the rural homes, but not enough is made to put on the local market in order to increase market for home-grown products."

Little Avalanches

Considerable fortitude will be required on the part of Oliver Zerking of Royersville, Pa., who is now two years old, in case he decides to qualify for the inheritance of an estate of \$5,000 and accumulated interest left to him conditionally by a maiden aunt. He will forfeit his legacy if he "drinks, smokes, chews, dances or engages in petties parties before he is 21."

Mrs. Clifford Fleschman of Atlanta firmly believes in unalienable right to an unobstructed view of a ball game to which she has paid admission. In pursuance of that belief she swatted a policeman on the head with a board along her line of vision leading to the home plate. The police judge levied an amusement tax of \$16.

WICHITA FALLS TROUNCES FORT WORTH AGAIN

AMERICANS TRIUMPH OVER ENGLISH IN PENNSYLVANIA RELAY CARNIVAL WHILE WORLD RECORDS TUMBLE BEFORE TEAMS

(By The Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Two international triumphs for American college stars over their British rivals from Cambridge University and two world's record relay performances stood out today as the vanguard of a host of 3,000 athletes engaged in the first day's events of the Pennsylvania relay carnival.

The smiling, fair-haired, titled Englishman Lord David Burghley made a gallant effort to repeat his victory of 1925 in the 400 meter hurdles, a special attraction, but failed because, in his own words, Johnny Gibson of Fordham University was "too fast and strong" for him.

Gibson wins
Losing five yards when he stumbled and was thrown off his stride early in the race, Lord Burghley finished with a rush, passing his team-mate, T. C. Livingstone-Learmonth, and finishing barely a yard behind the sturdy Gibson as a crowd of 20,000 cheered the 21-year-old Briton's capture.

It was Gibson's second straight victory in this event and squared accounts for his defeat two years ago by Burghley.
The second British bid for individual honors was frustrated in the 120 yard high hurdle. Two Cambridge entries, Bowler and Richardson, failed to qualify in the first trials.

World records broken
The world's record for the 400 meter relay, which collapsed off the quarter-mile college championship in 4:32.5 seconds, equalling the world's second set here last summer by the Newark Athletic club in the national championships.

Because of a blip among the timers, the intercollegiate race was run twice, but Mercerburg proved its mettle both times, leading a pack of some 16 rivals in both races by the time.

same time, Lawrenceville (N. J.) prep, which finished second in 4:22.5 seconds also was inside Mercerburg's former world's record of 4:32.5 seconds.

Quarter mile hard
Pennsylvania's quarter-mile team, anchored by Folsell Schull, football star, was forced to its recent equaling pace by a crack Penn State team, which finished a close second, turning in faster time than such rivals as Syracuse, Notre Dame, Princeton, Harvard and Michigan State.

Two other major college relay championships were decided. Ohio State's first relay victory in the history of the Pennsylvania carnival was registered in impressive fashion in the distance medley with Princeton, Bates and Penn State trailing. The spring medley crown went to Georgetown when Swinburne's strong finish beat off the challengers of Penn State and Harvard rivals.

The carnival record for the intercollegiate medley relay, 13:38.5, which was topped when the crack Baton Hill prep team of South Orange, N. J., stepped the distance in seven minutes, 52.4 seconds.

Bill Cox, rangy Penn State sophomore distance star, romped away with the two-mile run setting the pace for a field of a dozen runners all the way and leading into the final mile at the finish in 9 minutes, 32 seconds.

SAN ANTONIO HIGH SCHOOL WINS ANNUAL RELAY MEET

COLLEGE RELAY MEET
Main Avenue high school of San Antonio won the second annual high school relay carnival at A. and M. college here Friday with 12 points. Austin high took second place with 11 points and Oak Cliff high of Dallas was third with 9 points.

New Athlete Attains All-Around Record

PHILADELPHIA, April 29 (AP)—The intercollegiate, all-around athlete laurels that have rested for the past two years on the broad shoulders of Tony Plinsky of Georgetown passed today to a new star in versatility, Vernon Kennedy of the Central Missouri State Teachers college.

Plinsky, now out of college competition, was not there to defend his honors, but Kennedy shattered the Georgetown star's intercollegiate record in defeating nine rivals for the Decathlon championship which provided an all day showcase for the Pennsylvania relay carnival at Franklin field.

The sturdy Missourian finished the gruelling ten event test, lasting over eight hours, with a score of 7236.275 points eclipsing the mark of 7169.16 set by Plinsky last year. It was one of the keenest battles ever staged for all-around honors. With Kennedy coming from behind to beat out Dick Swartzburg of Denison university, who led for seven events and finished second, less than 100 points behind Kennedy, Virgil Elliott, the versatile paragon from Bethany college, West Virginia, weakened after a flying start and finished third, with Vincent Moroney of Georgetown fourth.

Sox Turn Recruits Back To The Minors

CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—Homer Blankenship and Leslie Cox, recruit pitchers were turned back to the minors by the Chicago club of the American League today. was on the scene, leaped into his plane and spread the alarm, dropping warnings from the air, at Gould, where a refugee train had been held in readiness.

Dikes Cut
 NEW ORLEANS, April 29 (AP)—Gen-
 eral Calhoun tonight downed three
 bridges made in the Mississippi
 levee fifteen miles south of New
 Orleans today after dramatic prepara-
 tions by state authorities to relieve
 the crescent city from the flood men-
 ace. Successive explosions of dynamite,
 buried deep in the huge walls of
 earth thrown up to hold the surging
 river to its course caused only three
 small trenches through which the
 waters of the mighty stream
 seemed at first reluctant to run.
 Pick and shovel augmented the
 work of high explosives and the water
 gradually gained in volume, but its
 movement was so unsatisfactory that
 several additional charges of dynamite
 were employed before night fall to ac-
 celerate the flow.

More Dynamiting
 Further dynamiting may be resorted
 to tomorrow, although several of the
 engineers were of the opinion that
 the force of the current would gradu-
 ally open the artificial channels until
 a sufficient volume was drawn into
 sweep out the levee for a distance of
 a thousand feet or more.

This view also was shared by the
 weather bureau here, a special flood
 warning late today forecasting a
 break of one thousand feet, or suf-
 ficient in the opinion of the experts
 to appreciably lower the level of the
 water both here and higher up the
 river.

Not Spectacular
 Save for the dashing about of police
 and military motorcycles and the fast
 circling of planes overhead, there was
 little of the spectacular about the
 creation of the first artificial crevasse
 in the Mississippi dikes in the
 history of floods from that river. The
 first charge of dynamite was set off at
 2:17 1/2 o'clock in the afternoon, more
 than two hours behind the announced
 schedule. There was a loud roar, heard
 for two or three miles away and a
 shower of dirt and smoke.

At this settled it was seen that the
 first effect had created a ditch some
 ten feet deep and probably six feet
 wide through which the water began
 to move slowly. The second explosive
 train was due to be fired within a
 minute, but ten minutes elapsed be-
 fore there was another explosion, due
 to a jamming of the firing "gun."

The third detonator followed a few
 minutes later and the engineers and
 several hundred other officials, na-
 tional guardsmen and newspaper cor-
 respondents and photographers rushed
 forward expecting to see a mighty
 leap of the waters towards the low-
 lands some sixteen feet beneath the
 crest of the river.

Streams Slow
 A fairly good stream ran under way
 in the first trench, but those in the
 second and third were extremely slug-
 gish and a force of workmen with
 picks and shovels went to work. Their
 efforts improved the situation slight-
 ly, but the engineers decided to ex-
 plore more dynamite to deepen the
 breaches.

Course through the narrow
 trenches, the water tumbled over the
 edges of the precipices where the
 blasting of the earth had stopped and
 flowed down into the Point-A La
 Hache road which slowly was inun-
 dated along a stretch of one hundred
 yards.

Advancing Water
 Crossing the highway the water
 moved south into a "meadow" and then
 swirled, gradually upon the de-
 serted little canal town of Caernarvon,
 which sprawls out over the line
 dividing the St. Bernard and Plaque-
 mine parishes which was selected as
 the point for the break.

Tonight the water was flowing
 slowly inland, covering a part of the
 Louisiana Southern railway tracks
 and reaching out for several ancient
 plantations.

With the force behind it gathering
 volume as the earth slowly crumbled
 before the rush it was expected that

a wide area would be under from one

to two feet of water tomorrow.

Parishes Under Water

Unless all calculations of the
 engineers go amiss, possibility all of
 Plaquemine parish and a large por-
 tion of St. Bernard parish, which
 borders on New Orleans will be under
 water within a few days. Should the
 expected roaring Niagara develop, the
 houses of Caernarvon would be
 swept away and the canal running
 alongside would be widened into a
 great artificial channel such as that
 cut by the flood after the break in
 the levee a mile northward during the
 flood of 1922.

Hundreds of persons armed with
 the coveted military passes were
 gathered on the levee less than one
 hundred yards from the break and
 there was scarcely a one who was
 not disappointed by the results of the
 explosion. Governor Shimpson, Major
 General Jadin, chief of army engi-
 neers and other officials who went
 down-stream on coast guard cutters
 to see the making of the break must
 have been even more disappointed
 for their view of the scene was al-
 most entirely cut off by a dense screen
 of willows arising through water from
 the crest of the old levee abandoned
 some years ago, when the present im-
 proved ramparts were thrown up.

Blasting Slow
 Actual preparations for the blasting
 of the dikes began soon after dawn
 with the arrival at the parish lines of
 an armored car from New Orleans
 carrying approximately 1,500 pounds
 of dynamite.

The boring of the holes proved a
 more difficult task than had been an-
 ticipated and when the noon hour,
 originally set for the blasting came,
 the work was far from completed.
 While the workmen toiled under a
 boiling sun, obscured only occasion-
 ally by fleecy clouds driven before a
 brisk northerly wind, detachments of
 the Louisiana National Guard secured
 the countryside to give a final
 warning to residents to leave for New
 Orleans, reported that some who as
 late as last night had declined to leave
 their homes were willing to get out at
 the eleventh hour. Army trucks were
 rushed to their homes and even until
 after the noon hour, they were travel-
 ing the road to New Orleans, loaded
 high with every manner of household
 goods.

In the far reaches of the parishes,
 where the flood waters will be several
 days in arriving, scores refused to de-
 sert their homes. These included a
 number of trappers who are ac-
 customed to floods and who believe
 they are familiar enough with the
 hydrocracies of the river out of its
 banks to escape harm in the overflow.
 Several thousands of the residents
 already had sought safety in New
 Orleans but hundreds of them return-
 ed downstream today in the hope of
 seeing the break which ultimately will
 carry the waters over their homes and
 their prosperous truck farms and
 plantations.

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SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic—Peter's Denial and Repentance.
Scripture Lesson—Mark 14:53, 54, 66-71; Luke 22:61-62.

Mark 14:53. And they led Jesus away to the high priest, and there came together with him all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes.

54. And Peter had followed him afar off, even within, into the court of the high priest; and he was sitting with the officers, and warming himself in the light of the fire.

55. And as Peter was beneath in the court, there cometh one of the maids of the high priest:

56. And seeing Peter warming himself, she looked upon him, and said, Thou also wast with the Nazarene, even Jesus.

57. But he denied saying, I neither know, nor understand what thou sayest, and he went out into the porch, and the cock crew.

58. And the maid saw him, and began again to say to them that stood by, This is one of them.

59. But he again denied it. And after a little while again they that stood by said to Peter, Of a truth thou art one of them; for thou art a Galilean.

60. But he began to curse, and to swear, I know not this man of whom ye speak.

Luke 22:61. And the Lord turned and looked upon Peter. And Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how that he said unto him, Before the cock crow, thou shalt deny me thrice.

62. And he went out, and wept bitterly.

Time—Peter's denial took place from 1 to 5 a. m. Friday, April 3, A. D. 33.

Place—The palace in Jerusalem occupied jointly by the former high priest Annas and his son-in-law, the high priest Caiaphas.

Golden Text—Let him that thinketh he standeth, take heed lest he fall—1 Cor. 10:12.

Introduction

We are now to study on of the saddest of all Sunday school lessons. Verily Peter, the rockman, was also a waverman, now up now down. And he was without excuse, for Christ had given him a clear warning. At the last supper he had sadly told his headstrong disciple (Luke 22:31-34) that Satan had asked for him, to test his faith, and that his Savior's prayer would be with him in the trial; then, when Peter boasted that he was ready to go with his Lord to prison and even to death, Christ told him plainly that before the cock should crow at the coming dawn he would thrice deny the Son of God, even declaring that he did not know him. Jesus knew Peter far better than Peter knew himself.

Peter "Followed Afar Off" v. 54

And Peter had followed him afar off. Even though Peter followed "afar off," as he modestly says through Mark, much courage was required under the circumstances. John was with Christ (John 13:13), and as an acquaintance of the high priest had no difficulty in obtaining entrance with the Sanhedrin and the soldiers.

Peter, however, was forbidden entrance until John spoke to the porter, and brought him in John, following his invariable custom, does not name himself in his account but calls himself merely "another disciple."

Peter's First Denial, v. 68

"But he denied, saying, I neither know, nor understand what thou sayest." Peter may have meant that he did not know what the servant was talking about, alleging ignorance of the whole matter, or he may have meant to say outright that he did not know Jesus. In either case his terrified utterance was a denial of his friendship with Jesus, and of his discipleship. And this from the leader of the apostolic band, the man foremost in his profession of loyalty and of courage, the man whose bold confession of Jesus as the Son of God was to be the foundation of Christ's church. What a fearful fall! And he went out into the porch.

In the darkness and comparative solitude of the entrance to the palace Peter expected to be unnoticed. He could not bring himself to leave the building where his Master was in peril of his life, though staying evidently involved him also in danger. Peter must have credit for this. "And the cock crew."

It was early dawn, our Lord had been arrested at about midnight. This was Peter's second warning. The first was Christ's clear prophecy that before the cock should crow twice that night, Peter would deny him thrice—(Mark 14:30).

Peter's Second Denial, v. 70

"But he again denied it." This took place in the porch (Matt. 26:71-72). Some of the company around the fire may have drifted out into the porch, or perhaps there were other arrivals. Peter did not find the porch the safe retreat he had sought. Matthew tells us that he denied with an oath. He was frightened and perplexed. He saw no need of involving himself in Christ's fate. Perhaps he argued with himself that he could be of some service to Christ if he kept himself safe. Satan is never at a loss for an argument, and at this time, we may be sure, Christ would have repeated his condemnation of Peter. "Get thee behind me, Satan!"

Peter's Third Denial, v. 71

"But he began to curse, and to swear." Peter felt himself trapped, and raged like a wild animal in a cage. He had an unreasoning feeling that Satan had added force to his statement, whereas in reality it weakened it. A quiet denial, lacking the matter off, would have been far more effective with those rough listeners; but Peter was in a desperate mood. "I know not this man of whom ye speak." With this third denial, the most explicit of the three, "the cock's shrill clatter" sounded forth from the courtyard outside for the third time, and instantly Christ's sad prophecy flashed upon Peter's mind. His period of probation was over. His terrible sin was upon him.

Why Peter Fell

1. Peter fell for one reason, because he was over-confident. He had declared that he would lay down his life for Christ (John 13:37). He had said that though all other men should be offended in Christ, yet he would not be (Mark 14:29). Modesty and humility would have been a far better vantage ground for his contest with Satan than such braggadocio.

2. "In the courtyard Peter was in bad company. He had seated himself among Christ's enemies. His object was to conceal his discipleship. Thus he acted denial before he spoke it. Had he been altogether loyal and faithful he would have kept out of such company and as near his Master as possible. The only true and safe thing to do when among Christ's enemies is to take one's place quietly and firmly at the beginning. We must guard against taking the steps that lead to denial of Christ."

3. "Couldst thou not watch with me one hour?" Christ asked the sleeping disciples in Gethsemane. If Peter had watched and prayed with Jesus then, he would not have denied his Lord a few hours later. "He who feels his weakness will be likely to watch, and he who believes in the power of God, as able to keep him from falling, will pray; but he who neither discerns his danger nor feels his need will sleep, and he who falls into a condition of spiritual slumber, taken unawares by the foe, is peculiarly likely in one way or another to deny his Lord."

The Lord "Looketh Upon Peter," v. 61

"And the Lord turned and looked upon Peter." St. Luke alone preserves this most touching incident. Jesus must have looked on his erring apostle either from the chamber in which he was being tried, if it was one of those chambers with open roof, or else at the moment when the trial was over, and he was being led across the courtyard amid the coarse insults of the servants. If so, the moment would have been one of awful pathos to the unhappy apostle.

Peter "Wept Bitterly," v. 62

"And he went out and wept bitterly." Contrast Peter with Judas. Judas lost his faith, then cast away his love, and went over to the enemy as a traitor. Peter thought to save himself without hurting Christ; selfish, weak, and wicked, but not apostate. Judas thought of the consequence of his sin, and some remorse and hope. Satan tripped Peter, but trapped Judas.

Peter Was "Sifted," Luke 22:31

Satan did not get Peter, after all. He certainly was "sifted," but the repentance of the bitter weeping restored him to a faithful discipleship; and he did indeed "strengthen" many brethren. "Seeing that Peter was forgiven and became so useful, let him that knows he has fallen rise up in earnest repentance."

An Illustration

"If someone should fall from this pier into the water, would he be drowned?" an old boatsman was asked. With a quizzical smile he answered: "No; it's not falling into the water that drowns a man. 'What then is it?'" "Sitting there!"

"In the hour of trial Jesus, plead for me; Let by base denial, I depart from thee. When thou seest me waver, With a look recall, Her for fear or favor Suffer me to fall."
