## Board chooses depository

The Colorado Independent School District picked the City National Bank as the school depository for the next two years, Monday night at a called meeting.

The school board and school officials could see little difference between bids of the City National Bank and the

First National Bank to become the school's depository and selected the City National Bank principally on the basis that school funds were already there.

Considerable sentiment had developed for splitting the deposits between the two banks. School officials said that

such a split was possible but would cause extra trouble in the accounting department.

Bank spokesman Bobby Lemons and George Womack for the City National Bank and Max Shaw and Warren Anderson for the First National Bank did not display any considerable

amount of enthusiasm for the "split."

Finally, the school board voted to put all of the funds in "one" of the two banks (not to split). Then came the vote making the City National Bank the depository.

The other agenda item was the adoption of the school budget for the

coming school year.

The budget of \$5,354,346 was adopted quickly, and the tax rate was set at 75 cents per hundred dollars of valuation.

Some discussion developed when school board member Dr. Billy Bruce Bridgford made the comment that he felt

that the tax rate should be adjusted downward to eliminate an annual budget surplus.

Superintendent of schools Charlie Uesilton said that the budget surplus was used to operate the schools at the latter part of the budget year "before taxes begin to come

## Commissioners discuss budget

The County Commissioners' Court met at 9 a.m. Monday to discuss

the 1984 budget and to declare a raise in taxes-effective taxes, that is.

County Judge Bill Carter said that would not mean more taxes for the individual. "If your house was valued at \$10,000 last year, and if you haven't made any improvements to the house, your tax should be the same, this fall."

The tax rate necessary to collect the same amount of taxes from the individual have gone up.

The tentative tax rate for the general fund was 17.96 cents per hundred dollars of valuation last year and will be increased. The road and bridge fund was 5.48 last year and will be increased. Both are being increased more than three percent and according to law, a public hearing must be held.

## Water main breaks

Residents in the northern part of town were without water again Monday afternoon when a 6-inch cast iron main line broke. The broken water line was located on Marshall Street.

The area of town that was effected was an area surrounded by Watson Street on the west, 17th Street on the north, Eastover Street on the east, and 10th Street on the south.

City water crews had the line patched by 5 p.m. Monday afternoon. City Manager Rick Crowley has lifted the 10-10 curtailment on watering.

## Emergency loans available to county livestock producers

Randy Green, representing Congressman Charles Stenholm, told the RECORD Tuesday that Mitchell County livestock producers will be eligible for emergency

loans through the Farmer Home Administration because of severe drought conditions. David Marion, local FmHA head, said that his office had not yet

received instructions about the loans.

Twenty West Texas counties are eligible. Coke, Howard, Martin, Mitchell and Nolan Counties are among the 20 Texas counties declared eligible for the loans.

To be eligible for the loan, producers must suffer in pasture or range production as a result of the severe lack of moisture that has affected much of West Texas.

"I had personally ur-

ged Secretary of Agriculture John Block to provide these loans where the counties met the criteria," Stenholm said. "So I am naturally pleased for the ranchers. However, there are still other counties which need E.M. loans and many crop producers have suffered severe crop damage as well.

E.M. loans are available at eight percent for applicants who cannot get credit elsewhere, and at a higher rate for

## Tax rebate running close to last year

Colorado City's sales tax rebate for the month of August was \$30,458.98 which is an increase of \$4,653.14 compared to last year's total of \$25,805.84. The city is running .14 percent behind but the economy is balancing out compared to surrounding cities who have decreased considerably in their rebates.

In comparison to Big Spring's total of \$207,590.29 which is an 18.33 decrease from last year, Colorado City is doing fairly well. Snyder's total was \$116,932.57 and Sweetwater totaled out to \$88,479.03.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$103 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities that levy the one-percent sales tax.

"So far this year, we are just a little ahead of the 1982 payments," Bullock said. "This is about where we expected to be by this time when we put out our revenue estimate for the state."

Bullock said seven of the 20 Texas cities that collect the most local sales tax-Houston, El Paso, Beaumont, Odessa, Abilene, Midland and Tyler-continue to lag behind last year's receipts. But the August payment to all seven

showed they had gained ground since last month.

In the past, there had

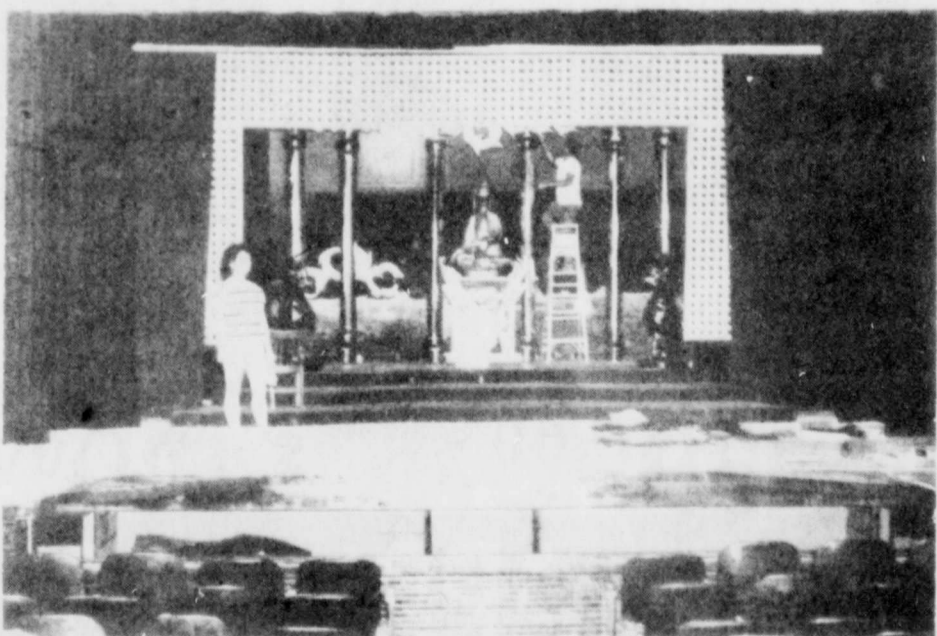
been no flying backdrops (curtains that are used for scenery and are lowered from the ceiling) and this production will have five different ones.

## Hightower extends deadline

Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower announced that the deadline for registration for the 1983 Family Land Heritage Program has been extended to September 16.

"Already, nearly fifty

agricultural properties have qualified for this year's program," said Hightower, "but we want to find all of the farms and ranches that should be honored by this program."

The Family Land He-

ritage Program was created by the Texas Department of Agriculture to honor families who own land which has been maintained in agricultural production for 100 years or more by the members of that family. Since 1974, when the program began, 1,558 properties in Texas have qualified for the program.

The basic requirements of the Program are: continuous agricultural production on the farm-ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm-ranch production by family members who are Texas residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum of \$50 income from farm or ranch products or if less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year.

Honorees in the program receive certificates of recognition during a ceremony at the State Capitol in November,

and histories of each property are included in the "Texas Family Land Heritage Registry" published by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Families who may be eligible for the Program may obtain an application from their county judges, county Historical Commission chairperson, or by writing the Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711. Once the completed forms have been certified by the county judge, they should then be mailed to the TDA Austin office for final consideration.

## Two local residents graduate from Southwest Texas State

Two Colorado City residents were among the 991 Southwest Texas State University students who filed for degrees awarded in summer commencement ceremonies August 13 in Strahan Coliseum.

The commencement speaker was San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros. The first Mexican-American mayor of a

major American city, Cisneros is serving his second term as mayor of San Antonio.

Of the 991 August degree candidates, 803 were from the university's seven undergraduate schools and the Occupational Education program. Twenty-two were candidates for associate degrees from the School of Health Professions, and 166 applied for master's degrees from the Graduate School.

Colorado City degree candidates include Marsha Ginzel of 1505 Watson St., and Guadalupe Landeros of 2003 Vine St.

Ginzel, daughter of Frank Ginzel, received a master's degree in business administration.

Landeros, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ignacio and Mary Lou Landeros, received a bachelor of science in home economics degree with a major in home economics education.

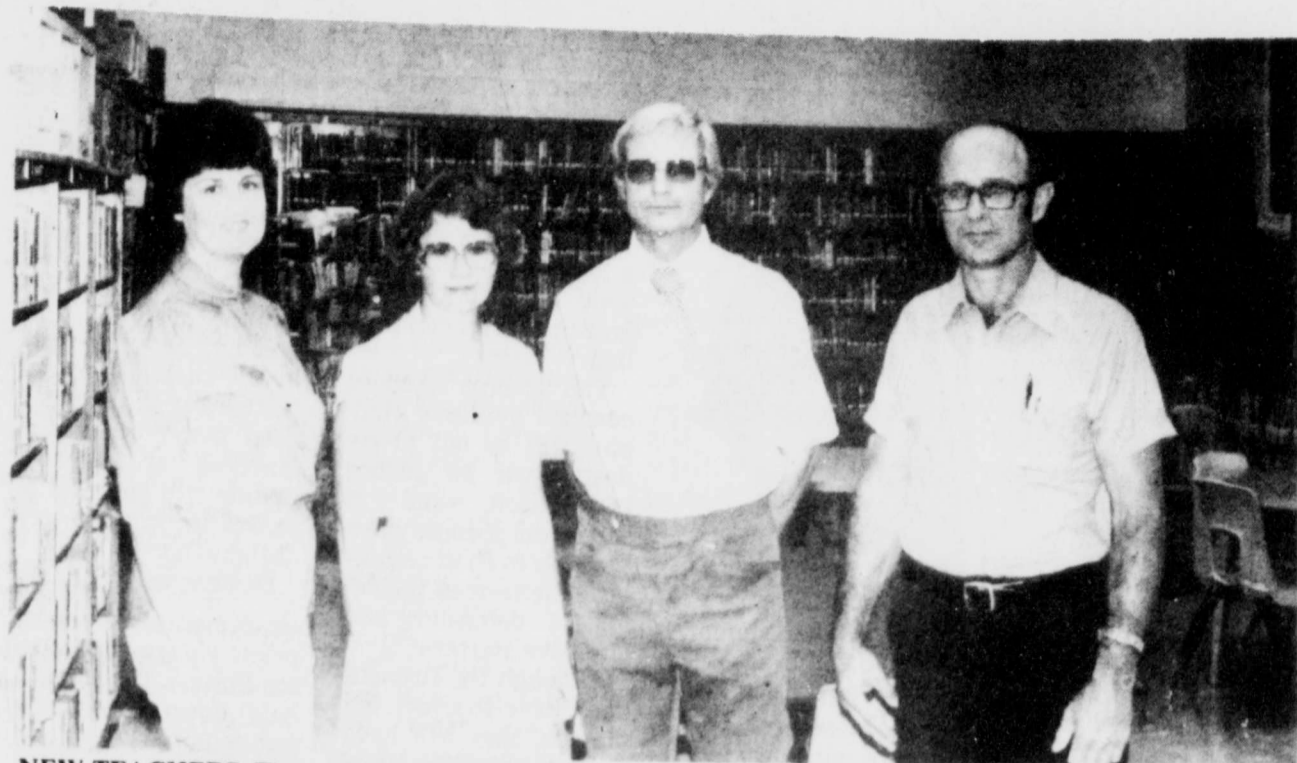

How do you feel about the 83 team?



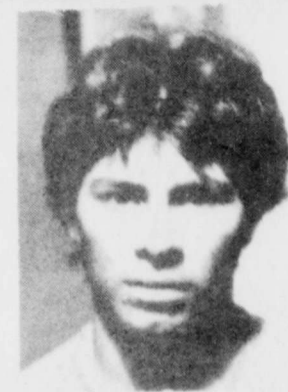

## Clifton completes summer missionary work in Oklahoma

During the past 10 weeks, Melissa Clifton of Loraine, devoted her time to being a summer missionary in the stock yards of Oklahoma City. She lived at the Baptist Mission Center along with 15 other missionaries from all over the United States.

Melissa applied for the position back in April and she "let the Lord guide her in the decision she had to make."

She had many duties during her 10 week stay in the slums of Oklahoma City. Some of her tasks were visiting the Senior Citizens of the area. "We would go and do odd jobs for them and do just fellowship with them. I met one man who didn't believe in Hell because he said God was too loving to create such a horrible place."

They had gym duty every night and played basketball with the older people of the area. "We had a 10 minute

devotional and we tried to show them that there was a better way for them because most of them were drug addicts."

Giving out food and clothing was another one of her many duties. "We had a food closet and people could come by referrals and get enough food for a month. We would also give out clothes. First we had to make out a report on them and then we would issue them eight items once a month."

She also worked in the local medical clinic where she would file cards, help the nurses and work in the pharmacy.

"A lot of the people who came in were unwed mothers and most of them were under 25. We would also help administer shots to the children."

Melissa also spoke in the local churches where she would give her testimony of faith and she helped in the Vac-

ation Bible School program. "The reason we had VBS was to give the kids something to do

and help them to stay out of trouble."

She commented that she had met a lot of interesting people. Some of them lived in abandoned buses, some

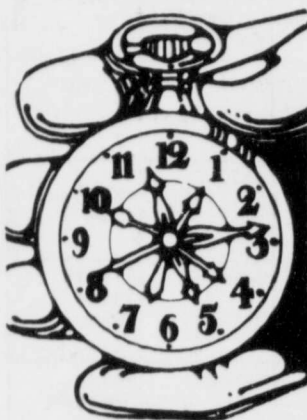
had been abused and others had been kicked out of their homes. "It was wonderful to see people who had drug problems or other problems come to know God. Many of them who had no money depended on the Lord for everything and some of them were much closer to God than those who were more fortunate than them."

"I met quite a few people with drug or alcohol related problems. One of the boys I met was a drug dealer and had been married three times and he was only 18! Winos lined the street and every now and then one of them would ask me to go riding around with them or if I had money for gas."

When asked if she would do this again, Melissa commented with an enthusiastic "You bet I would!" She is considering devoting her life to the mission field and maybe going to a foreign country to teach the word of God.

Melissa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Clifton and will be a senior at Loraine High School.

She stated, "I have really received a blessing this summer and became closer to God through all of the miracles he worked."

## Akins to assist conservation dist.

To promote the conservation of soil, water and related renewable natural resources in Mitchell County, Jimmy Harrison, Chairman of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District announced the support and assistance of internationally known actor, Claude Akins.

"Akins, who speaks for soil and water conservation in a series of broadcasts public service messages, is particularly recognized for his portrayal of gypsy trucker Sonny Pruitt in NBC-TV's 'Moving On' and for his title role in NBC-TV's adventure-comedy Sheriff Lobo," said Harrison.

Akins also guest starred in numerous TV series such as Police Story, Medical Story, Mannix, McCloud, Cannon, The Streets of San Francisco, Fantasy Island and B. J. and the Bear. He also appeared in films such as From Here to Eternity, The Caine Mutiny, Skyjacked, The Devil's Brigade, Inherit the Wind, The Great Bank Robbery and Timer Tramps.

Akins whose interest in soil and water conservation was nurtured at an early age said, "My feeling for the land comes from my father, who all his life has a love for the soil. He had a small piece of land

outside Bedford, Indiana and I watched him take care of it as if it were a very important partner. Through his example, I learned that proper treatment of the land is the only way it will really serve us as it's supposed to."

In commenting on current ecological and environmental concerns and how soil and water conservation fits into the overall picture Akins said, "With the problem of an increasing world population and the taking of farm areas for urban development and other uses, I think agricultural producers are constantly facing the problem of trying to produce more and more from less and less on a limited resource."

"Though we have made great advances in conservation efforts in the last several decades, other issues have emerged to cause soil and water conservation to be given a backseat in state and national priorities. These resources should be considered equally along with the other problems we have in our ecology," added Akins.

From a personal viewpoint, Akins said, "When I was in the army and in India, I saw the effects of bad land use and the starvation that follows. The people

in the area I visited knew the land was subject to flooding every year and yet they did nothing to protect it. Brazil is another example. While there, I remember how farmers would farm out their land and then move to another plot rather than restoring what they had."

"Look at what happened in this country prior to and during the dust bowl era of the '30's.' Soil conservation was mostly ignored until the land suddenly got blown away. At that point it was too late, so when we see signs of soil and water erosion the time to do something about it is when we first discover it and not wait until it's too late. The point I'm trying to make is that soil and water conservation is an ongoing thing and requires total public interest and support," concluded Akins.

Commenting on Akins' interest in assist-

ing Texas SWCDs with a conservation public awareness messages Harrison said, "We appreciate Claude's involvement in our local and state conservation efforts. He is saying what we have been talking about all along. And that is the conservation of soil, plant and animal resources does not hoarding these things for future use, but using them efficiently and in such a way that they will last and become more productive."

"If our district office is to serve Mitchell County and the surrounding area effectively, we need good two-way communication in our community. And that's what Claude is emphasizing in these public service programs. We need to know local concerns and we need understanding of and local support of our long range goals and objectives to accomplish soil and water conservation in our community," said Harrison.
