OUR GALVESTON LETTER.

The Late Storm—Immense Loss of Property—The G. H. and H. R. R. Bridge, and Communication with the Interior—The Epidemic—Prospects for a Convention—News and Items.
GALVESTON, Texas, Oct. 9, 1867.

Editor Express:
Our "Island City" has met with a severe infliction of winds and flood, from which property to the amount (at the lowest estimate) of a quarter of a million dollars has been destroyed. With the details of this loss your readers have already been made acquainted.

The most vital loss to us, however, is that of the G. H. and H. R. R. bridge, as we are thus cut off from all direct and speedy communication with the interior of the State; and, unless a bridge is immediately erected, Galveston will lose thousands of dollars of its trade and prosperity, and property here will depreciate in a corresponding ratio. A called meeting of citizens was held last evening to consult as to the feasibility of an immediate erection of the bridge; but nothing very satisfactory was adopted, save that a committee of five were appointed to consult with the railroad officials and devise a plan of operations. At a later meeting held the same evening by the City Council, several resolutions were adopted, one of the most sensible of which was that the city do at once proceed to the rebuilding of the bridge; and to this end a committee were appointed "to confer with all the powers in interest in the accomplishment of this great object." One fact which has proved and may prove an obstacle in the erection of a bridge in the manner proposed, is that the G. H. and H. R. R. is in the hands of a Receiver, and any party rebuilding the same may find it a labor of pains without costs.

The epidemic can be said to have almost entirely abated, and we trust in a few days to chronicle its disappearance. I regret to announce the death of Major H. A. Swartwout, the Acting Assistant Adjutant-General of this District. Major S. was a gallant, brave and courteous gentleman and officer, and was highly respected and loved by his fellows and the late lamented General Griffin.

I have information from the Civil Bureau that the registration returns, owing to the prevalence of the epidemic in the interior, are not all in, and on this account the prospect of an order for an election is somewhat remote. General Mower, it is stated, telegraphed here, whether an order for an election of a Convention, fixing the 2d day of November next, would be practicable? It is understood that for the reasons aforementioned the answer was "No." Of course the action of the Commanding General of this District, on his arrival here, will determine this matter. General Reynolds is at present supposed to be in San Antonio, where he is waiting the disappearance of the epidemic to proceed thither.

Our friend Flake of the Bulletin, appears this morning in a disclaimer as to the position of Messrs. Whilldin & Stockhouse on his paper. At the time I wrote you they were in the respective position assigned them, but unfortunately to-day they have both fallen from grace. Verily, the recent flood has other things to answer for than its damage of property.

One of the richest things in a literary character that I have recently seen, was shown me by a friend recently. A gentleman with a high-sounding title, in the law business here with a Sub-Assistant Commissioner of the Bureau, as follows: "To the Sub. Asst. of Bureau of Freedmen F. F. V. for the Dep't of Texas in 5th Military Dist. for La, and Texas for the Gov't of the U. States."

Think of such a conglomeration to be written by a titled gentleman of the Galveston bar. HUMPHRY.

MILITARY ITEMS FROM N. O. REPUBLICAN.
First Lieutenant J. C. DeGress, ninth United States cavalry, is ordered to report in person to the commanding officer district of Louisiana, for duty on his staff.

Leave of absence for sixty days is granted First Lieutenant Charles P. Smith, adjutant thirty-fifth United States infantry.

Leave of absence for forty days is granted First Lieutenant T. M. Tolman, sixth United States cavalry.

Upon the recommendation of his commanding officer the unexpired portion of the sentence of a general court martial in the case of Private Alexander H. Scott, company M. fourth United States cavalry, is remitted. He will be restored to duty with his company subject to the provisions contained in paragraphs 155, 157, and 158, revised army regulations of 1863.

Brevet Lieutenant Col. A. J. McGonnigle, the present chief quartermaster of the fifth military district, has been for more than a month confined to his bed with an unusually severe attack of yellow fever. Yesterday he made his appearance at his office, leaving it to be inferred that he will henceforth conduct the affairs of his office as heretofore.

During the illness of Col. McGonnigle the office has been in charge of Captain Charles Barnard, assistant quartermaster United States volunteers. Captain Barnard is the ranking officer now in service in his department of the late volunteer army, having held his present rank as captain since 1861. Captain Barnard is in charge of the soldiers' cemeteries in the fifth military district.

Col. George Lee, the well-known adjutant general at district headquarters, was on Saturday morning prostrated with yellow fever. It is hoped that the disease will touch him lightly, for the community cannot spare that courteous official from our midst.

Brevet Col. Sheldon Sturgeon, of the first infantry, has recovered from a painful attack of the yellow fever and has returned to duty.

General Mower has granted leave of absence for sixty days, on surgeon's certificate of disability, with permission to go beyond the limits of this military district, to First Lieutenant George H. Gram, adjutant seventeenth United States infantry.

Second Lieutenant Nathaniel Burbank, thirty-seventh United States infantry, temporarily relieved in special orders No. 117, current series, from these headquarters, and assigned to duty on the staff of the commanding officer of the district of Louisiana, will resume his duties as assistant secretary of civil affairs of this military district. He will report to the assistant adjutant general, in person, without delay.

The general court martial instituted in special orders No. 123, current series, from these headquarters, and of which Brevet Major M. R. Marston, captain first infantry, is president, is hereby dissolved.

Blackburn, the infamous traitor and scoundrel who tried to produce yellow fever in northern cities by sending into them infected clothing, has hitherto been in exile, but has now left Canada for New Orleans. The President's proclamation protects him. If he reaches New Orleans in time to die by the disease with which he hoped to devastate the north, the Democracy will lose another recruit—St. Louis Democrat

LOUISIANA AND ALABAMA.

Louisiana and Alabama are the first Southern States to vote upon the reconstruction measures, and both have declared in favor of the policy of Congress. In Louisiana the rebels who had registered remained away from the polls in the hope of defeating reconstruction; but fourteen thousand more than a majority of the registered voters have expressed their opinion at the polls on the Convention question. Alabama has followed gallantly in the lead of Louisiana. To the Convention of Louisiana has been elected as delegates citizens of the most honored and respected citizens, and the prospect of that State being speedily reconstructed is very promising. The vote for Convention was almost unanimous. And the delegates are overwhelmingly radical Republicans; in fact, we can learn of but one or two Conservatives elected. Over confidence in Ohio and Pennsylvania along with local issues, may bring temporary defeat upon the Republican party, but the results effect nothing unless it is to elate the traitors still to the Government who live by the mercy of the Government among us.

It is the Convention elections in the Southern States where the policy of Congress is to be tested, and already two gallant Southern States have spoken in tones which quell the little exultation which has arisen in traitors' throats over the results of local elections in Ohio or Pennsylvania. Redeemed and regenerated the Southern States will come forth the champions of the equal rights of all men, no matter what race, color, or religion, reaping the sweet blessings which the war left behind of peace and liberty, and infusing into the political veins of the nation new life, new principle, and lasting hope.

REVOLUTION IN ITALY.

The news by cable from Europe is of the most exciting kind. The revolution in Italy has come to open fighting and the Papal troops have been defeated and are falling back on Rome. The next news we expect to hear is the flight of the Pope and Rome in possession of the Garibaldians. The war to free Italy is pregnant with big results which may effect the peace of all Europe.

HEADQUARTERS.—General Reynolds has made his headquarters temporarily at Austin. Some of the curious among us think it was in consequence of the display made by the citizens of that place. We are glad General Reynolds found Austin so pleasant, and no doubt the reasons which influenced him to make it his temporary headquarters were entirely of a public nature. It is the privilege of the people at the Capital to deal largely in parade and display; it would be difficult for them to exist if it were otherwise; and the enthusiastic reception of the General was perfectly natural and proper. The General came to our city so quietly that our people did not know of it until next day after his arrival; and if the people didn't boil over with a public display it was no sign that they did not welcome him warmly. We know he is in good company and feel satisfied for the present.

TEXAS CATTLE AT ABILENE, KANSAS.—From the St. Louis Democrat we learn that thirty thousand Texas and New Mexico cattle have arrived at Abilene, Kansas, and await purchasers and shipment. The great demand for cattle and the practicability of this new route, has been the means of bringing so many cattle to that new and promising market. The Democrat advises the speculators to pay prompt attention to the matter.

STOLEN TEXAS CATTLE.—Washington, Oct. 4.—Official advices have been received here that 800 head of cattle, stolen by Indians from Texas, are held at Fort Bascom subject to the order of the owner on proof of property.

Col. S. Butterfield and Murphy are forcibly held by Indians at Medicine Lodge Creek—Kansas.

WASHINGTON, October 16.—The New York Times concluded an editorial with:—"We are inclined to think that the Northern States will not surrender their own rights as complacently as they have consented to the overthrow of those of the South."

Farragut's Sailors Hold a Meeting.

PHILADELPHIA, October 15th.—This evening the officers and men who were in Farragut's squadron at the capture of New Orleans held a meeting to organize a systematic effort to obtain prize money claimed to be due them for captures at that place; there was a large attendance and a spirit of determination was manifested to press their claims on Congress. A letter was read from Gen. Butler in reference to his bill before Congress to authorize the payment of said prize money.

U. S. Sub Treasury.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The balance in U. S. Sub Treasury is nearly one hundred and twelve millions.

Yellow Fever in New Orleans.

N. O. Oct. 15.—Twenty-eight deaths from yellow fever to-day at the present rate of decrease it will soon cease to be epidemic.

BY CABLE.

FLORENCE, October 15.—Revolutionary bands which entered Papal states at various points by eastern and southern frontiers have concentrated at Forinone under Alasotti Garibaldi's directions.

FLORENCE, 15, Evening.—Exciting news from South has been received; a battle has been fought near Arcola in Province Forinone between Garibaldi volunteers and Pontifical troops—a strong detachment of Papal Zouaves was sent from Rome during the latter part of last week to prevent a junction of the insurgent bands in Forinone with a party under Alasotti which was reported to be in that Province.—They were unsuccessful in accomplishing their object and were obliged to meet the united forces of the insurgent under command of Alasotti Garibaldi in person, a desperate fight took place outside the town of Veroli; the Papal Zouaves being badly beaten and losing heavily in killed and wounded—Garibaldians lost five killed and 15 wounded; no report was given of the numbers engaged on either side.

PARIS, October, 11.—It is reported that if condition of affairs around Rome should become critical the Pope will leave and take refuge in Bavaria where he has been offered an asylum.

Great activity prevails in the Tonkin naval arsenal. Garibaldi has issued

another address urging the Italian nation to arouse. Massini has issued a manifesto urging the patriots of Rome to rise and protect a republic.

Skirmishing in papal territory continues; reports conflicting from both sides received claiming advantages, no very important conflicts have occurred. Alasotti Garibaldi drove papal troops into Monte Gaggore, 3000 Garibaldians who blocked roads to Monte Liberte were driven away.

LONDON, October 16.—A wild rumor is afloat that the Fenians are planning an attempt to seize the Queen at Balmoral; the household Guard has been doubled.

FLORENCE, October 16.—Papal troops are falling back on Rome.

PARIS, October 16.—It is reported Spain has tendered Napoleon assistance in sustaining the temporal power of Pope.

TEXAS ITEMS.

The editor of the Republican has been shown several specimens of copper ore gathered in Montague county. They are pronounced very rich; some of them containing near 80 per cent of the pure metal.

Registration in Harrison county shows 805 white votes, and 2480 black. The Republican thinks the white vote might have been 1300.

Says the Tyler Reporter:

The wine crop in this county has been large. We know not what quantity has been made for export. It is certain that much more than a supply for home consumption has been secured. We observe that other counties in eastern Texas have manufactured large quantities also, from the native grape. We were shown through the cellar of our friend Col. Yarbrough, and find that he has several hundred gallons which bids fair to be excellent. Although the wine is new and still fermenting, we were able to detect the difference in the several kinds.
