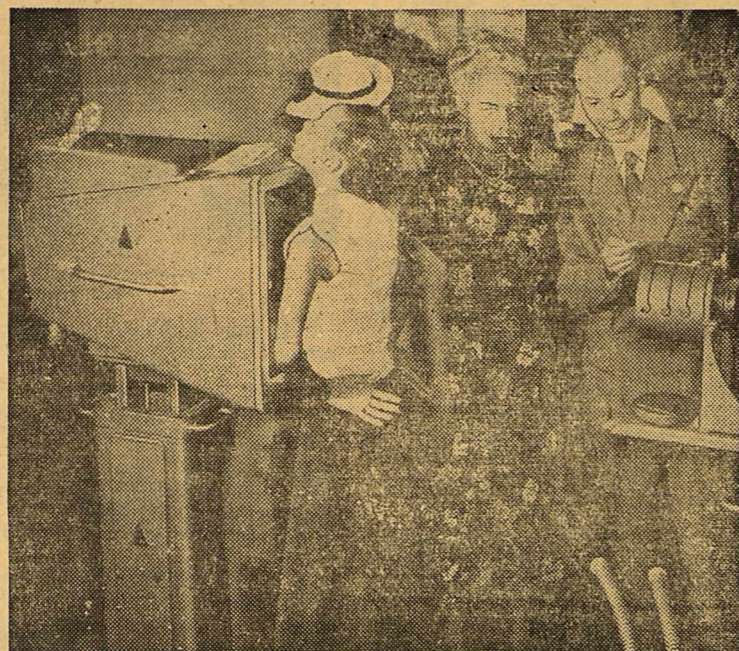

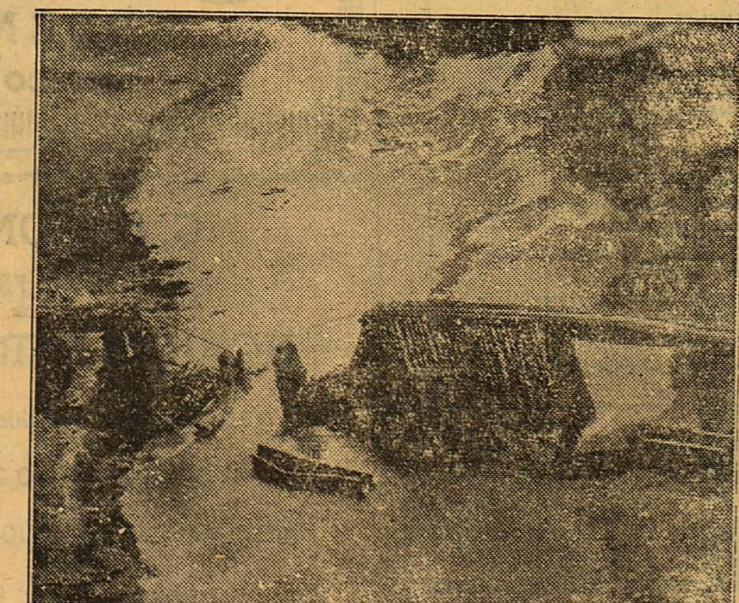

Range Society To Meet Dec. 10 In San Antonio

The third Annual Meeting of the Texas Section of the American Society of Range Management will be held at the Gunter Hotel, in San Antonio, December 10 and 11.

Range land development and conservation plus the proper utilization thereof, will be the main topic of discussion, but supplementary feeding on the range; control of poisonous plants; development of water for livestock; range re-seeding; and different breeds of cattle.

On the afternoon of the second day, an exhibit of various devices and in chemicals, for controlling weeds and brush and for spraying livestock, will be held. Also on exhibition, will be grass seeders; seed harvesters; branding tables; dehorning chutes; and many other items of interest to rangemen.

The American Society of Range Management, although organized only three years ago, has over 2,500 members and it encourages research activities in many and various fields of endeavor. It offers a merium for the exchange of ideas between technicians and ranchers and for bringing about a better understanding and relationship between workers with divergent view points, from many allied fields, including the teaching profession; research; extension; State departments of conservation; fish and game departments and especially those most vitally concerned with range land, the ranchers themselves.

Anyone interested in the program is cordially invited to attend our annual meeting.

Girl Cagers Take 26 - 20 Nod Over Rocksprings

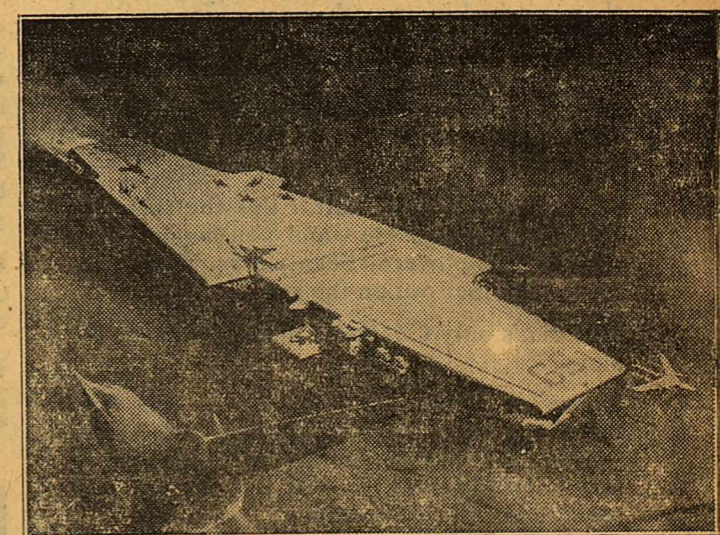

NEW AIRCRAFT CARRIER COULD ACCOMMODATE FOUR FAMOUS SHIPS ON ITS FLIGHT DECK

Plans for USS Forrestal Would Have Space for Frigates Hartford and Constitution and the Ironclads Monitor and Merrimac



Above is an artist's conception of the Navy's newest aircraft carrier USS Forrestal, the 59,900-ton flush deck vessel which will be built at Newport News, Va. The ship will have an over-all length of 1,040 feet, a beam of 128 feet on the waterline and an extreme width of 252 feet at one point on the flight deck. Some idea of the ship's immense size may be gained when it is realized that the old Constitution, 175 feet over-all; the Hartford, 226 feet; the Monitor, 172 feet and the Merrimac, 178 feet, could be placed side by side on its flight deck with room to spare for destroyers and other smaller boats.

The USS Forrestal will be the Navy's first carrier with a retractable bridge. Her four catapults, four elevators and a large flight deck will enable the ship to handle the heaviest carrier aircraft of latest design. Designed to accommodate approximately 3,500 men, including her air group personnel, more comfort and efficiency for her crew will be provided by air conditioned quarters, while escalators will quickly carry pilots to the flight deck from ready rooms below. The Forrestal will cruise at a speed of 30 knots plus and will be capable of remaining at sea for three months without replenishing.

Soil Conservation District News

News of Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District Prepared by Local SCS Personnel

Landowners throughout this area will be interested in the announcement by the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors that a new publication, "Soil and Water" will be launched the latter part of December, designed to help further the conservation of land through the far-flung soil conservation district program which now covers 95 percent of the entire state.

In this area is the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District, served by SCS technicians with headquarters in Sonora, Texas.

The publication is being sponsored by farmers and ranchers who are members of soil conservation districts which now cover 142,327,400 acres in Texas.

Its purpose will be simply to help solidify the efforts of these 100,000 far-seeing landowners toward a permanent land usage program which keep Texas soil pro-

ductive from now on, Clapton Puckett, president of the association and a landowner and active rancher at Ft. Stockton, said.

"Soil and Water" will be published monthly, starting the latter part of December, and will contain upwards of 50 pages devoted to all phases of the district program, which includes conservation of soil, water, range, timber and wildlife.

Editorial offices will be maintained in the Wilson Building in Temple, where the long-handled organization, the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors, has its headquarters.

John B. Cole, executive director of the association, will serve as editor. He was formerly with the Texas State Soil Conservation Board and has had wide experience in agricultural and conservation work.

Louis Reid, native of Fort

Worth, is managing editor. His experience includes publishing a community newspaper in Fort Worth, reporter for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and Fort Worth Press. He is a graduate of the University of Missouri.

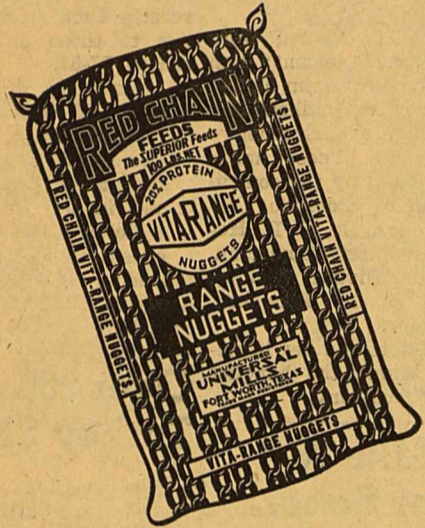
H. B. Fox of Taylor, will serve as a contributing editor. He writes for Collier's magazine and numerous Texas papers.

Ernest Lee Ludwick of Dallas is advertising manager. Ludwick is an experienced advertising man, attended school at UCLA and was a photo pilot in the Navy for five years during the war.

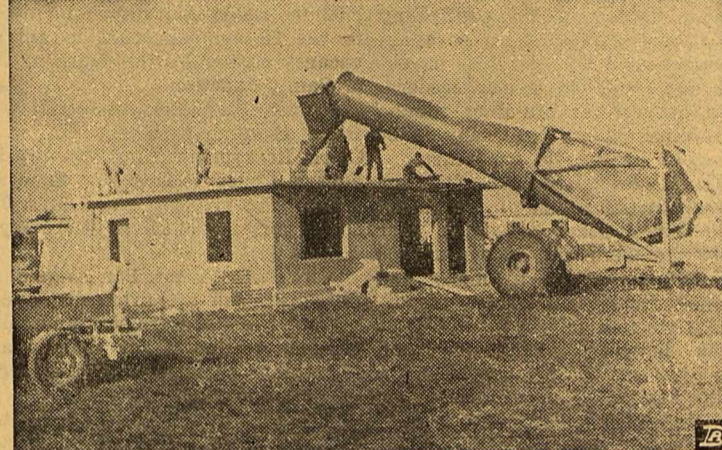

Homes Shot from Guns



LEISURE CITY, FLA.—Builders of Florida Sun Deck Homes here, employ a unique cannon to shoot a molded concrete house reinforced with steel.

Florida Sun Deck Homes has been launched with the opening of a 2,600-acre tract providing room for 6,000 houses priced at \$5,280 near Homestead, 20 miles south of Miami on Biscayne Bay and U.S. Highway 1.

Frank A. Vellanti Jr., who built concrete and steel structures in Manhattan Beach and Sheephead Bay, N. Y., and Thomas F. Palmer, superintendent of construction of the 6th Avenue Subway and the West Side Highway in New York, combined their talents to start the multi-million dollar retirement village of one-bedroom houses.

Styled by Leonard G. Feinen, noted architect of Hasbrouck Heights, N. J., and Fort Lauderdale, Fla., the monolithic houses also contain a combination kitchen-living room, bath with shower, and carport which can be converted into additional living space.

The cannon technique was employed two years ago by the same builders in a pilot tract in Hialeah. The houses are made to withstand hurricanes and are weather-proof and termite-proof.

The only development of its kind in the country, Leisure City was planned for retirees and pensioners but also has attracted young couples from all parts of the country. Carrying charges are \$30 a month. The State of Florida allows a \$5,000 tax exemption.

Leisure City has been recommended by the Florida State Improvement Commission as a development of well-built, low-priced, and ideally-located homes for retired people.

Pie of the Month



Mark a special family occasion with a rich and warm mincemeat pie, served with soft custard or hot brandy sauce and coffee.

If your husband remarks that he likes to see company come because then the food is extra good, it's time to pamper him alone! Bake him a luscious mincemeat pie, with an "M" pricked in the top crust for easy identification. (This also serves a purpose—that of letting steam escape during baking.) Or, he'll be equally pleased if you surprise him with a good mincemeat pie from your bakery.

Using packaged mincemeat, all that remains is to make a fine flaky pastry to carry the filling. The experts have pastry-making down to a few simple rules: Cut shortening into flour to make a dry crumbly mixture. Sprinkle only enough water over different portions of the mixture to make it hold together when pressed, and roll out lightly.

Though it really needs no trimmings, this wonderful two-crust mincemeat pie may be garnished with wedges of cheese, or a custard, rum or brandy sauce.

MINCEMEAT PIE

Pastry

2 cups sifted enriched flour
1 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup shortening
3 to 5 tablespoons cold water

Sift together flour and salt. Cut or rub in shortening. Add water. Mix into a dry crumbly dough. Toss on floured pastry cloth. Press dough together. Roll about 1/4 inch thick. Line pie pan with pastry. Fill with mincemeat. Cover with top pastry and trim edges. Flute edges with thumb and forefinger, or press together with tines of fork. Prick or slit top of pastry. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 10 to 15 minutes. Reduce to moderate oven (350° F.) and continue baking 30 minutes.

Filling

2 to 3 cups mincemeat

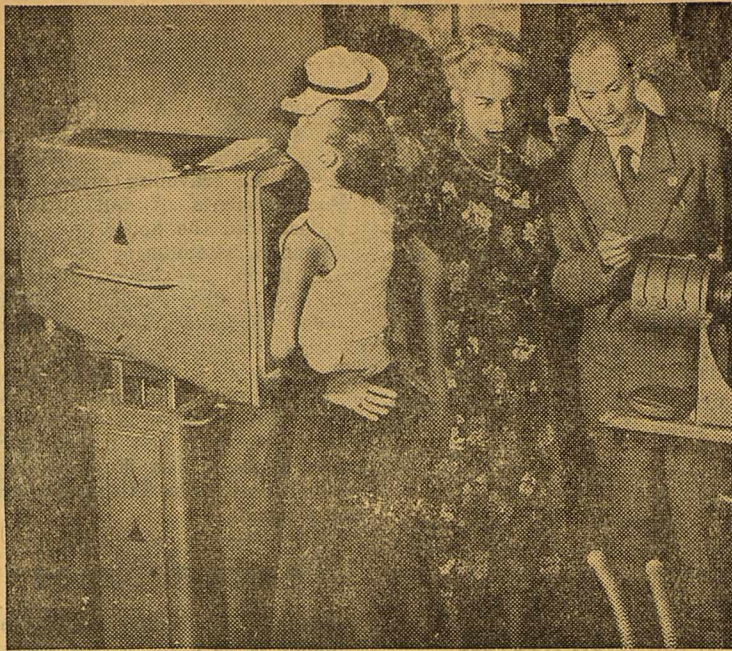

Everybody's Favorite Magic Mocha Cake



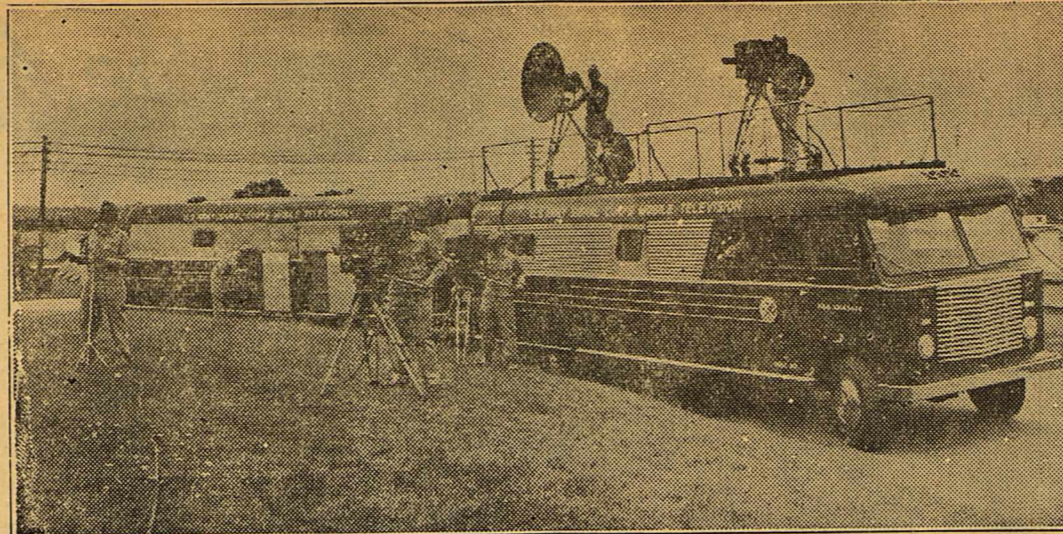
One of the family favorites is a big luscious homemade cake for dessert. You can bake it early in the morning, using either a quick white cake mix or a delicious devil's food mix, and top it with a magic quick frosting made with sweetened condensed milk. Assign the "frosting detail" to one of the teen-agers because it is so simple to make and absolutely failure-proof, no matter how inexperienced the cook. Try a Mocha Frosting that doesn't require endless beating and blending, thanks to the sweetened condensed milk, a rich creamy canned milk that combines perfectly with the other ingredients. It's a simple matter of putting the sweetened condensed milk, a tablespoon of strong coffee, and salt in the top of a double boiler and mixing them all together. Magic Mocha Frosting
(Makes 1 1/2 cups)

- 1 1/2 cups (15 oz. can) sweetened condensed milk
- 1 tablespoon strong, black coffee
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Put sweetened condensed milk, coffee and salt in top of double boiler. Mix well. Add chocolate. Cook over rapidly boiling water, stirring often until thick (about 10 minutes). Remove from heat. Cool. Stir in vanilla. Spread on cold cake.

Texas To Work With Other States On Vehicle Responsibility Law

Texas motorists who become involved in traffic accidents in other states and motorists from other states who become involved in accidents in Texas are most likely to find that the long arm of the new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law has followed them right to the scene of their misfortune, Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., pointed out today.

As explained by Director Garrison, here is how it will operate when the law becomes effective in Texas on January 1:

Assumed that a Texas motorist is driving his automobile in another state having a similar security type safety responsibility

law and is involved in an accident that results in death or injury to a person or property damage to any one person in excess of \$100. He will be required, under the laws of that state, to furnish proof of his ability to meet damage claims either through insurance or by depositing sufficient security to cover the apparent damage he caused.

Should the Texas motorist fail to do this, the authorities of the other state will suspend his privileges to own or operate a motor vehicle in that state and will send a certified copy of its suspension order to the Texas Department of in the other state would have resulted in suspension in Texas, his motoring privileges will also be Public Safety. If the circumstances suspended in Texas. They will remain suspended until he has satisfied the law of the other state to the same extent that he would be required to satisfy the Texas law.

In the same manner, the new Texas law applies to non-resident motorists who are involved in accidents in this state, resulting in death or injury to a person, or property damage to any one person in excess of \$100. Nonresidents who fail to meet the requirements of the Texas law will have their privileges suspended in this state and also in their home state if the circumstances would have called for similar action there.

"When you understand that 10 per cent of the traffic accidents in most states are caused by out-of-state drivers," Director Garrison said, "you will appreciate the importance of this provision in our law. It means that a visiting motorist will no longer be able to skip out of responsibility for his damages, by crossing the state line. If he does, he will find the administrator of his own state's responsibility law waiting for him with a suspension order. I think this alone will do much to promote greater safety on our highways."

Since 34 other states have enacted safety responsibility laws similar to the one that soon will become effective in Texas, the area where motorists are not subject to these modern statutes has been considerably narrowed. While the safety responsibility law in a few of these states does not include this reciprocal provision, they are rapidly adding it. In addition, traffic accident experts predict that most of the 13 states that have failed to enact these statutes will do so within the next two years.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

Q - I am a Korean veteran, and I just signed up for a \$10,000 insurance term policy - the new type that's available to Korean veterans. Will I get dividends from this policy?

A - No. Under the law, dividends are not payable on the new types of insurance for Korean veterans. Your premium rates, however, generally will be lower than for National Service Life Insurance for World War II veterans, a type of insurance that does pay dividends.

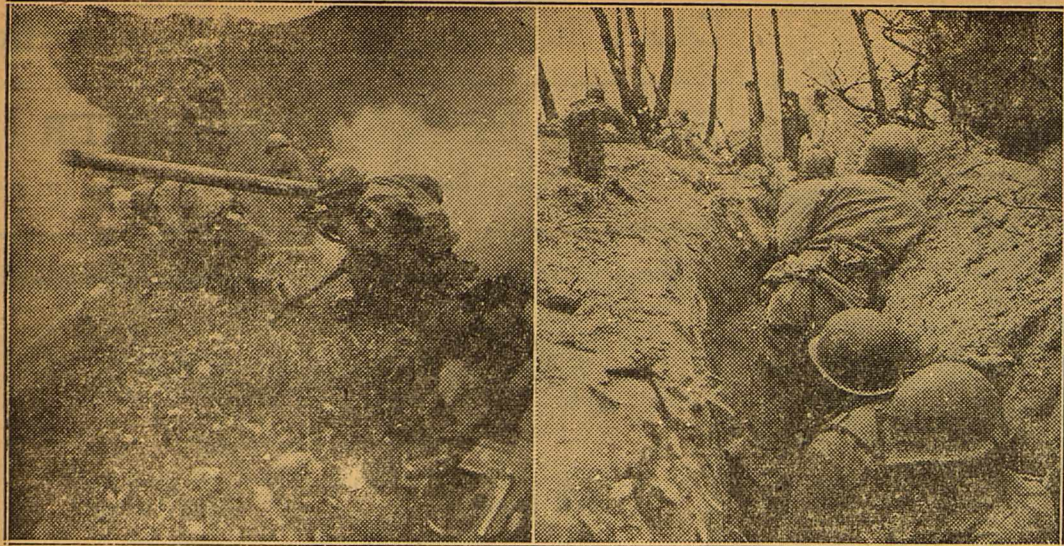

DROUTH SENDS SHIPMENTS OF LIVESTOCK SOARING

Livestock shipments in Texas during September were 74 per cent greater than in the same period last year, but only 4 per cent above August, 1951, shipments, the Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

The disparity is explained primarily by the drastic effects of drouth on Texas pasturelands, officials said. Further indication of the drouth's seriousness is shown in September-to-September comparisons of shipments within the state. Specifically, cattle shipments were down 4 per cent; calves 39 percent; and sheep, 59 percent, showing most livestock were shipped out of state.

However, interstate shipments of hogs, not primarily pastured animals, were up 300 percent.
