8 Men in Six Prisons Die By Electrocution

THREE WALK TO DEATH AT HUNTSVILLE

Eight men walked the last mile in six prisons today. They died by electrocution, firing squad, hanging and gas. Each had been sentenced to death.

Delbert Green sat in a chair in the prison yard of Utah's State Prison at Salt Lake City, a white heart on a red background pinned over his heart, and Green died for a triple slaying six years old. He was Utah's twentieth to die before a firing squad.

At Huntsville, Texas, two negroes and a white man walked to the electric chair. Grady Warren, the white, went first. Mack and Oscar Brown, the negro brothers, argued with each other until they died, each accusing the other of the murder for which they were convicted.

In New York State Prison, at Ossining, John Collins, 27, died in the chair for killing Charles Turner, 60, in a robbery. He almost hurried as he walked unassisted to the chair.

At Clarksville, Miss. Roosevelt Moon, a negro, died on the scaffold for a store robbery and slaying. Poison gas took the life of Frank Rascon, Mexican cowboy, in the Arizona state prison at Florence. Rascon, who killed another cowboy, walked into the gas chamber smoking a cigar, and asserting his was dying for a crime committed by his father.

COUNTY RALLY FOR GOVERNOR IS ARRANGED

Arrangements are being made for a "Carry Eastland County for Allred" rally at Eastland Tuesday night, July 14, when Gov. James V. Allred will speak, bring his campaign to this county after an honor-luncheon at the Laguna roof at Cisco and a speech at Ranter at 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

The reception at Cisco will be non-political in character, being a luncheon attended by some 150 men and women of the city honoring the governor of the state of Texas. After a few hours rest Governor Allred will go to Ranter and speak, doubling back to Eastland for a big rally county-wide in scope for Tuesday night.

Eastland is making big preparations, it is said, for the event. The part of the square not restricted by highway regulations will be roped off and the high school band will play. Surrounding counties of the oil belt are expected to furnish Allred supporters for the rally, which is to be the chief political address of the governor for his campaign in this section.

The local Allred committee is in charge of the arrangements, but the chamber of commerce will aid in ticket sales for the honor luncheon, which will be attended by Cisco people regardless of political affiliations.

Tickets are now on sale at the Chamber of Commerce at 75c each.

\$73,321.79 For 306 Loans

Made in County of Eastland

FORT WORTH, July 10.—Latest figures reveal that 306 loans amounting to \$73,321.79 have been made in Eastland county under the Modernization Credit Plan or Title I of the National Housing Act, according to a statement today by P. S. Luttrell, Associate Director of the Northwestern Texas District of the Federal Housing Administration.

The Northwestern District of Texas with headquarters in Fort Worth comprises 113 counties of North and West Texas. During the 20 months operation of the Federal Housing Administration, there has been a total of 9,610 loans amounting to \$3,241,505.08 made under Title I throughout this district, states Luttrell.

Title I or Modernization Credit Loans are made by banks and other financial institutions approved by the Federal Housing Administration. The loans are made for repairing, altering, modernizing and the improvement of real property.

JOHN W. POPE JUMPS OUT OF WINDOW, DIES

TYLER, Tex., July 10.—(U.P.)—John W. Pope, Jr., 26, assistant Attorney General of Texas was killed today when he fell from the seventh story window of a local hotel.

Justice of the Peace Buddy Gill ruled at an inquest that Pope's death was "by accident."

The young Texas official awoke early this morning to find his room filled with smoke. Officers said he apparently rushed to the window believing it to be a door, and jumped out.

His neck was broken from the fall. It was believed that Pope retired smoking a cigarette which ignited the bedding.

Man Hacks Wife, Six Children to Death

EAST CHICAGO, Ind., July 10.—(U.P.)—Celestino Gonzales killed eight persons and committed suicide because he feared he had lost his wife's love, and was discouraged over a recent illness, police believe today.

The brown Mexican blacksmith hacked his wife and six children to death yesterday in their home, then hunted down his helper, Joe Aro and killed him.

He committed suicide a moment later.

Plans to be Made On "Bookie Shops"

AUSTIN, July 10.—(U.P.)—Texas state racing commissioners will decide in August on a plan proposed by Texas race tracks to combat "bookie shops" with "receiving offices" in principal cities.

At present any person can place a bet at the track without being present by telegraphing the bet to the track. The proposed receiving station would merely act as telegraph offices do now.

In Spite of Drought Texas Cotton Good

AUSTIN, July 10.—(U.P.)—According to information received from voluntary crop reporters, Texas' increased cotton acreage in substantial in all parts of the state, but the greater increase is in the high plains and the area immediately south and east of the plains. Federal agriculture statisticians reported today.

Assuming a ten year average abandonment, Henry L. Rosar, agricultural statistician, estimated the area to be harvested will be approximately 11,912,000 acres compared with 10,637,000 acres in 1933.

SANDS POINT, N. Y., July 10.—(U.P.)—Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, United States minister to Denmark, and Captain Boerge Rohde, gentleman in waiting to King Christian of Denmark, will be married at 5 p. m. tomorrow at Hyde Park with President and Mrs. Roosevelt in attendance.

The ceremony will be performed at St. James Episcopal church, the announcement said. Captain Rohde arrived yesterday from Denmark.

DELEGATES ARE DIVIDED INTO TRIBE GROUPS

The mother and child were reported in excellent condition. The birth of the twelfth child to the parents of the world's only quintuplets was "very successful," according to Doctor J. E. Joyal, who attended.

Dr. Joyal was engaged by the Dionnes because they had disagreed with the quintuplets doctor, Alan R. Defoe, about the care of their five famous daughters.

200,000 WILL BE ON RELIEF AT \$15 WEEK

The nation's death toll mounted toward 250 today as a suffocating heat was breaking six-year records blanketed states from the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic seacoast.

Throughout two-thirds of the states temperatures above 100 degrees were common. Thousands crowded beaches and parks for relief from the oppressive heat. Highways were jammed as others fled from cities.

Drought damage was estimated at more than \$250,000,000 and mounted at the rate of more than \$1,000,000 for every hour the sun shines.

Scattered thunder showers caused damage in isolated places, but failed to bring relief in eleven states where 5,000,000 farm residents have been made destitute in five weeks.

The thermometer climbed toward 104 along the Atlantic to 106 in the Dakotas. Weather bureau officials saw no general relief in sight after more than a week of extreme temperatures.

Excessive heat extended from the Gulf for into Canada.

Food prices began to rise in some places, but federal officials saw no danger of a shortage.

The critical situation spurred federal efforts to place more than 200,000 farmers on work relief jobs earning \$15 a week. South Atlantic states were added to those in which federal drought relief funds will be expended.

The re-settlement administration announced a one-year moratorium on \$7,000,000 in loans to drought stricken farmers.

President Roosevelt planned to leave the capital tonight for a one-month cruise along the Maine coast before making a personal tour of the drought area in August.

BERKELEY, Cal. — (U.P.) — The University of California wants to know what progress mature people can make in learning foreign languages. An intensive experimental course of ten weeks in German will be tried out on any voluntary human "guinea pigs" who will submit to the test.

CONROE, Tex., July 10.—(U.P.) — Prison bloodhounds were today set on the trail of Charles Curry, who escaped from Central prison farm near Sugarland.

Curry was almost captured here last night. He had commandeered a young couple's auto and forced them to drive to Conroe. Their baby was with them. The child became hungry and the couple, whose names officers did not learn, persuaded the convict to stop so they could buy some milk. While in a store the father notified officers but Curry fled.

"I feel so sorry for poor Mr. Pacer," said a woman compassionately. "He is old and poor and feeble and all alone in the world, and he is not very well. I am sure he has seen better days. Then Mr. Pacer's discrimination short circuited. While his wife was away from town he entertained wild women at wild parties in her home. He laughed at her when she cried and pleaded with him. He defied her relatives who objected. He scoffed at the neighbors who remonstrated. He went his merry way. Then he began to do sick tricks in business.

Eventually Mr. Pacer began to lose things. He lost his wife and children; his wife left him and made a new life for herself elsewhere; she didn't feel that she cared to be drawn into degradation by living with Mr. Pacer as Mr. Pacer was living. He lost his standing in the community. He lost the leadership of his business associates. He lost the leadership of his company. Finally he lost his magnetic personality; then he lost his sweeties.

Now Mr. Pacer is old and poor and feeble and all alone. And that does not seem right to some folks who know nothing about Mr. Pacer's past. It seems to some persons that God is not quite fair with poor Mr. Pacer. But there is no occasion for commiseration. There is no need to expend on Mr. Pacer sympathy that might be put to sound constructive use elsewhere.

Mr. Pacer is getting what's coming to him. He is receiving instruction. He is learning a lot of things about life, about other persons' rights, and about playing the game. Unquestionably Mr. Pacer's consciousness today contains a life-sized regret that he did as he did. Although he is not broadcasting the fact, he has sense enough to know that his own behavior has brought him to where he is.

Now, if Mr. Pacer lives long enough, it will be converted into faculty, it will become instinct to be right. And when Mr. Pacer lives again—as he will—he will live somewhere—folks will say of him, "There is a fine man. He is true to his friends, he is straight" with his associates, he is kind and loyal to his family, he is 100 per cent clear through."

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, July 10.—Texas sheriffs know the name of their state association is peculiarly persuasive when it comes to asking for something, such as advertising.

So the officers of the Sheriff's association have decreed that nobody can use its name unless to present something actually authorized, without facing prosecution.

Pres. J. W. Arnold announced drastic action to answer criticisms that "courtesy cards" were being issued for display

in restaurants. The association parted company with the publisher of the Texas Sheriff's Magazine, and withdrew the official designation given this magazine only a month ago. The association will publish its own magazine hereafter, Arnold disclosed.

The association took the further step recently of removing its exposition headquarters from the "Law West of the Pecos" exhibit at the Centennial in Dallas, because it did not approve of some features of the Roy Bean portrayal.

Supporters of Gov. Allred have challenged the platform plank of Candidate F. W. Fischer, in which Fischer proposed, by abolishing property taxes, to lift a \$30,000,000 a year load. "The comptroller's report," says a statement from an Allred campaigner, "shows total state ad valorem tax assessed for the year 1935 amounted to \$21,600,000, which would of course be the maximum saving if there were no delinquencies."

The same worker said Fischer's 15 per cent old tax was estimated by him to raise \$72,000,000, while the

Allred statistician figured it would have been \$58,140,000.

These figures are not Mr. Allred's personally and are cited simply as the subject-matter of one of the issues of the race.

There is a genial son of Waxahachie who doesn't agree with all his kinkfolks.

He is James O. Burleson who is running for congress on the Townsend plan. He is related to the far-flung Burleson family, including former Postmaster Gen. Albert S. Burleson of Austin, and Gov. James V. Allred, whose maternal ancestors were Burlesons.

But James O. Burleson doesn't agree with Gov. Allred in politics, kinship or no, and is going to vote against the youthful governor this year. "He didn't give the old folks enough pensions," the Townsendside decreed.

Burleson joined his fellow-townsmen in making the celebration when Gov. Allred went to Waxahachie for a campaign speech; but his heart wasn't in it. It was too big a crowd for a candidate to overlook, so Burleson got out a goodly supply of his GARP campaign cards and circulated through the throng, a welcome

on his lips, a card in his outstretched hand.

He didn't have time to explain just what he disagreed with the former Cabinet Member Burleson about; but nobody has suspected A. S. Burleson of favoring a \$200-a-month pension plan.

FARM PRODUCE IS READY FOR TRUCK TAKING

Melons, peaches and tomatoes are about ready for market in the sandy section between Cisco and Rising Star and farmers usually depend upon truckers to take their produce to find markets further west in sections where such things are not grown. It seems that the produce is being taken rather slowly this year and the Chamber of Commerce of Rising Star is urging that farmers list what they have so that truckers may easily find their loads by going to the Chamber of Commerce building.

Editorial from The Whitwright Sun, June 25, 1936.

Whitwright, Texas.
J. H. Waggoner, Editor-Publisher. This editor, being a member of the legislature which made provision for the payment of old age assistance to needy persons 65 years old and older, has interested himself this week in making inquiries among local citizens who had applied for such assistance.

One man contacted said his application and that of his wife had been approved for \$17 each, making a total of \$34 per month. To be paid the couple beginning in July. This man and his wife own their home, keep a cow, raise vegetables, and have managed to sustain life. With \$34 coming in monthly, he said, they will be sitting on top of the world. He is perfectly satisfied with the amount allowed by the Old Age Assistance Commission.

Another man was approved for \$19 and his wife for \$17, the extra \$2 in his case being allowed for the purchase of medicine that he requires. An aged and practically helpless widow has been approved for \$30 monthly, the maximum amount possible to be allowed. Of this \$30, the State will pay \$15 and the Federal Government \$15. Other local applicants have been approved.

The Federal Social Security Act only joins the State in making payments to aged needy individuals, and the Federal Government will match state funds for this purpose only. Those who have made a study of the Texas Old Age Assistance law are now beginning to say that Texas has the most liberal old age assistance law of any state. In most of the states property owned by old people becomes the property of the State at their death, if they received old age assistance. And in other states if the aged person has children who are able to provide for them, they are denied assistance. No such provisions are to be found in the Texas law.

The Federal government has already appropriated over \$1,150,000 to match the State in the July and August payments. This is more than was appropriated to any other state, some of which have a larger population than Texas for July and August payments. The appropriation is larger because Texas is more liberal in its Old Age Assistance law.

Gold Medallion to Admiral Byrd
Commemorates His Lonely Vigil

A SUPERBLY human note was

struck at a recent dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City tendered by combined American industry to Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd—"in acknowledgment of his invaluable contributions to science and to pay tribute to those qualities of heart and spirit that make him universally admired and an inspiration to his countrymen."

During the course of the dinner at which the Admiral spoke briefly, for the first time, of the appalling experiences of his lonely vigil in the shadow of the South Pole, he was presented with a four and one-half inch gold medallion symbolizing American industry's tribute to his heroic exploit.

The face of the medallion depicts the Admiral seated at the radio in his tiny advance weather station tapping out "All's Well" to Little America, while the reverse side bears the following inscription:

DICK BYRD—GALLANT
GENTLEMAN
