

Electronic aid helps typists

"Typetronics" has invaded the room at Post High School. "Typetronics" is a complete electronic writing teaching system. It is being used in all typing classes at PHS, both Typing I and II.

"Typetronics" system has twelve channels in which the students can listen to the use of earphones. Students put the earphones on, turn to their assigned channel, and begin their lesson.

When school started, the projected goal was to average 16 words per minute after 15 hours of study. Students achieved their goal with most students typing average of 16-24 words per

minute. Nelda Leake had no trouble at all achieving her goal, as she typed 41 words per minute after just 15 hours of study. This is an accomplishment that any typing student should be very proud of.

Typing I students will use the "Typetronics" system for the first eight lessons, then use a combination of "Typetronics" and packets. The Typing II students use the "Typetronics" system when taking timed writings. With the use of "Typetronics", the Typing II students are averaging 48-52 words per minute on timed writings.

"Typetronics" is a very helpful machine to have around the typing class at PHS, and seems to be getting the job done!

Price changes only in fruits and vegetables

COLLEGE STATION — With meat prices stable, fruit and vegetable counters are showing the only signs of change in Texas grocery stores this week, one authority says.

"Soft fruits are one highlight at produce counters — with prunes, peaches, plums and grapes in best supply."

"And bananas are one of the better buys," Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt reported.

"Cantaloupe and watermelon supplies are on the decline, but some good values are still available."

"For high nutritive value at comparatively low cost, you can't beat potatoes, carrots and cabbage."

"Soft-shell squash, beets, corn and cucumbers are in relatively good supply — along with okra, tomatoes, purple hull and cream peas."

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

She said apples are more plentiful, but prices remain

relatively high, and new supplies of fresh pumpkin are appearing.

"At meat counters, best beef values may be found on round steaks, chuck roasts and steaks, ground beef and liver. However, in buying liver, pork offers the real economy prices."

"Turkey prices are on the rise and fryer chicken prices remain about the same, although some markets are featuring specials."

"Real pork values are virtually non-existent due to reduced production of hogs," the specialist added.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: It's a good year for juicy, sweet seedless grapes — great for salad, dessert, packed lunch, or munching.

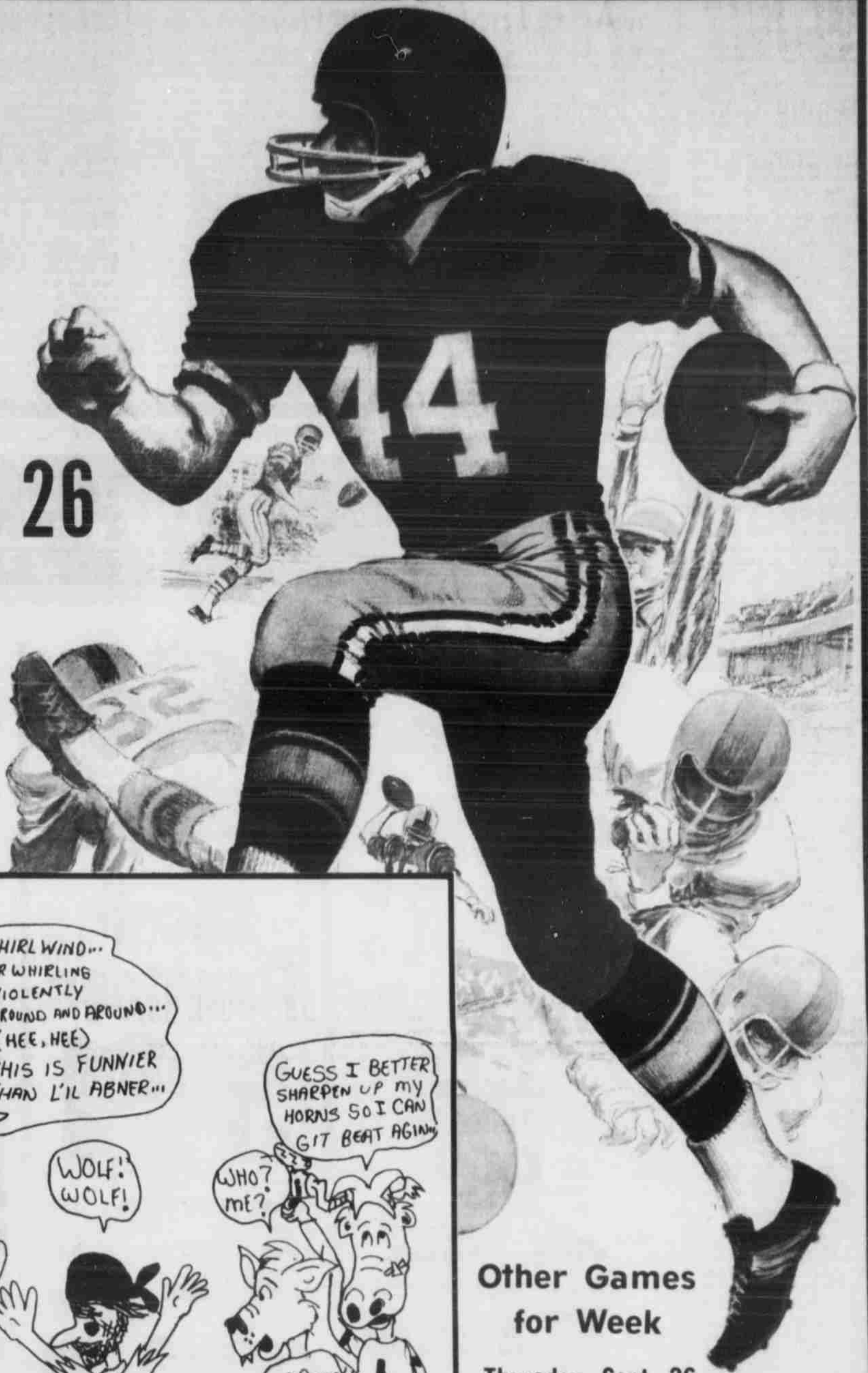

Skit shows how criticism hurt persons emotionally

The first and third period Home and Family Living classes at PHS held their first meetings of the year, Sept. 16

and 17. The Home and Family Living class, which is a division of the Future Homemakers of America, deals with family relations in the home and the community.

The meeting pertained to emotional wants and needs of the individual.

Both classes have been studying this subject through the "packet system" which gives each student individual instruction. During each meeting they performed a skit. The skit was entitled IALAC (I am lovable and capable.) The skit illustrated how the things an individual says to others or what is said to them, whether complimentary or insulting can effect the outcome of one or more person's days.

IN the skit one person, IALAC, goes through what could be labeled as a day in an average student's life. During the day IALAC receives insults

which cause vindictive feelings between IALAC and everybody else.

The same demonstration is made with pleasant exchanges made instead of the insulting ones. In both cases a chain reaction is made. One person can determine a mood by the remarks that they make at the beginning day. That mood is transferred from individual to individual. During the skit a paper doll was used to demonstrate the destruction of an individual when they are constantly in touch with criticisms. Each time IALAC received an insulting action or remark, a tiny piece of the doll was torn away. After receiving only a few insults there was little left of the doll. The same is true of humans. IALAC received a few unkind remarks which led to the destruction of a pleasant personality.

A discussion followed the skit at each meeting. Oddly enough during the discussions both classes decided that teachers have the largest amount of influence upon a student's disposition from day to day.

Cattlemen face choices in oversupply

COLLEGE STATION — Cattlemen are in the business of making a living by raising calves. But for the past year-and-a-half they've had more calves than the market has demanded, and prices have plummeted sharply. Calves are still abundant, and now cattlemen must decide what steps to take with the fall and winter months approaching.

What are the alternatives? Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers a few possibilities as to what the individual cattleman can do with his calves. He also discusses the advantages and disadvantages of each alternative.

1. Sell the calves right now. Calf prices are expected to move lower in the next few months, so current market prices are maybe tops for a while. With the calves gone, a cattleman could concentrate on culling his cow herd. On the other hand, holding onto the calves would yield heavier weights that are more desirable in the market. The price forecasts could be wrong. Total dollars are what really counts — not the price per pound.

2. Winter pasture the calves and sell them in the spring. This would boost calf weights, and spring market strength should bring calf prices up possibly \$5 to \$6 from the fall lows. Low cost gain on pasture should allow a fairly low break-even price for such feeders. With this option, cattlemen must risk both weather and disease problems. A large amount of winter pasturing of calves would probably keep down the spring price rise. Assuming that calf prices do dip in the next month or two, a cattelman may be ahead to sell his calves now and buy others later to overwinter on pasture. This option requires an immediate decision since winter pastures must be planted early.

3. Rough winter the calves and sell them in the spring. With a cheap feed source, calves would put on weight at a low cost and cattlemen could take advantage of spring price gains. There is even a greater risk here due to weather and disease problems and these could greatly affect gains. Furthermore, feed will be expensive this winter unless a cheap feed source can be locked in. Large supplies of calves held over the winter will limit spring price strength.

4. Feed the calves to slaughter weight. Risk from weather and disease should be minimal and gain should be consistent and substantial. If the feeding is done in a custom feedlot, expert management will handle the calves. On the negative side, high feed costs will force high break-even prices for finished animals. And there is price uncertainty in the fed cattle market. Holding the animals will cost money and will involve risk but could yield greater returns.

"Whichever decision the cattelman decides to make, it must be his decision and must be based on his own particular set of circumstances," points out Uvacek.

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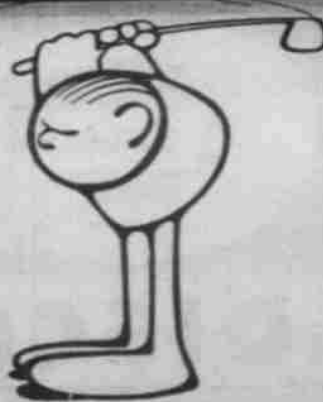
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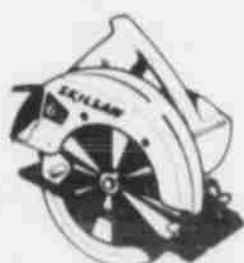


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
