Group Of Local Students Receives Wide Recognition

Last year a group of Abernathy Junior High School students prepared a program denouncing communism, telling basically what it is and how it operates. The program was for presentation in the class of Mrs. Juana Hill, the Junior High School teacher who made the "assignment."

Through hours of research on the part of every one of the 13 students involved, and diligent practice on their parts after completing their research, the program was presented, so well that Mrs. Hill felt that it would be a shame to limit the information to the Junior High students alone.

Word of their accomplishment got around and the abilities of these 13 local boys and girls were soon to be widely recognized.

Arrangements were made for the students to present their program at a Lions Club luncheon last winter, and from there the "wheels began to roll." Their next presentation was at the Abernathy First Methodist Church, then at the First Baptist Church here, and then at an Eastern Star meeting.

This past summer the group received an invitation from the First Baptist Church at Burkburnett to present their program there, which they readily accepted.

Shortly after the current school term opened, the group was contacted by representatives of a Study Club in Morton. The students and Mrs. Hill journeyed to Morton September 27, and presented their program to the Study Club group.

Again, "word got around" of the abilities of these Abernathy students, of whom four are now freshmen in high school, and they have been invited to return to Morton November 27 for a supper at the First Baptist Church. The program will then present the program for the members of the WMU and their husbands, and all youth organizations of the Morton Baptist Church.

'Lopes To Entertain Olton Mustangs At 7:30 Friday

The Abernathy Antelopes will play host to the Olton Mustangs on Antelope Field Friday night at 7:30 for each team's fourth conference tilt of the season. The Antelopes have won two District 2-AA games and lost one, while the Mustangs have won one conference game and lost two. However, Olton has a 3-5 season record, and Abernathy has a season record of 2-6.

Abernathy opened the district competition with a 27-22 win over previously undefeated Morton, then outplayed the Lockney Longhorns 18-13 for their second victory. The Lopes then went down in defeat last Friday night at Floydada.

Olton's Mustangs also won their

first district game, defeating the Muleshoe Mules, 12-8, but dropped their second conference tilt, 26-15, when they played Morton. The Mustangs were defeated again last week at Lockney, 20-14.

Still Have Chance
The Antelopes aren't entirely out of the running in the district race as they have a chance of being in on a three-way tie for the honors, provided certain things happen.

First, Floydada has to be beaten, and Morton may be just the team to do it. Those two teams will meet Friday night, but Floydada is favored as they will be playing on their home field.

If Morton beats Floydada this week and then defeats Lockney next week; and if Floydada wins their next week's game against Olton; and if Abernathy wins this week against Olton and next week over Muleshoe, these three teams will be thrown into a three-way tie for the district title. In that case the three teams would be declared District 2-AA Tri-Champions, and a flip of a coin would then be used to determine which of the three teams would represent the district in bi-district play.

Last Home Game

Friday night's game against Olton will mark the Antelope's final home game of the 1961 season. The Lopes will complete their regular season's play next week when they journey to Muleshoe for the November 10 meeting.

The Abernathy Lions Club conducted their second annual Lions Candy Day sale here Saturday, Sunday and Monday, November 10, 11 and 12, 1961. The event is WIBC sanctioned. Entries for the tournament close at midnight Tuesday, November 7.

The handicap team event is slated for Friday and Saturday, November 10, 11, 17 and 18, with bowling times set for 5:00 and 8:00 p.m. Handicap in the team event is 66 2/3 per cent from 900.

Benefield died after being stricken with a heart attack at 6:45 a.m. Wednesday, Oct. 25, at his home in Plainview.

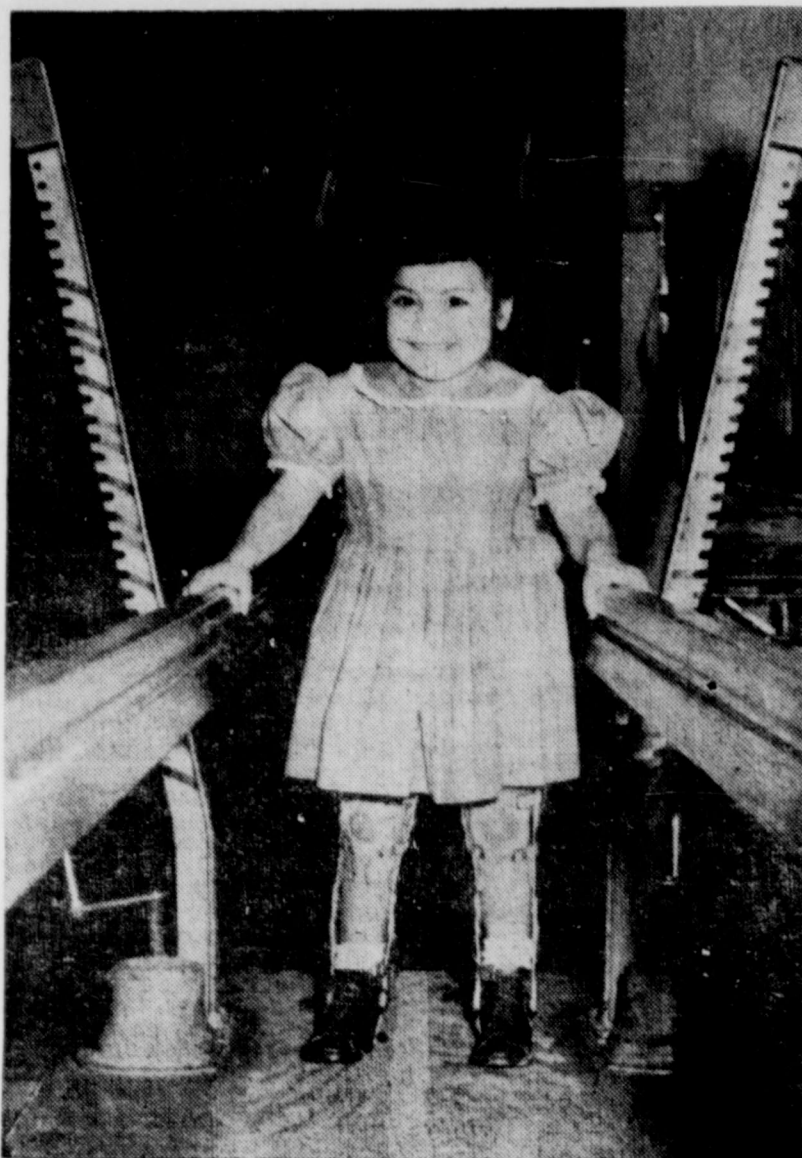
He came to this area in 1916 from Scurry County and settled in the Lakeview Community in the south part of the county. He farmed there until 1944 when he retired and moved to Plainview.

Gonzales Warm Springs Center Holds Rehabilitation Hope For Children And Adult Victims

GONZALES—There's a children's rhyme which begins, "One, two, buckle my shoe," and ends, "Nine, ten, START ALL OVER AGAIN."

How many times that phrase—"start all over again"—has been used! Listen and you'll hear it almost every day.

But "starting all over again" takes on more meaning than a mere child's rhyme for many people. Let's take a look at some of these persons.

Take "Joe," for example. He was doing well as a salesman... until that night he fell asleep while driving home and went tumbling onto the highway as his car plowed into a bridge railing.

His spinal cord was injured in the fall, and when he woke up he had a strange feeling. He was paralyzed from just above his waist all the way down to his toes. In that area he can't feel, and he can't move.

Joe's life will be changed. He must "start all over again." But, even so, he was lucky. If the damage to his spinal cord had been higher, he would have become a quadriplegic—he would have been paralyzed to some extent from his neck down, including his hands and arms.

Then there is "Mrs. Jones," an elderly housewife who had a stroke. The right side of her body is paralyzed, and she has trouble speaking. Doctors tell her that damage to her brain was caused by her stroke and that this is the

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tation offered at the Texas Rehabilitation Center?

The objective of the program is to restore each patient to the fullest usefulness possible, taking into consideration all phases of his life—physical, emotional, social, vocational, and spiritual.

Let's see now how Joe, Mrs. Jones, John, and Jim "start all over again."

At the Texas Rehabilitation Center, the medical director will prescribe programs of treatment for each of the persons which will suit their individual needs.

Physical therapists can teach them to use their muscles again by using exercises, heat, and water treatments. In occupational therapy they will receive vocational testing and training and again learn to take part in activities of daily living and self-care.

Speech therapy will be given those with speech problems, and recreation—important in adjusting to a new role in social life—is planned for all patients. A trained staff in the department of social and psychological service helps the patient overcome any emotional problems which he may

have. Around the clock they will be cared for by qualified rehabilitation nurses.

At the Texas Rehabilitation Center there are complete brace and corset shops which produce body-supporting devices recognized as among the best in the nation. Parents find that their children who are TRC patients can continue their education in the public school located on the grounds. And a full-sized dental clinic and an X-ray laboratory round out the TRC program.

With a budget of \$55,000 monthly, TRC depends upon contributions from federated giving organizations and public contributions to continue its charitable program.

Antelopes Bow To Floydada, Teague, 29-0

Abernathy's Antelopes went down in defeat at Floydada last Friday night at the hands of the Whirlwinds, 29-0. The tilt marked the first loss in district play for Abernathy, while the Whirlwinds remain undefeated throughout the entire season.

Floydada's quarterback-tailback Rodney Teague proved to be the difference Friday night as he passed for two touchdowns and ran for the extra points after the first TD and kicked one extra point. Halfback Charles Christian kicked the other two extra points.

Abernathy kicked off to Floydada and held the Whirlwinds on downs, forcing them to punt. The punt was whistled dead on Floydada's 46 yard line where the Antelopes took over. Quarterback John Kiker, fullback George Reagan and halfbacks Tom Ritchey and Joe Ybarra alternated in carrying the ball and moved to Floydada's 15 yard line before being held on downs.

When the Antelopes had to give

up the ball on that first drive it seemed to take a little of the steam out of them and moments later Teague skirted right end, spun loose from four Antelope tacklers and raced 65 yards for the first TD.

Halfback Pat O'Neil returned the kickoff to Abernathy's 31 yard line, then Ybarra sliced through the line for 13 yards to the 44. Reagan picked up 3 yards, a fumble lost a yard, a pass fell incomplete, and Waters got off a 41 yard punt which bounced out of bounds on Floydada's 13 yard line.

From that point the Whirlwinds began their second touchdown march with Teague hitting halfback Darryl Lindsey with a 21-yard pass for the score.

Ybarra returned the kickoff from the 10 to the 35. He then picked up 6 yards then Kiker added 7 more for a first down on the Antelope 48 yard line. Ybarra failed to gain but on the next play he took a pass from Kiker which was good for 16 yards to Floydada's 36. Two plays later end Jack Waters took a Kiker pass on the Whirlwinds' 28 but was hit hard immediately and fumbled and Floydada received at that point.

The Antelope defense held fast and Teague punted out of bounds on Abernathy's 35 yard line. Four plays later Abernathy was forced to punt as the first half ended.

The Whirlwinds scored one touchdown in each of the last two quarters and kicked the extra point after each. A 27 yard punt return by Teague set up the third quarter score.

Floydada had kicked off and Abernathy moved from their own 37 to Floydada's 43 before a pass interception ended the drive. The Antelopes held the 'Winds for three downs and Teague punted to Ybarra who was downed on his own 13 yard line. Three plays netted only 2 yards and Waters punted. Teague took the kick on Abernathy's 46, faked a handoff and galloped to the 19 before being hauled down. Two plays later Teague bootlegged around left end for 15 yards and the TD. Christian converted.

Bobby Pettit returned the kickoff from the 19 to the 32 and the Antelopes moved to the 43 before being forced to punt. Four plays later Floydada returned the favor but Abernathy ended up with the ball on their own 10 yard line. Kiker picked up four yards, a pass from Kiker to Ritchey netted one yard, then a 5 yard pen-

alty moved the ball back to the 10 yard line.

The Antelopes tried a quick kick which was a low, line drive. Teague stuck up his hands and brought the ball in on the 25 and was hit there immediately. On third down Lindsey took a pass in the end zone from Teague for the final TD.

The Antelopes stopped another Floydada drive late in the game when Reagan recovered a Whirlwind fumble on Abernathy's 35 yard line. The Antelopes moved the ball from that point to Floydada's 35 as the game ended.

Summary

The Antelopes compiled a total of 101 yards on the ground while Floydada had 188. The 'Winds completed 4 out of 9 passes for 71 yards, and the Antelopes completed 7 out of 14 for 61 yards.

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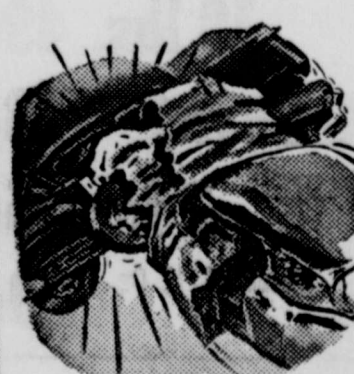
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15-Acre Exemption On Wheat Is No Longer In Effect

The 15-acre marketing quota exemption for wheat production is no longer in effect, E. J. Pope, chairman, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said this week.

"Many farmers still ask us about this at the ASCS office," Pope said, "and I want to emphasize this change in the law."

Under the 1962 wheat stabilization program, there is no exemption for a farm which has no 1962 wheat allotment and which did not have wheat for harvest in any one of the 3 years 1959, 1960, and 1961. On such a farm, the entire harvested wheat acreage would be subject to marketing quota penalty, Pope said.

Under previous programs, farms that produced no more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest were not subject to marketing quotas even though they had allotments of less than 15 acres.

For 1962, the marketing quota exemption for a farm is the

smaller of: (1) 13.5 acres, or (2) the highest acreage the farm had for harvest in the 3-year period 1959, 1960, and 1961. The marketing quota exemption is not an allotment.

If the acreage harvested is within the farm allotment, all of the wheat produced on the farm may be marketed free of the marketing quota penalty.

If, however, the wheat acreage on the farm exceed the allotment or the exemption, whichever is higher, the penalty will be computed on the acreage in excess of the allotment.

City - County Health Unit To Extend State Service

The Plainview - Hale County Health Unit, now in the organizational stage, will extend the services of local health units in Texas to a new high of 75 percent of the state's population.

The Plainview-Hale County unit will be the 55th to go into operation in Texas, Dr. L. T. Walter, director of local health services for the State Health Department, said.

Dr. Walter said that as soon as the local board of health is set up by the city and county governing bodies, he will have applications from trained public health personnel ready to present to the board for consideration.

Dr. Walter, whose job it is to locate public health officers for employment by the local units,

said he has several men in sight for the job at Plainview.

The Plainview unit is being set up on a co-operative basis, with the state providing \$13,878 a year for its annual budget and the city and county putting up the other \$29,999.

Personnel will include a health officer, two nurses and two sanitarians. Employment is by the local Board of Health, from applications of qualified persons submitted through the Merit System Council in Austin.

Dr. Walter was happy to have received approval from the City of Plainview and Hale County of the proposed budget for the new local health unit. He said it will be another major step forward in extending health services to a large portion of Texas.

County Receives Right-Of-Way Payment For Land Between Here And Hale Center

A check for \$2,999.37 for right of way payment was sent to Hale County last week by the Texas Highway Department.

The sum forwarded is partial

payment for the state's share of the cost of the land needed on U. S. 87, between South City Limits of Hale Center and North City Limits of Abernathy.

The check will be transmitted by District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock to the Hale County Commissioners Court.

While county and state share the cost of the right of way, the Texas Highway Department bears the cost of title insurance and pays the entire cost of appraisal work ordered by the Department. Checks for these items have already been forwarded from the Texas Highway Department to the parties concerned.

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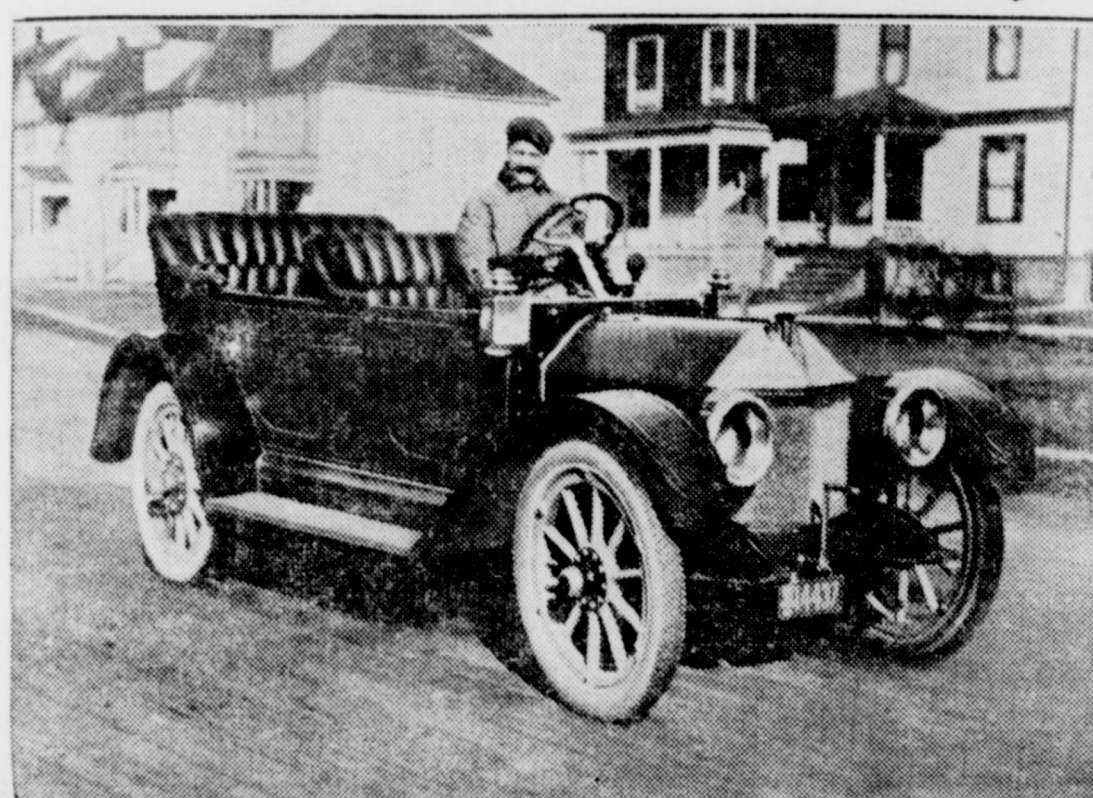

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Licensing And Light Requirements Of Cotton Trailers Reviewed By Liner

County Agent, Ollie F. Liner, emphasized the fact that farmers will be required to license farm trailers used to haul cotton if they have a gross weight of over 4,000 pounds. The cost for this license is \$5 per trailer. Trailers with a gross of over 10,000 pounds will be required to have a commercial type license. Farmers should keep in mind that the law of the State of Texas requires that all trailers being operated on public highways within the state shall have a minimum of two red reflectors on the rear of the trailer plus a burning red tail light visible for 500 feet, plus a red stop light, if the stop light on the towing vehicle is not visible. The burning red tail light and the red stop light may be of the combination type.

The requirements further call for two red clearance lights on the rear plus two amber reflectors on the sides near the front of the trailer and two red reflectors

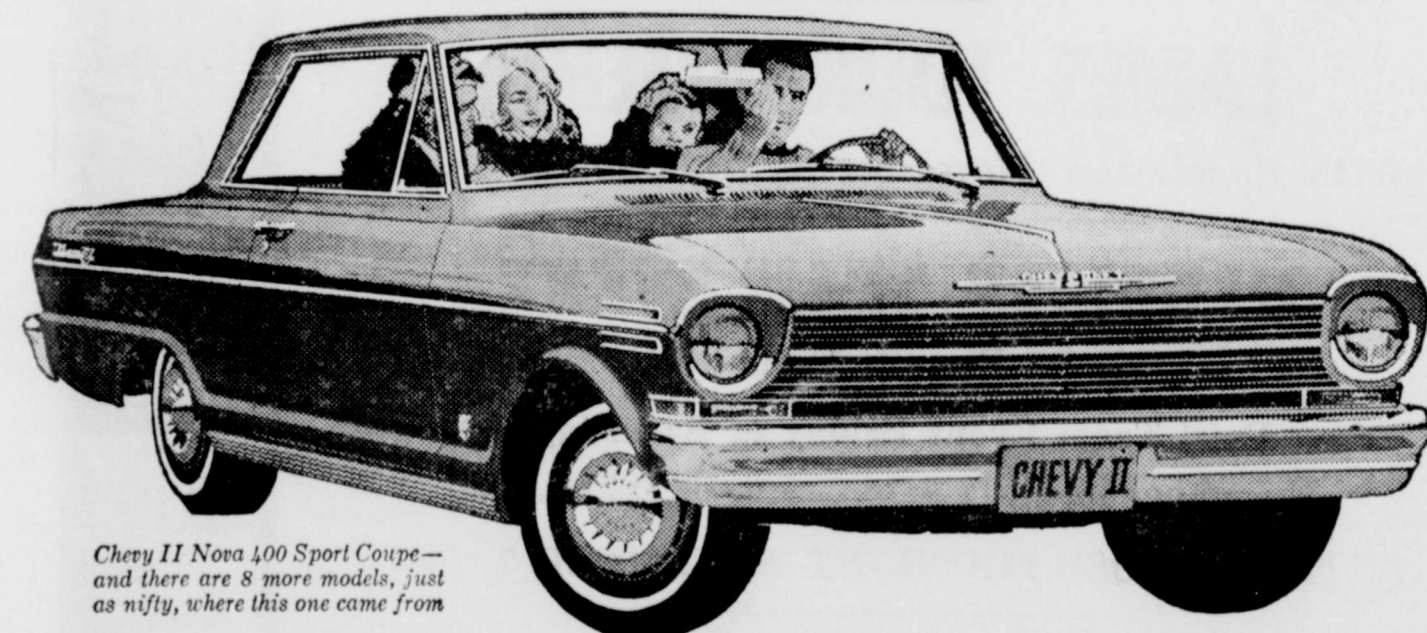

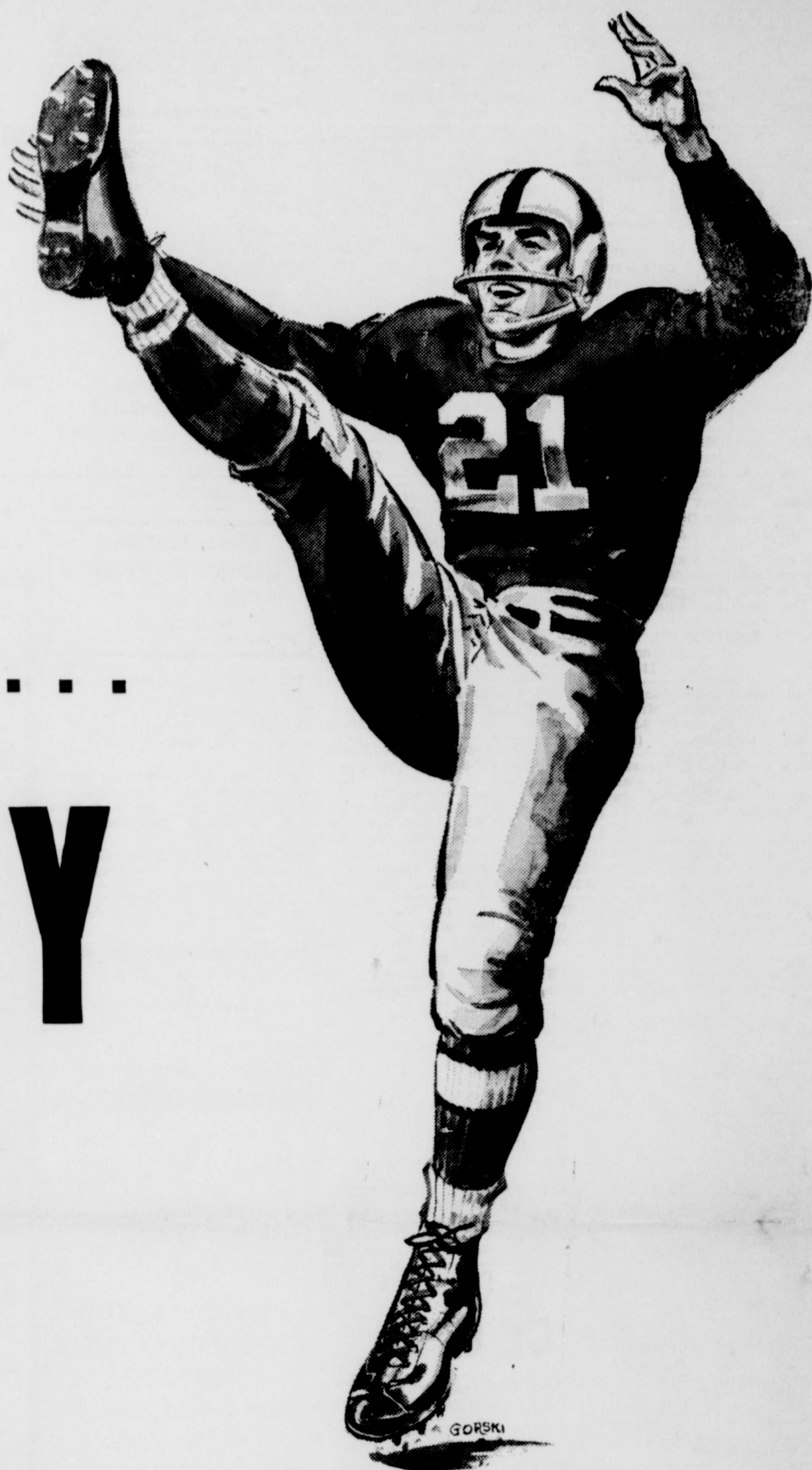
