SPEAKERS IN SHORT COURSE TREAT TOPICS

REMEDIES STRESSED IN ADDRESSES TODAY; MEET CLOSING

With the final hours of the Texas Technological college Farmers and Home-makers' Short Course drawing near, discussions have largely dissipated themselves into group studies of the different problems facing farmers of the Panhandle and South Plains.

The morning session of the final day was concerned principally with talks by experts on subjects of livestock, their care, treatment and the problems that arise in breeding. Approximately 200 men and women were assembled in the livestock judging pavilion at the college for the program.

Mowery Is Speaker
With Prof. W. L. Stangel, head of the department of animal husbandry at Texas Tech, presiding, R. C. Mowery, professor of animal husbandry, was the first speaker to appear this morning. Prof. Mowery took as his subject "Poverty Problems," and discussed from various angles the things that concern the poverty stricken of this section. He illustrated his talk by pointing out tests that have been conducted at the college and the results that have been obtained.

The second speaker before the gathering was M. B. Corder, agricultural agent of the Fort Worth and Denver railway, who spoke on permanent and temporary pastures.

Pasture Problem
"We must put our best efforts to the problem of pasture in order to arrive at any definite point in time," he said.

Riley Youth Is Given 99 Years

OGLESBY IS IDENTIFIED AS SLAYER

MAN IS WANTED FOR MURDER ON TAYLOR COUNTY CHARGE

PORT WORTH, Feb. 5.—Albert Oglesby, charged by a motorcycle officer here Monday, was identified today as Cole Oglesby, wanted in Taylor county on a charge of murder.

He was identified by Chief of Police Ingram and Sheriff Sheriff O'Chert, who had a warrant for his arrest on the murder charge. Oglesby is alleged to have killed a man by the name of Johnson on the Abilene highway in 1928.

Welding equipment found in the automobile in which Oglesby and Joe Newton were riding was identified as being stolen last week from the welding shed of the Magnolia Petroleum company at Oiden.

Johnson was shot to death when he drew a gun as he saw the two robbers approach. One of the hijackers was heard to remark, "I'll get the electric chair for this."

Hold Up Wrestler
After killing Johnson and holding up several other couples, the bandits held up Harry Demetral, a wrestler, and his woman companion, forcing themselves into Demetral's car, and forced Demetral to drive almost to Coleman, where the couple was released.

Ira McNeil, 23, former resident of Lubbock, died last night at 8:30 o'clock, following an extended illness at Alamogordo, N. M.

NINETEEN-YEAR-OLD SMILES IN HEARING OF VERDICT

WAXAHACHIE, Feb. 5.—Convicted of murder for the slaying of his father, Herman Riley, 19-year-old farm youth, was sentenced to 99 years imprisonment by a jury today.

The jury was given the case last night.

Still Faces Charge
Riley still faced a murder indictment for the slaying of his father, Ace Riley, on the same night, and an assault indictment for seriously wounding his younger brother.

He smiled when the verdict was announced.

"Well," he said, "I guess that's all right."

Mother Tries to Flee
Mr. and Mrs. Ace Riley, farmers, were shot to death the night of Dec. 6. Riley's body was found lying in his bed. Mrs. Riley, who apparently tried to flee, lay dead on the floor of another room, her feet covered with mud. She presumably had fled outdoors and then returned.

Herman's younger brother, Walter, also was shot as he lay asleep. The wound did not prove fatal.

A short time before the shooting Herman had quarreled with his father. Arrested when his blood-stained clothes were found, he admitted the triple shooting, saying he planned getting married and wanted to have a little money, to start married life.

The defense was insanity.

Validated Title
The Small bill validated title to land in the stream beds where the surveys cross streams that are not navigable but which are more than 30 feet in width. The original statute classified the streams as navigable and forbade surveys to include them.

Governor Moody vetoed the bill on grounds that it was unconstitutional. A large delegation appeared in Austin to urge the legislature to enact the law over the executive disapproval and both houses did this in the case passed on, involving validity of the Small bill the state had brought suit against Bradford and about 600 other defendants in trespass to title to recover the area, all in Gray and Wheeler counties, on grounds that it constituted a "statutory navigable stream."

SMALL LAND BILL UPHELD IN DECISION

APPEALS COURT RULES CONSTITUTIONALITY OF TITLE LAW

AUSTIN, Feb. 4.—The so-called Small River Bed bill, passed by the legislature over veto of Governor Moody, was upheld by the Third Court of Civil Appeals today.

The court reversed and remanded the case of the State versus C. W. Bradford and others, the suit involving title to valuable river bed land on the north fork of the Red River, on grounds that the trial court erred in sustaining the general demurrers and holding that the petition alleged insufficient facts to constitute the river beds in question a navigable stream of water course, but held constitutional and valid the Small bill which validated or granted the appellees right or interest in the area in controversy.

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The bill was written by Senator C. C. Small of Wellington.

COOK PAROLE RECOMMENDED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Dr. Fredrick A. Cook, Arctic explorer serving a 14 years and 9 month sentence at Leavenworth Federal penitentiary today was recommended for parole by the federal parole board.

Attorney General Mitchell has yet to pass upon the parole board's recommendation, and there was no indication from the department of justice today that what action would be taken. Should Mitchell approve the recommendation it will be submitted to President Hoover for his approval.

Cook began his sentence on April 6, 1925, after he had been convicted at Fort Worth, Texas, before Federal

Ortiz Rubio Takes Oath As President Of Mexico

MANY AMERICANS ARE PRESENT TODAY AT CEREMONIES

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5.—Stressing the "particularly good relations" existing between Mexico and the United States and pledging his government to five years of hard work in the interest of the common people, Pascual Ortiz Rubio took office today as president of Mexico.

It was the second time in recent history that a civilian took over the reins of power in Mexico peacefully. President Portes Gil, who retired today, being the first.

Many Americans Present
At least 40,000 persons jammed their way into the national stadium for the inaugural and in the crowd were hundreds of Americans.

Deputy Melchor Ortega, president of the joint session of congress meeting on a wooden platform in the center of the field, administered the oath.

Ambassadors of fifteen nations and the entire diplomatic corps accredited to Mexico were assembled in formal dress on the platform, which also seated all of the high military commanders, the state governors, the supreme court magistrates and other important officials.

Ceremony Brief
The ceremony, which took place at noon, was brief, but was accompanied by the same colorful military display that characterized the inauguration of President Portes Gil on December 1, 1928. BLOCK STILL HELD WITHOUT BOND IN JAIL

NO EFFORTS MADE TO RELEASE MAN BY COUNSEL TODAY

Efforts to secure bond for A. L. Block, of Dallas, charged with swindling in connection with promotion of the Lubbock Athletic club had not materialized early this afternoon.

Officials at the court house indicated today that a preliminary hearing would probably be sought in a justice court as soon as the prisoner confers with his counsel, Lewis Burks & Howard, and Pat Russell, Dallas attorney. The latter has not yet arrived in Lubbock.

Block, debonaire and prepossessing, was arrested last Wednesday in Dallas and returned to this city yesterday afternoon.

The nattily dressed agent of the represented club, who left this city last October, was placed in the "bull pen" at the county jail in company with 18 offenders, who are held on various counts. Crowded conditions at the jail have filled all cells beyond capacity.

Dr. O. W. English, of Lubbock, signed a complaint one week ago which alleges that Block fraudulently obtained the former's name to a note for \$100 membership in the club.

One hundred and eleven local citizens had subscribed to or had been donated memberships in the club.

Texas Anti-Seine Law Upheld Again

CORPUS CHRISTI, Feb. 5.—For the second time within recent weeks, constitutionality of the state anti-seine law was upheld in effect by a court ruling in district court at Rockport today. The ruling sustained a general demurrer of the state to the bill for a permanent injunction based on alleged unconstitutionality.

The Rockport suit was brought by commercial fishermen of Nueces and Aransas counties.

DEATH REVEALS WEALTHY PHYSICIAN LIVED OFF NEIGHBORS IN ARKANSAS

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NEW LEADER PROMISES TO WORK FOR PEOPLE ABOVE ALL OTHERS

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5.—President Ortiz Rubio of Mexico, in his inaugural speech today, promised above all to work for the people, the workers and peasants the "hope" of Mexico.

He said he would endeavor to remove all boundaries between the government and the people, seeking to establish a "social government" of common understanding and interest with the masses.

The address set forth in general the lines and purposes of the new administration which is to fill out the four years, nine months and 25 days remaining unexpired of the term of President-Elect Alvaro Obregon, assassinated July 17, 1928.

The new president said the ideals of the revolution—justice and welfare for all—had been accepted by the nation, as exemplified in his election by popular vote, adding that his government would never lose sight of the work it was pledged to carry out.

Restoration of conservative or even moderate men and systems, he declared, was impossible because the country was heart and soul intent on the radical work of restoring to the race its heritage.

The revolution had brought its own morals, its own justice, its own policies, in short, its own conception of life, he explained, promising that his government would be "eminently revolutionary."

MOODY'S PLAN IS CONSIDERED

CENTRALIZATION OF PLANT NEAR AUSTIN TALKED TODAY

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Governor Moody's plan for a central industrial unit of the prison system near Austin, with agricultural activities concentrated on four of the lower Brazos farms, was under consideration by the house when it recessed at noon today.

As now proposed the industrial unit would be "not less than 20 nor more than 75 miles" from Austin. Originally the location proposed was "within 20 miles" of Austin.

The administration bill got before the house through considerable jockeying between its opponents and supporters, after the committee of the whole reported all six of the prison bills without recommendation soon after the session opened.

Ban On Wisconsin Products Issued
MILWAUKEE, Feb. 5.—Because of the order of the Wisconsin real estate board prohibiting sale in Wisconsin of certain Rio Grande valley land, the new junior high school at Mission will be equipped with plumbing fixtures "manufactured in a state friendly to Texas," said a resolution adopted by the board of trustees. Contractors were notified no Wisconsin fixtures would be acceptable.

GROUP MAY BE CONFINED INDEFINITELY

BRADY'S INSANITY IS QUESTION; VERDICT AWAITED BY CROWD

(By Associated Press)
COURTROOM, AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—A dispirited jury worn with arguments sent word this morning it was deadlocked and held no hope of reaching an agreement as to whether John W. Brady was sane when he killed Miss Lehlia Highsmith.

Judge J. D. Moore, though he would make no announcement, indicated he would keep the jurors for an indefinite time. He failed, also, to call them down to ascertain whether they were in controversy over the question of guilt or insanity (sanity or insanity), or punishment, saying he would not confer with them until they specially requested it.

Life With Brady
Brady, 38-year-old former Civil Appeals court judge, had company in his cell, his wife of 30 years, spending the hours with him.

Meanwhile, a small group standing on a curb across the street continued to gaze up through the third floor windows at the jurors, who alternately would argue, one or two seeming to bear the brunt, against a majority. There would be periods of inactivity, and once in a while a tired juror would look longingly down.

The current report was that they stood 10 to 2 for conviction and a very stiff penalty.

A. G. B. Highsmith, father of the 23-year-old girl whom Brady stabbed to death, walked impatiently about the courthouse. District Attorney Henry H. Brooks was non-committal when informed of the jury status; Dayton Moses of defense counsel made no comment.

GAS BUILDING PERMIT TAKEN

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THREE NEW BUREAUS, TWELVE COMMITTEES FORMED IN W.T.C.C. WORK FOR YEAR

OUTLINE OF WORK IS GIVEN; STRESS ON OPPORTUNITIES

(Special To The Journal)
FORT WORTH, Feb. 5.—The work of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce this year is dedicated primarily to the promotion and development of the West Texas territory and is confined to those unofficial things which a chamber of commerce is supposed to do and leaves to the official bodies and agencies those things which they are created to do. With this end in view, the work is divided into two major heads.

First—That of protecting and expanding those resources we already have, and
Second—That of developing new industries and resources to the end that greater wealth and prosperity will be created.

To handle the work of the organization along the above lines, twelve committees and three bureaus have therefore been created, as follows:

Development Bureau
Charged with the responsibility of studying and promoting every phase of industrial opportunities in West Texas and of developing undeveloped resources and possibilities. The committee work of this bureau will be handled by five committees as follows:

Committee on Development Through County Agents. Committee on Development Through Live Stock Interests. Committee on Development of Mineral Resources. Committee on Development Through National Government.

Protection and Expansion Bureau
Charged with the responsibility of protecting and developing those resources, industries and institutions we already have. The committee work of this bureau will be handled by six committees as follows:

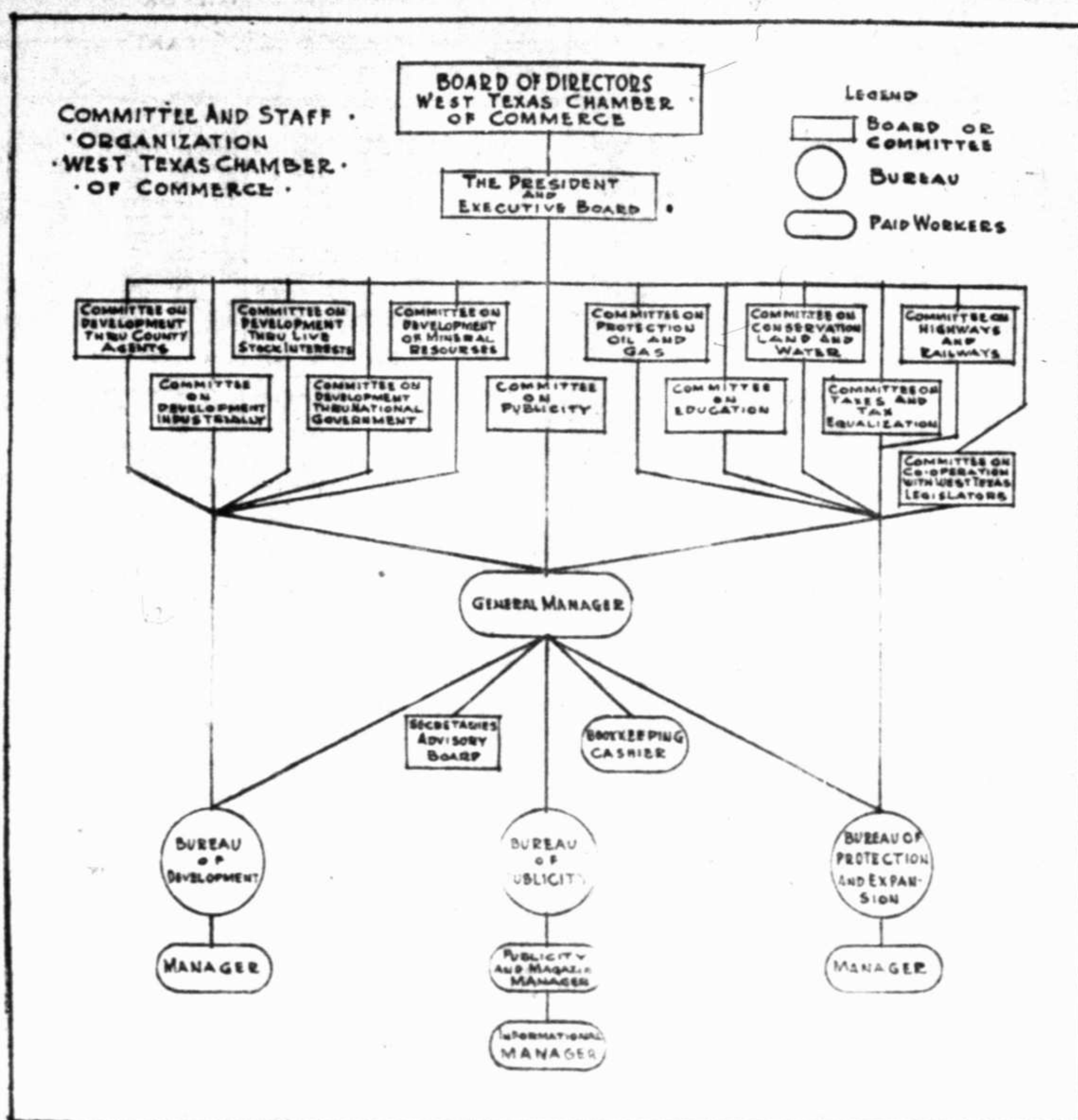
Committee on Protection Oil and Gas. Committee on Conservation Land and Water. Committee on Highways and Railways. Committee on Education. Committee on Taxes and Tax Equalization. Committee on Cooperation with West Texas Legislators.

Publicity Bureau
Charged with the responsibility of selling West Texas to West Texas and of selling West Texas to the outside world. The duties of each committee are as follows:

Committee on Development Through County Agents. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To secure further cooperation of business men and bankers with the agricultural program of Texas A. and M. college representatives

and county agents to the end of fostering and encouraging proper terracing of lands, of encouraging dairy development, poultry raising, and diversification of bettering marketing conditions, etc.

Committee on Development Through Live Stock Interests. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To cooperate with all livestock organizations and interests in a program having to do with better

breeding, feeding and marketing of livestock.

2. To study and report upon the feasibility of putting into operation a plan for feeding Texas livestock in West Texas to the end that West Texas shall get the profit on the beef cattle instead of the feeder cattle.

Committee on Development of Mineral Resources. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To survey and report upon the potentialities of mineral deposits other than gas and oil of West Texas with the view of promoting their development.

Committee on Development Through National Government. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To analyze the raw material production of West Texas with the view of determining the practicality of its conversion into finished goods with the view of promoting the manufacturing of these raw materials into finished goods within the West Texas territory.

Committee on Development Through County Agents. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

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tions for roads, education, welfare, military and reclamation.

2. To analyze the West Texas raw materials and undeveloped resources with the view of seeing to it that the government tariff policies do not discriminate against these raw materials and undeveloped resources.

Committee on Protection Oil and Gas Resources. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To cooperate with the oil industry, its allied organizations, the oil division of the Texas Railroad Commission, to the end that these natural resources be conserved and developed in an orderly manner.

2. To bring about a closer cooperation of operators and producers in order that these resources may be preserved in their natural underground reservoirs rather than brought to the surface and stored in man made receptacles.

3. To urge the creation of more refineries with a view of establishing more industrial plants that will transform the crude oil into a greater variety of finished products.

4. To cooperate with land owners and royalty owners in the proper development of all fields.

Committee on Conservation of Lands and Water. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To cooperate with legislators in the passing of statutes that will give relief from the abuses arising from filling on excesses and vacancies in land surveys, particularly in oil fields and securing just right to purchase said excess and vacancy if found and thereby clarifying and quieting land titles in Texas.

(Conservation of lands and water)

2. To cooperate with the board of water engineers and other agencies looking to proper protection of water sheds.

3. To prevent so far as possible infringement or trespassing on water rights on public streams on the theory that such waters be conserved.

First—for domestic and municipal purposes.
Second—for irrigation purposes.
Third—for power purposes.

Committee on Highways and Railways. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To study and report on plan for adequate state highway financing with adequate safeguards so that the funds will be expended fairly in West Texas counties as well as counties not in West Texas.

2. To study and report on railway development in West Texas to the end that such development shall proceed in accordance with a plan for the development of all West Texas territories.

3. To establish a freight and informational service office not for the purpose of intervening for or against rate structures for various towns but for the purpose of acting in an informational and advisory capacity to all towns in the West Texas territory on rate matters.

Committee on Education. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To cooperate with proper learning and rural schools are developed in keeping with the progress of West Texas.

Committee on Taxes and Tax Equalization. Under the board of directors and executive committee, it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. To study and report upon the inequality of assessed values for state taxing purposes in West Texas counties as compared with other counties in the state, with the view of bringing about equalization of assessed values in all counties for state revenues.

2. To study and report upon forms of taxation which will tend to stifle industrial and agricultural development.

Committee on Cooperation With West Texas Legislators. This committee is substituted for our previous Legislative committee. It exists not for the purpose of framing legislation, of lobbying for or against legislation, or in any way assuming those functions which belong to our duly elected West Texas legislators. This committee does, however, exist for the purpose of working with and through our regularly elected representatives and senators at Austin. We believe that our representatives and senators are a loyal a

group of West Texans as can be found anywhere and that they will see to it that the interests of West Texas are justly preserved and safeguarded.

Operating upon these premises this committee shall:

1. Lay before our West Texas Legislators from time to time the legislative needs of West Texas as viewed by this organization.

2. Prepare data and reports for submission to our Legislature and Legislative committees, when requested to do so by the executive board or by such committees.

Committee on Publicity. Under the board of directors and executive committee it shall be the duty of this committee:

1. Outline a policy of operating our informational bureau with view of making it a service to West Texas and of making it the basis for outside publicity.

2. To study the needs for a nationwide publicity campaign and to outline plans for financing such a campaign.

3. To outline the policies of West Texas Today, the official publication of the chamber.

DEATH ANGEL SADDENS HOME

POVERTY'S PIQUANT PAIN IS FELT IN LOCAL HOME

Poverty drove its most piquant pain of sorrow into the humble home of Will Defoor, 312 Avenue U, when its devastating companion, the death angel, claimed the life of an ill-stricken and indigent mother.

Mrs. Zelia Defoor, 25, who had been forced by destitution into a life inadequately sheltered from the ravages of winter succumbed early Tuesday to an illness of pneumonia.

While Rev. C. J. McCarthy, pastor of the 19th street Baptist church, conducted the funeral services yesterday afternoon, the husband and two small children convalescing from recent illness, were barely able to assemble around the simple bier of the departed companion. Tears coursed pallid faces—Faces which bore all the grief of want; faces which expressed emptiness.

Poverty Caused Death It was poverty which claimed the life of the young matron. The scantily furnished dwelling, lack of food and shelter were alike responsible for the death, physicians say.

When dire need of the family was first known the Salvation Army and the local chapter of Red Cross contributed generously with food and clothing. Every measure is now being exercised to bring the survivors back to normal living.

HEADLESS BODY OF MAN FOUND

WACO, Feb. 5. (AP)—The headless body of Frank Valeska, farmer of near Abbott, was found today by neighbors in a barn on the Valeska farm.

The body was found, according to meagre reports received at the sheriff's office here, by neighbors who sought Valeska after he had been missing from his customary work for two days.

The sheriff has gone to Abbott to investigate. His reports said the head had not been discovered, nor the weapon with which the man decapitated.

WILCOX SAYS LET LOVE GO TO COURTS WITH PARTY WRANGLE

GEORGETOWN, Feb. 5.—The state democratic executive committee today was standing firm in its position after D. W. Wilcox, chairman, had issued a statement taking issue with Senator Thomas B. Love, for the senator's reply to the committee ruling that state candidates on the democratic ballot would be limited to those who supported the democratic ticket in 1928.

"The question as to whether or not the committee has the legal authority to bar him and others in the same position from the state ticket will be tried in the courts and not in the newspapers," Chairman Wilcox declared.

The Wilcox statement denied the committee ruling applied to candidates for district, county and precinct offices and further denied the democratic committee had bid for the negro vote.

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DRY AGENTS ARE ACCUSED

NAMES OF AGENTS ARE LINKED WITH MEN IN TRIAL

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Feb. 5.—The names of prohibition agents in Fort Worth and United States Commissioner J. W. Flynn were linked with four defendants in a liquor case in the United States district court here today when Charles G. Mays was the first witness in a case against F. L. McConnell, Milt Stagers, Martin Carson and Bill Wilmer.

Starting testimony was given by Mays, much of which was subjected to an intense fire by cross-examination on the part of defense attorneys. In that testimony, the witness said among other things that stills and other equipment for the manufacture of liquor had been re-sold to moonshiners by McConnell after the equipment had been seized by prohibition officers in raids; that whiskey seized upon these raids was disposed of by McConnell, including delivery of a 10-gallon keg to the house that he "understood" was occupied by Commissioner Flynn; that McConnell and others of the defendants had told him that all of the prohibition officials and United States officers had been "fixed" so that there would be no interference, and that beer taken in raid had been resold to the original owner by McConnell.

BAPTISTS SEEK BETTER FINANCES

COLEMAN, Feb. 5 (AP)—Seeking means to place the denomination on a financial basis which would enable each church to remit monthly to the state headquarters in Dallas, the annual conference of the Baptist churches of the sixteenth district of Texas met here today.

More than 150 delegates from the district, which includes eleven counties surrounding Coleman, attended.

HOPE ABANDONED FOR LOST FLIERS

MOSCOW, U. S. S. R., Feb. 5 (AP)—The Arctic commission of the Soviet government believes Carl Ben Eielson and Earl Borland, American aviators in the Arctic regions of eastern Siberia since last November, have perished and has abandoned search for them.

Despite the discovery of Eielson's wrecked airplane on the Siberia coast January 23, the commission had continued its efforts to find the men in the hope that they might have survived the crash and escaped to safety.

The commission today regretfully admitted that there was no use in further search for the Americans, who were lost in attempting to bring aid to the stranded trading ship Nanuk.

The Soviet guard at Cape North, reported tonight that in their opinion the bodies of Eielson and Borland had been devoured by Arctic foxes.

GOVERNOR PINCHOT'S SCHOONER BRINGS RARE TROPHIES FROM FAR-OFF SOUTH SEAS; RETURNS FROM LONG VOYAGE

SAVANNAH, Ga., Feb. 5.—The three-masted auxiliary schooner Mary Pinchot has dropped her anchor in Savannah harbor, after having taken a gray-haired former governor of Pennsylvania on a roving trip to the islands of the South Seas in search of a dream that he dreamed when he was a lad in college.

Clifford Pinchot's boat has come back to civilization after a 20,000-mile cruise, and the former governor has gone back to Philadelphia and Washington to spend the winter. The voyage filled an ambition he had nursed for 40 years.

Next spring Governor Pinchot, members of his family and certain scientists plan another voyage to the glistening seas of the South Pacific and the tropical islands that dot that ocean.

Brings Strange Cargo
It has been many a day since a ship sailed into Savannah harbor bringing such a thrilling tale and varied cargo as did the Mary Pinchot. Fresh from a journey to the islands of the South Pacific—the Marquesas, the Society Islands, the Tuamotus and the Galapagos—the vessel brought strange trophies.

The jawbone of a sea bat, four feet long; a tiger shark's jaw large enough for a man's head to go through; baby specimens of the giant Galapagos tortoise, snuggled down by the warmth of the galley fire; a pot bench and masher that served a South Sea family for mixing the food of fish and vegetable; coconut crabs, the "bull weevil" of the coconut groves; coral of varied hues and shapes; shells, beautiful as Chinese porcelain. These and many other specimens were aboard.

Mr. Pinchot, now well advanced in years, took an active part in collecting specimens for the National Museum at Washington, and for the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Science. He harpooned the big sword fish off Albemarle Island in the Galapagos. The sword measures four feet.

Walked on Ocean Floor
Donning a diving suit Mr. Pinchot walked on the floor of the Pacific and collected coral specimens.

The water is crystal clear, but the inexperienced diver finds distances under the surface deceptive. Captain Frederick A. Brown of Fort Jefferson, N. Y., who commanded the schooner, tells of a member of the expedition who reached a beautiful coral specimen when he misjudged distance in using a crowbar to knock the coral from where it was growing. The Mary Pinchot sailed from New York on March 30 last and headed for the Marquesas and other islands about 3500 miles west of Panama.

In the Marquesas Islands the expedition captured a giant Manta or sea bat. Although this sea monster looks like a bat the comparison ends with that for it was 15 feet across the wings and its upper jawbone measured four feet.

Native Leaps on Fish
Captain Brown tells how these

monsters swim sluggishly near the surface and are harpooned by a native swimmer who jumps out of a small boat onto the fish, burying a harpoon in its back. Then the native races no time in swimming back to the small boat and clambering back to safety. The sea bat was hoisted on deck with block and tackle.

The expedition had to use mechanical devices to move one of the huge Galapagos turtles from a small mountain top down to the beach. Six men, using poles and slings, urged the tortoise toward the beach, where it and some of its fellows were taken aboard.

Several baby tortoises were also brought to Savannah. The ship's cook giving them a warm berth by the galley stove.

Among the interesting specimens were mounted coconut or robber crabs, taken in the Tuamotus. They might be termed the "bull weevil" of the coconut groves, for they destroy the coconuts, climbing the trees and cutting off the fruit with their powerful pinching claws to

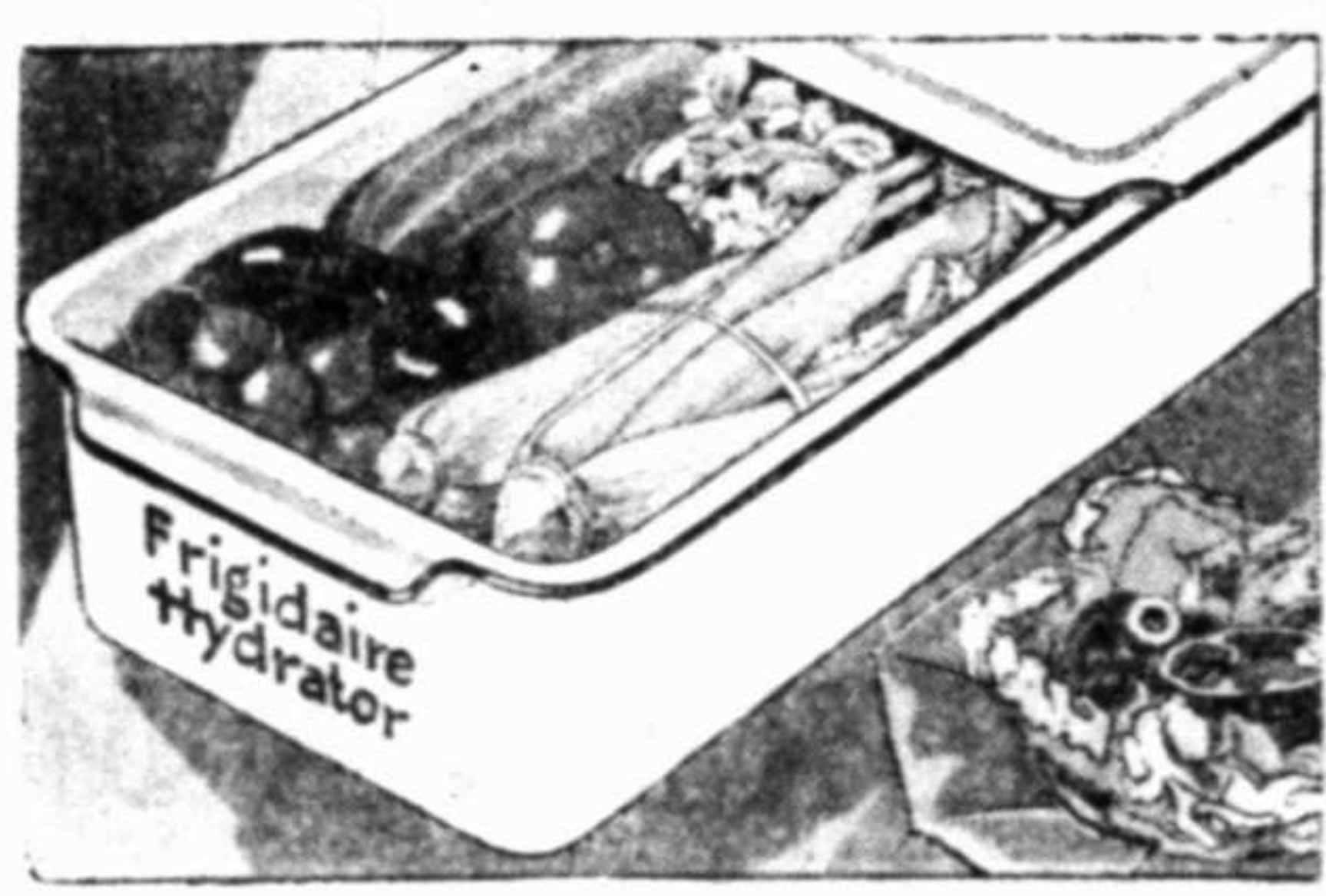

CONTRACT ON NEW SCHOOL TO BE LET

MARCH 4 IS DATE SET
FOR AWARDED WORK
OF NEW BUILDING

Plans completed and approved by the school board, contract for the new \$650,000 Lubbock school building will be let March 4, according to an announcement last night by A. C. Jackson, secretary of the board of the Lubbock Independent school district.

Work on the project will start immediately after letting of contract and officials state that they expect to have the building ready for use of students by January 1, 1931, allowing eight or ten months for actual construction.

Bonds Voted
The bonds voted July 9, 1929, were sold to the Brown-Crummer investment company January 8, 1930, at par value with accrued interest and a premium of \$650.

Site for the new structure is bordered by Avenues T and U and Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets. The building will provide accommodations for 1,200 new students and provisions will be made for future additions for 1,500 and possibly 1,800.

INCOME TAX TOTAL CLIMBS

SIX MONTHS HAS
\$1,184,602.927 IN
COLLECTIONS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Income taxes which increased amazingly in the 1929 fiscal year continued their upward trend in the first six months of the 1930 fiscal year, which closed December 31, pouring a total of \$1,184,602.927 into the treasury. This was an increase of \$171,531,330 over the same period of the previous year.

Individual tax payments for the first six months of the current fiscal year totaled \$559,539,113, an increase of \$142,591,151; while corporation payments aggregated \$625,063,813, an increase of more than \$28,000,000 over the same period of the 1929 fiscal year.

Total Is Given
Figures made public today by the internal revenue bureau showed also that the total income tax for the 1929 calendar year was \$2,592,908,798. Miscellaneous taxes for the same period amounted to \$625,513,592.

In the calendar year 1929, individuals contributed \$1,239,132,324 and corporations paid \$1,264,676,434 into the treasury, the total being an increase of \$235,338,428 over the previous year.

New York state, as in the past, rolled up the greatest amount of taxes in the 1929 calendar year. That state paid \$374,286,449 in corporation taxes, an increase of approximately \$91,803,000 over the previous year, \$477,353,824 in individual income taxes, an increase of \$147,195,000; and a total of \$632,422,267.

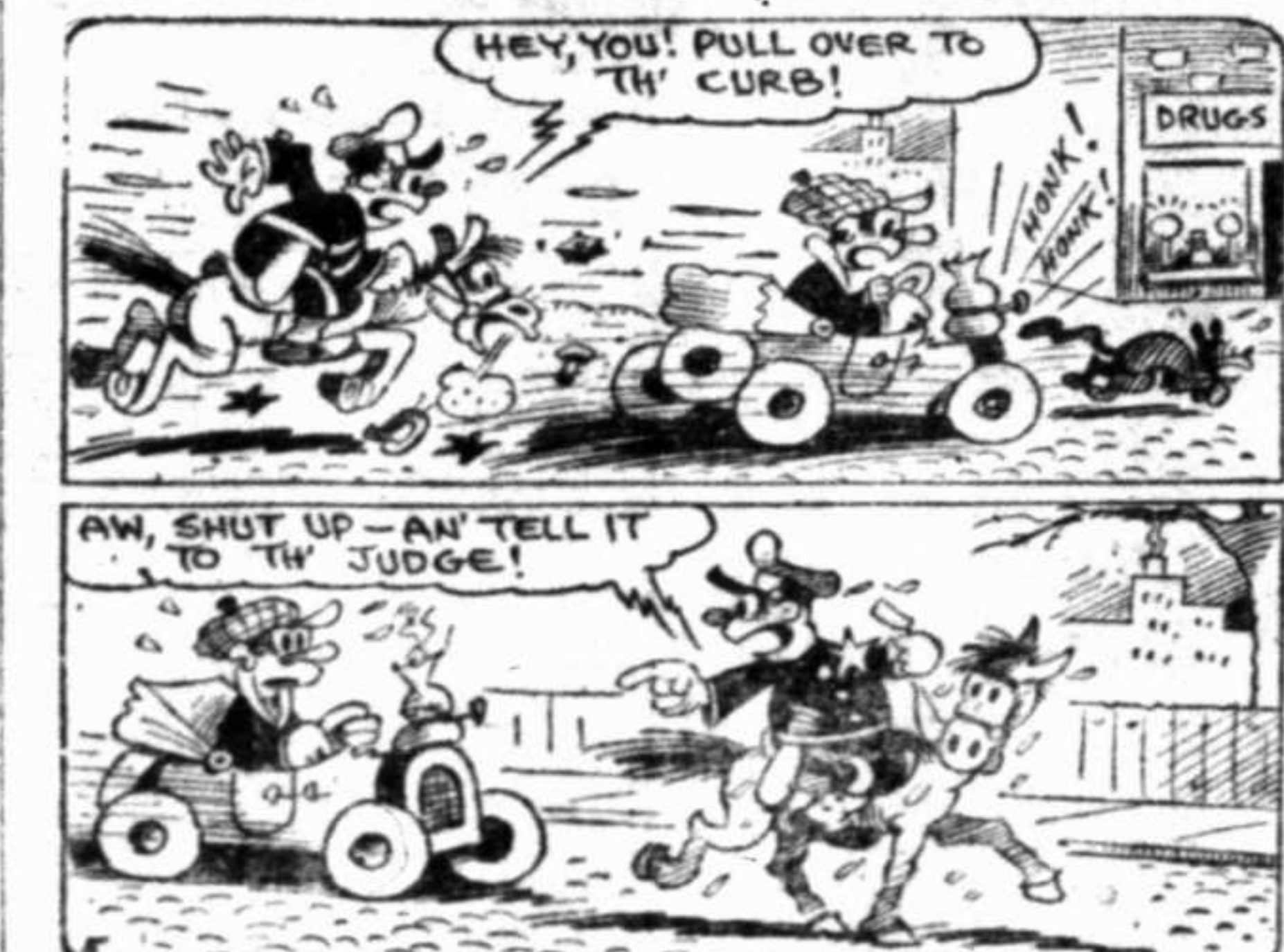

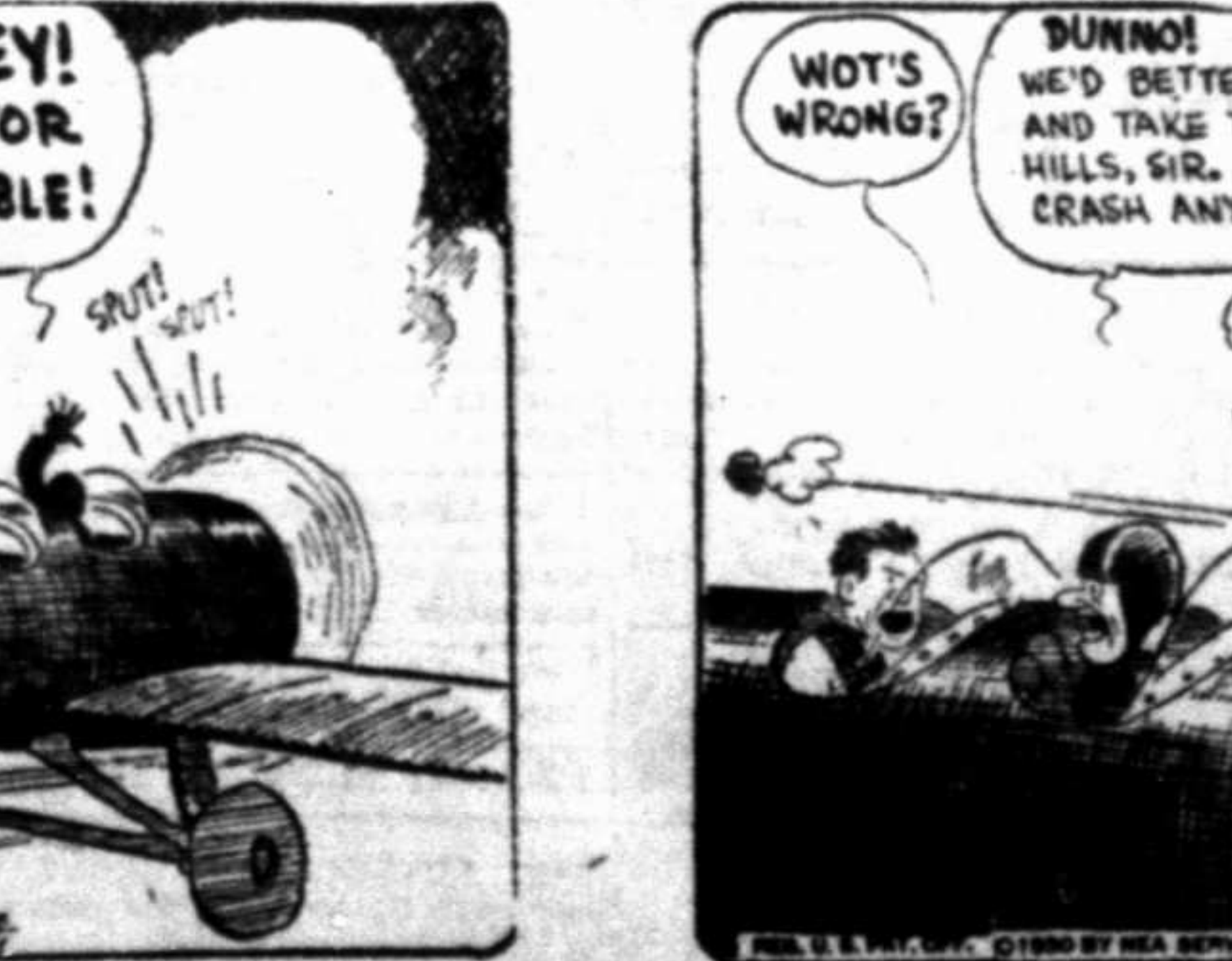

CORRUPT PRACTICES LAW IS DECLARED CONSTITUTIONAL

(By Associated Press)
MADISON, Wis., Feb. 5.—Wisconsin's corrupt practices law, challenged by Governor Walter J. Kohler in his defense against constitutional proceedings, today was held constitutional by the state supreme court. The case was brought by progressive republican political opponents of the governor, who charged that more than \$100,000 was ex-

pendent in his behalf in his 1928 campaign. The court directed that the case be sent back to the Sheboygan circuit court for trial.

The corrupt practices law limits each candidate's expenditures to \$4,000.

May Be Appealed
Decision of the state supreme court, however, may be appealed to the United States Supreme court. The chief executive's attorneys, in arguments before the state court, raised constitutional points which indicated that a basis was being laid for such an appeal.

Charges alleging violation of the law were filed against Governor Kohler soon after he was inaugurated a year ago by Phil La Follette, brother of United States Senator La Follette. William T. Evjue, Madison newspaper publisher; State Senator G. D. Roberts and Assemblyman Alvin Eis, leaders of the pro-

gressive republican faction in Wisconsin.

Expenses of less than \$4,000 were filed by the governor, but the expenditures of his friends, of which the chief executive said he was unaware at the time, brought the total to more than \$100,000.

PADUCAH, Ky., Feb. 5 (AP)—Frank Barret, Fulton, Ky., store owner died at the Illinois Central hospital here last night from wounds inflicted by Roy Springer Tuesday. Bailey Huddleston, chief of the Fulton police department, whose throat was slashed, was still alive although doctors declared there was slight chance for his recovery.

WRIGLEY'S TEMPERAMENTAL CUBS ALL SIGN UP; SALARY BOOSTS INFLUENCE

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—William Wrigley's temperamental Cubs, victims of a few undesired records in their recent world series skirmish with the Athletics, have established a somewhat different record in signing 1930 contracts.

Instead of giving Owner Wrigley, President William Veeck and Manager Joe McCarthy several headaches by becoming holdouts, as is the custom of players on most championship clubs, every Cub has signed his contract without delay.

Even Hack Wilson, who year after year has played the holdout role, came through with his signature in record time.

Although Veeck refuses to give out salaries for public knowledge, it is known the big reason for the lack of holdouts among the Cubs is due to substantial increases in pay for the more important members of the National League championship cast.

Wilson is believed to have received a contract calling for \$25,000, a good increase over 1929, while Charlie Root, Guy Bush and Pat Malone, aces of the pitching staff, also will draw fatter pay envelopes.

Wrigley has his heart set on not only for another National League flag, but another chance to win the world's championship. His spirit is shown in the players.
