FIRST RAIN FOR WEEKS IS ACCOMPANIED BY COLD.

Most of Monday was cloudy, and about the middle of the afternoon a light mist began to fall over most of the county, gradually growing heavier until about night a rain was falling in several parts of the county and on north into Menard County. From London to Menard the rain fall was from 1-4 to 3-4 of an inch. Along the county line between Kimble and Menard, nearly an inch fell early Monday night. Only a light shower fell at Junction Monday, but nearly half an inch fell during the night, and roads were difficult to travel Tuesday. With the rain came a noticeable drop in the temperature, and during Tuesday many stoves that have been stacked in back rooms and warehouses since last winter were brought out and everybody was taking stock of their wood supply.

Rains again Tuesday were reported from Menard County. The total for the two days being about 1 1-2 inches over the road from the head of Bear Creek on to Menard.

Phone messages from Kerrville and San Antonio Tuesday morning stated that up to that time no rain had fallen at either place.

Rains along the North Llano prevented the Sonora mail from arriving until Tuesday morning. This will revive the grass and bring up a winter weed crop that will be of great benefit to the stock industry. The cold weather was not severe enough to hurt sheep and goats that had been sheared recently, and will probably be beneficial in checking trouble from worms.

SHEEP AND GOAT RAISERS' EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HERE.

The first quarterly meeting for 1922 of the Executive Committee of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association met Monday in Pamplico's Hall, at Kerrville. Those present were: Claude A. Broome, president; James T. Elliott, secretary; J. W. Adams, San Angelo, members, E. K. Fawcett and J. D. Moore, Del Rio; Robt. Real Kerrville; Fred E. Earwood, Sonora; W. M. Noelle, Mertzon; W. C. Bryson, Sonora; Jim Moore, Clovis; W. O. Shultz, Paint Rock; F. C. Bates Jr., Sheffield; J. A. Whitten, El Dorado; R. A. Brown, Rock Springs; N. H. Skaggs, Junction and Geo. M. Thurnham, Del Rio.

The Executive Committee remained in session until about 4:30 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, and transacted quite a lot of important business, most of which is not for publication.

E. M. Johnson, agricultural statistician of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics for the United States Government, was present and explained the plan of his work in gathering information pertaining to live stock, which was very essential. Mr. Johnson stated that it was as necessary to have this detailed information about the number of head of various live stock, the quantity ready for market, etc., as it was to have the various reports on agricultural products. The following extracts are copied from an article by Mr. Johnson in the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Magazine, San Angelo, and will give an insight in the plan and its importance:

"The reports will cover two distinct sections, the feeder States and the range States. Coupled with the crop reports they should be very helpful for it is of so much interest to the breeders of Texas to know that the feeder States have a crop to feed and will want their stock to feed it to as it is for them to know that they have, or have not, the feeder stuff to sell."

"Texas, on January 1, 1922, had 3,077,000 head of sheep whose average value was \$2.40 per head and is the lowest State in this class of live stock. It marketed 15,000,000 pounds of wool for 1921 and sheared something better than 7 pounds per fleece."

"The demand for commercial stock reports, made by stockmen, have been a factor in the establishment of this work. Its need was made apparent by the serious conditions affecting the industry both during the drought of 1916-18 and throughout and following the war."

President Broome reported on the Cattle Raisers' Association, recently held at Fort Worth, which he attended and urged closer co-operation between that organization and the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

Secretary Elliott urged the advocacy of a law on Trade and Traffic.

In reference to predatory animals, a committee was appointed, which presented the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Be it resolved, That the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, in its action taken by Executive Committee at Kerrville, October 29th, that the State Legislature be and is hereby requested to appropriate \$25,000.00 per year for two years to aid and supplement the Federal appropriation to be expended under the supervision of Biological Survey, for the extermination of predatory animals in this State."

It was also moved and adopted by the committee, that the present method governing trapping of predatory animals be continued.

Reference was made by President Broome of the liberal action of B. M. Halbert of Sonora, in serving free barbed wire at the Dallas Fair, so as to acquaint the people with the fine diet that goat meat makes.

Sanderson was selected as the place for the next quarterly meeting of the Executive Committee.

The Association meets in convention in June at Del Rio—Kerrville Mountain Sun.

STATE CAPITAL NEWS

From The Austin Statesman:

STATE OFFICIALS FORESEE
DANGER OF COAL SHORTAGE.

This, the coal situation in Texas is serious is indicated by a telegram sent by Governor Neff and Clarence E. Gilmore, member of the railroad commission, to Clyde B. Atchison of the Interstate Commerce Commission, urging quick action in the delivery of 2,000 tons of coal per month for the next four months destined to Texas points for domestic purposes.

The telegram from Gov. Neff and Commissioner Gilmore follows:

"Monteville Mining Company, Birmingham, Alabama, sold through their agents in Texas 2,000 tons domestic coal for delivery per month of October to January. This coal for domestic consumption and its delivery becomes an emergency and failure of delivery will cause suffering. Urge cars for its shipment."

VINSON'S HOME RAZED BY
FIRE WHOLE IS TOTAL LOSS.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed last night the residence of Robert E. Vinson, president of the University of Texas, at 316 West Twenty-seventh street. The total loss is estimated at \$50,000, partially covered by insurance. The house was the property of the University of Texas.

No one was in the Vinson home when the blaze was discovered, and the origin of the fire remains a mystery. Dr. and Mrs. Vinson were attending a reception given at the University Faculty Club.

When the news of the fire was brought to the Faculty Club all the guests hurried in cars to the fire. The presence of so many people in formal dress added an unusual touch to the fire.

SECRETARY STAPLES CLAIMS
TO HAVE "FOLLOWED COPY"

Letters were addressed today by Secretary of State Staples to Herbert Peairs, Republican candidate for congress-man-at-large, and F. A. Chapa, Republican candidate for land commissioner, stating that their names had been certified on the official ballot as requested by the Republican chairman and secretary. Letters were received today from both candidates asking why their names were certified incorrectly.

SEVENTEEN SUICIDES AND 49 HO-
MICIDES TEXAS AUGUST RECORD.

During the month of August pneumonia in Texas claimed 83 victims, of whom 62 were white and 21 negroes, according to a report of vital statistics just issued by the bureau of vital statistics of the State Health Department. For the same month 19 persons died of aneurysm, of which 26 were white and 11 negroes; 28 died from palmaria, 22 white and 16 negroes; 29 died from diphtheria, 22 being white and 16 negroes; 17 persons committed suicide, all of whom were white, 10 died from homicide, 32 being white and

11 negroes; 12 met death by automobile accidents, 11 being white and one negro; 7 died from influenza, of whom 4 were white and three negroes.

There were 5,668 births reported to the bureau during the month of August, of which 4,355 were white and 1,313 negroes. Fifty-six of white twins were born during August, of which 33 were male and 17 female; 12 sets of negro twins, of which 2 were male and 10 female.

ELEVEN RANGERS DETAILED
FOR M. K. & T. STRIKE DUTY.

At the request of the M. K. & T. railroad management the Adjutant General's department late Tuesday detailed eleven State Rangers for strike duty on that system. These rangers are in most instances to take the place of deputy United States marshals who have been relieved from duty. They will be distributed as follows:

Wichita Falls, five; Fort Worth, four; Whitesboro one and De Leon one.

PRIZE FOR FINE COMBING WOOL

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 14.—Announcements of awards made in the wool and mohair exhibits shown in the Agricultural Building along with the exhibit of the wool and mohair section of the Texas Experiment Station located at A. & M. College was made Tuesday. The fleeces entered in the competition were judged by L. M. Murphy, wool specialist at the A. & M. College.

The awards follow:

First prize, \$10—Fine combing wool: Hal A. Hamilton, Del Rio, Texas.

Second prize, \$5—Fine combing wool: Frank M. Montague, Bandera, Texas.

First prize, \$10—Fine clothing wool: T. M. Judge, Sabinal, Texas.

First prize, \$10—Halfblood combing wool: T. L. Drishale, Juna, Texas.

Mohair:

First prize, \$10—Twelve-months kid: R. E. Taylor, Carlsbad, New Mexico.

First prize, \$10—Six-months kid: R. E. Taylor, Carlsbad, New Mexico.

The majority of the wool fleeces from Rambouillet and Delaine sheep. The fleeces were all grown in Texas and represent the efforts put forth and the excellent results obtained by the wool growers of the State. Texas wool growers have found it necessary in some cases to go north and west to purchase rams in the past, but the quality of the wool represented in the contesting fleeces and the fact that the rams are acclimated will result in Texas wool growers buying their fine wool rams at home in the future, Mr. Murphy said.

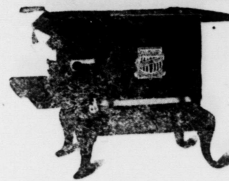

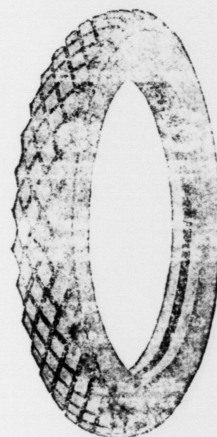
