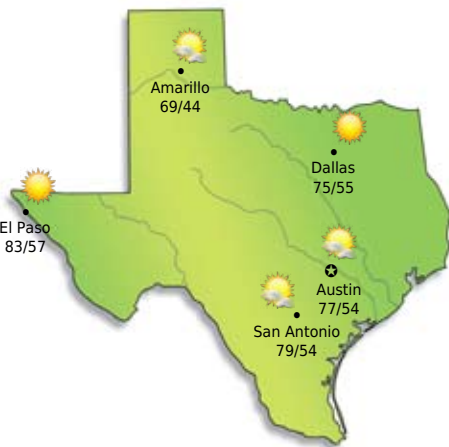

Details of N. Korea party congress secret, but goals clear

TOKYO (AP) — North Korea, the world's last great master of Cold War-era spectacle, is likely to deliver a big one when its ruling party holds its first congress in 36 years later this week.

What exactly is in store during the congress, which opens Friday and will be presided over by leader Kim Jong Un, remains a well-kept secret. But North Korea's advances toward becoming a truly credible nuclear power are sure to be touted along with claims of economic advances in the face of the toughest global sanctions it has been hit with in decades.

Also not in doubt: Pyongyang wants the event to grab headlines around the world.

The normally well-sealed country has invited a horde of journalists from around the world to give the congress an international spotlight. The North has been promoting it relentlessly for months in its

own state media and is vowing to make it a showcase of socialist success — both on the military and economic fronts.

The Rodong Sinmun, mouthpiece of the ruling Workers Party of Korea, said in an editorial Saturday that since the last congress in 1980, North Korea "proudly joined the ranks of advanced nuclear and space powers while demonstrating the might of the invincible politico-ideological, military and youth power and is now dashing ahead toward to a socialist economic power and highly civilized nation."

More violence kills 9 in contested Syrian city of Aleppo

BEIRUT (AP) — Syrian rebels and government forces on Tuesday shelled each other's neighborhoods in Aleppo, leaving at least nine dead and scores wounded on both sides as the diplomatic focus moved to Moscow where the U.N. envoy for

Syria was to hold talks in efforts to restore a piece-meal cease-fire that would also include the contested northern city.

Aleppo, Syria's largest city and once commercial center, has been the center of violence in recent weeks but was not part of the latest partial truce.

Syrian state TV said shells hit a government-held area during morning during rush hour, killing seven people and wounding at least 35, while activists reported two dead in a rebel neighborhood.

The activist Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights confirmed the shelling of government-held parts of the city, and also said that seven were killed, including a child. The Observatory said more than 50 were wounded, including some who were in critical condition, which could raise the death toll.

The Observatory and another activist group, the Local Coordination Committees, said government forces also shelled rebel-held parts of the city on Tuesday, killing two and wounding several.

West Texas Centers, which sees more than 2,000 people a month in their 15 mental health clinics in 23 counties, constantly educates the public and their customer's families on how to better help those living with psychiatric disorders.

To better help people understand mental illness and the services their clinics provide, West Texas Centers will be inviting the public during the month of May to stop by for a visit.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month.

"Our clinics are always open to the public but we are extending a

special invitation during the month of May — Mental Health Awareness Month — to people who may have never been inside our clinics to visit and learn about our services," Smith said.

"We will be giving our adolescents and children a bag, sunglasses and a bracelet, and our adult customers will have an opportunity to enter their name into a drawing for a gift basket."

When mental illnesses or disorders are talked about, the language typically used to describe the disorders tends to be clinical and impersonal, Smith said. These words, while useful for doctors or clinicians, often don't do justice to the person living with

mental illness. That is why this year's Mental Health Awareness Month theme — Life With a Mental Illness — asks those living with a mental illness to publicly share their stories.

Life with a Mental Illness is meant to help remove the shame and stigma of speaking out, so that more people can be comfortable coming out of the shadows and seeking the help they need.

"Mental illnesses are common and treatable, and help is available. We need to speak up early in the disease process and in real, relatable terms so that people do not feel isolated and alone," Smith said. "Sharing is the key to breaking down the stigma surrounding mental

illnesses and to showing others that they are not alone in their feelings and their symptoms."

This Mental Health Awareness Month, the agency is encouraging people to speak up about how it feels to live with a mental illness by tagging social media posts with #mentalillnessfeelslike. Posting with the hashtag is a way to speak up, to share your point of view with people who may be struggling to explain what they are going through — and help others figure out if they too are showing signs of a mental illness.

"Research shows that by ignoring symptoms, we lose 10 years in which we could intervene in order to change people's

lives for the better," Smith said. "Speaking out about what mental illness feels like can encourage others to recognize symptoms early on in the disease process, and empower individuals to be agents in their own recovery."

"Prevention, early identification and intervention, and integrated services work," she said. "Telling people how life

with a mental illness feels helps build support from friends and family, reduces stigma and discrimination, and is crucial to recovery."

straight wins on the East Coast.

Clinton and Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders also faced off in Indiana's Democratic primary on Tuesday, though the stakes were lower than in the Republican race. Clinton holds a commanding lead over Sanders — she's secured 91 percent of the delegates she needs to win the nomination. That means she can still win the nomination even if she loses every remaining contest.

Sanders has conceded that he faces a difficult path to overtake Clinton, one that hinges on convincing superdelegates to back him over the former secretary of state. Superdelegates are Democratic Party insiders who can support the candidate of their choice, regardless of how their states vote. And they favor Clinton by a nearly 18-1 margin.

Neither Clinton nor Sanders planned to spend Tuesday in Indiana. Sanders was making stops in Kentucky, which holds a primary in mid-May, while Clinton moved on to Ohio, a key general election battleground.

Clinton's team has started deploying staff

to states that will be crucial in November and is also raising money for the fall campaign. Even as Trump hires more staff to round out his slim team, he already lags far behind Clinton in general election preparations.

A showdown between Clinton and Trump would pit one of Democrats' most popular and highly-regarded figures against a first-time political candidate who is deeply divisive within his own party. Cruz and other Republicans have argued that Trump would be roundly defeated in the general election, denying their party the White House for a third straight term.

But Trump is the only Republican left in the race who can secure the 1,237 delegates needed for the nomination through regular primary voting. Cruz — as well as Ohio Gov. John Kasich, who trails significantly in the delegate count — must try to block Trump in Indiana and the handful of other remaining states to push the race toward a contested convention.

In an abrupt strategy shift, Cruz and Kasich announced an alliance of sorts in Indiana. The Ohio governor agreed to stop spending money in Indiana to give Cruz a chance to compete head-

to-head with Trump. Cruz has pledged to do the same for Kasich in Oregon and New Mexico, which vote in the coming weeks.

But that strategy, which appeared to unravel even as it was announced, may have backfired. A recent NBC News/Wall Street Journal/Marist poll found that nearly 6 in 10 Indiana primary voters disapproved of the Cruz-Kasich alliance.

"After they made the alliance, their numbers tanked," Trump said Monday. "That's what happens when politicians make deals."

Common sense

Republican presidential aspirant John Kasich stirred up angry words from women's organizations and the Democratic Party by his response to a question from a female college student at a town hall meeting in Watertown, New York, regarding sexual assault. Kasich said all the right things about prosecuting offenders, but what got the Ohio governor in trouble with leftists was the end of his response: "I'd also give you one bit of advice: Don't go to parties where there's a lot of alcohol, OK? Don't do that." Let's examine that advice. To do so, let's ask some general questions about common sense.

Does one have a right to put his wallet on the hood of his car, attend a movie show, return and find his wallet and its contents undisturbed? You say, "Williams, you've lost it! Why would one do such a crazy thing?" If that's your response, you miss the point made by Kasich's critics. People are duty-bound to respect private property rights. So why shouldn't one feel at ease leaving his wallet on the hood of his car and expect it to be there when he returns?

If the person's wallet were stolen, what would you advise? Would it be to counsel people to respect private property rights? Put into the context of feminists' responses to Kasich's suggestion, you might argue that it's

outrageous to suggest that people "restrict their behavior." Plain, ordinary common sense would say yes, a person has the right to lay his wallet on the hood of his car and expect it to be there when he returns. But we don't live in a world full of angels; therefore, the best bet is for one to keep his wallet in his pocket.

Here's a does-the-same-principle-apply question. Does a voluptuous, scantily clad young woman have a right to attend a rowdy fraternity party, dance suggestively, get drunk and face no unwelcome sexual advances? My answer is yes. Her body is her private property, and she has every right to expect that her inebriated state not be exploited. Suppose you were the young woman's father. Would you advise the following? "Go ahead and wear scanty attire, dance suggestively and get drunk. If a guy makes unwelcome advances, we'll catch him and bring rape charges." I'm betting that most fathers' advice would be the opposite, namely: "Dress and behave like a respectable lady, and don't attend drunken parties and get drunk." It's similar to the advice about leaving a wallet on the hood of a car. People are not angels, and one's conduct ought to take that into consideration.

Suppose you have a well-behaved, law-abiding son whose friends are not so well-behaved and law-abiding. They do drugs, shoplift and play hooky. Your son does none of those things. As a responsible parent, your advice to your son would be that it is better to be alone than in

the wrong company and that people judge you based upon the people with whom you associate. Your son might respond by saying, "I have rights. If I'm not doing something wrong, I shouldn't be judged based on what my friends do!" Your response should be, "You're right, but unfortunately, the world doesn't work that way."

Here's another common-sense issue particularly relevant to today's police/citizen relations. Suppose it's the middle of the night and a police officer is suspicious of a young male driver. The officer uses the excuse that the young man made an illegal lane change to pull him over. If the driver were your son, what would you advise him to do, exercise his free speech rights to berate the officer for making a stop on such a flimsy basis? Or would you advise him to quietly give the officer his license and registration and answer the officer's questions, which probably would allow him to drive away without a citation at all?

To teach young people, particularly young men, Benjamin Franklin's admonition that "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" is a challenging task. But it is the job of adults to get such common-sense messages across, even at the cost of leftist condemnation.

The lesser of the evils?

It's pretty darn depressing when political writers are essentially writing off the 2016 election as a choice between the lesser of two evils — seven months in advance of the election. It's one thing when, after months of negative ads, we shake our heads in disgust, but we haven't even really started yet.

If this is the way we begin, is there any question where we will end? Alienated, distrustful, angrier than we are now, having elected a president with no mandate at all.

We have to do better than this. If Donald Trump is going to be the nominee of the Republican Party for the most powerful job on the planet, then it's time for him, and us, to start taking his candidacy seriously. He needs to start doing his homework. Enough with the off-the-cuff comments of a television talk show host playing for ratings. If Donald Trump wants to be the president of the United States, he ought to start trying to act the part, and see if he can pull it off. If not, fine. It will be clear.

As for Republican talkers, it's time for them to grow up, too,

and stop blaming everyone and anyone for the fact that Republican voters are about to pick one of their competitors for a chance at the top job. To hear the chattering class complaining, you'd think Donald Trump was a three-headed monster who'd been foisted on an otherwise perfect party primed for victory. Not so. The Republicans didn't have a credible candidate who could connect with voters. That's a problem you can't blame on Donald Trump.

I watched some of the early debates with my students. I wanted them to get involved — dare I say, get excited — and the closest anyone ever came to inspiring that energy on the Republican side was Donald Trump. 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Group retraces old highway routes

STRAWN, Texas (AP) — Bankhead Highway may be the most important road many Texans have never heard of.

The coast-to-coast highway, which connected Washington, D.C., to San Diego — and stretched 850 miles through Texas, from Texarkana to El Paso — was vital to the development of not only major cities such as Fort Worth and Arlington, but also smaller places such as Strawn that blossomed during the state's oil, coal and railroad booms.

It all began 100 years ago, when Congress approved funding for Bankhead Highway. Much of the road is still on the ground today, although it is known by many other names in various cities.

Only a handful of places, including Aledo and Weatherford, still call it Bankhead Highway or Bankhead Drive on street signs. In other cities, it was (and sometimes still is) known as U.S. 80, U.S. 67 or Texas 1. In west Fort

Worth, it is Camp Bowie Boulevard. In Arlington, it's Division Street.

To celebrate the centennial of Bankhead Highway, a convoy of nearly 50 antique cars retraced the routes through Texas a few weeks ago, making stops in Arlington and Fort Worth before passing through Weatherford, Mineral Wells and Strawn, where the drivers were to enjoy a picnic before heading to Abilene and then a stop at Colorado City and Big Spring.

Often, the stretches of old Bankhead Highway run parallel to modern highways such as Texas 180 and U.S. 180, or interstates such as I-20. The interstate system, which now serves as the preferred route for most cars traversing Texas, has nearly banished Bankhead Highway to antiquity.

"Bankhead Highway needs to be for North and Central Texas what Route 66 is for Oklahoma and Missouri," Dale Truitt, who organized the 500-mile tour of Bankhead Highway from Texarkana to Odessa, told the Fort Worth

Star-Telegram. The caravan of cars from the Antique American Independent Automobile Association included a 1911 Dodge, a 1915 Packard and several Ford Model Ts.

"It's just time we got on it," Truitt said. "This tour is going to be the kickoff of hopefully more interest in Bankhead Highway."

In the tiny city of Strawn, about 80 miles west of downtown Fort Worth, a two-story building is still brightly painted with a sign that reads "Bankhead Hotel & Apts." The building has sat vacant for decades, as Strawn entered into a slow, steady economic and population decline linked to the area's oil and coal production, but the hotel is still a well-known local landmark and one of the few structures in Texas that uses the iconic Bankhead name.

Strawn's little piece of Bankhead Highway is now known alternatively as Texas 16 or Front

Street — a rather nondescript road in a city with no red lights other than at railroad crossings. But a block of the roadway in the city center, directly outside the Bankhead Hotel, still features the original Bankhead Highway red bricks made at a now-closed factory in nearby Thurber.

"We're very proud of those bricks," said Danny Miller, who grew up in Strawn and is now city secretary. "Many people who lived here helped make those bricks, and we've still got them right in our downtown."

But more than just that Texas connection, Bankhead Highway was one of the first coast-to-coast roads in the United States, starting at the Zero Milestone on the White House South Lawn in Washington and ending near the Pacific Ocean in San Diego.

And, after years of being all but ignored by history — to the point where many motorists today probably know little or nothing about it — Bankhead Highway is now the subject of a cultural reawakening of sorts. And that renaissance includes several car shows and other events that are being held this weekend in Fort Worth and several West Texas communities.

"Bankhead Highway was the nation's first all-weather, cross-country highway," said Dan Smith of Fort Worth, a retired meteorologist who wrote the book *The Bankhead Highway in Texas*, published in 2013. "The Lincoln Highway was first, but you couldn't use it all year because it went up through the northern U.S. and through the mountains out west, and that made the roads impassable. Bankhead Highway went all across the

country through the South, and you could rely on it all year around."

The highway was named after Sen. John H. Bankhead of Alabama, a strong advocate of building a coast-to-coast highway in the pre-World War I years.

The road was commissioned a year before Texas even formed its highway department, an agency that became the Texas Department of Transportation. The department and the Texas Historical Commission have worked together in recent years to map Bankhead Highway and catalog several thousand adjacent attractions.

The road wasn't built for military purposes, although many members of Congress supported the project for its ability to move people and equipment from one coast to another. As the U.S. entered World War I and later World War II, the need for troop movement to respond to a potential enemy invasion became paramount.

But in the cities on Bankhead Highway, the real value was the ability to bring in tourists and other visitors, and to more easily connect with the rest of the country.

In Strawn, Bankhead Highway harks back to a time when the city was at least four times its current population of about 600 residents.

"The Bankhead came through in the early '20s at a time before there were interstates or anything like that," said Miller, the Strawn city secretary. "It was very important to the economy of Strawn. Many businesses thrived catering to the traffic that passed through. It was a big deal having a major highway coming through a little town like this."

Apple has created over 2,000 Austin jobs since 2012

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Apple has created more than 2,000 new jobs in Austin since 2012 and is on track to meet the area hiring goals it promised in exchange for millions of dollars in public incentives, according to documents filed with the city.

The technology giant is set to receive \$35 million in tax incentives over the next several years from the city of Austin, Travis County and the state of Texas for an expansion of its operations in central Texas, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Under the terms of the incentives package, which was signed in March 2012, Apple Inc. agreed to create more than 3,600 new full-time jobs in Austin in 10 years while retaining at least 3,100 existing full-time jobs year over

year.

According to the agreement, the average wage for those new jobs is to be \$54,000 a year in the first year of the expansion and will stretch to \$73,500 in the 10th year.

Apple said last year that it was well ahead of hiring projections. A more recent report — filed in March by Terry Ryan, Apple's senior tax manager — indicated that the company continues to outpace the requirements.

As of Dec. 31, the total number of full-time Apple jobs in Austin was 5,102, according to the company's report. That includes 2,089 new jobs created since 2012, according to the report — an average of more than 550 a year.

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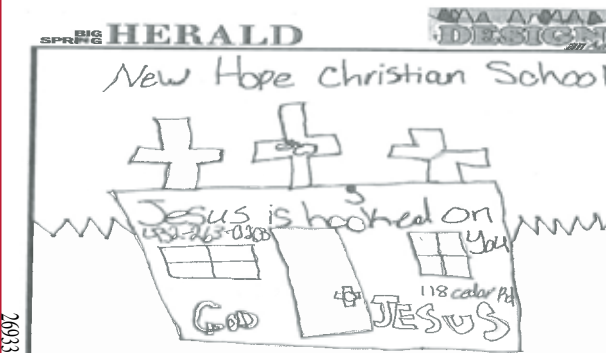
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Thunder beat Spurs, even series at 1-1

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Oklahoma City Thunder nearly gave the game away in a wild final sequence that referees acknowledge should have been dead before it started.

All that matters to the Thunder is that they're all even with the San Antonio Spurs.

Russell Westbrook had 29 points and 10 assists, and the Thunder held on to beat San Antonio 98-97 on Monday night, evening the series at one game apiece when the Spurs failed to score in the final seconds.

Kevin Durant added 28 points and the Thunder handed the Spurs just their second home loss of the season, rebounding from a 32-point beating in Game 1.

With San Antonio trailing 98-97 with 13.5 seconds remaining and Oklahoma City out of timeouts, Thunder guard Dion Waiters elbowed Manu Ginobili to get the space needed to inbound the ball.

"On the floor, we did not see a foul on the play," referee Ken Mauer told a pool reporter. "However, upon review we realize and we agree that we should have had an offensive foul on the play. It's a play that we have never seen before, ever, but we feel we should have had an offensive foul on Waiters."

Waiters claimed he was unaware of any contact.

"No, I'm in the game, man,

I don't really know what's really going on," Waiters said. "My whole mindset is get the ball inbounds and hopefully we get a foul once the ball the ball gets inbounds, but it was a crazy sequence the last 13 seconds. So we pulled it out, that's all I care about."

Waiters inbounded to Durant, who was immediately stripped by Danny Green. Patty Mills missed an open 3-pointer, LaMarcus

Aldridge lost the ball after grabbing the airball and Kawhi Leonard was unable to gather the ball before the buzzer sounded.

"I don't know what it is, to tell you the truth, what type of violation it is," Ginobili said of Waiters' elbow. "It's got to be something. But again, it's not that play that decided anything. We got the steal, we got the shot, we got an offensive rebound."

Aldridge had 41 points,

but the Spurs shot 43 percent as a team after shooting 61 percent in the series opener.

"It feels horrible," Aldridge said. "Feels like it was wasted. I've never been about trying to get points and not win, I always try to do things to win. If you win it's totally a different feeling, but losing like that hurts."

Dreams can come true: Leicester wins English soccer title

LONDON (AP) — Leicester City players crowded around a television inside the house of teammate Jamie Vardy, locked arm in arm, watching the action 100 miles away. And when the final whistle blew at Stamford Bridge, they raised their arms in triumph. One of the greatest sporting achievements in English history was complete.

In the second tier two years ago, in a relegation fight last season, a 5,000-1 long shot last summer, Leicester is now alongside Manchester United, Liverpool and the other clubs who can call themselves champion.

The Foxes clinched the most improbable title of the Premier League era when second-place Tottenham was held to a 2-2 draw at Chelsea on Monday night. With an insurmountable seven-point lead with two games remaining, Leicester is champion of England for the first time in its 132-year history.

"Championess! Championess! Ole! Ole! Ole!" the jubilant Leicester players sang as they jumped up and down with their arms on each other's shoulders inside Vardy's house.

"First three innings I was really good, last inning and a half wasn't very good," Keuchel said. "I have to rely on attacking the zone early, establishing the strike zone and making sure guys know I'm on the plate and they can't rely on the umpire to call balls."

The Cy Young winner hadn't lost at home since Aug. 10, 2014, against Texas.

"Well I've had plenty of opportunities to lose and offense has helped me out quite a few times," Keuchel said. "More times than not I've been

Mazara leads Rangers to win over Blue Jays

TORONTO (AP) — Expected to be an offensive force, the Toronto Blue Jays aren't getting enough out of their big bats.

Nomar Mazara hit a tiebreaking home run in the top of the eighth, then threw out the potential tying run at home plate in the bottom half of the inning, helping the Texas Rangers beat the slumping Blue Jays 2-1 on Monday night.

The Blue Jays left eight runners stranded and suf-

fered their fourth consecutive home loss, Toronto's longest slump at Rogers Centre since a four-game skid from April 23-26, 2014.

The Blue Jays are an AL-worst 2-7 in one-run games.

"In these close games we're just not executing good enough to win," manager John Gibbons said.

Toronto has lost eight of

Forget winners, losers; think NFL draft trends

Figuring out who won or lost in an NFL draft takes years, not hours. Finding trends is a whole lot easier.

Some were obvious, such as the love given Ohio State, and the disdain for 2015 bowl teams Tennessee, Duke and North Carolina.

The desire to find quarterbacks lasted from the first two picks through No. 223. The search for running backs was virtually an afterthought for three rounds, with only four going in the first 100.

A look at what NFL teams were thinking and doing in the 253-pick marathon.

BAGGING BUCKEYES: More than one observer has been asking how Ohio State didn't win the 2015 Big Ten title, let alone another national championship, after having 12 players selected.

The Chargers, Saints and Bills were most enamored of coach Urban Meyer's team with two selections each. The Giants, Jets, Cowboys, Lions, Texans and Seahawks each took one. Five Buckeyes went in the opening round.

Saints coach Sean Payton is friends with Meyer, which certainly didn't hurt as New Orleans considered and then took safety Vonn Bell and receiver Michael Thomas in the second round.

"He and I have been friends for a long time," Payton said. "I think it matters some."

Meyer, who worked portions of the draft for NFL Network, was beaming every time one of his players was chosen. And the first of those guys, defensive end Joey Bosa, paid tribute to the coach for paving the way to the NFL.

"The day you walk in on campus at Ohio State he expects you to have that goal to one day play at the next level and play in the NFL," said Bosa, who went to San Diego with the third overall pick. "That's what he strives to help you do. Him and everybody on that staff, he brings in only the best who want to see you succeed and who really care about you and care about your success."

WINNING BREEDS WINNING: Rex Ryan could have been speaking for 31 other coaches when he noted how significant success on the college level is in the draft process.

"I think we have a lot of winners in our locker room, there's no question," the Bills coach said. "And when you bring these guys in, it only adds to that. They're used to winning, we expect to win, we want to win desperately, and these guys are coming in and knowing what it takes, albeit in the college level. But it still says something when you've got the last two national championship programs and this year's (Florida State, Ohio State, Alabama). It tells you that, yeah, it's important. And when you're a member and playing with the best team in the country, that says something."

Buffalo's first four picks were from Clemson, Alabama and Ohio State. The Bills had six Florida State players on the roster entering the 2015 season.

The philosophy of concentrating on winning college programs stems from recruitment. The schools grabbing the most four- and five-star high schoolers are the ones who produce the most and highest draft picks. We're talking the Ohio States, Alabamas, Clemsons and Florida States of the world.

QB SEARCH: Consider that the top two overall selections were Jared Goff of California and Carson Wentz of North Dakota State. Quarterbacks.

Now consider that last year, Jameis Winston and Marcus Mariota went 1-2. Quarterbacks.

The huge difference is that Winston and Mariota widely were viewed as can't-miss prospects. Goff and Wentz probably wouldn't have gone in the top half of the first round in 2015, even though both are solid players with big upsides.

This Date In History

Today is Tuesday, May 3, the 124th day of 2016. There are 242 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 3, 1791, the Commonwealth of Poland-Lithuania adopted a constitution.

On this date:

In 1515, Pope Leo X promulgated the bull "Inter sollicitudines" allowing the Catholic Church to review and censor books.

In 1765, the first school of medicine in the American colonies, the Medical School of the College of Philadelphia (now the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania), was founded.

In 1802, Washington, D.C. was incorporated as a city.

In 1916, Irish nationalists Padraic Pearse, Thomas Clarke and Thomas MacDonagh were executed by a British firing squad; they were among 16 people put to death for their roles in the Easter Rising.

In 1933, Nellie T. Ross became the first female director of the U.S. Mint.

In 1945, during World War II, Allied forces recaptured Rangoon (Yangon) from the

Japanese.

In 1952, the Kentucky Derby was televised nationally for the first time on CBS; the winner was Hill Gail.

In 1960, the Harvey Schmidt-Tom Jones musical "The Fantasticks" began a nearly 42-year run at New York's Sullivan Street Playhouse.

In 1975, America's oldest operational aircraft carrier, the USS Nimitz, was commissioned.

In 1979, Conservative Party leader Margaret Thatcher was chosen to become Britain's first female prime minister as the Tories ousted the incumbent Labor government in parliamentary elections.

In 1986, in NASA's first post-Challenger launch, an unmanned Delta rocket lost power in its main engine shortly after liftoff, forcing safety officers to destroy it by remote control.

In 1999, some 70 tornadoes roared across Oklahoma and Kansas, killing 46 people and injuring hundreds.

Ten years ago: A federal jury in Alexandria, Virginia, rejected the death penalty for al-Qaida conspirator Zacarias Moussaoui (zak-uh-REE-uhs moo-SOW'-ee), deciding he should spend life in prison for his role in 9/11; as he was led from the courtroom, Moussaoui taunted, "America, you lost." Armavia Airlines Flight 967,

an Armenian Airbus A-320, crashed off Russia's Black Sea coast, killing all 113 people on board. Earl Woods, father of golfer Tiger Woods, died in Cypress, California, at age 74.

Five years ago: The White House said that Osama bin Laden was unarmed when Navy SEALs burst into his room at his Pakistan compound and shot him to death, a change in the official account that raised questions about whether the U.S. ever planned to capture the terrorist leader alive. Chicago's Derrick Rose became at age 22 the NBA's youngest MVP. Francisco Liriano pitched the major leagues' first no-hitter of the season, throwing his first career complete game in the Minnesota Twins' 1-0 victory over the Chicago White Sox. Actor-director Jackie Cooper died in Santa Monica, California, at age 88.

"Nobody believed we could do it, but here we are — Premier League champions and deservedly so," Leicester captain Wes Morgan said. "I've never known a spirit like the one between these boys, we're like brothers."

As recently as 2008-09, Leicester was in third-tier League 1, the equivalent of a Double-A baseball team filled with prospects. Just two years ago, Morgan and many of his teammates were playing in the far-from-glamorous second-tier League Championship. They were last in the Premier League in April 2015 before winning six of their last eight matches to avoid relegation, and at the start of this season betting houses favored them to drop back down.

But on Monday, fans who never dreamed their modest club in an East Midlands city with a population of 330,000 would conquer wealthier rivals

descended on Leicester's King Power Stadium to party into the night.

"People saw it last season when everyone expected us to be relegated, but we fought back to prove people wrong," Morgan said. "This season's been a continuation of that. We've built on the momentum, but I don't think anyone believed it would come to this."

Leicester, which will collect the trophy on Saturday when it hosts Everton at home, had not finished higher than sec-

ond in the top tier since 1929.

English soccer has not had a first-time champion of the top flight since Nottingham Forest in 1978. And for the last 20 years the Premier League trophy has never left London or Manchester, with Arsenal, Chelsea, Manchester United and Manchester City winning all the titles.

Unlike Blackburn's 1995 champions, Leicester has achieved its success without lavish spending.

Chelsea's draw also made Leicester manager Claudio Ranieri a league title winner for the first time in his career, 12 years after the 64-year-old Italian was fired by the Blues.

"It's the greatest achievement in the history of English football and it was led by an Italian," Matteo Renzi, the Italian Prime Minister, tweeted.

Ranieri's task when he replaced the fired Nigel Pearson in July was just to keep Leicester in the Premier League. Instead he has masterminded a sporting feat that will resonate for decades.

"I never expected this when I arrived. I'm a pragmatic man, I just wanted to win match after match and help my players to improve week after week," said Ranieri, who made a brief trip home to Italy on Monday to see his 96-year-old mother. "The players have been fantastic. Their focus, their determination, their spirit has made this possible. Every game they fight for each other and I love to see this in my players."

Finding a franchise quarterback has become paramount for NFL clubs, so much so that the Rams and Eagles mortgaged much of their draft stock to get to the top of this grab bag.

"One player can change your team, and for us, we know how important that is, that position, and so investing in that position was a no-brainer," said Eagles vice president of football operations Howie Roseman.

There is more to the QB story, though.

In all, 15 passers were drafted; such college star quarterbacks as Keenan Reynolds and Braxton Miller will change positions in the pros. Not all were selected with the idea they will be long-term starters.

Just as Dallas learned last season when Tony Romo was healthy for all of two games and the Cowboys fell apart, developing a dependable (or better) second-stringer is a must. It's fair to say that outside of Goff, Wentz and Paxton Lynch in the first round, none of the QBs chosen this year will be expected to compete, let alone win, a starting spot.

Not in 2016 and maybe not at all.

But if the likes of Connor Cook (Oakland), Cody Kessler (Cleveland) and Christian Hackenberg (Jets) develop into reliable backups, it's a positive step for those teams.

Despite a totally inconsistent career at Penn State, Hackenberg was the only quarterback to go in Round 2. That stems from his being a five-star recruit and to his measurables, not to his on-field performances in Happy Valley.

12 overall, but right-hander R.A. Dickey doesn't expect the offense to stay dormant for long.

"Right now we're sputtering a little bit but we've got the pedigree in here," Dickey said. "It's just a matter of time before we start clicking."

Named the AL's top rookie in the month of April earlier Monday after batting .333 with two homers and seven RBIs in 17 games, Mazara broke a 1-1 tie with a shot to center off Gavin Floyd (0-2).

"I put a pretty good swing on a changeup," Mazara said.

"I was looking for something up in the zone and that's what he gave me."

Brett Nicholas also homered as the Rangers, winners of five of six, took the opener of a four-game series between ALDS opponents from 2015.

Blue Jays outfielder Jose Bautista, whose dramatic homerun and exaggerated bat flip marked Toronto's Game 5 victory over Texas in last year's postseason, was held in check this time. He went 0 for 4 with two strikeouts.

Bautista faced Sam Dyson, who surrendered that pivotal homer last October, with runners at first and second and nobody out in the eighth. This time, Dyson won the battle by getting Bautista to line out.

Edwin Encarnacion followed with a walk, loading the bases for Troy Tulowitzki, who flied out to right. Saunders tagged from third but was thrown out by Mazara, with the call upheld following a Toronto challenge.

Game 3 is Friday at Oklahoma City.

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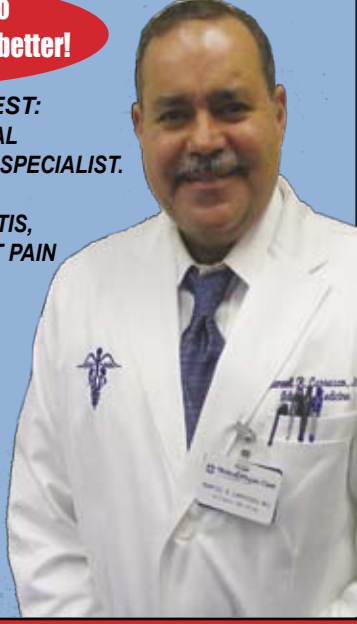
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
