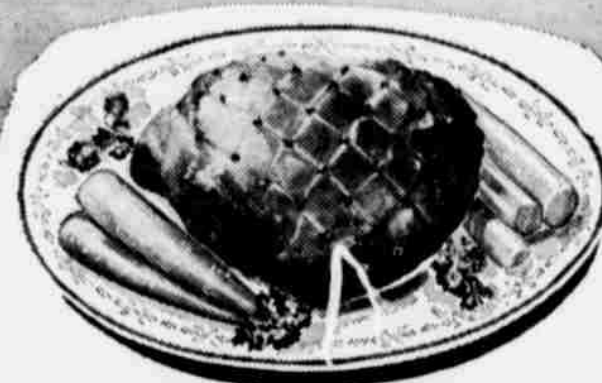

It ever a book literally hogged newspaper headlines for weeks, even months on end, it is "Death of a President" by William H. Manchester.

Now that the four-part serialization of the book has broken all circulation records for Look Magazine, just about everybody involved is having his or her say about the accuracy of the book in portraying the assassination of President John Kennedy in Dallas that afternoon in 1963.

But W. C. Stivers, now administrator of Garza Memorial Hospital here, is different.

"I haven't read the book," he said this week when we asked him about it while picking up the weekly hospital notes for the paper. "I haven't even read the serialization in Look Magazine. But what I have read in newspaper accounts about the Look article, some of the things which were reported in the book to have occurred in Parkland Memorial Hospital that day in Dallas were not as they were."

This is all Stivers wants to say in publication about any book discrepancies. "Enough has been written already," the hospital administrator said Tuesday. "I don't want to be quoted about them further because I wasn't in the emergency room of Parkland that afternoon in an official capacity."

How Stivers happened to be there a story which the administrator himself cannot fully explain.

Stivers had been employed in the business department of Parkland Memorial Hospital for eight years before leaving the hospital earlier in 1963 to accept an office position with the Powell Oil Corporation in Dallas.

He recalls that the day President Kennedy arrived in Dallas he went to lunch early so he would be back at his desk and not get caught in the jam which would develop when the President's motorcade passed through the area.

Stivers said he was returning to work along the freeway with his radio on when he heard that President Kennedy had been shot.

The next thing I knew I was in the hospital," Stivers said. "I did not recall driving there, or why I went to the hospital. It must just have been instinctive."

He said the car containing the president traveled the same way route to Parkland as he did, but he does not recall whether or not the President's car sped him on route. At the time he heard the shooting report he was in the Kennedy car. He said he did not know whether he arrived at Parkland a few minutes before or a few minutes after the president's car.

Stivers said when he arrived at the hospital's emergency section, he was on duty and asked if he could be of any assistance. He immediately assigned him the job of keeping out of the emergency section all unauthorized people who were swarming around the entrance trying to get in.

St. Kennedy sat in the hall of the section attended by Security men, Stivers recalled. He would have been on public duty if all the people trying to enter and their way were allowed.

School trustees meet

Five administrators extended new pacts

Post school trustees last night voted to extend contracts for the 1967-68 school year to five members of the administrative staff, but took no action to offer a new contract to Elementary School Principal Don Kinard, who Supt. Bill Shiver said "is undecided about wanting to return to Post."

The trustees' action followed the recommendations of the superintendent. It is customary for the board to act at its January meeting on the superintendent's contract, at the February meeting on the contracts of other administrators, and at the March meeting on teachers' contracts.

New 1967-68 contracts, with salary shown, and months of work included in the contract, were offered to:

Mrs. Bettye Scott, elementary supervisor, \$7,300 salary, an increase of \$300, 10 months.
High School Principal C. R. Hutchins, \$9,785.20, 11 months.
Senior High Principal Jim Polard Jr., \$8,625.65, a boost of \$400, 10 months.
Athletic Director Glynn Gregg, \$7,617, an increase of \$500, 9 1/2 months.

Administrators, like teachers, receive \$117 salary increment additions each year for added experience. This is not figured as a salary increase.

Trustees named Jack Alexander, a teacher, as assistant elementary principal at a \$6,518 salary, a \$1,000 increase, for 9 1/2 months. Alexander will succeed A. T. Nixon as assistant elementary principal. Nixon is scheduled to retire at the age of 65 at the end of the present school year.

Alexander will carry a full teaching load plus his new administrative duties.

Supt. Shiver told trustees that Alexander has four years teaching experience in the elementary school and is now participating in a certification program on both supervision and administration. He said this is another attempt to groom local teachers for local administrative positions.

In other actions, school trustees: Voted to purchase a new audiometer, to test the hearing of local students, for \$360.
Approved January bills for Title I, athletics, general fund, lunchroom and operating.
Decided to ask the Antelope (See School Board, Page 8)

Contest develops here in campaign for city mayor

Lucas opposed in re-election bid by John Hopkins

First spring election contest developed here Monday when John Hopkins, Tower Theatre manager and former city councilman, filed at city hall to make the mayor's race.

Mayor Harold Lucas already has filed for reelection to a third two-year term.

It will be the third mayor's contest for Lucas and Hopkins. Hopkins opposed Lucas in both the 1963 and 1965 elections, with Lucas winning both times. In 1965, C. R. Wilson was the third candidate for mayor.

Only other filings for the city election came yesterday afternoon when three city commissioners all filed to make the April race for additional two-year office terms.

They were Bob Collier, who will be seeking his third two-year term; Lewis Herron, who will be seeking his second; and D. C. (Billy) Hill, who was appointed to the council last November to fill the

vacancy left by the moving of Leo Acker to Houston and will be seeking his first elective term.

As yet, all three remain unopposed.

Filing deadline for the municipal election is only 10 days away — Saturday, March 4.

There has been even less interest shown so far in the April school board races.

With three positions on the board

to be named by voters only two candidates to date have entered the race.

Earl Chapman, secretary of the Post Independent School district trustees who was appointed to his present position on the board in December, 1964, following the resignation of E. R. (Buster) Moreland, has filed for Place No. 1 on the ballot.

Giles Dalby, prominent rancher,

has filed for Place 2 on the ballot, a position now held by Ted Aten.

Place 3 on the school board ballot, now held by Russell Wilks Jr., board president, has yet to have a candidate.

Filing deadline for the school board races is next Wednesday, March 1.

The school election is slated for Saturday, April 1, and the city election for Tuesday, April 4.

Enlists customers' aid

SWPS launches unique industry search program

A "Prosperity Through You" program is being launched by the Southwestern Public Service Company to enlist the aid of the electric company's customers and employees to attract new industries to Post, according to Glen Barley, manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The customers and employees will receive a "Prosperity Through You" prospect card with their March electric service statement. If they have any information at all on an industry that would be interested in locating in Post, they are requested to fill in the blanks on the card and bring it to the chamber of commerce office or the Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Industrial development has many times resulted from the actions of one individual," Barley said. "Just the slightest rumor has led, on many occasions, to the establishment of an industry which was economically important to a

community. This type of approach will obviously lead to some blind alleys, but it is equally obvious that, with the cooperation of all of us, it can also produce some valuable industrial prospects."

Plans for following up on the leads provided by the "Prosperity Through You" program call for an evaluation of the tip by local business leaders and then some type of contact with the prospect suggested by the local resident.

Southwestern Public Service Company announced establishment of a new industrial development department last fall. Since that time, the department has been accumulating economic information about communities in its service area in order that it will be able to provide industrial prospects with factual information. "Prosperity Through You" is the first program in what will be an expanded industrial development effort.

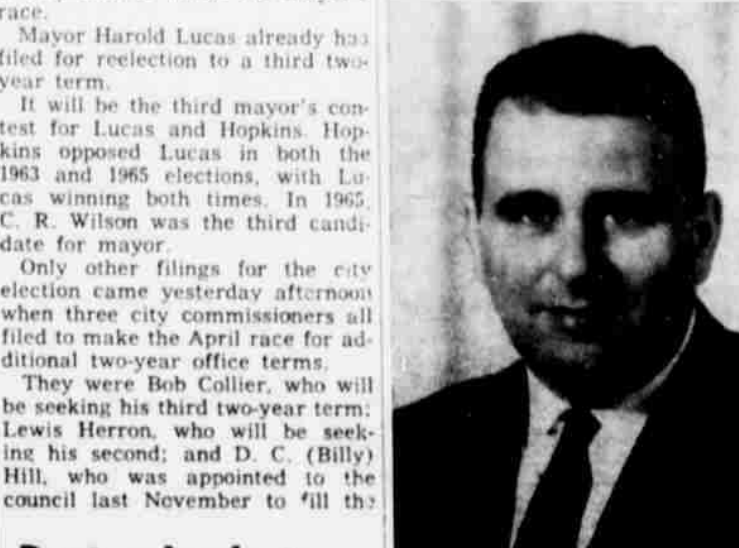

Mahon opposed to reduction in support rates

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Rep. George Mahon reports that officials of the Department of Agriculture may soon announce an arbitrary reduction in the loan rate on short staple cotton. Officials complain that there is a heavy accumulation of short staple cotton in the loan and that unless better staple and quality is grown the accumulation of hard-to-sell government stocks will continue to rise.

Mahon has cautioned Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman that an arbitrary reduction in support rates would be unfair and unacceptable. He asserts that he believes that the differentials reflected by the spot markets provide a sufficient spread between cotton qualities to encourage the production of better cotton.

"I have been encouraged," Mahon said, "by reports which have come to me indicating that West Texas farmers are aware of the threat to their economic welfare and are planning to make a major effort to improve staple length and quality."

Mahon said indications are that unless something dramatic is done within the next three years to improve the quality and uniformity of Texas cotton, the industry would sharply deteriorate and the economy of many producing areas would suffer great loss.

Hallettsville, Tex., founded in 1836, has been the county seat of Lavaca County since 1852.

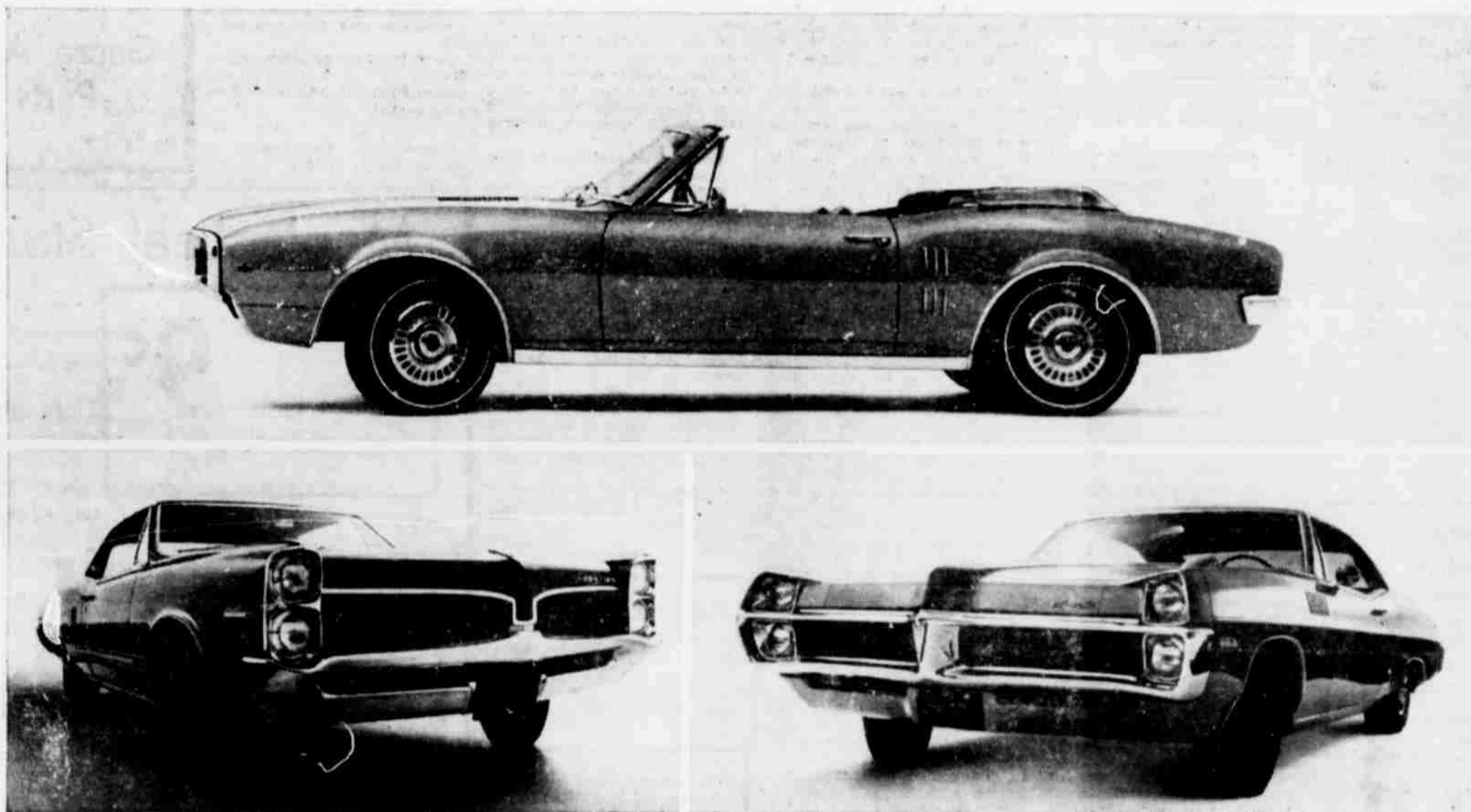

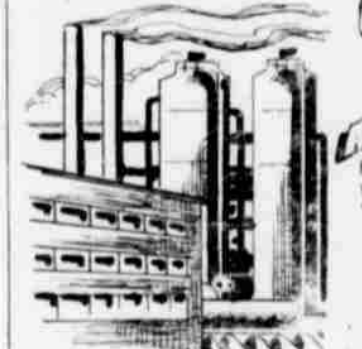

Q. My friend gets maximum disability payments from the VA because of war injuries. He works for the state at a good salary and sells insurance at night. A fellow employee has challenged his entitlement to disability payments. Is he justified in accepting them?

A. He most certainly is. Your friend apparently is receiving compensation for a service-connected disability. Outside income has no bearing whatever on compensation. The fellow employee must have confused compensation and pension—the latter being for total disability but not service connected. Pension entitlement is based on outside income.

Q. My husband receives a disability check for wounds received in wartime. We have had several children since he was disabled, yet our compensation does not increase. Should it?

A. Only if your husband is more than 50 per cent disabled and submitted proof of additional children to the VA.

Q. I am receiving pension under the new pension law with the additional benefit for aid and attendance. My wife takes care of me while I am at home. Next week I am scheduled to enter the Veterans Administration Hospital for extensive surgery. Will my pension benefit be suspended?

A. No. You will continue to receive your basic pension while hospitalized. After one full calendar month that portion of your pension benefit (\$100) paid because of a need for aid and attendance will be replaced by the "household" benefit of \$35 monthly. Upon discharge from the hospital, the full benefit will be restored.

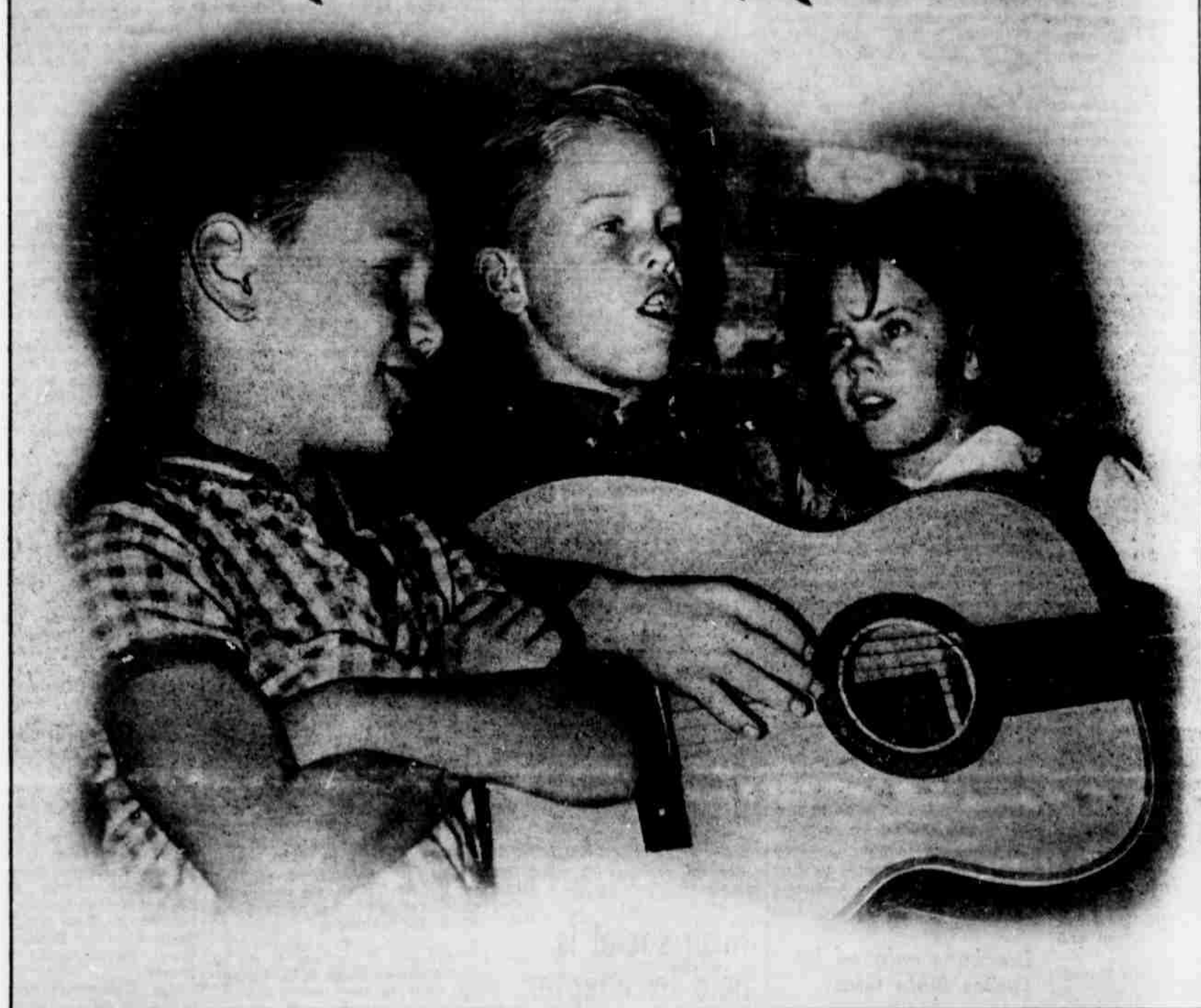

Booster club to plan another barbecue this spring at the park for all students who have participated in athletics in the local schools this year.

This action came after the superintendent told the board the booster club had proposed a formal banquet for all varsity athletes with the booster club paying two-thirds of the cost and the school one-third.

Shiver told trustees he questioned if the singling out only varsity athletes for such an event would not be considered by the Interscholastic League as an award and thus could put the school in violation of interscholastic rules limiting the amount of any such awards to \$15 for each participant plus a \$2 award for each additional school activity.

Trustees said they thought the athletic barbecue sponsored by the boosters last year was highly successful.

The board also approved the wage policies for the schools' auxiliary employees—office secretaries, janitors, and lunchroom workers—who came under federal minimum wage regulations Feb. 1.

The new policies transformed previously monthly salaries into hourly salary rates for these 19 employees and provided for bi-monthly salary checks instead of monthly. Supt. Shiver told the board that Dr. Bill Barron, professor of educational administration at the University of Texas, will make a three-day visit to the Post schools March 7-9, to give a general evaluation of the Post school system and look for any weaknesses.

Barron was a member of the evaluation team of experts which made a study of the Post schools four years ago. Shiver said Dr. Barron will report to school trustees at a luncheon meeting Thursday, March 9.

'Lopes fall to Dimmitt in bi-district battle, 80-67

It's only a little over 40 miles from Lubbock to Post, thank goodness. Otherwise, it would have been a long trip home Tuesday night for several hundred Post fans who saw the Antelopes lose to the Dimmitt Bobcats, 80 to 67, in a bi-district battle in the Coronado High School gymnasium.

Coach Wilbert Bigott's Antelopes,

playing in their first bi-district game since 1960, held their own throughout the first half against a pressing Dimmitt defense, but fell steadily behind in the third quarter when the Bobcats changed their defense to a sagging zone that effectively plugged the middle.

Meanwhile, the Bobcats were working under the Antelope basket

as if they owned it, with their big post man, John Howell, cramming in bucket after bucket on his way to a 38-point game total.

Post held the upper hand for the first half of the opening quarter, with the Bobcats obviously "tight" for the crucial contest, and nearly four minutes had elapsed before Dimmitt lit up their side of the scoreboard. They loosened up in time to tie the score at 14-14 at the end of the first quarter, however.

The Bobcats went into the lead for the first time about midway of the second quarter and held on until the first half buzzer, when Donny Windham hit from the side to give the Antelopes a 36-35 halftime lead.

Dimmitt broke the game wide open in the third quarter, scoring 22 points to Post's 12, and leading by nine points, 57-48, going into the final eight minutes of play.

The Bobcats kept up the pressure in the final period, scoring 23 points to Post's 19, with eight of the Antelopes' points coming on outside shots by Duke Altman.

Post's Ronnie Pierce, winding up a fine high school cage career, scored 21 points, but that was 17 less than Dimmitt's Howell poured in for the night's scoring honors. Norman Tanner, the only Antelope starter who will be back next year, scored 17 points, 11 of them in the first quarter.

Texas Highway map for 1967 available

AUSTIN — Six new public lakes, 319 miles of new highways and 18 new safety rest areas make their appearance for the first time on the Texas Highway Department's colorful 1967 Official State Highway Map.

Before the year is out, about one million copies of the map will be distributed throughout the world, inviting Texan and out-of-state visitors alike to "Discover Texas, America's Fun-tier."

All the new lakes are accessible to the public via the 67-thousand-mile Texas highway system.

Largest of the new reservoirs is Lake Meredith on the Canadian River in the Panhandle. Others are Lake Arrowhead, Fin Creek Reservoir, White River Lake, Bardwell and Somerville Reservoirs.

The new map shows 115 additional miles of Interstate highways, added since last year. More than 1,700 miles of these superb new highways are in service now.

The 1967 Official State Highway Map also delineates approximately 704 miles of new farm to market roads. Many of these provide the visitor with access to recreational areas throughout the state, as well as serving agriculture and industry.

Through its Travel and Information Division, the Texas Highway Department visits nearly three-quarters of a million visitors each year in eight Tourist Information Bureaus located at key highway gateways and in the rotunda of the State Capitol in Austin.

Additionally, the Department answers more than 261 thousand inquiries annually, furnishing information and descriptive literature about Texas.

In performing these services, the Department distributes more than 3.5 million pieces of travel-oriented literature about Texas annually. Of this volume, more than two million pieces are produced as a part of the Highway Department's travel promotion program.

Texas motorists may order the 1967 Official State Highway Map when registering motor vehicles during February and March. County tax officers have been provided with supplies of special order cards.

Copies of the map also may be ordered directly, sending name, address and ZIP code to: Texas Highway Department, Travel and Information Division, Post Office Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78703.

Eighteen additional safety rest areas are shown on the map for the first time. More than 1,100 safety rest areas, scenic turnouts and roadside parks now enhance the safety and convenience of Texas highways.

A message from Governor John Connally welcomes the visitor and extends a personal invitation to explore Texas.

Further emphasizing the water resources of Texas, a scenic photograph of the Sam Rayburn Reservoir in East Texas graces the cover of the map.

Padre Island centers a pictorial display, along with 12 other vivid color photographs of scenes and sights from every area of the state.

For the convenience of the traveler, the face of the map contains a handy mileage table, inset maps showing principal streets in larger cities, and listings of State parks, Texas Highway Department
