40% Of Voters Cast Ballots

Matthews Wins Election With Write-In Campaign

Mitchell County voters expressed their opinion at the polls Tuesday as they elected write-in candidate Caddo Matthews by a 2-1 margin over the Democratic nominee Olson Sweet for the office of county school superintendent.

The issue at stake was whether or not the county school superintendent's office would be closed. Sweet filed for the office and was unopposed in the Democratic primary. When he filed for the office, he announced his intention to close the office. However, before the office could have been closed, county residents would have had to vote on the matter or a bill would have to be passed through the legislature. Matthews campaigned to keep the office open. Apparently local voters do not want the office closed.

Some 1,743 Mitchell County voters turned out for the election, 40 per cent of the county's 4,288 registered voters.

In the only other contested race that affected the county, other than statewide race, was the election of a senator for the 30th District which consists of 29 counties which includes Mitchell County, Wichita Falls, Attorney Ray Farabee, a Democrat, won the election and carried Mitchell County 1,273 to 299 votes for Mary Kirchhoff of Plainview.

In statewide races, Democrats carried Mitchell County, although not as heavily as in past years. Election judges reported that there was a lot of ticket splitting. Due to the ticket splitting and the write-in candidate, one election judge said there was a lot of confusion and in one precinct about 20 ballots had to be thrown out because it couldn't be determined what the intention of the voters was.

Matthews' victory stunned long time political observers

for a number of reasons. Matthews received 1,143 votes and carried every precinct while Sweet received only 526 votes.

When Matthews announced his write-in candidacy in August, many politicians didn't give him much of a chance as it is very rare that a write-in candidate wins in any race. Usually, just getting the votes of those who vote a straight Democratic ticket is enough for the Democratic nominee to win.

The race initially was not expected to get as much in-

terest as it eventually created. Matthews announced his candidacy in the Record in August and since that time he has been working, shaking hands and calling as many county residents as possible. A strong group

of backers helped in the campaign, calling on friends and forming a telephone committee that contacted county residents just prior to the election.

ASCS Report On Payments

Don Stewart, executive director of Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, emphasizes that county farmers should report production of cotton or grain sorghum to the ASCS office immediately upon harvest and request appraisal by the FIC appraiser of harvested acres before crop residues are destroyed if the farmer is to receive a low yield payment for the 1974 crop.

Low yield payments of 12.7 cents per pound for cotton, 44 cents per bushel for feed grains and 68 cents per bushel for wheat will be computed in the ASCS office according to a percentage formula based on past production and planting history for each farm and on an individual basis, Stewart explained.

Three different types of payments will be made to farmers by the ASCS office this year, both Stewart and Amarie Hall, ASCS crops assistant, explained. They are: prevented planting payment for cotton or feed grain, failed payment on failed cotton or feed grain acres and low yield payments.

Prevented planting payments on 67 farms, totaling \$164,000, have already been completed.

"We have not paid any failed acres claims because regulations have been changing," Stewart said, "and we don't want to have to come back and get part of the payment back."

"We are hoping to have all prevented and failed acres paid within a month," he said.

A total of 213 farms are eli-

gible for grain sorghum prevented planting payments, 191 farms are eligible for failed cotton acres payment and 60 farms are eligible for failed grain sorghum payment. They have not yet been approved for completing the payments, but as Stewart pointed out, he hopes to complete payments in these areas in the next month.

Doe Tags Available, Says Aston

Game Warden Ronnie Aston reminds landowners or their agents to get doe tags as soon as possible, either by phoning him at 728-5703 or by going to his home at 962 E. 14th Street.

Deer and turkey season opens in Mitchell County November 16 and continues through January 1.

Limits are two deer and two turkey of either sex, but Aston warns that turkey must be tagged this year just as deer are tagged.

Quail season opens November 16 and continues through February 16. Bag limit is 12 per day, 36 in possession.

Aston says the deer are in good shape and there are a lot of them in the county. There is a good group of quail; even though hatches were not big the mild winter helped make them numerous. He also said that turkeys should be good hunting in the county.

Col-Tex Credit Union Wins Tops In Nation

For the third consecutive year, the Col-Tex Federal Credit Union in Colorado City, has earned the rare Thrift Honor Award for its success in stimulating savings.

Col-Tex Federal Credit Union manager George Hudson emphasized that the award is only given to the top ten per cent of federally chartered credit unions in the nation.

The Federal credit union attained a monthly rate of growth of 3.6 per cent in share

accounts \$20,000 and under. This growth rate was above the average for Federal credit unions of similar size, according to Paul A. Trylko, regional director of the National Credit Union Administration.

On September 30 the credit union had 1,103 members who had saved a total of \$737,473. The credit union primarily serves residents of Mitchell County. It was chartered in November, 1939.

H. P. Ball is president of the credit union and Mrs. Joyce Tolle is treasurer.

The National Credit Union Administration conducts its Thrift Honor Award program to provide an incentive for officials of Federal credit unions to encourage members with small accounts to save regularly as part of their family financial management plans. There are approximately 13,000 Federally chartered credit unions.

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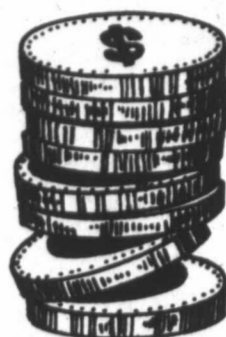

Junior Varsity Wins, 35-6

The Junior Varsity football team won their Thursday night game with Winters by a large margin 35-6. Winters took the ball first and scored, missing the extra point. That was the end of Winters scoring for the evening as the Wolves dominated the game. Halftime saw the Wolves ahead by 13-6 after touchdowns by Benny Arispe and Joe Moreno, Steve Belvin kicking the point after. Second half scoring was made by Pete Parlam, Benny Arispe and Joe Moreno, Steve Belvin kicking two extra points and Drex Grisham making a two-point conversion. Coach Michael Easterwood said the Junior Varsity team was fired up for the win, wanting to make up for their first loss to Winters, 34-16. Easterwood said that Benny Arispe's carries for over 200 yards rushing was aided by line blocking of fullback Joe Moreno and entire offensive line, including center Gerald Hill, offensive end Freddie Womack split end Vernon Ausbie, catches by Parlam and direction of quarterback Rey Torrez.
