Mississippi Sergeant Is Slashed, Then Beaten

BLOOD HOUNDS TAKE UP TRAIL

Fear Expressed That Girl Too Was Murdered

PARCHMAN, Miss., Dec. 28. (P)—J. D. Duvall, 35, a carpenter sergeant at the state prison farm here, was found murdered today, his 18-year-old daughter, Ruth, was missing and was believed to have met with foul play, and a negro trusty who had been working in the Duvall home was sought by posse with blood hounds.

Duvall was found by his wife about 9:30 a. m. when she discovered he had not retired. His throat was slashed and he was suffering from wounds on the head inflicted by a hammer.

Mrs. Duvall then called her daughter and receiving no answer went to her room. She was not there, although there were evidences she had retired.

L. T. Fox, superintendent of the penitentiary, expressed the opinion that the trusty, Charles Sheppard, had killed Duvall and his daughter and had carried her body away.

PASTOR FACING HERESY CHARGE

Cameron Preacher Is an Admirer of Dr. Fostick

CAMERON, Dec. 28. (P)—Rev. H. O. Kenney, pastor of the First Presbyterian church here, has been summoned to appear before the Central Texas presbytery in Temple January 8 to answer allegations on which heresy charges may be predicated.

Reverend Kenney received the summons yesterday from the secretary of the presbytery.

"The charges, I understand, are based on excerpts from my sermons and address which possibly may have lost their meanings by separation from the context of the sermons," the 39-year-old minister said. "However, I have trained myself to do my own thinking and do not intend to take my opinions from any man or body of men."

The local pastor is a great admirer of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, noted for his modernistic ideas.

"Those who have made the charges will be called on to appear at the trial, which I have no doubt will take place and there I intend to challenge their competency on both moral and intellectual grounds," the pastor declared.

He expressed the opinion that all of the trouble was due to "a little clique" which resented being "unable to run the church."

J. L. Noel Purchases Old Christian Church From Congregation

J. L. Noel has purchased the Christian church building and annex and will move them from the location at the corner of Kingsmill avenue and Ballard street.

When the buildings have been moved the lots will be sold either separately or as a unit. There are five lots 25x140 feet.

The Christian church members moved into their new educational building December 16. When the lots where the old church is have been sold a loan will be arranged and work will start on the new Christian church building, which will adjoin the educational building.

SALE OF TEXAS UNIVERSITY OIL LANDS DELAYED

Opinion Is Given by Trueheart This Morning

SOLONS TO ACT ON QUESTION

Million and One-Half Acres Offered Next Month

AUSTIN, Dec. 28. (P)—Land Commissioner J. T. Robison, reached by telephone on a Webb county hunting trip, refused today to accept the advice of Assistant Attorney General C. W. Trueheart that mineral lease sales on university land can be postponed.

This development revived possibility that the governor may call a special session at once to repeal the leasing law.

AUSTIN, Dec. 28. (P)—Need for a special session of the legislature to forestall leasing of Texas university oil lands in West Texas was removed today when the state land office received an opinion from the attorney-general's department advising that the lease sales on 103,000 acres scheduled for January 2, can be postponed to a later date in January.

The regular biennial session of the legislature convenes January 8.

Governor Moody, who has been urged by the Texas university board of regents to call a special session to withdraw the lands from the market in view of unfavorable price conditions, had not come to the capitol and announced his decision, but the opinion is regarded as settling the question.

Land Commissioner J. T. Robison was out of town today, but J. H. Walker, chief clerk of the land office, said he probably would take action in accordance with the opinion unless the commissioner returns today. The advice was from Assistant Attorney General C. W. Trueheart, who was in San Antonio, and mailed it.

The land cannot be withdrawn from the market, but sale can be postponed, Trueheart advised. A total of 1,500,000 acres is advertised for mineral sales at various times in January.

Baptist Service to Honor College Students Sunday

College students who are home for the holidays will be honored with a special service at the First Baptist church Sunday morning, when high school students, college students and college graduates will join in giving a program of music and inspirational talks. All routine of the service will be in charge of the high school students.

A choir of high school pupils and the high school orchestra will furnish music, with a piano solo by Louise Barton and a vocal duet, "Holy Night," as the special numbers.

An interesting feature of the student day program will be the recognition of college students of today, college graduates of the last five years, college students or graduates of any year, and teachers and administrators of the local schools.

Supt. R. C. Campbell, R. B. Fisher, principal of the high school, and Anna Meek, principal of Baker school, will represent the faculty of the public school in the program. Other speakers will include: Olin E. Hinkle, Clifford Solomon, Leonard Sibley, Miss Sarah Barrett, Miss Ruth Henry and Miss Helen Anderson.

HOUSTON, Dec. 28. (P)—A Houston narcotic ring was thought to have been broken up with the arrest yesterday of 14 men in a lonely camp on the banks of Buffalo Bayou near here.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28. (P)—Maximiliano Viguera, insurgent leader captured yesterday and sent to Mexico City for trial, was executed by a firing squad today after a court-martial.

AUSTIN, Dec. 28. (P)—Oil royalty collections from University of Texas lands in West Texas for December totaled \$127,559, according to tabulations of the office of Land Commissioner J. T. Robison. The grand total is now \$9,897,163.

MARSHALL, Dec. 28. (P)—Explosion of a drum of compressed air, used in operating a paint spray gun, cost the life of Glenn Wade of Dallas here yesterday. The drum exploded as Wade was bending over it. The impact crushed his head and he died an hour later.

AUSTIN, Dec. 28. (P)—Appointment of Claude D. Terr, now secretary of the state highway commission to the board of control to succeed Dr. H. H. Harrington, was announced by Governor Moody today.

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 28. (P)—Development of military aviation in the United States was the subject of a study made today by General Italo Balbo, Italian secretary of aviation, following his arrival here.

King George Has Hard Fight for Life After Relapse

LONDON, Dec. 28. (P)—King George has regained some of the ground which he lost yesterday, but his condition was fraught with anxiety, and in well-informed circles it was thought that his majesty still has a hard fight for life ahead of him.

The king's physicians reported this morning that while the condition of the affected lung region had definitely improved, his general condition has not shown the same progress. In other words, weakness and a deficiency of recuperative power persist to a serious degree.

A lengthy consultation was held this morning by five of the noted specialists who have been attending his majesty. It was devoted partially to a general review of the progress that he has been making.

More strikingly, however, it was revealed that new measures had been considered and adopted for remedying the situation caused by the failure of the patient to respond in a better degree to treatment designed to build up his strength and to pull him through to convalescence. There was no hint at this time as to what these measures would be.

MEXICAN INSURGENTS KILLED

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28. (P)—Dispatches from Guadalajara today said that military authorities there had received advices that 27 insurgents had been killed in four engagements with federal forces at various points in the state of Jalisco.

Ed Lynch, Pioneer Resident of Gray County, Is Dead

With the passing of Ed Lynch, 64 years old, in Pampa hospital at noon yesterday, Pampa and Gray county lost a long-time resident. Mr. Lynch died after a three-week illness.

He was a well known figure on the streets of Pampa, always accompanied by his pet collie dog. He had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. John Henry for the last seven years.

Mr. Lynch came to the Panhandle of Texas from Nesbit, Miss., more than 27 years ago, settling near Amarillo. In 1915 he moved to Gray county, when he became connected with Billie Joe Davison on a ranch on the north fork of the Red river. He was later with Dave McAfee.

Mr. Lynch was a devoted Christian of the Baptist faith. He was a staunch democrat.

The body will be sent to Hernando, Miss., where a cousin, Mrs. Martha Lusher, lives.

ALBATROSS IS THOUGHT DOWN UPON DESERT

Railroad Worker Asserts Fliers In Need of Aid

TOOK OFF AT 6:50 O'CLOCK

Singled-Motor Vehicle Had 646 Gallons of Gasoline

IMPERIAL, Calif., Dec. 28. (P)—A railroad worker who hurried here this morning from a point on the desert north of the Salton sea, said that a large airplane had landed and was in need of aid.

He said he believed the plane was the single-motored Albatross in which Charles Rocheville and John Guglement had taken off two hours ago from El Centro, Calif., in an attempt to establish a new world's endurance flight record.

EL CENTRO, Calif., Dec. 28. (P)—Carrying a load of 646 gallons of gasoline, the single-motored monoplane, Albatross, soared over the Salton sea today in another effort to break the world's endurance flight record. At the controls on the take-off at 5:50 a. m. were Charles Rocheville and John Guglement.

Christmas Was Satisfactory Here

Veteran Uses Old Army Revolver to Rout Four Bandits

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (P)—There aren't any more bullets in Joseph M. Adler's old army pistol today, but there is one less bandit alive.

Adler came out of the World war with the revolver and a wooden leg. Last night, when four men held up his drug store, the war veteran, who was in his living quarters above the store, took the gun from a drawer and hobbled downstairs.

Through a peephole Adler saw his clerk being held off by revolvers of the four robbers. Pushing open the door and bracing himself with his wooden leg, Adler opened fire. His first shot went through the heart of one of the bandits, later identified by fingerprints as Harry Cassel, 34. Another man was wounded and had to be dragged from the store by his companions, who returned Adler's fire without effect.

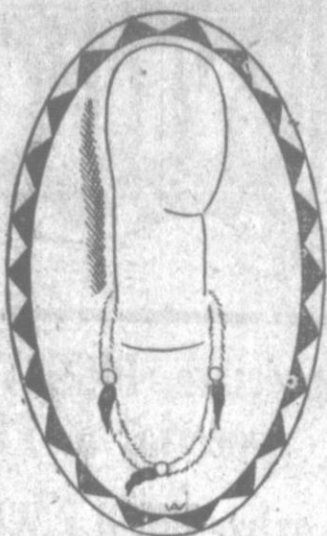

Helping the Homemaker

DAY'S MENUS
BREAKFAST
Stewed Apricots, Oatmeal and milk, Buttered Toast and coffee.

LUNCHEON
Celery and potato Soup, crackers, sweet pickles, Fruit cookies, Canned peaches, tea.

DINNER
Macaroni and cheese, baked squash, bread, butter, pear salad, date pudding and lemon sauce, coffee.

MISCELLANEOUS RECIPES

FRUIT SALAD FOR TWELVE
1 cup seeded white cherries, 1 cup diced peaches, 1 cup diced pears, 1 cup diced pineapple, 1 cup diced marshmallows, 1-2 cup red cherries, 1 cup salad dressing, 1-2 cup stiffly whipped cream.

Mix and chill the fruit. Mix the dressing and cream and add 1-2 of it to the chilled fruits, which have been thoroughly drained. Add the marshmallows and serve portions in crisp lettuce leaves. Top with the remaining dressing mixture and serve at once.

BAKED APPLES

(With Date and Nuts)
4 large apples, 2-3 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 2-3 cup chopped dates 1-4 cup chopped nuts, 1 1-2 cups water, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Wash and core the apples, fit into a small baking dish. Stuff with the dates and nuts. Mix the cinnamon and sugar and sprinkle over the tops of the apples. Dot with the butter and add the water and vanilla. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes. Baste frequently during the baking. The apples may be served warm or cold, with or without cream.

SPONGE CAKE DESSERT SERVING EIGHT

(A pretty dessert to be served with forks)
8 slices sponge cake, 1 quart pineapple sherbet, 1 cup red cherry preserves. Place the sponge cake on serving plates. Cover with the pineapple sherbet and add the cherry preserves. Serve at once.

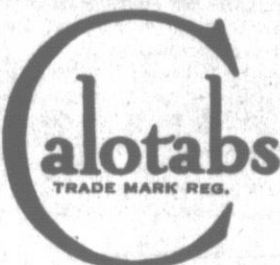

Greatest Sports Offering Planned by Chicago for 1933

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (P)—The most ambitious sports program of all time is being planned by Chicago sportsmen for the Chicago World's Fair Centennial celebration in 1933.

Under the plans, every football team of national importance will be brought to Chicago for games, giving Soldier field a headline gridiron attraction each Saturday of the football season.

Allen D. Albert, assistant director of the centennial said Yale, which has scheduled a game with Chicago in 1931, has virtually agreed to meet Chicago here in 1933 and that invitations were being extended for games that season between Harvard and Northwestern; Princeton against either Illinois or Michigan, and, if possible, a game between the Army and Navy.

Notre Dame, teams from the South and Big Ten, also are to be invited here during 1933 or 1932. Football coaches of all teams concerned have given their promises of support, Albert said.

The sports committee also is working on a program which would embody virtually every amateur and professional sport, including horse racing, golf championships, the world baseball series, track, a world's heavy-weight championship bout and international polo matches.

Practice for Ft. Worth Game Nearing Finish

FORT WORTH, Dec. 28. (P)—Training for the benefit football game between the Southwest conference and a team selected from outstanding Texas conference players wound up here today and the teams will take things easy until the kickoff tomorrow.

Shrivers from a good many cities over the state will come to Fort Worth for the game, the receipts of which will be turned over to the Masonic orphan's gymnasium fund.

Tommy Hughes, big Texas back, joined the Southwest camp yesterday and Ted Jeffries, Centenary back, reached the Texas camp, making the two rosters complete. Bo McMillen, former Center star and all-American back, has been selected to referee the game.

McMillen is now coaching at the Kansas State Agricultural college and with Coach Ernest Bear, formerly of Nebraska, is preparing a team of Big Six conference all-stars which will meet the Southwest stars at Dallas New Year's day.

Basketball Upsets Numerous — Almost Ranking With Grid

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (P)—Undeafed teams were few when the football season came to a close but they will be even scarcer in intercollegiate basketball if upsets continue to take as heavy a toll as they have in early season games.

The carnage is most appalling among the proud teams of the Eastern intercollegiate league. For the first time in memory, every one of its six members has bowed in defeat in December and the opening of the league season January 5 will find not a single one with an unspoiled record.

The university of Pennsylvania lost to three Western conference teams on a middle western trip. Princeton was beaten by Dickinson, Cornell by Rochester, Columbia by Army and New York university, Yale by Providence and Fordham, Dartmouth by St. Thomas and Penn by Indiana, Ohio State by Michigan.

Greatest Golfers Start Tournament

LONG BEACH, Cal., Dec. 28. (P)—Leaders of American golfdom, in great and colorful array, paired off here today for the first skirmish of the \$5,000 Long Beach open, one of a series of big money tournaments leading up to the \$10,000 Los Angeles event in January.

A field of more than 225 players, drawn from virtually every section of the country by the call of golf and fame, had 18 holes of qualifying play at tap for today.

School Stars to Taper Off Work

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 28. (P)—Fort Worth's high school football artists and Southern California's prep school all-stars were winding up their training today for tomorrow's inter-sectional clash at the Coliseum. Light drills were planned for both elevens.

Experts have seen a possible advantage for the Texans in the fact that the Fort Worth aggregation has played together as a unit through a hard season, while the Southern Californians, recruited from many prep school teams, have not yet acquired the "feel" of perfect team work.

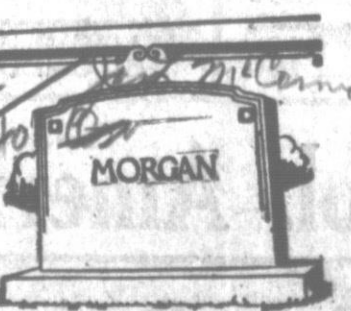

7. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith.

8. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give to me at that day; and not to me only, but also to all them that have loved his appearing.

16. At my first defense no one took my part, but all forsook me; may it not be laid to their account.

17. But the Lord stood by me, and strengthened me; that through me the message might be fully proclaimed, and that all the Gentiles might hear; and was delivered out of the mouth of the lion.

18. The Lord will deliver me from every evil work, and will save me unto his heavenly kingdom: to whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Time: Paul's second letter to Timothy was written not long before his martyrdom, which took place A. D. 67. Place: Prison in Rome.

Golden text: I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith.—2 Tim. 4:7.

Introduction
The Acts leaves Paul in his first Roman imprisonment, lasting two years. When his case came up for trial, he appears to have been released.

References in his letters to Timothy and Titus indicate that he went first to visit Macedonia and Asia. He seems to have visited Spain, and to have come with Titus to Crete. Then he came again to Asia and on to Corinth, probably wintering in Nicopolis. In prison, where he was arrested once more, on what charge we do not know, he sent to Rome, there to languish in prison. It was from there that he sent his second letter to his loved young assistant, Timothy, who was in charge of the church in Ephesus, and whom he urged to come to him in Rome. It is the last of Paul's writings which we possess, his final unsolicited not only for Timothy but for a church of Christ for which he was soon to give his life! It is one of the most precious documents in the Bible.

The Book of Second Timothy
The Second Epistle written by the apostle Paul to Timothy is the most personal of the Pastoral Epistles. Possibly no other of the New Testament letters makes so tender and so pathetic an appeal. Every paragraph is suffused with emotion, every sentence robes with the pulse beats of a human heart. Paul is now an aged prisoner in Rome, suffering, deserted, despised, condemned, and soon to be led forth to cruel death. In his previous captivity he had been allowed to dwell in his own hired house, to converse with his friends, and to direct his missionary work; now he is shut in a dark dungeon, he is disarmed with the cold, he is absolutely alone save for one faithful friend, Luke, beloved physician, to whom, probably, he is dictating this moving message of farewell.

"Tearing Ears"—V. 3
But, having itching ears, will heap themselves teachers after their own lusts. "Itching ears are ears that it to be tickled with verbal novelty, with rhetoric and eloquence, with and extravagance, with new and new teachings; the gospel has become tame and familiar to them; they bring together into their churches teachers who will cater to these untidy desires. Paul seems to be painting a picture of our own days in too many churches.

Crown of Righteousness, V. 8
Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness." The gift of the Greek athletic contests continued, the crown being the wreath of leaves which was the greatly rewarded for victory in the games. In the Olympic games it was a wreath of olive leaves; in the Pythian games, a wreath of parsley; and in the Isthmian games, a wreath of pine. Each crown was for superiority in the contest; thus there would be a crown of discus throwing, a crown of wrestling, a crown of boxing, a crown of righteousness. Paul is "laid up" in store for him, his coming to claim it. "Which crown, the righteous judge, shall give to me at that day." (The phrase is used in II Tim. 4:12, 18) Day of judgment, when the Lord shall judge every man according to his work (Matt. 16:27).

The Christian's Hope, V. 8
is the most important question for each of

us is how may we have such a hope, life a great sunset light shining into the western windows of our souls? There is but one answer—trust Christ. That is enough. Nothing else is. Is your life built on Jesus Christ? Are you trusting your salvation to him? Are you giving him your love and service? Does your life bear looking at today? Will it bear looking at in judgment? If you can humbly say, "To me to live is Christ," then it is well. Living by Him, we may humbly say, "To live is Christ," then it is well. Living by Him, we may fight and conquer, may win and obtain. Living by Him, we may be ready quietly to lie down when the time comes, and may have all the future filled with the blaze of a great hope that glows brighter as the darkness thickens.

Paul's Personal Messages, Vs. 9-16.

Paul now urges Timothy to use all diligence to come to him in Rome as soon as possible, because he is almost deserted. Demas (short for Demetrius) who had been with Paul in his first imprisonment (Col. 4:14), had forsaken the apostle in order to attend to some worldly business which he regarded as of more importance. Crescens had gone to Galatia (probably Gaul), an Titus to Dalmatia on the east coast of the Adriatic, each of them probably following Paul's visit not long before. Tychicus had been sent by Paul to Ephesus, Luke alone was with Paul. Luke the faithful physician. So Timothy was urged to come soon, and to bring with him John Mark, whom Paul found useful in many ways. It was cold in Paul's prison, and so he asked Timothy to bring with him a cloak which he had left at Troas with Carpus. It was lonely in the prison, and Paul begged Timothy to bring with him the papyrus books (probably also left with Carpus), and also the still more precious manuscripts written on parchment (vellum). Some think that Paul was arrested at Troas and for that reason had left his possessions there; also that "Alexander the coppersmith," here named as having done Paul much harm, was the man who had caused Paul's arrest, so that Timothy was warned to be on his guard against him when he goes through Troas on his way to Rome.

Paul's Triumphant Hope, V. 18.
"The Lord will deliver me from every evil work." From all the efforts of Satan to overthrow the apostle, destroy his life work, and make his testimony void. This seems to be a thought taken out of the Lord's Prayer: "Deliver us from evil." And will save me unto his heavenly kingdom." "Thy

kingdom come." This is the expression of the Apostle's belief that he will be delivered from the Roman courts and from death, but that He who saved him from the lesser danger would save him through all evil, even to the completion of his salvation in heaven.

Speaker's Commentary: "To whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen."

The presence of this doxology, closing a passage containing so many parallels with the Lord's Prayer, indicates that the doxology so closely associated with the Lord's Prayer was of very early usage, though it is not found in the earliest New Testament manuscripts and so is omitted from our revised translations.

The End of a Glorious Career
"But Paul cannot close with the doxology, for he must get in a greeting to Pricilla and Aquila who are with Timothy at Ephesus, and also the family of Onesiphorus who had been kind to Paul in Rome (II Tim. 1:16-18).

There is news also to give regarding two Christians known to Timothy, one of whom Paul knows to be in Corinth, and the other sick at Miletus; perhaps Timothy will look them up on his way to Rome (Hurry and get here before winter!). Then there are greetings from prominent members of the church in Rome, known to Timothy; perhaps they came to see Paul while he was ending his dictation of the letter. Then a double benediction upon Paul's dear young friend, and an "Amen" closes the writings of the great apostle to the Gentiles.

Hoover Gives No Hints of Cabinet to Be Selected

ABOARD U. S. UTAH, Dec. 28. (AP)—With the labors of his presidential campaign and his good will trip through Latin-America behind him, Herbert Hoover faces another strenuous period during the less than two months which remain before his inauguration.

The president-elect has before him the selection of his cabinet, the mapping of the policies of his administration and the preparation of his inaugural address. To write this address, one of the most important of his career which he will deliver at his inauguration March 4, Mr. Hoover will go from Washington to Florida in the middle of January to take up his residence on the quiet Penny estate on an island near Miami.

Mr. Hoover naturally has been giving his thoughts to his cabinet, but if he has any definite selections he has kept them entirely to himself. Even his closest advisers on the Latin-American tour assert he has given no indication of his appointments.

Noted Mexican Insurgent Caught

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28. (AP)—Maximiliano Vigueras, insurgent leader credited with two attempts to capture United States Ambassador Dwight W. Morrow, was under arrest today. He was captured in the town of Chalco and sent to Mexico City for trial in compliance with the new ruling against summary execution of insurgents.

Depredations laid to Vigueras have so affected tourist travel that the National Highway Commission had offered a reward of 5,000 pesos (\$2,500) for his capture.

Vigueras told newspapermen that upon learning that President Portes Gil had promised a fair trial for everyone including insurgents, which he styles himself, he decided to surrender.

Moody to Decide on Special Session

AUSTIN, Dec. 28. (AP)—Governor Dan Moody was expected to decide definitely today whether to call a special session of the legislature to block immediate leasing of 103,000 acres of valuable university oil lands.

The governor did not get in from a hunting trip until early this morning and his decision in the matter, brought to the fore by a request from representatives of the University Board of Regents for such action, was expected as soon as the governor could confer with his aides.

Expert on City Planning May Be Brought to Texas

DALLAS, Dec. 28. (AP)—One of the most outstanding experts on city planning will be available to assist Texas cities in their programs for the future if a suggestion made by the Texas Town and City Planning committee meets with favor. Sixty-five Texas municipalities have been asked to cooperate in bringing Gardner Rogers of Washington, assistant manager of the United States Chamber of Commerce to the state for a tour of advice and instruction. Each municipality contributing to the expenses of such an undertaking would be visited by the expert, who would study planning programs and give the city planners in each town his advice on their projects.

Paraguay Says Bolivian Troops Still Advancing

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—The placidity with which the Pan-American conference has been awaiting replies from Bolivia and Paraguay on a protocol for conciliation has been disturbed. Disquieting news has come with Paraguayan charges that Bolivian troops have again occupied Fort Yenguardia and have advanced 12 miles farther into the territory over which the dispute arose.

Paraguay in its communication to its legation here said that "a very grave situation has again been created, because Paraguay alone cannot avoid new fighting."

Former Research Worker Sought in Poison Robbery

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP)—A former employee of the Guggenheim Brothers research laboratory was sought by the police today as the rascal who killed the laboratory watchman by putting poison in his coffee.

Henry S. Gaw, 29, the watchman, was found dead, the victim of a powerful poison used in metallurgical processes in the laboratory.

Detectives assigned to what they said was one of the strangest robbery-killing in New York police records concentrated their efforts on a search for James Baker, who had formerly worked about the laboratory as a laborer.

HOOVER INVITED TO TEXAS

DALLAS, Dec. 28. (AP)—President-elect Herbert Hoover is expected to make a trip to Texas before his inauguration, despite the fact that he is returning direct to Washington from his South American good will tour. Leonard Withington, director of the republican state organization in Texas, said yesterday, Withington said he had information from National Committee man R. B. Creager that he would seek to have Hoover visit the state.

Heldman Charged in Wife's Death

CANTON, O., Dec. 28. (AP)—An affidavit charging Wilbur O. Heldman, Lorain Furnace salesman, with the murder of his wife Margaret, 21, on the night of Dec. 13, was filed by Coroner T. C. McQuate, today.

Heldman told authorities his wife shot herself to death the night of Dec. 13 with the same gun she had used just a week previously to end the life of Vernard E. Pearn 35, Canton coal dealer. Heldman had obtained a confession to the Pearn slaying from his wife at their home at orain earlier in the day and he was bringing her to Canton to turn her over to authorities, he said. Mrs. Heldman's death occurred in their automobile as they reached the outskirts of Canton.

WISH TO ABANDON

24 MILES OF ROAD

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—Permission to abandon 24 miles of railroad between Bonham and Bona, Texas, was sought in an application filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Denison, Bonham and New Orleans railroad today.

The railroad company told the commission the line was unprofitable and that it could not provide funds to meet maintenance costs.

Millionaires to Watch Devos and Hudkins Battle

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP)—Glittering shirt fronts at the ringside and fast flying gloves in the ring are expected to provide a proper setting for the windup of the 1928 ring campaign in Madison Square Garden tonight.

Ace Hudkins of Nebraska and Rene Devos of Belgium will battle while the '600 millionaires' and friends of "Tony" Biddle, wealthy backer of the Belgian boxer, watch. The fight is a ten-round affair and the winner is to get a shot at Mickey Walker's world's middle-weight championship, if Walker can be induced to risk the title.

Recurrence of Flu Feared by Doctor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28. (AP)—Another outbreak of influenza more severe than the disease now prevailing is regarded as a possibility later in the winter by Surgeon General Cummings. He said that he viewed the situation at present as serious, but declared that the present wave is mild in character and that there is an apparent absence of complications.

There is little likelihood in the opinion of the surgeon general that the disease will not spread over the Atlantic states as it has the West and parts of the South.

MEXICAN PRESIDENT TO REFUND INDEBTEDNESS

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28. (P)—A law has been passed authorizing President Portes Gil to negotiate with foreign governments for aggregate settlements covering all claims of their nationals against the Mexican government for revolutionary damages. The law is intended to fix Mexico's internal indebtedness.

The bill provides for the appointment of a committee to study and fix the total internal obligations after which the president will issue a law regulating the payments. All obligations will be funded into a single issue redeemable in not less than 45 years and bearing 5 per cent interest. The bonds will be secured by such revenues as the government may designate.

CHICAGO, Dec. 28. (P)—Alexander Katowski went home last night from the psychopathic hospital, released as harmless. At dinner time he produced a revolver, fired four times at his daughter, Mrs. Bertha Derman; missed his mark each time, then slashed his own throat with a razor. He is not expected to live.

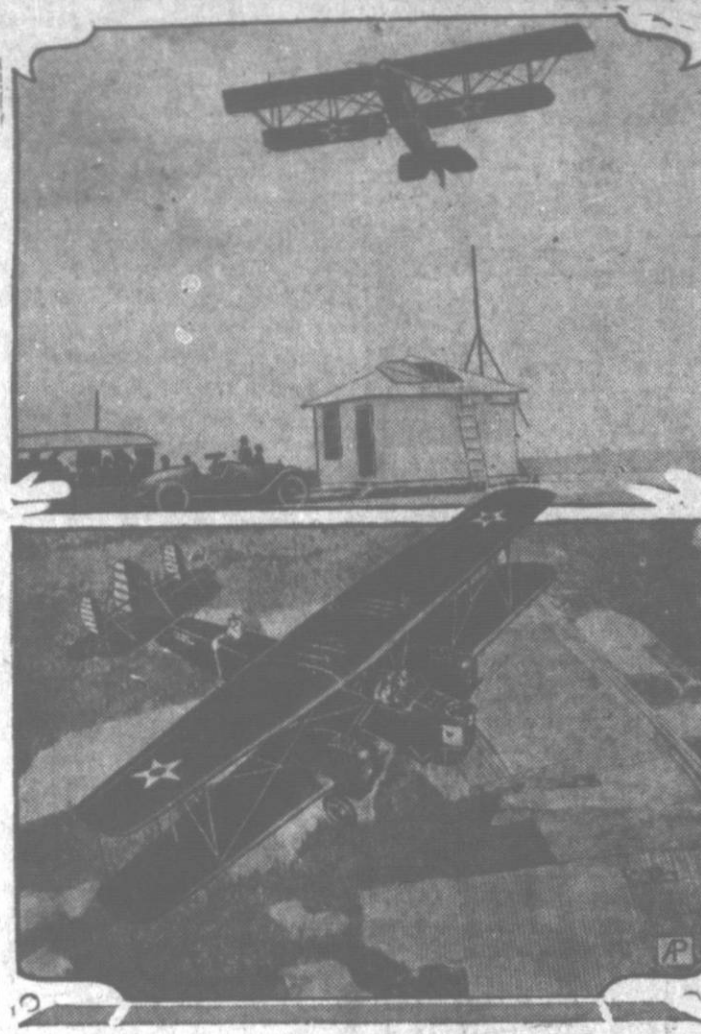

Fliers "Bomb" Camera To Acquire Skill In Aerial Destruction



A "camera" big enough for a man to sit inside records the effectiveness of imaginary bombs dropped by cadets of the United States Army air corps flying school at Kelly Field, Texas. The "camera" is a building (above), with an opening in the roof, over which bombing planes fly to "drop their bombs."

SAN ANTONIO, (P)—A "camera" plane's shadow when it is some distance away. The man designated to make a record of the cadet's hit sits at a target board inside. A metronome ticks off the time required for the plane's advance, and the marker traces its shadow across the board.

When the cadet arrives over his objective and is certain that he would hit a war-time target, where it is a building or a battleship, he tells the marker by radio telephone to "mark that spot." The marker then places an "X" on the mapping board, showing the effectiveness of the cadet's hit. If it is within the central ring of

The building is constructed with a large opening in the roof, through which the camera lens picks up the

the mapping board target, it is a perfect hit. If the "X" is in one of the other rings, it is not a perfect hit and the cadet's instructor will be able to point out the fault.

Huge LB-5 bombers, perfected for the army air corps by the Keystone Aircraft Corporation, are used by flying school cadets for these bombing practices. The bombers are capable of carrying thousands of pounds of demolition bombs if they are called upon to participate in a war-time mission.

Although the Army Air corps provides for some bombing maneuvers in which actual bombs are used, all of the "bombing" done by cadets at the flying school is carried on with imaginary explosives over the "camera obscure" building.

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 28. (P)—Latest reports from Afghanistan today said the rebels had succeeded in cutting off the electric lights and power for government factories in Kabul.

GASTONIA, N. C., Dec. 28. (P)—J. W. Vanderburg, a farmer his wife and three of their children were killed, and their bodies burned today in their home near here.

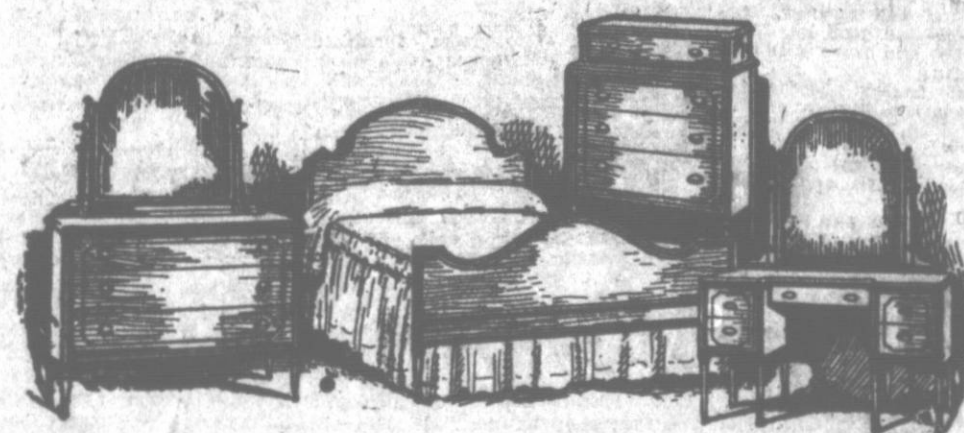
