ectors of the Garza Memorial Hospital at their public hearing Monday noon a budget calling for approximately \$375,000 in expenditures for the next 12 months beginning Oct. 1. The board would project a \$45,000 deficit based on increased charges at this past occupancy rate. Increases ranging from 10 to 40 percent will be sought from Blue Shield, Garza Memorial Hospital rates here on rooms, emergency room charges, etc., are well below the average even most smaller hospitals in this area. Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker told directors that if the board is successful in securing new doctors within the next few months, it should be possible to boost the hospital's occupancy rate and wipe out the projected deficit. Hunsaker spent Tuesday showing a young Irish physician, the latest foreign doctor to visit Post, around the community. The Irish doctor is visiting three Texas towns seeking a location for his practice. He will return to Ireland and make his decision. (See Hospital budget, Page 3)



Huge damage suit settled out of court

The \$1,200,000 damage suit against the Santa Fe railroad — largest suit ever filed in Garza County — was settled out of court about 5:30 p. m. Tuesday after a full day in court in which several witnesses testified. Attorneys for neither side would comment on the size of the settlement. Raymond Wiggins, the 40-year-old black, who is the ultimate plaintiff in the suit, sat in the back of the courtroom during part of the Tuesday session. He was so seriously injured in the fatal Main Street crossing crash in the early morning hours of May 8, 1974, it is reported his medical bills since have totaled over \$70,000. Larry Joe Carter, 19-year-old Crosbyton football player who was the driver of the pickup in which Wiggins was riding, was instantly killed in the crash. Witnesses who were on the stand Tuesday included Stoney Stalcup, who was in the Allsup session. (See Out of court, Page 3)

Grand jury indicts man for striking officer

Frank Celaya, Jr., has been indicted by a Garza County district court grand jury on a charge of intentionally and knowingly causing bodily injury to State Highway Patrolman Jerry Morris on April 10, 1976 who was in the lawful discharge of his duties by striking him about the head with a wooden club. The indictment was one of seven returned here Monday afternoon by a new grand jury. Celaya is alleged to have attacked Morris when the officer stopped him and a juvenile companion for speeding US-84 northwest of Post. The two were caught by other officers after wrecking their own car after they had fled the scene of the attack on Morris. Other indictments included: Euvel Carter, for burglary entering and committing theft Aug. 31, 1976 on property owned by Diann Guthrie; Amzelmo "Moses" Casares Jr., for possession of more than four ounces of marijuana Aug. 24. A photographic essay — containing over 100 photographs — which takes a last look at the authentic, old time skills practiced by the Mexican vaquero, is now on exhibit in the Post Public Library. Palmer brothers buying well servicing business

A new Post corporation — Palmer Well Service, Inc., — effective Friday, Oct. 1 — will purchase all the well servicing equipment and the office and shop property of Rocker A Well Service. The new firm will be operated by Bob Palmer and M. L. Palmer, brothers. The equipment purchased includes nine well servicing units, three hot oil trucks, and 17 pickups. The purchase price was not disclosed. What's more some 40 employees of Rocker A will be terminated with Rocker A at the end of today and will go on the payroll tomorrow of Palmer Well Service. Earl Chapman, who has operated the Rocker A firm here for the last 18 years of the firm's 20 years existence, told The Dispatch this week that Rocker A will continue only in oil production, and not as an oil servicing firm. Only two employees of Rocker A, J. C. Steele and Mrs. Sammy Pollard, will remain with Rocker A. Top ropers, artists due

Everything's set for the sixth annual OS Ranch Steer Roping and Art Exhibit Saturday and Sunday, except the weather, with all "weekend" workers from Jim Prather on down hoping for Indian summer to return. Dalby denies mandamus writ against city judge

County Judge Giles W. Dalby Wednesday denied a writ of mandamus against City Judge Louise Greene in an unusual suit which had been brought on behalf of four local men who had pleaded guilty in July to gambling charges but then decided they wanted their cases tried. The writ suit was brought by Sue Ray, local attorney, in an effort to compel the city judge to accept an appeal bond so the gambling case could be tried in county court. It was tried before Judge Dalby Aug. 7 with seven witnesses appearing, including the four bringing the action — Alton Steel, George Mindieta Sr., Johnny Quintana and Charles Bell. Ray contended the four plead guilty under duress out of a lack of knowledge of the law. The city's position was that there is no appeal from a guilty plea. That first presidential 'debate'

We have a lot of doubts about the current presidential "debates" — the second of which is due to blanket the TV channels next week.

First, we doubt if 90 million Americans sat down to listen to the first one last Thursday night. If they did, a lot of them probably went to sleep in their chairs, lulled into dreamland by all those statistics. More probably, a lot of off buttons were pushed before the sound fad-up at the end extended the 90 minute show another 27 minutes.

Second, we doubt if anywhere near that number will be tuned in for the second debate between President Ford and Jimmy Carter on foreign policy.

Third, we doubt if the debates will turn out to be a deciding factor in the current presidential campaign.

Fourth, we doubt if the first debate at least changed very many people's minds about who they were going to vote for in the November election.

But we did have some positive reactions to the first debate.

To us, President Ford came across strongly and concisely for his conservative position but Carter simply did not show the strong command of the situation most Americans want in their president.

To us, those who listened all the way, or even part of the way were the winners of that particular "debate" because they had the opportunity to hear the two candidates sum up their economic viewpoints. And it was quite a contrast.

President Ford was not surprising in his position. He stood against the new programs and heavy new government spending and promised to balance the budget next year.

Carter on the other hand again emphasized

the strangeness of his economic position. He is for expensive new programs, including big government job programs, but insists he will balance the budget first even if he has to put those programs off.

Now you can't put off a new government "make work" program for the unemployed, like the old WPA, until after you balance the budget and you can't balance the budget if you initiate such government spending as an economic crutch.

But Ford failed to make this obvious point against his opponent. In fact, both men spent too much of rebuttal time taking "cheap shots" at the other which couldn't be answered under the rules instead of making logical points.

But the voters' choice between the two on economic issues were clear. Carter was for new programs, though he did not define them very well, but Ford wasn't. He preferred to cut taxes, try to balance the budget and let the private sector provide the jobs.

Next week's debate will spotlight the two's views on foreign policy. It will give the America public a chance to see the different approaches of the two men.

The third debate will be a general one.

The best thing about the first debate was the worthiness of the questions by the news panel. Also we liked the format a lot better than we thought we would.

Throughout the entire presidential campaign, the debates probably offer the best chance for thinking voters to compare the thinking of the two men and their stands on the issues. Certainly, they offer voters a fairer shot at candidate positions than do the big network "campaign news shows" in which a little network bias can have a terrifying effect.

Whose side are you on?

The hardest task Supt. Bill Shiver has in developing the Post schools' educational program is to keep parents both interested and knowledgeable about what's going on at school.

Some months ago an open house program in the schools as an evening effort was a "bust."

Bill is going to try again Monday noon, Oct. 11 in the school lunchroom when he will have Dean Robert H. Anderson of Texas Tech, one of the nation's top educators, Dr. Ben M. Harris of the University of Texas, project director for the Post schools, and Dr. Kathy Dueck, teacher education director of the University of Calgary,

a Post school consultant, on hand for a sack lunch "get acquainted hour" with parents in which all questions about Post's educational direction will be answered in layman's language.

Bill hopes he gets a crowd of interested parents.

We hope he does too, but too many parents refuse to embark from that bygone era of the "three R's" and try to come abreast of modern education, even though their lack of understanding at home becomes a block instead of an aid to their children's educational progress.

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Butler have returned from Germany, where they visited their son-in-law and daughter, Staff Sgt. and Mrs. Graydon Howell, Jr. who are stationed in Karlsruhe, Germany with the U. S. Armed Forces.

While in Germany the Butlers and Howells toured the Bavarian region of Germany and Austria, visiting the castles Heideburg, Herrenchiemsee, Linderhof, Neuschwanstein and Hohenzollern; the Monastery at Oberammergau, and the great cathedral of Ulm. Also the unique regions of the Black Forest and Garmish with their houses painted in religious and folk-tale scenes. schools. Small children are kept firmly in hand by an older person when out.

The overwhelming traffic travels at an awesome rate of speed, and blinking lights on the autobahn means get over or get run over. If there is a fuel shortage in Germany they seem to be oblivious to it. The traffic included everything from autos, (all new) mopeds and bicycles, (ridden by all ages of both sexes,) street cars and omnibuses. There are also plenty of pedestrian folk determinedly striding along either to some place or just taking a walk over the meadows or to many of the beautiful palace parks.

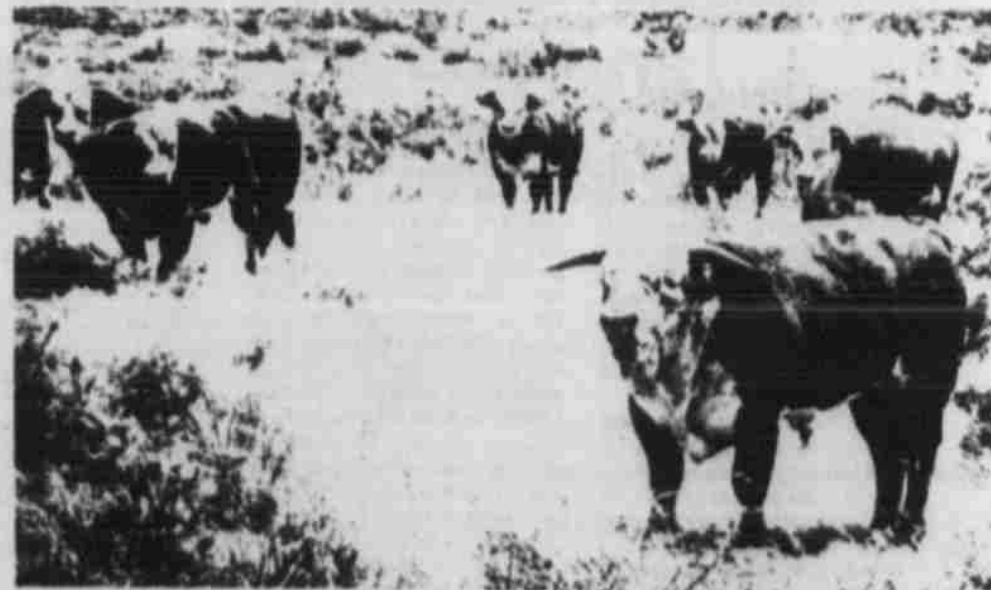

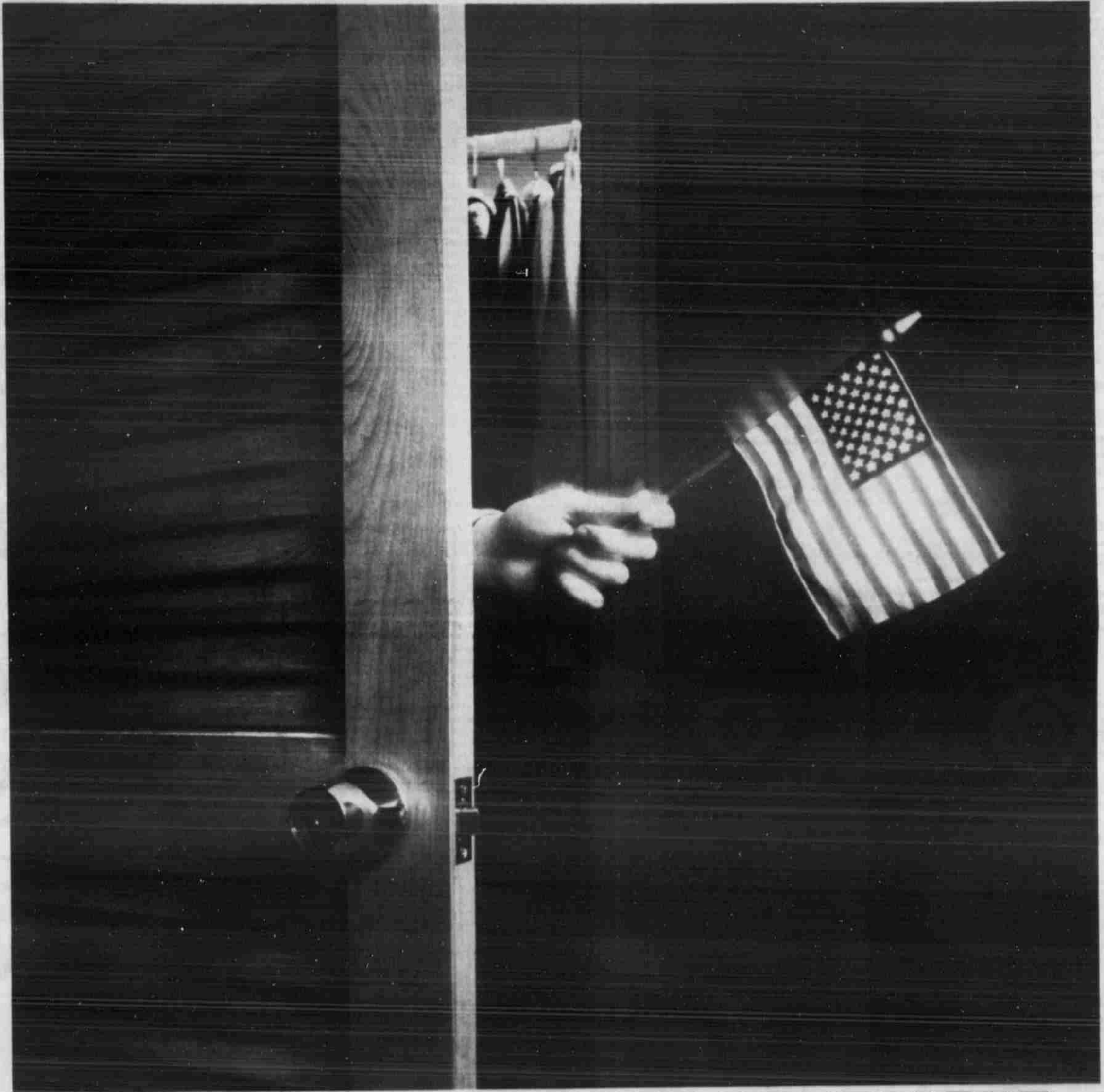

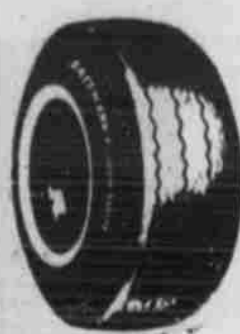

Focus on Home Economics

T-SHIRTS MAKE TOP FASHION NEWS

The T-shirt formerly known as children's play clothes — now emerges as the fashion basic for all family members.

Styles vary from traditional casual or sporty to dressy looks in soft, shiny, clinging fabrics. And some even 'grown' into dresses.

Necklines may be round, square, boat, bateau or jeweled. Sleeves are short, capped, semi-capped or long and loose.

Color and interest are added with stripes, ruffles, embroidery, sequins and rhinestones wild picture patterns, and top stitching which looks like misplaced seam finishes.

Designer logos add a high fashion look, or wearers can create a personal touch with iron-on logos, prints, or phrases.

Today's T-shirts still have some 'old fashioned' features. They are usually machine

washable and dryable and often made of cotton or cotton blends to be cool, comfortable, soft, and absorbent.

When buying T-shirts, check for quality fabric and workmanship. Shirts will be more durable when the fabric is closely knit and the shoulder seams are reinforced, and ribbing (if applied) is stitched securely.

Try T-shirts on to assure proper fit. Be sure neck openings provide adequate stretch so that stitches do not pop when putting the shirt on.

Consumers also check for shrinkage information, particularly if the fabric is cotton or cotton blends, and wash according to care label instruction for correct water temperature, wash cycle and bleach and drying information. If the label recommends laying the shirt flat to dry, be sure to do so, patting the shirt into shape. Machine drying may cause shrinkage in this case.

Using hot water, too high drying temperatures and inappropriate bleaching techniques can cause shrinkage and color loss.

If machine dried, remove T-shirt promptly to prevent wrinkling and possible shrinkage from overdrying.

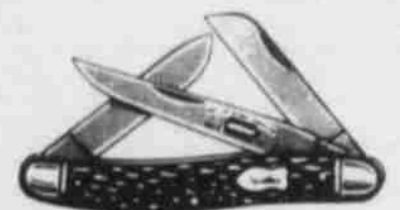

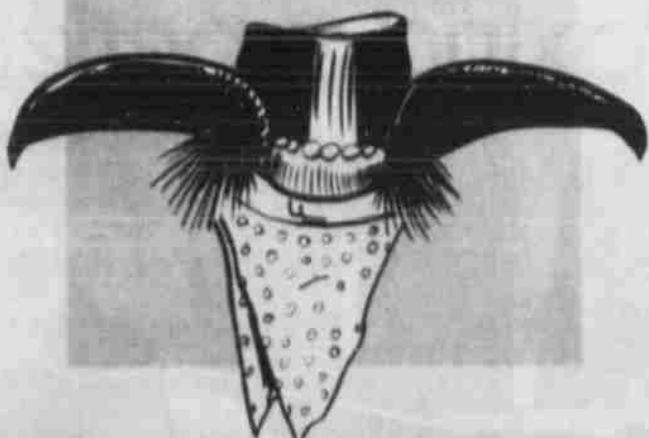

Jimmy Dorland rallies Lopes with two 'big plays'

Post scores wild 34-20 win over Colorado City

Jimmy Dorland came up with two of his "big plays" Friday night in Antelope Stadium to rally the Post Antelopes to a 34 to 20 victory over the Colorado City Wolves after the visitors had rallied in the third period to tie the score at 13 all.

The biggest of the "biggies" came on the Colorado City kickoff after the Wolves had pounced on a Lope fumble deep in Post territory and scored to knot the game with 4:14 left in the third.

Dorland gathered in that high booming kick by 273-pound Steve Belvin on his five yard line and came up the middle. He broke through the wall of Wolf tacklers and raced the Colorado City safety for touchdown land.

Ninety-three yards down the field, the safety pinned him against the sideline and tackled him on the Colorado City two.

That changed the whole momentum of the game which in the second half had swung to the Wolves.

Fullback Randall Wyatt bucked in for the touchdown and Buddy Britton converted to put the Lopes back in front 20-13 — all in 19 seconds of clock time after the Wolves had tied it up.

Then with seven minutes left in the game, Post was on the Wolves' 32 yard stripe with a fourth and 10.

Quarterback Brad Shepherd faked to a back into the line and then found Dorland running free for 32 yards and the fourth Post touchdown — the one, as it turned out, which was the real victory margin.

Those weren't Dorland's only contributions to the victory, just two of the "big play" variety.

He scored the first touchdown on an 18 yard sweep around left end behind some great blocks and he set up Post's second score by running 17 yards in two plays from the Colorado City 25 where Post had recovered a Wolf fumble only moments later.

According to The Dispatch chart, he ran for 92 yards from scrimmage in 14 plays, was stopped for no gain on another, lost 13 yards on two carries, fumbled twice, recovering one of his bobbles though in the arms of a tackler.

Late in the game while the Lopes were grimly holding on

to a 27 to 20 lead he tackled a Colorado City pass receiver so hard on fourth down that the ball went flying 10 yards away incomplete and that Wolf threat was stopped.

But Dorland wasn't the only player on the field by any means. The Lopes, moving well out of the power I formation, got fine gains and standout plays from a lot of players.

For Colorado City, Quarterback Ray Torrez had a fantastic night of running and passing.

He passed for 192 yards against the Lopes and one 61-yard touchdown play and ran well on the keeper, especially in the second half, getting the final Colorado City touchdown.

The game was an exciting one with a lot of "breaks" and the victory margin lay in the fact that the Lopes capitalized on their opportunities more often than did the Wolves.

Post turned the ball over five times on three lost fumbles and two pass interceptions, while the Wolves were handing over the ball to the Lopes three times on fumbles and once on an interception.

This is how the action went: Colorado City won the toss and confidently chose to kick off, believing they could bottle up the Lopes in their end of the field as they had done both Sweetwater and Cisco.

But the Lopes drove it from their own 14 to the Colorado City 34 before Halfback Randy Baker bobbled the ball for the first of a half dozen "gifts of the evening."

Colorado City ran the ball down to the Post 22 where on fourth and one they fumbled the ball and although recovering lost the opportunity for a first down and the ball went over.

A short time later Post fumbled the ball away on its 25, but the Lope defenders dug in and Colorado City lost a yard in three plays and Belvin missed a 43-yard field goal try.

The Lopes couldn't move as the second quarter began but Buddy Britton set up the first Post touchdown when he boomed a punt 64 yards high over the Colorado City twin safeties to the Wolves' seven-yard line.

The visitors tried a surprise quick kick on third down but the low ball traveled only 11 yards to the Colorado City 18 where the Lopes had their first scoring opportunity, thanks to their kicking game.

Dorland swished around left end behind some terrific blocks for the 18 yards into TD-land on the first scrimmage play with 8:14 left in the half. Britton converted.

Now it was Colorado City's bobble time. Britton pounced on a Wolf fumble on the Colorado City 25. Dorland got 11 yards on a pitchout wide right and then rambled for six to the eight.

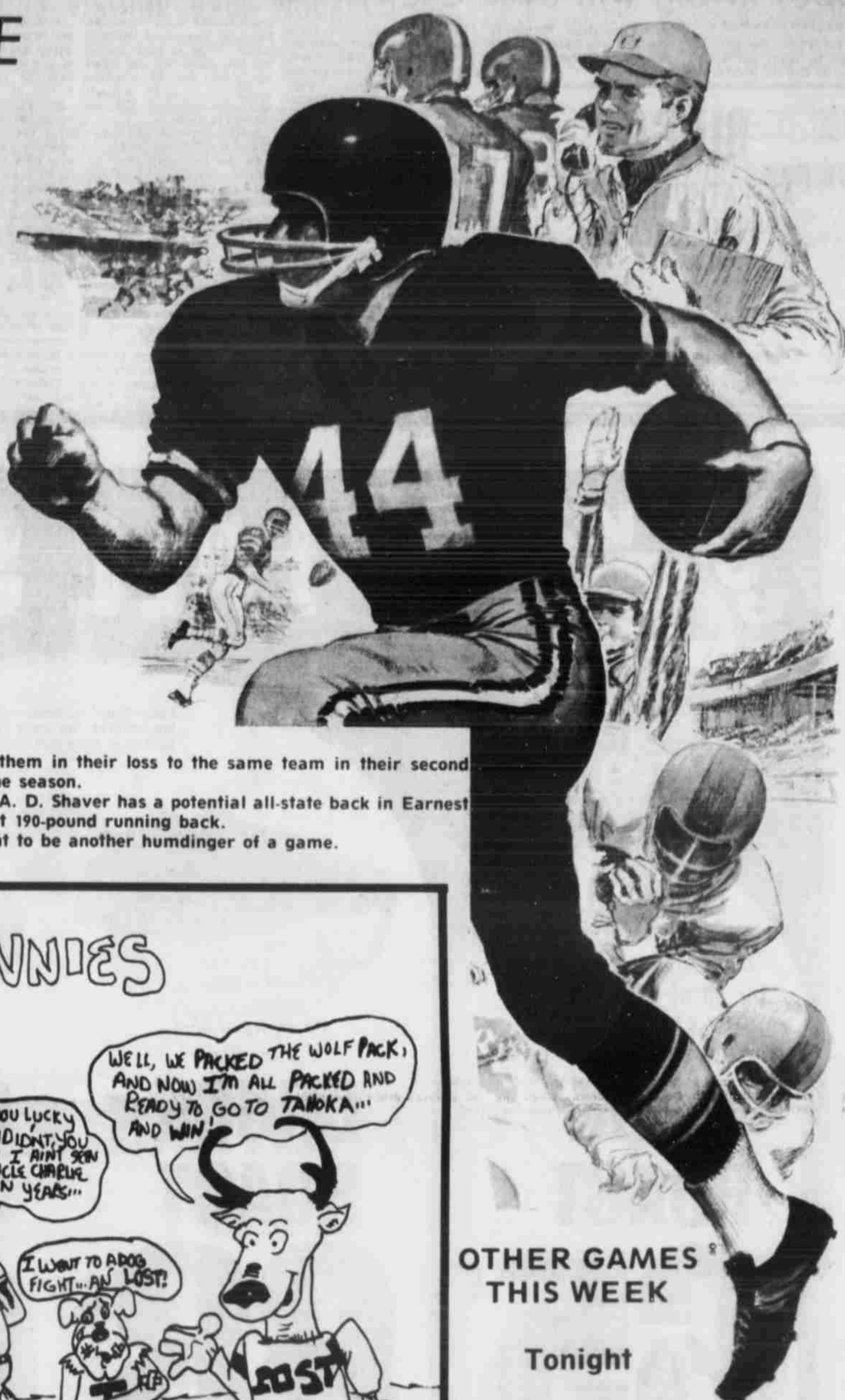

then faked into the line and passed to split end Evans Heaton in the left flat for the

second touchdown. The conversion kick was blocked. It was 13-0 with 5:50 still left in the half.

Colorado City then drove from its own 18 after the kickoff to a first down on the Post 12 in five plays, passing for eight and then a 55-yarder to Pete Parham accounting for 64 of the 70 yards.

The Wolves ran once to the 10 and then threw incomplete three straight times into the end zone.

With 2:49 left, Post ran it out to the Post 41 in five plays. That left 25 seconds on the clock. Shepherd was sacked for a 10-yard loss and then tried to run to his right and throw back across the field.

A Colorado City back intercepted on the Post 33 and zipped it to the 15. That left one tick on the clock and time for just one more incomplete pass.

Early in the third, tackle Casey Zachary recovered a Colorado City fumble at mid-field but the Lopes couldn't

move and then the game's momentum changed.

Starting from his own 33, Quarterback Ray Torrez ran for 6 and then found Halfback Benny Arispe 10 yards behind the Post secondary and lofted him a long pass which Arispe caught and ran in for Colorado City's first touchdown. The play covered 61 yards.

Belvin converted and it was 13-7 with 6:57 in the third.

On the first play after the kickoff, Dorland fumbled and Colorado City recovered on the Post 25. The Wolves drove it across to tie the score in seven plays with Fullback Gary Hulme going over from the two with 4:14 left. Torrez on fourth and three ran around Post's left end on a keeper for 14 yards to the four to keep the drive going.

Belvin missed the conversion kick to leave the score tied.

That's when Dorland took charge with his 93 yard kickoff return to the Colorado City two which set up Post's going ahead score by Wyatt on the first

scrimmage play. Britton converted and it was 20-13 for Post again.

After the next kickoff Zachary forced a Torrez fumble by hitting him hard behind the line of scrimmage. Tackle Danny Saldivar recovered on the Wolves' 33.

Post kicked up one first down, but as the fourth period opened were held and pushed back again by the Wolves, who took over after a fourth down sack on the Colorado City 33.

Colorado City quickly moved to the Post 37 but at that point Heaton intercepted an off target Torrez throw and returned it 10 yards with the Wolves drawing a personal foul penalty on the tackle.

Post drove from that point — the Wolves' 46 — for their final score with Dorland getting the last 32 on Shepherd's second touchdown pass of the night on a fourth down throw.

Britton converted again. There were seven minutes left, but though behind 26-13,

Colorado City came roaring back.

The Wolves went 65 yards from their own 35 after the kickoff to their final score in five plays.

Torrez found Arispe again behind the Lope secondary for a 40 yard gain to the Post 25. Torrez running the ball on keepers on three of the next four plays ran it across from the 14. Belvin converted and it was 27 to 20 for Post with 5:59 left.

Colorado City successfully pulled off an on-side kick on the kickoff and took possession on Post's 47. Torrez rolled left for 21 yards for a first down on the Post 26.

Baker broke through for 14 yards on the second play to the two-yard-line and then plunged across for the final touchdown on the next play with 10 ticks left on the clock. Britton converted and that was the ball game — one that took almost two and one-half hours to play.

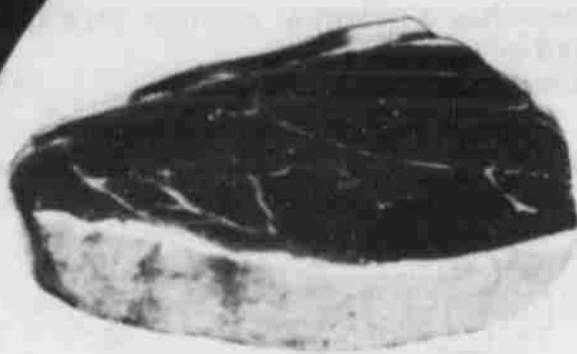

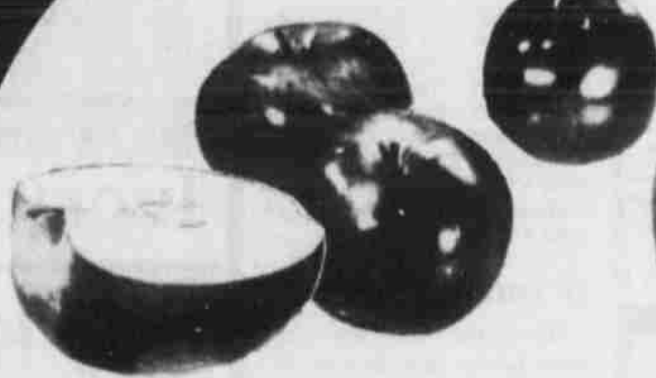

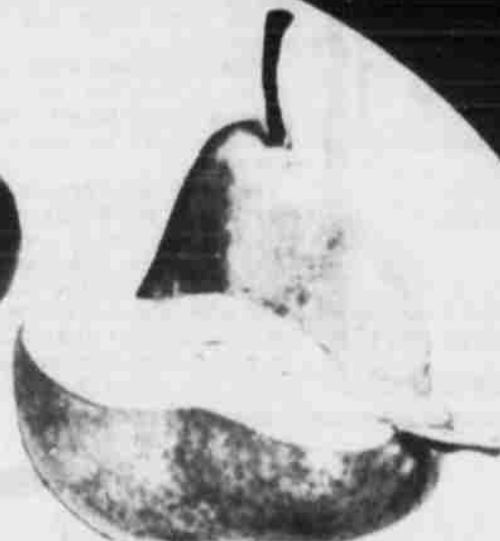

14 of the top professional money winners in calf roping on the RCA circuit this year.

They include Roy Cooper, Monument, N. M., second, \$26,723 in prize earnings; Butch Bode of Brenham, fourth, \$20,896; Edd Workman of Mineral Wells, seventh, \$18,830; Kim Gripp of Hereford, ninth,

\$17,505; Phil Lyne of Artesia Wells, 13th, \$15,262; and Kyle Ditto of Coahoma, 14th, \$14,898.

The nation's top calf roper, Tom Ferguson of Miami, Okla., is slated for the OS Steer Roping Sunday but isn't on the Saturday afternoon calf roping program. He's won \$28,979, roping calves and also is the leader for professional rodeo's all-around champion with \$72,824 in total earnings, also leading in steer wrestling

with \$41,083.

Fifty-one entries are listed for the girls barrel race which starts at 9 a. m. Sunday with the final 12 making their last run at the start of the afternoon steer roping at 2 p. m.

The new sporting event for the weekend is the NCHA approved cutting horse contest in its own arena. This begins at 10 a. m. Saturday with the top 12 horses working a final time before the judges at 12:30 p. m.

Sunday. There are two classes, open and non-pro, and some of the top cutting horses in the Southwest are expected.

As for the steer roping, competition will be keen among 35 of the nation's best steer ropers for the \$10,000 first prize for the average — the biggest jackpot anywhere for steer ropers. Since each puts in \$1,000 entry fee into that pot with \$10,000 added the pressure is sure to be stiff with every throw of the rope.

A roper can't miss or he is out of the competition for the average which is total time on four head with only the top 12 getting the fourth steer.

Leading competitors include 1976 world steer roping champion Charles Good of Elida, N. M.; Roy Thompson of Tulsa, runnerup to Good for the world title in the National Finals and 1975 champion; Marvin Cantrell of Nara Visa, N. M.; 1976 Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association champion for winning the most steer roping money over the season; Sonny Worrell of Altoona, Kans., runnerup to Good in the National Finals; Tom Ferguson of Miami, Okla., RCA's all-around cowboy leader and top calf roper.

Then you can add to this a dozen or so past world champions and defending OS champ John Barnes and former OS champions Pake McEntire, two-time winner, and Walter Arnold, former Post cowboy who took the top prize here two years ago.

Thirty-eight well known cowboy and western artists will have over \$250,000 worth of paintings, drawings and sculpture hung for exhibit and sale in the OS ranch house over the weekend.

All but 10 of these artists are coming to Post for the "OS weekend," many bringing their wives, and will be guests in Post homes.

There are reservations for over 500 for the Friday night Art Preview Party, which begins at 5 p. m. with a buffet supper served on the ranch house lawn from 6:30 to 8:30. It attracts art buyers and collectors from everywhere as they get the first buying chance that

night. Admission to this affair is \$15 at the cattle guard. It is not a restricted affair, but it is one in which advance reservations were sought so enough food could be prepared.

During the preview party, an auction will be conducted by steer roping announcer Lin Helton at which bronzes and sketches given by the artists for West Texas Boys Ranch will be auctioned off.

It will be held on the outdoor slab at the Post Stampede Rodeo Grounds with The Solid Country providing the dancing music and Tony Booth, nationally known country singer from the west coast, the featured entertainer. 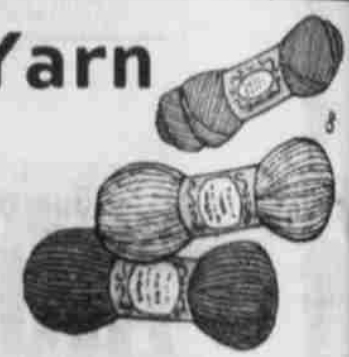
