Mayor Falk Says...

Council Took Correct Action

Rockport's City Council rejected the Rockport Sailing Club's request for a zoning alteration at the "saltwater swimming pool" for reasons it did-and still does--consider void, Mayor Walter S. Falk said Thursday.

Although the request was denied by the Council two weeks ago, controversy continues to stir concerning the pool and the sailing club's request for a Special Use Permit that would have permitted construction of marina facilities at the pool.

At that meeting--a joint hearing by the City Council and City Plan Commission on the permit request--the Council did not deliberate before casting its vote that denied the permit.

"No debate was necessary," Falk said Thursday. It was not only a matter of feeling that this was not the best use of public land. "It would have been consid-

ered as a business enterprise," the Mayor said.

He said the sailing club, in its request for the permit, stated that boat slips would be constructed which would be leased to non-club members and visitors.

"When they (the sailing club) were going to lease stall space--that made it a business," he said. The

sailing club is classified as a non-profit organization.

The sailing club needs a marina, Falk agrees, "and the Council would go along with them--help them," but such a facility should be located "someplace besides public property. We did not feel we should use what little public land we have," he said.

Falk also commented on a petition presented to members of the City Council at the June 4 public hearing, a petition whose validity has been questioned on the basis that not all signatures belong to citizens of Rockport and that not all signers are voters in Texas.

"The petition was pre-

ferred to us properly by citizens. It was stated at the hearing that it represented the signatures of voting citizens of Rockport and the Aransas County Navigation District Number 1." Since the saltwater pool is on Navigation District property he said residents of District No. 1 were affected

Shaw Speaks At Charter Session

A majority of Texas cities favor the council-manager form of government and small city councils, Rock-

port Councilman J. Martin Shaw told members of the city's Charter Commission Tuesday night, June 19.

The Commission heard Dr. Shaw speak during its weekly session that began at 7 p.m. at City Hall. In other action during the session, the Commission tentatively approved remaining sections of Article IV, dealing with the duties of the City Attorney, City Engineer and other administrative departments and offices, and Article V, dealing with city nominations and elections.

The first two sections of Article VIII, on Tax Administration, were approved before the Commission adjourned at 10 p.m. The Commission's next meeting will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, June 26.

Dr. Shaw presented members of the Commission with copies of two pages, and read excerpts from a study on Home Rule Cities in Texas done in the summer of 1978 by the University of Texas.

The Councilman's remarks pertained to Article III which the Charter Commission voted to approve at last week's meeting, and Commission Chairman L.N. Jackson pointed out that since the article was not on Tuesday's agenda, the Commission could not take any action.

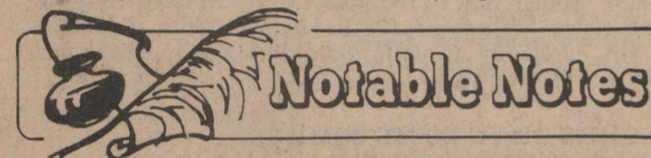
However, the Commission will review the entire City Charter when all the articles have been written, and additional changes may be made at that time.

Article III in Rockport's

proposed City Charter deals with the City Council and would establish a Council of one mayor and six councilmen. The mayor and two councilmen are elected at large under the proposed Article, with the remaining councilmen elected from the two city wards.

According to the study, done on 100 Texas cities, Dr. Shaw said, the most common size for city councils is five. He observed

District Seeks Bids, Won't Have To Move Lines

The Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District is seeking bids for sale of \$245,000 in water revenue bonds to pay for an additional storage tank in Peninsula Oaks.

The District authorized advertising for bids in its

meeting Tuesday, June 19, in the Aransas County Courthouse, during which District members also learned that an 18-inch water line on Avenue A will not have to be relocated.

First Southwest Company of Dallas was authorized to prepare a notice of

sale and bidding instructions in seeking bidders for purchase of the water revenue bonds.

Laddie Janecek, who works out of First Southwest's offices in San Antonio, told District members that anyone can bid on purchase of the bonds, but

that the bid will be for purchase of the entire bond series, the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District Series 1979 Water Revenue Bonds.

John McDavid, Sr., chairman of the District, said the bonds will be used to pay for an additional

storage tank because the present storage tank at Peninsula Oaks is not adequate for the district's needs.

In other action during the session that began at 5 p.m. Tuesday, McDavid told District members that an 18-inch water line officials earlier thought would have to be moved will not have to be relocated.

The line parallels Avenue A, the county road that the Texas Highway Department earlier proposed to follow in constructing the proposed Highway 35 bypass. The Highway Department had asked that the water line be relocated because it was too close to the proposed highway right-of-way in some places.

Commissioners Approve Grant

Aransas County Commissioners approved a \$2,801.14 grant to the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District, to be used as part of an engineering feasibility study concerning waste water treatment. Commissioners made the decision at their regular meeting June 20, with County Judge

John Wendell presiding.

Reese Rozzell, representing the district, appeared before the commissioners to request the grant. He explained that the Environmental Protection Agency required the district to sponsor a public participation program to get input from area residents. The cost of the program, estimated at

\$11,204.55, will be taken out of the original \$74,697 grant, and will be repaid to the district at a later date.

However, Rozzell said the district must have 25 percent of the cost of the program on hand in order to be repaid, causing the district to request county aid.

Commissioner Raymond Owens made the motion, to

pay \$2,801.14 to the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District, which commissioners approved.

Fulton Mayor L.E. Casterline and City Councilman James Metzger appeared before commissioners to request Aransas County collect Fulton city taxes. Casterline had ap-

For Fleming, Wife

Vacation Lasts 32 Years

When Roe and Inez Fleming came to Rockport on vacation, they really weren't planning to go into the shrimping business--or to stay for 32 years.

They did both. "The business just got interesting to us and we got into it," is the way Fleming put it, and Mrs. Fleming added, "We both liked it very much."

They still do, coming at 5:30 a.m. every morning, seven days a week, to open the weathered pink Fleming's Bait Stand located on Rockport's Turning Basin, keeping it open until 10 p.m. It's open year-round for their customers, some of whom have been dealing with the Flemings since they opened business 32 years ago, she said.

The Flemings hadn't been married very long, Mrs. Fleming said in a recent interview, when they came to Rockport. During the war, Fleming worked at the Navy shipyard in Houston, then he began operat-

ing a cab company. That's how he met his wife--he answered the call when she and her sister wanted a cab to take them to town.

"I thought she (Mrs. Fleming) was pretty good-looking, so I asked her for a date," Fleming recalled.

After that, Mrs. Fleming went to work for the company. "I worked for him before we were married," she said, "and since we've been married, we've always worked together."

Fleming recalled the Turning Basin had just been completed when he and his wife--then living in Pasadena--came to Rockport in 1947. "Fishing was really booming when we came here," he said. "That's what got us."

Over the years since they've been here, the Flemings have been most impressed by Rockport's growth. "It (Rockport) wasn't very big when we came," Mrs. Fleming said. "There was a dry goods store and one little grocery--and Corky put in

little restaurant where the Shell Shop is now. The Davis Cafe was there--that was when it was just a wooden cafe."

The Flemings started their own business, in the same spot on the Turning Basin that they occupy now, with one boat which Fleming operated. The business now has two boats--the "Blue Mist," operated by their son, Rick, 26, and "Miss Brandy," which is operated by their son-in-law, Jim Friebele.

"Miss Brandy," Mrs. Fleming added, was named after Friebele's daughter, the Fleming's first grandchild, who is now eight years old. The Flemings have five children, eight grandchildren--and are expecting a ninth--and one great-grandson.

At one time, before the Navigation District built the permanent bait stands on the Turning Basin, the Flemings had a stand located on a steel barge. "We built the barge and sank it," Fleming chuckled.

He explained he "came in with the boat" and was trying to get close to the barge for docking. "I threw the back end (of the boat) into the barge a little hard, and it went down."

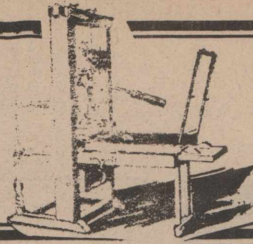
That happened four or five years before the permanent bait stands were built, he said, and Mrs. Fleming recalls that the original bait stand went up in 1960.

"That was the year it snowed," she said, proving it with a photo of the bait stand under a cover of the white stuff. "That's the only time I ever remember it snowing here," she added.

She said the original bait stand was half its present size, and added the Navigation District made the additions that brought it to its present size a year or two later. The Flemings lease the stand from the Navigation District, although they own the storeroom, back piers and "all the inside fixtures," Mrs. Fleming [See FLEMING, page 2]

The Flemings have a sizeable collection of photos of their bait stand. "People from all over the world take pictures of the stand and send them to us," Mrs. Fleming said. Their customers are also world-wide, they said, and their business, which started out selling bait, now offers "dead shrimp, live shrimp, table shrimp, mullet, crabs," artificial lures, nets, rods, bait buckets—just about anything a fisherman would need to help him bring in the big ones.

Do the Flemings ever think about retiring? "We think about it," Fleming commented, "but we never do it." After 32 years of operating a bait stand in the same location, he summed up his and his wife's feelings: "We've enjoyed every bit of it."

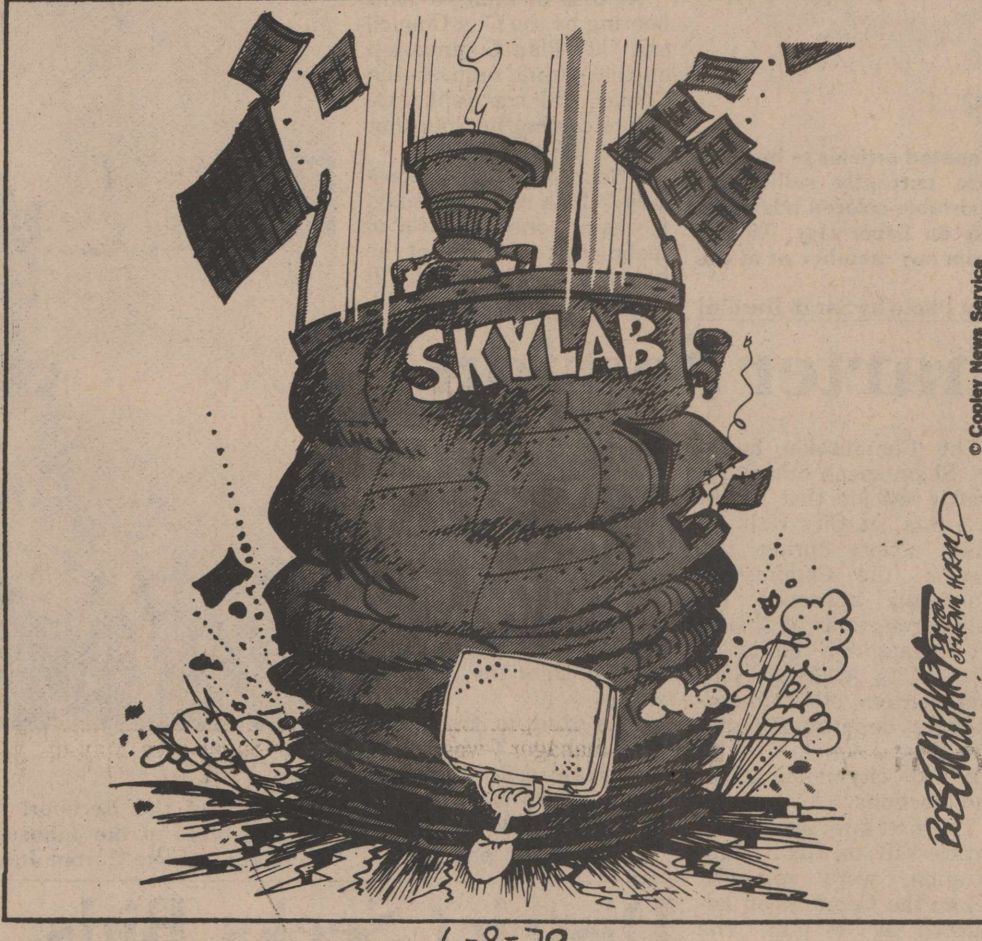

McDavid, which he read Tuesday to District members, State Highway District Engineer Roger Q. Spencer, Jr., said the Highway Department can move the highway baseline 10 feet to the west. This would allow the water line to remain in place.

In the letter, Spencer said, "Initial construction of the bypass would build the first two-lane roadway on the west side of the total 270-foot right-of-way. This would allow more time for your organization to develop future plans."

Spencer added, "As major improvements to the water line are made, the ultimate goal should be placement at the proper elevation and location. To insure that improvements are properly located, we

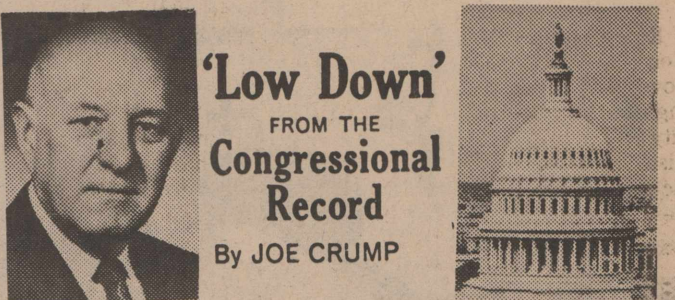
Willard T. (Slim) Suttles died at the age of 85 in Aransas Pass on June 17.

'Low Down' FROM THE Congressional Record By JOE CRUMP

BILL CHALLENGES OPEC

REPRESENTATIVE JAMES M. JEFFORDS (Vt.) ... Today myself and 19 of my colleagues, a bipartisan group, are introducing a bill (H.R. 4345) because like most Americans, we are tired of being at the mercy of OPEC. We want our Nation to regain control over our own destiny.

"We propose to put a cap on what OPEC can charge us, by providing an alternative to buying their oil. We propose to do that by making the best use of our sources, and of our dynamic free enterprise system.

"Our proposal, the fuels replacement bill, creates an assured market for substitute fuels. Any number of alternatives are available or can be produced to meet this mandate, including alcohol from wood, grain, or garbage, synthetic fuel from coal or oil from shale. The fuels used would be determined by the marketplace competition. There would be no cost to the Federal government, except for enforcement.

"Refiners would be required to phase in substitute fuels, beginning in 1981, with quantities increasing to 10 percent of their total gasoline production by 1987. They could mix the fuels themselves, or contact with others to do it...

"Estimates of the consumer costs of motor fuel under this program vary greatly, as you might expect. But it is clear the price will be cheaper than it would be without the program. Spot checks from OPEC are now over \$20 a barrel, and in one recent case, over \$50...

"Shale oil would range from \$20 to \$25 per barrel. Alcohol prices would range from \$20 to a little under \$50. Liquid from coal would have an initial price range of \$25 to \$40, but the top end of that project would be reduced to \$30 by 1985.

"Clearly, this program will not bring back the era of cheap energy. But it will, at the very least stabilize the incredible price hikes which will otherwise occur.

The message to OPEC will be that we have a serious program, putting us on the road to energy independence, and that they would be well advised to deal with us in a reasonable manner. 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Charter Provides For Council-Manager Government

[Note: The following is the first in a series of articles on the contents of Rockport's proposed new City Charter.]

Rockport will have a Council-Manager form of government and voters living in areas annexed by the city would have the right to disannex themselves if Article I under the proposed new City Charter is adopted

in its present form.
With a population - more than 5,000 - that now qualifies Rockport to become a Home Rule city under Texas statute, the city last November elected a 15-member Charter Commission to draft a City Charter.
Article I under this proposed new Charter, on the "Form of Government and Boundaries", was ap-

proved by the Commission in March. N.F. Jackson Jr., chairman of the Commission, has pointed out that all action taken by the Commission is subject to later change. Rockport residents will be given an opportunity to express their views in public meetings when the entire charter has been drafted.
The final decision on the charter will be made at the

polls by Rockport voters.
As adopted by the Charter Commission, Article I provides for a Council-Manager form of government for the city. The City Manager is to be appointed by the City Council and Section 1 states "All powers of the City shall be vested in the City Council."
Article I also provides for annexation of territory by the City of Rockport, but

provides that if the city fails to provide "standard governmental and proprietary services of the City" to annexed areas within three years from the date of annexation, "a majority of qualified voters" within the annexed area may petition for disannexation.
Section 3 of the Article sets down the "Extension of Boundaries" (annexation

powers of the City). Jackson said the city "has had the power to annex for many years" and there are no changes from present procedure in this part of the Charter.
He added that Section 4, which is the disannexation provision, "puts a rather severe burden on the city, but that's as it should be."

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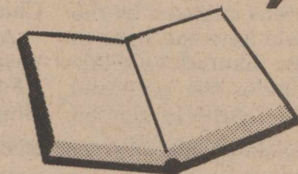

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The Apprenticeshop... A Discussion With Lance R. Lee, Director

This is the second of a two-part series. The article is reprinted from "The Apprenticeshop—a discussion with Lance R. Lee, Director," published in A Marine Manifest - 1972. The article details the workings of an apprentice school for boat builders.

The first part of the series dealt with the crafts involved in making boats. Students spend eighteen months at the school, during which time they learn the craft of building boats from master craftsmen.

Today's conclusion will deal with student life while at the school.

Q. If a young person came and said, "I don't care about the community lifestyle particularly, I'd like to live in an apartment in town and have all the conveniences, but I would like to come here and learn to build fine boats," what's your reaction, and what are the apprentices' reactions?

A. What we do with candidates is work with them for a while and explore the way they behave, everything from the way they use their hands to how careful they are of other people, and I guess we find out whether they're steady, have a sense of humor and are gentle. If they are these things we know they will work in our community. It isn't that it's a club, it's that the community has to have a certain harmony in order to work closely together, with sufficient co-operation to build a peapod. If that harmony isn't there, the person wouldn't work out as an apprentice here and it's easy to say no. Some think that building a boat by hand to tolerances of a 16th of an inch or better would take too much time, would involve senseless expenditures of patience, and so forth. You discover after you've done it for a while that it not only becomes second nature to work to such a tolerance, but that it's extremely stimulating. It's exactly this that craftsmen of the past discovered and what made many of them such fine philosophers as well as excellent mechanics. Why Chartres Cathedral, why the Last Supper, why Shaker furniture? Because of a tradition of great pride, through tangible accomplishments and magnificent tolerances in craftsmanship. We say, "these are unnecessary and expensive, not something our culture is about." So cornices and columns on the facades of our buildings have disappeared and been replaced by granite squares upon granite squares and cantilevered concrete. Something's lost—something in the inner beast of the craftsman has become perfunctory. He now pours concrete instead of strives with a chisel. The greatest loss is the quality within the person rather than the building. The reason for preserving wooden boats, as far as I'm concerned, is the qualities that will rub off on the craftsmen and women, not simply the nature of the boats. Getting that very elusive quality back into the society is much more important than having fine wooden boats or Renaissance quality carvings or handblown glassware. The article isn't important, but qualities within the people who create them is vital. Without that resource, I don't think a culture can remain buoyant. Most people agree that this "elusive quality" is critically needed, the point here is that studying about the inner strengths gained through demanding performance, whether renaissance carving or 19th century shipbuilding, doesn't revive those strengths. It simply creates a hunger for them. We are in need of the acts themselves. Hence, an Apprenticeshop. Hence, 700 applicants, most of them learning about us through word of mouth.

Q. You've mentioned revival, but you're obviously talking about more than boats.

A. John Gardner was fostering a revival in the early '70's; I took him very seriously. The basis of the revival lies in a way of life, it has much less to do with either boatbuilding or traditional designs. They are outward expression of a revival in resourcefulness and the growth of sensible practices. Take the sprit rig, or recreational pulling boats, or the departure from fancy paint and brightwork to linseed oil, pine tar and turps. Each of these saves—in money, maintenance, time and resources. When you analyze the rig or the act of rowing, or the use of natural finishes, you come away with a very perceptible means of responding to global issues, (energy crisis, inflation, alienation). But when you live with that rig or row or use linseed oil you become resourceful, less dependent on money and more appreciative of the business of living in harmony with Nature.

Q. The "sail and oar" theme prevails here?

A. That theme in the Shop is intentional for many reasons. To be a kind of metaphor of living in harmony with nature: let's make use of wind, current, and muscle in an age of energy crisis. That seems very obvious to us, but even more important is an underlying attitude of using our ingenuity, wits, and hands. Travelling silently and moving slowly are already proving very beneficial in an age of noise, frenzy and competition. We need relaxation, we need recreation. We are sure that "sail and oars" will prove of greater and greater value, that more people will want these over the fast moving power boats. Their inner spirits will seek these calming forces.

Q. Is there a general term that you have for what the Apprenticeshop is doing, a broader term that's easily understood?

A. Perhaps "apprenticing equals resourcefulness" as much as vocational training equals the transfer of technique. Apprenticing means resourcefulness in the way you live, it implies the discovery that you stop and build a sawhorse at the right height to allow you to work all day without stooping, and so not become fatigued. And not then to resent the time you've spent building that sawhorse. It was Harold Kimber, the English Master Boatbuilder who spent six weeks of volunteer service to the Apprenticeshop, who taught us that one, and who really made me realize that apprenticeship is vastly more important than simple vocational training. Secrets of that nature can be transferred by our older craftsmen who have had to put them in practice in order to stay in the game. "Red" Davis, Cecil Pierce, and of course, Dave Foster, our Master Builder, have each transferred a great deal of such "strength" to our students.

Apprentices through the ages had a hard-scrabble route. In the Apprentice Book of Bristol, we learn that apprenticeship was created for economic, social and educational purposes. It served all of these aims to have young men working with master craftsmen, as they came away with sufficient expertise, but also sufficient canniness, husbandry, or what I'm calling resourcefulness to just

barely make it in a very demanding trade in which, for instance, they had to be very careful of the amount of wood they expended. They had to "recycle" their chips, or scrap. They had to count fastenings. Rest assured they didn't lose any. They had to keep very close track of their tools, and of how fast they went through a plane iron; Harold Kimber shared a good deal with us about apprenticeship in England 50 years ago. One learned all one could about wood, the sawyer's art, felling timber, about identifying, from the standing tree, what you needed, about seasons, the turns in weather, when to go after elm. You learned how to live with your environment, and the essential need to make use of the resources at your command; the theme of craftsmen of necessity prevailed, rather than the theme of artists of pleasure. That theme is hopefully what we are affording our students. The term, "craftsmen of necessity" seems to create some confusion. Much of what I mean by this is seen in the very high expenditure for a higher education today. From academia, a student comes away nearly broke, if not definitely in debt, and often has still not got the "tools" to become resourceful, to put together the ideas he or she may have. So many get "fine" educations and then find out that they can't at all live the way they want to, or do the things that they have a certain passion for. Instead they are channeled into doing something really quite lackluster, and they begin to get further from their ideals. We deal here from a base of pragmatic idealism. Ideals can certainly be realized if we apply human energy and resourcefulness, and accept struggle. Here, at every turning, we have had sufficient to do all that we've needed, and most that we've wanted to do. I ask, then, what the difference is between apprenticeship and higher education, and my only conclusion can be that academic education gives you knowledge about the world rather than the ability to do something. That's an ugly conclusion, but it seems to hold up more and more. We have perhaps half or better college graduates as students in The Apprenticeshop, many of whom were not equipped to realize their ideals. They're now becoming so equipped.

Q. Where are they going largely? What's happening to apprentices that leave?

A. Graduates have gone to Minneford's, to Paul Luke's, to local professional boatbuilders; Paul has founded his own boat shop, Jim is working in Gougeon Brother in Michigan, all building in wood. Eddie was sail-oystering, now restoring a Chesapeake oysterman. Another has applied to law school; one worked on a farm for a year after leaving The Apprenticeshop. There are others. John is making furniture, until he figures a way of getting a shop going with the necessary materials and tools to build boats.

Someone who can use his hands is doing himself a great favor in terms of practicality for the future from both a professional and a personal standpoint. You make your own workbench in the house, you put in your own sink, and perhaps turn towards sculpture. On every level you're deepening your lifestyle. To me, this is the sort of thing that characterizes the past New Englander, the craftsmen first of necessity, then of inclination.

The men and women who forged a way of life on a somewhat inhospitable shore, and handed down a marvelous small craft heritage were more than heroic pioneers, they were highly skilled artisans. The architecture of early New England shows the hand of boatbuilders. Some of the marvelous curved steeples and bow windows in the churches, and houses in places like Thomaston, Wiscasset, Rockland and Bath, speak of ship-building traditions. That's a very fine theme, whether it's looked upon as a history of maritime affairs or simply a cultural history of this country. This is where an enormous amount of resilience within the society came from. We seem not to have rejected, but let that resilience slip away in our enthusiasm for words and symbols and knowledge about the world. The sadness lies in our now passing on only the words to our kids in the name of "education." Much of what's most intriguing there, I guess, is that kids 50 years ago were information poor, and experience rich. They worked on the farm, or with their fathers as fishermen, they mended nets and hauled traps as a matter of course from the time they were five or six. Schools were set up to give them information that they didn't have. Now they've got an enormous amount of information, from television, from conversation, from the media in all its forms. Now they're information-rich and experience-poor. But the schools are giving them still more information. They never have a chance to develop or experience on the levels that were used 50 or 100 years ago. It's for this reason that apprenticeship makes a lot of sense educationally. We fill that gap, but don't, by any means, turn kids away from being academic. That's an oversimplification. We give them a frame of reference and competence from which to interpret the things that they read or study or hear about. As Justice Douglas put it, "our culture turns out doctors of philosophy, but no philosophers." You need a frame of reference in order to be a philosopher, and you get that more through experience than from reading, or from lectures or from knowledge about something. That, essentially, is the educational backdrop of the Apprenticeshop. I begin to see the basic elements here, in skills that really begin by using the hands, and becoming so conversant with things that hands can do in response to needs, that upon getting your hands educated, there is an enormous number of things that you no longer have to worry about. It may start with chopping firewood and continue to digging a well, to putting in your own heating system, and hooking up your own plumbing.

If, along the way, you can make a living by starting to use your hands, learning boatbuilding, you can then make anything, from a split-rail fence to a violin, depending on your temperament. The compound curve and changing bevel in boatbuilding provides the disciplines along the route to the point at which you no longer have to worry about whether you can do something.

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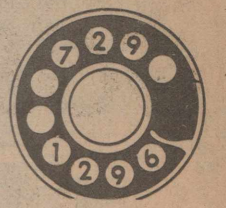

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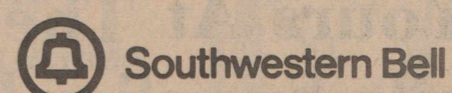

that, "if we have a seven-member council, we'll have some people elected with a very, very small vote." However, Commission member William Walston said that wouldn't be true in Rockport's case because of the combined use of

at-large and ward elections. Dr. Shaw also said that 83 percent of the cities in the study have a Council-Manager form of government—the form the Charter Commission selected for Rockport—and that none of the cities that adopted a Council-Manager form of government have abandoned it, although cities have changed to Council-Manager from other forms. In presenting Article V, on nominations and elections, to the Commission Tuesday, Commission

member Ed Armstrong pointed out that members of the subcommittee that prepared the ordinance "were essentially guided by the election code and statutes of Texas." The Commission also gave tentative approval to the first two sections of Article VIII, which establish the office of taxation and set down the city's power to levy, assess and collect taxes.
