CED sets new tax rate

"This whole thing is rotten," said a Westbrook area taxpayer at of the Mitchell County Education District (CED) meeting held on Thursday night as the local CED tax rate - of 77 cents per \$100 valuation - was established.

The CED board met for over three hours to approve two of the three agenda items which included adopting the tax rate, bank depository guidelines and tabled action on a 1991-92 CED budget until the next called meeting - September 24 - of the board.

The tax rate of 77 cents was approved after a lengthy - often heated - discussion between board members, school administrators and taxpayers.

Geneva Findley, business manager for the Colorado Independent School District (ISD) and administrator for the local CED, told the board members - chairman Dwayne Harris, representing Colorado ISD; vice-chairman Warren Zant, representing Westbrook ISD; and secretary Robert Dale Finley, representing

Loraine ISD - of the state mandates involved in establishing a tax rate for the local CED.

Figures given the board concerning collection rates of the three component school districts were 'rough', Findley noted, since only Colorado ISD's report had been presented to the board.

It was noted that the projections had been based on collection rates for Colorado City and Westbrook of 97 percent and of 85 percent for Loraine, figures that came from Texas Education Agency reports.

The projection - using these figures - was that it would require a tax rate of 81 cents per \$100 valuation to fund the state requirement.

Glenn Sanders, superintendent of the Loraine ISD, told the board that the collection rate was also 97 percent.

The figures were recalculated using an across the board figure of 97 percent. The result was a 3 cent drop in the rate - to 78 cents which would raise a total of \$3,657,664.

The Mitchell CED is mandated

to raise - by state legislature guidelines - a local funding amount of \$3,639,763.

This amount was arrived at by multiplying the previous year's tax roll by 72 cents.

The state mandate for funding is arrived at before the new tax roll is certified. Thus any property fluctuations in value and exemptions change the rate of taxation that is required to raise the required funds.

Don Nimmo, superintendent of Colorado ISD, told the board that 72 cents is an 'arbitrary' figure.

A tax rate of 72 cents would raise funds - approximately \$3,480,727 - short of the state mandated level.

Harris advised the board members that by going with the collection histories of the component school districts, he would recommend the tax rate be set at 78 cents per \$100 dollar valuation.

"You're sticking it to us [Westbrook]," Zant responded. "Leave it [the tax rate] at 72."

Superintendent Nimmo reminded the board members of the special August 10 election and the outcome, in which voters adopted exemptions that affect the fund raising capability of the CED.

These exemptions in effect force the tax rate to be raised to reach the funding goal.

The other factor which affects the amount of funds received is the collection rate, which for Mitchell County was estimated at 97 percent.

"We're going to collect 100 percent," said Zant, "or sell the property. Either way, we're going to get the money."

"Don't set the rate at 97 percent," he urged. "We're going to turn it over to a lawyer and collect it. We need to set the tax rate at 100 percent."

Harris responded by saying that, "I feel we must set a tax rate based on the history of last year's collection rate."

"That's a bunch of malarkey," Zant replied. "You're letting three percent of the people get away

without paying their taxes."

Sonny Hollis, superintendent of the Westbrook ISD, added that, "You are penalizing all the taxpayers in the county and are clearly encouraging non-payment of the tax."

"We have to raise enough tax to reach the funding level to meet the state mandate in order to receive state aid," Harris said.

"That three percent makes a lot of difference," Zant said. "Set the collection rate at 100 percent to figure the tax rate."

"We don't collect 100 percent of school taxes," Harris said. "It sounds good on paper, but it's like stripping cotton, even though you want to, you don't get everything out of the field."

"If we set the rate 1 cent more than the state mandates," Zant returned, "we're robbing from the people and I ain't for sticking it to my neighbors."

"You have the opportunity to give a tax break to the citizens of Mitchell County," Hollis said.

Assault victim leaves note; suspect caught

A note - pleading for help - that was given to an employee at a local store and actions taken by the Colorado City Police, led to the arrest of a man for 'family violence assault' in Electra.

Electra Police Chief Herb Edwards commended the Colorado City Police Department for the response of the local unit in dealing with the case.

An employee of B and B One Stop Deli said that two people, a man and a woman, had come into the convenience store on Tuesday evening to pay for gas.

They were later identified by the police as Danny Lee Garrard, 36,

and Margarette Dickerman, both of Electra.

Dickerman gave the clerk behind the counter her charge card and said that if the clerk needed identification she would have to get it from the man with her, that she needed to use the bathroom.

Employees of the store noted that the woman looked as if she was sick - that her face was red and blotchy - and that they knew that was something was wrong.

Dickerman went to the bathroom and wrote a note - saying, "Call Police, Help Me," and included the license plate number of

Rural addressing continues for 911

A meeting to discuss the effort to address rural Mitchell County to meet the requirements of the 911 system installation was held at the Courthouse on Wednesday.

Karen Holman, 911 Coordinator for Mitchell County, that every effort was being made to complete the addressing project by the first of the year and to 'do it right the first time.'

She noted that the benefits of the system will be that everyone will have a physical address and that emergency response time will be cut down as the 911 computer will be able to let dispatchers explain to officers where locations are.

The addresses of rural Mitchell County are being listed primarily as a requirement for the 911 system, but it was noted at the meeting that the post office will be switching to

a physical address on rural mail sometime in the future.

Holman said that the project that is being undertaken will make addresses compatible with phone numbers.

After the program has been completed, a continual updating, to ensure that all new homes are listed in the system will be required to keep the system up-dated.

The addressing used by the 911 system will in effect become the rural customer's new mailing address at some later date as the post office will convert from the rural route boxes to actual physical addresses.

Representatives of the county, city, police department, sheriff's office, ambulance service and utility companies were on hand to hear the presentation and offer their opinions on the addressing plan.

Accident claims 3 lives

A car-truck collision on Interstate 20 claimed the lives of three people and left one in serious condition.

The Tuesday evening collision involved a 1976 Mercury and a 1990 Freightliner eighteen wheeler. Both vehicles were traveling westbound in the right hand lane of the interstate near mile-marker 208, according to Department of Public Safety (DPS) reports.

The Mercury was heading westbound, riding on the shoulder of the road, on interstate 20 at a slow rate of speed when it entered the path of the Freightliner, reports indicate.

The truck struck the rear of the car and drove on top of the vehicle.

Both vehicles then left the roadway to the north, hitting an embankment, crossing the service road and came to a stop in a wooded area, DPS Trooper Karl Keesee reported.

Reports indicate the vehicles traveled approximately 650 feet with the truck on top of the car.

Three of the four passengers - all members of the same family from Winters - who were riding in the car died. They are: the driver of the car, Debra Bailey, 33; her husband, Tommy Clay Bailey, 27; and their son, Timothy C. Bailey, 3.

DPS reports indicate that Justice of the Peace Keith Ruddick

pronounced each of the three dead at the scene of the accident.

The other passenger of the car, Austin L. Hord, 13, sustained head injuries in the collision and was transported to St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock where he remains unconscious and in critical condition, reports indicate.

Hord is the son of Debra Bailey from a previous marriage.

The two occupants of the truck - Donnie Thomas Hayes, 30, of Dublin, Virginia, driver of the truck and Thomas D. Sutphin, 43, of Charleston, West Virginia - were treated for injuries at Mitchell County Hospital and released.

Keesee said that the wreck - which occurred at approximately 8:25 p.m. - happened as the truck came over a rise in the road and that

the sun would have been directly in the driver's eyes.

The driver of the truck reported to Keesee that his partner was attempting to climb into the sleeper when the wreck occurred.

When the collision occurred, the man fell into the driver's lap. He attempted to pump the brake in an effort to stop, but Keesee indicated that evidence did not indicate that the brakes had ever been applied.

Keesee noted that a blood test had been taken of the truck drivers and that - as with all accidents involving fatalities - the information would be turned over to the District Attorney.

This accident brings the year to date total to 9 deaths that have occurred on Interstate 20 in Mitchell County.

the car - on a piece of toilet tissue and gave it to an employee behind the deli counter.

The employee read the note and notified the police as soon as the car pulled away from the store.

Officer Pat Taylor of the Colorado City Police Department responded to the call at 8:22 p.m. on Tuesday evening, police reports indicate.

He took the note and had a registration check done on the vehicle.

Another message was found at approximately the same time that had been left at a rest stop west of Westbrook, and had been turned into Department of Public Safety officers.

The report showed that the car was registered to Dickerman in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

Police Chief David Montgomery noted that a call to the Ardmore Police Department turned up information that she no longer lived in Ardmore, but that she had possibly moved to Electra.

A call was made to the Police Department in Electra, where Police Chief Herb Edwards said that they had received a call from Dickerman's grandmother who was afraid that she had been taken

against her will by Garrard. At this time a statewide welfare concern alert was issued by the local police department, Chief Montgomery noted.

Police officers in Electra went to the woman's home and found a car outside, but were unable to get an answer at the door, Chief Edwards said.

The Electra police got in contact with the grandmother and were in the process of obtaining a consent form to enter the residence when the door was finally answered.

Chief Edwards reported that the girl had been severely assaulted and that Garrard was taken into custody before noon on Wednesday.

Garrard and Dickerman have been living together for approximately the past two months at her house in Electra.

She told police that Garrard wanted to visit friends in Colorado City, but that she didn't want to go.

Reports indicate that Dickerman was then assaulted.

The couple drove to Colorado City where Garrard was to visit with friends, but they were not at home.

They then drove back to Electra and went to sleep, not waking for the officers knocks at the door.

"And you aren't taking advantage of the opportunity."

"The rate should be set at 76 cents," Zant said. "If the funds end up short, the school districts can borrow the money to make up the difference. There's no need to screw all the taxpayers in the county."

"We're going to raise the amount," he added. "I have faith in the people of Mitchell County and think we should give them a little break. Two cents is a lot of money."

"We should do what the law says," Zant told the board, "but not go over and abuse it. The people are broke, put it [the tax rate] where it belongs. We don't need to jab them [the taxpayers]."

"Westbrook and Loraine are getting shafted when you get down to it," Zant said. "For every penny of CED funds Colorado City gets 77.63 percent, Loraine gets 5.794 percent and Westbrook gets 16.574 percent."

"By raising the tax rate two cents," he noted, "we'll be giving it to Colorado City."

Zant said that, "If he [Finley] votes for it [the 78 cent tax rate] they ought to run him out of the county."

"We can't figure collections at 100 percent," Harris argued. "We don't have a history of collecting 100 percent of school taxes. It is all tied back to state funding."

"I'm not going to vote for it," Zant said. "We need to let the people have a break."

"Is somebody from Austin coming to arrest us if we don't?" Zant asked. "We have to live by the law of the land, but it is not our duty to go beyond it. We have no [CED] history to go on," and added, "Why screw the people?"

"It's not good business to set a tax rate without taking into consideration the collection rate," Harris said.

"76 cents is what's mandated," Zant said. "It was 72 cents before the people voted for the amendments, but why should we add 2 more cents to every \$100 of valuation, you're wanting us to pay for the people who are not paying."

"We're doing what the state says," he said, "but why stick the people - it's not right. How could someone go home and sleep at night after gouging the taxpayers for two cents. We need to treat the people right."

"You ain't seen no mad people yet," Zant said. "But you will if you set a tax rate over what the state mandates."

"Who's to say we won't collect 100 percent," Zant argued. "If you raise the rate you're gouging the people, it's like trying to screw the whole county for two cents. Put it at 76 cents and leave it alone."

The discussion continued for almost an hour and involved several of the taxpayers who expressed their criticism of the CED system.

As a compromise, Finley made

a motion that the rate be set at 77 cents per \$100 valuation.

Zant seconded the motion and it was approved by vote.

The board also approved guidelines to be used in the bidding process by financial institutions for a CED depository.

Finley noted that the CED board members and administrator had met with representatives of the two Colorado City banks and the bank in Loraine to collect data to help find out what the institutions would bid on and to offer advise on drawing up guidelines.

Three areas of the proposal were discussed as possible problem areas with the bank bidding process.

They were that the local institutions did not want to put up securities for flow-through monies, when the money would only be in the bank for a few hours; needed to know what the cash balance for the CED would be; and how much security the institutions would have to pledge on the account.

Board members discussed that the only purpose of the CED was to collect and distribute the funds.

The board decided to send out the bid specifications based on this type of account.

The bids for the general checking account for the Mitchell CED will be opened at a called meeting to be held on Sept 24.

Snags were run into as board members discussed the 1991-92 budget for the CED.

"You're getting all the money [Colorado City]," Zant said, "but you want us [Westbrook and Loraine] to pay your bills," he said referring to the system by which the money is state mandated to be paid out of the CED account.

"The bills need to be divided on the same basis as the revenues," Zant said.

It was mentioned that the payment of administration expenses had been handled at an earlier meeting of the board.

"I know," Zant said. "It was one of those 2-1 votes."

After discussing the matter for a while it was agreed to put the budget adoption on the Sept 24 meeting agenda.

Also to be discussed at the meeting will be tax collection and CED operational guidelines.

The meeting began with Supt Hollis making a statement to the board in reference to a Tuesday phone conversation between Hollis and Harris which concerned public protests at CED meetings.

"I want to point out," Hollis said, "that the power of protest is the very principle on which this county was founded."

He reminded the board members of the Boston Tea Party, which was a protest of taxation.

"Under the first amendment," Hollis said, "sometimes called the Bill of Rights, we have the right to public protest of reprieve of grievances."

"You took something on yourself that you didn't have the authority to do," Zant said. "You should have never talked to Tom Rees. You were taking something on your shoulders that you didn't have the right to do."

"I had the right to ask for advice," Harris said.

"We spent money," Zant said, "when the state of Texas already had the lawyers."

"The attorney general's office would only defend the constitutionality issue," Finley said.

"I felt like...," Harris started.

"Exactly," Zant replied. "You had Mr. Rees up here and you had already talked to him."

"It didn't cost us anything to get advice from Mr. Rees," Harris said.

"I don't like it when you take it on your shoulders," Zant said. "When you take it on yourself to represent me, I don't like it."

The next meeting of the Mitchell CED will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 24.

Wolves helpless in season opener, lose 21 - 0 to Ballinger

The Colorado City Wolves lost the season opener to the Bearcats of Ballinger by a score of 0-21.

"It was the first ball game of the season," Coach Tom Ramsey said after the game, "and anything can happen."

The "backbreaker" came with 11:03 in the second quarter when Ballinger's Kirk Travis took a David Castillo punt on an 80 yard scamper to put the Bearcats ahead at 14-0.

"We had the play covered," Ramsey said, "but we forgot to tackle."

The Wolves began the game by kicking off to the Bearcats and were able to contain them on the first series.

The Bearcats punted and the Wolves took possession of the ball on their own 39 yard line, but were unable to make a first down.

When Ballinger took over for their second possession, they kept control of the ball for 5:18, until Kirk Trimble crossed the goal line on a one-yard lunge for the first score of the game.

The running attack of Kristen Trimble and Eric Sensabaugh and the passing attack supplied by quarterback Will Duggan to Kirk Travis moved the ball on the 9 play scoring drive.

Colorado City began their next series at their 25 yard line.

Quarterback Kelly Ramsey came out firing a strike to David Castillo for a 23 yard gain, the Wolves only first down in the half.

As the second quarter started, the Wolves still had the ball at approximately the same spot - their 47 yard line - and were forced to punt the ball away.

Kirk Travis then provided the moment of magic for the Ballinger fans with an 80 yarder, when he looked like he had been stopped almost after he had gathered the ball.

Colorado City started again at their own 24 yard line. Two incomplete passes and a 2 yard run by Kevin Green brought up 4th down and 8, another punting situation.

With 9:54 remaining in the first half, Ballinger began to operate from their own 44 yard line.

The Wolves stopped their running game and caused them to

punt on 4th down after only gaining 6 yards in 3 attempts.

Colorado City failed to make anything of the effort as three plays later they were punting the ball back to the Bearcats.

Ballinger began to move the ball from their own 30 yard line with 6:57 showing on the clock.

They worked the ball across mid-field to the Colorado City 20 yard line before giving up the ball on downs, but they had effectively milked the clock down to just :20 remaining on the clock.

On a second down play, Ballinger intercepted and took possession of the ball.

The very next play - the last play of the first half - Mark Smith intercepted a Ballinger pass.

The teams went to the locker room with Ballinger ahead 14-0.

The Wolves kicked off to the Bearcats again to start the second half.

Ballinger fumbled on their first play of the series, then Colorado City fumbled the ball right back on the very next play.

The Bearcats began again two yards further back - on their 25 yard line - than they had begun after the kickoff.

They could only move the ball 14 yards before they were forced to punt the ball to the Wolves.

Colorado City only ran three plays before punting the ball back.

Ballinger started with the ball on Colorado City's 36 yard line and kept the ball on the ground to edge towards the goal line.

A twenty yard run by Trimble down to the Wolves 3 yard line put the Bearcats against the door with less than 5 minutes left in the third quarter.

Moments later, Duggan scored on a quarterback keeper from one yard out to provide the final score of the game.

The Wolves showed some fire in their next possession.

Quarterback Ramsey connected for a 31 yard pass to David Castillo on the first play of the drive that started on the Colorado City 15 yard line.

Kevin Green carried the ball the next 5 plays and moved the Wolves down to the Ballinger 27 yard line with 1:44 left in the third quarter.

An incomplete pass and a Coty

Strain run for 5 yards and a penalty that was declined by Ballinger brought up fourth down and 1.

Kevin Green took the ball across the line and moved the chains down to the 20 yard line.

On the next play, Green again rambled with the ball, this time down to the Ballinger 16 yard line. The only difference was that he didn't get up after the play was over.

Green was taken from the field to have his ankle examined at the Mitchell County Hospital.

Reports indicate that he has a bad sprain and will return to action next week.

A 13 yard quarterback sack ended the drive with 11:22 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Ballinger kept the ball on the ground for the remainder of the game. With a third down and seven situation, Sensabaugh broke loose for a 18 yard run up the middle of the field and let the Bearcats work the clock down to the 6:40 mark before giving the ball back.

Colorado City made another first down pass combination between Ramsey and Castillo work for 24 yards to take the ball out to the 44 yard line, but the drive stalled and

the Wolves again punted the ball away.

On second down, Gene Rogers recovered a Ballinger fumble at the 20 yard line.

Colorado City charged onto the field.

Ramsey completed a 7 yard pass to Doug Conner to move the ball down to the thirteen yard line.

Chris Williams, filling the shoes for injured Kevin Green, was given the call on the next three plays and moved the ball down to the 4 yard line before a fumble ended the drive.

Ballinger ran two more plays and moved the ball out to the 22 yard line before the clock had slid down to just 1:40 left in the game.

It only took quarterback Duggan two kneedown snaps to run out the clock and leave Colorado City with a win under their belts.

Coach Ramsey noted that the Wolves will be facing Stanton next week. "They have 8 offensive and 9 defensive players returning from last year," he noted, "it will be a challenging game, but we'll be ready for them."

Last year Colorado City was able to slip past Stanton with 8 seconds remaining in the game.


Mitchell County to receive state funds

State Representative Robert Junell today announced the awarding of \$28,662 to Mitchell County to provide substance abuse education services. The funding is part of more than \$74 million awarded by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse to continue and enhance anti-drug services to Texans for the September 1991 through August 1992 fiscal year.

"Alcohol and drug abuse is a root cause of many of our state's problems -- from unacceptable school dropout rates to the increased spread of AIDS, to the overcrowding of our prisons," said Rep. Junell in announcing the funding award. "Reducing the

demand for alcohol and other drugs - through intervention and treatment for those addicted to abusable substances, and through prevention and education to stop others before they start -- is the true answer to this problem."

The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse received 701 applications requesting more than \$130 million to fund chemical dependency programs throughout the state. The amount awarded is an increase of \$7.1 million over last year's funding, the result of increased federal dollars made available through the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Services Block grant and the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act.



The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$7,659 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$4,067 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.77 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.
