AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 7.—The house today adopted the concurrent resolution asking Governor Miriam A. Ferguson to immediately resign from office in accordance with her campaign promise to Dan Moody, democratic nominee for governor.

The vote was 54 to 47 with five not voting.

When the resolution was sent over to the senate, point of order was raised by Senator Bailey, Dewitt county, that it was a matter not contained in the governor's proclamation concerning the special session and had not been submitted in a special message since opening of the session.

AGREE ON SCHOOL BILL

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 7.—The senate and house free conference committee this morning reached an agreement on the bill making appropriation to supplement the available school fund. The agreement provides for an appropriation of \$2,500,000, with provision that if there is any additional revenue provided by the 40th Legislature for schools they shall be deducted from the appropriation so as to permit a per capita apportionment of not exceeding \$14 for the current school year.

The vote by which the agreement was reached by the free conference committee was 5 to 2. Senator Fairchild and Representative Wallace, who voted against the agreement, announced they would present a minority report insisting on a sufficient appropriation to permit a \$15 per capita apportionment.

CHURCH WAR AND RUSSIAN ROW GO INTO BACKGROUND AS A. F. L. PLANS TO UNIONIZE AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 7.—Although it presents a front far from consolidated upon the question of recognizing soviet Russia, no such hesitancy was revealed by the convention of the American Federation of Labor Thursday in passing a resolution authorizing President William Green to take definite steps in a campaign to organize the automobile workers of America.

The move to unionize the automobile industry means more to this automotive center than anything else likely to develop from the national labor gathering and dwells in potential importance the federation's clash with the Y. M. C. A. and local churches.

Detroit automobile manufacturers are overwhelmingly for the open shop and they have taken steps to organize against any advance of the trades union movement.

That a fight impending upon the resolution to recognize soviet Russia comes before the convention seemed likely from the reception accorded a speech delivered by Sherwood Eddy, international secretary for A. F. of L. M. C. A.

MAY FLOOD COAL MINES OF ENGLAND STRIKERS DECLARE

90,000 SAFETY MEN IN
SHAFTS WILL BE
WITHDRAWN

Gov't Is to Make War

WILL SEND NAVAL ENGINEERS
TO GUARD MINES
FROM STRIKERS

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Striking English coal miners have met a governmental ultimatum with flat rejection, a rally call to all British labor, and preparation for desperate steps to continue their flight.

A vote to withdraw 90,000 safety men from the mines and possibly to approve flooding of every pit in England, followed rejection by the national delegates conference here Tuesday of Premier Baldwin's proposal for settlement of the five month strike.

Resolutions urging a stricter embargo on foreign coal, forbidding miners to handle surface coal and requesting a special session of the trades union congress to discuss a financial levy for the miners also were passed.

Authentic figures show that of the one million miners who went on strike, 136,750 are back at work. This is an increase of 2,354 over the figure of Wednesday.

PLANES TO FIGHT YAKUS

Mexicans Send for Airships to Sub-
due Warring Indians

TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 7.—The warring Yaqui Indians who recently ambushed a battalion of Mexican federal troops in the Mexican Sonora desert, will be subdued by air attacks in the future, Consul Juan Anconedo announced here Thursday.

Major Pablo Sidor of the Mexican army, has been commissioned to come to the United States to purchase airplanes and they will be used immediately in the campaigns against the Yakus.

ABOARD THE CARDINALS' SPECIAL TRAIN, EN ROUTE FOR NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The St. Louis Cardinals, after their defeat by the Yankees, are en route to New York to see the world's championship.

Rogers Hornsby, whose thrill of victory was striped of all meaning by the sadness of his mother's death on the very eve of the series, declared Thursday night as the two teams sped eastward that his ball team would win the world's championship.

SOUTHERN FINANCIERS AT
U. S. BANKERS' MEET
FOR PROGRAM

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7.—Endorsement of the national administration policy in dealing with foreign governmental debts and approval of the McFadden branch bank bill without the Hull amendment, had been accomplished when the 52nd convention of the American Bankers Association adjourned here Thursday.

The second largest banking conference held in the United States in the past 52 years terminated when 7,000 delegates began a two-day holiday before returning to their homes.

Emergency measures to relieve farmers of eight major cotton raising states of the South were taken up at a special meeting of Southern bankers.

Resolutions endorsing the following program was passed:

Twenty-five percent reduction in cotton acreage in one crop section, orderly marketing of cotton so producers may receive largest financial returns from crops; the pledge of credit facilities of southern bankers to aid in financing holdings on all actual cotton that can be marketed until there is a demand for the commodity at a satisfactory price.

Upon the return of the bankers from this territory from scheduled pleasure trips, a meeting will be called to consider adoption of these resolutions.

SAILORS DISAPPROVE OF GIRL THEY SEE ON SHORE TODAY

By VIRGINIA SWAIN

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The new style in girls is a big failure so far as the sailing man is concerned.

From champion Don Juan, he has turned woman hater, says Mrs. Janet Roper, house mother of the Seaman's Church Institute of New York.

Wild hair, varnished cheeks and gold digging have proved too much for men who spend midnight watches dreaming of the gentleness of the stevedore in whose arms they expect to forget the hardships of the sea.

For thirty years Mrs. Roper has been listening to the love stories, the hopes and fears and pettinesses of men on shore leave.

"If sailors no longer want a girl in every port, it isn't because they are converted to monogamy," she says. "It is because they can't find the kind of girls they like. Men who see so little of women throughout the years become incurable idealists."

Sailors Remember Her
In 30 years of social service work among seamen, Mrs. Roper has learned more of sea life, foreign ports, navigation and racial psychology than perhaps any woman has ever known before.

Every wind has blown to her bits of knowledge, as she waited by the docks. Her mail brings letters from old sailors who she befriended years ago when she worked among the whaling taverns of Boston.

Her friendships encompass all nations, and her name is known on Chinese junks as well as on American merchant vessels.

On her wall hang gifts and foreign pictures, and the memorial certificate sent by the government to "the nearest friend" of a young marine killed in the war.

The 30 years have brought her various rewards—a sense of humor, tolerance for weakness, faith in humanity, and a household of parrots that she says: "Seamen love animals," she says.

"They will smuggle little scrawny kittens and pups into this building under their coats, in spite of rules, and spend their last cent on food for a pet monkey."

"A parrot is the handsomest gift they can think of for a friend. But because of the birds sea-going vocabulary, I have to give them away. I've distributed enough parrots in my day to stock a bird store."

Janet Roper's job at the institute is to supply feminine sympathy. She dispenses good advice, buttons, cheery conversation, library books and in extreme cases, money.

"The seaman's life is hard at best," she says. "It takes natural family relationships, social pleasures and

the solid security of the landman's life. But it gets a hold on men that can't be broken.

"Considering absences and temptations, I think it surprising that sailing men are as faithful to their families as they are."

The trouble oftenest poured out to Mrs. Roper is homesickness.

"Through every phase of a sailor's life runs the little longing for a place of his own on dry land. The romance of strange ports and foreign peoples may hold him, but at heart he is always hungry for his native town."

"At the piano the favorite songs are 'My Little Gray Home in the West' and similar ballads. Homesickness even vouches through such burlesque 'drunk' songs as 'Show Me the Way to Go Home.'"

"It's my job to make this place as much like home for these wanderers as I can. I'm not much concerned with sectarian religion. Though I began as a church mission worker, I've learned that creed doesn't count much. It's the inner light that I try to awaken. I want a man to be conscious of his spirit."

"Not long ago, three men told me that I had awakened in them an interest in the spiritual when I talked at a Sunday night meeting. Later one of them entered the Dominican Brotherhood, another went to the Moody Institute, and the third went into Hindu Theosophy. I was just as happy about one as another."

Janet Roper objects to the name "mother" as applied to herself, because it suggests a sentimental relationship. "I'm not maternal, I'm only friendly," she insists. "I'm genuinely interested in each man."

"And I'm shocked at nothing."

Which may be the reason why so many men who go down to the sea in ships come home again eagerly, year after year, to the welcome of Janet Roper.

A FEEDING CENTER

We are of the opinion that Lubbock being the hub of the Plains, and the railroad center of this part of the country, there should be established here a feeding center for cattle, sheep and hogs, and we believe there is in the minds of the Chamber of Commerce to start something like this if they can get the necessary backing of people who should be vitally interested in the proposition.

The South Plains has this year, and will always have, a tremendous surplus food crop, and this must be utilized in some way. We must find a market for this produce, and we are going to have to bring the market to Lubbock. To ship the feed is too uncertain. It costs too much to ship it. The market too, is very uncertain, and for that reason we are going to have to market this feed crop by feeding it to livestock. We believe that if a plan can be worked out whereby the necessary pens and feeding equipment can be furnished, we can make this a great feeding center for cattle, sheep and hogs. This will be a help to the people who have stuff to feed, and it will be a great help to the fletchers who have the feed to sell. It will make a market for the feed and at the same time create a market for the yearlings and the surplus cattle, hogs and sheep that our farmers may have. To our way of thinking, we can see big dividends from an arrangement like this.

We think the Chamber of Commerce is on the right track in this matter, and if we can get the people aroused to the importance of diversified farming to such extent that the farmers will plant feed, corn, etc., and also raise a few cows and sheep as well as a bunch of porkers for sale as the feed season arrives, there can be a general turning of the farm products of this section of the country into cash, showing a good profit to the farmers.

We think the time has arrived in this country whereby we must take care of the agricultural interests, as this is the main source of revenue, and in order to do that, we must get far away from the one crop idea, and bring into full swing a strict, well regulated, well balanced system of raising cotton, wheat, corn, and the various articles of the truck farm, along with some sheep and hogs, and several extra cows, and a good lot of poultry, not forgetting for a moment the wonderful opportunities of the dairying industry of the South Plains.

With the already good market for poultry and the poultry products that is furnished the people of this section and with the establishment of a feeding center here for the livestock that can be raised this country can be made very prosperous and the farming class of people will come in for the big end of the prosperity, which means that the entire population will get their proportionate share of the money made. There is food for much thought, and a co-operative move on the part of the commercial organization, the farm organizations and the wholesale dealers there can be fine results come from the suggestion.

CARING FOR THE CHILDREN

In all disasters there are more children suffer than any other class of people, especially is this true of the disasters that befall people in their homes, such as the storms and the floods, the earthquakes and fires. This was true of the recent storms in Florida which took its toll of parents, and some children of course, but leaving thousands of children homeless. Here the "heartless millionaires" close their pocketbooks—no they don't they come to the rescue. The announcement was made in a few days of a fund for the destitute children, and is headed by the cereal king, W. F. Kellogg of Battle Creek, Michigan. Children were selected as the beneficiaries of the fund after consultation with Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, the daughter of William Jennings Bryan, and the only woman on the Miami Central Relief Committee. At the present time Mrs. Owen is serving as a resident relief worker at Coral Gables. There are, Mrs. Owen stated, thousands of children whose parents have been killed or injured. Many of these children are pitifully destitute. Contributions are urgently needed if they are to be properly cared for. Money available before the establishment of the new fund was equirred for the care of the sick and injured, and could not be diverted to the care of other cases. In accordance with Mrs. Owen's suggestions, \$5,000 has already been wired to Coral Gables to be expended for the benefit of the children of the hurricane swept territory by a committee composed of Mrs. Owen, Dr. Benjamin Powell, pastor of the Coral Gables Community Church; and Dr. Tallman, of the Tallman Hospital, Coral Gables. Coral Gables has

been selected as the headquarters for the administration of the fund because of the comparatively slight damage suffered by the city and because of the sanitary conditions prevailing there. This has resulted in the concentration of large numbers of refugees in Coral Gables. The Miami-Biltmore Hotel, Coral Gables, housed 2,000 refugees immediately following the hurricane. The Tallman Hospital, with a normal capacity of 30 beds, has treated over 500 cases and is caring for the entire southwest area of Miami.

There is one thing that can be said about big America. She nearly always responds readily to the care of children, and this is certainly one of the splendid things about this nation. Unlike many of the other nations of the world, America has a heart for the suffering children.

USING THE FACE AND PHYSICAL CULTURE

Gone are the days of that calm, egg-like placidity of countenance, so long heralded as the surest preservative of beauty. If you want to save your face, use it. This is the latest advice offered in papers and magazines. Pouting, it seems, keeps the lips full and youthful. Smiling lifts the cheek muscles. But the smile must be with lips alone—no pleasant crinkling around the eyes. Rolling the eyes is advocated as the only means of exercising them. If your eyes are dull and heavy it is not from late hours, or rich food, oh, far from so. It is because the poor things are feeling the need of their daily roll. Chewing and biting, whether it be of food, or the hand that feeds you, or just going through the motions, makes for a clear-cut jaw line. Sniffing refines the nostrils. One article suggests that all these things be done "at every opportunity, on bus, or train or car." Thumbing the nose and running out the tongue were not mentioned, but doubtless it would be well to add two ancient and honorable exercises as conducive to grace and freedom of expression. Standing on the head for an hour or two every day would be good, also, making gravity pull the other way, for a change. It's a fine idea, full of possibilities, and its cheapness recommends it. Why not all take it up and make faces at every opportunity? Even if the resultant beauty be less than we hoped, the returns in mirth would be infinite.

ONLY HIS LIFE

Are we losing our active interest in politics? Registration reports from many states in the last few months seem to indicate that we are—if we ever had any. In the principal city of one state the first day of registration for the state elections showed that about 22,000 voters out of a total of 300,000 had registered. While succeeding registration days will increase the roll, nothing like a full vote is expected when election day comes. Similar apathy is reported throughout the state. Men and women alike seem indifferent. One reason given for the lack of interest is that it is "only a state election." "Only a state election," with everything involved from the governorship down, including the personnel of the courts, and representation at Washington. In any city or state the voters will have exactly the kind of government which they bring about. Can we afford to lose interest in what concerns us so closely? Yet he who does not register cannot vote. Which is to say, he cannot have any say about the conditions under which he lives his own life.

THE HURRICANE SEASON

The news from Vera Cruz, added so swiftly to that from Florida, together with Florida's second scare, is rather terrifying. Where will this end?

It is a comfort to learn that hurricanes have their regular seasons, just as northern snows do, and that the reason is just about over. The height of the season, writes an expert in the Boston Transcript, is reached during August and the first part of September. Over 54 per cent of the true hurricanes over a period of 37 years were found to have come within this six week period. When a "tropical disturbance" starts in June, the chances are three and one-half in nine that it will grow up into a real, life-size hurricane. The chances increase until the first half of September, when they are six and one-half in nine. Then they decrease until November, when they run down to one in nine.

Even one in nine sounds like one too many to the people who have just been through the experience. But only a few of the hurricanes, all in all, strike land. And September is gone, taking with it the most serious danger.

THE THING TO STUDY

Young people pondering in which branches of study to specialize, will do well to consider the foreign languages, especially French, Spanish, German and Italian. The reason for this suggestion is that business interests in this country already are embarked upon a tremendous drive for foreign trade. Marked as the movement is, it is small in comparison to what will develop in the next few years. As a result there is already a demand for persons with some knowledge of foreign languages. The openings are many and varied. They will increase in number and variety as business expands. It is a field as wide as the world, crowded with possibilities for interest, adventure and success. Happy the youth who fits himself to take advantage of it.

This is an age of better production, keep high grade stock. The scrub cattle hogs, poultry, horses or mules. The very best is the cheapest and it should be the aim of every farmer to keep high grade stock. The scrub that as much as the high grades and they do not produce anything like as much, which means that they are expensive in the long run. One good cow that will produce five or six gallons of milk per day is better investment than three cows that will not produce any more.

ON WHETHER YOU LOVE YOUR WORK, SAYS AUTHOR SUCCESS, BE IT BUSINESS OR MATRIMONIAL DEPENDS ENTIRELY

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Why all this talk about the qualities that make for success in business and those that make for success in matrimony—as if they were so different, when they are exactly the same questions. Helen Woodward, business woman, wife and author.

"You make a success in any job because you love it," she says. "You make a successful wife because you love your husband. Failures are merely people doing work they hate and doing it badly. That applies to wives and business women alike."

Mrs. Woodward rose from a frightened, shy, and inefficient office girl to one of the most successful and highly paid advertising women in the country. She is the wife of D. E. Woodward, the writer. Many of the experiences that colored the adventurous road from typist to executive are taken up in her new book "Through Many Windows."

Most are Misfits

She has viewed her fellow workers with an understanding mind and a sympathetic heart. The stenographer who can't spell and won't learn, the office girl who bails up every message and the woman executive who can't get along with her employees—all are that they are because they are misfits, she claims.

"When people are doing what they like and are naturally fitted for, they don't have to be urged or goaded. They turn on full speed and inevitably reach their goal."

The business world is full of failures because established values need to be scrapped and the happiness in a job as well as the ultimate success needs to be taken into consideration. The journey is as important as the goal.

MOORE.
 "Many women would actually love to sell merchandise, or do housework, but they believe teaching is more dignified and carries the suggestion of superior mentality. So they try to be teachers."

"There are countless women who correspond with the outdoor type of man, who love athletics and healthy physical labor, but they don't take this into consideration when they fit themselves into a job, and the first thing you know a Diana is trying to become a bookkeeper or stenographer."

Women, and men too, should take more time in choosing a job or profession, and should harmonize their work to their natural inclinations and

temperaments, and do the work that interests them, despite the standing or lack of standing that the job implies, Mrs. Woodward believes.

"Nothing aids you in your job like loving it," she insists. "Just as nothing makes you overlook your husband's faults as does being honestly in love with him."

Dangerous Age.
 Mrs. Woodward believes that business women make the most successful wives, particularly those who wait until they are 30 or more before they venture afterward.

The business woman, that is the successful one, who marries late, marries for just one reason, she points out. "It's because she actually cares for the man. She is particular, yes, probably a bit fussy. But she has made a success of one hard job, and is ready to tackle another."

"But thirty is a dangerous age to embark on a career. Because a woman who has waited until that age to start usually is impelled, not by a love for the work she selects but because of reverses of fortune or by boredom."

"It is not used to making quick decisions, she has not been disciplined by particular business demands efficiency as well as charm, and she has no resistance to daily routine. She mistakes talking about work and evidences of activity for actual labor. And it's hard to be in love with your job unless you get its knacks before thirty."

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SHERDEL BREAKS IN 10TH AND YANKS WIN

ST EDWARDS CATHOLICS TO CLASH WITH MATADORS TODAY

FATE SNATCHES VICTORY FROM GRASP OF ASPIRING CARDINALS BEFORE THIRTY-NINE THOUSAND BOOSTERS

SPORTSMAN'S PARK, ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—Fate plucked victory from the eager hands of the St. Louis Cardinals Thursday and deposited it in the laps of the unexpected Yanks.

In a ten inning game replete with thrills, brilliant and boneheaded fielding and extraordinary happenings the Yanks came from behind to beat the National League champions, 3 to 2.

Billy Sherdel, with the forefinger of his pitching hand almost crippled by a carelessly handled ball, went down to his second defeat at the last moment, just when the Cardinals appeared to be certain of victory.

Three hits in a row in the first of the ninth, with Ben Paschal, a pinch hitter, having the final punch, tied the score after many St. Louis fans had left the park and started home, convinced every one that the game was over and the Cards had won.

Herby Pennock, who chalked up his second victory of the present series by holding St. Louis to six hits and could riding out the waves of seeming disaster that threatened to sweep him from time to time, proved his greatness in the final pinch by turning back the fighting Cards.

It was the Yanks who possessed the winning drive and in the tenth inning Sherdel cracked and let in the winning run.

Those mysterious things known as "the breaks" beat St. Louis.

The Yankees, with a one-game edge on the series, and needing but one victory to become world's champions, can thank fate more than their own playing for the situation.

For five innings, Sherdel, despite his finger, which was jammed when he caught one of Bob O'Farrell's fast returns on the fly, held the American league champions ransom.

Meanwhile, Lester Bell's rule had punched over the first run for the Cards in the fourth. Then in the fifth at lucky double by Pennock, which should have been an easy out, and a badly muffed up play at second base which once again should have retired the Yank pitcher, contrived to tie the score. Mark Koenig's single drove in this run.

Koenig was the batting hero and the fielding goal of the game. Lester Bell chimed in with a double in the 7th and when O'Farrell's third hit of the day sent him romping home the game seemed as good as over.

But it all went for naught. In the ninth Lou Gehrig's double-fell safe when it should have been caught. Lazzeri and Paschal hit safely and the score was tied. Pennock, who really pitched a great game and allowed but seven hits, stuck to his task and held the Cards hitless for three in the tenth. He permitted Koenig a single, threw in a wild pitch, walked one batter and hit another.

After the bases had been purposely filled in the tenth with one out, "Push 'em Up" Tony Lazzeri did that very thing. He pushed up a high fly to Chick Hafey, and Koenig raced home after the catch.

Bang went the ball game. A record crowd of 39,553 left with out a word.

With this game over, St. Louis had farewell to its first world series. Three days of unprecedented excitement had left the populace satisfied and hoarse, but the dried-in-the-wool St. Louis fans lingered to cheer the Cardinals on their way to New York, where, in the opinion of every one in this Missouri mad house, they will clinch the base ball championship of the world.

The spectacular collision between Chick Hafey and Taylor Douthett during the fourth game took its toll in the Card outfield, for the St. Louis center fielder was unable to play in Thursday's contest because of his still shuddering, injured in the crash. Holm took Douthett's place.

Hafey made the first put out of the game, loping in for Earl Combs' sk/scraper. When Babe came to bat a barrage of cheer burst from the stands to increase one hundred fold, when Sherdel fed the Babe slow balls and Ruth went out an easy boundary to Hornsby. Thus the game began, with the bedlam in the stands and bleachers more tumultuous than in any game thus far in the series.

To add to the frenzy of the fans, Mark Koenig kicked in with one of his customary errors in the Cards' half of the first. Billy Southworth, who benefitted by this crack in the Yank defense, promptly stole second but his team mates could not get him home.

A fast double play, Hornsby to Bottomley, saved a run in the second, after Lou Gehrig and Tony Lazzeri had slugged to quick succession and put Sherdel into a tight hole.

The Cards pitcher turned in one of the star fielding plays of the series of the Yanks' half third, when he speared Pennock's line drive to the box with his glove hand.

Bob O'Farrell follows this with an amazing quick pickup and throw of "Cupid's" tap in front of the plate, retiring the center fielder at first.

This was just one more example of O'Farrell's greatness as a catcher.

On Ruth's next appearance at the plate, Sherdel could not get his slow ball over, and he walked the Babe and followed this by striking out Gehrig.

The homecoming of cowboys, horns and yells broke loose, only more to the Cards' half of the fourth, when Jim Bottomley crashed a Texas

leaguer to left field. Babe Ruth came tearing in in a desperate attempt to catch the ball, and as a result, missed it entirely. Bottomley was awarded a two-base hit by the official scorers.

Lester Bell then brought down the house by slapping a single to center, scoring Bottomley with the first run of the game.

Then it was Babe Ruth's turn to make the greatest catch of the series.

Hafey lifted a long fly which was dropped into the temporary boxes beyond the left line when the Babe came tearing in on the dead run.

Ruth dashed along the wire fence, leaped over as he ran, stuck out his gloved hand and speared the ball. Mark Koenig then kicked O'Farrell's drive into the air, but the play was scored as a base hit for the Cards' catcher. On the next pitch, Thelma hit to Koenig who threw low to first, but Gehrig scooped up the throw. One out and Farrell on second, but Sherdel fanned and Koenig threw out Holm.

An unusual break of luck gave Pennock's double in the sixth. Hafey started in after the Yank pitcher's fly, misjudged it, slipped and went down on one knee. Before he could get up, the ball had tumbled to the fence. Then O'Farrell, with a quick snap throw, caught Pennock off-second, but Thelma, who speared the ball with one hand, dropped it, and Herbie was safe once more.

A moment later, Pennock, who should have been out at least twice in this inning, raced home on Koenig's single to left. In the meantime, Combs had walked and there were two Yanks on the bases with none out and Ruth at bat.

Here was world's series drama. Billy Sherdel stepped into the hero role. With the count two and two on the Babe, the St. Louis hurler struck a fast one over for the third strike, and the stands cut loose as Ruth sent the air with a mighty whiff and retired to the bench with hanging head.

Southworth made a brilliant catch when with the bases full of Yanks Tony Lazzeri slugged out a potential home run. The ball fell just inside the park, and there was Southworth, edging gingerly along with his heels against his concrete, in just the place to catch it.

In the Cards' half of the sixth, Earl Combs contributed a spectacular running catch of Hornsby's drive to cut off what seemed like a certain hit.

Thunder of drumming heels and tumult of hand clapping accompanied Lester Bell's double which opened the Cards' half.

This was nothing to the commotion created by O'Farrell's single to left field, which brought left home with the run that broke the tie. It was Bob's third consecutive hit of the game.

Confusion came into the contest in the ninth inning. Gehrig lifted a short fly to left, which went for a double when Hafey let Thelma try for it instead of taking it himself. Lazzeri pointed down the third base line, and Ben Paschal to bat for Joe Dugan and the disgruntled Yank third baseman threw his hat away in disgust as he left the field.

The manager's move was justified however, when Paschal popped a single to short center field, scoring Gehrig.

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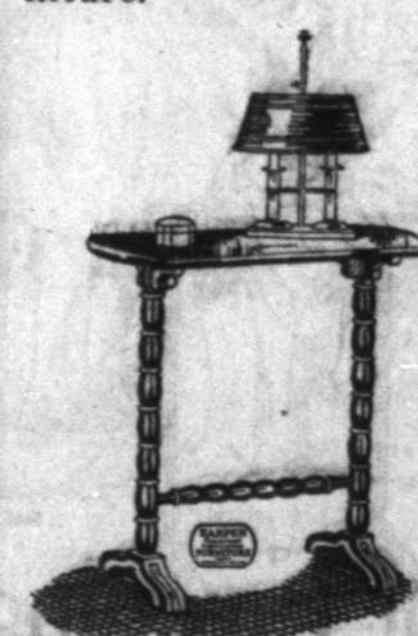

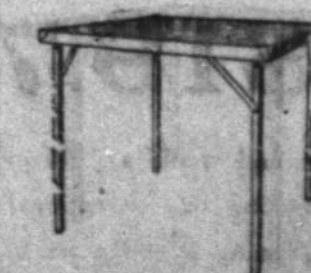

ACCOMMODATIONS TO TOURISTS NOT GOOD

AMERICAN AUTOMOBILE ASSOCIATION FINDS THIS COMPLAINT TRUE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 7.—Following on the heels of many complaints received during the 1926 touring season in regard to the poor quality of food and accommodations given by many of the farm houses and boarding houses catering to motor tourist travel along the highways, the American Automobile Association issued a statement today declaring that the state health authorities must expect their licensing and supervision to such places in the interest of public health and safety.

The complaints which prompted the A. A. A. investigation and today's statement came from every section of the country. It having been found that there is everywhere along the highways places offering tourist accommodations that are in no way equipped to give a standard of service that safeguards health requirements.

The A. A. A. said the statement, fully recognizes that the growth of motor touring in recent years has created a demand for lodgings along the highways. It is equally clear, however, that many undesirable places have come into this type of catering and to make the matter worse "Gyp" outfits encourage such places by selling them signs and picturing lots of easy money.

"In too many instances," said Thomas Henry, President of the A. A. A., "these boarding houses do not come up to the minimum requirements of the state health departments either as regards sanitation or food and water."

The A. A. A. statement continued: "At the moment, there is no regulation or supervision whatever of these establishments. The number of complaints forthcoming indicate clearly that in a great many instances they are not equipped to take care adequately of the traveling public. In many instances the conditions do not come anywhere near modern sanitary requirements."

"In too many cases, the 'room and bath' advertised simply means one dilapidated bath in a house of ten rooms. Ninety-nine times out of a hundred, the tourist who enters such places has no knowledge what eyes of who is running them, what previous sickness the place may have harbored, or whether he can depend on getting pure food and untainted water. The situation is aggravated by 'Gyp' outfits which start many unqualified people in the business of catering to motorists by selling them signs that mislead the motorist as to the character of the place."

Every student at Centenary is preparing to make the trip according to the Centenary scout who witnessed the Trinity-S. M. U. game in an effort to diagram the Mustang plays. A very low rail rate has been made and the students are going to take advantage of it, believing they will journey to Dallas to see their eleven coaches, the student body, Dr. Sexton and the faculty, are set for the game. Since the day the game was scheduled they have prepared for it, for a win over S. M. U. would be sweet meat for the rival Methodists.

Centenary has eleven letter men, the same number that greeted Ray Morrison at the opening of the season. Reports from Centenary indicate that some of the letter men are having a hard time making the club—that the youngsters are forcing them to step for the positions. Their backs are powerful, scoring two touchdowns against T. C. U. in their first quarter, and it will be too bad for the Mustangs if their forward wall falls to hold.

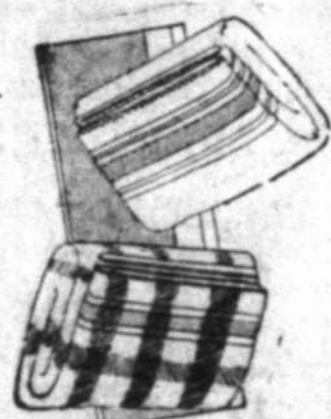

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MAIN BUILDING SAFE AT "STATE"

WON'T TEAR DOWN HISTORIC
STRUCTURE ON AUSTIN
CAMPUS

AUSTIN, TEX., Oct. 7.—Loyal Texas-exes who became alarmed over the fate of the historic Main Building whenever mention is made of the erection of a new building on the University of Texas campus have need of no fear. The Main Building, begun in 1882 and completed in 1889, will probably stand as it now is for another twenty years, according to Dr. W. T. Mather of the University building committee.

Although parts of the building have been condemned for many years, it has been necessary to continue using the entire building. Ever since it has become known that the plans for a greater University of Texas allotted the site of the Main Building to a quadrangle, it has become well known how much sentiment about the structure is stored in the hearts of former students. The most Texas-exes the Main Building and Varsity are almost synonymous terms. Originally all departments of the University were housed within the Main Building. Gradually the various departments have grown to such extent that separate structures have been necessary and wooden shacks for many years took care of the overflow.

As Garrison Hall, Biology Building, and the Library, the three buildings last erected on the University campus are on the same level, the plans for the Main Building are located. The greater University program provides for a mall extending north and south and another east and west to the limits of the University campus from the central quadrangle where the Main Building now stands.

CHURCHES TO BUILD FOR A. & M. BOYS

SEVERAL DENOMINATIONS WILL
ERECT BUILDING OF THEIR
OWN THIS YEAR

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., Oct. 7.—Religious activities of the various denominational groups at the A. and M. College of Texas are well under way for the present school year. It is expected that several churches at the college will erect buildings of their own just north of the campus during the next 9 months, on ground purchased in past years. Most group services are now conducted in college lecture rooms.

According to reports compiled to date, the denominations are represented as follows in the student body: Methodist, 641; Baptist, 589; Presbyterian, 232; Christian, 182; Episcopal, 118; Catholic, 119; Lutheran, 58; Church of Christ, 58; Jewish Reformed Church, 15. These figures will be increased when registration records are completed, and as additions are made to groups.

Religious convocation is held each Sunday morning at 10:15 o'clock in Guion Hall, the college auditorium. This service is compulsory for all students, and is also attended by campus residents and Bryan people. Leading religious workers of the state are invited to conduct these services. Station WTAW, the college radio broadcasting station, features these weekly services.

A union Sunday school is conducted in Guion Hall each Sunday for all students and campus residents who are not affiliated with some group, under the direction of M. L. Cashion, secretary of the Y. M. C. A.

Rev. J. C. Thomson, Methodist pastor, has been at work on the campus for the past two years. Services for his group are conducted in the Methodist tabernacle. A parsonage is planned for erection in the near future, to replace the temporary structure now in use.

The Baptist group is in charge of Rev. R. L. Brown, who has been at the college for the past six years. The group services are filling the temporary quarters in use, and plans are under way for the erection of a church building on ground adjoining the pastor's home off the campus.

At present the Presbyterian work is under the direction of Dean F. C. Bolton of the college but a pastor has been called and plans are being completed for the erection of a pastor's home before Christmas. Services for the group are held in the Y. M. C. A. building.

The Episcopal group has started out this year with a new pastor. In former years services were led by the Bryan pastor and men from other cities. Rev. W. W. Daup, formerly of Rochester, Minn., has arrived on the campus and taken over the work. He was at one time head of the Episcopal work in Bryan. Ground has been purchased and a church will be erected during the next year. Services are now held in the Y. M. C. A. chapel.

The Christian group, with Dr. LeRoy Davidson of the college in charge, conducts services in Guion Hall with the union Sunday school.

Father J. B. Gleisner of Bryan conducts Mass each Sunday morning for the Catholic group. The have purchased ground for buildings, but at present one of the college class rooms is used for their services.

W. T. C. C. Opposing Sugar Rate Boost

ANSON, TEX., Oct. 7.—The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is opposing the increase in minimum car lots of sugar from six thousand pounds to sixty thousand pounds. As at present announced, the Interstate Commerce Commission has authorized an increase in the minimum weights to Oklahoma and Louisiana points. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce fears that in case the measure is not allowed to go through it will be but a short time until the same minimum car will be set for Texas points.

The organization in its brief opposing the increase sets forth the fact that the small towns and cities will be discriminated against by the increase. In the past the small city merchants have been able to purchase a minimum car load rate on the commodity. However, thirty six thousand pounds of sugar is almost the limit for the merchant in the average town of West Texas. Should he be compelled to purchase sixty thousand pounds of sugar in order to get the carload rate, he will be prevented from shipping sugar in car lot quantities and will be compelled to pay local freight rates for smaller shipments.

The difference in freight rates will force him to increase his price of sugar and the consumer of West Texas will be penalized.

The traffic bureau of the regional organization is proceeding upon the theory that an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure and is seeking to strike at the measure before it is applied to West Texas.

BUILDING CONTINUES IN CANYON UNABATED

CANYON, TEX., Oct. 7.—Canyon's building program has not checked. The new Olympic Theatre, erected by W. J. Wooten, has just been opened with a packed house; another theatre to be called the Strand will be established in the same spot of the former Olympic. Otto White, of Keosauqua, Iowa, is moving his equipment from that place to Canyon.

The Canyon Tailoring Company is planning an addition of an up-to-date laundry to the present tailoring plant.

DISCOVERER OF ANESTHESIA TO BE HONORED AT SESQUI

Dr. Crawford W. Long, who performed the first painless surgical operation with ether as an anesthetic, is to be memorialized at the University of Pennsylvania Exhibit at the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition in Philadelphia.

The University authorities have just received some relics for the exhibit made from the wood of the historic tree marking the spot where Dr. Long, Class of '39 Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, made this revolutionary step in surgery, March 20, 1842, in Jefferson, Georgia. The mementoes are a gravel made from the tree and a pen-holder.

WOMEN WANT SIX-DAY WEEK

THINK FIVE DAY WEEK OF WORK IS DREAM OF FUTURE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—While men labor leaders are seeking the five day week of forty hours, as inaugurated by Henry Ford, women have set their aim for the present at the six day week of 48 hours. Such is still an unrealistic ideal for female workers generally.

Officials of the women's bureau of the labor department would like to see general adoption of the five day week of forty hours for the millions of women who go to work daily in mills, stores, offices and factories, but they look upon that happy condition as very far in the future. There are many steps between general adoption of a six day week of 48 hours, is what they want at present.

Investigations completed recently in 18 states and two large cities show that a majority of women are working more than 48 hours a week and some as many as sixty hours a week, which is ten hours a day for six days—a week and a half under Ford's new scheme. The survey covered 2,695 establishments and is regarded by bureau officials as giving an accurate picture of conditions generally.

These establishments employ 232,874 women. Of these, 187,571 or 81 per cent work 48 hours a week or longer. The type of employment covered includes manufacturing and mechanical industrial transportation, trade, professional services and clerical occupations. Of the more than 8 million women employed in gainful occupations, more than five million are in these classes. Domestic and agricultural services were not included as a strict tabulation comparable to the ordinary employment of men in industry could not be made.

It is significant that the group including the women who work fifty hours a week, is the largest of any. There are 43,352 women who have long hours, or nearly a fifth. Second largest is the number of those who work 48 hours, which is 40,932. 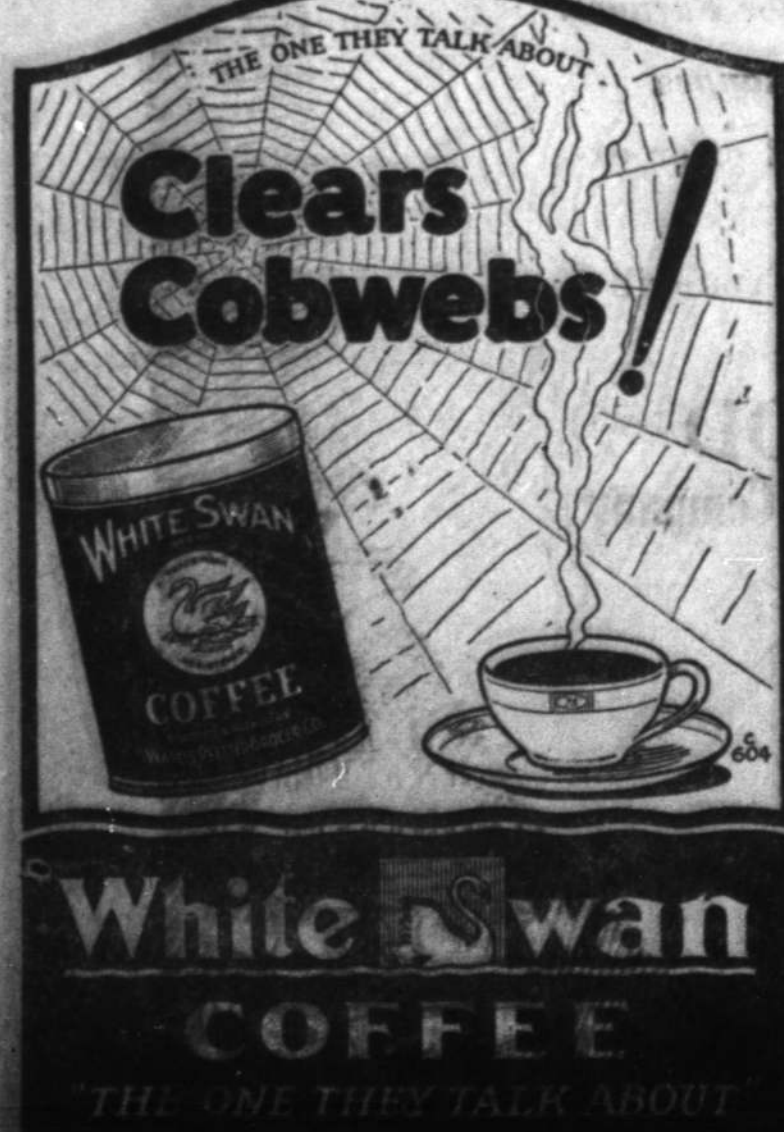

EVENING LETTER-COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 7.—While the market averaged slightly lower today, due to evening up accounts in advance of tomorrow's bureau report the undertone was comparatively steady considering the uncertainty attending Friday's government crop forecast.

There are indications for the return of unfavorable weather in the southwest where prospects are for increasing cloudiness and unsettled weather probably rain over the week-end.

The chief executives of the cotton states, banks and bankers of the southern states, the Federal financial officials are working in harmony, devising plans whereby the surplus of this year's crop may be held from the market until a better price is obtained. A meeting of delegates and governors of the southern states is to be held at Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 12, to confer over the present cotton situation in the south.

Three additional private crop estimates were issued today ranging from 15,425,000 to 16,550,000 bales and the average guess of members of the New York Cotton Exchange as to the indicated crop is 16,574,000 bales. The average of 13 private estimates issued so far, as to condition is 58.5, and as to the indicated yield, 15,960,000 bales ranging from 15,295,000 to 16,678,000 bales.

The pivot on which the market will swing is probably 16,000,000 bales. If the bureau report points to 16,200,000 bales or larger, the market will likely decline, probably advance if 16,000,000 or less.

Ginnings to October 1st are likely to be small compared with 7,126,000 to corresponding date last year, as ginnings to 8th pt. 16th were only 2,511,000 bales against 4,282,000 last year.

Trading in the American contract markets will be suspended tomorrow from 5 minutes before until 15 minutes after the government report, in New Orleans, 9:55 a. m. until 10:15 a. m. when trading will be resumed on a call.

The immediate future course of the market, therefore will likely depend mainly on the nature of tomorrow's government cotton crop forecast.

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POLITICAL BUNK FAILS TO TALLY

SCOUTS REPORT MORE APATHY
THAN USUAL AS VOTING
TIME NEARS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—Political
ballyhoo appears to be less effective
than usual this year. Scouts report
an unusual degree of apathy, although
election day is less than a month
away.

There is some interest in spots be-
cause of personalities such as in New
York state. Indiana seems to be on
the edge of an upheaval because of
kian political victory. But the coun-
try as a whole apparently doesn't
care who is elected. Indications are
that the vote will be even lighter than
in 1924, when half of the eligibles were
not sufficiently interested to go to the
polls.

Both parties have their loud speak-
ers on full time duty. They call it
a campaign to educate the voter. But
it neither educates nor interests.

Possibly this is due to a suspicion
that the politicians have nothing
valuable in a score of formal state-
ment while to say this year. The ev-
ents issued from various campaign
headquarters here during the last
few weeks tend to support this sus-
picion.

They reveal an affluence of words,
a poverty of ideas, and are stamped
all over with the trade mark of bun-
kum. Here are a few paste gems is-
sued by some of the campaign lead-
ers during the last few weeks:

Republican—"The country will not
vote against the party that has
brought about increased prices, wages,
activity in business."—Senator Phipps,
chairman republican senatorial cam-
paign committee.

Democratic—"We may expect soup
kitchens next winter if the unemploy-
ment (in the textile industry) contin-
ues, and no slogan that we are now
enjoying great prosperity will change
this. Facts, talk, loudness."—Senator
Gerry, chairman democratic campaign
committee.

Republican—"Economic chaos al-
ways follows democratic tariff laws."
—Representative Wood, chairman re-
publican congressional committee.

Democratic—"Every big panic since
the civil war has occurred either un-
der republican high tariff administra-
tion or high tariff legislation."—Dem-
ocratic book of facts.

Senator Phipps, September 24—"If
the people approve of President Cool-
idge and the abundant prosperity he
has wrought by sound and economical
administration, they should vote to
sustain him during the next two years
by the re-election of a republican
majority. This is the sole issue of the
present campaign."

Democratic—"The people realize that
an attitude of doing nothing will not
remedy present conditions and they
are turning to the democrats for the
intellectual heil and the moral
courage that is needed to handle the
present crisis."—Senator Gerry.

Republican—"The republican party
will organize the senate and the house
of representatives of the 70th con-
gress."—Senator Phipps.

Democratic—"The Senate is certain
to be democratic, and it looks now as
if the house would also."—Senator
Gerry.

Prohibition—no comment.

BRITISH LEAGUE MEETS SATURDAY

CANADIAN PARTICIPATION IN
LOCARNO TO BE DIS-
CUSSED

LONDON, Oct. 7.—Dominion partici-
pation in the Locarno peace pact, the
future diplomatic intercourse of the
dominions with the outside world,
and other questions as important, are
to be threshed out at the assembly of
Great Britain's private league of na-
tions—the Imperial conference that
meets Saturday, October 9.

The advance guard of dominion
prime ministers is arriving for the
conference, the first in three years.
One-fourth of the area and population
of the world, comprising the British
empire, will be represented.

Canada, Australia, New Zealand,
South Africa, New Zealand and the
Irish Free State will be represented
by their premiers. India will be rep-
resented by several Indian princes
and the Earl of Birkenhead, Indian
secretary in the Cabinet. The crown
colonies, such as the West Indies, will
be represented by Colonial Secretary
Amery and his assistants, the under
secretaries of colonial and dominion
affairs.

None of the important questions to
be discussed is likely to be settled,
finally at the meeting, except partici-
pation in the Locarno pact. The do-
minions are expected to say that they
will not be parties to it, but there is
little doubt that if Great Britain were
drawn into another world war thru
her responsibilities under it, the do-
minions, with the possible exception
of Southern Ireland, would participate.
The question of diplomatic repre-
sentation by the dominions in foreign
capitals, such as Canada at Washing-
ton, is likely to remain unsettled. The
British government will concede the

representative at Washington or any
other capital.

Australia and New Zealand are not
likely to want to appoint any diplo-
matic representatives. They stand for
unity in the empire.
