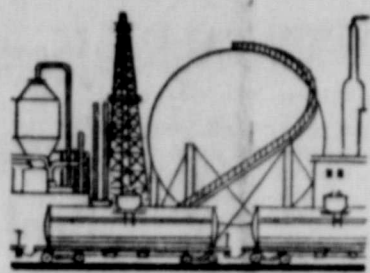

Bulldogs Blast Open 10-A Campaign Against Baird High Bears Friday Night

Coach Gerald Cumpston's Ranger High Bulldogs, after a rest from combat last Friday night, get back under the arcs Friday night to open their District 10-A grid wars.

The Maroon & Whites who have been toiling vigorously for eight days, will taper off with a light, limbering-up session Thursday afternoon on the eve of their first conference contest of the fall.

They're rated top-dogs in their clash with the Baird High Bears at Baird Friday night.

But anything can and may happen in the set-to between the rested Bulldogs and the winless Bears.

Opening kickoff is set for 8 p.m. and, as usual, a large entourage of Ranger Fans are due to follow the Bulldogs to their first and crucial conference test.

Coach Cumpston's crew sneaked by 7-AA Cisco, 15-13, four weeks ago in their opener; fell before powerful 7-AA Dublin, 14-0, rhw following week and prior to their open date week they whipped Class B Gorman 50-6.

The Bears have lost four

straight, scoring only 16 points against their opponents' combined 130.

Ranger's offense has tallied 65 points while the Maroon & White defense has grudgingly yielded 33 to their three non-conference foes.

The Bulldogs go into their initial 10-A combat with a considerable weight advantage. Ranger's starting eleven averages 176 pounds per man. Baird's first string offense averages 153 pounds.

10-A COMPETITION TO OPEN FRIDAY WITH CROSS PLAINS, DE LEON DUEL IN SPOTLIGHT

District 10-A play begins this weekend with three important conference clashes on tap for schoolboy grid fans.

Topping action will be De Leon's Bearcats and the Buffaloes of Cross Plains colliding at De Leon Friday night. The two 10-A clubs are rated the best in the seven-member circuit.

Cross Plains upset by Class B Rising Star last Friday night, 12-7, has a record of two wins against that loss. They've scored 53 points while their opponents have amassed a 58-point total.

The Bearcats, who pounded Comanche, 36-0, last weekend, have a two won-two lost record, and have scored 70 points against their opponents 28.

Another spotlight battle pits darkhorse Ranger High Bulldogs, 2-1, against the Baird High Bears who've lost four straight. The 10-A contest will be unrivaled at Baird.

Eastland's surprising Mavericks undefeated until they were shocked, 32-0, by the

powerful Dublin Lions of District 7-AA last Friday night at Eastland, will be attempting a comeback when they journey to Albany for a conference encounter with the Lions, currently dwelling in the circuit cellar.

The Clyde Bulldogs, with a 2-1 record, will meet the 7-AA Cisco Lobos in a non-conference affair at Cisco.

fare Club and the Texas United Fund.

Leaders point out that when the original budget request was submitted by USO there were approximately 2,600,000 men and women in the U. S. armed forces, including 50,000 troops in South Vietnam.

Current plans now under way however, are to step up the number in the armed forces to 3,000,000 men, with an estimated, 125,000 eventually being assigned to Southeast Asia.

Aid for the USO from the United Fund has been asked by President Lyndon Johnson and the Assistant Secretary of Defense substantiating the need for the establishment of six new centers and expansion of existing ones. Although Vietnam will be the principal focus, the Philippines and Guam, as well as training and staging camps and militarily impacted areas of the United States, will likewise be influenced and require immediate attention and assistance.

Carpathian Walnut Crop Appears Good

The two specimens of Carpathian Walnut trees on the Eastland County Courthouse lawn are doing their part to prove the testimony of nurserymen who call the rare-in-this-country tree, as the "tree find of the century."

Planted only five years ago, the two English variety walnut trees are already beautiful shade trees on the southeast corner of the courthouse lawn and yield an ample crop of succulent nuts each year. Self-pollinating and boasting beautiful white barks are but two of the rare tree's characteristics.



Being able to withstand extremely low temperatures (as much as 20 degrees below zero) is another characteristic and is the reason the variety eventually found itself in this country.

It was discovered growing in the Carpathian mountains of Poland more than a quarter of a century ago. Its true variety and name is the Broadview variety of the English walnut, County Agent J. M. Cooper reports. Scionwood (budwood or graftwood or both) was first taken to England by a man who was impressed with the variety's resistance to cold weather. Later it found its way to Canada and into the United States.

Commercial plantings of the new walnut have been made in Michigan, Pennsylvania, and upper New York state where the temperatures have been too cold for the types and varieties of the English Coast.

A CHARACTERISTIC—Common only to the rare Carpathian Walnut trees, two samples of which are found on the Eastland County Courthouse lawn, is the rapid growth of ones or more shoots in a short period of time. The two limbs rising high above this tree show the fast growth, and is evident on both trees on the lawn.

Brownwood according to Cooper who was along when the scionwood was given to be tried.

This particular walnut is a beautiful, self-pollinating tree with large green, glossy, lush growing leaves. They grow much faster than do pecan trees. If a large tree, six to seven feet, is set out it will generally start bearing the third year. It only needs be large enough to produce its own pollen.

The nuts mature in September, when they start opening the nuts are pulled from the tree and placed in a shady place to cure out. Others in the county are finding the trees to be fine nutbearing trees that provide quick shade as an ornamentals. Trees are available in the county.

'Beat the Champ' Pecan Orchards Judged Excellent on Field Day

Winners of the Beat the Champ Tournament which ended last week at Fiesta Bowl are, in the women's division, Sara Peel, first place with 627; Sandra Strothers, second, 575; and Myrtle Aaron, third, 558.

In the men's division, winners were Jerry Carter, first place, 647; Mack Board, second, 600; and Clyde Benton, third, 572.

These winners will compete in the "Beat the Champ" finals to be held in Abilene at the VFW Lanes. They will be rolling on the same lanes as Dick Weber and Donna Zimmerman in an effort to beat the champions' three-game series. Both men and women will use the regular tournament handicap.

Men will use a 75 per cent handicap of 200 scratch, a 135 pin maximum three-game handicap; and women will use a 75 per cent handicap of 198 scratch, also a 135 pin maximum three-game handicap.

First prize for both the men and women bowler will be \$50 cash. Second place winners will receive \$25 and third place winners, \$15. Fourth and fifth place winners will receive \$10 each.

Approximately 100 pecan growers and other interested persons from Eastland and all surrounding counties made the annual tour of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association last Friday, reported to be one of the best tours ever conducted.

Prospects for the pecan harvest appeared to be excellent, with clusters averaging six to seven pecans, and some as many as 13. Orchards visited prior to lunch were the Lynn Daniels, Doss Alexander M. H. Montford, and Weldon Fenter. The Carl Taylor and C. E. Smith orchards were toured following lunch and a business session.

A huge tree in the Smith orchard attracted considerable attention, and a pot was made up with tourists guessing the number of pecans that will be yielded.

Results of demonstrations from using the new insecticide — Di-Syston — in the soil beneath the trees were reported to be excellent, according to an agriculture specialist from College Station who was present on the tour. Di-Syston prevents yellow aphids and the resulting honey dew.

Several pecan authorities from Big Spring, Lubbock and Fort Worth were present. At the directors meeting after lunch, Cisco and Rising Star were the only two towns making a bid for the annual fall pecan show. Members of the Pecan Growers Association will vote on the matter at a date to be announced.

On the other hand this money manipulating magic appears to be a case of 'robbing Peter to pay Paul.' All very well as long as Peter stands for the 'one way benefit.' But when Peter begins to suspect the ethics involved, then there might be an accounting and another story told, such as was experienced in the Great Depression of the 30's. However, all in all, I'm much better for the reading of it, and highly recommend the pamphlet to everyone who would master the mysteries and workings of our

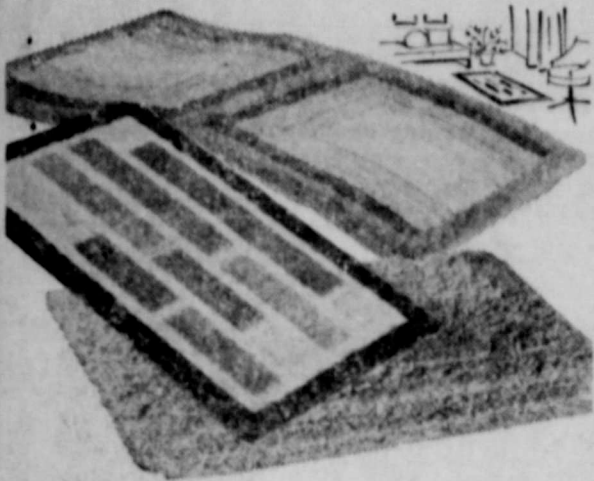

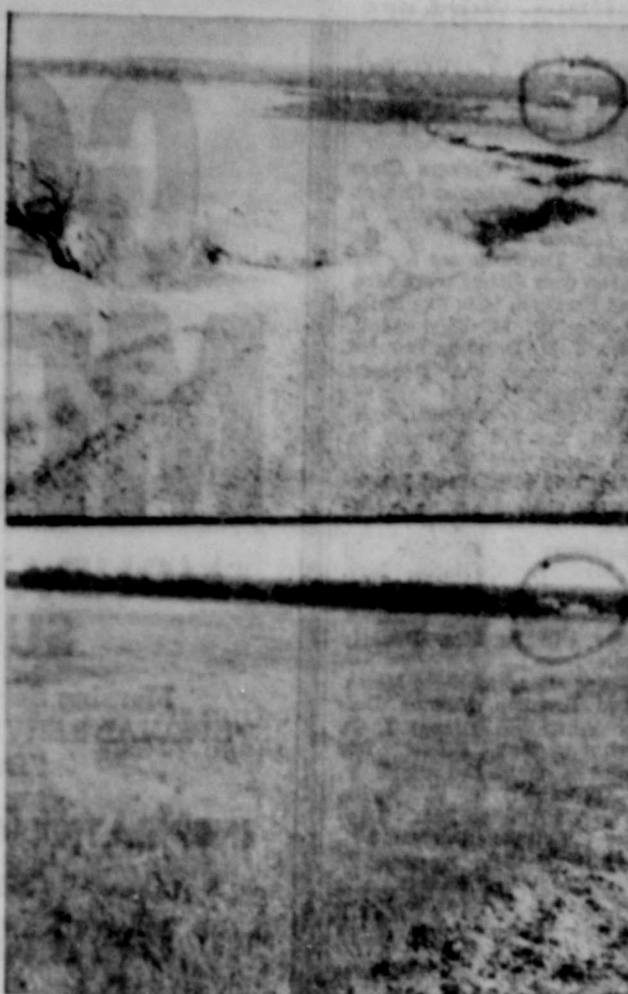

WHAT'S THE SCORE— CONSERVATION WISE?

By EDDIE SIMMS
Soil Conservation Service
Footprint season is here.
For illustrative purposes a game has been in progress throughout Eastland County in 1965. It is the team of Conservation Programs and Soil and Water Conservation treatments versus the weather, erosion, and brush and weeds.
Farmers, ranchers, business men, professionals, and others are exercising the plays and providing the interference for reaching the goal of sound land use and treatment.
During 1965, the line plunger of brush control accompanied some 7,000 acres. These gains came hard because of the strength of the opponent. Substantial gains were made by the forward passes of pasture establishments, with some 4,400 acres established through the efforts of the quarterbacks, landowners and operators, and the ends, the varied soils of Eastland Coun-

ty. Only a small percentage of these passes were failures. The end runs of range seeding made the next largest gains with the establishment of approximately 3000 acres. The end runs suffered losses however from the opponent's dry weather. Off-tackle plays of cross fences, ponds, terraces, diversions, and other treatments during the year contributed to advances made.
The Conservation team is not without a defense. Conservation cropping systems, strip cropping, and cover crops; along with range deferment and pasture and range management, are holding the line against the slashes of dry weather, erosion, and brush and weeds.

The coaches, Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors; and managers, Soil Conservation Service and other agency personnel, have been on the sidelines with equipment, new practices or methods and

Conservationists Mark 25th Date At Corpus in Oct.

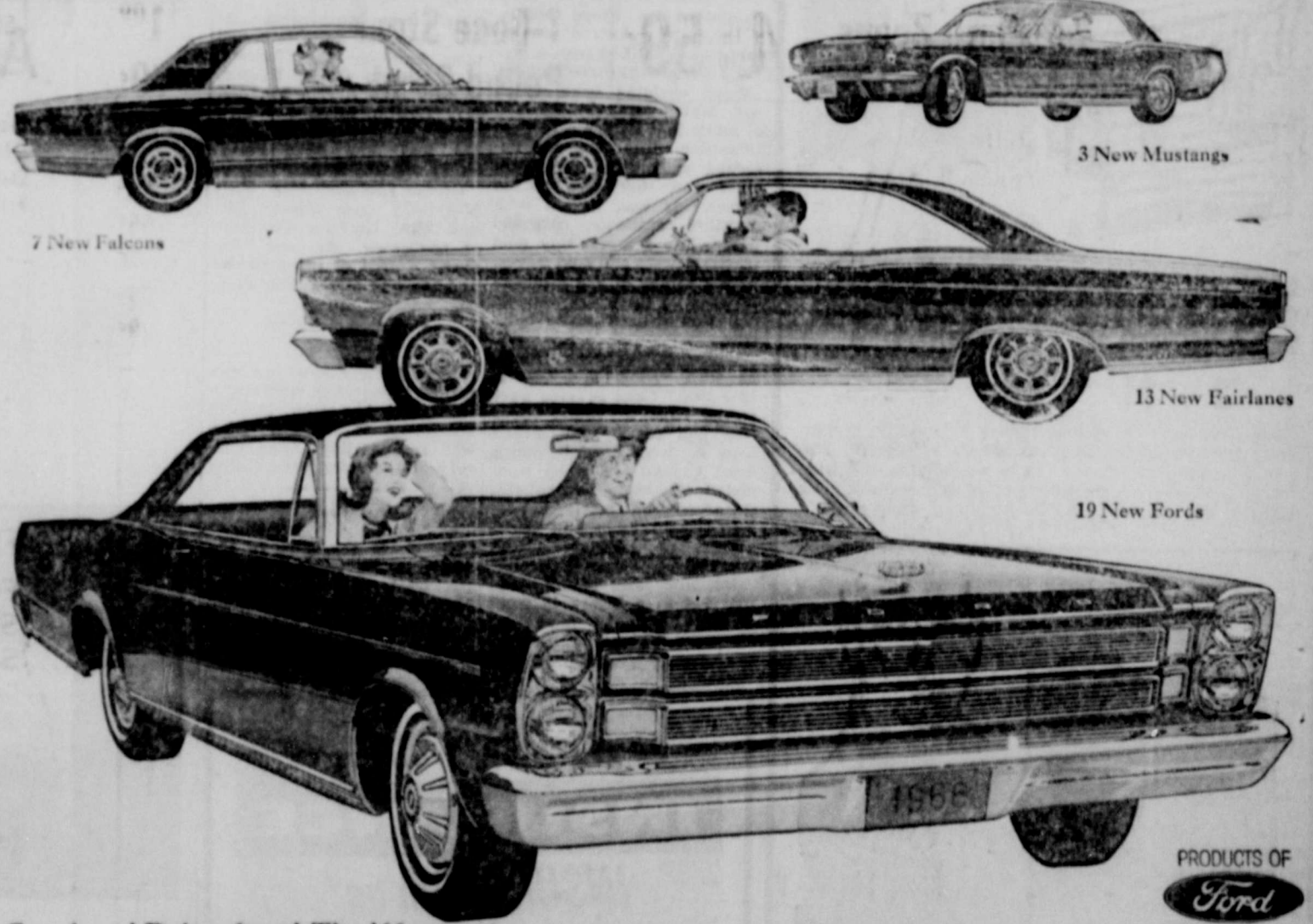
Soil and Water Conservation Districts of Texas will be celebrating their 25th anniversary during their annual meeting in Corpus Christi, October 12, 13 and 14.

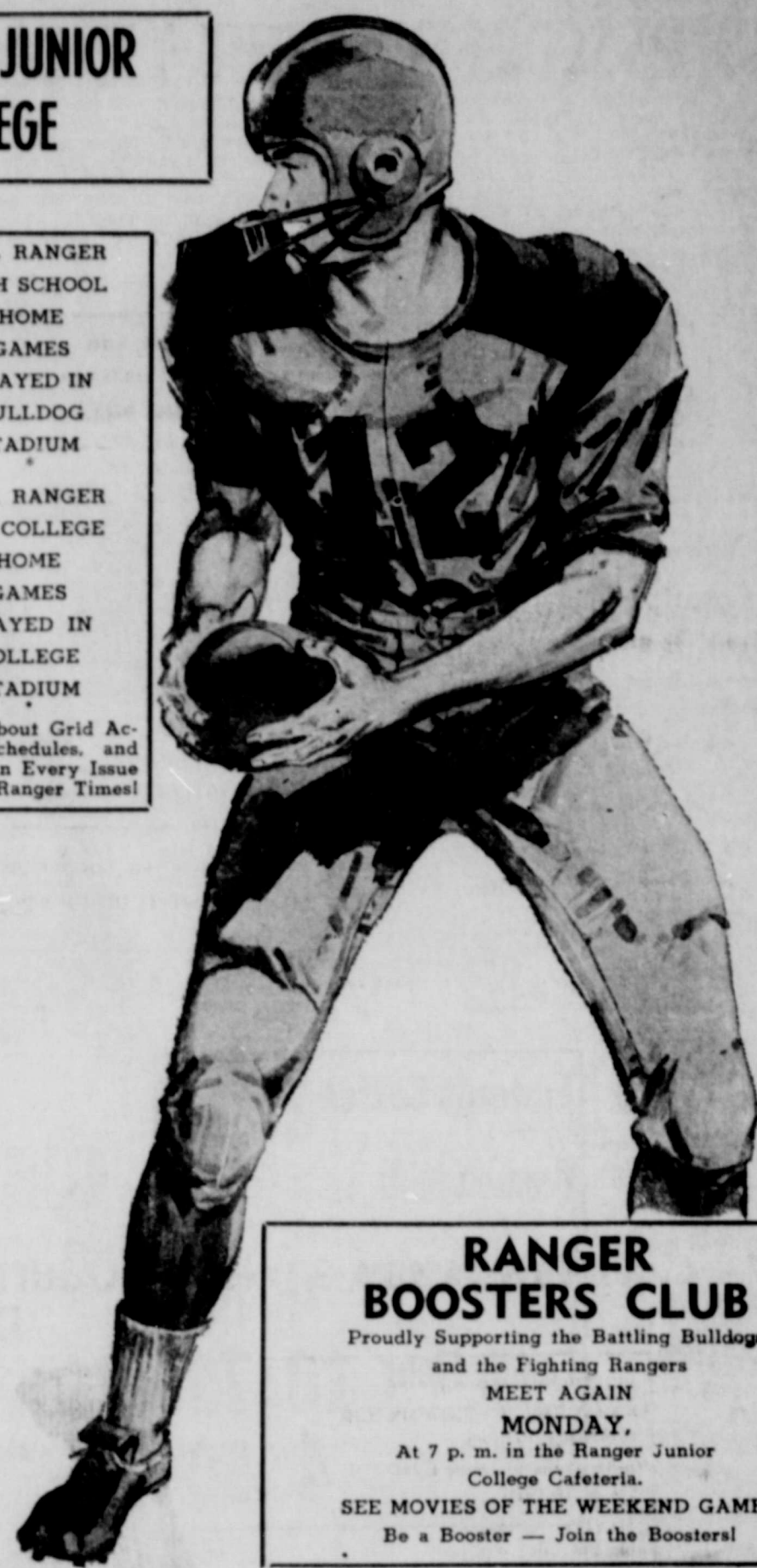

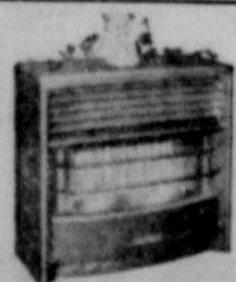
