Over Hundred Victims Of Alleged Swindle Here Physicians Picture John Brady Victim Of Insanity

Chief Of Defense Counsel Outlines Story Of Decline

Defendant Is Shown As Man Who Killed Woman Due To Destruction Of Finer Instincts By "Bootleg"

Brady Is Unmoved

Former Judge Reveals No Emotion As Attorneys, Witnesses Picture His Mental Crumbling

(By Associated Press)
COURT ROOM, AUSTIN, Jan. 29.—Two physicians at here late today while John W. Brady's own counsel read a long indictment against him as a man who killed a woman because his finer instincts had been destroyed by bootleg liquor. When it was finished they testified in effect: "Such a man is insane."

Brady, on trial here for the murder of Miss Lelia Highsmith, 28, with whom the defense said he had a long "affair" heard from E. A. Berry, chief of his lawyers, the whole story of the defense case as Berry described it to Doctors Goodall and Joe Wooten, slight, mustached elderly brothers.

Brady Unmoved.
The 59-year-old defendant, a former civil appeals court judge, did not alter his expression perceptibly as Berry said in substance to the Western, one after another:
"Doctor, it is in evidence here that John Brady, until a few years ago had an exceptionally bright mind and held a high place in the public service and the public trust. It is in evidence here that a few years ago he started greatly overindulging in bootleg liquor. That he early became surly, morose, lost his interest in his practice, abused his wife, and treated her with the utmost unkindness."

"It is in evidence here that he lost masculine virility; that he became intensely nervous; that his voluntary muscles sometimes would quiver."
"It is in evidence here that three or four years ago he entered into an affair with a young single woman in the same town where his

Testimony Ended In Shook's Trial

Defense Closes Its Case Without Calling Single Witness; Eight Testify For State

(By Associated Press)
WICHITA FALLS, Jan. 29.—Testimony in the trial of Tom Shook, former Electric police chief charged with the murder of O. E. Daugherty, truck farmer in August, 1928, came to an abrupt end late today when the defense rested without calling a defense witness.

After two and a half days spent in completing a jury, state testimony required only three hours. Judge P. A. Martin of the 99th district court will charge the jury and turn the case over to attorneys for six hours of argument Thursday morning.

Although the defense had indicated Shook would plead self-defense, the charge prepared today by Judge Martin only murder and malice aforethought, including no instructions on the law of self-defense.

The state used eight witnesses to describe the fatal stabbing and incidents related to it, including Shook's escape and recapture 13 months later in Tennessee. The case is expected to reach the jury by Thursday noon.

AUTO THEFT CHARGED

O. H. Gholson Arrested By Officers Wednesday

O. H. Gholson, of Lubbock, was arrested Wednesday by local officers and lodged in the county jail following filing of charges of theft of an automobile.

Gholson is alleged to have stolen a Ford touring car from the Ramo Rent Car station here three weeks ago. The car was recovered by local officers Tuesday at a farm house about 35 miles northwest of Lubbock.

House Committee To Consider Pro Question Feb. 12

Everything From Repealing Eighteenth Amendment To Modifying Dry Laws Will Be Brought Out

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—The whole prohibition question, from repealing the eighteenth amendment to modifying the dry laws, will be opened to wets and dries in hearings to begin before the house judiciary committee February 12.

This course was decided on by Representative George S. Graham, chairman of the committee, because he felt "that the proponents of measures to repeal the eighteenth amendment and to modify the prohibition laws are entitled to a hearing."

With the exception of a short session held by a subcommittee in 1928, this will be the first time the legislative proposals to repeal the dry act have been brought before the important house group. The full committee will take testimony on seven resolutions to repeal the amendment; and a subcommittee headed by Representative Dyer, Republican, Missouri, later will consider proposals to modify the Volstead act, including Dyer's 275 per cent beer bill.

The house expenditures committee prepared to end its consideration tomorrow of the Williamson bill to transfer the prohibition fund from the treasury to the justice department. Modifications to make it obligatory but not compulsory for the latter to investigate industrial alcohol permits issued by the treasury were agreed on today.

WHEAT DROPS

CHICAGO, Jan. 29. (AP)—Wheat prices fell below levels set by the market board today and reached nearly a ground level price for the year.

County Jail Is Filled to Capacity; Sheriff's Department Halts Activity

OPERATIONS of the local sheriff's department came to a standstill last night at 8 o'clock.

With the arrest of two men at that time who were lodged in the county jail, the total number of prisoners was increased to 43 or just 16 more than capacity. The jail is equipped to hold 27 prisoners and beyond that it is a question of "the best man for himself."

Prisoners jammed.
A visit to the jail last night revealed all classes of prisoners jammed together. Three men sat side by side on a one-man bunk—trying to shift themselves about and snatch a few hours sleep. Others were sprawled

Wife Of Hawkins On Stand At Crosbyton

CROSBYTON, Jan. 29.—Sobbing softly at times as she recounted events of the tragedy in which her father was killed and her husband charged with murder, Mrs. Joe Hawkins tonight took the witness stand and testified in behalf of her mate who is on trial in 72nd district court here for his life. All of her testimony pointed to the fact that her husband shot in defense of his own life.

Mrs. Hawkins had to be carried from the court room this afternoon when she became hysterical during the testimony of eye witnesses to the shooting. She re-appeared, however, early in the evening and was placed on the stand as the last defense witness.

In Good Humor
She explained that she and Joe had been picking holes prior to the shooting and that he was in the best of humor while coming to the house where incidents relative to the fight took place. Hawkins and her son, Frank, she told, were trying to separate the dogs before arrival of father.

"Father's voice was unusually loud when he told Joe to separate the dogs," she testified. "I knew he was mad when he began to talk. Joe was calm throughout the argument and I tried to get father to go home."

Tone Emphatic
"Every time he talked his tone became louder and more emphatic and he gripped the hoe in both hands. He advanced once as if he intended to strike him."

When asked if she thought her husband's life was in danger, Mrs. Hawkins' reply was "Yes."

"I called to both of them to stop and kept telling father to go home." When Hawkins appeared from the house with the gun, she said, Walker's foot was on the porch and that he raised the hoe as if to strike. She testified she believed that if Hawkins had not shot, he would have been killed. The two according to the woman, had never had cross words previously.

Further in defense of her husband she testified that she believed her father capable of inflicting serious bodily injury despite his age.

Two Young Local Couples Missing From Homes Here

Widespread Search Started For Lelia Alma Osborne, Mary Alexander, Charlie Guyne, Bill Tomerlin

A widespread search was instituted here yesterday by parents and local officers for two young Lubbock couples who disappeared from the city Tuesday morning about 9 o'clock.

Two 15-year-old girls, Lelia Alma Osborne and Mary Elizabeth Alexander, together with two boys, Charles Guyne, 17, and Bill Tomerlin, 18, were thought to have left in a Whippet sedan, license number 981-318.

Efforts were being made late yesterday to get radio stations to broadcast news of their disappearance with requests that any information regarding them be sent parents in this city.

Parents of Miss Osborne, who was described as being about five feet five inches tall with brown hair and eyes, told officers that they did not know any reason for their leaving but that they believed them to be on their way to California.

Unexpected Problem Seen With Opposition To Proposed Steering Group In Plenary Session Today

Conferences Held

Five-Power Agreement On Methods Of Measuring Fleet Tonnage Virtually Completed Wednesday

LONDON, Jan. 29.—New and unexpected difficulties of procedure arose tonight to threaten the smooth running of the plenary session of the naval conference tomorrow. A five power agreement on the method of measuring fleet tonnage was practically complete, however, and ready to be broadcast to the world through the newspapermen who will be admitted to the session.

The unexpected problem, which so suddenly reared its head grew from objections to the proposed steering committee of delegates on methods and limitations, the setting up of which was expected to be the chief formal business of the session tomorrow. To this committee were to be referred technical questions such as those France and Italy have been wrangling over for more than a week so that the conference proper can go forward with the business of disarmament.

Hundred Indicted Of Liquor Charge

One-Third Of 102 Charged With Conspiracy To Violate Dry Laws To Face Trial In Federal Court

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 29.—Less than one-third of the 102 defendants indicted on a charge of conspiring to violate the federal prohibition laws by widespread liquor dealing activities in the oil fields of Pottawatomie county, will stand trial in United States district court here.

Selection of a jury for the trial started today. Twenty-five defendants pleaded guilty during the day and sentences were deferred until February 15.

Thirty-two defendants including Randall Pittman, county attorney of Pottawatomie county, and Frank Fox, former sheriff, announced they were ready for trial. Roy St. Lewis, United States district attorney announced that W. C. Clapper, a defendant who had been a fugitive from justice since his release from the Pottawatomie county jail at Tecumseh had been arrested at Springfield Mo., and would be returned here for trial.

Of the remaining 44 defendants, it was said five are dead and the others fugitives from justice. Marion Fuller, former chief of police at Earlboro, who was expected to be a key witness for the government, died Saturday night under circumstances that caused government attorneys to launch an investigation, the result of which had not been announced tonight.

Elements Triumph in Effort to Save Life of Sea Diver, Trapped in River

QUEBEC, Que., Jan. 29.—The elements appeared to have triumphed today in a desperate battle for the life of a deep-sea diver who was trapped at the bottom of the Outarde river, in an isolated section 175 miles north of Quebec.

Peter Trans was caught Monday in the cribbing at the bottom of a falls where the Ontario Paper company is constructing a power plant, at a point near where the Outarde empties into the St. Lawrence.

Planes To Rescue
Airmen bearing two rescue divers set out yesterday to go to Trans' aid, but they were forced down by a snowstorm at Rimouski. A volunteer diver

went twice yesterday and reported Trans could be freed only by sawing away the crib, but he was afraid to try it himself lest he accidentally sever the air lines.

Today a laborer, Arvo Silvala, put on a diving suit and went down into the icy waters. He worked close enough to Trans to grip his hand. There was no response. Trans was either unconscious from the long exposure or dead.

Current Too Swift.
The two rescue divers, Gennel Morency and Lewis Began, resumed their flight today and arrived at Riviere Aux Outardes. But when they got there the current had become too swift for them to go below.

Chicago Bombings Climax Attempt To Kill Official

Two Men Injured and \$100,000 Damage Is Result Of Blasts

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Two men were injured, damage estimated at \$100,000 was done by a bomb which wrecked a one-story building housing a grocery store tonight.

The injured men, eating in a neighboring restaurant, were cut by flying glass.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29. (AP)—A series of bombings, robbery and gun play was climaxed today by what is believed to have been an attempt on the life of a state's attorney's official who has been active against Chicago's organized vice rings.

A new record for bombings in a single day was reached as five blasts rocked residence and industrial buildings in the North and South Side districts, causing extensive property damage.

Attempt Frustrated.
An apparent sixth bombing attempt was frustrated by an alert garage attendant who routed two men he surprised trying to attach a package to the motor of an automobile belonging to Chief Investigator Pat Roche, of the state's attorney's office.

The men fled with the package, which was thought contained a bomb intended for Roche in reprisal for the fatal shooting of an armed robber by one of Roche's men earlier in the day.

The latter incident occurred after the investigator learned an attempt was to be made to rob several Gold Coast apartment hotels.

The man killed, later identified as Andrew Wright, 34, formerly of Denver, Colo., walked into the lobby of a hotel and was killed by police bullets while resisting arrest.

No Pay-Day Given Chicago Employees

County Officials Hold Up Payment Of Salaries To Several Thousand Result Of Financial Crisis

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—What was to have been pay-day for several thousand county employees turned out to be just another Wednesday. County officials, after planning to post to postpone payrolls by issuing tax anticipation warrants in small amounts, decided they should wait until the civic rescue committee determined definitely what, if anything, it could do toward pulling the city and county governments back from the brink of bankruptcy.

Slas Strawn, chairman of the rescue group, returned from Washington, but spent most of the day finding out what had happened during his absence. Although he previously had been said that the committee had been pledged \$500,000 for purchasing tax warrants, Strawn declined to comment on what progress his group had made.

Informing that H. Wallace Caldwell, president of the school board, had sent a representative to New York with \$50,000,000 worth of school tax warrants for sale, Strawn expressed hope that "a deal could be made, since that would mean a loan for the rescue committee to raise."

MADISON, Neb., Jan. 29. (AP)—Aaron Read, octogenarian of Madison has filed for nomination as United States senator from Nebraska in the republican primaries.

Read announced today he was "unalterably opposed" to prohibition and the Eighteenth amendment.

LAMESANS ARRESTED

Two Held Here On Charges Of Pro Law Violation

Two men, giving their address as Lamesans, were arrested by officers of the local sheriff's department last night at 8 o'clock and lodged in the county jail to face charges of violation of the prohibition law, which will be filed this morning.

The two were arrested in the 1500 block on Avenue B and were driving a Ford sedan, which was confiscated and is being held by officers.

About seven or eight gallons of whiskey were found in the automobile, a portion of which was in a large keg and the remainder in a handbag.

Recreation Club Formation Probed In Meeting Here

A. L. Block, Alleged Agent Of Association, Arrested In Dallas On Charges Of Swindling Wednesday

111 Names Involved

Claim \$1,900 In Cash And About \$10,000 In Notes Received; Prominent Men Hold Stock In "Club"

INVESTIGATION was started last night into alleged swindling activities in connection with promotion of "recreational club association" in this city when 16 citizens, representing a wide range of professions, assembled in offices of the chamber of commerce to form an inquisitorial body, following arrest late Wednesday in Dallas of A. L. Block, alleged agent of the thus-styled organization.

The meeting was called last night by the Retail Merchants association.

111 Names Involved
Names of 111 citizens were revealed at the meeting as having subscribed for memberships in the association. Most of these signed notes, while many others made partial or full payments. Others represented that they were donated memberships, each of which was valued at \$100 by agents. Twenty were represented as having complimentary stock in the organization.

Complaint was filed against Block in the office of Justice of Peace G. R. Scott and was signed by Dr. O. W. English. The complaint charges Block with fraudulently securing a note with the misrepresentation that the association had executed a contract for a lease of a lot in this city, located at Thirteenth and Avenue K, for the purpose of erecting a club building. Arrest of the defendant was made through the local police department.

According to W. F. Sehenck, local attorney, who conducted the investigation last night, there is no record of a lease or purchase contract in connection with the above lot.

Crude Production Average Declines

Recent Production Activity Shows New Effect In The Midcontinent Area. Oil And Gas Journal Shows

TULSA, Jan. 29. (AP)—Recent production activities showed new effect in the Midcontinent area when the estimated daily average production of light and heavy crude dropped 44,383 barrels during the week ending January 25, according to the Oil and Gas Journal.

Of this total 38,555 barrels were registered in the Oklahoma fields. The Seminole area dropped 34,800 barrels, northern miscellaneous, 4,339 and St. Louis Pearson 3,620 barrels. Despite continued production curtailment Oklahoma City pool climbed 3,980 barrels.

The remainder of the Midcontinent area decline was supplied by general throughout the other areas no marked declines being reported for any. One or two had slight increases.

Declines in the Gulf Coast and Southwest Texas heavy crude areas a total of 8,178, and a 4,000 barrel drop in California heavy crude made the total decline for the entire United States approximately 47,679 barrels. Of this 37,446 was in light oil.

California light oil increased 5,300 barrels. The total estimated daily average production for the entire country for the week ending January 25 was 2,615,328 barrels as compared to 2,682,807 barrels for the week ending January 18.

Kansas production was 116,180, compared with 110,970 for the previous week.

Financial Chaos Continues Reign

Forebodings Of Showdown With Citizens' Rescue Committee Rumbles Over Chicago

CHICAGO, Jan. 29. (AP)—Forebodings of continued financial chaos rumbled through the local government today as public officials prepared for a showdown with the Citizens' Rescue committee.

The board of review delayed collection of 1928 and 1929 taxes by ordering what virtually amounted to a new reassessment of loop property.

This action followed protests that loop property was undervalued \$300,000,000 in the 1928 reassessment.

Officials were still divided over acceptance of financial aid offered by Elias H. Strawn, chairman of the rescue committee.

Mayor William Hale Thompson, his forces in the city council and H. Wallace Caldwell, president of the board of education, still frowned upon the Strawn offer, which was accompanied by an ultimatum that public officials must pledge cooperation to reduce operating expenses and allow the Strawn committee to designate for what needs the \$20,000,000 in pledges should be spent.

Anton Gernak, president of the county board, and Howard Elmore, head of the sanitary district, favored acceptance of the offer.

WOULD LEGALIZE BEER
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—Chairman Wickersham of the law enforcement commission, in a letter to Representative Dyer of Missouri, made public today, said Dyer's proposal to legalize beer containing 2.75 per cent of alcohol would be submitted to the commission for consideration on February 5.

SUBORDINATES SELF

Britain Accepts Summons On International Court

LONDON, Jan. 29. (AP)—Great Britain today subordinated itself to compulsory jurisdiction of the permanent court of international justice, and was pledged to accept summations before that tribunal at the behest of any other national member.

Fulfilling a pledge made prior to the general election, the labor government of Ramsay MacDonald in a night session of the commons forced through ratification of the optional clause of the court against stiff Tory opposition by vote of 276 to 193. The laborites had the support of the liberals.

CHARGE DENOUNCED

Senator Caraway Denies He Accepted \$500

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—Senator Caraway of Arkansas jumped up at the senate lobby committee hearing today to denounce as "an absolutely outrageous falsehood" an assertion that he had received \$500 for addressing an im-

porters' organization. Testimony by Arthur L. Faubel, secretary of the American Tariff league, aroused the committee chairman to his vehemence. Apparently angered, the witness related to the Arkansas democrat that he took exception to his remark.

"I don't care whether you take exception or not," Caraway shot back.

Far North Awaits Report Of Search

Searchers Dig In Snow And Ice About Wreckage Of Elison's Plane In Hope Of Finding Bodies

TELLER, Alaska, Jan. 29. (AP)—The far north today awaited reports from a searching party near North Cape, Siberia, which has been digging into the ice and snow about the wreckage of Earl Ben Elison's airplane expecting to find the body of the noted Arctic aviator and his companion, Earl Borland.

Meanwhile, two other fliers who for weeks have been awaiting an opportunity to join in the hunt for the long missing birdmen were on their way to North Cape. The two, Pat Reid and Ed Young, Canadian pilots, took their planes into the air here yesterday for a 400-mile flight to the Siberian coast where the Elison-Borland plane was found.

Alfred Lomen, director of the search for Elison and Borland, after receiving a report of the discovery of the wrecked plane, expressed opinion that the bodies of Elison and Borland would be found there.

The searching party, composed of four men, was taken to the scene Sunday by Joe Crosson and Harold

Gillam, American fliers who located the wreck Saturday. Since Crosson and Gillam operated from the fur trading ship Nanuk, frozen in the ice near North Cape, reports from the searching party were expected from that source.

Yancy Story Free For Present Time

Alleged Bank Robber Says He Is 'Almost Worn Out' From Answering So Many Subpoenas For Trials

DALLAS, Jan. 29. (AP)—Yancy Story, 48, tried so many times for bank robbery that he was "almost worn out" from answering subpoenas, was free, temporarily at least, today.

His trial here yesterday, the fourth, was postponed, and Story left for his farm in Denton county. He was to have been tried for robbing a bank at Ponder four years ago. It was four years ago that he was tried and convicted of robbery of the State bank at Krum. His 99-years sentence was reversed on appeal. A change of venue sent the retrial to Sherman, resulting in a hung jury. Then he was tried at Martin, and sentenced to five years

imprisonment. This case is now on appeal. State and defense attorneys agreed last night that the state would dismiss its case here if the appeal from the Martin sentence was withdrawn.

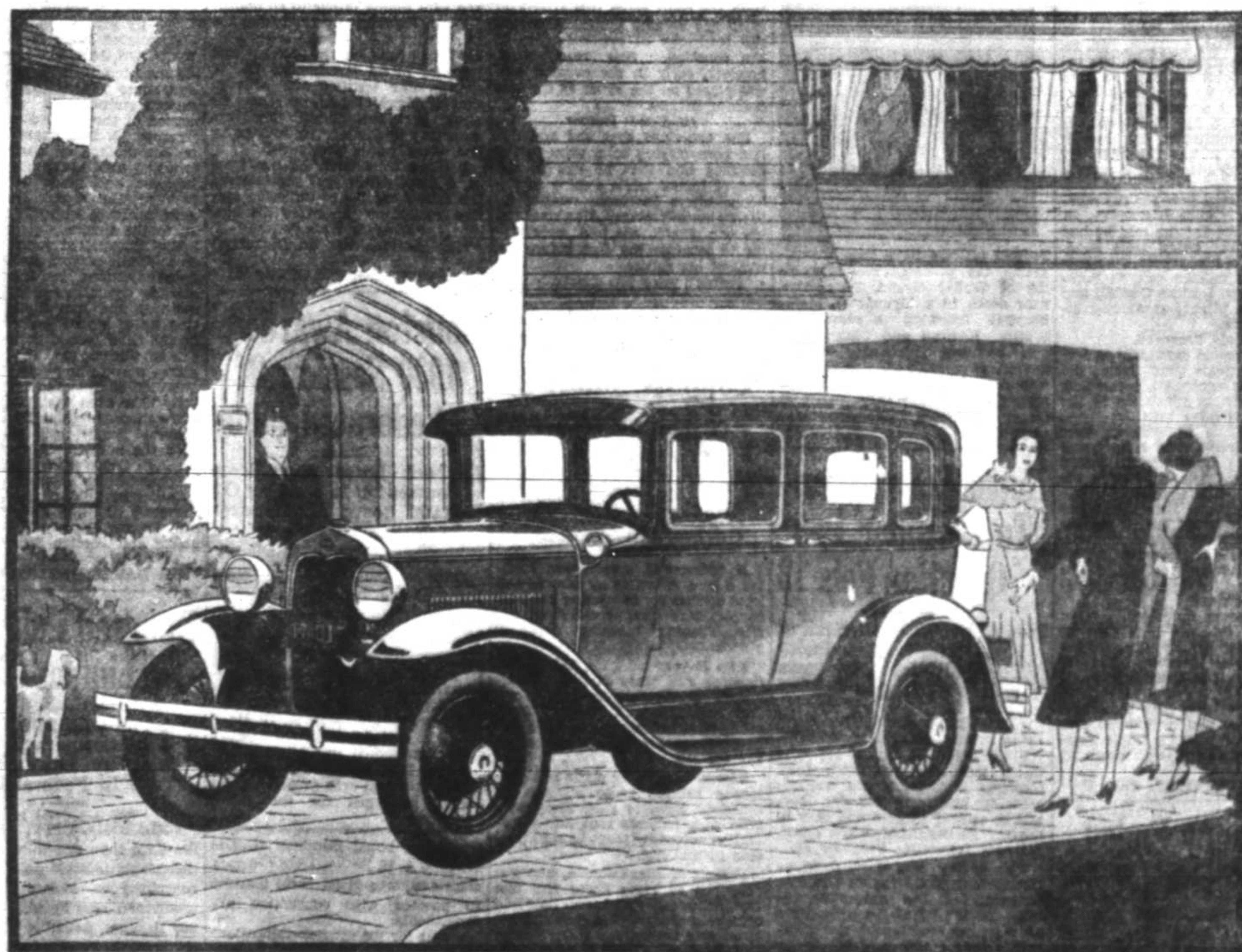

Committee May Be Asked To Come To Texas To Probe Facts To Real Estate Row By Agents

AUSTIN, Jan. 29. (AP)—Gov. Dan Moody today considered inviting the Governor of Wisconsin to send a special committee to Texas to investigate personally facts relating to sale of certain lands and get first hand information of conditions complained of by the Wisconsin real estate brokers board in denying permits to certain agents in Wisconsin selling Rio Grande Valley lands. At the same time, a resolution was prepared for introduction in the legislature by Rep. A. P. Johnson of Carrizo Springs inviting the Wisconsin board to reconsider its action. The South Texas chamber of commerce, through Ray Leaman, manager, and W. Grady Kinsolving of Corpus Christi, president, has agreed to underwrite expenses of the visit of the Wisconsin committee. These measures were undertaken as a result of a meeting held here yesterday by Texans interested in off-setting the effect of the Wisconsin board's refusal to grant sales permits. It was decided to appoint a permanent committee of 19 to act when similar emergencies arise and to pass on the responsibility of Texas land agents.

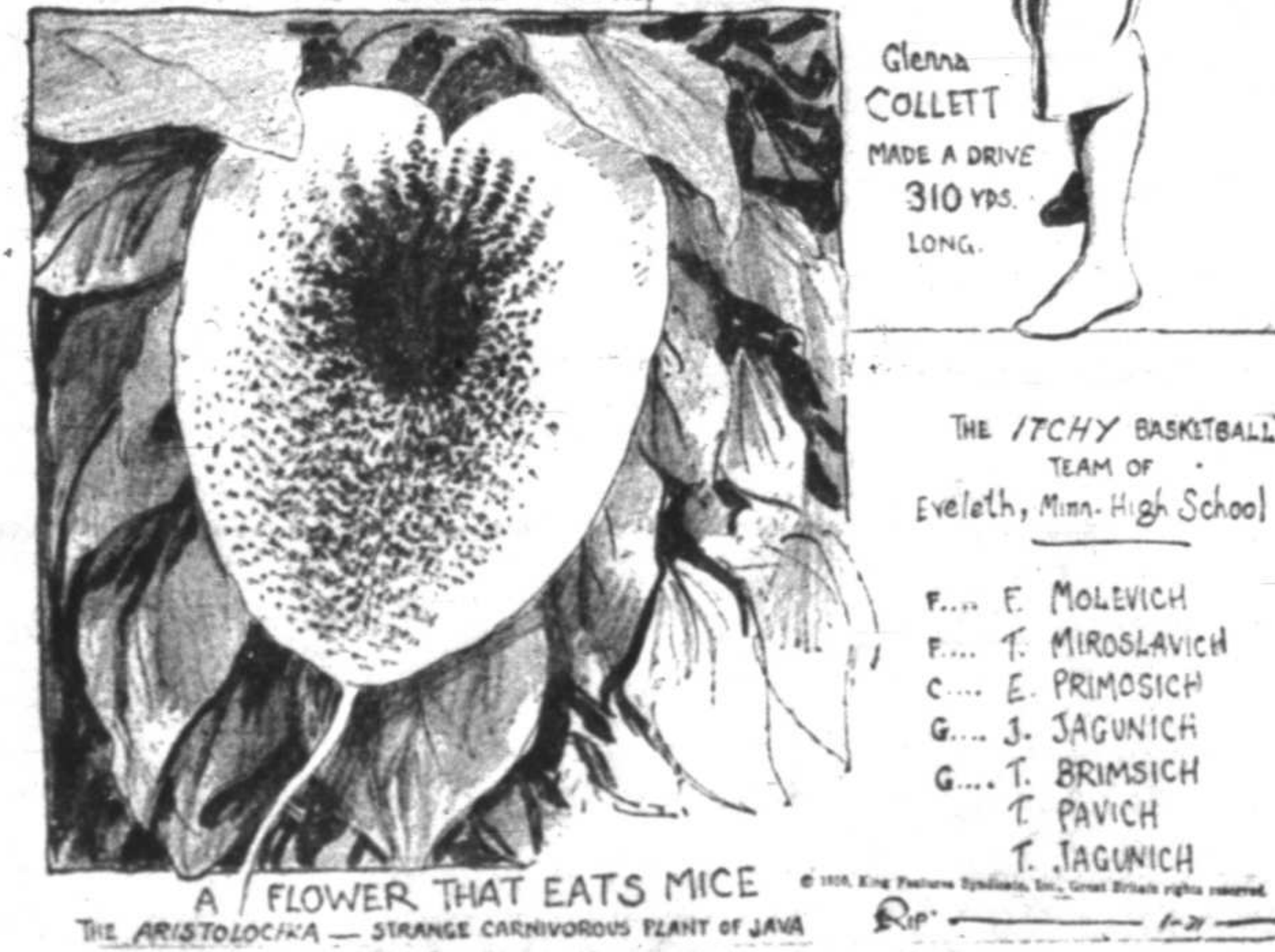

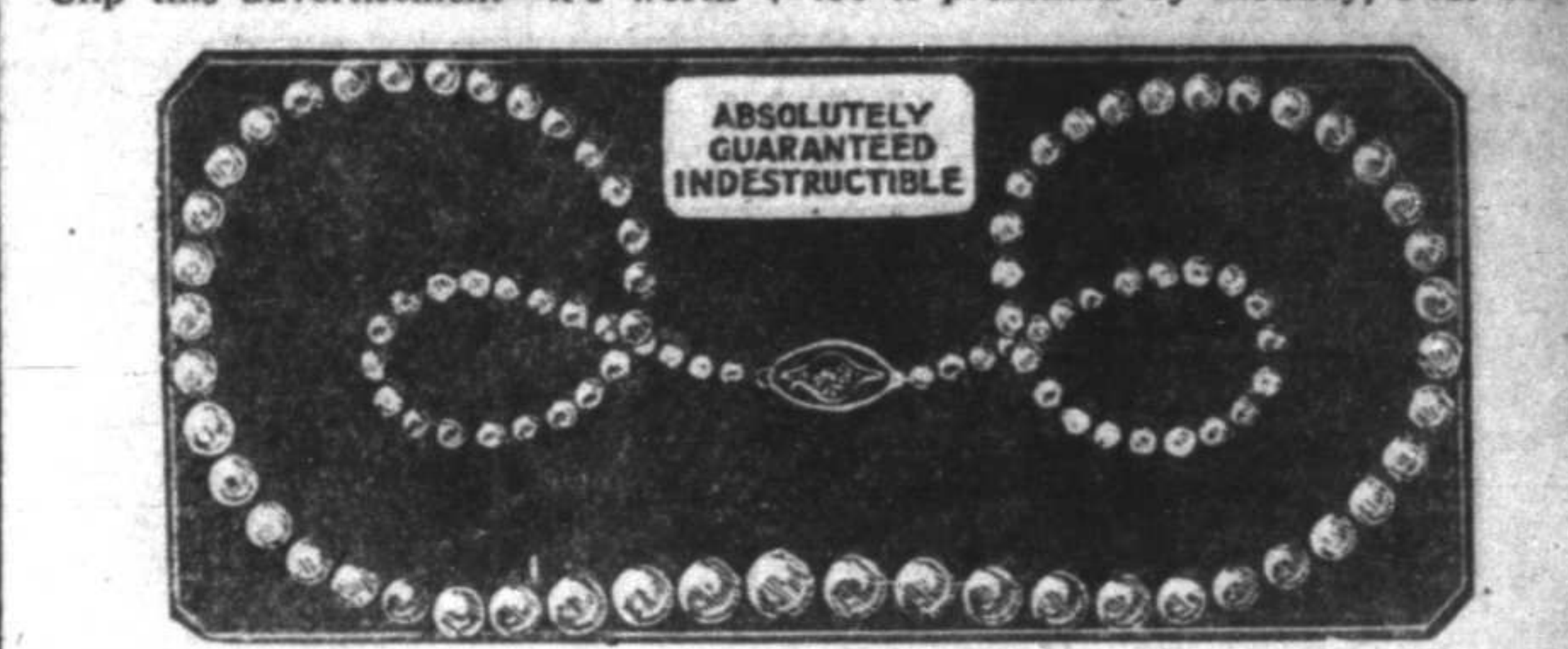
Twenty-Two Held On Liquor Counts

Former Mayor Among Ones To Enter Guilty Pleas In Conspiracy Trial In Federal District Court

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 29. (AP)—Twenty-two persons named as defendants in the Pottawatomie county liquor conspiracy case, including Homer Knappenberger, former mayor of Earlsboro, entered pleas of guilty to conspiracy charges at the opening of the trial in federal district court here today. Judge Edgar S. Vaughn announced sentences would be imposed February 15. Knappenberger, who previously had pleaded not guilty, was the first to change his plea. He was followed by Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Burdett, who likewise reversed pleas of not guilty. Burdett, Knappenberger's son-in-law, is a former chief of police at Earlsboro. J. N. Barron, W. A. Graham and Gus Hern then recalled their previous pleas and admitted guilt. The maximum penalty on a conspiracy charge is two years imprisonment. The minimum is \$1 fine or a sentence of one day in jail. Others who changed their pleas of not guilty were Jack Voltz, H. B. Wallace, Tom Theophilos, Numa Warren, Rose Lutke, Vanour Sherill, son of the former chief of police at Earlsboro, James H. Webster, Luther Wolff, Ruth Morgan, May and Barney Porter. Randall Piman, Pottawatomie county attorney, originally charged in the conspiracy, asked a severance of his case.

ago in Africa, on the back of a jogging camel—I almost slept, in spite of noise and motion.

Sleep when you need it is the most important sleep of all. Sleep then whenever you can, whenever you need to. But sleep, don't lie awake!

Tech College Is Facing Shortage Of Funds In 1931

President Horn Back From Directors Meeting Held At Corsicana; Will Ask Solons For Aid

President Paul W. Horn, of Texas Technological college, returning yesterday from Corsicana where he attended a meeting of regents of the school, declared that the school possibly will face handicaps due to the shortage of funds in the 1930-31 session.

Announcement was made at the regent's meeting that the state legislature and Governor Moody will be presented with requests for appropriations amounting to \$136,500 during the special session, W. T. Oatson, business manager of the college, has gone to Austin to represent Texas Tech in its plea for funds.

Summer School In Want. Included in the immediate need of the institution is the matter of funds necessary for the continuance of the regular summer school. An appropriation of \$35,000 for this organization is included in the list of needs.

"No definite organization for the 1930 summer school will be effected until some action is taken by the legislature," Dr. Horn said. Tentative plans are underway but no definite steps can be taken under the present conditions.

Other itemized needs which will be submitted the governor and his body include: salaries (contingent), \$28,500; maintenance, \$25,000; additional equipment \$40,000.

Fire Causes Need. The president estimates that the recent fire at the college will necessitate a request for approximately \$10,000.

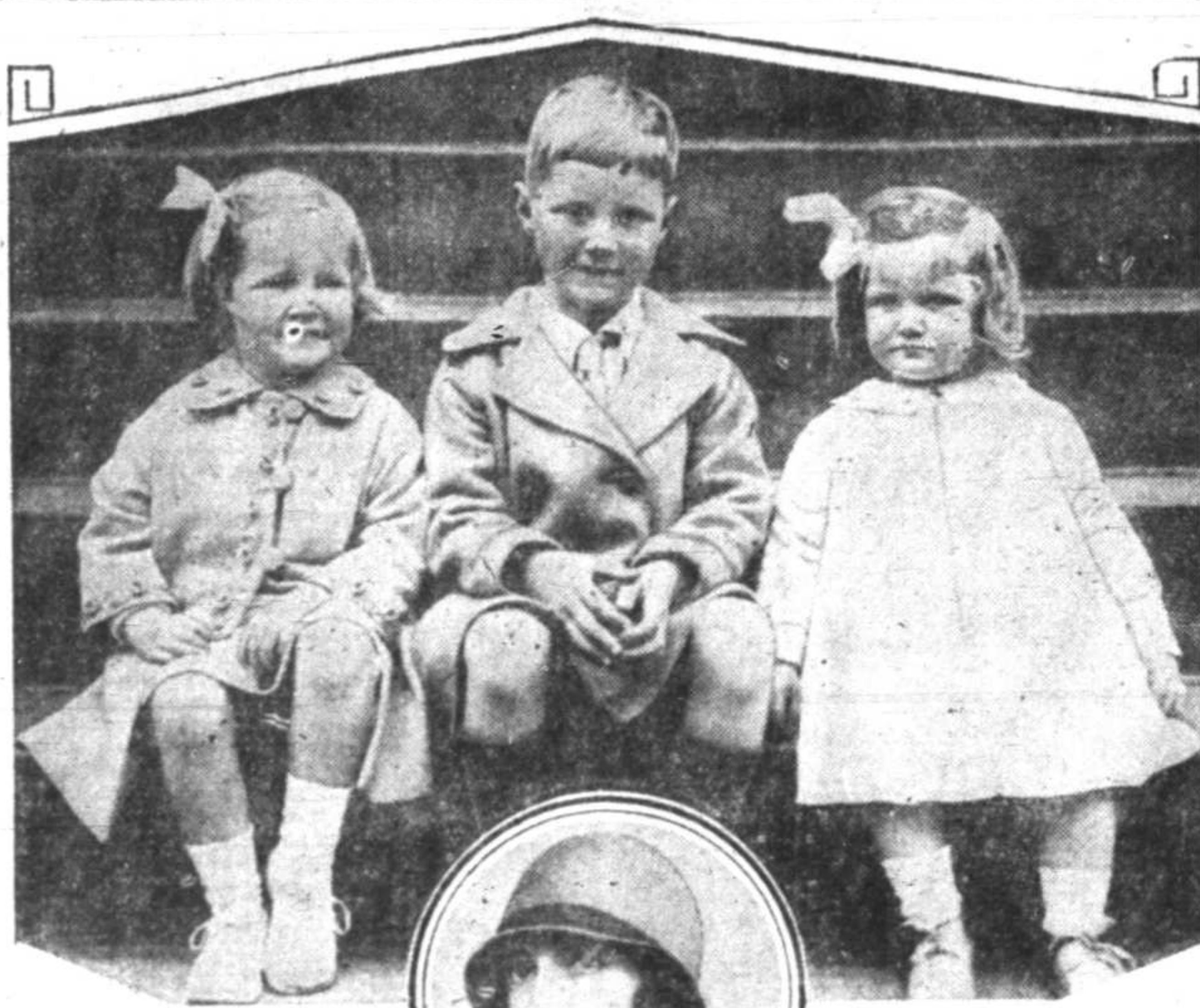
The next meeting of the board of directors will be held in Lubbock on May 26, during commencement week.

Following is a portion of the report presented before the directors by the college president:

"I call your attention to the fact that the dean of agriculture of the college and the president of the college were invited by the governor to take part in a conference held at Austin January 5, to meet with Chairman Alexander Legge of the Federal Farm Board, and Mr. Carl Williams, member of that board, and with others interested in agricultural problems. Dean Leidigh was appointed a member of the sub-committee to assist in drafting recommendations as to the organization and operation of the work with reference to the cotton marketing situation, especially in Texas. I may state in general that it was the evident belief of Mr. Legge and Mr. Williams that such relief as could be afforded by the Federal Farm Board to the farmers in Texas would be largely in the nature of help in the direction of cooperative marketing.

"You will doubtless be interested to know that the day of the Texas Technological college is prospering from every standpoint. Our dairy was recently given the contract for supplying cream to the Hilton hotel at Lubbock. Mr. Renner tells me that on the basis of the order placed today, there will be a profit of approximately \$600 daily. He

Federal Government Faced with Task Of Reassembling Fortune of Indian

TOPEKA, Kas., Jan. 29. (AP) The federal government today was faced with the task of reassembling the scattered fortune of Jackson Barnett, incompetent Oklahoma Creek Indian, who eight years ago gave with a thumbprint signature more than \$1,000,000 in Liberty bonds to charitable institutions and his white wife.

The order which will effect return of the fortune to the government came yesterday in a decision handed down by the United States circuit court of appeals for the tenth district, holding that transfer of the huge sum to other parties was illegal since it was held in trust by the government as guardian of Barnett.

The ruling came in a suit brought by the government against Marshall L. Moon, Washington lawyer, seeking return of \$15,000 paid him as attorney's fees for handling phases of the transfer.

Mrs. Barnett was given \$550,000. The other half of the Indian's fortune, \$550,000, was given to the Baptist Home Mission society of New York.

Demand Remedy in Immigration Abuse

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP) — A remedy for the abuses and injustices he said had resulted from present immigration regulations as applied on the Mexican border was demanded today by J. T. Canales, Brownsville, Texas, attorney, before the house immigration committee.

"I am not opposed to any bill dealing with this immigration if it will cure the evils that have resulted under the present laws, for conditions could not be much worse than at present," he said.

"In an effort to make a good showing at Washington," Canales said, "many Mexicans legally in this country are being deported unjustly. If it were not for the abuse of power by immigration officers the growers of Texas would not now be faced with a labor shortage."

Referring to a proposal to bring in Porto Ricans to fill the shortage, the witness said, "those people would require a generation to become acclimated and develop into efficient workers."

TRIAL POSTPONED

AUSTIN, Jan. 29. (AP) — Trial of the case involving an injunction against Commissioner of Agriculture George B. Terrell to enjoin him from enforcing an embargo against importation of citrus fruit into Texas, was postponed indefinitely today.

It was decided that the case should be heard by a three-judge federal district court, and Judge David West of San Antonio said he would assemble the court in the quickest possible time.

"It's Corbett!" they shouted.

"But, who's that fat guy with him?" one asked.

"Dat shows what you know about fighting," said another. "Dat's Billy Delaney, Corbett's trainer."

Texas Tech board of directors in Corsicana meeting fail to decide on coaching staff reorganization.

Arkansas Star Is Outstanding In 3 Sports and "Book Larnin"

PAYETTEVILLE, Ark., Jan. 25.—Wear Schoonover of Pocatonton, Ark., University of Arkansas' great end, has a unique record in athletics south and west of the Missouri and Mississippi rivers.

In eight football games Schoonover caught 20 passes, thrown by Dick Miller, halfback, for a total gain of 319 yards, an average of 31 yards per pass. Six times the tall Razorback carried passes across the line for touchdowns and 10 times he place-kicked the ball between the posts for the added point. His longest run of the season was 92 yards for a touchdown on an intercepted pass. Against Baylor he caught 14 of 17 completed passes and intercepted five fumbles.

Schoonover does other things besides football. He is captain-elect of the basketball squad. College humor named him All-American forward in basketball last winter. He plays first base and pitches on the baseball team and maintained a batting average of .340 last spring.

Schoonover was popularly acclaimed the man who had done the most for his university last spring. He was a "straight A" student all last year and now in his senior year is Arkansas' candidate for the Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford University, England.

By taking the opening game of a two game series with the Scarlet-clad cagers from the big country, the Matadors rung up their tenth straight court triumph and kept their slate clean for the year.

Lobos Flash Defense

Although the skirmish last night started off like the Paymen were in for a picnic, the visitors buckled down soon after the opening Tech spurt and battled the Matadors tenaciously. Clarence Hodges was the only Tech sharpshooter that was able to penetrate the Lobos' defense effectively during the first period, scoring 12 of the 14 points registered by the locals during the period.

While the visitors were showing a stubborn defense, the Matador scoring aces were noticeably "off" in their shots from the field. Time after time the black-jerseyed dribblers worked the ball into scoring range only to see their attempts roll off the hoop. Free throws were equally as difficult for the Paymen, the locals converting but five of approximately 13.

The first half ended with the Matadors leading 14 to 10 and at the beginning of the closing period, the invaders got the jump and came within a point of tying the score. It was at this juncture that Coach Payne sent his regulars back on the floor and the locals began to pull away again.

Hodges made the flashy Matador forward a little help in this stanza and the Lobos were helplessly beaten. Fisher, Maxwell and Tadlock came to the rescue with a few tallies and the contest was put on ice.

Coach Bernice Graves used 10 men in his attempt to turn back the rampaging Matadors, two of which were outstanding. Hale led the visitors in scoring with 8 points while B. Connally turned in a neat defensive performance and showed an aptness for scoring from long range.

For the second successive night, Hodges carried off high scoring honors. Seven field goals and three free throws gave the Matador scoring ace a total of 17 points for the night. Fisher was next high man for the visitors.

Tonight's game between the Matadors and Lobos will mark the last home appearance of the Tech quintet until Feb. 10 when the Matadors return from the five-game invasion of Abilene to meet the Canyon Buffaloes.

Needing a manager, he will try out every broken down big league player he can corral, and if his team doesn't win, he will try more of them, and if it still doesn't win, he will bring some old timer out of retirement—like Johnny Evers.

There have been exceptions, of course. Notably, Joe McCarthy. Then there was Clarence Rowland, now back in the minors, who was not the best manager when he served in the majors, but not the worst. And there have been pilots who, while they had seen duty in the majors, began their master minding in the bushes. Donie Bush, former leader of the Pirates, and now manager of the White Sox, is one of them. Gabby Street, recently installed as head of the National league unit of the Cardinals' chain system, is yet another. Billy Southworth had a brief trial with the Cardinals and was sent back to the minors.

Picked With Reason

On the average, these men seem to stand a little ahead of the managers picked up in all these years from the league diamonds. Not because they came from the bushes, to be sure, but because they appear to have been picked with some degree of reason.

The Cubs' management went the rounds of worn-out big league stars until Bill Wrigley went to Louisville for McCarthy. And in going out of the big city for an executive Wrigley was following a very simple system.

If the big league magnates put in as much time hunting for outstanding managers as their scouts do in pursuing ivory, maybe they could uncover more Joe McCarthys hiding away in the bushes.

TRAGEDIES OF THE AIR

"It's easy enough to be pleasant. When life runs along like a song. But the man worth while is the man who can smile when everything goes dead wrong."

OFFICIALS of leading American air transport companies should take the above verse and paste it figuratively speaking, in their hats. They need to abide by its homespun philosophy if they are to keep the respect and the trust of the public at large.

It is not surprising that an investigation is being held in Kansas City, where after five persons were killed in a crash of a Central Airlines plane, company officials had wreckage hurriedly removed and all evidence destroyed. "It's going to be difficult to determine the cause of this accident," said E. A. Watkins, Central Lines president, "but we'll make a full report as soon as the facts can be determined."

"Oh, yeah," as they say in the movies, "as soon as the facts can be determined," if it is now possible to determine any.

Airline officials will do well to admit that investigation of crashes is essential in this infant age of aviation. They will profit by admitting that through their own error, and subsequent correction of the error, air travel will become safer, more popular and more profitable. They may just as well realize that they can't get to first base without public confidence and that they'll never hold it unless they try to keep above the table and figure out a way to shove the ace "twixt."

The commercial airlines have publicly warned "directors of public relations" and all that sort of thing to keep the newspapers off the back of the racket. When things run along like a song, the average editor finds his desk loaded with air transport propaganda. But what happens when "everything goes dead wrong?"

Here's what frequently occurs. Hired bruders smash cameras and plates of newspapermen, trying to procure "shots" of a crash. If they're big enough and smart enough—which is rare indeed—they further attempt to halt reporters in their efforts to secure facts. In the TAT crash in New Mexico, after the great search resulted in the finding of the burned plane and its wreckage, these things are precisely what occurred. Further than that, they occur every time a U. S. Army plane crashes—yet there is no commercial concern more desirous of securing favorable publicity than the aviation branch of the army.

The army air chiefs and the commercial transport magnates will learn their lesson, sooner or later. Conviction of one or two for removing evidence and thwarting justice may be necessary, but the Morning Avalanche doubts it. Public opinion, properly formulated through truth from the newspapers, will likely solve the problem unaided.

Incidents like the one in Kansas City won't help air transportation any at all.

LONDON FOG

The London fog is up against it. The charge brought against it is not that it resembles pea-soup but that it costs money. In three years there have been 27 days of real fog, which caused the losses to lose \$34,457 miles. A lost mile can never be recovered, and each lost mile represents lost transportation for a great number of persons.

Not only is this grave assertion of malicious interruption to traffic brought against the London fog, but its character is assailed. Its thumb prints have been taken; its make-up analyzed. The experts declared it to be nothing more nor less than a soot-laden white mist, so heavy that the cold high atmosphere can't support it, and down it comes to the warm earth like a blanket. Gradually the heat dissolves the mist, but not the soot which remains as a gratuitous contribution to the real estate of London.

When there is no mist to convert the descending soot into fog, the soot comes down by itself and, with other deposits, forms a coating of dirt. From these explorations it is decided to focus public energy on the expulsion of soot from London. If this is achieved the London ground-hog will disappear.

It seems as though some one might have thought of that before.

THE STATE IN PARENT ROLE

It is hardly a square deal to parents to persuade them that their duties and responsibilities toward their children have been taken over by governmental and welfare agencies and then, when the children turn out badly, berate the parents for neglectfulness.

There has been apparent for a number of years a process of taking out of the parent's hands the guardianship of the child. More and more juvenile courts, the schools, welfare agencies, movements and organizations assumed responsibility for the physical, moral and mental well-being of the nation's children, especially in the more populous areas.

As a consequence, some parents have lost their sense of responsibility and their children have ceased to recognize parental authority. To criticize parents who have been encouraged to resign their child-raising duties to the state or public agencies is unfair.

The accusation that the children of this generation are more incorrigible than those of former generations can only be accepted as an admission that the tremendous amount of child welfare work done in recent years has been more harmful than beneficial.

Frequently a good neighborhood is a place where you pay high for the privilege of being after a "bad" neighbor.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

WETS WANT DRY LAW AS REAL ISSUE AT 1930 CONGRESSIONAL ELECTIONS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Wets want to make prohibition as nearly as possible the sole issue at this year's election of United States senators and representatives. This is the explanation of their attempt to force votes in both houses of congress on a proposition to repeal the Eighteenth amendment.

They fully realize that it will be beaten overwhelmingly. However, almost all the present representatives and 28 of the 32 senators whose terms are just expiring will be November candidates to succeed themselves. The wet leaders are eager to put every one on record, that they may know just whom to fight and whom to help henceforward.

Considering how long and how violently prohibition has been argued, it is astonishing how many lawmakers have managed to keep astraddle of the subject thus far.

Among the representatives, perhaps 100 out of the 435 total have contrived to avoid expressing themselves definitely. A senator is too conspicuous to remain on the fence so easily, but concerning several, even of them, there is uncertainty.

The wets concede that a great deal more than half of the doubtful element will choose the dry side if compelled to make a selection, but the two groups will be sorted out at any rate. The wet strategists then will have at least one advantage—they cannot very well be much worse off. Out-numbered two or three to one now, as they estimate, a little additional loss will hardly matter; if they gain it will be noticeable.

While hurling the hypocrisy charge against the dries since the dawn of Volsteadism, the wet leaders have seemed unconsciously of the amount of bunk which they themselves have been broadcasting.

In order to understand their plans of today it is necessary to recognize the complete insincerity of their repeated denials of any intention to nullify the Eighteenth amendment. Its nullification is, of course, essential to the program's success. They personally may do none of the nullifying, but someone must do it or prohibition will be triumphant and that will end the controversy.

The more intelligent wets are coming belatedly to admit as much, which clarifies the situation considerably. They rest, even though pretending not to see through it, are proceeding as if they did.

The latest idea, then, is a super-dose of nullification.

Many dries at last not only concede that enforcement has been unsatisfactory thus far, but some of them, like Senators Borah and Harris, are proclaiming it vehemently. Those of the wets who really have the courage of their convictions favor the thoroughest imaginable strengthening of the dry machinery.

Just as these improvements are being installed they hope by formidable wet congressional gains, to throw the worst wet yet into the dry mechanism, believing they can break it down utterly.

The theory is that the wettest period the country has experienced up to date, under the dryest administration and directly following a maximum enforcement effort, will wreck all public confidence in the prohibition experiment's future, and maybe lead to a wet congress' election in 1932.

The wet managers are not so optimistic as to look for an anti-Volstead majority in the next congress.

They will greet the capture (if they can accomplish it) of five or six senate seats and 20 or 30 in the house of representatives as a tremendous victory, calculated to disrupt dry morale and hopelessly disorganize dry enforcement during the ensuing two years.

Needless to say the vital question is Can the wets do it?

In any event, a clean-cut election issue is highly important to them. To win, they not only must gain seats, but it must be patent that they have gained them.

The dries see the point. They do not so much mind a vote in the senate, where the alignment already is fairly obvious. In the house of representatives, where there is no doubt about a huge dry majority, but inclusive of many members who prefer to keep quiet about the wets probably will find a test mighty difficult.

"PARROT DISEASE" ISN'T COMMON ENOUGH TO CAUSE ALARM

In 1904, three cases of psittacosis or "Parrot Disease" were reported in Boston. Last fall an outbreak of this disease was reported in Buenos Aires and more outbreaks have recently been reported in the United States.

In Hamburg, Germany, 28 cases with five deaths occurred last fall. In the epidemic of psittacosis which occurred in Paris in 1892, there were 49 cases and 16 deaths and it was reported that the infection had been caused by parrots brought from South America.

When psittacosis occurs, it begins with a chill and fever with a good deal of weakness and depression and usually some inflammation of the lungs. The extent of the inflammation of the lungs determines whether or not the patient lives.

When the records of a considerable number of cases are assembled, it is found that from 30 to 40 per cent of the patients die. When the disease was first described in Paris, a germ was isolated from the parrots and it was found to be of the type of the same family as the typhoid germ. This germ is now called bacillus psittacosis.

"Parrot disease" is essentially a medical curiosity and need occasion little alarm among the people of the United States. The symptoms resemble those of other infectious diseases and one should be certain that the disease is actually psittacosis and not pneumonia or other infections of the lungs.

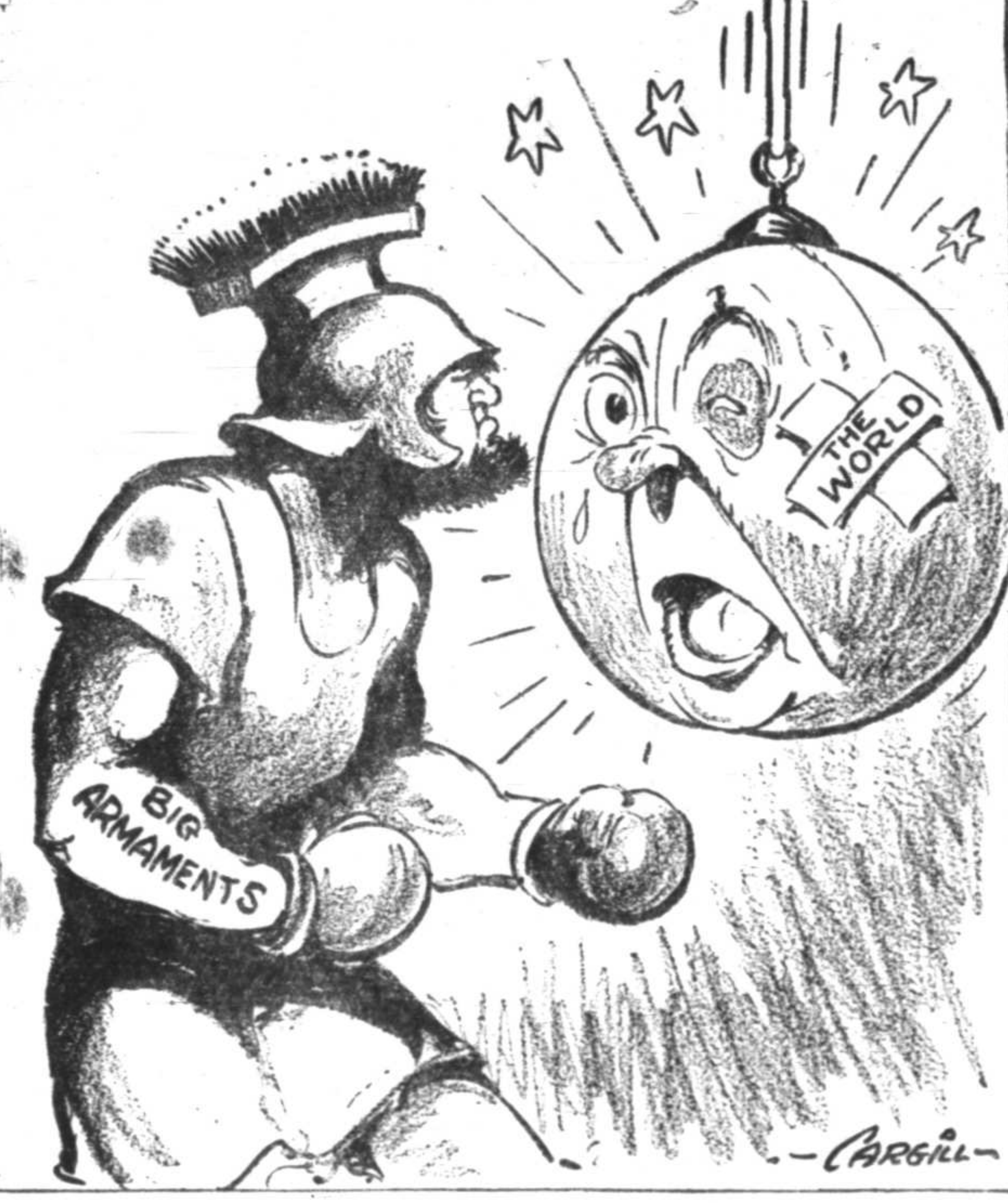
Obviously, the first step is to get the suspected parrot and to find out whether or not he contains the germs which are responsible.

The occurrence of such cases in the United States is new evidence of the fact that methods of transportation, exchange of products among various nations, and the complete abolishing of boundary lines between peoples makes it impossible any longer for a nation to be isolated. The disease of one people will sooner or later appear among others.

Already cases of many of the tropical diseases have been found among the sick in the United States. It is probably that more and more cases are likely to appear in the future, notwithstanding the fact that the United States Public Health Service and all of the health organizations of various nations are concerning themselves with the prevention of such transmission.

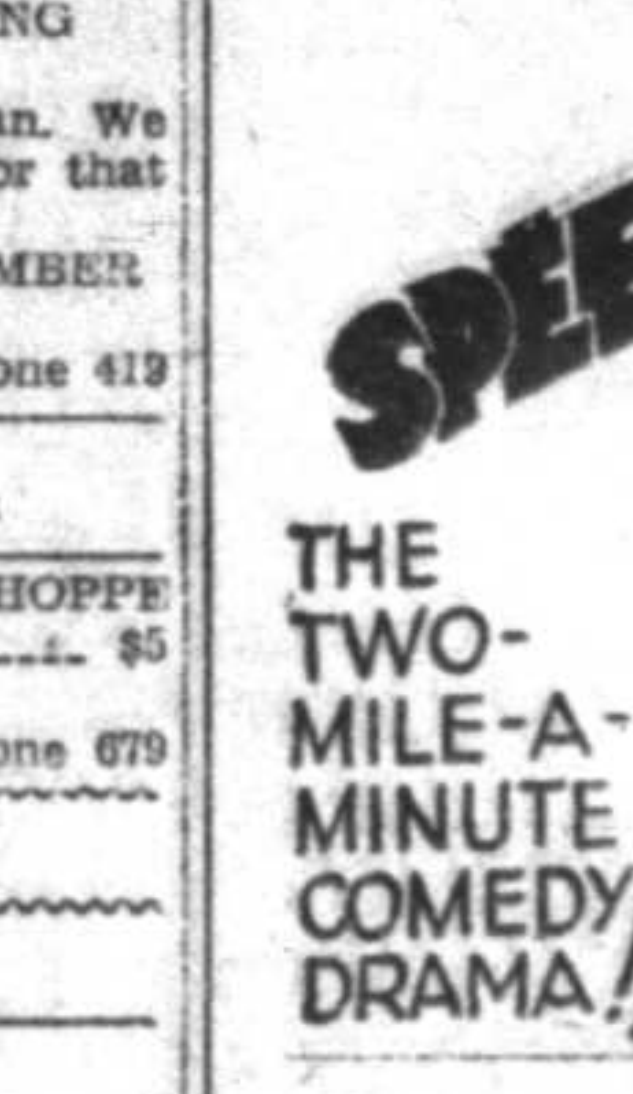

Leidigh Explains Purpose Of Farm Board Committee

Lubbock Members Tell Of College Station Confab To Work Out Plans For Cotton Cooperative

Dean A. H. Leidigh, of the school of agriculture, Texas Technological college, yesterday explained the purpose of the committee meeting recently held at College Station to discuss plans of a Texas unit for the national cotton cooperative.

Dean Leidigh, a member of the committee, having been appointed by Governor Moody, returned yesterday morning.

"We are endeavoring to make possible under the conditions outlined by the federal board for the cotton farmers of Texas to receive assistance from the board and derive benefit under provisions of the national farm act," said Dean Leidigh.

"The government will require that the individual member in the state who is hooked up with the state and national agency by a producer. Attention should be specifically directed to the fact that both the state and national laws require this."

"Our committee had no authority to even discuss the possibility of gin cooperatives, farmers, or buying and selling organizations joining in to secure federal aid. Farmers were warned not to miscellaneous start organizing local cooperatives, because the government will have nothing to do with them."

"In the interest of the best kind of mutual understanding and because of the vast size of the state of Texas it appears probable there will be district organizations in widely separated parts of the state. The committee went on record as being favorable to this development and on the other hand it recognized that existing property rights of people who have for a long time been engaged in active marketing must be taken into consideration. For that reason every effort is being made to have a uniform contract which will provide for district or regional groups when delivery in those groups are sufficient to adequately meet the insistence of the federal farm board."

"To Ask Inspections. "Our committee went on record as asking the board to insure inspection of the cooperative agencies in the manner of back examination employed by the Federal Reserve system."

"The entire program confronting the cooperatives will be discussed at the short course, Dean Leidigh said. Members of the governor's committee are Dr. T. O. Walton, president of Texas A. and M. college, chairman; Dean Leidigh, Lubbock; O. B. Martin, College Station; Harry Williams, Dallas, and Lawrence Westbrook, Waco.

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 29. (P) Using the existing cooperative cotton marketing structure as a nucleus, establishment of a strong central cotton marketing organization in Texas will be recommended to Governor Moody this week by the committee of five named by him at the request of the Federal Farm Board to consider the best method for Texas to apply provisions of the Federal marketing act.

Among other conclusions adopted by the committee in its report at a meeting yesterday was the recommendation that the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Marketing Association be organized as a beginning for the new organization with certain modifications.

The report was the result of three days' deliberations by the committee, headed by President T. O. Walton of A. and M. college. Carl Williams, Oklahoma, cotton member of the Federal Farm Loan Board, and C. O. Moser, Dallas, vice-president and executive secretary of the American Cotton Cooperative Association, the new \$30,000,000 corporation, met with the committee.

Modifications suggested were decentralization of activities, liberalization of the marketing contract and provision for auditing and inspection service under supervision of the Farm Board.

This proposal is to be presented to directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association in Dallas next Tuesday.

McCloskey Trial! Being Considered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (P) — Concluding its hearing of testimony, the house elections committee considering the contest of Harry M. Wurzbach, republican, of the seat from the Fourteenth Texas district held by Representative Augustus McCloskey, democrat, today took the case under consideration in executive session.

In a final plea, Hugh Robertson, attorney for Wurzbach, claimed the 1928 election in Bexar county caused "the rankest corruption in any case ever brought before the house of representatives."

Before a large audience he reiterated charges of conspiracy, and he asserted the governor of Texas had put in a qualifying clause when he signed McCloskey's certificate of election.

"Would the governor have done this if he thought the man had a clear title? No, a thousand times no," Robertson shouted.

NEGRO GIRL FOUND PARIS, Jan. 29. (P) — The scantily-clad body of a negro girl about 12 or 14 years of age, daughter of Will Lee of Detroit, Tex., was found beside a road near Detroit yesterday. The girl apparently was the victim of an attack. Officers investigated a theory the girl had been thrown from an automobile. Dr. J. D. Skidmore of Blossom said he believed the girl died of exposure after an attack.
