RED SUTTON IS INDICTED FOR MURDER

Let Contract On Borden County Road

Grading-Drainage To Be Done From Dawson Line East Highway Department Announces Bid Friday

The State Highway Department last Friday awarded the contract for grading and drainage on Highway Fifteen, east from the Dawson county line to Gall, a distance of 14.2 miles.

Cage Brothers and F. M. Reeves and Sons, Inc., Bishop, were the successful bidders at \$152,444.00.

This is another important step in the completion of the paving on Highway Fifteen, across the state of Texas and part of New Mexico to El Paso.

For many years road enthusiasts of this section have worked long and diligently toward the ultimate finishing of this important road. The first fight was to get the road designated as a state highway and it took several years of digging and countless trips to Austin before this was finally accomplished.

When it finally received State designation, the next step was to get it hard surfaced.

Dawson county succeeded in getting her part of the road finished quite a while ago. Contract was recently let on the east half of Gaines county and now with the letting of the west half of Borden county, this will leave the west side of Gaines, the east side of Borden and across Scurry county unpaved, and present plans of the Highway department are to finish these during the coming year. This will give a shorter, all-year route between Fort Worth and El Paso, with a saving of more than one hundred miles between the two cities, and going directly by the famous Carlsbad Caverns.

P. O. EMPLOYEES OF DISTRICT TO MEET IN LAMESA

Postal employees of the 19th Congressional District will meet in Lamesa Saturday night of this week for a general get-together, according to Postmaster Owen C. Taylor.

Invitations have been sent out to the employees of 127 Post Offices in the district and about one hundred guests are expected. A banquet will be held at the First Methodist church Saturday night at which time a program will be held.

An address by Postal Inspector Olaf Baldwin of Amarillo, and another by Hon. George Mahon will highlight the program.

According to reports Wednesday afternoon, the Daw-Tex test well, which was spudded in last week has reached a depth of sixteen hundred feet. The well is located about ten miles north of Lamesa on the J. E. Neely farm. It is almost due east from the Albaugh-Robinson well, drilled some time ago. Although the drilling was not started until last Wednesday night, sixteen hundred feet was drilled the first week. A rotary rig is now being used, but standard tools will be moved in when the first casing is set.

Oil men over the country are watching this well with a great deal of interest.

Two Former Dawson County Residents Meet Tragic Death

Killed In California Automobile Crash

Tragedy struck twice in rapid succession Saturday, November 26th near Delano, Calif., and claimed the lives of two former Dawson county citizens, Ray Plew and Terrel Renfro.

They were going from their home in McFarland, Calif., to Delano, where Mrs. Plew was visiting, their car overturned by a blow-out, or was struck by a hit-and-run driver. Evidence showed that the car turned over at least three times.

They were rushed to the Delano hospital. Renfro lived only a few minutes, from the result of a broken neck. Plew was given first aid and rushed to the Kern county hospital at Bakersfield, where he died at 8:55 p. m. The accident occurred about 6:45.

Terrell Allen Renfro was born, May 22 at Lamesa. He was converted and baptized in the Baptist church at Midway, in August, 1932. He is survived by his father and mother, five brothers, S. B., R. M., Phillip, Gene and C. B. and six sisters, Mrs. Wilma Bowman, Greenfield, Calif.; Mrs. George Turner and Mrs. Joyce Smith of (Continued on Back Page)

Project Engineer Is Appointed For School Buildings Will Engineer Local Construction On Program

Appointment of Mr. Olin F. Smith, of Austin, as resident engineer for the Federal Public Works Administration on the new \$148,000.00 PWA financed school building program was announced by George M. Bull, regional director, in charge of Region No. 5.

Construction on the new school improvement program, made possible by an outright grant of \$66400 was started on October 13, 1938, and is scheduled for completion in May 1939.

Mr. Smith will bring with him a wide experience gained as engineer on other important undertakings, to aid the school board and the contractors in meeting PWA Administrator Ickes demands for speed, in order that the community may have the new facility as quickly as possible and so that men will be put to work.

Mr. Smith was educated in the University of Texas School of Architecture and has worked for years with the firm of Gieseke and Harris of Austin and also for the State Parks Board. He has designed and supervised construction of some of the best buildings in the southern section of this state.

"It will be his duty," Mr. Bull announced, "to see that the new buildings (Continued on Back Page)

Call Special Term Of District Court To Conduct Trial

Two Others Indicted As Accomplices By Jury

The Dawson County Grand Jury this week returned a bill indicting M. B. (Red) Sutton, for the hi-jacking of Hurt's Haberdashery, and the murder of Maxie Woodroof.

It will be recalled that about a year ago Hurt's store was held up late one Saturday afternoon. The fleeing robber was pursued by Mr. Woodroof, who was clerking in the store. After a chase of about a block, the robber was overtaken and in the ensuing scuffle, Mr. Woodroof was killed.

The robber escaped and for several months no trace was found of the man who committed the crime, but several have been questioned. A few weeks ago, Sutton was arrested in South Texas and returned to Lubbock for questioning on a cold checking charge. He was also questioned on the Lamesa robbery, and was held to await the action of the local grand jury. Scores of witnesses were examined before a bill was returned.

W. P. and D. C. Brown, brothers-in-law of Sutton were indicted as accessories and are held with Sutton in the Dawson county jail. Judge Louis B. Reed, will call a special term of the District Court in Dawson county, beginning next Monday morning and continuing for three weeks. During this special term Sutton will be tried, according to officials.

The regular fall term of the Dawson County District Court will close this week, according to District Judge Reed.

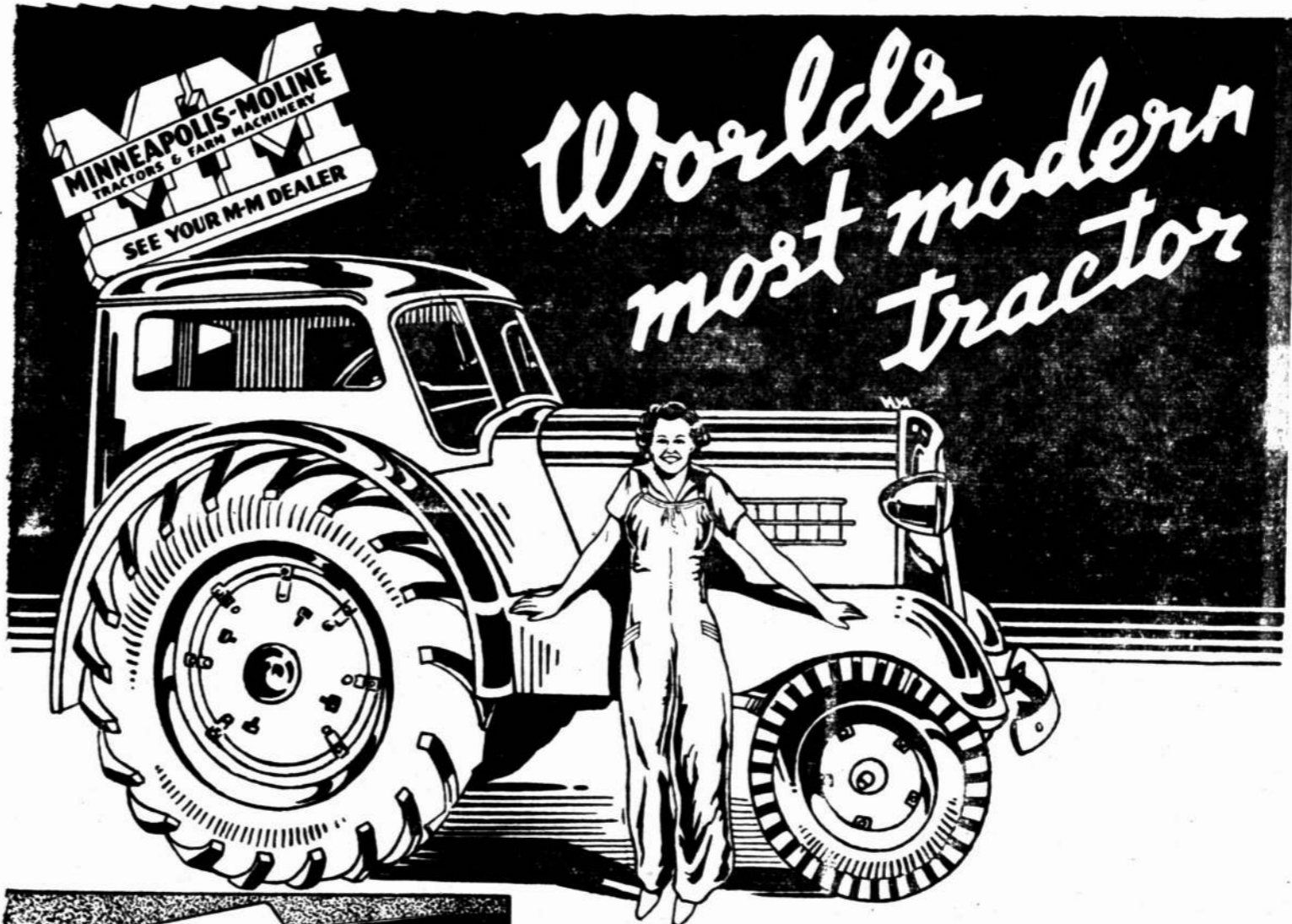

County Chairman Speaks On Program

Joe Peterson Talk Given Over Radio At Big Spring Mon.

Highlights of Farm Program Are Given

In the current discussions of the farm bill many of the most desirable features have been overlooked. Some people have thoughtlessly urged that the measure be repealed. They overlook some very worthwhile features of the bill, which I do not believe any thinking person would want repealed. Among these are the following:

1. The freight rate provision, which authorizes the secretary of agriculture to file applications to correct the rank discriminations against agricultural products in the freight rate structure of the country. This has been one of the greatest burdens agriculture has suffered. I do not believe any thinking person actually interested in the success of the American farm would want this provision repealed.

2. The research provision, which provides for the establishment of laboratories in the different sections of the country and for the search for new markets, new outlets, and new forms of distribution for the various farm products that are produced. Surely no

one wants this desirable feature repealed.

3. The export provision, which provides for 30 per cent of the tariff collections to be devoted to exporting farm commodities and to distributing these commodities and their products among the needy people in America. Surely no wise person would want this provision repealed.

4. The Soil Conservation provision. Every man, woman and child in America is interested in the conservation and rebuilding of the soil. Some of the finest work that has been done in this generation in connection with the soil conservation provisions of the act. I do not see how anyone can object to this provision.

5. The loan provision, which is intended to prevent complete price collapse. Last year we produced the greatest cotton crop in history. We produced the greatest wheat crop since 1915. In 1923, with a smaller cotton crop than in 1937, cotton sold at 4c and 5c per pound. In 1932, with a smaller wheat crop than in 1937, wheat sold at 20 per bushel.

Low and unsatisfactory as prices are now, they are infinitely better than they were in 1932. In addition the cotton and wheat farmers are receiving soil conservation payment. The cotton farmer is receiving a price adjustment payment and the cotton and wheat farmers are to receive some additional parity payments.

If any cotton or wheat farmer will take his pencil and figure these payments and prices along side the 1932

tragedy, he will find how much better off he is with the present program than he would be with no program at all.

At the beginning of the 1938 cotton picking period there was a carryover of 13,000,000 bales, more than twice the annual consumption of cotton in the United States. Any program, any plan that may be offered must deal with this tremendous carryover.

Everyone familiar with the facts knew that the new farm act of 1938 was going into effect during the most difficult period that could be conceived. The tremendous surpluses that had been produced in our major crops complicated the problem to an extreme degree.

It seems to me that anyone sincerely interested in the success of the farm program should be willing to wait until there is a thorough try-out of the new measure or at least until one season has passed before beginning to sow the seeds of discord and to stir up dissatisfaction.

No one claims the law perfect. On the other hand, no fair man can deny that it has many desirable features. No man is wise enough to predict in advance just how it will work out. This much is certain: anyone who is attacking it when the new season has just started is not making a contribution to the welfare of the farmer.

No doubt in the light of the experience, some changes will be found necessary. These changes can and should be made. Congress does not

meet until January. By that time I am sure any needed changes will be much clearer. In the meantime, I hope that all farmers and every sincere friend of agriculture will refrain from interfering to the end that the best possible results may be obtained.

Any act, for its success, depends upon three things:

1. The form of the law.
2. The character of administration.
3. The cooperation of those in whose interest it is enacted.

No law however perfect can be successful unless it is well administered. No law however, perfect, even if well administered, can succeed unless the people who are affected are willing to cooperate. He does the farmer no service who lights the torch of intolerance and who undertakes to create dissatisfaction at the very time during which the most critical part of the work is being done.

The agricultural program today is not a bill. It is a movement, and the bills are but various steps in that movement.

It involves credits. We have the lowest farm interest rates that have ever prevailed in the history of this country.

It involves markets. We have a specific provision for widening the markets both at home and abroad.

It involves freight rates. We have provision for correcting the inequities in the freight rate structure.

It involves research and new uses. Provision has been made for work along

these lines. It involves the preservation of the soil. This is the heart of the present program.

It involves the handling of our vast surpluses which are sometimes produced within the borders of America.

Provision is made in the act by which the farmers, under a 2-3 vote, can vote, can provide for regulating the disposal of excessive surpluses. At the same time it provides for widening of the markets and increasing the sale

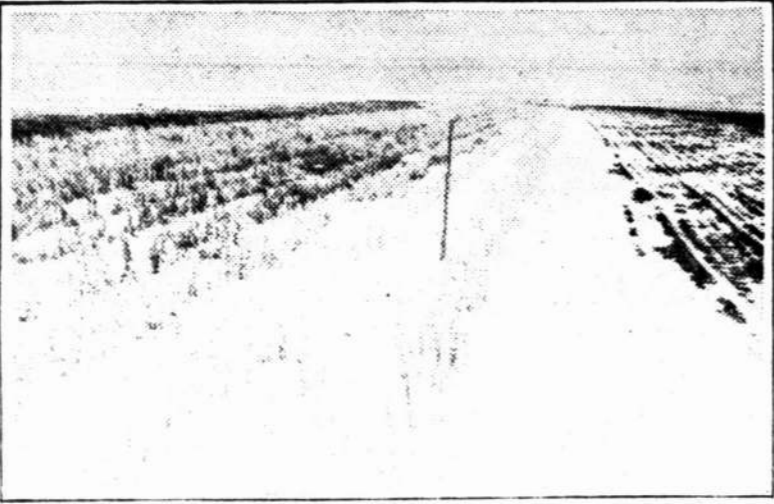

Hold Snow Where It Falls



Snow held on the ground where it falls means more moisture for crop and grass growth in the spring. It also means that the ground is not so hard and that the snow is swept into gullies, against buildings, or into fence row drifts.

Terracing Holds Moisture of Snow

Snow, held on the ground where it falls, melts and soaks into the soil to provide more moisture for crop and grass growth in the spring.

When snow falls in the High Plains area, it usually is subject to the force of strong winds which prevail during the winter and early spring. H. H. Fennell, director of the Soil Conservation Service points out. If the ground is smooth and there is nothing to break the force of the wind, the snow is swept into gullies and roadside ditches, against buildings, or into fence row drifts.

When this occurs, grass lands are left bare and cultivated fields not only barren, but smooth and glazed so that the next high winds may start the blowing of topsoil.

Snow swept into gullies and ditches means that the moisture has been lost for crop or grass growth, Fennell points out. This fact is made evident by the vegetation that grows in draws, drainageways and in roadside ditches during the dry periods.

Where snow is held on pastures by contour furrows and ridges or diversion structures, and on cultivated fields by terraces, crop stubble or strips of vegetation, the moisture is conserved for crop use, it is pointed out.

Grass stubble and strips of vegetation also serve as protection against soil blowing in areas where wind erosion is a serious problem, the Soil Conservation Service official states. Strips of vegetation also aid in the propagation of wildlife food and cover during the winter months.

In areas where snowfall is followed by strong winds, it has been observed that furrows and ridges hold the snow in small drifts, while on untreated pasture land, the snow is swept into

gullies or into huge drifts against the fences or other obstructions.

"Conservation practices and crop residues can play an important part in conserving moisture by holding the drifting snow," Fennell says. "In many instances in this semi-arid area, water from melting snow may mean the difference between crop success and failure."

I am sure that if all those who have a simple heart interest in the success of the greatest of all American business, American agriculture, will calmly analyze and show a disposition to cooperate in working out the final program, great progress can be made.
