It is a healthy thing in our democratic way of life to have intelligent understanding of the important functions of our basic institutions. This is especially true of the schools. The initiative and resourcefulness and the wisdom and leadership that our schools are inculcating in the youth of today are the answer of the problems of citizenship in the years ahead.

Yes, "bring me men to match my mountains." That is the need of our times and must come from the public schools—schools that are strong in virtues required for building strong men and women.

We can be assured of this and do our part in understanding and helping the public schools to fulfill their great obligation to our times by being a participant in the annual Public Schools Week, March 6 through March 10, 1961. Schools will hold open house, accept their hospitality, and you will enjoy the experience of going back to school—if it but for a day.

FOR U. S. SENATOR

Many Vehicles Need to Be Inspected Now

The deadline for all vehicles that travel Texas Highways to have inspection stickers on the windshield is fast approaching. Fewer vehicles have been inspected thus far than ever before at this time of the year, since the inception of the State Vehicle Inspection law. The law is sound and has prevented many unsafe vehicles from traveling our highways.

According to L. A. Welch, who operates the only official inspection station in Santa Anna, there are more than 600 vehicles in the Santa Anna area that have not been inspected—and the deadline is only 43 days away. This 43 days includes six Sundays, which actually leaves only 37 days in which to get 600 vehicles inspected. That means an average of better than 16 vehicles are going to have to be inspected each day. In order for one station to inspect that number of vehicles per day, they are going to have to be brought in pretty rapidly.

The law says the sticker will be on the windshield no later than April 15. Usually about a day or two after April 15 the law enforcement officers begin getting strict about the enforcement of this law.

Are you going to be one of those who will be waiting in a long line to get your vehicle inspected—or even worse yet, will you be one of those who will receive traffic tickets for not having the inspection sticker on your windshield? If you get a traffic ticket for this the minimum cost will be \$15.50 plus the fact that you will be forced to get the inspection.

It would seem the best thing to do is get that vehicle in the inspection station now, while there is still time.

State Capital NEWS

Austin — Both pro- and anti-sales taxers declare they're in a better position now that Gov. Price Daniel has dropped his support of the payroll tax plan.

Pro-sales taxers say this will leave the Legislature practically no choice but to pass a general sales tax. But opponents say it clears the way to getting down to "numerous other plans."

In his message dropping the payroll tax, the governor also said that he felt neither a sales nor income tax had a chance of passage. He recommended instead the State Finance Advisory Commission's second choice plan, extension of excise taxes.

Under this plan, new items to be taxed would include restaurant meals, gas, and electric household appliances, jewelry and watches, soft drinks, building materials, business machines, home and office furnishings, and boat and automobile parts.

Taxes on these items would be increased: motor vehicles, gasoline, air conditioners (to include central systems), cosmetics, beer, liquor, wine and

boats and motors.

ELECTIVE INSURANCE BOARD

A proposal to grant the people the right to elect the members of the Insurance Board has been introduced by Rep. David Read of Big Spring.

The appointive Board has been under severe criticism for several years, especially since it suddenly increased insurance rates on motorists, based on traffic violations.

Bill is patterned after the law requiring the election of the Railroad Commissioners. It is the sponsor's belief that the public would be given more consideration if the insurance posts were elective positions.

AUTO INSURANCE PLAN HIT

Texas' merit rating plan for auto insurance came in for heavy criticism as the Senate Insurance Committee considered a measure calling for extensive changes.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo declared that, at present, it's not how you drive, but whether you get caught, that determines your insurance premiums.

Under a revised plan sponsored by Senator Hazlewood, insurance premiums would be raised only for more serious traffic violations. No penalty points would be assigned for anything that happened before January 1, 1960.

In taking apart the present plan, Senator Hazlewood said it is inequitable because, among other reasons, (1) it doesn't apply to commercial vehicles such as trucks, taxis, etc. and (2) traffic tickets aren't passed out as readily in small towns as large ones.

No one appeared to disagree with his view.

WATER BILL PASSED

A bill to raise the amount the State Water Development Board can lend for local water projects gained final passage from both Houses.

It will become law with the governor's signature. Governor Daniel favors the bill, called it "a great step forward." Bill will allow the board to lend up to \$15,000,000 for any one project.

Another water measure under consideration would allow the state to buy conservation storage space in Texas reservoirs, saving and selling water that would otherwise run off. It is in the form of a constitutional amendment and is sponsored by Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas.

Supporters hope to gain legislative approval in time to have it put on the ballot at the same time as the run-off in the

WOMEN LOSE ROUND

Women's rights advocates lost by one vote an effort to get their proposed constitutional amendment sent immediately to the Senate floor.

Instead, the amendment designed to wipe out with one stroke all differences in legal treatment of men and women was sent to subcommittee.

A large delegation of women came to plead for the measure. Objectors said a law-by-law approach should be taken to avoid legal chaos.

SCHOOL DAY INCREASE

House passed to the Senate a bill which would increase the time during which a child may be legally compelled to attend school.

Present requirement is to attend school from 7 to 16 years of age for 120 days each year. House bill would change the age limit from 6 to 16 years of age and the school year to 180 days.

At the request of Rep. Jack Woods of Waco, the House removed a provision that would have required 17-year-olds to stay in school.

JOB CLASSIFICATION APPROVED

A bill to assure "like pay for like work" among state employees has moved to within one step of final House passage.

Sponsored by Rep. John A. Huebner Sr. of Bay City, the bill enacts a job classification system and raises the salaries of workers receiving less than the standard salary for those in their category. No salary cuts would be made.

Estimated cost of the required raises under the measure is \$450,000 a year.

PROPERTY OWNERS UPHOLD

Two cases involving disputes between property owners and oil and gas drillers were ruled on by the State Supreme Court.

In a Lubbock County case, the high court ruled that a drilling firm was responsible for damages caused by salt water pollution of an irrigation well — even though the property owners had given permission for salt water disposal on the land.

In another case, the court ruled that drillers using the sand fracturing process to open up subsurface cracks to release gas were trespassing on the rights of neighboring lease holders.

SHORT SNORTS

Rep. Robert Hughes of Dallas is sponsor of a bill to strengthen laws against cruelty to animals. House gave final approval to a bill to require run-offs in special elections to fill congressional vacancies. Present law applies only to U. S. senatorial races.

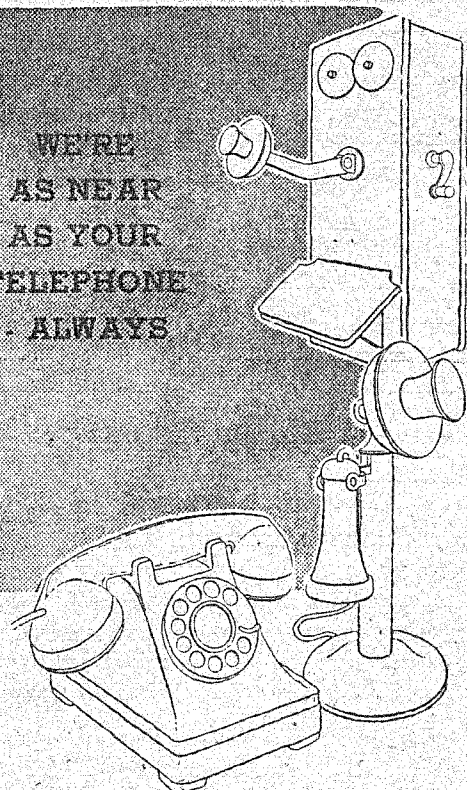

Major Crime Up 13.1 Percent During 1960

Major crime in Texas increased 13.1 percent in 1960 over 1959, led by hikes of some 25 percent in robbery and burglary, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported today.

The total number of estimated offenses in 1960 was 57 percent greater than the 1955 total, the department said.

The department's report, compiled from data reported by Texas sheriffs and chiefs of police, indicated the following:

Murder and homicide — 1,080 estimated offenses; rate per 100,000 population 11.7; down 1.3 percent from 1959.

Rape — 1,196 estimated offenses; rate 13; up 2.7 percent.

Robbery — 3,560 estimated offenses; rate 38.6; up 25.7 percent.

Aggravated assault — 12,128 estimated offenses; rate 131.5; up 1.8 percent.

Theft — 108,869 estimated offenses; rate 1,180; up 12 percent.

Auto theft — 15,147 estimated offenses; rate 164.2; down 4.3 percent.

The total number of estimated offenses involving these seven

types of major crime during 1960 was 198,956 or a rate of 2,157 per 100,000 population, for an increase of 13.1 percent over 1959.

"This means there was an average of a little over one major crime committed in Texas every three minutes of every day of the year 1960," said Col. Homer Garrison Jr., department director.

"The picture of the crime problem in our state can be seen even more clearly by a further breakdown: Murder and homicide occurred at the rate of about three per day; rape occurred on an average of three per day; robbery, 10 per day; burglary, 156 per day or about 6.5 every hour; theft, 298 per day or about 12 per hour; and auto theft, 41 daily or nearly two every hour."

SUBSIDITIS
Federal Government subsidies to special economic groups are on the march. In 1960 they amounted to \$7.1 billion in comparison with a mere \$1.19 billion in 1950.

The Joint Economic Committee staff defines a subsidy as an act by governmental unit involving either a payment, a remission of charges, or supplying commodities or services at less than cost or market price, with the intent of achieving a particular economic benefit.

Using the foregoing definition we now have about 150 Federal subsidy programs: Agriculture, Labor, Business, Urban Renewal, Public Housing and Home Financing are the major subsidies. Not included in the \$7.1 billion total of subsidies in 1960, were veteran's benefits, aid to other countries under our mutual security program and grants to States for assistance to the needy.

Subsidies have grown to the point where now there are very few Americans who do not get money from at least one of them.

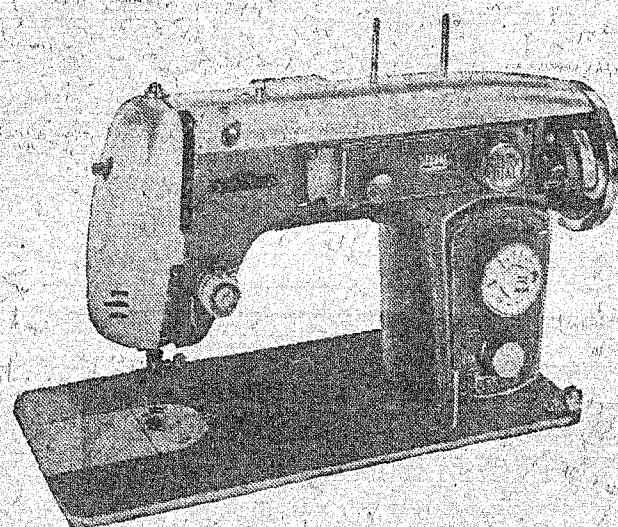

Mr. Curry said that a \$35,000, 600 contingency fund provided by the 1961 Agricultural Appropriations Act has just been released to the Farmers Home Administration to meet the growing demand for credit.

This move was taken by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Mr. Curry said, in an effort to make certain, within the authorities and funds available, that no qualified family-type farmer will be required to give up farming because of his inability to finance his 1961 operations.

Because of high operating costs and unfavorable margins of profits, many farmers have exhausted their regular sources of farm operating credit. The amount of operating loans made so far this year by the Farmers Home Administration totals 20 percent higher than last year. The credit Agency's biggest lending season lies just ahead as farmers prepare to start their spring work.

The Farmers Home Administration makes operating loans primarily to help eligible farm families make improved use of their land and labor resources on family-type farms and make needed changes in their farming systems. Most of the changes call for adopting better farming practices and improving the efficiency of their farming operations. Loans may also be made to qualified farmers who carry on smaller than family-type operations.

Operating loans help farmers pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, tractor fuel and other farm and home operating needs including the refinancing of chattel debts. Loans are scheduled for repayment in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay over periods up to seven years. The interest rate is five percent.

Further information on these loans may be obtained from the County Office of the Farmers Home Administration located in Room 412, Coleman County State Bank Building, Coleman, Texas.

The normally healthy infant should be checked about every six weeks during the first year, every three months during the second year, and once a year from the sixth to twelfth year. Most medical authorities believe that from about 12 to age 40 or 45, annual health check-ups are adequate. After 45, some doctors advise examinations every nine months. These time schedules, kept in mind, are suggested for normal people without previous serious or chronic illness.

No single examination can be applied to all persons, but all check-ups include a medical history, the actual physical examination, and may include certain laboratory and x-ray procedures as determined to be necessary. The medical history gives the physician clues as to what he should be especially alert for when he begins the examination. It will include such things as social and occupational habits, past illnesses, present symptoms. Armed with this advance knowledge the physician can frequently detect the possibility of disease long before abnormal physical signs become apparent to the patient. (A weekly feature from the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

Basis for GI Insurance Dividend Told By V. A.

The Veterans Administration today identified which veterans and which will not share in more than a quarter-billion dollar GI insurance dividend to be distributed under the President's accelerated payment plan designed to assist the economy.

P. J. Mims, Manager of the VA regional office in Waco, Texas, outlined a step-by-step method GI policyholders could use to find out if they have a dividend coming.

First, locate your GI insurance policies. Next, take note of the policy number — especially the letter in front of it.

Then, follow this guide: (1) You will get a dividend — If the letter "V" precedes the policy number, or if the letter "K" precedes the policy number.

(2) You will not receive a dividend — If the letters "RS", "W", "RH", or "H" precede the policy number, if you have already received your dividend for 1961, you will not receive another one. If you placed your policy under in-service waiver of premium payment which is still in effect.

Mr. Mims pointed out that about 261,000 policyholders in Texas will participate in the dividend.

He urged veterans to forego buying their individual questions to VA. "Veterans will help themselves and VA by not flooding our office with individual phone calls and letters."

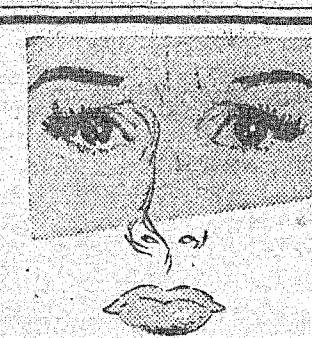

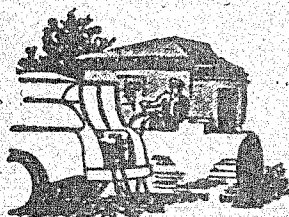

The clinic will be under the direction of Dr. J. Paul Board, who recently moved to Waco from Temple where he was on the staff of the VA Center.

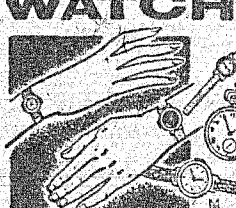

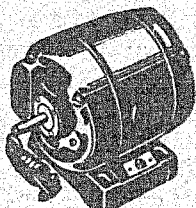
