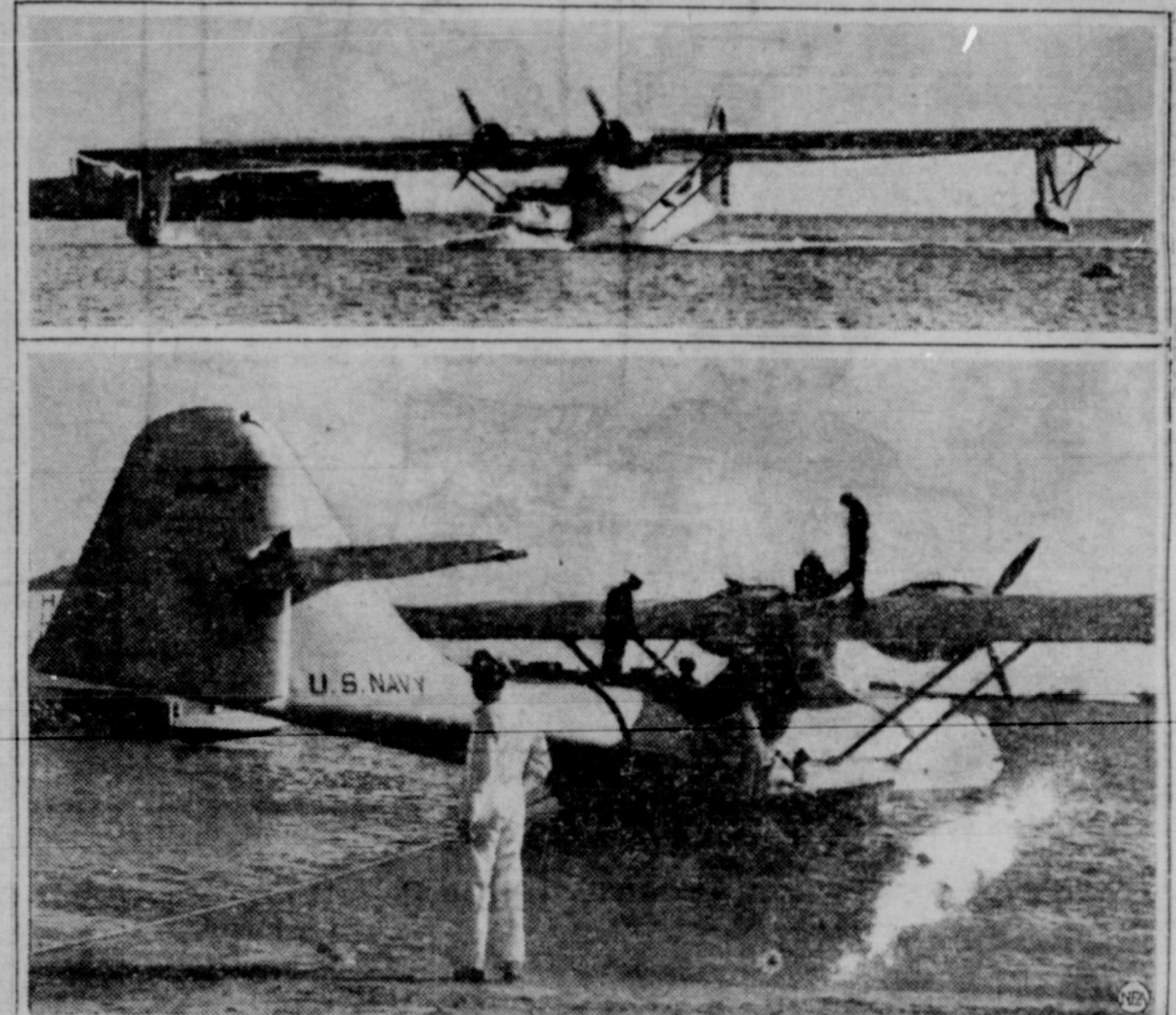

Sixty of These Ships Will Form New U. S. Armada



Construction of a mighty armada of 66 giant air cruisers, patterned after the twin-motored flying patrol boat XP3Y-1 shown above, will get under way immediately, the Naval Bureau of Aeronautics announces, and may revise completely functions of the aerial wing of the U. S. fleet. Recently, the XP3Y-1, shown in top photo taking off, and in lower photo being re-fueled, made a record 3700-mile non-stop flight from Panama to Alameda, Calif. A local base at Hawaii and floating tenders, it is believed, will be provided for the projected air fleet, which could cross the Pacific non-stop. Note the retractable wing pontoons.

WPA PROJECTS IN COUNTY ARE AT STANDSTILL

Hope to Have Two of Project Going in Short Time

Community projects approved for Memphis and Hall county under the Works Progress Administration last week-end are at a standstill here, according to County Judge Jim Vallance.

It is not known definitely when work will get underway, but it is thought that it will likely be later in the fall. At present Hall County is busy harvesting the cotton and feed crops over the county, and the number of local men that should be put to work on the projects would not be sufficient to warrant work orders, it is believed.

However, it is hoped that at least two of the projects may be started soon. These are the landscaping of the High School grounds and the conversion of the old East Ward school building into a community and club center, one project, and the transferring of the government canning kitchen here over to the WPA.

The canning kitchen is at present operating on the same basis as heretofore. While awaiting word from the district WPA officials at Lubbock, Mrs. C. A. Williams has her canning crew busy putting up foodstuff on the toll system, which provides that the workers be paid by a part of the goods canned.

AERIAL CIRCUS ARMISTICE DAY IN THIS CITY

Hatch Flying Service of Fort Worth to Stage Show Here

The Hatch Flying Service of Fort Worth will stage an air circus in this city, at the Airport, Armistice Day.

Johnny Holden, advance man for the attraction, was in the city yesterday, making arrangements for the appearance of the airplane attractions here next Monday.

The company will bring two planes to the city, one an open job and the other a cabin Stinson, and will carry passengers during the show, which will start at noon. The personnel of the show will include A. D. Hatch and O. L. Holden, pilots, and Raymond Fitzgerald, parachute jumper.

Free attractions will consist of exhibition stunt flight, wing walking and a parachute jump, and there will be no charge for admission to the field.

BOTH TESTS IN HALL COUNTY ARE DRILLING

Phillips Fishes Bit And Resumes Work After Short Delay

Both of Hall County's oil tests are steadily making hole now, according to reports reaching the Democrat from the locations.

Knorpp No. 1, which resumed operations last week, after being shut down for several weeks, is making good progress it is said, but no information is available as to the depth of the hole at the present time.

The Knorpp tests are just south of the river, near the Ox Bow crossing, on the southeast quarter Section 7, Block A, A. B. & M. Survey.

The Phillips test, near Parnell, is drilling again, after a twelve hour shutdown, due to a lost bit. This test is being pushed down by three shifts of drillers and work never stops, except in case of an accident, like the losing of the bit day before yesterday.

Leases in the vicinity of the Phillips test are said by local oil men to be changing hands daily, and bringing good prices.

GERMAN EMBARGO

The German foreign office today revealed that Germany had imposed an embargo on arms and ammunition to Italy and Ethiopia when the war first started. Britain hailed the action of Germany in prohibiting profiteering in exports of war materials to Italy.

TAX EXEMPTION BLANKS READY

Exemption For Home Used Cotton May Now Be Secured

Application blanks for tax exemption on cotton to be ginned for the making of mattresses, quilts and other house-hold purposes for home use are now available at the office of James A. Jackson, county farm agent.

Tenants, land owners, share-croppers or any man working through a definite number of acres of cotton on any farm are entitled to the tax exemption on the lint cotton. Not more than one exemption will be made to one family, regardless of the number of contracts the family may possess, Mr. Jackson stated. However, all tenants, share-croppers and landlords on one farm are entitled to the exemptions.

In accordance with the AAA specifications, no one person may secure more than 110 pounds of lint cotton to be ginned tax free. The cotton also must be grown this year and must be used for domestic purposes within the producer's house-hold.

PRESERVING THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS

THE newspaper fraternity, and that part of the public as a whole which realizes the absolute necessity of preserving the freedom of the press, will cheer the opinion handed down yesterday by the Court of Criminal Appeals that District Judges do not have the right or authority to forbid the publication of testimony in public criminal trials.

The decision freed six Houston newspapermen who had been judged in contempt of court by Judge M. S. Munson, of Angleton, in the recent trial of a life term prisoner for murder.

The opinion of the court was that newspapers have a constitutional right to publish proceedings of the courts of the land.

Many groups and blocs in the past have sought, fortunately unsuccessfully, to curtail the freedom of the press, and this will no doubt be repeated many times in the future. If

the attempt is ever successful, the results will be far more dire than the average man may think.

Some newspapers and magazines are, we regret to say, subsidized by various special interests, but the great majority of the newspapers of the land are free to disseminate their honest opinions on any and all subjects.

With a muzzle on the press, the special interests would be free to bulk the country wholesale, and the people would never find it out until too late to do anything about it, except regret the fact.

With a free press, the public is informed of movements and the real reasons behind them.

In championing any cause this newspaper, or any other, does not so much care that its readers agree with our views as it does that they "think" on the subject under discussion before acting.

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BOOMING AGAIN SAY MERCHANTS

Business Men Report One of Best Days In Years Saturday

Business is booming again in The Queen City of the Upper Red River Valley and her Trade Territory, if one may believe local merchants, as well as more reliable indications.

According to retail merchants around the business section, the multitude of people that poured into Memphis last Saturday was the biggest in some time, and the volume of business done here was the biggest this year. Others reported that the volume of business transactions here last Saturday reached a peak since the autumn of 1933.

Drug firms, grocery stores, dry good concerns, confectionaries, garages, filling stations and other business enterprises were included in a canvas of the town in determining the amount of business transactions in Memphis last week end.

And the answers that local entrepreneurs gave sounded almost as optimistic as a chamber of commerce report.

The county court house was swamped with farmers, ranchers and townspeople transacting business there. The county agricultural agent and his force of technical workers report the busiest day in the history of the office Saturday.

More people passed through the county agent's office that day getting their ten percent tax exemption tickets, filing their sales tax reports and transacting other farming matters than ever before here, Mr. Jackson said. Since the government is involved more in farming matters than formerly, it is thought definitely that more people have dealings with the

county agriculture office than ever before.

Despite these trends of increased business and business demands, there was at least one institution in the city that suffered a severe set-back. This was the petit courts of the city.

Justice Court attaches here reported a lax week-end. Ordinarily from 20 to 30 drunks are thrown in the local calaboose, but last Saturday, Sunday and Monday resulted in arrests here to the extent of almost 50.

Justice of the Peace W. L. Wheat dismissed the matter from his mind by saying that he "guessed everyone was too busy to get drunk."

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

NOW is the time to make your Thanksgiving mince-meat so it can ripen a few weeks before using and, if you use apple brandy in the making you'll have a flavor that can't be imitated.

Charlotte E. Field, noted New York chef, also uses this fine seasoning aid in plum pudding, wine jellies, fruit cakes, brandied peaches, sauces and mousses.

This is Miss Field's recipe for mince meat. She says it will make six pies.

Mince Meat

Two pounds lean beef, 5 pounds apples, 1 pound beef suet, 2 pounds raisins, 2 pounds currants, 1 pound Sultana raisins, 1-2 pound shredded citron, 1-3 pound candied orange peel, 2 tablespoons ground cinnamon, 1 tablespoon grated nutmeg, 1 tablespoon cloves, 1 tablespoon allspice, 1 tablespoon salt, 2 1-2 pounds brown sugar, 1 pint sherry, 1 quart apple brandy, grated rind and juice 2 oranges, grated rind and juice 2 lemons.

Boil beef until tender and chop fine. Pare and chop apples and weigh. Chop suet and remove strings. Mix all ingredients and cook until apples are clear. Seal in jars and let ripen for two weeks.

Don't think mince meat is good only in pies. It makes delicious cakes and puddings, too, and it's very easy to use.

Mince Meat Pudding

One cup mince meat, 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup milk, 2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon salt.

Beat eggs until light. Soften butter and add with milk to eggs. Mix and sift flour, salt and soda several times and sift into first

mixture. Add mince meat and mix thoroughly. Turn into a buttered mold and steam two and one-half hours. Unmold and serve with hard sauce.

When mince pie or a pudding made with mince meat is the dinner dessert, the meat course should not be heavy because there are a lot of calories in mince meat. A nourishing cream soup, an egg dish with a vegetable and a fruit salad makes a splendid setting for mince pie.

Eggs and Mushrooms

Four hard boiled eggs, 1-2 pound mushrooms, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 tablespoon salt, 1-3 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup milk.

Melt butter and add mushrooms which have been cleaned and cut in small pieces. Cook five minutes and sift over flour. Stir until blended and add parsley, salt and pepper. Add milk, stirring constantly and bring to the boiling point, cover and simmer for five minutes. Cut hard cooked eggs in thick slices and add to mushroom mixture. Heat thoroughly and serve on squares of hot buttered toast.

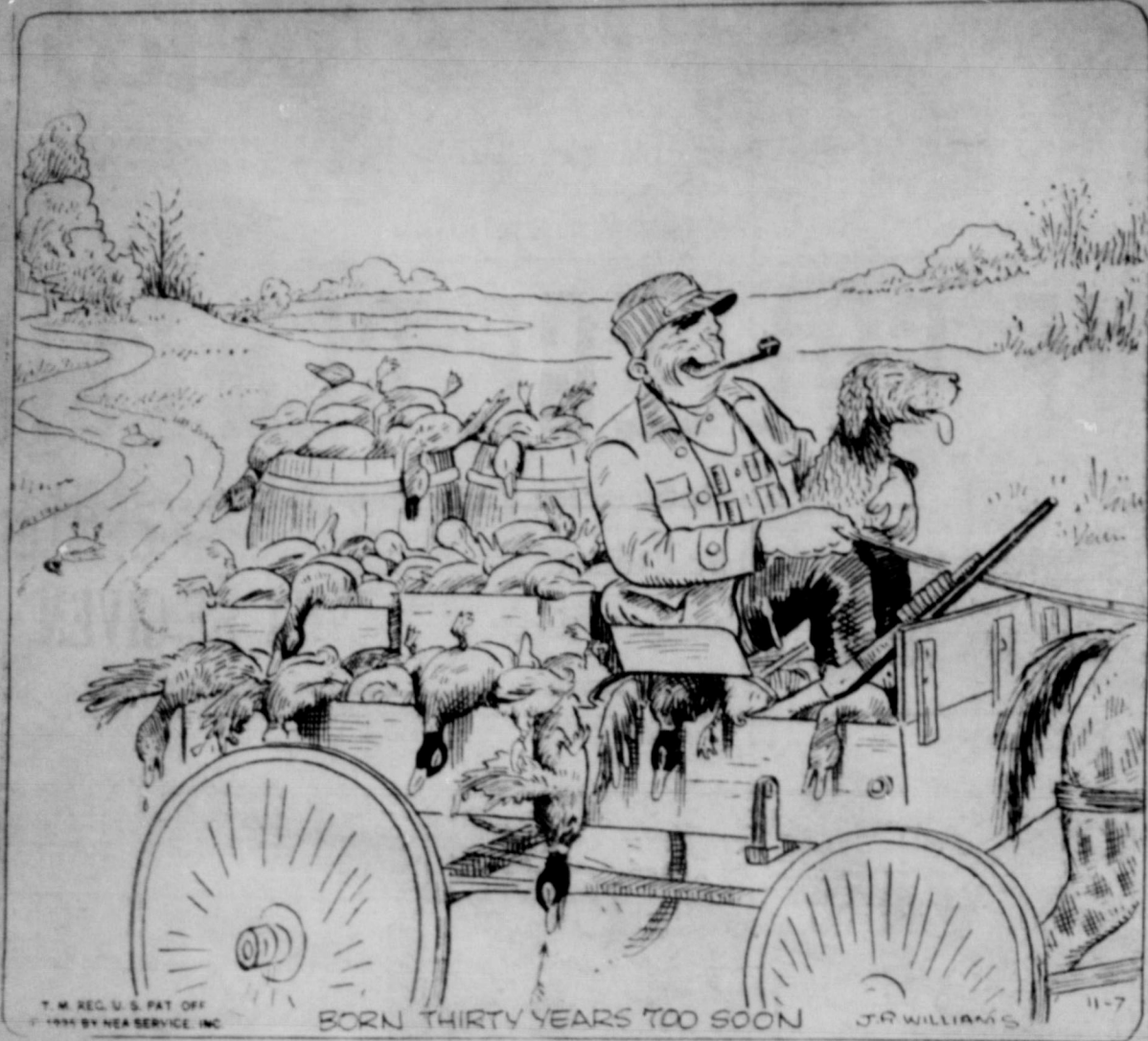

Tax Collections Are Better

Collection of state and county taxes for the past month took a decided spurt over the preceding month, according to figures released this morning by Tax Collector and Assessor Holt Bonds.

Tax reports show that \$2,582 were collected here during the month of October in both current and delinquent county taxes, which includes common school and road taxes. This compares with only \$726.45 which was collected during the preceding month on delinquent taxes. Current taxes did not go into effect until the past month.

A sum of \$7y6.89 was collected during the past month in state collections for both current and delinquent payments, as compared with \$210.70 in delinquent taxes for the month before.

Eleven poll tax receipts are listed at the tax collector's office. The force was busy today mailing out statements of the current year's taxes to taxpayers over the entire county.
