More Than Forty Contractors Are Present at Courthouse Monday

More than forty bidders were represented at the courthouse Monday afternoon when bids for the new high school building for Junction were opened. Among the local bidders represented were Maxwell and Ramsey and Luther Hill and Roy Reynolds.

No contracts were awarded Monday and some of the low bidders in each class were requested to present additional information before the bids will be let.

The interest shown by contractors and the figures submitted show that the board has selected an opportune time to construct the building as several thousand dollars will be saved as the contractors have submitted unusually low bids.

The board has ten days from the time the bids were opened before coming to a decision, and during this time the investigations will be completed and the contract let.

Kimble County Ranchmen Favor 'Eat More Lamb'

E. S. Mayer Discusses Movement At Courthouse Tuesday Afternoon

Approximately forty sheep growers were present at the courthouse Tuesday afternoon to hear the "Eat More Lamb" movement discussed by Mr. E. S. Mayer of San Angelo, and Mr. Racey of Dallas. Mr. Blanton of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Magazine was present but did not address the sheep men.

County Chairman George R. Pepper called the meeting to order at 2:30 p. m. and introduced Captain H. W. Rieck, who, in a few brief words, presented the subject and introduced Mr. Mayer of San Angelo, the principal speaker of the afternoon. He discussed at length the movement and then introduced Mr. Racey, who gave a graphic presentation of the "Eat More Lamb" movement by means of charts.

At the close of the lecture, the ranchmen showed their interest by agreeing to join in the movement by contributing one cent for each sheep annually for a period of five years. If the sheep raisers through the country will each sign up for a period of five years, it will furnish ample funds for advertising purposes. It is generally known that the purpose of the movement is to create a fund to advertise the lamb industry as a source of meat supply. During the afternoon, many things were advanced to show why lamb is not as popular on the table as it should be.

The Kimble County ranchmen are behind the movement and are hoping to see an improvement in the business before many months as a result of the co-operative advertising campaign.

Insurance Department Pleads Against Holiday Fire Hazards



Chief John Hankins of the Junction Fire Department has received the following letter from the Texas Fire Insurance Department:

"The Texas Fire Insurance Department is anxious that every precaution be taken in your community against 'Holiday Hazards,' and we are appealing to you to make regular inspections during the month of December.

"Periodic inspections are better than none at all, but we are in favor of daily inspections.

"We believe that the fire marshal and fire chief should work together in arranging a systematic inspection of their community. A fire chief's big job today is 'Fire Prevention' work instead of waiting for a fire to start as in the old days. Experience has proven that firemen make good inspectors on account of their long period of training, and by working under the supervision of the Fire Chief it will be possible to have different men on duty each day, and in this manner daily inspections are made possible.

"The Holidays introduce special hazards in the home and in the commercial districts in the form of combustible decorations and candles, lanterns or fire-works. You should recommend the purchase of decorations which have been impregnated with a solution which prevents their burning readily. Asbestos should be used instead of cotton wool for Christmas 'snow.' Substantial candlesticks should be used, and candles should not be put on Christmas trees, in windows or near curtains, near decorations, or in paper lanterns.

"We suggest that you use your local newspaper in urging your people to co-operate with you in keeping down 'Holiday Hazards' and in doing so constantly keep before them that heavy losses naturally affect insurance rates adversely, and that it is the people themselves and not the insurance companies who pay the losses.

"A low fire loss in Texas during December will help to establish a lower annual fire loss this year than in 1929, and this is the goal we are striving to reach."

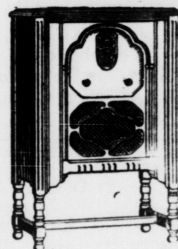
