Lone Wolf Relays set Saturday

It's not every year that Mitchell County residents have the opportunity that awaits them at this coming Saturday's Lone Wolf Relays.

Colorado High School's track teams, both the boys and girls, are the swiftest in recent CHS memory and also are among the area's elite. Wolf fans can get a first hand look at this year's outstanding crop of athletes when the Wolves host

teams from Seminole, Sonora, Crane, Slaton, Post, Clyde, Brownfield, Coahoma, Ballinger, Wall, Crosbyton and Stanton.

After an 8:30 a.m. scratch meeting, field events begin at 9 a.m., running preliminaries at 11

a.m. and finals begin at 4 p.m.

"It'll be between us and Sonora," said varsity boys coach Rick Robinson, who also is serving as meet director.

"We're going to have to really get after it to beat them," said

Robinson. "We don't have the depth they do."

The Broncos, led by distance runner Jose Escalante, broke the Wolves' string of consecutive team

City adopts first \$2 million budget

Colorado City adopted its first \$2 million budget Monday night, \$2,237,940 to be exact, and about 12 percent over the budget for the last fiscal year. Citizens will pay for the increase with a three percent raise in property taxes, and a \$5 jump in the cost of city services. The minimum cost of water, sewer and garbage pick up will go from \$23 to \$28, effective May 1.

Brenda Tarter, city manager, says that much of the increase is due to the costs involved in landfill operations and equipment. Colorado City is in the middle of closing out an 80-acre landfill operation and attempting to get approval to use another 30 acres. Both opening and closing landfills have become high cost items due to state and federal regulations.

Other cost increases built into the new budget are 5 percent raises in

pay for employees and improvements to the water distribution system.

Newly re-elected Mayor Elmer Martin and councilwoman Dee Hearn were sworn in for two year terms and two new councilmen, Tom Carlock and Don Webb, were sworn in.

Mrs. Tarter reported to the council that delinquent taxes remain due on Sands Park, a new park area in the northwest of town and requested that the council agree to write off the city taxes due and pay school and county taxes and costs in the amount of \$476.73. The council voted to do this, since the park is in the area served by a Community Development grant and the money allocated to the park could not be used until the taxes were paid.

Gary Smith of Abilene, ad-

School board members sworn in

Ronnie Aston and Kathy Bassham, newly elected members of the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees were sworn into office Monday night along with re-elected board member Dr. Billy B. Bridgford.

The swearing-in ceremony took place after votes from Saturday's election were canvassed and certified. Aston was elected to a one-year unexpired term created by the resignation of Dr. Pat Thomas, and Bassham was elected to Joe Kirschbaum's place on the board. Kirschbaum did not seek re-election.

In other business, the board unanimously re-elected S. L. (Mac) Morris president; Eddie Piland, vice president; and Bridgford, secretary.

No action was taken on a request to advertise for bids for a new press box at Wolf Stadium until it can be determined if the present plans can be modified in order to meet the \$25,000 budgeted for the project.

Last year, when the project was

first bid, the low bid was in the \$60,000 range for the project.

Trustees said some of the items such as air conditioning, heating, carpeting and paneling might be deleted or that a metal structure might be built instead.

Morris commented that last year, all the bidders were from out of town, and that this year, there may be local bidders which could result in lower bids as well.

The board agreed to meet on Monday, April 22 to consider the press box further.

In other business, the board:

-approved a long range plan for the gifted and talented program as presented by Dr. Walter Bingham, assistant superintendent;

-agreed to have the floor at Wolf Gym refinished at a cost of \$3,800;

-adopted school board policies concerning salary schedules for the lunchroom personnel, the maintenance/custodial personnel and transportation department personnel.

Preston Morris, who won re-election to the Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors in Saturday's election, was unanimously elected to board president during Monday night's called meeting in which votes were canvassed and new board members sworn in.

Other officers include Jack

Perkins, vice president; and Jane McCarley, secretary. They also were elected unanimously.

New board members sworn in along with Morris were Jay Craddock, Marion Bassham and Gus Armstrong. They replace former board president Bobby Lemons and members Herbert Mearse and Glen Hemphill who did not seek re-

election. Lemons had served 10 years on the board and Mearse, 12 years.

Annual kindergarten round-up scheduled

Kindergarten round-up will be here soon. It will be held April 15-19 from 9 a.m. to noon at Kelley Elementary. The child enrolled for kindergarten must be five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1985.

No child will be enrolled for kindergarten without a state birth certificate (not the hospital certificate with the foot prints on it). A state certificate may be obtained from the county seat where the child was born.

Also, when enrolling your child in school, please have the immunization record with you or the address from which the record can be obtained.

The following immunizations are required upon enrollment in the Colorado Independent School District according to Texas law:

-Oral Polio: At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday.

-DTP: At least three doses of DTP vaccine are required. At least one of those doses must have been received on or after the fourth birthday. (Pertussis vaccine is not required for children five years of age or older.)

-Measles: One dose of measles vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of measles illness.

-Mumps: One dose of mumps vaccine is required or provide a physician-validated history of mumps illness.

-Rubella: One dose of rubella vaccine is required. Rubella vaccine is not required past the 12th birthday.

ministrator for the block grant set aside for the Sands area, reported that \$541,426 has been spent from the total project budget of \$800,000. \$110,605 is presently obligated and under contract.

The grant involved housing rehabilitation, code enforcement and demolition of substandard homes and buildings, paving of streets and drainage, sewer line work, and the Sands Park.

The council got its first look at plans for a new firehouse, which will be built at 11th and Vine streets. Architectural drawings indicated a building of 7,954 square feet on a lot area of 150 feet by 140 feet.

The council, in studying

vouchers, commented on a bill from its legal firm of Thompson, Rees and McKinney in the amount of \$762.50 and directed Mrs. Tarter to set up a meeting with the firm to discuss the scope of the \$600 monthly retainer fee paid by the city. The feeling of the council was that minor matters such as discussion of points of law should be covered under the retainer fee.

In other business, the council: —took no action on a request from Lone Star Gas for an increase in rates. The rate will be set by the Public Utility Commission; —gave a plaque of appreciation to Dr. Don Bennett, who did not run for re-election this April; —passed an ordinance updating public building codes;

—heard a report from Mrs. Tarter on Stamford's Main Street project; —gave the city administration authority to advertise for bids on a new police car;

—heard Mrs. Tarter ask for help and ideas for the forthcoming Texas Sesquicentennial celebration;

—heard an announcement that April 22-26 would be Clean Up Week. Landfill fees will be waived;

—heard plans for a new water well at Ruddick Park, and;

—set aside for study, a request from Colorado City's Kiwanis Club that the ownership of the Dell-Barber Kiwanis Club Park be changed from the city to the Kiwanis Club.

titles by capturing their own Sonora Relays two weeks ago.

1984 Lone Wolf Relays champion Slaton returns to defend its title but will be hard pressed to do so because "they graduated most of their (athletes)," said Robinson.

The Wolves can also expect strong competition from Clyde, especially in the field events.

The varsity boys division includes every 7AAA member except Ozona and the meet should give the Wolves a good preview of next week's district meet at Sonora.

Setting new records has itself become a broken record for the Wolves.

The school record in the 400 relay has continuously fell this year and Chris Aguilon, Kevin Norman, Perry Conner and Joey Ritchey brought it down to 43.18 at Brady last week and are a threat to erase the Lone Wolf Relays record of 43.50 set by Coleman in 1983.

In the 1600 relay, Norman, Conner, Don Randle and Mike Ligon own a school record 3:25.47 and have a shot at Slaton's 1983 record of 3:25.55.

The Wolves will also be strong in the 100, 200 and 400 meter dashes.

Leading the way in the 100 is Ritchey, who has run a 10.99 this year. Norman holds the school record of 10.89 and should push Ritchey (if not beat him) along with Aguilon. The Lone Wolf Relays record is 10.78, set by Coleman's Stalworth in 1983 and Rotan's Hooper in 1982.

Ritchey also leads the way in the

200 where he will be joined by Pete Rosas. Ritchey's school record of 22.48 is just over the Lone Wolf standard of 22.15.

The Wolves have also been betting high points in the 400 and high jump where Randle leads both events. Randle owns the CHS record of 51.17 but Conner and Ligon have also run in the 51's. Loraine's Darnell set the Lone Wolf record of 50.48 in 1983.

Randle has a CHS record of 6'5" in the high jump set at regional last year and while the Wolf Relays record is 6'8", set by Eastland's Boles in 1979.

Doug Chitsey will run the hurdles for Colorado City while other events and entrants are: 800—Rosas; 1600—Wylie Dakan, Moises Molina and Paul Marion; 3200—Molina; long jump—Randle, Conner and Ligon; discus—Chitsey, Larry Hearn and Johnny Rivera; shot put—Dakan, David Britton and Hearn; pole vault—Armando Rivera and Stu Howell.

Over on the girls side, this year (like the past two years) it's Sandra Williams and company—the defending Lone Wolf Relays champs.

The Wolves have a strong team of their own but coach Mark Merrell said "Wall will be tough."

Williams, a two time state qualifier, is the area leader in the 100 and ranks among the state's top 10 in that event along with the long jump and triple jump. Her long jump of 17'11" is tops among all the state's AAA competitors.

Injuries will hamper the Wolves more than anything.

Williams "still has a problem" with a nagging leg injury and won't jump at all. Yvette Camp and Sherry Fite are also questionable for competition because "instead of taking a chance we're going to try to win district next week," said Merrell.

Fite last week ran a 59.95 in the open 400. At press time, the state's best in AAA was 59.90.

The Wolves are also among the state's top ten in the 400 meter relay where Juanita Green, Staci Free, Fite and Williams ran a 50.37 at Post last Friday.

Fite this year has cleared 5'0" in the high jump—which would tie the Lone Wolf Relays record.

Besides Williams, the Wolves will also get a strong performance in the sprints from Free.

Sally Mendoza and Sheri Morris have led the Wolves in the distance and hurdle races.

Other events and entrants are: 3200—Mendoza and Laura Ledesma; 800—Mary Ann Bailey and Margie Beltran; 100—Williams, Free and Robin Edwards; 100 hurdles—Morris, Janie DeLoera and Shana Lowery; 800 relay—Green, Jennifer Monroe, Free and Williams; 400—Fite, DeLoera and Michelle Garcia; 200—Free, Billie Muncie and Monroe; 1600—Mendoza and Beltran; 1600 relay—DeLoera, Bailey, Garcia and Fite; triple jump—Bailey and Audy Rivera; high jump—Fite and Holly Tarter; shot put—Edwards, Daphne Fowler and Garcia; long jump—Rivera, Misty Strain and Tarter; discus—Garcia, Christabel Molina and Fowler.

nel; —adopted school board policies concerning transfer policies of non-resident students;

—amended the 1984-85 official budget;

—renewed contracts for teachers and other personnel, and;

—approved the financial report and tax roll change as presented by Geneva Findley, business manager.

Supt. Charlie Uselton reported on the Texas Education Agency audit of the district's vocational program. The monitoring visit showed no discrepancies based on the documentation reviewed, said Uselton, who said the district should be very pleased with the report.

County accepts bid

Mitchell County commissioners Monday, during a regular meeting, accepted a bid from Grimmett Brothers contractors of Snyder for some 12 miles of sealcoating on various Mitchell County roads.

The commissioners accepted the alternate bid of 50 cents per square yard for 140,800 square yards of seal coating for a total cost of \$70,400.

West Texas Construction Co. of Abilene bid 49 cents a square yard, but commissioners said they were unfamiliar with the company and no representative was present at the bid opening Monday.

Commissioners said the Snyder firm has done a good job in the past and the bid price also included sweeping and clearing ahead of the seal coating while commissioners did not know if the Abilene company performed that service or not.

Other bidders and the alternate bids they submitted were Lipham Construction of Aspermont, 53 cents a square yard; and Sidell Inc. of San Angelo, 73 cents a square yard.

In other business, the commissioners heard from Reed Roach of Business Records Corp. of Dallas concerning microfilming and indexing of deed records in the county clerk's office. Roach said the service would cost approximately \$1,300 a month depending upon the amount of documents and pages and that a microfilm

camera will be furnished for the county clerk's office. He said the camera could be used for microfilming older documents and that his company could also come in and microfilm all the records in the clerk's office for a fee to be determined after an inventory of the records is made.

Commissioners took no action on the matter until a formal proposal is received from the company.

Joan Beach, county clerk, said \$6,000 is budgeted this year for rebinding of aging records, but that if they are microfilmed and hardcopied, the rebinding won't be necessary.

Roach said that many counties are having their records microfilmed and hardcopied in order to save space and to protect a copy of the records in the event of a disaster such as a fire.

In other business, Sheriff Wendell Bryant said that his office deputy has quit and that he has found a replacement who is experienced and is a certified officer as well as a jailer. Bryant said he wants to pay her \$1,131 a month which is a jailer's salary instead of the \$1,020 a month first deputy salary because of her experience and her additional certification.

Commissioners told him that it would not be fair to other county employees and told him if the opening is a first deputy's job, then that should be the salary paid.

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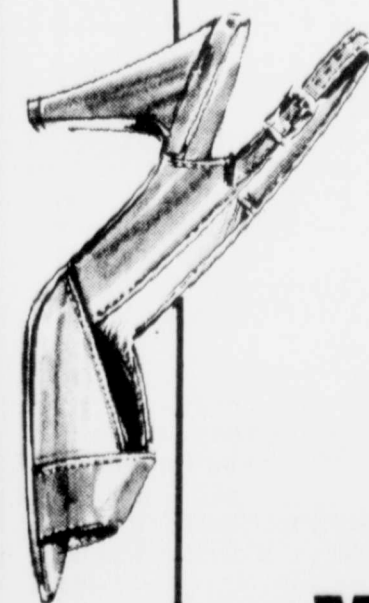
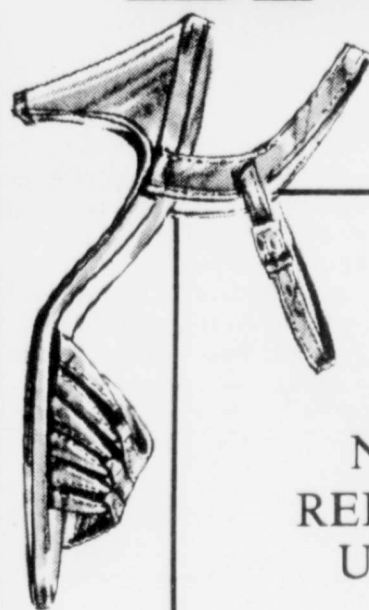

Fox presents program to Self Culture Club

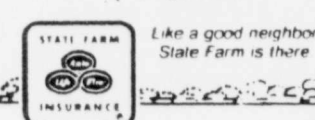
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Birth

Crop insurance deadline Apr. 15

April 15 is the last day to apply for crop insurance for cotton, and grain sorghum in Mitchell County, according to Dottie Sampley, a representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop insurance covers unavoidable loss or production

resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Sampley.

A new crop insurance plan, called Actual Production History (APH), is available this year to producers of corn, grain sorghum, peanuts, cotton, and rice. Producers of these crops may now

qualify for higher yield guarantees by proving their yield history. Rates have been developed to offer reduced premium for producers with above-average yields. "This change could sharply reduce the cost of carrying crop insurance," says Sampley.

To find out more about the APH plan, producers should contact a local, authorized agent. To select an agent, producers may check the list of agents at their local ASCS office. April 15 is the final deadline for applications.
