Fire Department Begins Associate Membership Drive

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department has begun its annual Associate Membership Drive and you have probably already received a letter from them extending you an invitation to become a part of the association. Many have already responded.

Through the support of the citizens of the community and surrounding area, the VFD has been able to accomplish a great deal in the past year. They have used donations to buy several new air packs for the firemen, a new air compressor, and a new generator. They also have been able to suit out all the firemen in good protective equipment, which is very important for their safety.

The VFD tries to begin a new project each year and this year will be looking at two. One is to update their foam truck which is used in fighting oil fires. The other is to insulate their present metal building. Seems there are lots of problems with condensation in the cold months, and the pumps freezing up.

To better serve the people of the county and community, the department must continually improve and maintain their equipment and will need your support in order to do that.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers had to settle for the number two spot in District 24-A basketball after a 70-59 defeat by the Novice Hornets in Brownwood High School gym last Friday night. Both teams had finished league play with a 5-1 record and the Friday game was the tie-breaker to determine the district championship. Both teams will advance to the playoffs.

Behind the quickness of Hartman and McIver Santa Anna started strong by putting several goals on the board before Novice got untracked and led until the final minutes of the third quarter when Novice, led by Matt Motley, began a shooting surge that couldn't be stopped.

Santa Anna led after the first period of play by 7 points and was the halftime leader with a score of 33-25. The Mountaineers were able to only come up with 8 points in the third quarter of play while Novice

poured in 20 to gain the lead and keep it to the finish, although the Mountaineers regained there composure to make 18 points in the final period.

The Hornet's ace Mat Motley was the games leading scorer while pouring in 41 points.

James Hartman led the Mountaineers with 20 points. McIver contributed 13 and Davison 12, Scotty Anderson 5, Eddie Tomlinson 4, Bob DeLeon 2, and Dennis Absher 1.

Local Elections Changed From April to May

Most Texas voters are now aware that the date of the Democratic and Republican Primaries has been moved, but many Texans are unaware that the date for local elections have also been changed.

These elections which include the Santa Anna City Council and the Santa Anna Independent School District election of trustees, will be held Saturday, May 7. That is the first Saturday in May. In the past the local elections have been held on the first Saturday of April.

The filing period for both local elections will begin on February 22 and continue through March 23. All city and school elections will follow this schedule as part of a uniform

election law recently enacted. April 7 is the last day a person may register to vote in the local elections.

Absentee balloting by personal appearance for all local elections will begin April 18 and end May 3.

The city election will be for three council seats. Current officeholders of those three seats are Stanley Hartman, Susie Voss and Alex DeLeon who was appointed in November to fill a vacancy created when Joe Taylor resigned his council seat. The council elections are held at large with the three top vote getters being elected for two-year terms.

Two places on the school board,

currently held by Bill Martin and Danny Kellar, are up for grabs this year. The school board election is also an at large election with the two top vote getters being elected. The terms for school trustees are three years.

Water Snake Makes National Inquirer

According to an article in an area newspaper this week, written by Richard Horn, West Texas made the "National Inquirer" not for being birthed by aliens but for being held captive by a water snake.

The Feb. 16 issue of the tabloid views with horror and disgust the Concho water snake and its effect on Stacy Dam.

"A vitally needed dam in Texas was delayed for a year because of a snake, and now the people are being soaked for whopping \$3.7 million to protect the reptile!" writes an inquirer reporter in a column headed "Bureaucracy Runs Wild".

Actually water officials said the snake caused little construction delay. But the \$3.7 million is what an alternative habitat for the snake would cost.

Board Extends Contracts For Gray and Burns

The Santa Anna ISD board of trustees met for their regular monthly meeting last Thursday to consider contracts for principals and coaches and to set the school board election, along with tending to other fairly routine business.

The contracts of Elementary Principal Jack Burns and High School Principal Frank Gray were extended by one year each by a unanimous vote following recommendations by Superintendent Gerald Brister. This runs each contract through June 30, 1990.

The contract of school business manager, Judy Hartman, was also extended to June 30, 1990, also by a unanimous vote.

In another unanimous vote, the board gave band director, Lonnie Baker, another year's contract.

Letters of resignation were read from head coach Galen Privitt, and from coaches, Russell McGough and Kathy McGough. All the resigna-

tions were accepted effective at the end of the 1987-88 school year.

The board, with much reluctance accepted the resignation of William Hightower effective at the end of the school year. Hightower, the agriculture teacher, plans to retire after 33 years of teaching.

The calling of the school board election is just a formality since the state actually sets the dates. However, the board did formally set the date for May 7, with Rose Bass appointed as election judge. The terms of Bill Martin and Danny Kellar will be expiring.

A summary of hours of required school board training was presented. Members of a school board are required by state law to receive no less than 20 hours of prescribed training in a given time period. Gary Absher has received 21.25 hours; Roddy Dean, 15 hours; Danny Kellar, 25.5 hours; Bill Martin, 8.5 hours; and Terry McIver, 10

hours. Approval was given to sell a 1982 GMC 24-passenger bus.

In other routine business the board made some amendments to the 1987-88 operating budget and some revisions were made in the board policy concerning teacher's career ladder. The revisions having to do with eligibility and assignment to the career ladder.

Board members present for the meeting were Roddy Dean, Dickie Horner, Ronnie Hartman, and Gary Absher. Superintendent Gerald Brister and Judy Hartman, business manager, were also in attendance.

Priceless Privilege

Christians have been granted a privilege though it's not a very popular one. This privilege is identified in the New Testament with several different words, but the meaning is the same.

The Christians are known as servants, stewards, ministers of some other word. It is a privilege because we have been called to be co-laborer with Jesus the Christ, to be His servants, His faithful stewards and to minister in His name, to achieve His purposes, to follow His will.

It is not a popular function simply because mankind usually chooses to "do his own thing", set his own objectives, and strive mightily to reach his own goals. Jesus, however, calls us to turn away from selfish ambition and to fulfill His purposes.

The nouns that identify Christians are not arbitrarily chosen, but are analogous to the duty performed. For example, a good servant never tells his master what he will of will not do, rather, his desire is only to please his master. So also with a steward, The good steward is one who faithfully and willingly cares for ALL the resources that have been left in his care.

When Paul and Barnabas left on a missionary journey, they took Mark with them as their minister. (Acts 13:5) That does not mean that he was to conduct a service of worship for them, each Lord's day at 11:00. His purpose was to take care of the details. Whatever the missionaries desired for Mark to do, he did, and did it willingly. It was for him a privilege, not to do his own will, but the will of his missionary leaders to whom he had committed himself for ministry.

In the New Testament, a jailer was also a "minister" in that his sole purpose was to carry out the wishes of the judge. No jailer decided the fate of the inmates. Only the judge made those decisions.

Frequently in ancient times, ships were propelled by men on the lower deck, each with an assigned oar. The captain was on the upper deck and made all the decisions about where to go, when to go, route to go and so forth. The only task of these "inner rowers" was to faithfully pull on the oars.

The privilege that is ours as Christians, is to be willing and faithful under-rowers on Christ's ship of state. We are to do so in order that He, Christ the Captain, can take His ship of state where-ever He chooses. Let us be rid of the thinking that says,

"Why do I have to sit HERE, while he gets to sit THERE?"

"I'm tired of rowing"

"I row more faithfully and more diligently than all the others."

"Some just come and sit."

"He is not doing his part."

"There are so many rowers no one will notice if I don't row" etc. etc.

What a precious and priceless privilege is ours, to be under-rowers for Jesus the Christ. May we all be faithful to the privilege, by not doing our own will, but faithfully and willingly doing the will of Him who has chosen us for His own.

If I have not asked for your vote and support, personally, please take this as my personal plea for your help to elect me as your Sheriff.

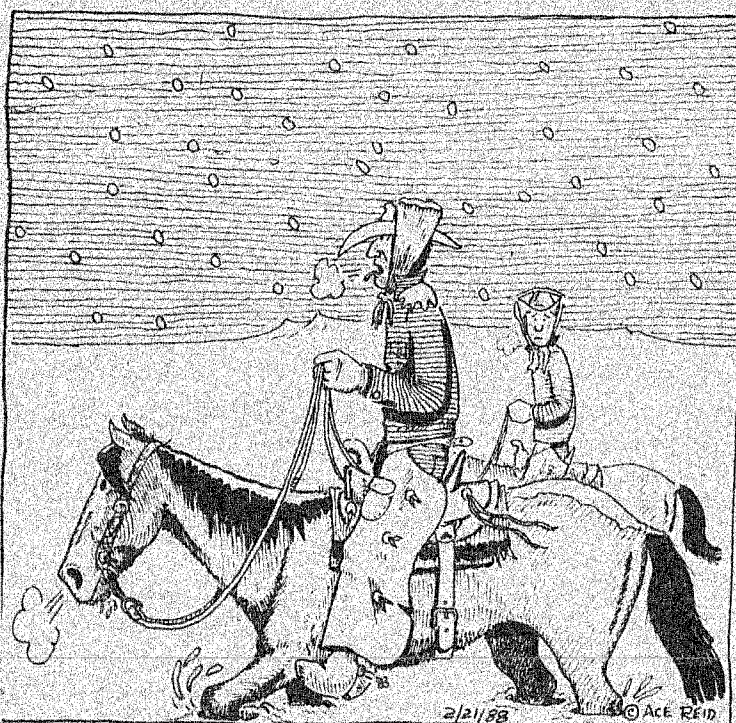

Tombstone Inscriptions Books Available Soon

A new set of books is about ready to go to press on the History of Coleman County. This will be a three volume set containing all tombstone inscriptions in Coleman County, called "Coleman County Cemetery Inscriptions". They will contain all

inscriptions found on every gravestone in Coleman County and in some cases, additional information on these people.

The main reason these cemetery inscriptions are so important is these stones contain the only records

of many deaths prior to recording of deaths by the county and state which was required in the early 1920's.

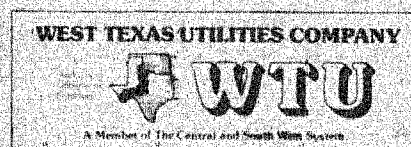

202 Employees On Job At Stacy Construction Site

According to information given at a news media briefing last week, work is progressing on schedule at the Stacy Reservoir site and there are 202 people now employed at the site.

The tunnel, which has made so much news, is complete, except for a concrete flooring to be poured which facilitate the flow of water back into the river. However there still remains the project of drilling four inch drainage holes through the top of the tunnel, which will allow the moisture to collect in the tunnel.

It is expected that about May 1, the heavy concrete work will begin. Good news for the area is that more employees will be added at that time. Currently Brown and Root has 202 people on the project and that number may increase to 230 sometime in May. The large concrete mixing unit is already in use as is the sizeable rock crushing unit which is crushing stone to a small size for use in the concrete.

Most of the attention is now

centered around the control tower which will be in the service outlet. The tower will be 150 feet high, most of it buried in the dam, and will have a six foot diameter conduit through which lake water will flow, on a controlled basis, back into the river.

First, use of the control tower outlet will be the diversion of the water in the Colorado River while the structure is being placed across the river. Closure on the river will be expected to begin in November of 1989.

Above the service outlet and control tower will be the service spillway, with a number of gates, all to be controlled as to the amount of water they will discharge. The emergency spillway will be located on the Concho County side of the river.

Delta Omicron Visit Former Santa Anna Building

Delta Omicron Chapter of Santa Anna placed first for the month of October. Pattie Musick is the Educational Director for Delta Omicron. District VII placed first in October and November for 100 percent reporting and 2nd in December for 80 percent reporting. Donna Bradley is District Educational Director.

Following the meeting, the ladies enjoyed having lunch at the Stagecoach Inn and then sightseeing in the small shops in Salado. Among the shops visited was an exclusive

ladies shop housed in the former Santa Anna Gas rock building which was moved to Salado a number of years ago. Following the merger of Santa Anna Gas with Lone Star Gas, the building was the location of the Winslow Barber Shop and then a domino parlor before it was finally moved to its present site in Salado.

Core trench backfill is well along and much of the dam, or north levee, on the upper end, is in place, yet to be covered by rip rap. The bulk of the fill will take place when the dam is spanned across the river. The base of the dam in that area will be well over 400 yards in length. There has been a tremendous amount of dirt work already. Excavation totals 815,456 cubic yards, while fill on the dam totals, 826,325 cubic yards.

Total cost of the Stacy project will be \$68 million, with dam construction amounting to \$30,726,804. Expenditures to date total \$18,084,463.

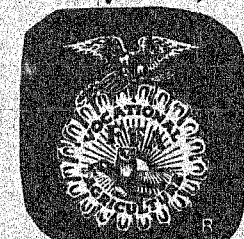

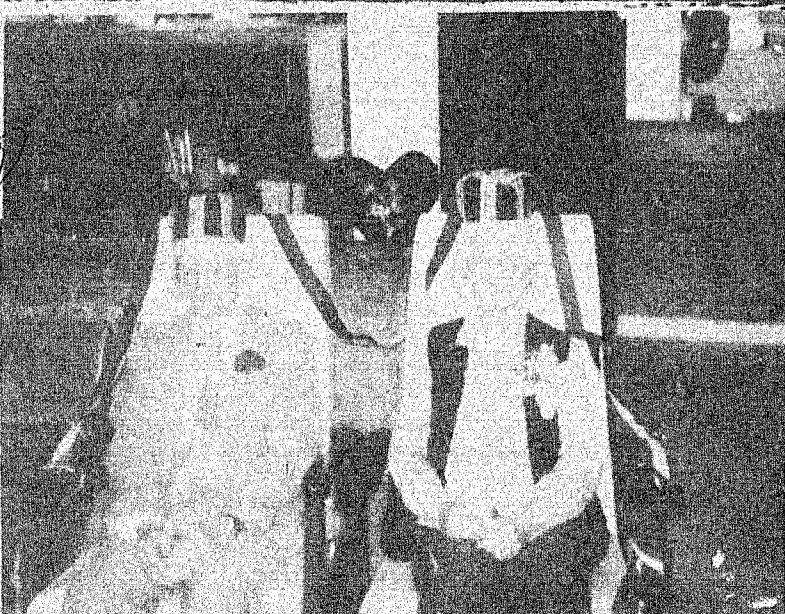

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NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

CITY OF SANTA ANNA, P.O. Box 188, Santa Anna, Texas 76878 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10274-02 which authorizes a discharge of treated wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 20,000 gallons per day from the surface water treatment facilities which are located in the vicinity of Lakes Sealy and San Tana, approximately 3.5 miles northeast of the City of Santa Anna in Coleman County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Mud Creek; thence to Jim Ned Creek; thence to Lake Brownwood in Segment No. 1418 of the Colorado River Basin.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will specify conditions and limitations generally the same as those currently enforced by the existing permit. The expiration date of the existing permit was April 12, 1987. It is proposed that the expiration date be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the permit decision, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
