COUNTY BOUGHT \$107,024.50 BONDS IN MAY

JUNE QUOTA OF \$50,400 HAS TO BE RAISED FROM SERIES E BONDS ALONE SAYS TREASURY

Cisco Daily Press:

Our quota for May in the War Finance Drive was \$50,400 and under the rulings of the treasury, at least for the present, that quota, as well as the June quota which has been set at \$50,400, has to be raised from SERIES E BONDS ALONE.

During the month of May we sold \$52,024.50 of Series E Bonds, \$5,000 of Series G Bonds and \$50,000 of the two per cent bonds which were so popular during the April special drive in which the county sold more than the One Million of all classes of War Bonds. So, for the month of May, we actually exceeded our quota of \$50,400 by the sale of Series E Bonds alone, and the total sale of all War Bonds for the month of May was \$107,024.50.

The fiscal year ends June 30, 1943, and for the twelve months period ending June 30, 1943, it was the desire of the government that Series E, F and G Bonds be sold to a total of Twelve Billion Dollars. Of course, the Series E Bond has been the popular bond with the people and a large per cent of the assigned quota for the year has been made up out of the sale of these bonds. But just at this time it would seem for the months of May and June that we are going to have to make our county quotas from the sale of SERIES E ONLY and we will also have to buy a considerable quota of F and G Bonds in addition in order that the Twelve Billion sales for the nation may be accomplished by the end of June 30th. In other words, we have got to do just a little more for the month of June than we have been doing if the nation as a whole reaches its quota of Twelve Billion and, of course, we do not want to fail in this as to our part.

So, as county chairman, I would suggest to you who have already bought your full quota of Series E Bonds for the calendar year 1943, that you who have surplus money to put in bonds go ahead and purchase as many of the Series F and G Bonds for June as your bank account will stand. In this connection, it is to be hoped that beginning with the new fiscal year of July 1, 1943, that our quotas will again be assigned on a basis of Series E, F and G Bonds, as these bonds have all been advertised and popularized together and they all are popular bonds with the people. We feel sure that the treasury department will see fit to again combine these bonds for our quotas beginning July 1, 1943.

In addition to the above, Rising Star bought \$5,000 worth of Series G and Ranger bought \$50,000 worth of two per cent bonds, which makes the total of \$107,024.50.

CANNING SERVICE IS IN HONORED FOR FULL SWING GALLANT ACTS

Processing and canning of green vegetables at the canning center in the 1100 block of D avenue is in full swing, said Mrs. Jimmy Allen who is in charge of instructions. It is now mostly green beans, she added.

The canning center is mainly to assist those who do not have pressure cookers in saving the fruits of their victory gardens. Persons may use the equipment and secure the instructions necessary at a cost of about one cent per can. If it is impossible for one to do their own canning, they may prepare their vegetables for canning and have the canning done by some of the helpers at the center, Mrs. Allen said. However, it is not the object of the center to do the canning for customers.

The project is under the supervision of M. D. Fox, agriculture teacher for Cisco public schools.

Sgt. Gus Foreman, nephew of Mrs. Charles Roberts and who has often visited in Cisco, has been decorated with the Purple Heart and Air Eagle for gallant service in daylight bombing of the Gilbert Island group in the South Pacific. Sergeant Foreman has been based in the Hawaiian Islands for some time, but has now been sent on an important mission elsewhere.

As rear gunner in an American four-motored Liberator bomber, this young man was in the first plane that struck at the important phosphate-producing Nauna, damaging the airfield and plant, valuable to the Japs for fertilizer and munitions production.

Sergeant Foreman was one of the three men to be decorated for their action in the raids. He is also credited with sinking a submarine.

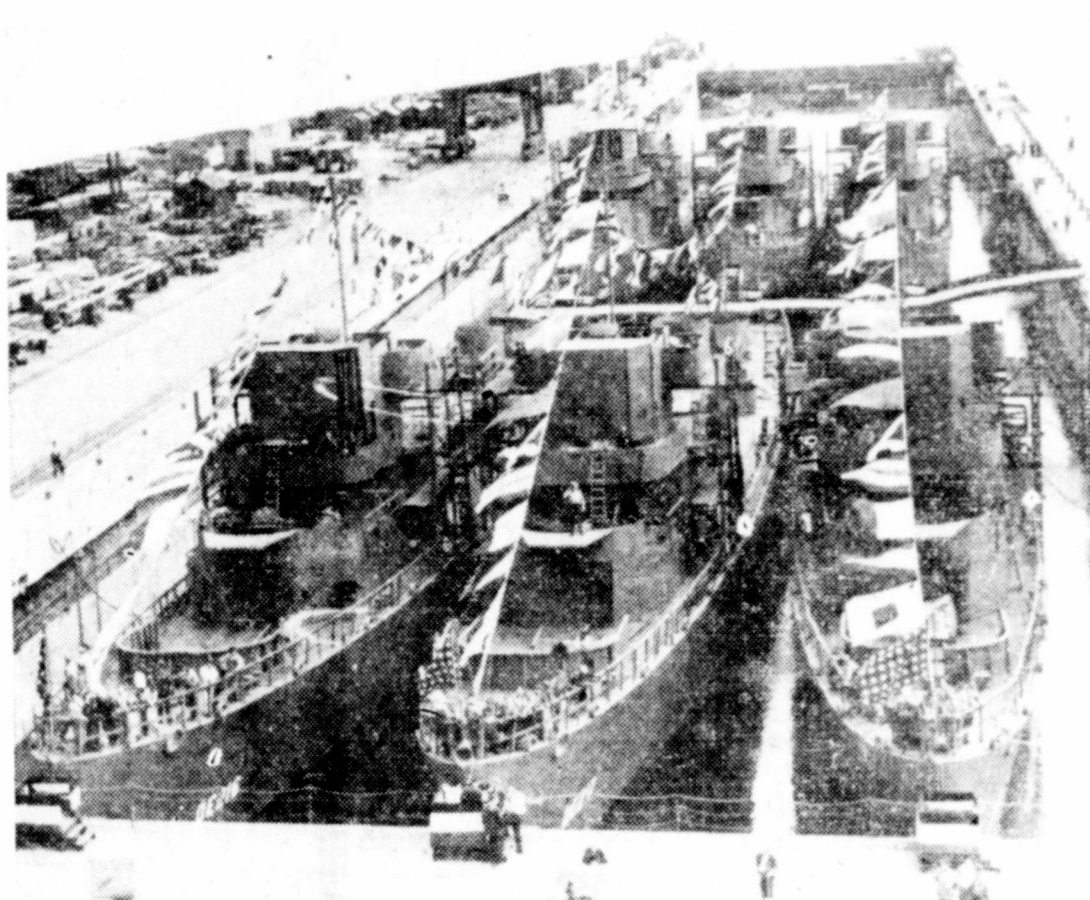

RANGER DEATH.

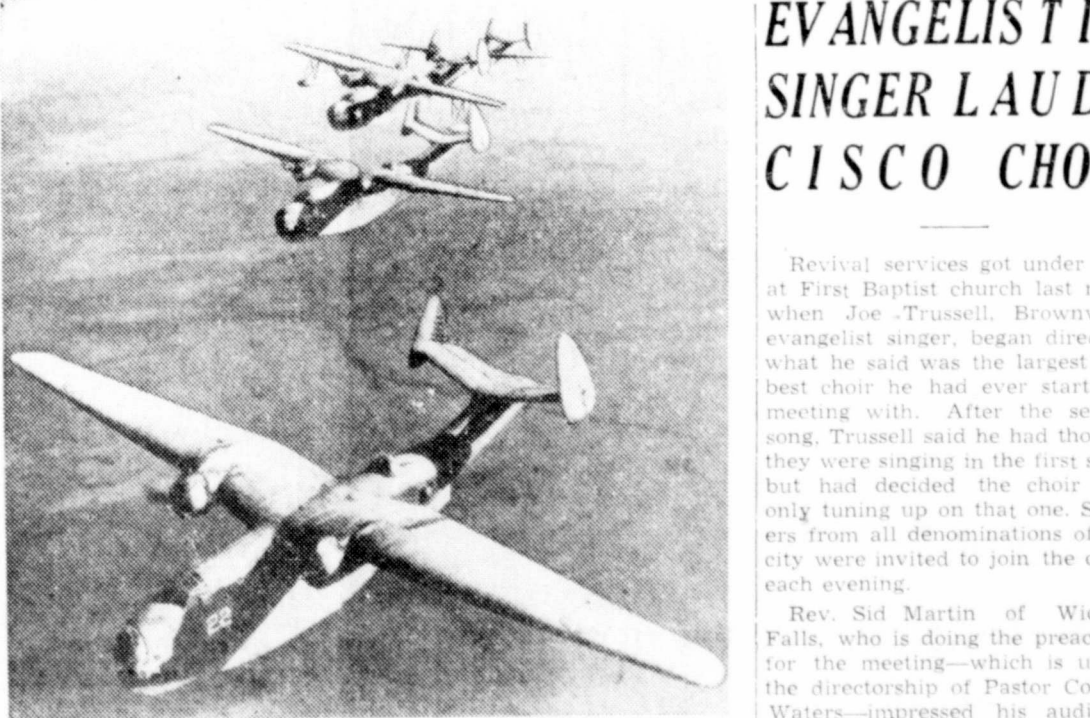

EVANGELISTIC SINGER LAUDS CISCO CHOR

Revival services got under way at First Baptist church last night when Joe Trussell, Brownwood evangelist singer, began directing what he said was the largest and best choir he had ever started a meeting with. After the second song, Trussell said he had thought they were singing in the first song, but had decided the choir was only tuning up on that one. Singers from all denominations of the city were invited to join the choir each evening.

Rev. Sid Martin of Wichita Falls, who is doing the preaching for the meeting—which is under the directorship of Pastor Cooper Waters—impressed his audience with the bigness of himself, spiritually as well as physically. He was deeply in earnest in his sermon and appeared to throw himself completely into his effort to lead sinners to Christ. H. L. EDWARDS ALLIED BOMBS FORMER CISCO PULVERIZING MAN IS DEAD PANTELLERIA

Harry L. Edwards, well known Houston oil man and former Ciscoan, was found dead in his bed at his home there early this morning. Mr. Edwards had suffered slight heart attacks in the past, but had not complained recently. Mr. and Mrs. Edwards occupied an apartment at the Lamar Hotel and she discovered his lifeless body when she awoke at 6 a. m.

Deceased was about 53 years of age and had been an independent oil operator since 1930, when he left the Humble Oil & Refining company and established the Edwards Drilling company, with headquarters in Houston. Mr. Edwards was superintendent of the Humble Oil company in Cisco from 1920-22, and was transferred from Cisco to Houston to become general superintendent there.

While a resident of this city he was very popular and took a live interest in everything that conducted to the welfare of Cisco.

December 3, 1935, he was married to Mrs. Ida Lee Bell, formerly Miss Ida Lee Shelton, of Cisco, who, with their son, Bobby Bell Edwards, and his mother, a resident of Tulsa, Okla., are the immediate survivors.

Mrs. Lannie Mancill, sister of Mrs. Edwards, left for Houston early this morning to be with her sister. She was accompanied by her three brothers, S. M. and Jim Shelton of Abilene and W. L. Shelton of Ft. Worth.

The funeral has been set for 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon, with interment in a Houston cemetery.

Following a fried chicken and vegetable luncheon, topped with lemon pie, Rotarians today enjoyed song numbers by Joe Trussell and a short talk by Rev. Sid Martin, evangelists, who are conducting the revival at the First Baptist church.

T. J. McCarty of Abilene and Ensign Gordon Sherman, home on a furlough, were visitors. President Ernest Hittson announced that Jack Cisco of Dallas would probably speak to Rotarians at an early date. W. W. Fewell and Cooper Waters reported on the resolution of respect on the passing of Rotarian Asa Skiles, the resolution being read by Mr. Fewell. President Hittson also read the acknowledgement for flowers sent by the club.

Joe Trussell, accompanied by Mrs. A. L. Thomas at the piano, sang three numbers, receiving a hearty encore.

Rev. Sid Martin, himself a Lion, had only a few moments of time left to speak, but many members said that never had they heard so much said in so short a period of time. The minister told a few humorous stories and then launched straight into his dynamic message that drove home the truths he wished to impress. Rev. MEGLASSON AT HOME.

Lt. George W. Meglasson of the anti-aircraft artillery group, Camp Wallace, Tex., is spending a few days here with his mother, Mrs. Cora E. Meglasson. He expects to return to his post Saturday.

LONDON, June 10.—Wave after wave of Allied bombers heaped new destruction on smoking, blockaded Pantelleria yesterday in an offensive to smash it into unconditional surrender and British observers said today that an Allied landing was imminent, if not under way.

In Algiers, however, the Echo de Alger in a front page story predicted that Pantelleria would be reduced soon by blockade, presumably without the necessity of a landing. The newspaper said that the offensive against southern Europe already had begun with the Allied demand for the surrender of Pantelleria.

A Rome broadcast acknowledged that the Allies also were encircling Lampedusa, the second largest of the Italian stepping stone islands in the Sicilian narrows. British naval forces landed a reconnaissance party on Lampedusa, 96 miles southwest of Pantelleria, Sunday night and all but two of the party returned safely.

Today's report from Allied headquarters in North Africa, telling of the latest attacks on Pantelleria, made it clear that the Italian garrison still had made no reply to the Allied demand for unconditional surrender of the 32-square-mile island roughly midway between Tunisia and Sicily.

Once again yesterday the Italians attempted to intercept the raiders over Pantelleria, only to run into disaster. Twelve enemy planes were shot down for a loss of only one Allied aircraft. Italian losses for Tuesday and Wednesday amounted to 19 against two Allied planes.

BILL TO STOP STRIKES IS ON ITS WAY

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Legislation to forbid another shutdown of the nation's coal mines during the war and providing a fine and jail term for John L. Lewis if he calls such a walkout appeared today to be headed toward congressional approval.

The compromise bill provides: 1. Specific authority for the president to seize any plant, mine or war facility useful to the war effort when its operation is threatened by a labor dispute.

2. A \$5000 fine and one year imprisonment for any person who coerces, instigates, induces, conspires with or encourages a strike, lockout, slowdown or other interruption of a government-seized property.

COTTONSEED CRUSHERS.

HOUSTON, June 10.—The Texas Cottonseed Crushers association is headed by C. M. Francis of Stamford, succeeding S. J. Vaughan, Jr., Hillsboro.

GESTAPO TIGHTENS HOLD.

STOCKHOLM, June 10.—Heinrich Himmler's police are tightening their grasp on Germany because of sagging morale, reliable reports coming out of Germany indicated today. For this reason keen observers here believe a crackup in Germany is unlikely until absolute military collapse also is at hand.

BEANS PLOWED UP.

BATON ROUGE, June 10.—Agricultural agents returning from the "bean belt" reported today farmers were plowing up hundreds of acres of beans unharvested because of a labor shortage and weak market; and were preparing to plant another crop.

WE, NOT THEY.

There is discernible a rising tide of discontent with OPA, which frequently appears to go out of its way to irritate folks. People are vexed with points, rate about high prices, increased about feelings and the decreased distance between ceilings and floors, roughly because they cannot get more gas.

This is natural in a people accustomed to a free economy. But a neutral observer, who doesn't like being regimented any better than the next fellow, may say it seems to him people are fighting the wrong cause, but their distress.

Without war there would be no OPA. The existence of war is the present cause of troubles. The remote causes of war, since the fall of the Axis and some can be beneath the war itself. If people could think of the OPA as a committee of themselves, the server suggests, trying to help them build peace, this reason, if they could think of the rationing effort in general as a thing WE do not as a thing THEY force on us, life would be easier and attempts to hold the line would have a better chance.

Maybe inflation cannot be wholly controlled. But it is better to control it partly than let it run wild. If WE work at it, WE can get somewhere. People thought as THEY ran only try and perhaps fail.

NAGGING.

The dignified and sedately restrained Major George Fielding Elliott is usually fed up with a certain type of senatorial nagging. In his war comment column the other day, he wrote these as follows: "I am very tired of hearing repetition by Senators Wheeler, Chandler and others of the worn-out question: 'Why don't the Russians give us Siberia?'"

He thinks this is done by counter-attack senators to divert our Russian allies in the minds of the American people. Also to suggest that if the Russians don't help us against Japan, the United States shouldn't help them against Germany.

It hardly seems possible that many Americans can be misled by such sensational maneuvers, whatever their purpose. There is a general agreement in this country that the most important thing for both Americans and Russians at present is to knock out the Germans. It seems unlikely that the senators referred to know more about war strategy than do the British and American experts on that job. And when Germany

has been thrown and hog-tied, then the Allies can clean up the Asiatic job. In the meantime, a little observation will disclose that the Japs are receiving quite a bit of Allied attention right now.

SUBSTITUTES.

Americans have always been such great meat eaters that present varieties of such food on the home front bring privation to millions. And there is not much improvement in the outlook. For the war duration, at least, there must be considerable change made, not only in the national diet itself, but in people's dietary state of mind. They will have to be retrained to eat the foods available.

But this should not be any great hardship in most cases. Fish will be used to take the place of meat. In the summer and fall a rich variety of fresh vegetables and fruits become available. The garden that so many people are making now in their own back yards, and even in their front yards, and on vacant city lots—have already begun to bring rich rewards. There will be plenty of wholesome "green stuff" and also an abundance of vegetables to be stored for winter, in the old American style now almost forgotten.

The gap between meats and vegetables is also bridged rather easily, in most cases, by the liberal use of milk, which itself is equivalent to a wholesome meat loaf. Its value may be more appreciated than ever from now on. Pints of milk seems assured for the summer and fall, at least, with an abundant surplus for storing in condensed form. And condensed milk, as people now realize, is a much finer and more palatable food than it used to be. Rationing will make sure that the ration gets their share.

LAW REGULATING UNIONS BE FOUGHT

AUSTIN, June 10.—A law designed to regulate activities of labor unions will become effective in Texas August 10. The act was not signed by Gov. Coke Stevenson and became law automatically.

Main provisions of the new law will require unions to:

1. File with the secretary of state itemized financial statements annually; copies of bylaws and constitutions; names and addresses of all officers; and copies of working agreements which allow employers to make deductions from workers' pay for union funds.
 2. Charge only a "reasonable amount" for dues.
 3. Keep accurate records and accounts which must be open to members.
 4. Make no charge for working permits, but the law allows initiation fees of a "reasonable amount."
 5. Give members a public hearing on specific charges before discharging them.
 6. Hold annual election of officers.
 7. Reinstate without payment of back dues members returning from the armed forces who are unable to make such payments.
- Unions are prohibited from making contributions to political parties or to candidates for political office. No person convicted of a felony may be either a union officer or organizer, and organizers must register with the secretary of state.
- Records filed with the state are confidential, except to the attorney general, the labor commissioner and legal inspectors.
- Three sections of the bill have been ruled unconstitutional by the attorney general. Those sections deal with charging a "reasonable amount" for dues, requiring annual elections (this provision was so worded it excluded railroad brotherhoods), and reinstating members returning from the armed forces without payment of back dues.
- This ruling, if sustained in courts, would not affect other parts of the law.
- Labor leaders have said they would seek a court test of the act before its effective date.

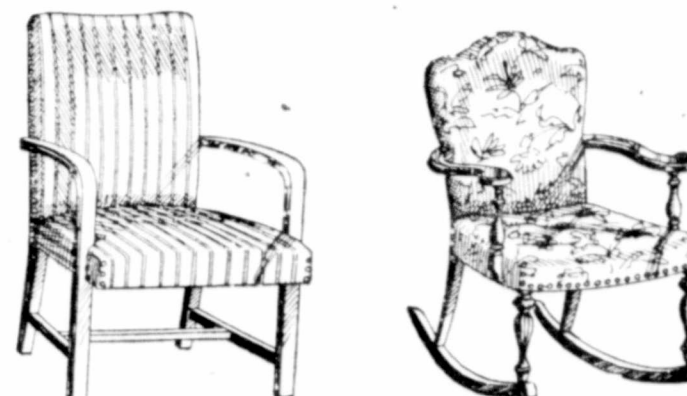

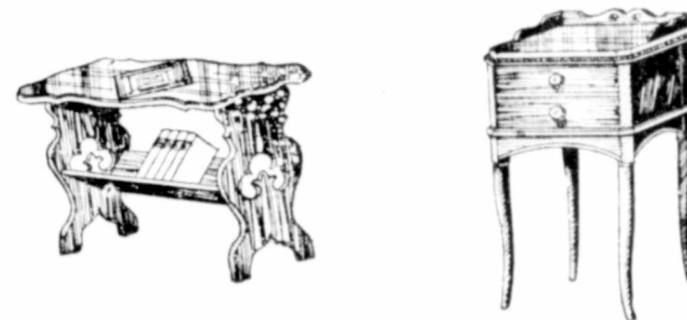
