James White re-elected to CISD board

In the weekend's election coverage, the *Big Spring Herald* incorrectly reported that incumbent Coahoma Independent School District Trustee James White, was defeated in his bid for re-election on Saturday.

However, unofficial results show White retained his seat on the board with 160 votes while Brandon Iden, who received 114, was not elected. The weekend article incorrectly reported Iden as the third winner

in the race for three at-large seats on the board. The *Herald* based its story on a transmitted fax copy of election results from the Coahoma ISD administrative office. The faxed copy shows that White received only 60 votes.

White's win on Saturday means all three incumbents on the CISD board will return for another term. Larry Cordes and Jody Reid also retained their seats.

CISD trustees will meet at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building,

600 Main, to canvass the election, administer the oath of office to the newly-elected members and re-organize the board.

The countdown has begun.

The American Cancer Society Relay for Life for the Howard-Glasscock Unit begins with registration for teams at 4:30 p.m. on Friday, May 9.

Seventy-seven teams are expected to swarm over Blankenship Field and begin setting up tents, canopies, barbecue grills and lawn chairs in preparation for the community-wide campout.

The field should be bursting with teams, food and drink vendors, informational displays, entertainment and children's activities.

In addition to hundreds of team members, as many or more citi-

zens are expected to stop in at the event at some point during the weekend.

At 6:45 p.m., the Relay will get under way with opening ceremonies, including welcoming remarks from county judges for both Howard and Glasscock counties. Teams will be introduced, and participants will join in singing the national anthem.

At 7 p.m., the Survivor's Lap marks the formal start of the event, as hundreds of cancer sur-

vivors will circle the track as their names are read. Then team members will begin walking, jogging or running around the track — an effort that will go on all night and into Saturday morning.

At 10 p.m., the beautiful luminaria ceremony is a must-see. Hundreds of brightly decorated bags, a lighted candle in each one, will ring the field and into the stands, where they spell out HOPE that a cure for cancer will be found soon. Each one honors a cancer survivor or loved one who lost the battle with this devastating disease.

Late into the night, entertainment and refreshments of many types will be available.

Local musicians will take the stage in the main tent starting at

8 p.m., along with cowboy poets and the adorable winners from the Relay Rascal Razzamatazz pageant sponsored by the Big Spring State Hospital.

Participants and visitors will be able to sample a real New York-style hotdog, buy a chance on the Relay photo quilt and compete for dozens of door prizes. Hula Hoop contests, a purple clothing "fashion" show and themed laps will keep walkers and team members energized into the early morning hours.

This year's Relay will end with the announcement of total money raised at 10:30 a.m. in the main tent. Teams that raised the most donations, walked the most laps and other notable accomplish-

Runoff

**Neugebauer,
Conaway top
District 19
candidates**

It's not official yet, but with all the precincts reporting,

Randy Neugebauer, R-Lubbock, and Mike Conaway, R-Midland, look to be headed for a June 7 runoff election to determine who will be the area's next congressman.

Neugebauer edged Conaway for first place in Saturday's 19th Congressional District special election. The Lubbock candidate took 13,029 votes, or 22.4 percent, compared to Conaway's 12,254, or 21.1 percent.

"Obviously we're very gratified and very excited at the support we had tonight," Neugebauer said Saturday after the results were in. "It's nice to be the front runner in this race. We look forward to continuing to campaign hard and just run a district-wide campaign and focus on the issues. Keep showing the people in District 19 how hard we work and how effective we are at getting things done. I think that's what brought us to this point tonight and I think that's what's going to take us to a victory in June."

Since neither candidate took 50 percent of the vote, the two will face off in a runoff election.

While the date for the runoff has not officially been set, Howard County Clerk Donna Wright said June 7 is the most likely day.

"We won't know until the governor announces it, but probably June 7," she said.

The returns are actually still unofficial at this point. Howard County commissioners will meet Tuesday at 1 p.m. to canvass the county's results, and officials districtwide

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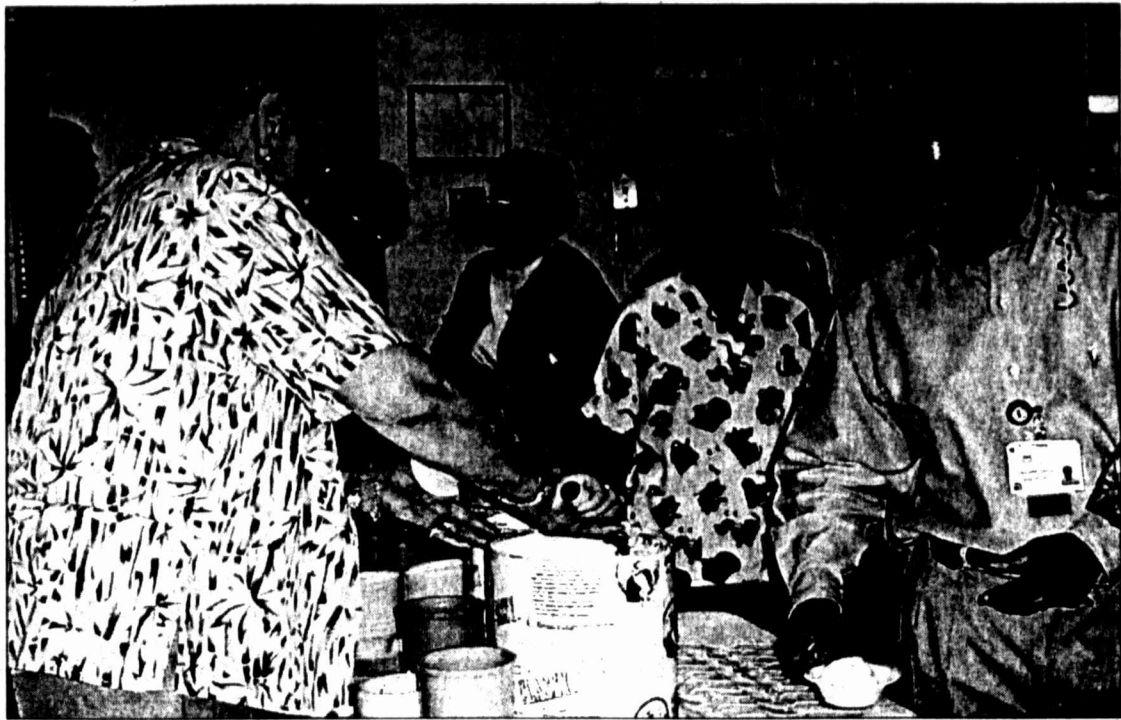

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State lottery unveils changes to Lotto Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — Lotto Texas is getting another makeover.

In an effort to increase the size of the jackpots, the Texas Lottery Commission debuted a revamped version of the twice-a-week game on Sunday.

Gone is the old system, where players chose six numbers from a field of 54. The new rules will let players choose five numbers from a pool of 44, then choose another number, or bonus ball, from a separate field of 44.

Those who match all five from the first field

and the bonus ball would win the jackpot, which starts at \$4 million and continues to grow until somebody wins. The odds of winning it all will jump from 1 in 25.8 million to 1 in 47.7 million.

While jackpot winners should be less frequent, the new Lotto Texas will boost the odds of winning any prize to 57-to-1 from 71-to-1. The number of prize tiers will increase from four to eight and the number of overall winners will jump approximately 25 percent, lottery officials said.

game fresh and new," Reagan Greer, executive director of the Texas Lottery Commission, said in Saturday's editions of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "Players speak with the dollars, and all of the evidence suggest that people like big jackpots."

The revised game will give players additional

ways of winning. For example, players who match the first five numbers will win an estimated \$10,000. Those who match four numbers in the first draw plus the bonus ball will win about \$2,000 on a \$4 million jackpot.

Greer said the hope is that higher odds against

winning drive up jackpots into the tens of millions, spurring increased ticket sales. He predicted that jackpots could climb to as high as \$100 million three times a year.

The state Comptroller's office said the new game will increase lottery revenue to the state by about \$50 million a year. Texas already gets about \$1 billion a year from its lottery games. The money goes toward public schools.

Lotto Texas began in 1992 and originally let players chose six numbers from a field of 50.

The field was increased to 54 in 2000.

Those changes didn't prove to be the remedy officials had hoped. They have blamed that failure in part on the fact that players are winning more frequently than was anticipated at the relatively low levels of \$4 million and \$6 million.

Saturday night's \$7 million jackpot was the last drawing for the old Texas Lotto game.

Tickets for the new game went on sale Sunday, with the first drawing Wednesday night.

Some opposition, but most Andrews residents favor site

ANDREWS — If she could, Peggy Pryor would simply pick up and move her Andrews home from near the route low-level radioactive waste would travel on its way to a proposed disposal site.

"They're bringing this stuff on roads," said Pryor, a retired cardiac technician who has lived in Andrews all but three of her 53 years. "I really wish I could move where I lived."

Pryor, though, is one of only a handful in this West Texas town who oppose the site, even though environmental groups say it would make Texas a dumping ground for the nation's waste. Most Andrews County residents back the proposal, seeing it as a way to diversify the oil-based economy, and to create jobs.

The site is about 30 miles west of the town that sits along the New Mexico border. A hazardous waste storage facility now operates on 1,350 acres of the red, barren and windblown landscape. Lawmakers are considering a bill that would allow the Texas Department of Health to issue a license to a private company to administer a low-level nuclear waste site.

The bill, by Rep. George "Buddy" West, R-Odessa, passed the House two weeks ago and the full Senate is set to consider the measure this week. Waste Control Specialists, a Pasadena-based company that operates the storage facility, is the only company that has said it is interested in pursuing the license.

Currently, there are about 75 workers at the site, said Lloyd Eisenrich, president of the Andrews Industrial Foundation, a privately funded economic development group supporting the site's expansion. If built, the low-level radioactive waste site could bring in

as much as \$10 million a year into Andrews County coffers, a 7.5 percent cut of the operation's revenues.

Andrews County Judge Richard Dolgener said he favors the venture, as does almost everyone in town.

"I haven't had anyone who deals in that industry tell me anything that's turned my head," he said. "And I'm looking for something to grab my attention. The scientific studies have been done and as far as I'm concerned I haven't found one scientific study to show that's not a good place to do that."

Andrews resident Lynn Pearce agreed, saying oil

can't carry the area forever. "There's nothing out there that it can hurt," she said. "It brings jobs. I don't see anything wrong with it. We don't need to be totally dependent on oil."

Ground water, however, can be in danger of contamination, according to the Lone Star Chapter of the Sierra Club and another Andrews detractor, Richard Simpson, who has spent recent weeks in Austin listening to legislators discuss the proposal.

Simpson and Pryor contend a study done by Texas Tech University researchers is flawed.

"I have seen maps that clearly show the Ogallala

extending further than the site," Simpson said.

Eisenrich disagreed, saying the study shows the aquifer ends about 30 miles east of the site. There also is an impermeable layer of red clay that lies under the aquifer on the High Plains and rises to near the surface at the site, he said.

"It's absolutely the most geologically ideal place to put this stuff in," he said. "There is no subsurface water out there."

The House version allows for two facilities to be set up at the site. One would handle the waste under a federal compact that requires the state to dispose of wastes from Texas and Vermont. The compact is part of a nationwide plan to store low-level radioactive waste regionally.

A separate but adjacent facility would take Department of Energy waste, a provision that has caused lawmakers some concern in the past. Last session, the bill died in the House.

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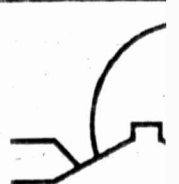

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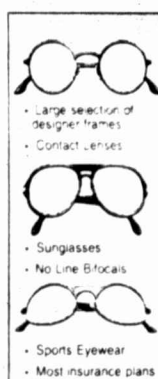

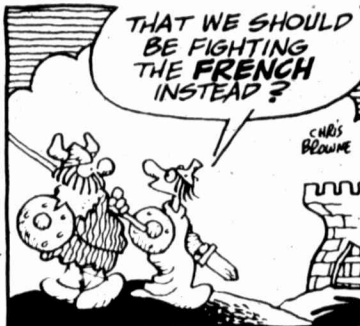

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Jane Goodall was honored with Harvard University's 2003 Global Environmental Citizen award.

"Jane Goodall's groundbreaking and captivating research with chimpanzees continues to change the way we perceive our animal 'cousins' and ourselves," said Eric Chivian, director of Harvard's Center for Health and the Global Environment, which presents the award.

Goodall was recognized for her work with environmental initiatives through the Jane Goodall Institute, including the Congo Basin Project, which aims to stop poachers who are threatening chimpanzees' survival in the area; and Roots and Shoots, which supports students in projects to benefit

animals and the environment.

Best known for her study of chimpanzees in Africa, Goodall now lectures on the threats facing primates and other environmental crises, and is working to curb a decline in chimpanzee populations.

"Every individual has a role to play in protecting our environment," Goodall said Monday.

Last year, she was named a United Nations "Messenger of Peace." Messengers serve as advocates in areas ranging from poverty eradication, human rights, peace and environmentalism.

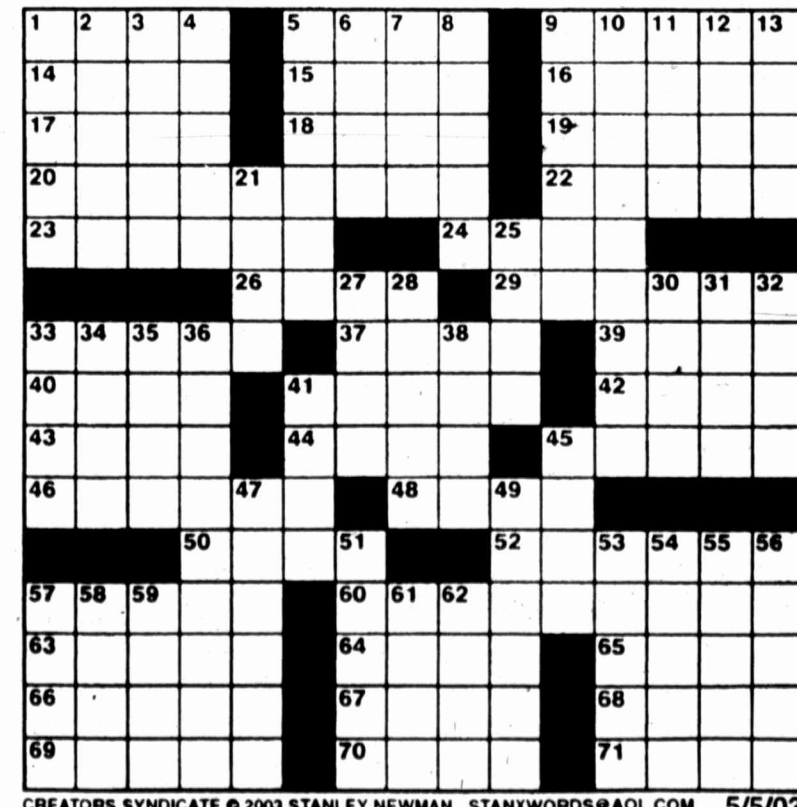
