

Chuck Wagon Gang Rolls Over Europe

There were 40 Texas ambassadors in Aberdeen, Scotland recently at the Europe '79 Oil Show in the person of a group of men serving America's favorite food, barbeque, and there was a Colorado City ambassador there in the person of M. D. Williams.

M.D. Williams belongs to an organization called the Chuck Wagon Gang which is a group of businessmen who, except for him, are all from Odessa and who are dedicated to spreading the good word about Texas in general and Odessa in particular. Their sole method of

doing this is serving their famous barbeque to any group who happens to want it. They are a nonprofit organization.

Since they were organized in 1940, they have traveled all over the world and served groups from a few hundred in size up to a gathering of 30,000 at a Klondike Days celebration in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada.

Twice a year they travel to Nashville, Tenn. to serve a gathering in excess of 20,000 people at the Grand Ole Opry.

Williams, who has been a member of the

group for about five years, has traveled with them to Stavenger, Norway to serve some 5,000 people at the North Sea Conference.

A trip to Singapore is planned for 1982 and Williams stated that they have been asked to return to Aberdeen. He added that it takes about three years of planning for an overseas trip to come off.

Williams had many kind words to say about Scotland and its people and it was evident that he thoroughly enjoyed the trip which lasted from Sept. 2 until Sept. 9.

He said that they fed about 5,000 people at the oil show and he was surprised that there weren't more Americans there since there are many of them in the country connected with the oil industry.

Williams stated that the Scottish people themselves were very friendly. They were shy at first but after getting to know the Americans See GANG Page 7

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Criticism Told Of Ambulance

Complaints concerning the length of time the Mitchell County Ambulances have been taking in answering calls was the main item on the agenda of the regular meeting of the Mitchell County Ambulance Board Thursday.

The board which is made up of representatives from the Mitchell County Hospital Board of Directors (Bob Rely), the City Council of Colorado City (Ray Dillard) and the Mitchell County Commissioners Court (Johnny Shackelford) meets once every three months.

In addition to Root Memorial Hospital Administrator Charles Root and Business Manager,

George Witten, three full time Ambulance Service Emergency Medical Technicians (Rhonda Merket, Greg Hardegree and Janet Free) were also at the meeting.

At the beginning of the meeting, Root told the group, "We are getting criticism because of the time lapse of some of our ambulance calls."

Root went on to state that there had been reasons for the time lapse in all of the calls in which there had been complaints. He added, however, "We don't have an opportunity to go back and tell the people what the real story is."

Root presented the board with a detailed See ROOT Page 8

The cost to purchase the display areas at the roundup is \$22.50 for an eight foot by eight foot See FOOT Page 8

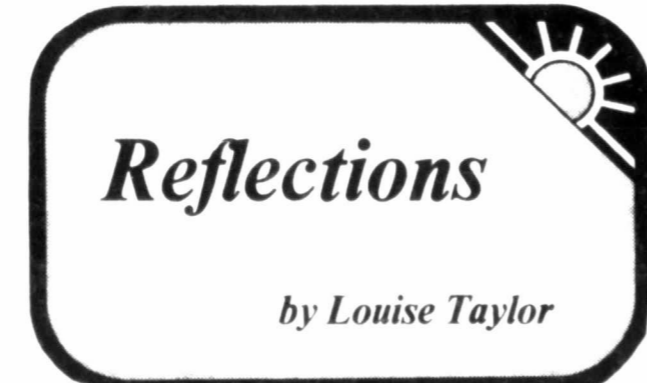
Car Leasing Creates Stir

The Colorado School Board will hold a called meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday to discuss the school's car leasing agreement.

At present the school is leasing five vehicles from Jay Adams Chevrolet. At the regular board meeting on Oct. 9 the board accepted an agreement with Jay Adams to lease the vehicles at a rate of \$175 per month plus a charge of eight cents per mile for all miles over 6,000 driven in each car in a six month period.

Since that time, however, the board has had complaints from other local car dealers that they weren't given an opportunity to make an offer to lease the vehicles.

At Tuesday night's meeting the board will have to either decide to stay with the agreement with Jay Adams Chevrolet or rescind the minutes of the Oct. 9 meeting and call for bids on the lease agreement.



Reflections

This week has been proclaimed National Business Women's Week across our nation, sponsored by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Club, Inc.

Working women constitute some 43 million of the nation's work force. We have come a long way since 1848 when Susan B. Anthony, along with Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Stanton, led the "Feminists" movement at the first women's rights convention in New York. Before that, in 1836, an institution of higher education for women was founded by Mary Lyon.

During Jackson's administration, some states passed laws allowing women to keep and manage their property after marriage.

It was in June of 1919 that Congress passed the nineteenth amendment extending suffrage to women.

In the 1920 and 30's, having won the right to vote, women now demanded equal rights to jobs, income, their own apartments, cigarettes and liquor according to a recent history book.

Today, businesses have many women employees, some of which hold high positions of authority. Look at the women in our area: some are teachers, pharmacists, executive positions, owners of their own business, and police officers just to name a few.

At a recent convention I attended, women represented professions such as CPA's, judges, lawyers and doctors. Not too many weeks ago, I saw a female operating a steam roller here in Colorado City. In nearly every profession or business, women are being employed.

How many years will it be before we see a woman president of these United States?

I recently read where a Dallas county chief medical examiner has called for an autopsy of the individual buried in Rose Hill Cemetery in Tarrant County under the name of Lee Harvey Oswald.

Oswald was accused as the assassin of President John Kennedy sixteen years ago in Dallas.

The medical examiner says he has been made aware of certain information which sheds doubt as to the identity of the person buried in Rose Hill.

Officers, he said.

"We had between 45 and 50 units combing a 25 square mile area," he said. "We thought we had the answer to the communication problems pretty well in hand until this thing came up," McCollum said.

"We have a 45 foot communication bus that we moved to the site and set up as a command post."

"The Oklahoma DPS and Sheriff's officers were in touch but we found we had no communications with the Texas officers," McCollum noted.

At the point in the film where the first two officers were murdered, an eye witness telephoned the sheriff's office to report shots fired and then later telephoned the Caddo Police to report the officers down and the killers were headed toward Caddo, McCollum explained.

There was confusion at this point in the events because the DPS had no knowledge of the location of the troopers or their status because they had not called in their position.

"We had a general idea of their location but did not know they were wounded," McCollum said.

In the film the officers were depicted attempting to use the radio after being wounded. McCollum noted that the troopers were located about 10 minutes after the two escapees were cornered and killed in Caddo.

"We tried to find them by air but they were on a narrow back road surrounded by huge trees, McCollum stated.

"Didn't you pick up the city's broadcast on the status of the troopers or didn't they put it out? Were you in communication with the Caddo PD?" a dispatcher asked from the audience.

"No, we were trying to monitor them on a scanner. I will say that we missed it," McCollum said.

The third trooper was killed minutes later when the fugitives were cornered in the city of Caddo, according to McCollum. Two internal See TWO Page 8

The text I want to minister on deals with one of the worst problems, if not the worst, that exists. In fact, this problem has existed many years and has not been solved. Jesus faced this problem with His close disciples. The disciples were constantly battling over who was the greatest. From the secular to the sacred, from sports to war, from poor to rich, from the non-exalted to the exalted, that age old question of who is the greatest is still hanging around.

The desire to be the greatest has and will destroy relationships. Homes have been broken, friendships have been destroyed, spirits and hearts have been crushed and fellowship dissolved because of the self-centeredness and self-will of the individual to be the greatest.

In the scriptures chosen as our text, Jesus deals with this subject of the greatest. The disciples were debating this very thing. Jesus confronted them concerning their debate and they acted as if nothing was going on. Jesus gave them an illustration. Jesus took a little child and set him in the middle and said, "Whosoever receiveth one of such children in my name, receiveth me." In another scripture, Jesus says "Except a man humble himself and become as a little child, he cannot enter the Kingdom of God." He also said, "He that desires to be the greatest and chief, let him be your servant or let him be the least."

In order to receive our reward or whatever, we have to set our vision in the right place. If we are to receive spiritually, we must first get in position. We are to serve one another. We are to stop being high-minded and condescend to men of low estate. We must reach down to what we think unimportant and insignificant, but important to God. We need to be like Mary instead of Martha and choose that righteous or right thing. If your life is centered around Jesus, you will desire to get to the place of pleasing Him. That place is in total humbleness to His will.

Jesus says "The person who is faithful in the least, shall be faithful in the greatest." Samuel told King Saul, "When you were little in your own eyes is when God raised you up." Paul puts it in the right perspective in 1 Corinthians 1:26-31 (KJV), "For you see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called: but God hath chosen the foolish things of the world, to confound the wise; and God has chosen the weak things of the world, to confound the things which are mighty, and base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen, yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are: that no flesh should glory in his presence. But of him are you in Christ Jesus, who of God is made unto us wisdom, and righteousness, and sanctification, and redemption: that according as it is written. He that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord." Folks, in this world I see no spiritual super stars. We are all getting there the same way: through Jesus Christ.

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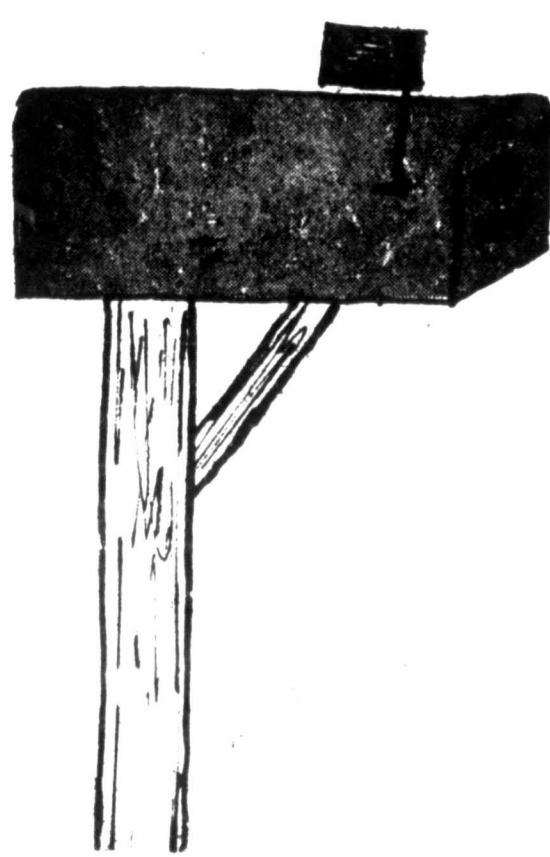
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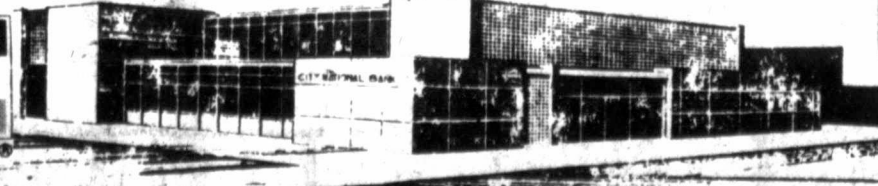


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Wike Family Moves To Dimmitt

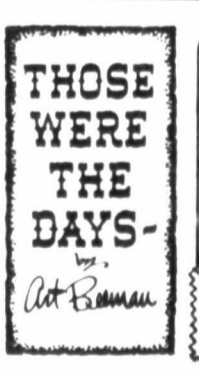

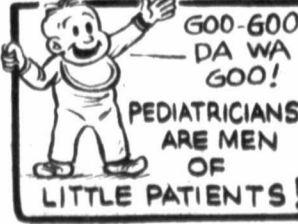

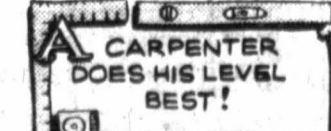

GANG. From Page 1 they would do all they could to help them.

The Colorado City man went on to add that if one of the Americans asked directions of them, they would not only tell him how to get where he was going, they would even offer to take him there in person.

Williams added that apparently not all Scottish men wear kilts as they are pictured because he didn't see many of them.

The Scottish men were apparently impressed with the Western style hats which the Americans wore because there were several offers to buy the hats.

The houses of Aberdeen were all of graystone and they all looked like miniature castles, Williams said. He added that one thing that really impressed him about the town and about the entire country was that it was so clean.

There was no trash or litter on the streets, there were no flies and there were no stray dogs or cats.

He also said that there were no stop signs in the town. When a person came to an intersection, he simply gave way to the driver on the right.

Williams only had one opportunity to see the countryside but he described it as "Beautiful with rolling hills."

On this trip outside of Aberdeen he visited a castle which has a name that is very unusual and haunting, "Drumtochty."

A brief history of the castle stated that it was uncertain exactly how long it had been there but the known history of the place went back to the early 1600's.

Just as the Scottish people were not accustomed to the barbecue which the Chuckwagon Gang served, so the Americans were not familiar to the Scottish food. Williams stated that whatever it was he ate during his visit there, it was very good but he never did find out what it was.

Another minor problem probably expected by the Americans was the slight language barrier. Williams said that the Scottish people talked very fast and slurred their "R's" and the Americans would have to ask them to slow down in an attempt to understand them. Williams remembered that when one of the Scottish people said the word "Steak" it would invariably come out as "Stock."

In contrast, the Scottish people seemed to have little trouble understanding the Texans with their slow drawl.

Williams finally added that even though prices in this country are high there are still nowhere as high as prices in Scotland where gasoline costs \$2.25 per gallon, a hamburger costs \$5 and the meal served by the Chuckwagon Gang cost about \$12 per person.

Morren's Decision Reversed

Local Attorney R.L. McKinney was able to convince the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas to reverse the conviction of Jay Franklin Morren for the crime of forgery.

On October 11, McKinney appealed the conviction alleging that the original indictment to which Morren pled guilty was fundamentally defective as it did not allege all the necessary elements of the crime of forgery.

During this period, they made a total of 120 calls for a total mileage of 4,436 and a total cost to the people involved of \$6,866.25.

certainty. Any command post must be manned by key personnel from all agencies. Interdepartmental cooperation and communication is a must in any emergency situation," McCollum stated.

About 40 persons from all branches of law enforcement communications attended the meeting.

Members from Midland, Abilene, Floydada, Brownwood, Big Lake, Plainview, Lubbock, Anson, Durant, Oklahoma, Sweetwater, Odessa and Colorado City were welcomed by City Manager Ray Mason.

Other items on the program included talks on child abuse, given by Don McWhorter of the Abilene Department of Human Resources and defense tactics for women, given by Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent Joel Howerton.

A: "The Browns" are no longer recording as a brother and sisters team. At one time, especially back in the '50s, they were one of the hottest acts in country music. Jim Ed, as you mentioned, is now recording with Helen Cornelius, and they are one of the most popular duets in the business. His sisters, Maxine and Bonnie, have retired from show business.

Q: Is Webb Pierce still recording?
A: Webb is still very active. He is currently recording for Planatation Records out of Nashville and makes personal appearances.

Q: Is it true that Dolly Parton has forsaken country music and now considers herself one of the so-called Hollywood set? Is it also true that she and her former boss, Porter Wagoner, are now throat-cutting enemies?

A: Dolly, as you probably know, has become one of the super-popular people in show business thanks to her appearances on network television and the big syndicated talk shows. Even though her more recent recordings do not reflect the original country sound, she still considers country music her basic love.

She did, however, drop her "family" band and is adapting to a more "modern" sound in music in order to correspond with her new reputation. She is now considered to be in the same set as Olivia Newton-John, Linda Ronstadt and Emmylou Harris. She and Porter Wagoner are at extreme "outs" with each other. Even to the unfortunate point of legal actions.

Q: How old is Roy Acuff? How old is Gene Autry?
A: Acuff is 75; Autry is 72. Both were born in September. Roy's birthday is Sept. 15; Gene's is Sept. 29.

Q: Is it true that Jimmy Heap, the country singer from Taylor, Texas, was robbed and murdered?

A: Jimmy Heap lost his life in a boating accident more than a year ago. You may have confused his death with "Stringbean" of Hee-Haw show and Grand Ole Opry. Stringbean (Dave Akeman) and his wife were robbed and murdered several years ago at their home near Nashville.

Q: I was born and raised in Abilene, Texas. My family radio was always dialed in on "The Slim Willet Show" on radio station KRBC. He was not only a disc jockey and country singer, he also wrote quite a few hits. I know he wrote the big song "Don't Let The Stars Get In Your Eyes." He also wrote a tune that was my father's favorite song. It was about the oilfield workers (my Dad worked in the oilfields). Do you recall the title?

A: That had to be Slim's composition and recording of "Tool Pusher From Snyder." It was released on 4-Star Records around 1950.

Q: I've heard all kinds of reports that Connie Smith, the female country singer, retired from country music. I still see her on various country television shows. Did she change her mind and decide to get back into the big loot from the big business?

A: Connie still appears on the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville singing only gospel songs. She is still retired from country music. The shows you see her performing on via your TV set are syndicated shows that were pre-recorded several months ago.

Q: Is that fine lady of country music, Kitty Wells, still making records? Also, didn't her husband lose his life in the same car accident that took Jim Reeves?

A: Kitty has a new album on the market consisting of new recordings of her past big-selling hits. Her husband, Johnny Wright, is still very much alive and active in country music. Johnny was half of the famous "Johnny and Jack" team back in the '50s and mid-'60s. His partner, Jack Anglin, lost his life in a one-car accident while on the way to Patsy Cline's funeral. Jim Reeves lost his life in a private plane crash in the '60s.

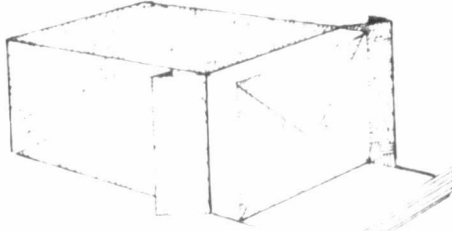

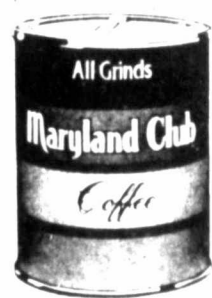
