DISTRICT COURT CLOSED LAST SATURDAY

The regular April Term of the District Court closed on last Saturday night with several cases undecided. It seems to be general opinion of the attorneys and others that Ochiltree County will have to be allotted more than one week for the clearance of our district court docket. Following are the cases that were disposed of this session.

Ochiltree Oil and Gas Co. vs. Caaa Oil Co., Change of Venue to Hemphill County.

Spearman Lumber Co. vs. B. A. Becker, Judgment for plaintiff of \$1460.00.

E. T. King vs. Cora A. Kink, Divorce decree granted.

State of Texas vs. Dean Parnell, Theft of cattle, Two years in State Penitentiary.

State of Texas vs. Harvey Drake, Bootlegging, Three years in State Penitentiary.

W. V. Jones vs. W. R. Hess, change of Venue to Lipscomb County.

The case against the Perryton Independent School District in regard to taxes for school purposes resulted in a hung jury. It is deplorable that this case could not have been settled this term of the court for as it now stands all of the tiresome procedure of trying this case will have to be gone over again at the next term.

This was one of the busiest terms of the district court ever held in Ochiltree County. The original panel of forty petit jurors was exhausted early in the week and a second and third venire of twenty-five and thirty-five men was called by the court.

GRAND JURY IN SESSION THREE DAYS

The grand jury which was called for this term of court had a busy session of three days duration but failed to find very many indictments. It is a hard matter for a grand jury to gather in evidence that will justify them in returning a true bill even when they are almost positive that there have been violations of the law. In our minds the grand jury summoned this time was composed of some of the most representative men in the county. Two indictments for theft and felony and one for a misdemeanor, resisting an officer, were returned by the jury.

D-C-D GENERAL CONVENTION

W. A. Palmer, Secretary and General Manager of the D-C-D Highway Association, has returned from a trip over the Highway as far as Houston and found great interest in the forth-coming convention of the Association which is to be held at Canadian, Texas, on April 26-27-28. Advises have been received by mail from a large number of towns on the system regarding delegations to the Convention. A conservative estimate places the number of delegates and visitors at between four and five hundred. Some towns will bring as many as twenty cars. There will be visiting bands from Guymon and Elk City and perhaps Childress. Governor Neff of Texas, Captain J. D. Fauntleroy, State Highway Engineer, R. M. Hubbard of New Boston, Texas, Chairman of the State Highway Commission of Texas, Comptroller L. A. Smith of Austin and Highway Commissioners McCrory and Martin will be present.

The town of Canadian will be houses will be decorated inside and handsomely decorated. Business is being prepared to take care of all delegates and rooms will be furnished for everyone present. The Convention will open Wednesday night, run through Thursday and Thursday night and close Friday noon. Governor Neff and party will come by automobile from Childress and arrive in Canadian at five-thirty p.m. Wednesday, April 26th. The Governor will speak at ten a. m. Thursday morning. Thursday night will be "Stunt" night and some unique entertainment is being prepared.

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COMPULSORY ARBITRATION

Why in the world do not our national lawmakers pass a law making it compulsory for all public service corporations and their employees to get together and arbitrate their fights, and make the fine and imprisonment stiff enough in case of failure that each side would be either compelled to submit to such arbitration or go to prison? There is no other way to settle these continued brawls between capital and labor, and it is high time the statesmen of the country were finding it out.

The idea that the whole people must be subjected to inconvenience and loss of millions because railroads or coal operators and their employes have not sense enough to settle difference the same as notions are now proposing to settle them, and as sensible people everywhere do, is absurd. That sort of thing is getting to be a stench in the nostrils of the public and all society. Nine times out of ten both sides are to blame, and the Government should take each of them by the collar and knock their heads together. Railroads, coal, steamships, light, power and water are all public necessities, and no set of men, whether they represent employers or employes, or what not, should be allowed to discriminate the whole public and cause it paralysis of business and loss of time and money, and those who do so willfully should be put out of the public service business.

Unless this foolishness stops before long one of two things has got to happen. One is compulsory arbitration with heavy penalties. The other is public ownership of all public utilities. The former is preferable.

COAL SITUATION DEMANDS ACTION

The "watchful waiting" policy of the Administration relative to the coal strike situation will amount to about the same as the Wilson "watchful waiting" policy in Mexico did—nothing at all but more trouble. For once Senator Borah is right, when he says an emergency exists and has existed for some time, and action should have been taken long ago.

The coal companies comprised mostly of the railroads, the big New York banks and the Steel Corporation, are entitled to no sympathy from the public, for whatever troubles they have they have brought upon themselves. The coal mining industry of the United States is the worst-managed industry in the country. They imported these yahoos in here from all the countries of Europe, the lowest type of manhood they could find, and now they are reaping the natural results. They are wrong, also, in refusing the Government's demand that they meet with the representatives of the men and seek to arrive at an adjustment of the difficulties.

On the other hand, the men are not deserving of sympathy, either, as their demands are abnormal to the verge of absurdity. They demand a five day week and six hour day, at same pay as they are getting now for six days and eight hours a day, and are not entitled to anything of the sort. No class of workers gets that, and they are no better than all the others. In fact, they are not as good, for not one out of twenty of them are Americans. They came in here from the rotten kingdoms of middle Europe to raise trouble with American workmen, and that is just what they have done. Where they came from they got 50 cents a day, worked 12 hours, wore wooden shoes and lived on cabbage soup.

The Government has got to step in and handle this situation, and the quicker it does so the better. Government ownership is not the solution, but strict Government regulation, and a National Board of Compulsory Arbitration is. This is a case where, both sides are against the general public, and both sides are in wrong, and deserves a handling that will break up all such public calamities for all time.

Time was when we used to use gasoline for removing spots from clothing, with occasional mistaking it for kerosene and blowing up the kitchen range, but now life's highway is dotted with gasoline stations like a milky way, and instead of driving Dobbin up to the watering trough we drive the Ford up to a service station and fork over our week's wages.

THE FARMER THE GOAT

After all is said and done it is the farmer that bears the bulk of all the burdens, for after all the taxes have been passed along by the higherups to the other workmen, the fact still remains that even the other workmen would die if the farmer did not feed him, and so would everybody else. Every drone in the country is astride of the farmer's sturdy back and every swivel chair and roll-top desk is in the long run kept up by the tiller of the soil. We hear awful screams from the press and politicians over the agricultural block in Congress, but the wonder is the farmer has not demanded legislation and fair treatment long ago. Congress and politicians have expended tons and rivers of oratory and legislative effort for industry, but mighty little for agriculture. The railroads and trusts all get theirs, while the farmer has always been the goat. Now we hear much about granting a subsidy for steamships, but not a word about a bonus of any kind for the farmer, yet the ships would not have anything to haul if it were not for the man behind the plow. He has been receiving two-bits a bushel for corn, yet if he went to a grocery and bought some of it back in the shape of sawdust breakfast food in a paper carton he has to pay \$25 a bushel. He can't make a cow hide a present to anybody, but pays \$8 for a bum pair of shoes. He will sell you a lamb for a dollar, but is charged that for a lamb chop at a restaurant in town. There will be no "back to the farm" movement until the farmer gets a share of the profits somebody else is grabbing.

IN HER HUSBAND'S MEMORY

Mrs. Maude Donohue, Minnesota Newspaper Woman, to Erect Building as Memorial.

The day Mrs. Maude A. Donohue's husband enlisted she went to work on the editorial staff of the San Francisco Examiner. She is now editor and publisher of a progressive little weekly paper at Kokato, Minn., trying by keeping herself always occupied to forget the day when she received the news that her husband had been killed in action in France.



Mrs. Donohue intends this year to erect a new newspaper building in Kokato as a memorial to "My Bill," and then she intends as a "distant dream" to write a book of his life. Last year she visited her husband's grave at Romagne, where 22,000 were buried in the heart of the Argonne wood.

Probably no paper in the country gives more sympathetic treatment to the problem of the returned soldier than does the weekly at Kokato. "The tragedy of war has broadened my viewpoint," says Mrs. Donohue. "There is much to be done, and I'm frank to say that I expect great things of the American Legion as an organization representing men who know what the word 'service' means."

FRENCH AWARD IS DECLINED

Legion's National Commander Accepts Honor Only in Name of Those Who Served.

Hanford MacNider is one of the negligible number of persons who declined the award of "commander of the Legion of Honor," proffered by the French government. Mr. MacNider, as national commander of the American Legion, adroitly shifted the honor to the heads of a million soldiers. He said that he could receive the decoration only as a tribute to all Legionnaires—and when the medal arrives it will be deposited in the archives of the Legion.



When he received the notification of the award, he cabled Marshal Foch: "In the name of 5,000,000 service men and women represented by the American Legion, we extend through you to the President of the French republic our gratitude over the tribute proffered. Realizing that this is not awarded to me personally we accept it for every man and woman of our organization and in extending our deep thanks pledge to France our continued love and devotion."

Mr. MacNider was made a chevalier of the Legion of Honor on the battlefield in 1918.

AERIAL POLO IS NEW SPORT

Airplane-Toy Balloon Game One of Features at Recent Legion Entertainment in Florida.

Aerial polo is the latest sport. One of the chief features of an entertainment given by the American Legion at Miami, Fla., was a game of polo staged high in the air, sans mallets sans ponies, sans ball, sans everything except a dozen nimble aviators and several dozen toy balloons.

Every sort of twist from the Immelman turn to the maple-leaf drop is called into play during the contest. Here is what happens: A motorboat loaded with the many-colored balloons of the proverbial country fair plows out into the harbor and drops anchor. From nearby hangars come galloping a dozen Pegasuses. They take the air, and when they are equidistant from the launch, at a safe altitude the little balloons are released and go soaring upward in great confusion on the wind.

The air rider who captures the greatest number is declared the winner. The Legion pilots who tried it said that it used to be easier catching Taubes.

Would Postpone This Expense.

The dome of the proposed Victory Memorial building in Washington would be virtually a huge service flag. It would be studded with five million stars—gold for those who died, blue for those who served. The plan is to have each star engraved with the initials of the soldier it stands for, so that future visitors will be able to distinguish them, with the aid of a telescope, from the floor below. The American Legion has taken the stand that the erection of the expensive memorial should be withheld until there are fewer suffering veterans on the streets.

HARRY WONG TI, LEGION MAN

One of China's Most Active Sons in New York, Worker for His Organization.

The long-tailed queues and honorable garb of the celestial, the dangerous dives and the ornate joss-houses are pointed out to sight-seers aboard New York's rubber-neck busses rumbly through Chinatown. But perspicacious persons realize that "China in America" is represented as often by clean-cut young men as by long-haired ancients.



Harry Wong Ti, who served in the Seventy-seventh division, is one of China's most active sons in New York. One of three American-born Chinese ex-service men of the John Purroy Mitchell post of the American Legion, Ti is busily occupied in raising funds for a lean-to at the veterans' mountain camp in the Adirondacks. He also serves on the executive committee of his post.

In a recent round-up of slackers in Chinatown several Chinese ex-soldiers assisted the Legion "detectives" in the work of tracking their quarry, and in many other ways Chinese service men have proved to the Legion, by their progressiveness and their initiative, how worthy they are as patriotic citizens.

OLD GLORY AND UNION JACK

Emblems Float Side by Side Over Great Arch Astride Canadian and United States Border.

Astride the Canadian border at Blaine, Wash., is a great peace arch, celebrating a hundred years of friendly relations between Canada and the United States. Side by side float the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack—a symbol of our international good will.

The vista of peace which American Legionnaires saw in their mind's eye through this portal gave them the name of their "Peace Arch post" at Blaine. At the time of the unveiling of the monument the Legion took an

active part in the ceremonies, and represented with their uniformed ranks the strengthening of the bonds of brotherly feeling with Canada which came as a result of the recent alliance against a common enemy for common ideals.

On the architrave of the monument are carved the words, "Children of a Common Mother," to perpetuate the idea of the triangular relationship between England and her two American offspring.

Carrying On With the American Legion

A plea that all students at Nebraska university join the Legion for the honor of the institution and the perpetuity of our country has been made by Chancellor Avery.

The "Society of Military and Naval Officers of the World War" has come into existence in New York state. Plans are under way to make it a nationwide organization, with hereditary membership.

Ex-service men who ask for aid at Racine, Wis., receive no hearing unless they hold a letter of endorsement from the American Legion. "Impostors in bought uniforms" have brought on the move.

Influx of Japanese on newly opened farm land is opposed by the American Legion of central Oregon. George Shima, so-called Japanese potato king, has shares in a company which owns 17,000 acres of this land.

"To aid and to aid quickly" is the object of the Washington State association in New York City, which is checking up on Washington state soldiers in need. The Legion is asking other states to "do likewise."

"Wait two years until the gas gets working good," was no idle jest on the part of the Germans. Almost one-third of the 80,000 hospital cases in America are suffering from mental disorders, the Legion reports.

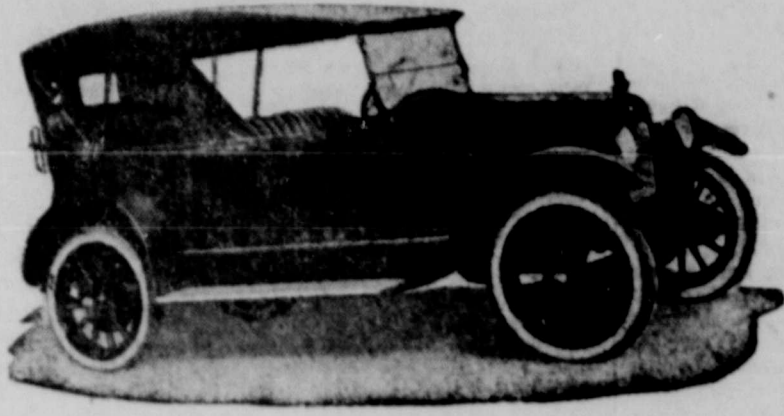

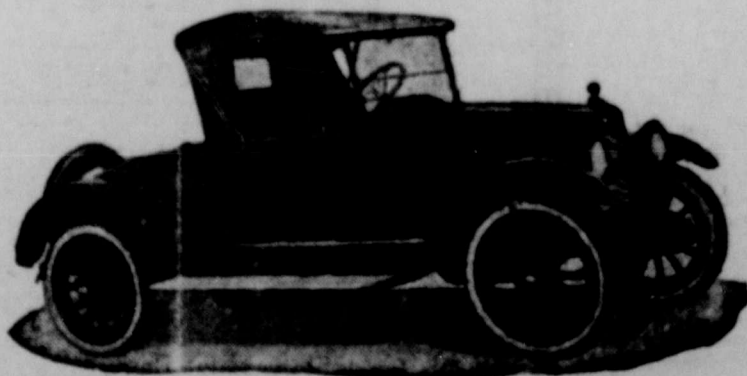

**A LETTER TO THE VOTERS
OF OCHILTREE COUNTY**

A few words to the Public of Perryton and Ochiltree County, Texas: Some good citizens of this County have seen fit to go to the District Judge about the actions of myself and the county judge and County Attorney about a fine that has been let run an account of some boys running a horse race and betting on it. Now I suppose that justice is being cheated but I am not sure who is cheating and am taking this method to have my say publicly instead of going to the District Judge and trying to get the officer of this county removed from office for doing just what the law gives them the right to do. The facts in this case are these: the boys did run the ponies, and they did bet a little money on the race, as they both said they did and only asked for the Judge to suspend payment until such time as things eased up so they could get the money to pay their fine. Now let's review this case a little. One of these boys went to the army and did his part to help win the war, while you fellows stayed at home and enjoyed your gains from high prices caused by the war; although this boy was entitled to an exemption for the reason that he has an aged mother and some orphans to make a living for. Now he came home after his discharge and took up the job of trying to make a living for them again and, if put in jail as these good men are howling about, let's see what happens. We not only would have to pay board bills for them but would be bound under the law to see that the aged mother was cared for. Now you say they should not have violated the law. This is right. You see it makes a difference who breaks the law to some. Now I don't look at it that way, one man has no right to break one law and then cuss his neighbor for breaking another, so you fellows better get yourselves clean before you want to be so just on others. I know who made these talks and what is at the bottom of it all. Now I have lived here for 21 years and in Texas the rest of my life time and I never yet had any one to say I ever kicked my fellow man because he was down and if I am not big enough to go in any crowd of men, let them be who they may, and extend a helping hand to them without myself being lowered in the mind of some shortsighted fellow, then I am too little for my job. When the people brought the sinner before Christ and made their charge. Christ told them that she should be stoned to death but that the one present without sin should cast the first stone. There were none cast. And if some of these people here would learn to run their own business and let their neighbor's alone there would not be half as many troubles in this world. And I want to say right here if you can't say a good word to the credit of your neighbor or fellow man then don't say anything. That is my practice and I feel better for it and I don't care who I associate with none of you fellows that are after me or my fellow county officers can find where I ever went far off the right track. Although you have never done anything but try to cause me trouble, you can not say that I or any of my family did you any but good terms. I don't want any newspaper advertising but am able to take care of myself physically, mentally and otherwise.

Now in conclusion I want to say that if you fellows that are talking the K. K. Klan will stop breaking the laws yourselves and come out and form a law and order club where you don't have to wear a mask then I am with you, but there will be no masked mobs in this county. There is no occasion for it and these fellows that form them are criminals. Then why should they bother some one else for the very thing they do themselves? This is just what made me write this piece. The simple fact is that those self righteous fellows that have made this attack on us County Officers for trying to do justice to all, either can't see their faults or think others can't. Now purge your own records and judge not lest you be judged, do things to help your fellow man instead of trying to put things in his way. If some of you fellows think you can get to heaven and live by the religion you practice then I don't want any of it, for my religion is to treat my fellow man as I want to be treated and be just to all and I would not give my chance for yours.

DALHART SCHOOL BUILDING DESTROYED BY FIRE

Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the school building on the south side of town, used for grades and high school students, Saturday morning of last week. The fire is supposed to have started about 4:30 a. m. and when first seen was in the attic near the flue. The alarm was sounded by switch engines on the F. W. & D. C., and the volunteer department turned out, but were unsuccessful in combating the flames that soon spread to the rooms of the building.

Nearly all the citizens of the town were on the scene before daylight, and automobiles filled the streets around the school block.

Only the broken walls of the building were left, and these have since been wrecked. Hundreds of dollars worth of books, the property of the State of Texas, all the school equipment, including library and physical laboratory, went up in flames, as high school and grade students, and parents and friends, stood by, helpless in arresting the fire demon that consumed everything as he went from room to room.

The burned building was constructed in 1908 at an approximate cost of \$30,000. At that time W. J. Clarke was president of the school board, A. S. Kendricks, secretary, and the following were members: C. J. Carter, T. W. Turner, E. H. Griffith, E. E. Kersey, and R. C. Balsam. J. R. Ronley was superintendent of schools. D. P. Kaufman & Sons were the architects, and C. D. Patterson the contractor.

The insurance carried on the building at time of the fire was \$49,200. Of this amount \$42,000 was on building, \$5000 on furniture and fixtures, and \$2200 on State school books.

A hurried meeting of the Board was called Saturday, and it was decided to finish the school term of five weeks. The churches of the town were offered to the Board, and school is running this week in the Baptist, Methodist South, Presbyterian, and Christian churches. When the pupils gathered at their respective places Monday and an inventory taken of books, it was found that the loss in text books was not as great as at first supposed. Other books were telegraphed for immediately, and indications now are that the school term will be finished in good shape.

No information has been given out by the Board as to what arrangements will be made for the schools this fall, but it is freely assumed that a contract will be let for a building in the same location, and every effort made to complete it in time for the fall opening.

The new \$125,000 high school building is nearing completion, but will probably not be used till fall. Also, an architect has been engaged for the new building in Ward 1, and it is thought that the contract will be let soon.

It looks now like Dalhart will start the next school year with all new building and equipment. —Dalhart, Texan.

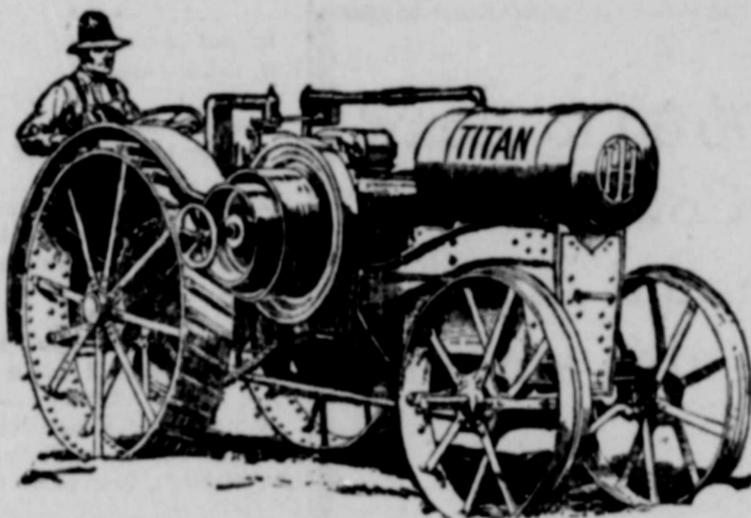

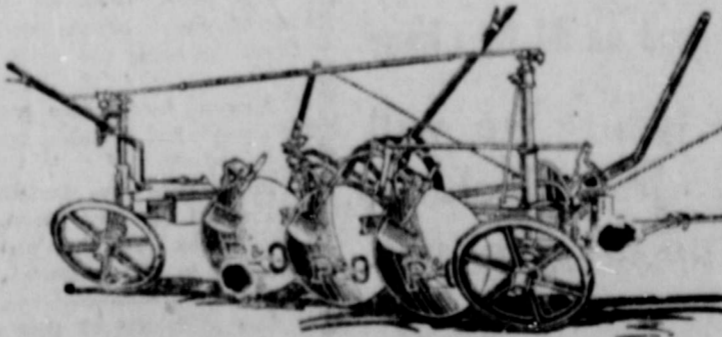

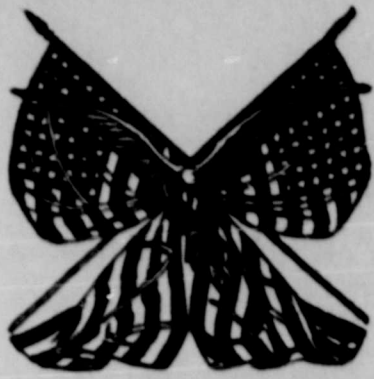

SEX OF EGGS AND CHICKENS

Department of Agriculture Says There is No Dependable Method to Determine Sex.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Raisers of poultry have long wished for a reliable means for determining the sex of chicks and of eggs to be used for hatching, but, in spite of the promise of various manufacturers of devices, the United States Department of Agriculture says there is no very dependable method for determining the sex of chicken that a certain egg will produce, and that it is extremely difficult to determine the sex of chicks of most breeds.

The department has made tests of a number of devices claimed by the

makes to give good results in sorting out male, female and infertile eggs. In all cases they have been found to be useless for the purpose, as two persons could never get the same result with a lot of eggs, and hatching tests showed that one could do just as well by closing his eyes and picking out the eggs at random.

On account of the difference in the color of the down of the sexes it is often possible to select with considerable accuracy the hens and cockerels of the Barred Plymouth Rock as soon as they are hatched, but in the case of most other breeds and varieties this selection cannot be made with any certainty until some time later. Those who know the breed well are able to distinguish between the sexes of Leg horns when they are three to four weeks old. The sexes of the medium-weight breeds, with the exception given above, have the same appearance until the chicks are 10 or 12 weeks old. The surface sex differences in the Asiatic breeds are not as apparent up until the birds are three or four months old.

There may be differences that will make it possible to sort the sexes earlier, but so far poultrymen have found no reliable basis for selection.

GREAT IMPORTANCE OF OATS

Used in Ration of Growing Chick It Does Much to Build Up Strong Frame and Muscle.

The importance of oats in the poultry ration cannot well be overlooked. It forms the backbone in many rations. It is chiefly important in the growing ration for young chicks, for it will grow frame and muscle more economically than any other grain. Steel-cut oats, rolled oats, or growing mash, having ground oats or oatmeal as a base are exceptionally economical feeds for growing stock. Fed in connection with buttermilk, it makes the best growing ration now known. Of course, a grain mixture should be fed for variety.



DOULTRY NOTES

Confine the hen until the chicks are wanted.

The busy hen is the one that lays the most eggs.

Chicks should not receive feed until they are 36 hours old.

The baby chick will not stand chilling. It must have access to heat whenever it desires.

Toe-mark the chicks as soon as they are hatched. This enables one to tell their ages later.

Disease control and sanitation are among the most important things in poultry management.

Chicks chilled at some time early in their development keep dropping off even after attaining considerable size.

The coop for hen and chicks should be well ventilated, easy to clean and of sufficient proportions to insure comfort.

The cockerel that can be marketed as a broiler in March or April brings more money than the one marketed in June.

In cold weather ten to thirteen chicks are sufficient for one hen, while in warmer weather fifteen to twenty can be cared for successfully.
