Lake Rises 2 Feet; 2 to 7 Inches Fall

Rains of 2 to 7 inches Thursday afternoon and early Friday morning blanketed Mitchell County and brought new life to the moisture-starved farm lands of the county.

"A million-dollar rain—maybe even more," was the way jubilant farmers and agricultural leaders in the county described the downpour.

The rains came at an ideal time for cotton seeding, reports A. V. Sheppard, Soil Conservation Service unit technician here in Colorado City. All parts of the county can seed in 10 days to 2 weeks, weather permitting, he stated.

The "million-dollar" downpour came with deep moisture conditions in the county's soil still good. The 2 should make for ideal planting conditions—along with a good, warm soil temperature too, Sheppard reported.

The rain hit every part of the county with the lightest fall reported in the northwest portion of the county near Dunn with just under 2 inches. Otto Jones, manager of Rendonbrook, reported the heaviest rain in the county—7 inches.

Ranchers reported most stock tanks caught water with many filling to overflowing in the sections of heavier rains. Many, however, need more rain to be filled—in the northwestern part of the county and other scattered areas. Buford and Colorado City area reported the best stock tank conditions following the rain.

Westbrook reported 3.25 of rain with small amounts of hail fall Thursday afternoon. The rainfall neared 5 inches south of Westbrook, in the Conaway area, and most stock tanks were reported filled.

Six to 7 inches fell in the area southwest of Hymen. Some sheep were reported drowned in that area.

Five shallow wildcats have been staked in Mitchell County.

Dixon Drilling Co. has staked the 5, all for 900 feet, on a I. L. Ellwood lease 17 miles south of Westbrook.

No. 1-33 is 2,332 feet from the north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of section 33-17, SPRR survey.

No. 1-34 is 2,360 feet from the north and 2,353 feet from the west lines of section 34-17, same survey.

No. 1-37 is 2,343 feet from the north and 2,341 feet from the east lines of section 37-17, SPRR survey.

No. 1-38 is 2,353 feet from the north and 2,323 feet from the west lines of section 38-17, same survey.

No. 1-39 is projected at 2,351 feet from the south and 2,345 feet from the west lines of section 39-17, same survey.

Mitchell County oil fields added 274.70 barrels of new potential in the month of April with 6 field wells.

The month's potential is 72.17 barrels below the potential added in the month of March.

Sharon Ridge (1700) field produced 4 of the new wells with 53.3 barrels of potential.

Two wells in the Turner Gregory field have 704.67 barrels of potential.

During the month, latent East Howard field had 2 locations. Sharon Ridge (1700) had 6 Turner Gregory had 4 and Westbrook field had 1.

Completions during the month were 1 well at 1 in Sharon Ridge (1700), 3 in Turner Gregory and 2 in Westbrook field.

Latent East Howard and Sharon Ridge fields have the potential to produce 1,000 bbls. per acre each registered in the county during the month.

200 Residences Damaged by Hail

Wind-driven hail damaged more than 200 Colorado City residences here Thursday afternoon.

The late afternoon hail came with more than 4 inches of rain that soaked the city. Hailstones up to 1 inch in diameter struck the city—with the northern and north-eastern sections taking the brunt of the storm.

Damages, ranging from a few dollars to several hundred dollars to individual residences spread across the city. Final damages could top the \$50,000 mark, it is estimated.

Reports of damages continue to pour into insurance agencies. Most claims will be checked out this week, but first checks showed most of the damage in the area of the city north of 9th St.

The driving hail knocked holes in roofs punctured screens and broke window panes over the hard-hit area. One house in the Eastover Addition, was reported to have 12 window panes broken. Several homes in the north-

eastern section were hit with such force that interiors of the homes were damaged from the hail striking the outside walls. The older homes in the area showed the most effects of the damage.

Hail and high winds damaged shrubbery and trees and several signs in scattered sections of the city toppled in high gusts.

Water flowed down 10th St. from Hickory St. to Walnut. Water also stood on 11th St. for a short time. All traffic was halted by the flowing water both Thursday afternoon and Thursday night around 10 p. m.

State Highway 208, Hickory St., was covered with flowing water at several points above 11th St. Many cars stalled, but were aided on their way by trucks stationed all along the street by Texas Highway Department.

The same conditions prevailed Thursday night when the second heavy downpour of the day began.

Street damage was relatively minor, but isolated spots of damaged pavement were reported. A portion of pavement washed out on the southwest corner of 18th St. and Hickory St. and at least 1 auto nose-dived into the hole.

Final estimates of the hail, wind and water damages are expected late this week.

Southwestern Bell Telephone reported 6 poles down west of the city and a few lines down.

The damage was relatively minor, but some sections were without service for a short time.

Texas Electric Service Company was out on calls for several hours, but most damages resulted from blow fuses at individual residences and a few blown transformers.

Actual costs of damages to each of the companies were reported as, almost nil, with loss of service to customers being the only inconvenience of the storm.

ESPECIALLY IN HOUSE

New Redistricting Bill Affects County

Mitchell County was affected by the Texas Legislature's redistricting bill reforming the state into new Senate and House districts this week.

The big change for Mitchell County came in the House of Representatives—redistricting where its district was enlarged from 3 to 6 counties.

Added in with the present quartets of Mitchell, Nolan and Fisher were Stonewall, Dickens and King. The first 3 made up the old 91st House district.

The change will not, however, affect this district's representative in the manner the redistricting affected some in many sections of the state.

The redistricting will force representatives presently in office from different districts to leave to run for reelection against each other—due to the fact that their counties are now in the same district.

Rep. Max Calkins is the present 91st representative and will not be re-elected this year. The new map puts him in the 92nd district.

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to the 24th congressional District—which remains the same size in numbers of counties with 13.

The only change in the district was that Dickens County was removed and Haskell County added.

In the new district are Mitchell, Borden, Fisher, Garza, Howard, Jones, Kent, Taylor, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford, Stonewall and the new member, Haskell County.

Sen. David Ratliff, Jones County is the present senator from this district.

Redistricting in the state is compulsory under the Constitution every 10 years.

The redistricting was made on a basis of population shifts recorded in the 1960 census.

With some exceptions, each House District will have at least 10,000 population and not more than 70,000.

The bill, which was completed Thursday, leaves 113 representatives districts out of 100.

See 4 big metropolitan areas of Dallas, Texas, Fort Worth and Houston Counties. These 113 are apportioned such a way that each representative has an average of 40,000 constituents.

Estimates are that the new House District, of which the county is a member, has a population of just over 100,000.
