TREVA LADD IN T.C.U. BAND

FORT WORTH.—Treva Ladd, a graduate of Burkburnett High School, is among 115 members of the 1968-69 Horned Frog Marching Band.

Known as the "Shore Waders" of TCU, the band currently has members from 20 states and three foreign countries. Under the direction of Dr. James A. Jacobsen, the musical organization practices its routines and precision drills three times each week, putting in about 2,000 man hours toward production of one hour and a half show of six and a half minutes.

The band was formed initially in 1905 by some boys who had a little extra time and wanted to blow a horn or beat a drum. In 1921 J. E. King formed an organized band and began to hold rehearsals and to play for school functions. When the group had 27 members in 1925, solid purple uniforms with white braid, reflecting TCU's colors were purchased.

Today the band plays not only for TCU football games, but also for some high school games in route to out-of-town Horned Frog bouts.

Director Jacobsen, holder of a B.A. degree from Colorado State College, came to TCU in 1955 from Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. He has done graduate work at VanderCook College of Music in Chicago and holds the honorary Doctor of Music degree from Southern College of Fine Arts in Houston.

Treva Ladd, a freshman, plays cornet in the band and is the feature twice.

STRAIGHT TICKET VOTING SIMPLIFIED FOR TEXANS

Hundreds of Burkburnett voters will be among the millions casting their votes in the national and state elections Tuesday.

Texas voters will face a new system on the ballot.

This is the change which allows a voter to vote a straight ticket, that is, for all the candidates of one party, by making a single mark on their ballot if desired.

To vote a straight ticket, a

voter only to mark an "x" in the box beside the name of the party. This box is at the top of the list of candidates.

A person voting a split ticket should not mark his box, but mark his "x" in the square before the name of each individual candidate.

Voters are cautioned to be certain their ballots are marked properly, so that their intentions will not be subject to misinterpretation by election officials.

Heavy Election Turnout Is Seen For City, Nation

Voter interest in the general elections Tuesday was at a high level as the day approached and a record turnout is expected at all levels, from precinct to national.

Mrs. Dora Davis, Wichita County Clerk, said 1275 absentee ballots had been cast up to 5 p.m. Friday, when absentee voting closed. Mail ballots were 1,318 and were to be accepted until 1 p.m. Tuesday.

In Burkburnett, where absentee voting had been in progress, deputy Mrs. Latreese Duncan said 40 ballots had been cast absentee.

Burkburnett residents will vote in three boxes. Precinct No. 27 will be at the Junior High School, with Mrs. C. M. Archer serving as presiding judge.

Precinct No. 28 will be at the Town Hall, with F. T. Felty as judge.

Precinct No. 29 has been moved to the city barns, located at 200 West Third Street, in the former Shamburger Lumber Company location.

Voters will select from candidates for president, a U.S. congressman, governor, and county officers.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., with tabulations continuing through the day. No results or standings will be announced until after the polls close.

GAGGING THE RHODESIANS

It is shocking and almost
incredible, but nonetheless
true, that even as the nation
was in the midst of a presiden-
tial election and concerned
about ominous new Soviet ag-
gression in Central Europe, the
Johnson administration found
time and had the desire to en-
gage in new, petty acts of re-
taliation against Rhodesia. One
of the few countries that has
offered to send troops to Viet-
nam to assist embattled Amer-
icans.

While the vast majority were
concerned about truly serious
things, some smart alecks in
the U. S. Treasury fired off a
letter to Washington banks, or-
dering them to block the check-
ing accounts of the Rhodesian
Information Agency. The two
Rhodesians who man this ag-
ency found they couldn't pay
their rent or buy groceries.

Most Americans surely will
feel that the United States is
too great a nation to stoop
to this kind of petty business.
The only effect of it, aside
from causing the two Rhodes-
ians inconvenience and personal
difficulty, is to cut off the
American people from access to
information offered by the gov-
ernment of Rhodesia. The block-
ing of the checking accounts
therefore, really struck at the
U. S. public, for it was a crude
act of news management.

Fortunately, the brave Rhod-
esians have good friends in
Congress—men who bear in
mind that Rhodesia is an anti-
communist bastion in Africa
and has leadership with plenty
of intestinal fortitude. The
fund cut-off produced a bar-
communist bastion in Africa
ury's act.

The U. S. public would do
well, however, to think about
this mean slap at Rhodesia. It
is the latest in a series of ab-
surd measures designed to
please the socialist government
of Great Britain and the Afro-
Asian majority in the United
Nations. One of the first things
a new administration should
do is acknowledge Rhodesia's
independence and seek an ex-
change of ambassadors.

The U. S. should categorize
as nonsense the United Nations
assertion that Rhodesia is a
threat to peace. Nothing could
be more absurd. Only hypo-
crites would accept the U. N.
line.

It should be noted in this
connection that the government
of India has been in the van-
guard of nations seeking U. N.
action against Rhodesia. But
when 650,000 Russian soldiers
stormed into Czechoslovakia
and carted off the Czech lead-
ers to Moscow, India declined
to condemn the Russians. It
was a sample of the old U. N.
double standard, which invari-
ably is applied against civilized
elements and nations in Africa.

It is outrageous, in the view
of many Americans, that the
Johnson administration took
far stronger economic measures
against Rhodesia than it would
take against communist coun-
tries. Indeed the measures taken
were ordered without con-
gressional approval or consent,
as in the case of a ban on trade
with Rhodesia. Ironically, this
trade ban resulted in the U. S.
buying chrome ore from com-
munist Albania and Russia in-
stead of from the normal source,
anti-communist Rhodesia.

While Rhodesia occupies only
a small space on the globe, it
is full of significance for Ameri-
can foreign relations. Our treat-
ment of the Rhodesians typifies
what's wrong in our foreign
policy: we treat our friends
badly while finding excuses for
our enemies.

The United States has few
friends on the African con-
tinent—few lands where Ameri-
cans are treated with respect
and may move with safety. Few
states offer opportunities for
legitimate investment—invest-
ment that is protected by a
constitutional government that
keeps its word. Rhodesia and
the Republic of South Africa
are the two African nations
that Americans can trust. But
they are the nations that con-
sistently receive ill treatment
from the liberal ideologues who
have been in charge in Wash-
ington for the last eight years.
It is time for a change in
U. S. foreign relations. The

change should involve frank
recognition of the nation's real
friends and good treatment of
them in future. In the case of
Rhodesia and the Republic of
South Africa, opportunities exist
for mutual defense moves
against expansion of Soviet and
Chinese communism in Africa.
Opportunities also exist for
new commercial ties between
the United States and Southern
Africa, a region that has tremen-
dous economic potential
and that should be closely linked
to the free world, free en-
terprise systems.

After January 20, when a
new administration takes office,
the United States should act
again as it is proper for a great
Republic to act, with dignity
and with a regard for other
nations that represent civilized
values.

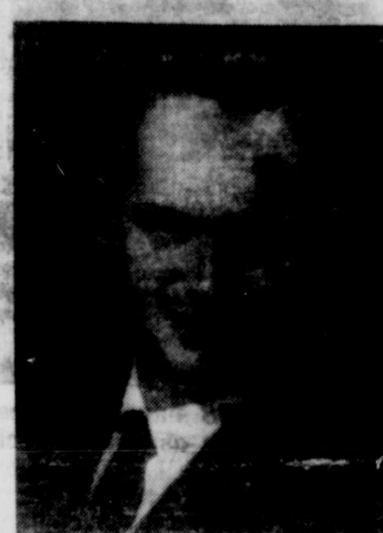

Safety Sunday Is Proclaimed For November 17

AUSTIN, Gov. John Connally has proclaimed Sunday, November 17, "Safety Sunday" in Texas and called on all citizens to enlist in the fight for greater safety by considering their moral obligations to protect the sanctity of human life.

"It is essential that every Texan realize that safety for himself, his loved ones and his friends, as well as others is a matter of moral responsibility," the Governor said in his proclamation, while pointing out that "accidents" continue to take a grave toll in our State each year.

He noted that in traffic crashes alone 3,367 Texans lost their lives and an additional 205,308 persons suffered painful injuries last year. The economic loss from these accidents is estimated at some \$793 million.

The purpose of "Safety Sunday," which is sponsored by the Texas Safety Association, is to focus public attention on the necessity for reducing accident tolls especially during the Fall and Winter holiday season. The Safety Association reports that previous experience indicated that accidents tolls increase sharply during this period.

On the Highest Authority

There are victories in Vietnam that never make headlines...victories based on the Highest Authority, beyond the combat, wherever embattled men choose to take a stand against the evil and alienation within themselves, and reach out to God.

Beyond Combat, just published by Moody Press of Chicago, is perhaps the most unusual book to come out of that "endless" Asian war. Written by Major James M. Hutchens, the book offers a unique insight into war itself and the varied responsibilities of those who look after the spiritual and moral welfare of American fighting men.

Now chaplain to the Green Berets, Major Hutchens served with both the 70th Engineer Battalion and the 173rd Airborne Brigade in Vietnam. There, where men face death, they also face God. Issues otherwise fuzzy take on remarkable sharpness in the battle zone.

Beyond Combat provides a closeup look into the stark realities of sudden, violent death in a new kind of modern warfare. As the first U.S. chaplain to be wounded in Vietnam, Major Hutchens relates several first hand experiences of front line action at such places as Deo Mang pass and Hill 85 where he received the Bronze Star for heroism.

Not just another book on the chaplaincy, *Beyond Combat* confronts the reader with the reasoning behind participation in warfare, the anxious moments before meeting the enemy, and the power of faith in the lives of military men. It is an account which follows the

ministry of one chaplain who won his way into the hearts of the men he served. Even deep in Viet Cong territory GI's flocked to his services.

For Americans mindful of war's terrible destructiveness, this book searches out meaning and purpose in an otherwise spiritual vacuum. With anecdotes that are sometimes amusing, sometimes tragic, but always sensitive and enlightening, Major Hutchens brings the combat GI vividly to life, and in the process gives the reader an indispensable lift that will sharpen his own understanding and closeness to God.

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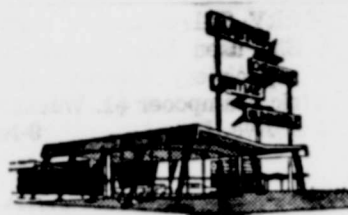
