Official Talks More About 'Subtitle D' And Its Impact On City Landfill Operations

Last week the Santa Anna News had an article concerning the landfill dilemma with which City officials are presently trying to cope. In that article we told you we would try to have more information forthcoming.

Derrell Warnock, Superintendent of Operations for the City of Santa Anna, gives us the following insight into the problem the City faces.

Mr. Warnock says:

"After October 9, 1993, all landfills in the state of Texas will be expected to be in compliance with all the operational requirements of the new regulations, 'Subtitle D'. There will be new requirements for documentation of operations, equipment requirements, requirements for gas monitoring wells, and many other changes which are included in the new proposed regulations. All sites will have to submit a revision to the site operation plan to insure that the permit is in compliance with the new regulations.

What do we mean by compliance? We will try to give you some insight into 'Subtitle D', beginning

with the pit liners. All pits will be required to have 'Poly' liners. This will be a very costly operation. On top of the liners will be 36" of compacted household waste, then 12" of compacted clay. This procedure will continue until the pit is filled. After this procedure, 24" of compacted cover fill and 6" of top soil is to cover the entire pit.

In order to follow these procedures, the City of Santa Anna will have to purchase a compactor, at a cost of about \$130,000; and a self loading scraper, cost about \$260,000. It is apparent the City cannot afford this type of equipment.

Add to that the cost of drilling and equipping three required water monitoring wells, to keep check on ground water, which would cost the City another estimated \$35,000. Also add two gas monitoring wells, to keep check on methane gas, at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

The landfill will require daily covering of all solid waste.

These are just some of the problems the City of Santa Anna faces

in future operation and maintenance of its landfill. After October 9, 1993, we will be required to maintain the landfill for a period of thirty years after closure. All of this will be very costly and will come under any or all changes that the EPA or Texas Water Commission might require in that thirty years.

These are some of the reasons that city officials are looking at private companies which contract hauling of garbage and trash to regional landfills. It is quite possible this could be an alternative to the high cost of operating the landfill.

All of the costs mentioned above translate into a cost of \$20 to \$28 per month for each household. The alternative of having contractors haul the waste could mean a savings to the citizens since it could be contracted at the cost of about 50¢ per month more per household than we are presently paying.

City officials are working very hard to solve this problem with which we are faced. We are aware that rumors abound and we hope those interested in the matter will take the opportunity to obtain the facts."

Santa Anna Penatuhkah Comanche Chief A Family At The Center Of Power

Additional detail on the Penatuhkah Comanche band and individuals within the band was provided by friends and visitors, Texas Rangers, and others. A few of these observations will be presented to help the reader more clearly visualize these Comanches.

Their common dress is the breech-cloth and moccasins, with a buffalo robe flung loosely over the shoulders; but some have now begun to imitate the more civilized tribes. They have a great variety of ornaments, many of which are of pure silver, principally fashioned into large brooches. Their decorations are derived from birds and shells which are bartered to them by the traders. The hawk and eagle feathers are the most esteemed of the bird. They use several native dyes, provided from roots, but I am ignorant of the names or of the process of manufacture. Vermillion, indigo, and verdigris, are sold them by traders. They also paint with white and red clay on particular occasions. They are of a light character, with a gay cast of mind, and rather fervid temperament.

A part of warriors (Comanche) dressed in their trappings--embellished shields, fancy moccasins, long pig tails, bedecked with silver shoulder belts worked with beads and adorned with shells, fine leggings, ornamented cases for bows and arrows--mounted upon spirited horses, singing a war songs and sweeping over a prairie is a beautiful spectacle to a man with plenty of brave fellows to back him.

Buffalo Hump (Penatuhkah war chief): "Buffalo Hump was the genuine, unadulterated picture of a North American Indian. Unlike the majority of his tribe, he scorned all European dress. The upper part of his body was naked. A buffalo hide was wound around his hips. Yellow copper rings decorated his arms and a string of beads his neck. With his long straight black hair hanging down, he sat there with the earnest (to the European almost apathetic) expression of countenance of the North American savage. He drew special attention to himself because in previous years he had distinguished himself for daring and bravery in many engagements with the Texans." (Dr. Ferdinand Roemer, German Scientist)

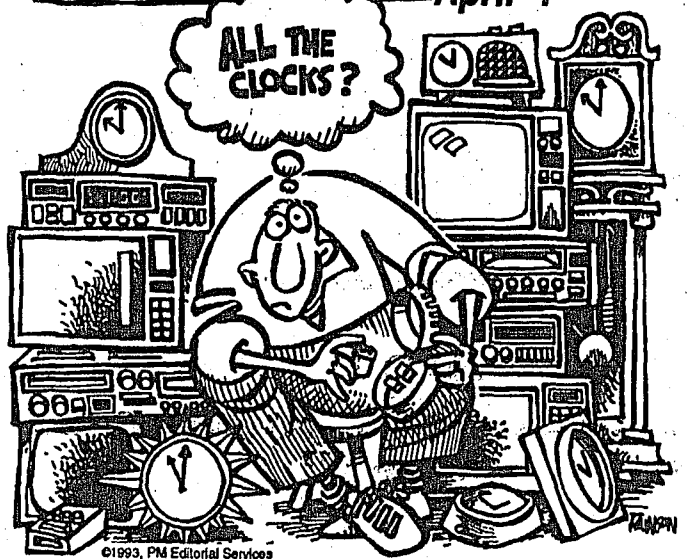
Granddaughter of Local To Wed

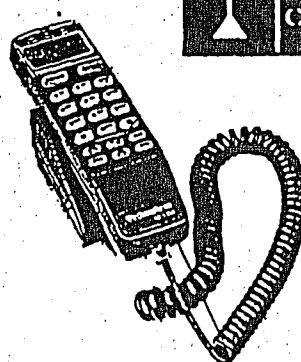
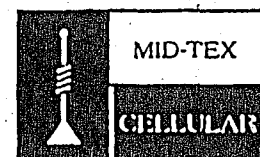

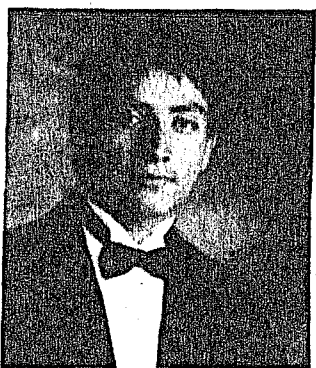

ACCENT MARK—The University of Texas at Arlington ranked eighth nationally in the number of master's degrees it awarded in computer science and electrical engineering last year.
Two other Texas schools ranked in the top 25. Texas A&M was 21st and UT Austin tied with Columbia University for 23rd.
Among schools offering master's degrees in industrial engineering, Texas A&M ranked eighth in the nation and UT Arlington ninth. No other Texas schools were in the top 25.
They're taking an ecological rather than an anthropological approach to their study and classifying the areas as an industrial "biome". To ecologists, the planet Earth is a biosphere and biomes are subdivisions that have the same kind of climate and vegetation.
Tundras, temperate grasslands and rain forests are examples of natural ecological biomes because they get their energy from the sun. Industrial biomes—like the Metroplex—are built by humans and depend on fossil fuels for their primary energy.
The UT Arlington researchers hope to discover why industrial biomes get started, why they exist and the different types of family structures within.

MAKING THE GRADE—If the Legislature follows the request of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, applicants for admission to any four-year state college or university would have to pass a college preparatory curriculum in high school.
Three public universities presently have an open admission policy. They are The University of Texas—Pan American, the University of Houston—Downtown and Texas Southern University in Houston.
The law would require students to have passed four years of English, two years of mathematics, four years of social studies, two years of science and three years of foreign language.

HOME ON THE RANGE—Texas Christian University has a new one-classroom building that cost \$1.2 million and will be used to teach no more than 35 students.
It's the new Winthrop Rockefeller Building for Ranch Management. It will house the school's unique 36-year-old ranch management program. The 30 to 35 students will spend six hours a day, five days a week, in the classroom. When they complete the one-year course, they will be certified in ranch management.
Rockefeller, a graduate of the school, provided a \$1.05 million challenge grant for the facility. It was more than matched in less than three years.

BIGGER IS BETTER—Austin Community College, started 20 years ago as a part of the capitol city's independent school district, now has 23,000 students, three campuses and a recently purchased administration building.
ACC has an open admissions policy and offers remedial classes to those who need to make up deficiencies before continuing their education. It also offers technical programs leading to associate degrees or certificates.
It has 267 full-time faculty members and 1,102 who teach part-time.
ACC is unique in the nation in relying on part-time instructors. Last year 67 percent of its classes were taught by part-timers.

NO PLACE LIKE "BIOME"—Thanks to an anthropologist at The University of Texas at Arlington, residents of that city may discover that home is really a "biome".
Professor Jeffrey Hanson and two of his graduate students in anthropology are studying poverty, crime, unemployment, homelessness and other problems they have seen in Arlington and the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex.

WHEN YOU WANT THE VERY BEST—The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center has been named one of the 10 best hospitals in the country.
When more than 1,000 board-certified specialists around the nation were asked to name the country's best hospitals, they ranked M. D. Anderson No. 8.
John Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore was rated first, the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., was second and Massachusetts General in Boston third.
In the specialty of cancer, M. D. Anderson was ranked first in the nation.

A DYING ART?—Autopsies for other than criminal matters have been decreasing in the U. S. for 30 years. In Texas, only 13 of each 100 deaths were autopsied.
This concerns pathologists at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston where almost half of in-hospital deaths resulted in autopsies. Physicians at the Galveston school believe autopsies are important because about 10 percent of them reveal a major diagnosis not known before the patient died.
Pathologists believe that autopsies are more necessary than ever because medicine can still learn much from the dead.
"Often corpses reveal more secrets than the living," one specialist says.

MATCH POINTS—Fraternity parties at Southern Methodist University in Dallas and The University of Texas at Austin will by dry affairs in the future.
Greek organizations at both schools have voted to ban booze and beer from future socials. Individual members who break the rule will be subject to suspension and a possible cash fine.

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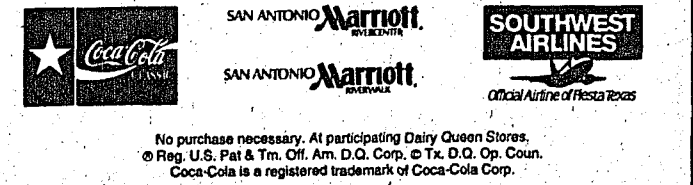

Capitol Comments by **BOB TURNER** State Representative - District 73

Health care and related issues are receiving major attention during this session of the Texas Legislature. It is my opinion that health care cost, availability and health insurance affordability are some of the most important issues facing Texas at this time. Governor Richards, along with several House and Senate members, have introduced bills that should provide better access and affordability for small employer/employee groups. The Governor's plan creates a statewide group purchasing cooperative, which would provide a larger number of persons with health insurance, and make negotiating price more effective with insurance companies, plus, providing a larger total group to share the costs of the few insured who have major and costly health problems. One of the major issues that is being debated in the Governor's plan, as well as most of the others that have been introduced, is the aspect of guaranteeing insurability. This means that even if someone has a terminal illness, the insurance company could not turn them down for insurance coverage if they have applied and paid their premium. Many of us feel that with guaranteed insurability no one would feel it important to buy health insurance until they get sick and need it, thus, making the insurer group have more and more sick clients, and less and less well clients, which would increase the cost of coverage drastically in a very short period of time. It is a known fact that some individuals do not have health insurance through choice. Their priorities in life are such that they had rather have a newer car—larger boat—or better home, than to spend their money on a health insurance premium.

A reception was held in the Capitol for the U. S. Surgeon General Dr. Antonia Norello, this past Tuesday. She was in Texas for a number of speaking engagements, and spent a couple of hours visiting with we State Legislators in the Capitol. The new Surgeon General will play a major role in any national health care reform, and she discussed the various possibilities briefly with those of us who took the time to visit with her. A few days earlier, a delegation from the nation of Ghana in West Africa were guest in the House Chamber. Discussions with these Ghanaian Representatives was a very enlightening experience, relating to their country's philosophy and challenges.

The pace in the Legislature is getting unbearably fast with a large amount of time being spent in committees and subcommittee meetings and conferences. In addition to spending the time required in our assigned legislative committees, and these meeting last often until 9 or 10 p.m., we must also make presentations of our own legislation before other committees, which can consume hours. In the Agriculture Committee, one of my two committee assignments, we have passed out legislation in the past week that will expand the financing capability of the Texas Department of Agriculture's lending capability for agriculture and ag-related enterprises. This would add value to the agricultural products that we grow in Texas. This piece of legislation will be heard in the full Texas House in the next week or so and will be of great assistance to rural communities, such as those in the 73rd District.

A number of pieces of legislation are pending that do all sorts of things—from how local counties determine what county officials they will have—to the squabble over the expansion of the DFW airport. Trucking deregulation is a major topic of discussion with both a Senate and House bill being introduced that will deregulate trucking



within the State of Texas. It is felt by those proposing the legislation that there will be more competition if the permitting and control system currently in place in the trucking industry, which is operated by the Railroad Commission, were eliminated. Those who oppose this deregulation stress that this would likely be a short-lived reduction in rates until all the smaller, and newer truckers would go broke and go out of business because they priced their services too low. The detractors give the deregulation of airlines in the U.S. as a prime example, stressing how many of the carriers have gone broke since they were deregulated and stress the fact that all but one or two of the airlines are in deep financial trouble and fewer and fewer airlines remain in business at all. This is because deregulation allowed them to set prices for fares and the price competitiveness, which made the fares lower and lower, has damaged the industry. Most issues are just as complex as this, in that there is no clear-cut good or bad or right way, versus wrong way to vote on so many of the issues facing the Legislature.

During the past week we have had a large number of individuals and groups from the district visit the Legislature, my and I. A cross section of farmers—realtors—school

groups—truckers—nursing home/long term care providers—health care professionals—just to name a few, have visited and shared their concerns with us. This is extremely important, in view of the fact that there are such a tremendous number of different bills. We need your help in keeping us informed on those issues that come up that have an impact on you, your business or your profession.

In closing I want to mention a prime example of what a seemingly simple act of government can cost the taxpayers of the state. This was exhibited in the determination last session of the Legislature to change the name of "Texas Department of Health (TDH)" to become the "Texas Department of Public Health (TDPH)". Comptroller Sharp, in his newest effort to restructure state government (against the grain) has discovered that this simple name change would cost taxpayers of Texas approximately

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over the state—office supplies printing changes—and etc. This week the House passed SB 372 by Senator Bivins that will repeal the change in name for the agency, and make this saving possible. All the bill lacks to become a law at this time is the Governor's signature.

Can You Benefit From Earned Income Credit?

The Earned Income Credit (EIC) is a tax benefit for working families with at least one child and income of less than \$22,370 in 1992. The EIC provides working families who meet the income requirement with \$1,324 for one child. Families with two or more children get an additional benefit of up to \$60. Families with a child born in 1992 get an additional benefit of up to \$376. And families that pay some or all of the premiums for a health insurance policy that covers a child receive an extra benefit of up to \$451. A family that qualifies for all three extra benefits can receive a total EIC of up to \$2,211.

More than 14 million families nationwide now qualify for the EIC. Increased unemployment and poverty in 1992 increase the number of families for the EIC. Many families who experienced unemployment in 1992 will probably qualify for the EIC but may not know about it or how to file for it.

Who benefits from EIC? Working families with children are the major beneficiaries. The EIC helps low-wage workers make ends meet. EIC also is a work incentive because only families with earned income qualify for the credit. Both married and single-parent working families can receive the EIC.

one morning and brought us some bar b que sauce he made. Told me to try it and tell him if it was good. Floyd it was good eating. The boys said good! Nothing wrong with that.

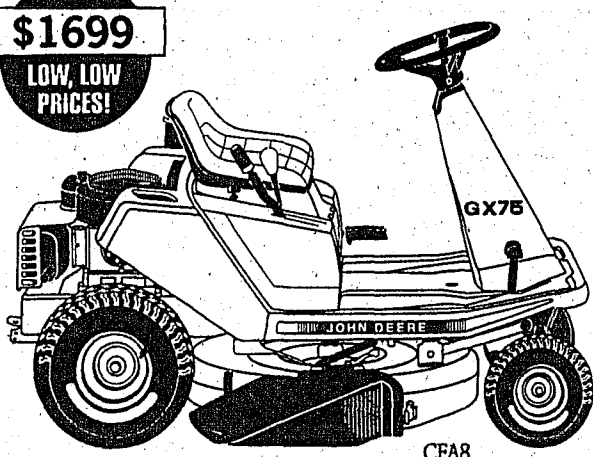
