SATURDAY AT 5:30 p. m. is the time for the Cisco High School class of 1943 to hold its reunion at Lake Cisco Park, and Mrs. Hammett tells us that everything is all set for a good crowd. The local members of the class expect fully half of the some 67 members of 1943 to be present with their families.

Plans call for a class roll call. Those who attend will be asked to introduce their families to the reunion.

MRS. HAMMETT, who was Cathryn Shepard when she was secretary of her Senior Class, tells us that the reunion this year is all a mistake — an honest mistake. But they're going ahead with it. It wasn't a mistake at all, and we'll bet that everybody who attends the reunion will enjoy it very thoroughly.

The mistake became known when Mrs. Hammett and Bob Lloyd and Fred Shockley of the Class of 1953 went up to the school board office Thursday to open the letter that the 1943 class wrote and attached to a \$25 savings bond to be used by the present class in buying something for the school.

When they opened the box, they discovered that the bond was to mature in 12 years and was intended for the class of 1955 to use. But since plans have already been made, it was turned over to the Class of 1953 and the reunion will be held as scheduled.

Incidentally, the class of 1953 had something over \$100 on hand and this sum plus the saving bond will go into a fund to buy electric drinking fountains for the school.

SURPRISING TO Mrs. Hammett and school officials was a letter enclosed with the saving bond and the 1943 class' letter to the current class. The surprise letter was written by Mr. F. Walker, who died several years ago and was secretary of the school board (like Mr. Clyde Karkalits is now) at that time.

Mr. Walker's short letter reads as follows: "Hello Class. Hope you are not having to run your school and fight a war too. No job."

THE LETTER THAT THE Seniors of 1943 wrote to the current class is quoted as follows: "It will probably be strange to you receiving a letter from a class gone 10 years before you, and not reading it until after it is 10 years old. We hope, however, that you will enjoy it, remembering the strong fellowship that exists between all the classes — those gone before and those who remain — of our dear old school. We, the Senior Class of 1943, herewith will to Cisco High School a \$25 U. S. Savings Bond. We are giving you the responsibility of seeing that this bond is cashed when it has matured, because we trust that you will see it that the \$25 will be used for the benefit of the entire school body."

The principal of Cisco High School, whoever he may be at this time, has the sole power to cash this bond, but you are to be in charge of the money after the bond is cashed and see that it is spent properly.

This bond was bought because of a deep feeling of loyalty and love in our hearts for our country, and in an effort to do our share in keeping her free. Prayer is that you will have some spirit in receiving it that have in giving it.

Never stop loving America! These perilous and troubled times that our generation is encountering, we have come to realize just how much she means to us. May it not be necessary for our generation to shed blood for her preservation, but be willing to fight and even to give your lives for her if she needs these sacrifices again to keep her free. We think it is fitting to have a reunion of the two senior classes in order to celebrate the peace that we hope will have come before the reading of this letter.

There will be four night performances of the rodeo, produced by Homer Todd of Fort Smith, Arkansas.

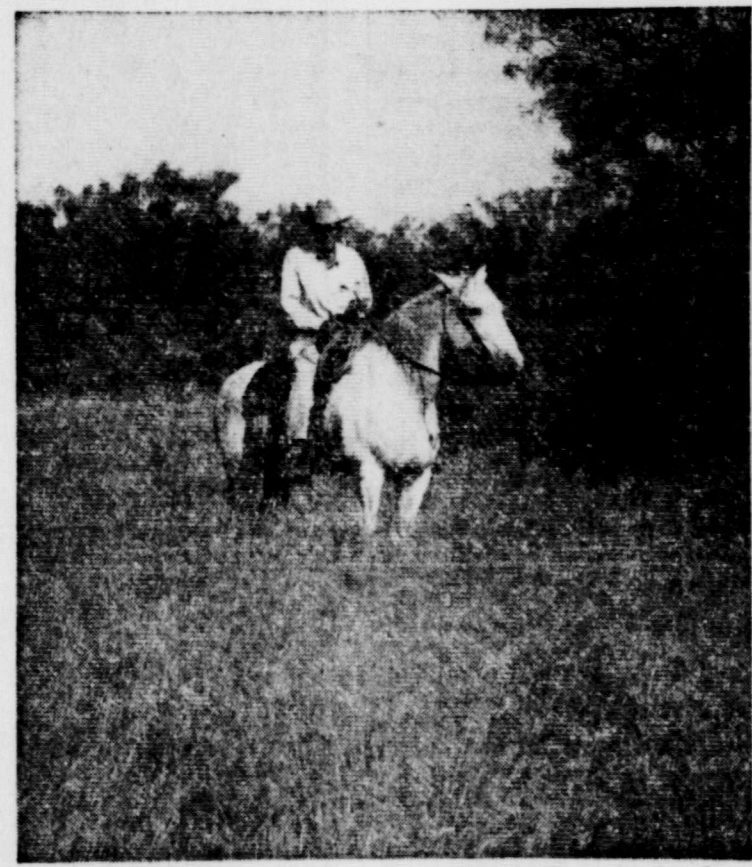
Ranger Pastor Named Convocation Delegate

Tall and mid bunch grass once covered Central Texas in abundance. This type grass has generally been replaced by short grass and woody plants except on a few of the better ranges.

Restoring Good Grass To Eastland County Ranch Land Is Goal Of SCS

Old timers tell of an abundance of grass in Central Texas when they first settled here. They usually state that the grass reached their stirrups on the hills and would hide a man on a horse in the bottoms.

R. B. Marcy, a Captain in the 5th Infantry, U. S. Army, traveling eastward in this vicinity stated in his diary on October 29, 1849, "We have been passing near the borders of the Upper Cross Timbers all day, and gradually approaching them until we are within a mile. We have seen but little mesquite and grama grasses have almost entirely disappeared; but we find the other kinds of prairie grass in abundance." Here

he was referring to the transition of the short grasses west of this area to the tall bunch grasses then in this vicinity.

Numerous accounts of early settlers state that the worst drought of memory occurred in 1886 and 1887. They recall that during this drought period cattle from western short grass areas were driven into this region to feast on the large coarse grass in the bottoms and medium height grasses so abundant on the slopes and ridges. Both, they say, were replaced by other short grasses and weeds in 1886 and 1887 and have never been common since. They usually attribute the disappearance of the taller grasses to drought but admit that ranges were overgrazed at that time and have continued to be overgrazed until the present time.

Eastland County ranges did not carry through the current drought as well as they did in 1886 and 1887. Instead of cattle being brought in many head of stocker cows were shipped out of Eastland County. Over 160 car loads of emergency hay were shipped in to help save our remaining stocker cattle.

While beset by drought and falling prices Eastland County ranchers do not face a hopeless situation. Current examinations of ranges by ranchmen and Soil Conservation Service technicians reveal many good perennial range grasses are still present on the land. While these good range plants are low in vigor, current growth is satisfactory. The real hope for the present rangeland is conservation ranching. If remnants of good range plants can be allowed to produce seed, ranges will recover. A conservation program including such practices as proper stocking, range deferments, and brush eradication will once more assure us of an abundance of grass.

Charlie Joe Owens was named chairman of the tournament.

It was understood that Memorial Day was being observed as a holiday in most area cities. The county courthouse was expected to be closed throughout the day.

Mr. Rosenthal, who was in charge of raising the fund, planned to hold the drive open until next week for the benefit of others who might desire to have a part in the project.

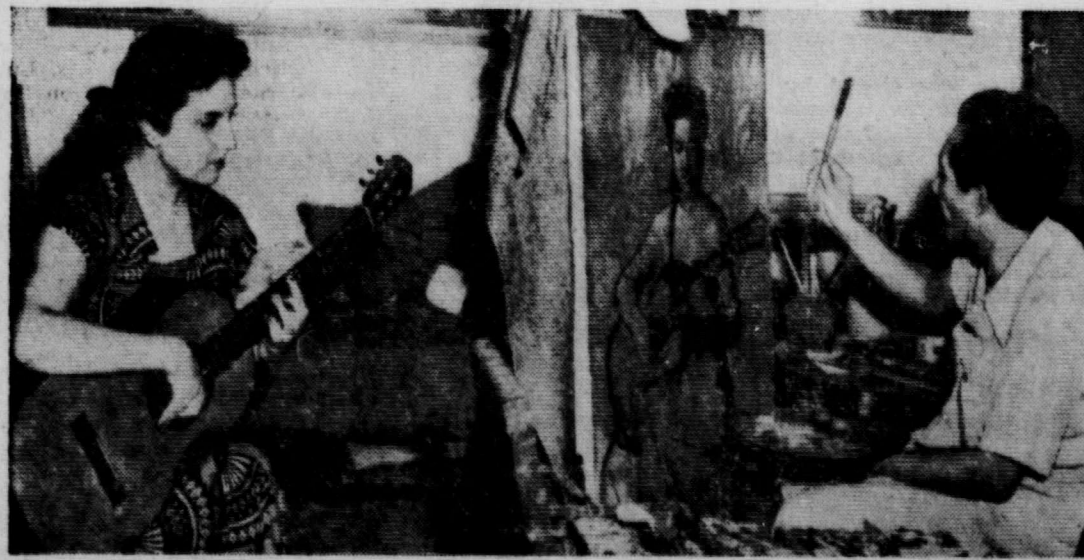

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OBJECTIVES AND METHODS

The Eisenhower Administration has been in power for four months — a sufficient period of time to give Congress, the commentators, and the public at large a good idea of its objectives and methods. Much discussion is going the rounds as to how it has done thus far.

The consensus is that the President's popular standing is as high as it was at the time of his election — perhaps even higher. He has improved materially as a speaker, and he presents his thoughts with greater clarity and precision. He has a happy and rare combination of friendliness and dignity. His continued stress on traditional, old-fashioned ideals and principles has evoked the warmest kind of response in the hearts and minds of millions of people.

He has enjoyed a genuine "honeymoon" with a Congress which is narrowly divided between the parties and this happy relationship is continuing. All the basic elements in his legislative

program seem almost certain of approval, though there will be delays — the President and his team are learning that in government, results can't be attained nearly as quickly as in military and business life. There has been little really bitter Congressional criticism of his Administration or himself. For the most part, debate over controversial issues has been conducted on a high plane.

Where and when the Administration has shown weakness, it generally has been due to political inexperience — no one the top group ever held a top federal position before. To take one example, the early furor over the stock holdings of certain Cabinet appointees, and the period of confusion that followed, seemed largely due to ignorance or misunderstanding of an old law. To take another, some of the Cabinet members obviously felt that reorganization of their departments could be accomplished in jig time. Whereas, due to Civil Service, patronage, and other such forces it is long-term job. To take a third, administration members on occasion have wounded Congressional sensibilities, because of a lack of knowledge of the unwritten laws of protocol and custom that are jealously upheld by both House and Senate.

In helping the Eisenhower Administration make its unavoidable adjustments to the realities of political life, the man who was his foremost opponent for the nomination has done yeoman service — the able and complex senior Senator from Ohio, Robert A. Taft. No one living, in all probability, knows as much about how the government operates, or is as adroit at getting things done. Almost everyone once predicted an early Taft-Eisenhower split. Now early Taft-Eisenhower split. Now it looks as if the two men have reached a firm working and personal relationship. Dissimilar as they are in many ways, their basic principles are much the same. Senator Taft has said that he will not attempt to get the presidential nomination again, and that he expects President Eisenhower to be the victorious 1956 candidate. He is devoting himself to making this Republican Administration a success. In prestige and influence he is second only to the President himself, and he is much more skillful in political dealings.

To sum up the general view, the Administration is doing excellently — and all the future auguries are favorable.

Mulch vs. Hoe Frequent Topic of Garden Debates

Old-time gardeners taught that the deeper the soil was stirred in cultivation, the better it was for the plants. Many moderns take exactly the opposite view and say that any stirring of the soil is harmful to near-by growing plants.

It is difficult to persuade an experienced gardener that his plants are not benefited by stirring the soil surface, however; and even extremists concede that it kills weeds. It also breaks the crust on the soil surface, and allows both air and water to enter. But there is no need to stir the soil deeper than an inch for these purposes.

The muscular effort required to cultivate to this depth is no greater than sweeping the floor; and even less if the hoe blade is kept sharp and used as a cutting instrument to shave the soil surface.

As soon as your seeds have sprouted, so you know where they are, begin regular shallow cultivation, especially after every rain; and no weed will grow in your garden. Easy strokes of the hoe will turn up the white sprouts of weed seed before they have reached the surface. Only in the rows between the seedlings will you have to pull up weeds; and this is usually done when the rows are thinned out.

As your plants grow, their roots will extend close to the surface, and care should be taken not to allow the hoe to disturb them;

lest more harm than good result. After plants have passed the seedling stage, and thinning out is completed, cultivation can be avoided by covering the soil with a mulch. Many materials have been used for this cover, including boards, stones, asphalted paper, newspaper, lawn clippings, straw, leaves, ground-up corn-cobs and sawdust.

One of the best of these materials is lawn clippings, if they are dried first in the sun. To prevent them heating, they should be spread out thinly, or tossed frequently with a pitch fork to air and dry them. A thin layer of dry clippings should be worked into the soil, after it has been thoroughly watered. Dry clippings can be piled on this first layer to a depth of several inches. Tomato plants especially will benefit from a mulch.

Grass keeps the surface of the soil in excellent condition to admit both water and air, both of which are necessary to plant roots. A grass mulch, preferably of an annual grass which will die in the winter, and which does not spread or seed objectionably, can be used to advantage in a rose garden, or between tall growing vegetables.

Lazy gardeners may get comfort from these newly discovered facts about plant growth. Research workers have taken most of the muscle out of gardening, but they have increased the need for knowledge and skill.

Turkey Poults Are Off, USDA Reports

Turkey poult production for the 1953 season to May 1 was 19 percent below last season, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported in announcing the results of the special May 1 turkey hatchery survey in 14 important States. Hatcheries reported that they had produced 16 percent less heavy breed and 28 percent less light breed poults to May 1 than in the corresponding period last year.

The May 1 survey revealed that poult production during the week ending April 25 was also below the corresponding week last year, with heavy breeds down 13 percent, light breeds down 10 percent and the total down 12 percent.

Eggs in incubators on May 1 were 11 percent less than on May 1 last year. The number of eggs set for heavy breed poults was 11 percent less than a year earlier, and eggs set for light breeds, 13 percent less.

The special May 1 survey was made in the following important States in poult production: Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, Virginia, South Carolina, Kentucky, Texas, Washington, Oregon, and California. These States have more than two-thirds of the turkey hatchery capacity in the United States. The May 1 survey was made to obtain indications of changes taking place in the 14 States as a whole. State data are shown separately for these States where returns were large enough to give what are considered to be reasonably reliable indications. Turkey hatcheries cooperating in the May 1 survey had more than 45 percent of the United States turkey hatchery capacity and had produced about 20 million poults to May 1 this year.

Reports of turkey hatchery operations up to May 1 indicate that turkey production is being curtailed more drastically than turkey growers indicated in January. At that time growers planned to reduce production by 8 percent, with a cut of 3 percent in heavy breeds and 23 percent in light breeds.

Total production so far this season was down in all States. Production of heavy breeds was universally down, with decreases ranging from 9 percent in Washington to 50 percent in Virginia. The changes in production of light breeds showed a wide variation ranging from a 50 percent increase in Michigan to a 72 percent drop in Nebraska. Virginia and California, the leading States in production of light breeds, showed a drop of 36 percent and 61 percent respectively in light breeds.

Poult production for the week ending April 25, as compared with a year earlier, also showed marked variations between States. Decreases in production of heavy breeds were recorded in all but two States, Ohio and Washington. Several States showed increases during the week in production of light breeds, notably South Carolina, Minnesota and Oregon.

Except for Washington, all States show decreases in the number of eggs in incubation on May 1 as compared with a year ago. Virginia shows 25 percent less, with a decrease of over 30 percent in heavy breeds and 19 percent in light breeds. South Carolina shows a decrease of 22 percent, with both light and heavy breeds showing about equally in the reduction of eggs in incubators May 1 compared with a year earlier.

HEALTH TALKS

Some people have trouble telling the difference between heat stroke, heat exhaustion, and heat cramps.

With heat stroke (similar to sunstroke except that it occurs indoors) the patient has a hot, dry skin and does not sweat. The temperature is very high, often as much as 105 degrees Fahrenheit. The victim may complain of a headache, and his pulse will be strong and rapid. Unless treated, he may die.

He should be removed to a cool place and cold packs applied, especially to the head. The body may be cooled with a bath or with wet sheets, and the limbs rubbed toward the body. A doctor should be summoned immediately.

Someone suffering from heat exhaustion has a moist, cool skin and perspires freely. His face is pale, his temperature more nearly normal. Often the victim faints but doesn't remain blacked out for more than a few minutes.

He also should be removed from the hot surroundings and his head kept level or low. He may be given mildly salted liquids by mouth, and coffee or tea may help. If much vomiting occurs, he may need to be given fluids by vein. In extreme cases it may

be necessary to apply heat to the body.

Heat cramps occur in the stomach region or the limbs, causing great pain. Symptoms of heat exhaustion also may be present. First aid is the same as for heat exhaustion.

All three of these conditions can be prevented. The temperature of indoor working quarters shouldn't be higher than 86 degrees Fahrenheit. If a man must work in hot surroundings during the day, he is less likely to have trouble if he sleeps in a cool place at night. Loosely woven cool clothing should be worn, and a hat or other shield used in the sun. Salt diluted in drinking water should be taken by workers who are constantly exposed to high temperatures.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

What about court rules — the procedural rules governing legal trials? Are they tools of delay or instruments of justice? Procedure is the lubricant which makes the machinery of uniform justice run smoothly. Far from being of concern only to lawyers and judges, rules of procedure are of real significance to all of us.

The law is composed of two parts — the substantive and the adjective law. The substantive law defines rights, duties and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights wrongs; it describes crimes and sets up penalties. Adjective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invoke the substantive law.

Some of our most important rights are to be found in the body of procedural law. For example, as a people who want justice to prevail, we like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have his day in court. This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say before a judge and jury.

Your day in court implies that you shall have the right to be properly represented, to have your case presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. It means that you shall be confronted by your accusers; that you shall have the right to cross-examine them; that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf.

Finally, the law governing procedure tells you how you may appeal your case to higher courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial or that a prejudicial error has been committed in the trial court.

Much of our procedural law comes down from centuries of experience in the courts of other lands. It was inevitable that through the centuries some of the procedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have experienced many advantageous changes in our laws governing the procedure of courts and administrative agencies. There is a growing custom in the United States of giving the courts the power to revise their rules in certain fields.
