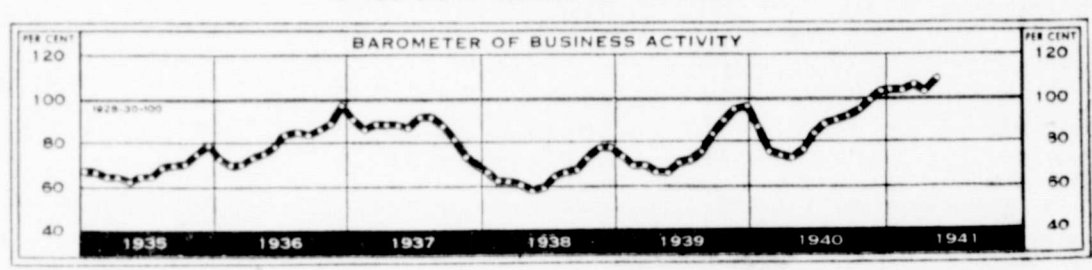

Bill Farmer Says Wheat Crop Short

W. L. Farmer, prominent farmer and rancher, living a few miles west of Cisco, has just returned from a visit to his daughter, who lives 11 miles from Tulsa. He stated that the grain crop in Oklahoma was short, like that in this section. Too much rain has caused rust damage to wheat.

Mr. Farmer, who owns several farms in different parts of this area, has about 250 acres in wheat. He says 60 acres to the farm is the limit under the AAA set-up. His wheat, he stated, is far short of expectations, averaging around 10 or 11 bushels per acre. Rust cut the crop short, which gave promise of a large yield. There is an abundance of straw, but the heads are light. Oats, however, yielded a fair crop of around 50 to 60 bushels.

Eastland and Cisco Men Lose Driving License

AUSTIN, June 24.—The privilege of driving was taken away from 190 persons in the state from April 2 to June 5 it was announced by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., state police director. W. E. Clark Begins Planting a Crop of Fall Tomatoes

Cisco's tomato grower, W. E. Clark, who lives about six miles out on the Rising Star highway, will begin planting his fall crop this week, he said while here Monday.

"While wet weather is fine for tomatoes after the plants have been put in the ground it is the worst time to plant when a fellow bogs down in the field."

"I expect to plant about five acres on a sub-irrigated plot of land, about the same I usually plant. The crop will necessarily be late as it was last year. However, I really dispose of my tomatoes on the fall or late market and I manage to sell about all I can produce, for when my crop comes in there are only a few to be had."

Mr. Clark has ideal land for growing fall truck. The land is sub-irrigated and retains moisture in the driest season. To supplement the natural moisture of the land, should there be an extended dry season, he has a well that produces an abundance of water with which he irrigates his growing crops. In addition to tomatoes he also grows onions, cabbage, cucumbers and other farm truck.

REPORTS SAY LITH. REBELS ARE IN REVOLT

Allied Forces in Syria, Acting Under Orders Churchill, Rapidly Pushing Upon the Vital Syrian Centers of Ryak, Beirut and Homs

By UNITED PRESS. Unofficial sources reported today that Hitler's eastern armies have smashed 80 miles across Lithuania to within 45 miles of the Latvian capital of Riga.

Scandinavian reports indicated that the Nazi blitz operation was aided by Lithuanian rebels, who revolted and attacked Russian troops from the rear.

There was no confirmation from Russian or German official sources of the reported advance across Lithuania.

In Ankara it was rumored, on the contrary, that Soviet forces, imitating nazi technique, had launched several slashing offensives into the German lines. No place names were given in the Ankara reports.

Allied forces in Syria, acting under orders from Prime Minister Churchill to press their occupation of the country at full speed, were rapidly pushing upon the vital Syrian centers of Ryak, Beirut and Homs.

Joseph Thompson Seeks Senatorial Toga; Visits Here

Joseph Thompson of Waco, who is seeking the senatorial toga, was a brief caller at the Daily Press office this morning. He stated he has made an extensive campaign for the senate, having made 300 speeches, visited 950 cities and circulated 300,000 copies of his platform. Mr. Thompson is a mechanical engineer. He thinks "machines have taken the workers' jobs."

His platform favors "lowering working hours after the war to 25 hours per week; pay every old person 60 years of age \$50 per month; every man, woman and child \$5 per month by taxing national income as an aid to increase population and equalize wealth and increase buying power of the common people. This will prevent communism, bolshevism, nazism and fascism," he says.

Larger loans on farm products, every city anti-aircraft defense, standing army of two million, double the navy strength, consumption of domestic products by increased buying power, and stop all immigration, his platform sets forth.

Quarters of Age Insures 65 For Life

Rare Is Right

December 31, 1940, need 7 quarters of coverage. Workers attaining age 65 during the first six months of 1941 need 8 quarters of coverage, and those reaching 65 during the last six months of 1941 will need 9 quarters of coverage. The number of quarters of coverage required to be fully insured increases at this rate until the worker has 40 quarters of coverage. Then he is fully insured for life.

Approximately 978 single-engine aircraft for private and non-scheduled commercial flying, having engines with a maximum horsepower of 100, were sold in 1940, an increase of 114 per cent over 1939.

7,990 Motor Cars Issued Licenses

The Eastland office of tax assessor-collector has issued 7,990 motor vehicle licenses for 1941, according to the record of that office. Of this number 6,515 were passenger cars, 850 commercial trucks and 625 farm trucks. These figures do not include license plates issued by sub stations, that only report at intervals.
