He spoke at the Lions Club luncheon yesterday on the subject of "Corrosion and Electricity." And about all we can say about his talk is that we're against corrosion.

WHEN YOU SEE a pipe line running across the country, you probably think "well, there's a pipe line." But there's a lot more to it than you'd think. The companies have to think about corrosion — a process by which the iron seeks to return to its original state.

And the engineers have found a process whereby ground beds are scattered along the lines to put electrons back into the pipe and preserve it at a considerable savings.

Joe reports that gold has the lowest corrosive rate of all metals. Copper has a very low rate, hence it is used extensively in piping under houses.

Along with his talk, Joe demonstrated a meter with which they measure the electron situation in their pipes. He gave a demonstration on static electricity and showed how pipe liners handle it. He used Lion Ted Wandle as his "meter" to show how you can transfer static electricity. Ted's ear transmitted sparks and Ted screamed as Joe touched it.

90% Of Children Are Fugitives — From The Dentist

AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—More than 90 percent of all school-age children in this country are fugitives from a dentist's chair, an official memorandum from the Governor's office points out.

In an effort to call attention to the fact that children's teeth are decaying six times faster than they are being filled, Governor Allan Shivers has designated February 4, as Children's Dental Health Day in Texas. Texas' observance is part of a national program of children's dental health.

"Dental decay afflicts an estimated 90 percent of school-age children," the Governor wrote in the memorandum. "Dental health of our children should be a major concern of our community."

This will make the fourth year that state health authorities and private dental practitioners have teamed together to combat widespread dental deterioration of children's teeth. The Texas State Department of Health and the State Dental Society are sponsoring the state observance.

One of the biggest hurdles to be overcome, program sponsors say, is the attitude that baby teeth are insignificant.

"They aren't," Dr. Geo. W. Cox said. "Our dental scientists tell us that the first teeth have a vital bearing on the condition of permanent teeth."

The Governor's memorandum read: "The thought, attention, and efforts of those in the dental profession are concerned with preventive measures for children that they may be assured a substantial measure of lifelong dental health."

"The establishment of such preventive measures as fluoridation of public water supplies is encouraged by public health leaders as one of the dental profession's most powerful allies in improving the nation's dental health."

He appealed to "agencies, organizations, and individuals to mark the occasion" by calling public attention to the plight of youngsters' teeth.

Texas Insurance Bill Is Highest In State History

AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—Texans bought fire, windstorm and extended coverage insurance in record-breaking quantities in 1951, Fire Insurance Commissioner Paul H. Brown has announced.

Fire insurance premiums reported through the Texas Insurance Checking Office last year totaled \$63,478,359, an increase of 10.7 per cent over the \$57,366,114 in fire premiums collected in 1950. Windstorm and extended coverage insurance premiums jumped to \$43,348,500 in 1951, an increase of 13 per cent over the \$38,350,365 buyers paid for this type of protection in 1950.

Commissioner Brown said that the over-all increase in fire, windstorm and extended coverage premiums is 11.6 per cent above totals according to Checking Office reports. Property owners got an even higher percentage of protection for their money, however, because of rate reductions made by the Board of Insurance Commissioners in 1951. Last April, windstorm and extended coverage rates were reduced more than \$600,000 and in October, fire insurance rates were lowered \$2,303,000.

"An estimated \$3,000,000 in premiums collected by companies not using the Checking Office still are to be reported," Commissioner Brown said. "Indications are, however, that these companies will show an increase in line with those reporting through the Checking Office."

Critical Drought Checks Grains In Most Farm Areas

Wheat in parts of the north-west and small grains and winter cover crops in most of east Texas made fair to good development in the continued warm open weather during the past week. Critical drought, however, continued to check small grain, winter pasture and dryland vegetables in all other areas. Cut worms were damaging some wheat in the Low Rolling Plains.

Army worms also were reappearing in some south Texas oat fields. Weekend showers over the southeast and upper Coast will be very beneficial but general rains were still needed over practically the entire State. Preparation of land for spring crops was well along over much of the State. In south Texas corn planting time is just about two weeks off and it is still dry.

Harvest of winter vegetables was active under favorable conditions and growth in all irrigated areas was stimulated by the continued warm weather. In non-irrigated areas, however, lack of moisture caused further deterioration, particularly of spinach in the Coastal Bend where much of the crop has been severely damaged by dry weather and disease. Dryland onions were holding up fairly well but thrips were in most fields and poisoning was started. Irrigated onions continued to make rapid growth and development pointed to an early harvest.

Growers in the north Texas onion area were still waiting for better moisture conditions before planting. Early planted tomatoes and potatoes in the Lower Valley made fairly good growth. Watermelon and tomato planting in the Falfurrias area was at a standstill for lack of moisture and the small earlier planted acreage needed rain badly. Tomato beds were being planted in the East Texas area and some plants have started.

Heavy supplemental feeding of livestock continued as droughty conditions held back much needed green feed over most of the State. The warm weather of the past two weeks, however, has permitted stretching the short feed supplies on many farms and ranches. In the northwest wheat pasture was still responding to early January moisture and an increasing amount of green feed was available in that area. Small grains, clovers and winter cover crops in east Texas, where moisture also was favorable, were coming along. Early lambing was under way in Plateau counties.

Central theme of the painting shows two jackrabbits on the alert beside a large rock surrounded by cacti. The typically large ears of the Texas jackrabbits suggest the name for the Dozier painting. The artist calls his work an "interpretive painting of West Texas," pointing out that the red ears of the rabbits distinguish the picture because they blend with the cacti plants of red. The cacti plants appealed to the artist because "they are indigenous to the wide area in West Texas and New Mexico."

Following presentation of the painting, Mr. Bird will review some of the operating problems facing Lone Star in 1952 and discuss with the employees plans under way to meet these problems.

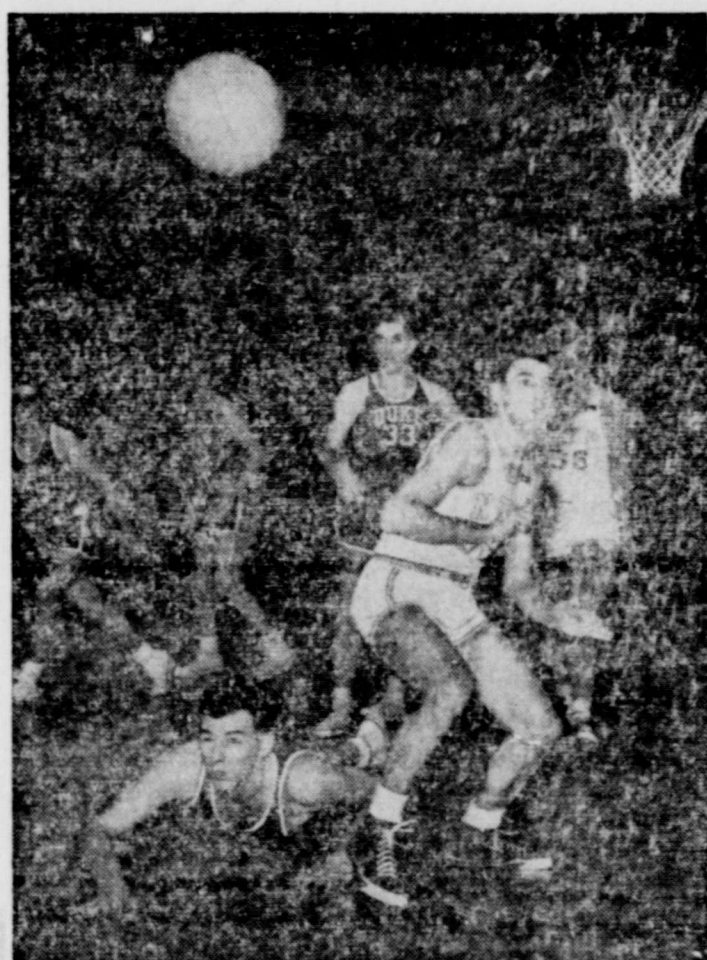
The 1952 Fords are in three lines — four models in the Mainline, three models in the Customline and three models in the

CITIZENSHIP BEGINS AT HOME

THE first lessons of human relations must be taught to little children by their parents at home. There they must learn that while democracy allows every individual his right to certain privileges, it also requires certain obligations to others. There the child must learn that liberty does not include the invasion of the rights of his brothers and sisters and that government has rules. Later in the school the child must learn that lesson in a broad way as he comes in contact with children of other homes and other circumstances. Here in the home and in the school are laid the foundations of ideals and attitudes that govern the child's whole life as a citizen. During February and March the East Texas Chamber will hold eight citizenship and career conferences for high school seniors at East Texas colleges.

Parents who think that they can leave all instruction about citizenship to school teachers are making a grave mistake. The good teacher has a marvelous opportunity to teach little children the fundamental principles of our American form of government and the history of the men who fought and died that we might have freedom. But the parents must begin, even before school age, to teach in simple terms these basic principles of human behavior.

Our National policies are controlled by sentiment development at the community level. J. Edgar Hoover, director of the F. B. I., said recently in Washington to the Senate crime investigating committee: "Crime is a problem to be met and solved in each city, town and hamlet. In those communities where public opinion is enlightened and aroused, crime is at a minimum. In such communities crime has not become entrenched, it does not enjoy unholy alliances with those in public office." Mr. Hoover also said: "The experience of people in other lands who suddenly found

every qualified voter has the right and the duty to attend this precinct convention of his party and have a voice in electing the delegates to the county convention, who in turn elect the delegates to the State convention, who in turn name delegates to the National convention, who nominate the President. If you do not attend the precinct convention in your neighborhood on May 3, you will have nothing whatever to do with determining who will run for President. Primary elections in July for State and local offices have nothing to do with the nomination or election of the President.

The most important business you have as a citizen is to inform yourself of public issues and to instruct your children in the principles of our system of Government. How long has it been since you

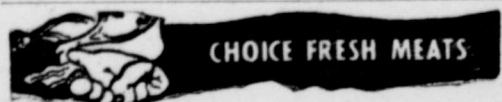

Wha Chung is the 21-year-old graduate of Kyorgki High school and Sook Myung college where she was a music major. She registered for English, Bible and music theory courses at ACC, while her sister is taking English, Bible and biology.

Their parents decided to send the girls to ACC after being persuaded by the mother of Herne Kern Oh, a 1951 graduate of ACC, and friend of the family. They have three younger brothers, one of whom plans to come to ACC.

White Tail Deer Released In Etex By State Agency

AUSTIN, Jan. 31. — Another step toward advancing wildlife restoration and game management in Texas was to be taken over in Houston county late Thursday, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

At that time, the first consignment of white-tailed deer was to be released in an area where big game has declined heavily.

The release place was at the Shady Grove Fire Lookout Tower about ten miles southeast of Crockett.

The Executive Secretary said this is the first time that Federal, State, County and private authorities have cooperated in such a large restoration and management project.

"This delivery of a load of deer for the new restoration area," he said, "marks a milestone in our combined efforts to improve Texas wildlife resources. The success of this undertaking has been assured in advance because the local folks in the immediate area of the transplanting have strongly shown their intentions to cooperate."

The deer were brought to the Crockett area after being trapped on the Aransas Federal Wildlife Refuge. The first consignment was expected to number more than twenty head.

Biologists have found the natural essentials to provide food and cover for white-tailed deer in the large restoration tract, less than 20,000 acres of which are in the Davy Crockett National Forest.

Invisible Molds On Seed May Destroy Germination

There is no such thing as mold-free seed, according to Prof. Clyde M. Christensen, of the University of Minnesota. Seed from the irrigated regions of dry land farming areas of Idaho and Oregon carry fewer molds than seed from more humid regions, but none are mold-free.

Seeds are invaded by molds while developing on the plant, but apparently most infection occurs just before harvest until the seed becomes thoroughly dry. Seed may look clean and bright, but still be invaded by molds that are invisible except through the microscope. They may remain dormant for years, ready to resume growth whenever conditions become favorable.

The major factor influencing growth of molds in stored seeds is moisture. A moisture content of 11 to 13 per cent in oily seeds, and of 14 to 16 per cent in starchy seeds, will permit molds to grow. If the seed is dirty, contains a large number of insect fragments, has been damaged by frost, or already has been extensively invaded by molds, the critical moisture will be lower than if it is clean, well matured, and relatively free of molds. Seed that is dry enough for safe storage for two weeks may not be dry enough to be safe for two years.

The temperatures in which seed is stored in most of the United States will permit moderate to rapid growth of molds if enough moisture is present. If the moisture content of a given

lot of seed is just above the critical range, the molds present will begin to grow. As they grow, they gradually weaken and the germ and finally kill it. There is no sharp, sudden transition from sound, vigorous seed to dead, decayed and discolored seed. The process is a gradual one that cannot be detected by ordinary means. It may cause reduced viability and slow germination, without any mold being visible on the outside of the seed. This gradual deterioration probably is much more extensive than the more obvious changes caused by molds.

If molds continue to develop they eventually produce quantities of spores on the outside surface. The seed then is called moldy, or musty. If the moisture content is high enough, the molds may cause heating, which is the final product of mold growth in stored seed, not the beginning phase as often believed. Various laboratory techniques have been developed to detect mold invasion, none of which are simple enough for use by the layman.

The only practical method now known to prevent mold spoilage of stored seed is to keep all portions of it so dry that no molds can grow on or in it. Seed stored dry can become moist by slow transfer of water vapor from the warmer to the cooler parts of the seed lot. A large number of chemicals have been tested in the hope that one could be found that would prevent this sort of spoilage. None of those so far tested has done an effective job without killing the seed.

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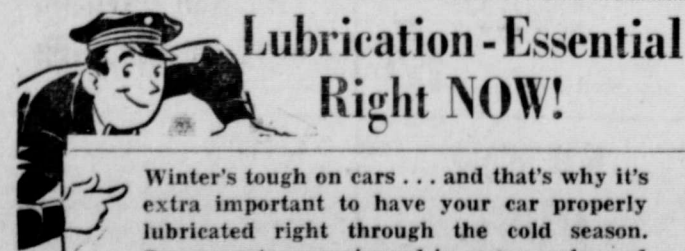
