In the past it has been quipped that everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it. Well, this is not necessarily so today. A lot is being done to modify the weather and still people talk about it.

All of which leads us to the observation that a lot of people have been talking about the postal service recently. Unlike some of the governmental agencies, they are not keeping a low profile. In fact, their profile has been raised lately, as well as their rates. But as the weather of yore, there does not seem to be much that the common citizen can do about it. This is very unfortunate because the local postal employees in the Twin Cities, and all in the area that we are acquainted with, are able and conscientious workers that try to speed the mails to the best of their abilities.

Our thinking is that the big mail boo-boo was the decision some time ago to take the mail from the railroads and substitute trucks and airplanes. We think that this has proved to be the biggest and most fat-headed decision that has come out of foggy bottom in the past decade; and that takes in some real humdingers. Without the direct routes provided by the rails, we now have the patchwork of zip routes and sectional centers that place Farwell and Bovina almost 300 miles apart by mail. It has reduced the opportunities for mail to leave our community and slowed delivery to this area. Altogether, we think that the record has plainly written that the mail service has deteriorated since trucks and planes have replaced rail transportation.

One result of the decision to take the mail revenues away from the railroads was to completely sink any trace of the passenger service that did derive some revenue from the Post Office. Now what do we have? Well, for one thing, the government has had to go into the rail passenger service with that horrible monstrosity known as Railpax or something or the other. If this boondoggle doesn't cost the taxpayer a bundle, we will eat our freshman beanies. Our mails have slowed up to the point of absurdity, and our mailing costs have jumped another foot or so. It would seem that if we are going to have to subsidize passenger rail service, we might as well do part of it through the postal service and thereby increase postal efficiency. If the taxpayer is going to be stuck, and he is, for rail subsidies and higher postal rates, the least he could expect would be better service from the Postal Department and the railroads.

A U. S. Senator recently said that if the Lockheed Corporation management made the wrong decision, the Company would have to live or die by them and not to beg for Federal assistance to bail them out. This we agree, but it does seem passing strange for such sentiments to be expressed in Washington where bureaucratic fat-headedness runs rampant. If said senator can be so cautious to Lockheed, it looks like he would be concerned with his own vineyard and prune the boobs who think we have better mail service now than ten years ago. Lockheed can go broke, but politicians can always tax the public; that is the difference.

Wheat Harvest Begins

The Parmer County wheat harvest is well underway, according to Mack Heald, Parmer County Agricultural Agent. Heald estimates that if weather conditions remain favorable the harvest will be completed within a two-week period.

According to Heald, the lowest number of acres in recent years (25,000) will be harvested in the county this year. He attributed the shortage in acres harvested to the low price of wheat. Many farmers used their wheat as a range crop for grazing cattle instead of harvesting it, states the agricultural agent.

The first load of wheat in the Farwell-Lariat area was received early last week. Since that time, several loads of the golden grain have been received at area elevators. Most of the wheat is yielding 50-60 bushels per acre.

Heald states that little of the area wheat crop received any damage this year either from greenbugs, wind or hail. However, in the Lazbuddie-Friona-Clay's Corner areas, some damage was recorded from severe winds and hail earlier this spring.

Twister Sighted --

Local Area Hit By High Winds, Rain

The Twin Cities were menaced by heavy thunderstorms and high winds last Friday. Although a funnel was sighted two miles south of Texico, the area received slight wind damage. Reports of some wind-battered wheat and trees were received, but no measurable damage was done.

Asa Smith of Lariat reported a half-inch rain on Friday and .2 inch on Saturday. Several locations continued to receive moisture on Saturday.

South of Texico there were reports of high winds and much rain. Mrs. John Hadley said they received 1.20 inches of rain Friday with a little hail. She reported a half-inch of moisture on Saturday.

Fred Chandler told the Tribune that Farwell received an inch of rain on Friday and .1 inch on Saturday.

Mrs. Elmer Langford reported 1.1 inch of moisture on their place north of Texico. She said there was some hail, but too much rain to complain about the hail.

Several reports of vandalism were received last week from Farwell businesses. Tuesday night, June 8, seemed to be the worst night for activity by persons who broke windows and street lights.

According to Otis Huggins, representative for Southwestern Public Services Co., vandals broke out five streetlights around the Farwell Schools, three at 9th Street and Ave. A and several more across the town. He reports \$206 in damage to the lights.

C. L. Mahaney, owner of Border Theater, reports his showcase window was broken last Tuesday night and a picture stolen. He said he has received damage to the same window in previous weeks.

It is guessed that a group of vandals are throwing rocks and bricks at their targets since they are in evidence at the sights of destruction.

Wednesday night, June 9, a group of vandals broke out three flasher lights east of the Santa Fe Depot, said E. J. Sprouls, Santa Fe agent. "They apparently threw rocks at the light," he said.

Willie Roberts reported several windows at the Farwell School bus barn had been broken. He estimates \$40 to \$50 worth of damage was done. Roberts said he thought the damage was done on Thursday night, June 10, but he couldn't be sure.

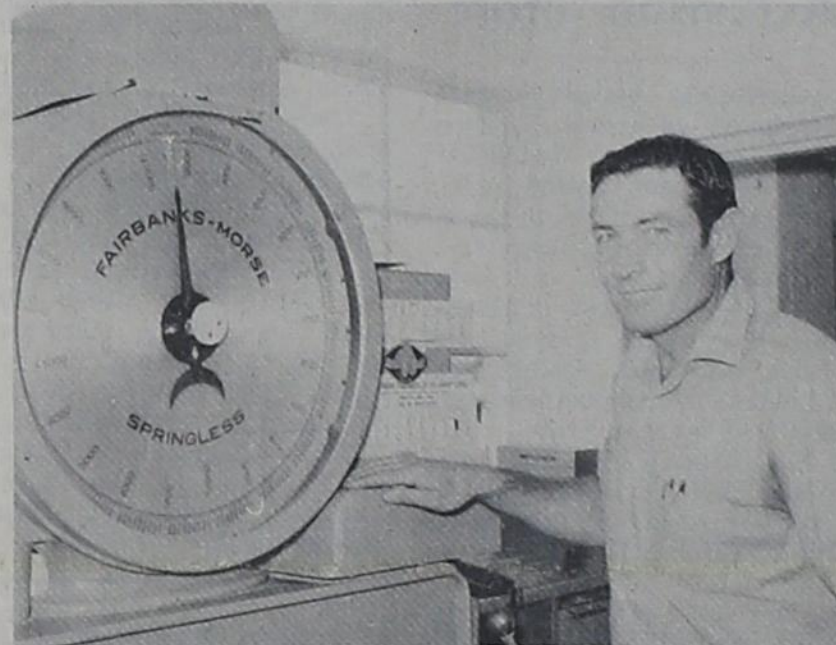
Several unconfirmed reports of vandalism occurred in Texico, including alleged damage at the Texico Swimming Pool, but official word was not available to confirm the reports.

Golden West Receives First Load Of Wheat

Golden West Seed in Texico received its first load of the 1971 wheat crop Friday, June 11, according to Ray Pritchett, elevator owner.

The wheat, two loads of Tascosa variety, was brought in by Dee Brown and his father, D. J. Brown, from their farms south of Texico. One load tested 14.80 and the other tested 12.80. The irrigated wheat was averaging 60 bushels per acre.

Pritchett also reports that the elevator received several loads of Tokak barley from the Joe McWilliams farm on Wednesday and Thursday. Test weight of the barley was also reported as good.

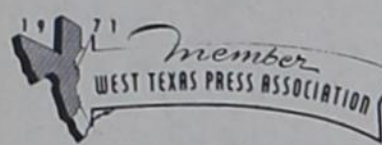

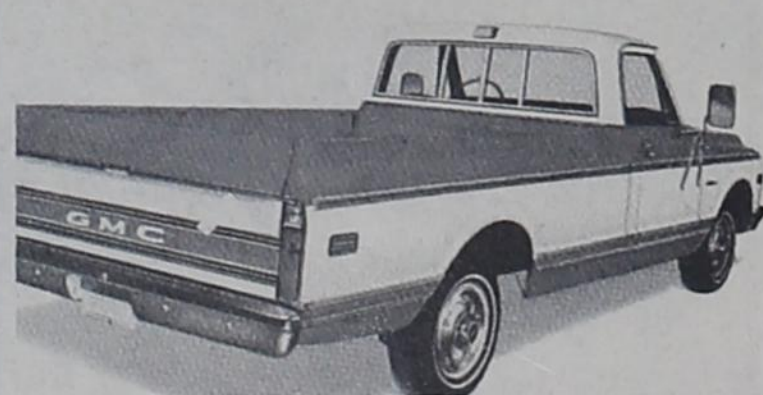

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On The Farm In Parmer County

LACK OF NITROGEN OR IRON CAN YELLOW LAWNS Texas homeowners who have Bermudagrass lawns which are turning yellow instead of growing thick and green should look for nitrogen and iron deficiencies in their soil.

The nitrogen deficiency causes a general yellowing of the lawn while the symptoms of iron deficiencies are yellow, bleached spots in the turf.

Iron deficiencies develop mainly in alkaline soil and the upper Gulf Coast and parts of East Texas are usually the only regions in the state that don't lack iron.

For the most rapid and effective correction of iron deficiencies, spray applications of iron chelates or iron sulfate on the lawn. Soil applications are also helpful, but they may not correct severe iron deficiencies.

Fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium should be applied in the early spring and again in the early fall to eliminate nitrogen deficiencies. In addition to this applications of nitrogen as ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate at 4-6 week intervals during the growing season.

The additional applications help to maintain vigor, color, and uniform growth of the grass.

A soil test is extremely helpful in determining exact fertilizer needs, showing the need for lime, and indicating soil salinity problems, but there are some general guidelines to follow in fertilizing Bermudagrass.

The applications of the complete fertilizers in early spring and fall should be made so that two pounds of nitrogen are applied per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Examples of such applications would be 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 17 pounds of 12-12-12 per 1,000 square feet.

The additional applications during the growing season should be made so that approximately one pound of nitrogen is applied per 1,000 square feet in each application. Examples of proper application would be five pounds of ammonium sulfate (21%) or three pounds of ammonium nitrate (33%) per 1,000 square feet of lawn area.

CROP REPORT FROM FARMERS NEEDED In early July, some 22,000 Texas farmers will receive an

acreage and production of selected crops questionnaire from Cary D. Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas Agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that State totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry -- agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

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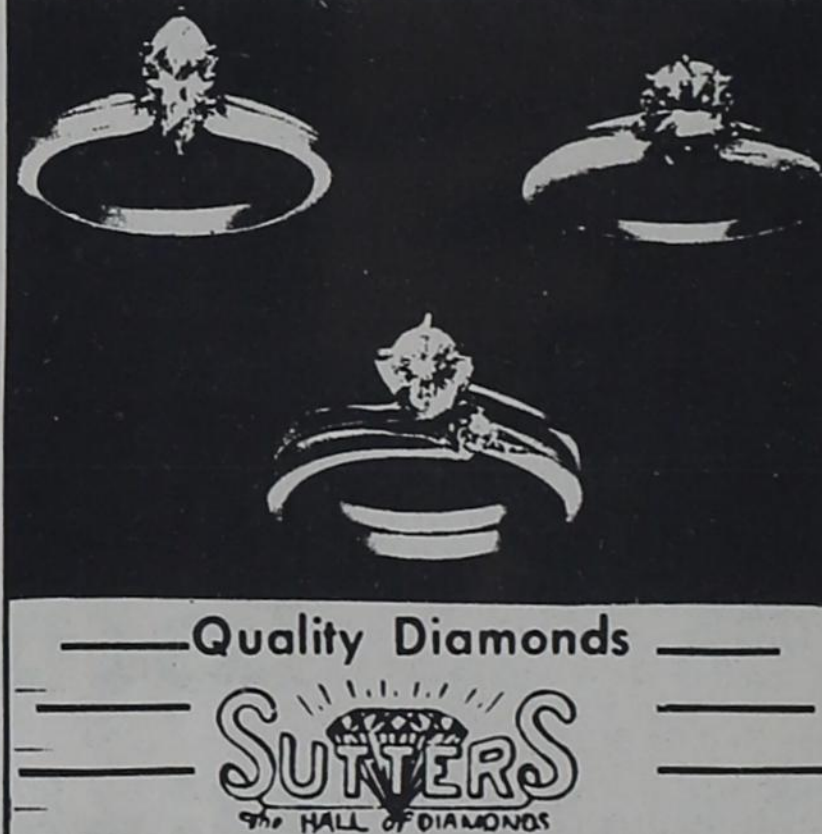
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Buttons Howard Injured In Freak Accident

Berwin "Buttons" Howard of Farwell who was injured in a freak accident Sunday afternoon was showing a marked improvement at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock early Tuesday morning, according to Walter Hughes, a close friend of Howard.

Howard, a well-known rodeo performer, had participated in the Pioneer Days Rodeo in Clovis at the home of his brother, Paul Howard, Sunday afternoon when the accident occurred. He received severe injuries to his larynx and neck.

According to information released by family members, the accident occurred when Howard roped a calf and dismounted to tie his calf. At that time the horse began to buck and the rope became tangled around

Howard's waist and worked its way up around his neck. He was dragged some 300 feet by the horse before he was untangled from the rope.

He had been unconscious several seconds when he was rushed to Clovis Memorial Hospital where an emergency tracheotomy was performed. He was later transferred to the Lubbock hospital where he is in the intensive care unit. Late Monday he was able to breathe by himself and recognized his wife, according to his sister-in-law, Mrs. Paul Howard.

Tuesday at noon, Howard had recovered enough to sit up and communicate with family members.

Although a three-week stay is short, the Windsors say they have enjoyed meeting friends of the Kaltwassers and have come to have a deep affection for the people they met while they were here. They plan on going back home June 27.

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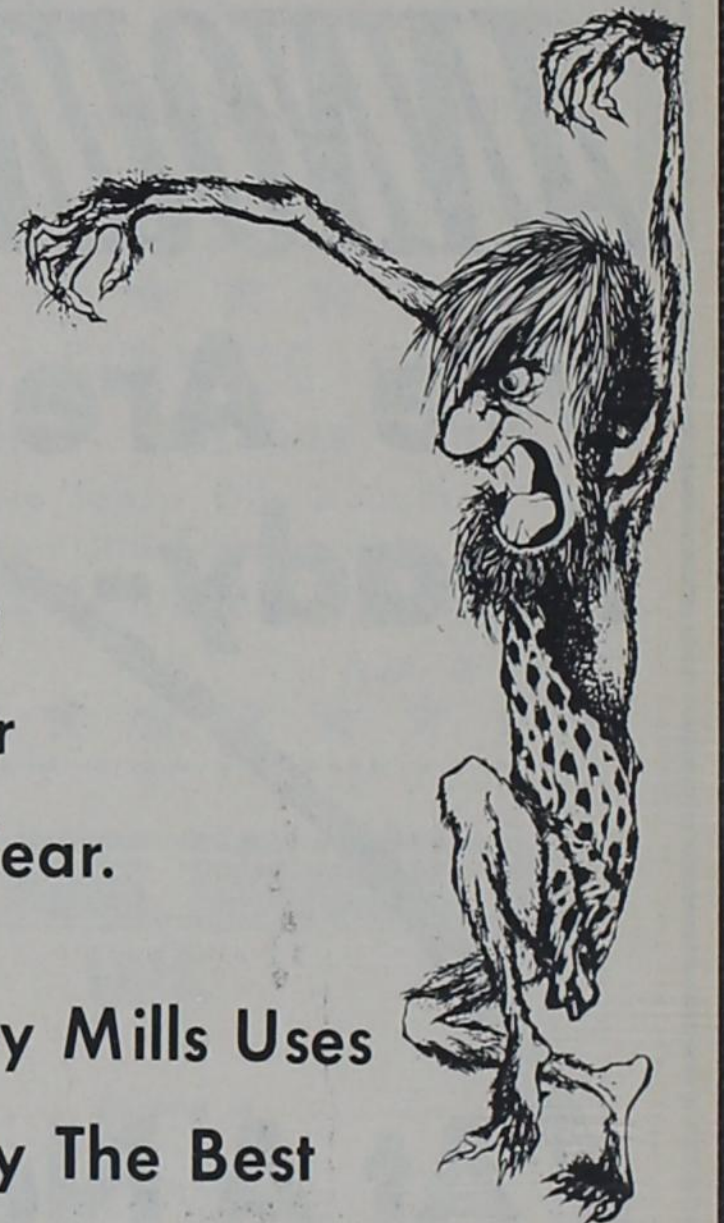

Life Isn't Over For Mrs. Tipton

Mrs. Percy Tipton has raised five children, but she is a long way from sitting on the porch swing to wait out the rest of her life.

Mr. and Mrs. Tipton moved to Farwell in 1929. Their children are Bert, who lives in Fullerton, Calif., Billy of Phoenix, Ariz., Mrs. Frankie Brand of Clovis, Ewell of Roswell, N.M., and Mrs. Fern Tuggle of Lubbock.

After Mrs. Tipton got her children off to living their own lives, she started dabbling in the doll business. Since she has 13 grandchildren, doll-making started filling up most of her time. Besides making dolls for her own family, Mrs. Tipton started making dolls for friends of her family and their friends. Pretty soon doll-making was a fulltime job, and it continues to be her primary activity.

Two years ago, Mrs. Tipton and her daughter, Fern, started making dolls on a large scale. They obtained scraps of material from neighbors and friends. Now, Mrs. Tipton makes every kind of doll imaginable from "goonies" to stuffed animals.

"Goonies," Mrs. Tipton's first project, are dolls with tightly-stuffed bodies and long, padded arms and legs. Shortly after she started these, she began making "Raggedy Ann" dolls. From these, Mrs. Tipton went on to make stuffed animals, "gonks," Jack and Jill dolls and little pig-tailed baby dolls.

"The wilder they are, the better they are," Mrs. Tipton says of the dolls she makes for little boys to drag around and for little girls to play house with. She states that she has received orders from young men who want dolls for their cars or young women who like to decorate their beds with the toys.

The dolls are stuffed with old pieces of sheets and pillowcases that are given to Mrs. Tipton. Sometimes she stuffs them with other materials. Presently she is putting dacron into several of the dolls' bodies so they can be easily washed.

She gets patterns for all her dolls from the stores or by ex-

This summer she is helping to coach Capitol Food baseball team (girl's team) and through the years she has been and is currently teaching a first and second grade Sunday School class at Farwell Church of Christ where she and her husband are members.

Ruby is a daughter and the middle child of R. V. Ham and the late Mrs. Ham. Being one of nine children, Ruby learned early in life the meaning and joy of sharing with others...a lesson which has been of great benefit to her through the years.

Ruby began and completed her formal education at Farwell Public Schools. Following high school graduation, she began her career by working at the Bill Hall Grocery Store later graduating to a job as telephone operator. Just prior to her retirement from a career girl, she spent eight years as cashier-bookkeeper at the local Southwestern Public Service company. 8 eggs
4 c. sugar
1/2 t. salt
8 c. Half and Half
4 c. whipping cream
4 T. vanilla

Beat 8 eggs until smooth, add 4 cups sugar, Beat. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 8 cups Half and Half and 4 cups whipping cream. Beat until all of mixture is smooth, add 4 table-spoons of vanilla and mix well. Pour mixture into ice cream freezer that has about 3 inches of milk in the bottom. Makes 1 1/2 gallons.

RITZ CRACKER PIE

Ritz crackers
1 c. sugar
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1/2 t. baking powder
3 egg whites
1/2 t. vanilla

Crush about 20 Ritz crackers. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder. Beat 3 egg whites until stiff. Add 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and pour mixture into buttered pie pan. Bake about 30 minutes in a 350 degree oven.

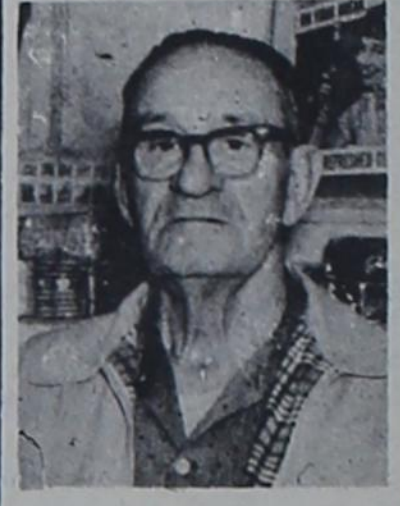
Church Supper Set Sunday

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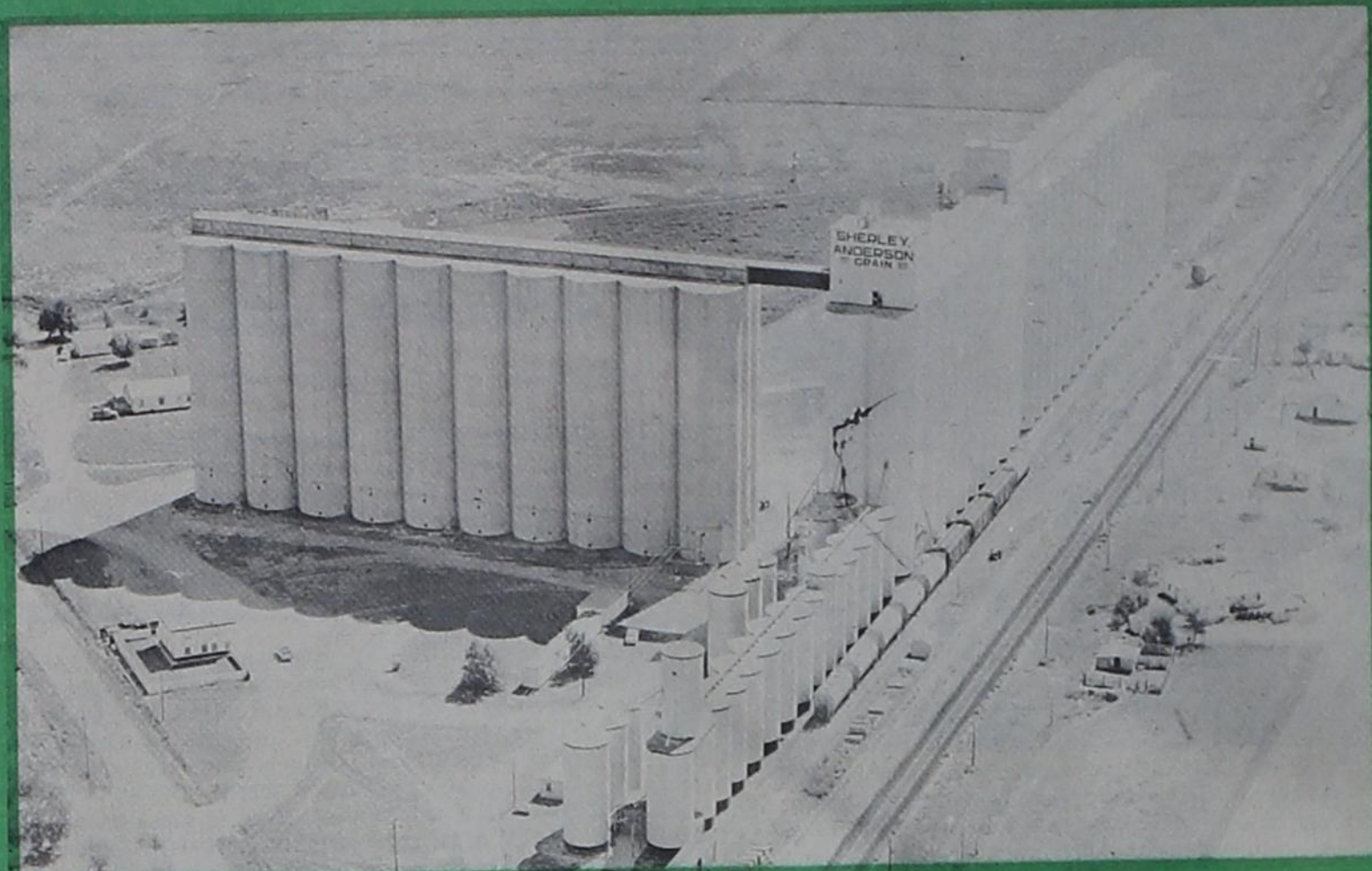
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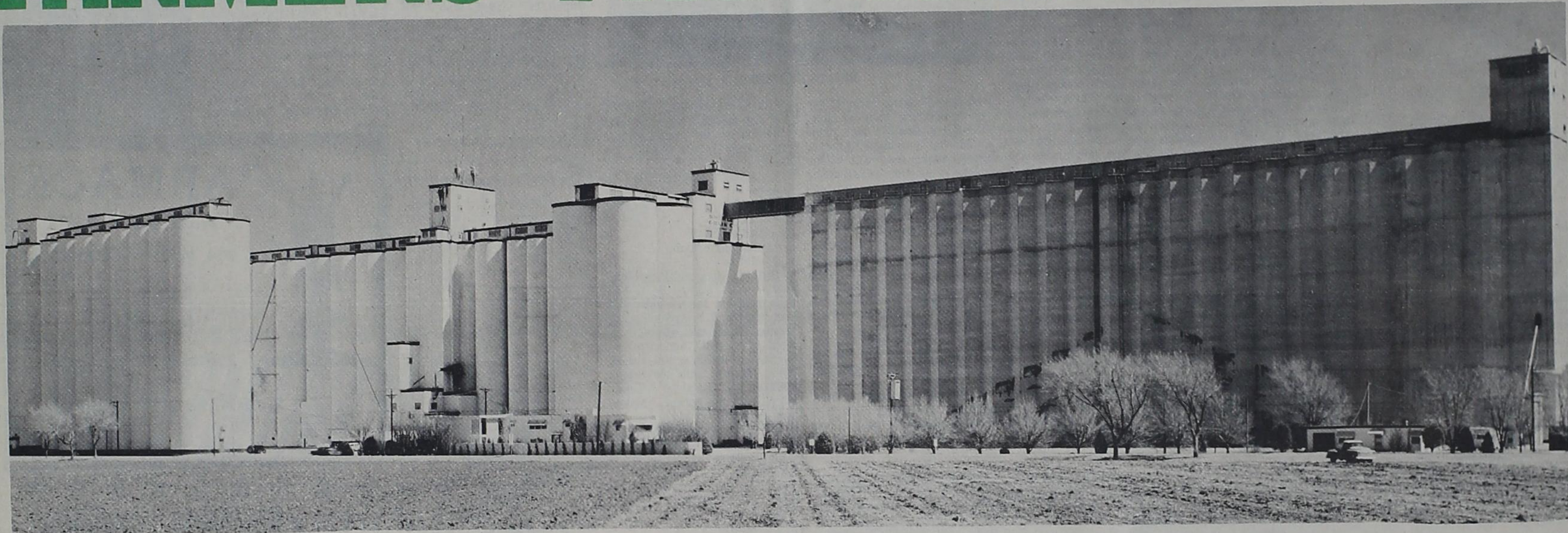
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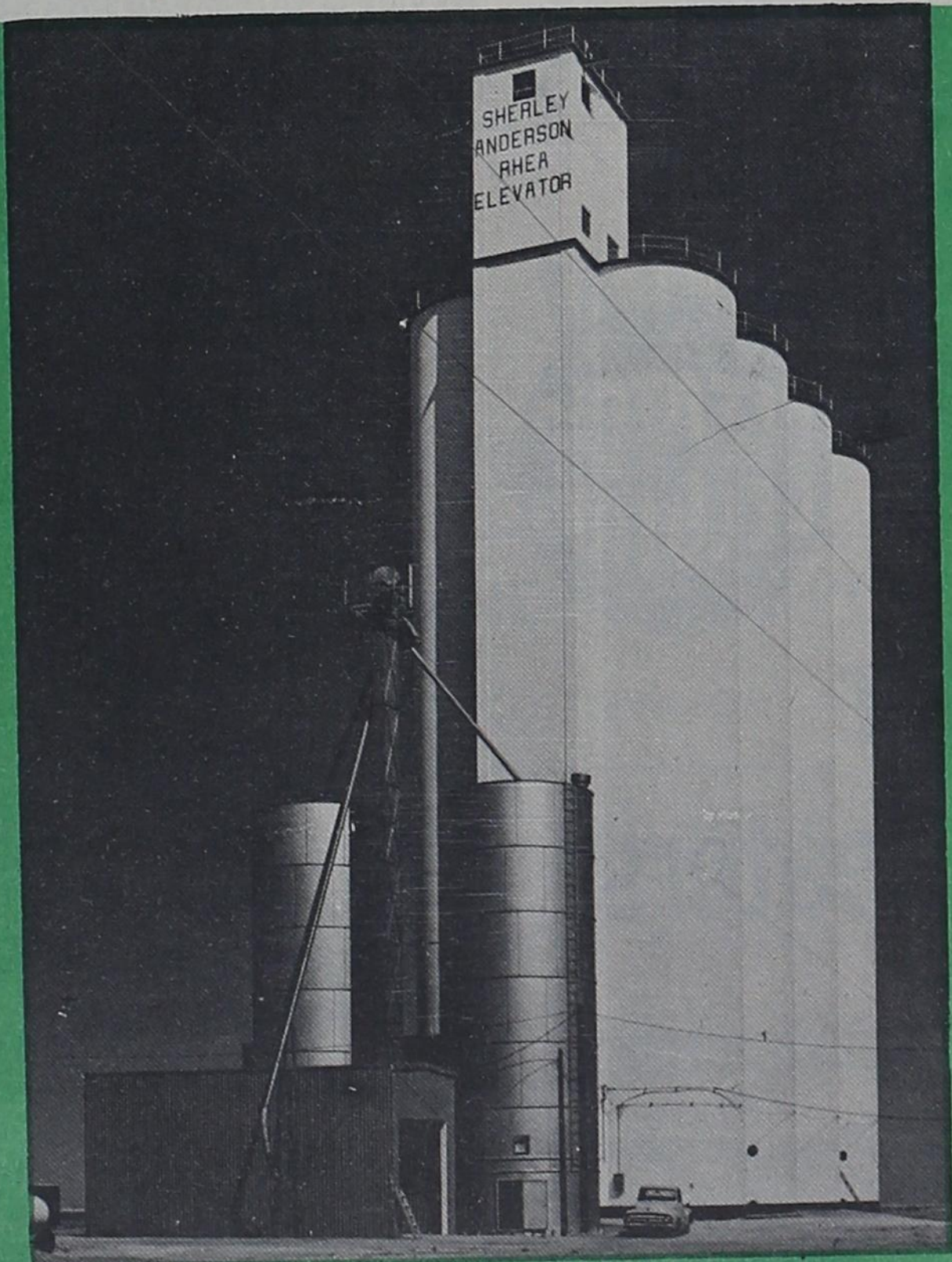
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
