1940 Allotment Will Be In Mail By November 15

Predicting that all 1940 cotton allotments will be in the mail by the middle of November, E. N. Holmgren, state AAA administrator, said necessary information had already been received at state headquarters here for figuring allotments for 16 Texas counties.

Before any allotments can be mailed however, the state allotment must be set up in Washington and broken down for counties by the state office, Holmgren said. Franklin, Delta, Titus, Morris, Rains, Marion, Van Zandt, LaSalle, Coke, Somervell, Bosque, McLennan, Williamson, Frio, Maverick and Zavala counties have already furnished the state office with cotton histories of their farms and the allotments for these counties will be set as soon as the county figure is available, the administrator announced.

Educational meeting for administrative assistants and county committeemen were held over the state during the week ending September 23, and the necessary forms and printed instructions were sent to all counties during the week ending September 30, Holmgren said.

Since this instructional procedure, county AAA officials have been assembling the cotton history for each farm in the county during the past three years, computing cotton acreage planted and diverted, and tabulating the information.

The histories are then transmitted to the state office where allotments are set up. Farmers should begin to receive their allotments through the mail the latter part of October, Holmgren declared, and all allotments will be made in ample time before the cotton marketing quota referendum December 9.

He is not required with foolish generosity to give an advantage, but is never to take a questionable advantage.

Sportsmanship is simple. It is merely being gentle in strength, being courageous in weakness, keeping the rules, playing the game, being on the level with adversaries, and being on the level with your self.

Let me plead with you as a coach and friend to do all you can to promote sportsmanship. A boy who consistently violates these principles should be put out of the game. "When the great scorer comes to write against your name, He write—not that you won or lost, but how you played the game."

Club Boys Leave For San Francisco

Texas' 67,000 4-H Club members will be represented in the finals of the national dairy contests, held in connection with the National Dairy Show at San Francisco, by the Eastland county judging team and the Hopkins county demonstration team. The contests will be held October 21-25.

In the party that left Texas Oct. 14, were L. C. Love, Buster Wheat and Jack Walker, club boys of Eastland county, and their assistant-county agent, Sam E. Rosenberg; Gay Bryan and Jesse Hallaway, the 4-H representatives from Hopkins county, and assistant county agent J. M. McFartridge; and G. G. Gibson, assistant dairyman of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service.

The boys won their state honors in competition with other county teams at the Junior Farmers' Short Course at A. and M., in July.

The Hopkins county 4-H team will show in detail the working of the Dairy Herd Improvement Association in their county, and will demonstrate how it has helped local dairymen produce a larger net profit from one good cow than from three or more ordinary ones. The state contest was conducted by the

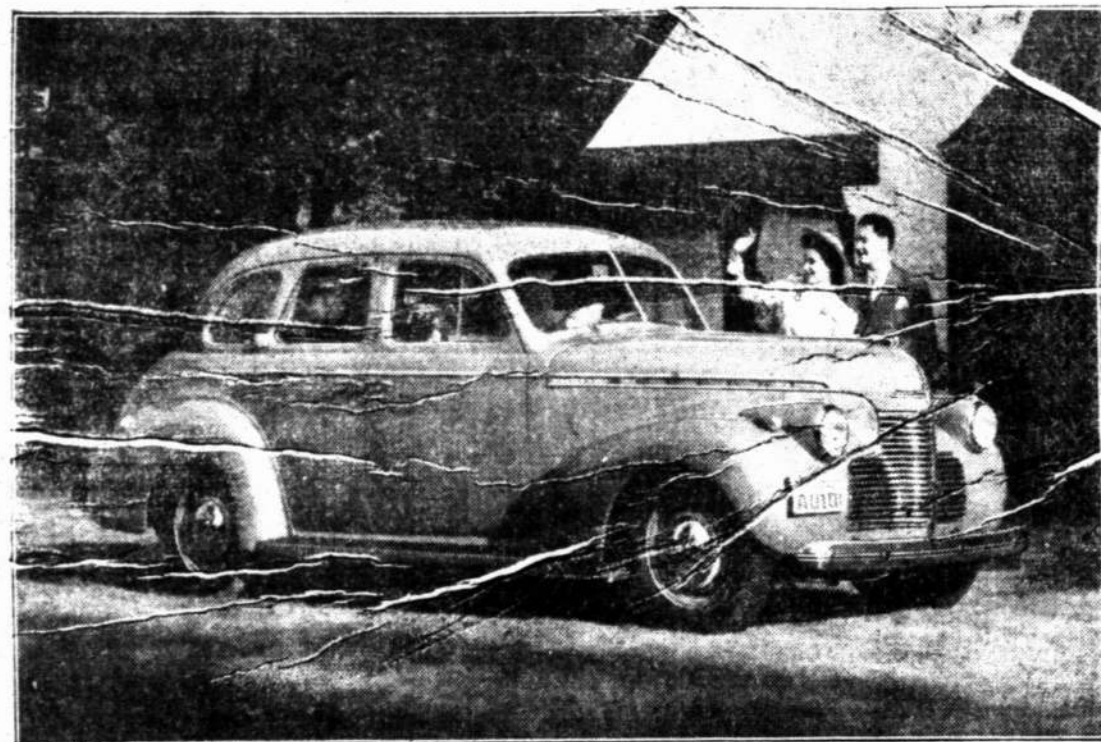

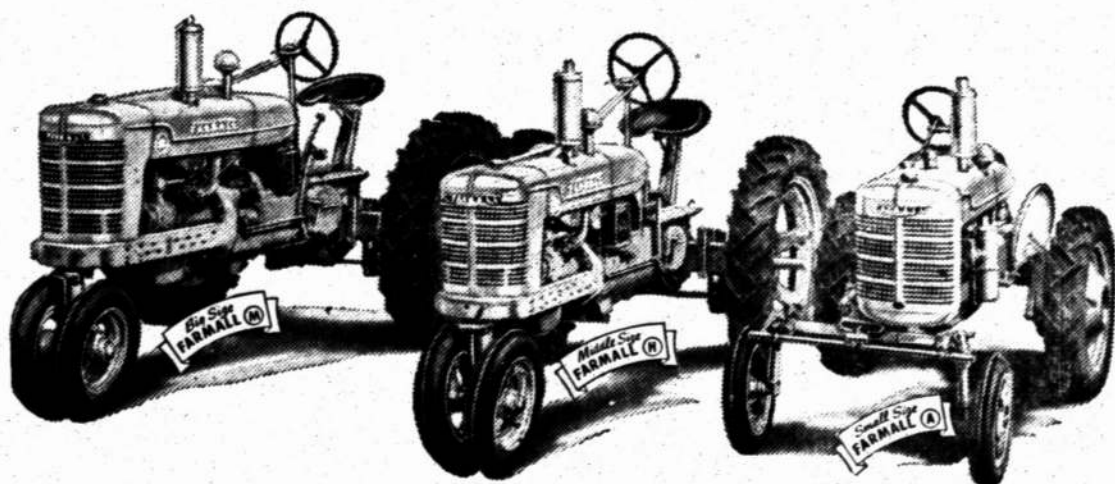

fruits left to answer the jelly-makers last call, so prudent housewives are taking advantage of these to complete the partially filled shelves in their cupboards, advises Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Two essentials a fruit must have in proper proportions if it is to be converted into jelly are pectin and acid, the specialist points out. Both of these elements decrease as the fruit ripens, so for the best results she recommends a mixture of the underripe to furnish pectin and slightly underripe and ripe fruit, acid and the ripe to contribute flavor and color.

Among the fruits which have both pectin and acid in sufficient quantity at the proper stage of maturity are tart apples such as winesap, crab apples, cranberries, grapes including wild native grapes and some of the cultivated varieties.

Combination of fruits such as crab apple and grape and tart apple with plum, also result in interesting blends.

One tip on jelly making which the specialist emphasizes is the cooking of jelly in small quantities. To get a clear quality product, use only four to six cups of juice at one time, she says. For detailed instructions Miss Neely suggests study of "Home-Made Jellies, Jams and Preserves", USDA Farmers' Bulletin No. 1800, available at the office of county home demonstration agents.

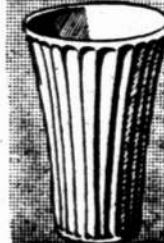

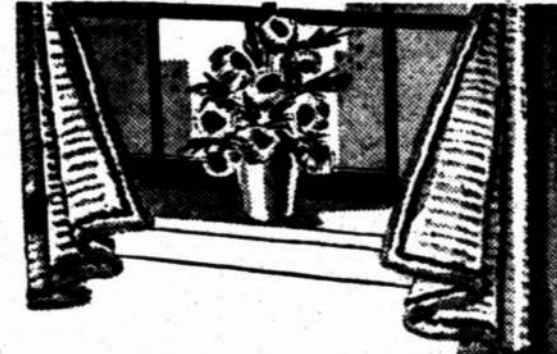

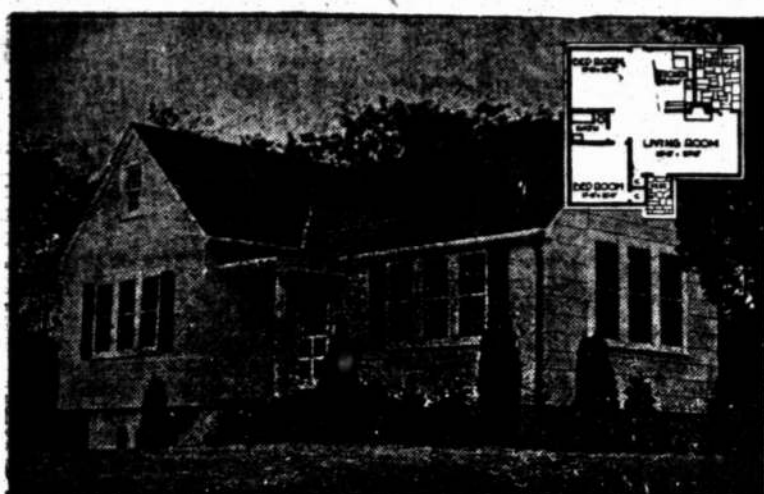

Dr. Cox Says:

A generation ago living conditions were less forced than they are today. Clock-consciousness was defined by hours rather than by minutes. And while there was less actual leisure then than now, the tempo of daily existence was moderate. While this new speed has definitely contributed to the amazing progress that has made this country great, and is reflected in the high living conditions now enjoyed in the average home, it has not been without its drawbacks.

"One of the most important of these is its possible effect upon health," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Of course no one would revert to former days, but it cannot be denied that misdirected, high-tension living overtaxes the nervous system and may undermine the general health of the individual. Recently, an outstanding neurologist, after making allowances for disease conditions due to syphilis, drug addiction, alcoholism, congenital defects and old age, claimed that many cases of mental collapse and less marked conditions of the nervous system could be traced to a too-rapid pace both in work and play, and to an accompanying habitual disregard of basic health requirements. He emphasized, however, that the fault does not lie so much in the high-pressure system of life as in overapplication.

"A sustained, fast living pace can be somewhat neutralized by the wise expenditure of leisure time. Indeed it can be said that it is not one's occupation, however exacting it may be, which usually does the damage to nerves and health, but the combination of high-speed work and disregard of nature's fundamental laws.

"Those who are burning the candle at both ends could well stop to consider that the excessive use of stimulants, consistent loss of sleep, and the nerve-shattering practices in general are the real allies of nervous breakdowns, neurotic conditions, and more serious mental manifestations.

"High-speed-day-and-night life is not advisable for present satisfaction, health or ultimate peace of mind. The wise person will, therefore, avoid it, and let moderation rule."

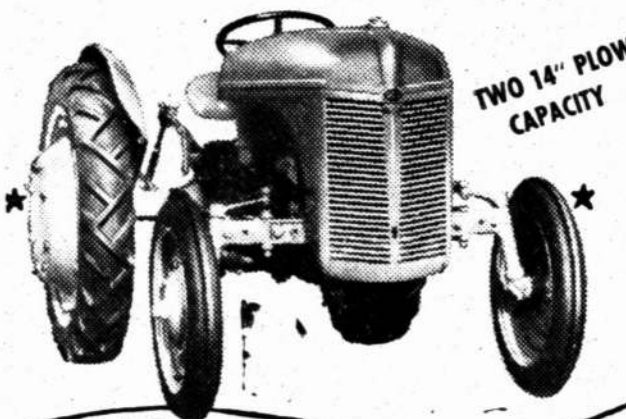

Select Turkey Breeding Stock Now Is Advised

Turkey producers should select their 1940 breeding stock during the last of October and the first weeks in November. Use of these dates makes it possible for the turkey producer to determine the early maturing birds in the flock.

In selecting turkeys for breeding purposes the breeder should remember that (1) the turkey is strictly a meat bird, (2) early maturity is desirable, (3) breed type must be held pure.

Since the turkey is a meat bird it should be (1) smoothly fleshed, (2) evenly covered with fat, (3) have a broad, level breast, (4) short heavy muscled thighs or drumsticks, (5) free of pin feathers, (which denotes early maturity) and

(6) the back and the breast should be parallel.

Turkey breeders should be careful to not keep birds hatched after May 1 for breeders. Age of a bird may be determined fairly accurately by noting if pinfeathers are observed. If the pinfeathers have come through the skin and the feather has started to take on a fan-like shape, then you may reasonably expect to have an early maturing bird—especially if the bird is covered smoothly and evenly with white fat.

It is suggested that the breeder place legbands on the selected birds. Also the selected breeders should be kept separate from the birds to be sold. A ration made up to furnish growth and develop the bird should be fed rather than a fattening mash.

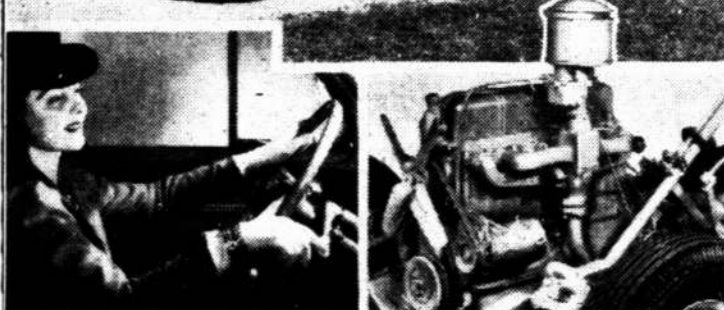

Winter Legumes For Texas Soils

By E. B. Reynolds, Chief, Division of Agronomy, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station

Soil fertility is the basis of all agriculture and of the prosperity of agricultural regions. Soils and soil fertility are influenced greatly by climate. In warm, moist climates, such as that prevailing in the southern states, the soil organic matter decays and disappears rapidly. This is the reason why the soils of the south, as a rule, are low organic matter and why it is difficult, if not impossible to build up large amounts of organic matter in them by plowing under crop residues, manure and green manures. In the north, however, the conditions during the summer favor abundant vegetative growth while the extremely low temperatures during the long cold winters retard or prevent the decay of the organic matter, conditions which lead to the accumulation of organic matter in the soil.

Soil organic matter is important because it affects profoundly the tilth, water-holding capacity, and the fertility of the soil. It is a storehouse for the nitrogen in the soil and acts as a regulator of the mineral nutrients. In fact, practically all of the nitrogen in the soil is contained in the organic matter. The decay of the organic matter in the soil releases the nitrogen in the form of nitrates, which are directly available to plants. Since the amount of organic matter and nitrogen is low in the soils of Texas especially in the sandy soils in the eastern part of the state the use of suitable and adaptable legumes to supply these constituents would be given serious consideration. Several years ago the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station began experiments to determine the legumes

best adapted for soil improvement in different parts of the state. Many varieties of both summer and winter legumes have been included in the work at most of the substations. Of the many legumes tested, hairy vetch made the largest and most consistent yields of forage on the sandy soils in the eastern part of the state. It produced an average yield of 1.53 tons of air-dry forage per acre at Tyler, 1.57 tons at Nacogdoches, and 2.47 tons at College Station. These yields of dry forage are equivalent to approximately 6 to 10 tons of green matter per acre which when plowed under would add 100 to 170 pounds of nitrogen per acre. Oregon common and purple vetch were the next best-yielding varieties at Tyler and white clover and red clover were the second and third ranking varieties at Nacogdoches.

In the Gulf Coast Prairie hairy vetch also made the largest yield, 2.11 tons of forage per acre. Red, subterranean, and white clovers followed, with yields of about one and one-half tons per acre. At Beaumont subterranean and red clovers made the largest average yields, 2.52 and 1.61 tons of forage per acre respectively. Alsike clover produced 1.31 tons of forage.

The sweet clovers have been the best legumes on the dark soils at Denton in central north Texas. At that point biennial white sweet clover produced the largest average yield, 1.71 tons per acre, while biennial yellow followed next with a yield of 1.63 tons. Black medic, which belongs to the bur clover family, made an average yield of 1.20 tons per acre.

In the southern part of the blackland belt from Temple southward and in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, Hubam clover has been the most satisfactory winter legume. In fact at Beeville, it has been the only successful legume, where it made an average yield of 1.95 tons per acre. At Weslaco in the Rio

Grande Valley, Hubam clover has made unusually large yields, 7.42 ton of dry forage per acre. It has proved to be an excellent green-manure crop in citrus orchards on irrigated land. Annual yellow sweet clover, Tangier peas, and subterranean clover also have done well at Weslaco, where they yielded 3.35, 3.85, and 3.18 tons of forage per acre, respectively. Purple vetch and Hubam clover made the largest yields at Winter Haven, producing 1.97 and 1.54 tons per acre.

None of the winter-growing legumes have been successful over a period of years at Iowa Park, Chillicothe, Lubbock, Spur, and Balmorhea, in the western part of the state. This is probably due to a lack of moisture and to cold weather. Some of the legumes, especially hairy vetch, are winter hardy, under those conditions and their failure is due largely to lack of moisture. The failure of winter legumes in this region, however, is not of very much importance because green manures have not been very effective in increasing the

yield of following crops. To summarize briefly, hairy vetch has been the most suitable winter legume for soil improvement on the sandy soils in the eastern part of the state and on the soils of the Gulf Coast Prairie. The biennial sweet clovers have been the best soil-improving legumes for central north Texas and Hubam clover for the southern blacklands and the Rio Grande Valley. None of the winter legumes have done well in western and northwestern Texas.

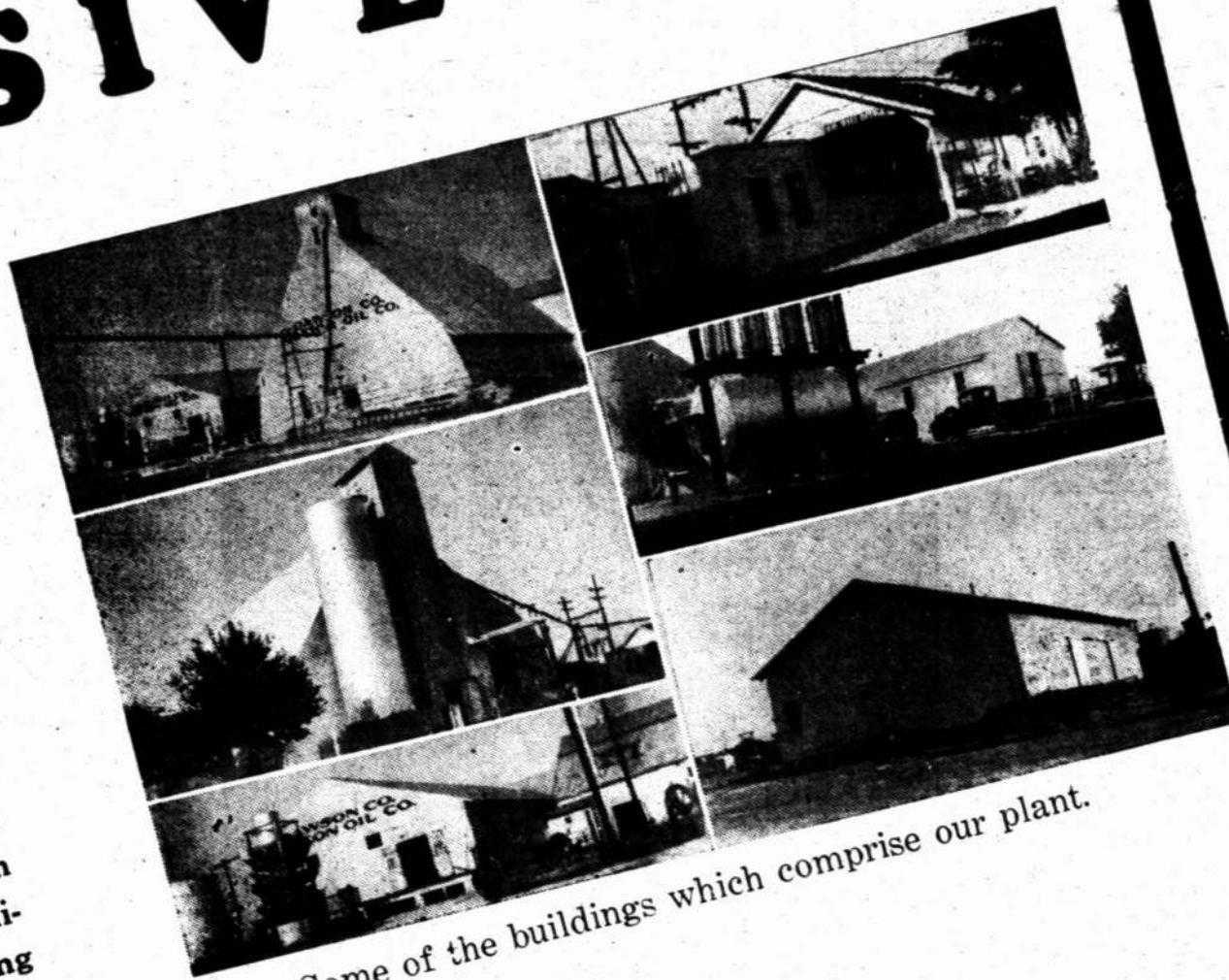
