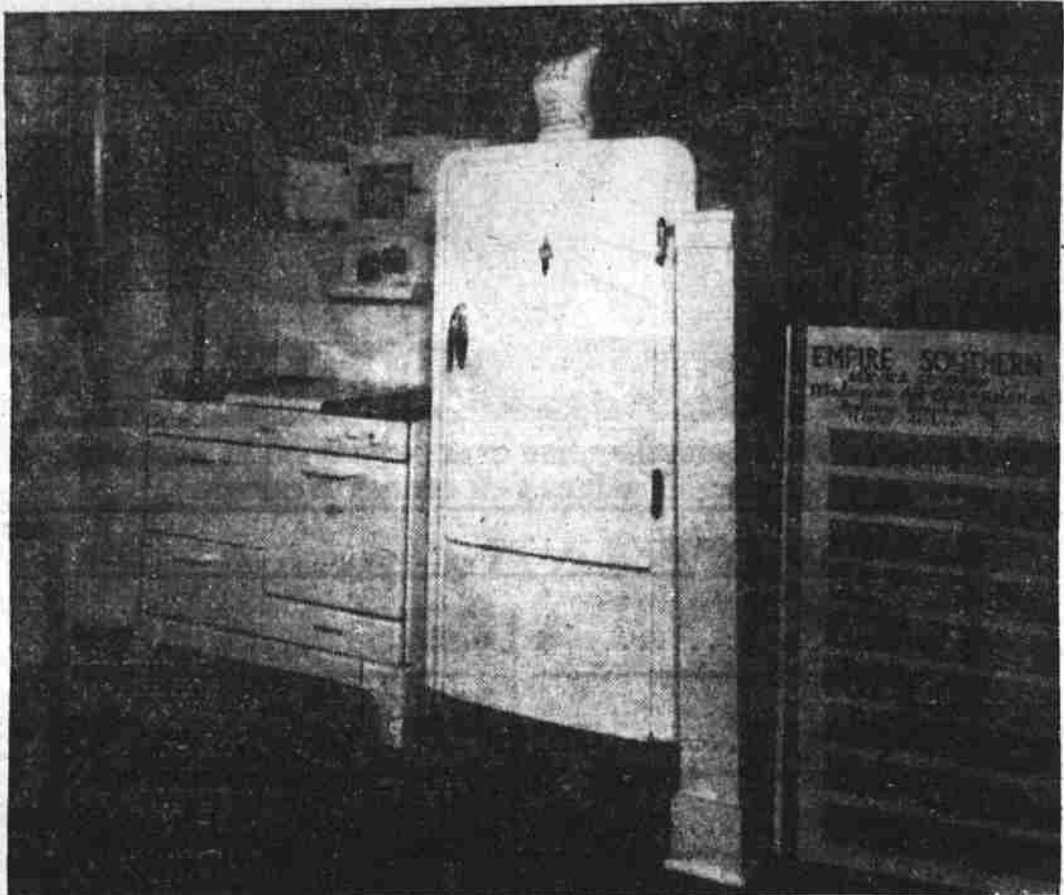
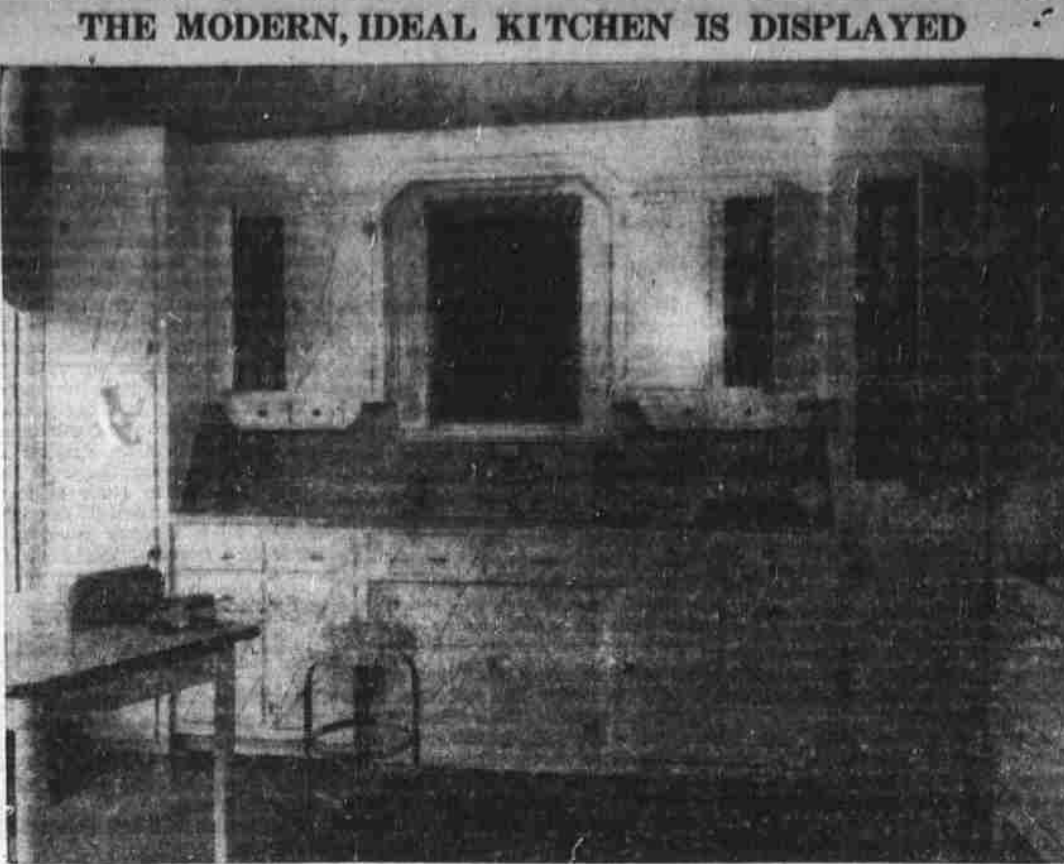

CATTLE IMPORTS TO U. S. NEAR QUOTA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—The customs bureau announced today imports of cattle weighing 700 pounds or more under provisions of the Canadian trade agreement between Jan. 1 and Nov. 7 totaled 155,366 head, or 99.7 per cent of the year's quota.

Imports of dairy cows weighing 700 pounds or more in the same period were listed at 5,382 head, or 26.9 per cent of the quota.

British Pottery Boom

The picture offered her only a small role, yet she emerged virtually a star. She was signed by another company and was to have had a starring role.

Twice a production date was set for the film. Each time her failing health prevented it. She was bitterly disappointed.

"Life's too short," she said in one of her last interviews. "I am past 70, and yet I pray God for a few more years in which to bring some sunshine and happiness into the lives of people."

"I want to be gay, to dance and sing on the screen, to be a comedienne like Marie Dressler herself. And I know I can do it."

"I know because I have had so many sorrows myself, so much hardship, I have suffered, so I can bring happiness to others if they will only let me."

FORMER SENATOR IS KILLED IN MISHAP

HILLSBORO, Nov. 18. (AP)—Former State Senator Ed Westbrook, widely known in political and legal circles, was killed in an automobile accident one mile north of Hillsboro late yesterday.

Westbrook, whose home was in Sherman, was found in the wreckage of his car by a passing motorist who rushed him to a Hillsboro hospital where he was pronounced dead.

No one witnessed the accident. It occurred on a sharp curve just before the highway reaches a Missouri-Kansas-Texas underpass. The car careened through a guard railing and crashed into the railroad dump. Westbrook was traveling south.

Westbrook was first a member of the legislature from Hunt county and later state senator from the tenth district. He also served in the state senate from the ninth district.

A scholar and reviewer of known reputation is Miss Evelyn Oppenheimer of Dallas, who will appear in Big Spring the afternoon of December 3 to give a review, under auspices of the 1936 Hyperion club, of V. Sackville-West's outstanding biography, "St. Joan of Arc."

Miss Oppenheimer received her Ph. D. degree in literature and philosophy at the University of Chicago and was graduated with Phi Beta Kappa honors. She is a member of the Chicago Poetry Society and has held the position of literary critic on Chicago newspapers.

A book reviewer of long experience, she received personal recognition from Margaret Mitchell for her interpretation of Miss Mitchell's best-seller, "Gone With the Wind."

Miss Oppenheimer has written Hyperion club members that she considers the Sackville-West story of the Maid of Orleans a distinctive work of its kind, describing the biography as a "literary event."

Foods On Display By Pantry Demonstrator Valued At \$101.82

The 318 quarts of home-canned products and the cured foods which were displayed by Mrs. Louise Matthies, pantry demonstrator for the Highway Home Demonstration Club, at an achievement program today are valued at \$101.82.

Included in the canned foods are 31 varieties, and in the cured are eight varieties. Much of the food has been conserved by Mrs. Matthies, but that which she could not grow and conserve has been obtained by exchanging fresh produce from their farm at the market.

Mrs. Matthies says the cream and eggs from their farm pay for all foods bought in town.

In addition to conserving these foods, Mrs. Matthies has, this year, papered the shelves and walls of the pantry with light colored building paper to add light; has labeled

all containers with uniform labels; organized the foods according to the class in which they belong; and labeled all shelves; and has provided bins for cured foods by using large boxes which she reconstructed, giving them a sloping front for more convenience.
