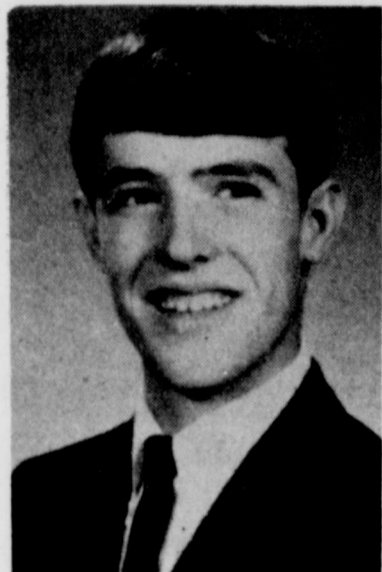

## FOR OUTSTANDING WORK

### Abernathy Youth Winner Of \$500 4-H Scholarship

#### ...Receives Scholarship

COLLEGE STATION (Sp1). Two West Texas boys have been named winners of C. J. Davidson \$500 Scholarships, state 4-H officials announced today. Kerby Ray Spruiell, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Spruiell of Abernathy in Hale County, and Dennis Wayne Newton, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Newton of Enochis in Cochran County, will receive the awards in recognition of their outstanding work in 4-H, community and school affairs. The scholarships are two of the several administered through the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation to aid students with their college education.

Dennis is a recent graduate of Bula High School where he was president of the student body and sergeant-at-arms of the student council. He played football, basketball and baseball for four years. He was elected captain of the football team and has been a member of the district-winning debate team for four years.

Dennis is vice president of his local 4-H Club and has raised show pigs and breeding stock as projects during his six years in the club. He has won awards for his swine production, livestock production, leadership and was named Gold Star Boy. He has attended several leadership camps and workshops.

He has spent three years in Future Farmers of America and has been president for all three years. He has attended area conventions and two state conventions. Kerby graduated from Abernathy High School this year where he was an officer of the National Honor Society and Salutatorian of his class. He was a member of the drama club and competed in the University Interscholastic League science contest. He was also on the honor roll.

He has spent seven years in 4-H work and completed projects in leadership, public speaking, entomology, recreation, electricity, homestead improvement, safety, swine, field crops, food and nutrition and food preservation.

Kerby has been local president of his 4-H Club, county parliamentarian and district 2 council delegate. He was the Gold Star Boy in 1967 and was on the entomology team which won first in county, district and state competition and he won first in district public speaking. He was named the winner of the Plainview Kiwanis Club 4-H Award and the Farm Bureau 4-H Leadership Award. He has won a total of 108 ribbons in his 4-H Club work.

He has attended district leadership and electric camps and the state conference on resources. He has also attended the State 4-H Roundup. He is a member of two district and 12 county committees and has served as a junior leader in public speaking and electricity.

While in FFA he was awarded the State Farmer Degree and the honor of chapter and district Star Farmer. He was a delegate to both national and state conventions.

Dennis plans to use his scholarship to attend Texas A & M University and study agronomy.

Kerby hopes to major in either electrical engineering or political science at Bethany Nazarene College.

Claudie E. Williams, Jr., 1968 AHS Valedictorian and Nineteenth Congressional District Appointee to the United States Military Academy, will matriculate into the Academy located at West Point, New York at 9:00 a.m. Monday, July 1.

Departing from the Lubbock Municipal Airport Sunday, June 30, at 7:10 a.m., Claudy's plane will carry him to Dallas where he will fly directly to John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York City.

The Braniff International flight on which Claudy will be riding is scheduled to land in New York at 12:46 p.m., Eastern Daylight Saving Time. From there, Claudy will travel by automobile to Wilmington, Delaware, where he will spend the night of June 30 with his aunt and uncle.

Claudie will officially become a member of the "Long Gray Line", which extends over 166 years of our country's history and includes such distinguished names as Grant, Lee, Pershing, MacArthur, and Eisenhower, at 5:00 p.m. Monday when he takes the Oath of Allegiance.

For the next two months, Claudie will undergo a period of intensive training and strenuous physical exertion. The specific purpose of this summer program is to acquaint the new cadet with the demands that will be made on him as an officer in the United States Corps of Cadets.

During the first month of training, Claudie will be allowed no visitors. In the second month, he may have visitors on either Saturday or Sunday afternoons, but not both, provided his privileges have not been restricted.

Two weeks ago, Claudie was presented a West Texas Outstanding Scholar Award by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. As well as being valedictorian of his graduating class, he received the 1968 AHS Citizenship Award at the May 27 commencement exercises.

Other achievements of this past year include his being editor-in-chief of the Abernathy High School newspaper, president of the National Honor Society, Who's Who in Journalism at Abernathy High, 1967 Texas American Legion Boys State Delegate, and a member of the AHS Student Council.

He is the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Claudie E. Williams, Sr., 1206 13th Street. Earlier this year he was offered a four-year Army ROTC scholarship by the Department of the Army, a cadetship to the Virginia Military Institute, and a \$1200 V.M.I. scholarship; however, upon his appointment to West Point, he forfeited each.

During their four months at OCS, the candidates spent

a total of 520 hours on military, tactical, organizational, and technological subjects. In addition to the classroom time, two hours a day was devoted either to close order drill, swimming lessons, physical training or similar activities.

Candidates received actual sea-going experience aboard a squadron of Yard Patrol Craft which are attached to the school and operate daily on Narragansett Bay near Newport.

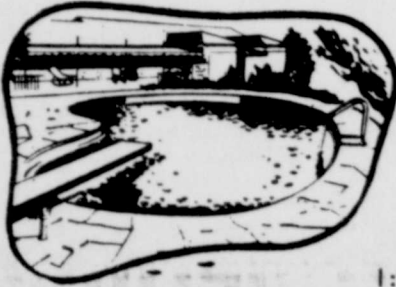

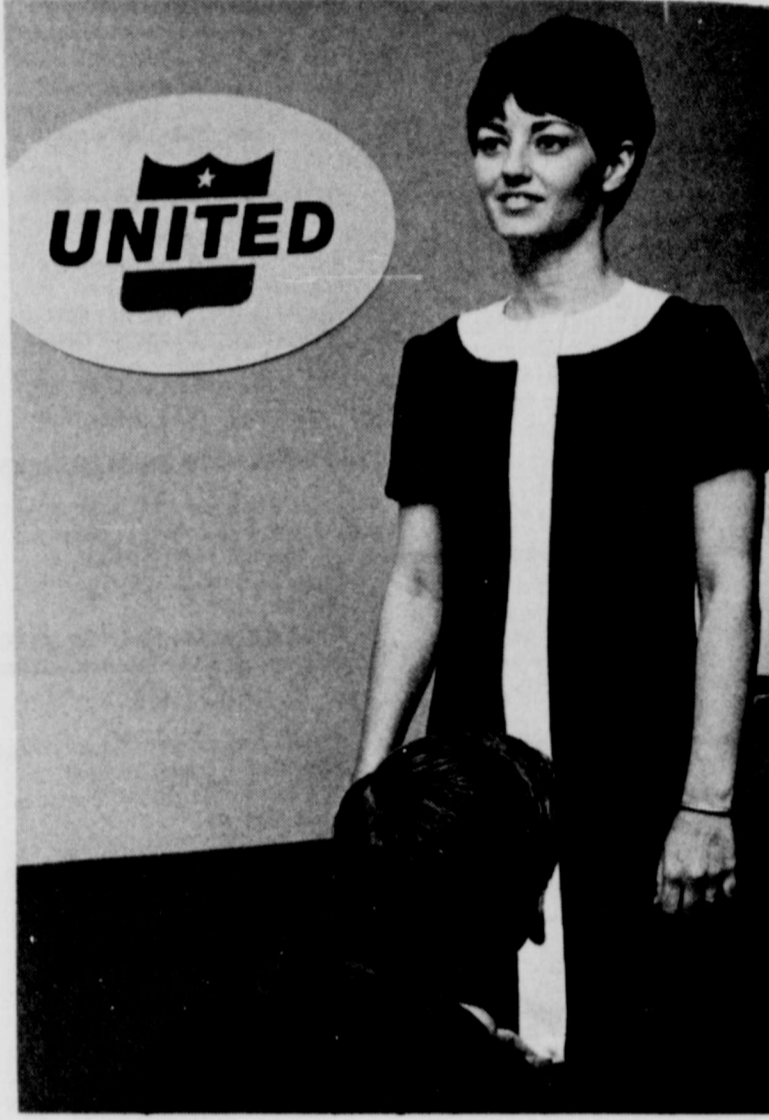

### New Musical Opens At Hayloft July 2

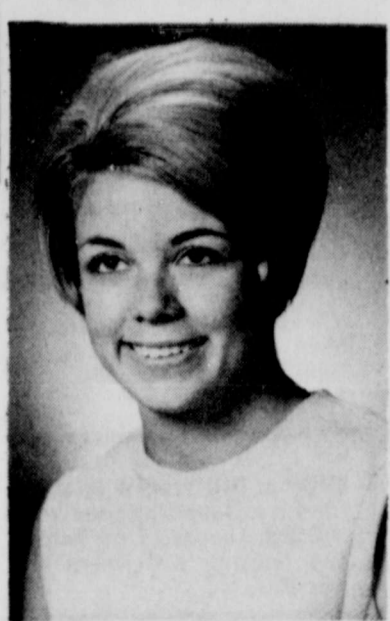

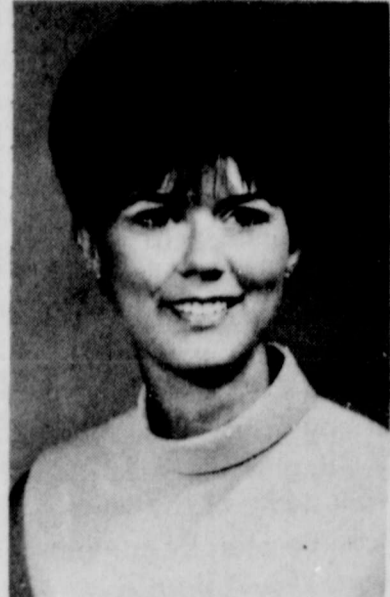



**AG EDUCATORS  
 TO VISIT HERE**

The Texas Young Farmer Program will be in the spotlight during the week of July 8 through 12 as approximately forty Kansas and Oklahoma educators study Young Farmer programs in the northern half of Texas. The group, made up of Vocational Agriculture teachers and teacher-educators of the two states, will spend five days visiting Young Farmer members, field days, and various educational activities across Texas. Dr. Ray Agan, Head of Agricultural Education Department of Kansas State University, and Dr. Robert Price, Head of Agricultural Education Department of Oklahoma State University, are heading the educational tour. Coordinating the tour in Texas is Billy Conner, Executive Secretary of Young Farmers of Texas of Austin.

Traveling in a chartered bus, the group will cover almost 1,000 miles while visiting in Texas from Paris (in northeast Texas) to Tulla in the Texas panhandle. **ABERNATHY MAN**

**Settlement In Damage Suit  
 Possibly Sets State Record**

AN ORDER approving what probably is the largest settlement ever in a single-injury damage suit filed in Texas was signed Friday by Judge William R. Shaver in 72nd District Court.

The \$345,000 agreed settlement order was signed in Lubbock following a pretrial hearing on a suit resulting from a Jan. 25 traffic mishap involving Agustin Cerda, a 42-year-old Abernathy man, and a truck driven by an employee of Steere Tank Lines, Inc.

Shaver said the amount is about three times the amount of the previous high award involving a single-injury damage suit in Lubbock County.

Figures supplied by the Southwest Index Bureau of Dallas indicated the settlement might be the largest amount for such an agreed settlement ever obtained in Texas, according to an attorney for the plaintiff.

Settlements in single-injury damage suits not involving insurance companies might not be reflected in the Southwest Index Bureau of Dallas indicated.

The suit settled Friday was brought by Cerda against Steere Tank Lines, Inc., and Roy Lee Payne, both of Lubbock. The suit alleged Cerda is totally paralyzed as a result of injuries suffered in a collision between his car and a truck driven by Payne about 1.3 miles south of Abernathy on U.S. 87. Cerda was seeking judgment for \$945,000.

Cerda, who has three children, was employed by the Randolph Manufacturing Co. of Lubbock prior to the collision. He also was pastor of a Nazarene church located in Abernathy.

He still is hospitalized, Shaver said.

An unusual use of evidence was made in the case, according to Shaver, when the plaintiff introduced a color film showing a day in the life of Cerda as a patient at Methodist Hospital, Shaver said.

Film frequently is introduced in such cases by the defense, in order to prove the plaintiff is not injured as he claims, but rarely introduced by the plaintiff to support his claim of disability. Such film probably would have been admissible as evidence into the trial of the case, Shaver added.

Elements considered in arriving at a settlement figure included Cerda's loss of earnings for the remainder of his life and past and future medical expenses.

The suit had been scheduled for trial Monday before a civil jury in 72nd District Court.

figures, the attorney noted. Shaver indicated attorney's fees would amount to about one third of the total of the agreed settlement.

The suit settled Friday was brought by Cerda against Steere Tank Lines, Inc., and Roy Lee Payne, both of Lubbock. The suit alleged Cerda is totally paralyzed as a result of injuries suffered in a collision between his car and a truck driven by Payne about 1.3 miles south of Abernathy on U.S. 87. Cerda was seeking judgment for \$945,000.

Cerda, who has three children, was employed by the Randolph Manufacturing Co. of Lubbock prior to the collision. He also was pastor of a Nazarene church located in Abernathy.

He still is hospitalized, Shaver said.

An unusual use of evidence was made in the case, according to Shaver, when the plaintiff introduced a color film showing a day in the life of Cerda as a patient at Methodist Hospital, Shaver said.

Film frequently is introduced in such cases by the defense, in order to prove the plaintiff is not injured as he claims, but rarely introduced by the plaintiff to support his claim of disability. Such film probably would have been admissible as evidence into the trial of the case, Shaver added.

Elements considered in arriving at a settlement figure included Cerda's loss of earnings for the remainder of his life and past and future medical expenses.

The suit had been scheduled for trial Monday before a civil jury in 72nd District Court.
