

"Big Red" Band Grows to 100 Under Direction of Willis Parker

BAIRD — The Baird "Big Red" Marching band made its first appearance in U.I.L. competitive events in four years by participating in the Region 7-A marching contest held in Brady Saturday, Nov. 20. They received an overall rating of II on an adjusted rating scale of I thru V. Since approximately five of the 32 bands in the contest received ratings of I, local bandmen are proud to achieve the II rating on their first outing.

In the twirling competition, Anita Hambrick received a rating of I. Sally Robertson was rated II and a trio (Anita Hambrick, Carmen Deel and Tammy Brown) were rated II.

School officials and fans were well pleased with the band's performance and feel that the band and Mr. Willis Parker, director, are to be commended for their fine effort, as well as for the remarkable progress they have shown during the past two school years.

The band has grown steadily, both in quality and quantity since Mr. Parker began working with the group in August, 1969. His first called rehearsal here yielded 31 musicians 20 of whom were sixth graders. The program now includes 100 students. Sixty-eight members from grades 7-12 make up the "Big Red" band, and the 5th and 6th grade group has 32 members.

After the Thanksgiving holidays, rehearsals will begin for the Symphonic Stage Band. About 30-34 members will participate in this group with all rehearsals and work done on the students' own time after school.

The coming weeks will also include much preparation for the U.I.L. Solo and Ensemble

Contest February 26 in Brownwood, and the U.I.L. Concert and Sightreading Contest at the new high school auditorium in Ballinger on March 24.

Expansion of the program to include competition brings new opportunities in the music field to these students. It also adds many hours of hard work by the students and their director, who not only has the responsibility of getting 600 hands, feet and lips going in the same key, at the same pace, in the right place, but must also contend with their instruments, music, uniforms and transportation.

The later sometimes presents its problems at the most inopportune times, as evidenced by the events of last Saturday.

As the time for departure of the polished crew drew near, a phone call brought news of the illness of a lead-off member. There was no alternative but to embark, minus one, and make the best of it. This proved difficult, though, since the bus had a flat. Music had to be retrieved so a car was dispatched for this job. It, too, promptly developed a flat.

But young musicians and their leaders are not easily discouraged. They made their trip, represented their school and community to the best of their ability and returned ready to work toward greater achievement.

Coach Wilson Praises 1971 Bears For "A Job Well Done"

BAIRD — Head football coach "Bo" Wilson and his coaching staff are to be applauded for their outstanding year at Baird High. A great asset to the school and this community, and they will always be remembered for what they have achieved in uplifting the spirits of these young men and women of this school.

Coach Wilson came to Baird facing one of the hardest handicaps ever to face any coach, lack of spirit. He had to lift the spirits of these students and teach them determination. The football team was dead on its feet, without many wins, and in a rut. Coach Wilson took this team and made fighting Bears and the result was nine wins and one loss for 1971.

An interview with Coach Wilson this week, as he relates his great year at Baird High School, follows:

"I am extremely proud of our 1971 football team. I feel that the accomplishments they achieved were a credit to our school and community. I just hope everyone realizes how far these boys have come and what they did accomplish during this past season. It was a tremendous honor for us to have played for the District 7-A championship. I think it was an extremely well-played football game. A very good Albany team won, and a very good Baird football team came in second. Every community needs to experience the atmosphere that prevailed during the Baird-Albany week. I think that such an atmosphere can produce more community pride than any other event."

Coach Wilson stated that this season had a great impact upon the boys who played and will also inspire those who will return next year, and will keep this feeling of pride alive at

Baird High. The team's accomplishments during the 1971 season was a record of 9-1; scoring 326 points in 10 games, highest scoring in the district. The team ranked second with 58 points being scored against a team in a season.

David Strickland, one of the most outstanding young men on the squad, ended the year with 17 touchdowns and 102 points for a great record. He gained over 1,000 yards rushing, the leading scorer in District 7-A, ranking third in the Big Country which includes 3-A, 2-A and A schools. This young man will indeed be rewarded for his outstanding ability and for his sportsmanship this season.

Cecil Faircloth, a marked target for every game this season, ends his fine senior year with slightly less than 1,000 yards gained, 11 touchdowns, and 74 points. A marked target means, if we can stop Faircloth, maybe we can keep their scoring down, however, when the target was stopped, Strickland came on like a herd of wild Bears, so nothing worked for the opponents, the Bears would not be stopped.

Quarterback Gary Goble did

a fine job running the Veer T offensive attack for the Bears. He finishes high among scoring leaders in District 7-A. Goble's execution of the option play was the key to Faircloth's and Strickland's ability to have the ball at the right time.

The great leadership of Billy Denman, the only senior starter in the interior line, did much to help stay in there and get the job done well. The remaining seniors, Elzaim Rodriguez, Manuel Gonzales, Yogi Garcia, these boys led the way in showing what loyalty and pride can accomplish. Great appreciation is extended to Randy Bates for his help to all as manager - this will be remembered by both coaches and the team.

The 1972 football team has had a great example laid before them. It could and should be another exciting year, with 25 boys returning from this record-setting team, plus a good group of 8th grade boys coming in as freshmen. The Bears should have enough boys participating to have a J.V. game schedule, which is needed to have a strong program in football.

Heading the list of returning Bears next year is Jay Mike Reeves, who not only will be the strongest quarterback in the district, but already has established himself as a solid kicker as well as a passer. He came onto the field many times this year for place kicking, to add up the score for the Bears.

Joining Reeves will be Dicky Greenway, Pud Jaggars, Brian Hughes, Danny Vestal, Butch Barron, who are already two-year lettermen. Others are Tommy Neal, Terry Bates, Robert Grant, Jimmy Meador, Byron Hatchett, Billy Charles

Hatchett, David Smauley, Mike Tollett, Bill Windham, Wayne Fielder, Russell Van Der Linden, Andy Vestal, Don Kelly, Steve Bryan, Jim King, Jim Wilson, Rudy Rodriguez, and Grabel Rodriguez. Returning with this team will be the trainer Larry Newton and manager Craig Franke.

Coach Wilson stated at the end of his interview. "I hope everyone is proud of these young men - I can assure you the coaching staff of Baird High School is. It has been a privilege to have had the opportunity to be associated with each and everyone of the 1971 Bears, and to the seniors, special thanks for a job well done."

"Our football team of 1971 has completed one of the best seasons registered here in several years. This feat was not accomplished by accident. Our players and coaches worked many dedicated hours achieving this goal. Anything other than true champions would be unfair to our coaches and players."

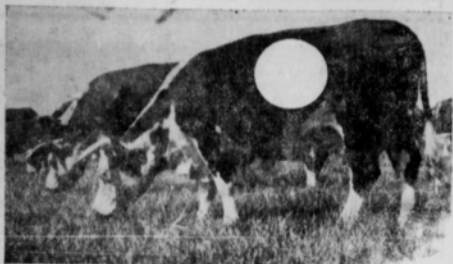

Another rule necessary for an understanding of the scriptures is that one must not take things for granted which God has not expressly stated in His word. A lot of confusion exists about what the scriptures teach because people read things into the Bible which the Bible does not say. The Bible warns us not to add anything to what God says, nor to take away anything from what it teaches.

"For I testify unto every man that heareth the words of the prophecy of this book, If any man shall add unto these things, God shall add unto him the plagues that are written in this book: And if any man shall take away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part out of the book of life, and out of the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book." (Rev. 22:18,19).

The Apostle Paul said, "But though we or an angel from heaven preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed." (Gal. 1:8)

Two of the most misunderstood passages in the Bible are the result of violating this principle of understanding the scriptures. It is because of adding in one instance and subtracting from what God said in the other instance.

Some people say John 3:16 teaches that we are saved by faith ONLY. It doesn't say that! The word "only" or "alone" does not appear in the verse at all. Nor is there any other verse in the Bible that teaches that man is saved by faith ALONE. James says, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith ONLY." (James 2:24)
