FIRST AUCTION SALES TO BE HELD MONDAY

Interscholastic Meet Opens In Lamesa Friday

Schools Of County Will Compete For Honors At Affair

Large Crowds Expected For Two Day Meet

The Dawson County Interscholastic League annual meet will be held this week at the Lamesa Public Schools.

Contests in music memory, picture memory, arithmetic, Ready Writing, Typing, Shorthand, Story Telling and the various speech contests such as declamation, extemporaneous and debates are to be held Friday, March 24. The declamation events will begin at 9:15 a. m. in the high school auditorium. Story telling for small pupils will be conducted in the elementary school auditorium to be followed by the debating contests for high school boys and girls. Likewise the extemporaneous speech contests are to be held there in the afternoon.

Choral Singing will be held Thursday night at the high school auditorium. The one-act play contest is to be held on Friday night at the high school. Three schools, Union, Klondike and Lamesa are entered in this event.

Tennis and playground ball contests will be conducted Friday on local courts on the campus and on the old baseball grounds south of town.

Preliminaries in track and field will be held Friday afternoon and finals will be held on Saturday afternoon.

All schools of the county but two are members this year. The officers of the League are:

It is expected that more than one thousand pupils will take part in one or more events of the County Meet, to which the public is invited.

DAW-TEX WELL IS STEADILY GOING DEEPER

After considerable trouble as the result of a crushed casing, the Daw-Tex well, located ten miles north of Lamesa, is again going forward.

They were drilling at 4450 feet in oil stained lime, when a section of casing crushed. After removing as much casing as possible, it was found that more than six hundred feet remained at the bottom of the hole. So much trouble was experienced, that it was thought for a time that a new hole would have to be drilled, however, the difficulty was overcome, and they are now drilling at 4,100 feet.

They expect to reach the original depth of 4450 feet by the latter part of the week, when seamless casing will be set and standard tools moved back into the hole.

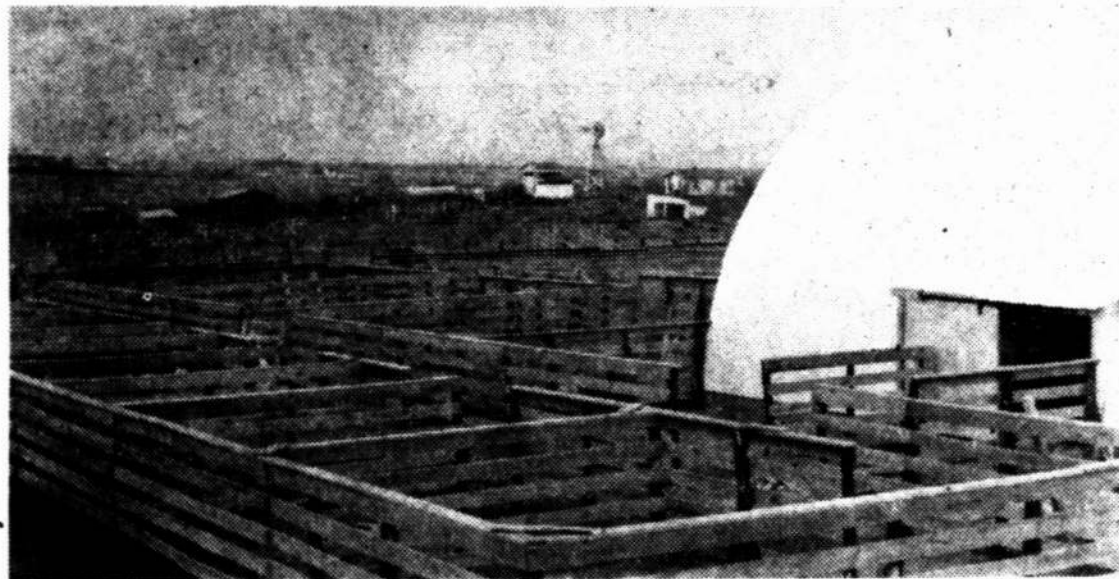
An erroneous report was published in one of the down state papers that the well had struck sulphur water, but this has been emphatically denied by company officials, who have the geologists reports to substantiate their statements.

Before the shutdown they had drilled for two hundred and fifty feet in oil stained lime and oil odor lime, very porous. The well is running high from the Albaugh well.

Auction Barn Where Sales Will Be Held

Tremendous Crowds Are Expected For Opening

Culminating a long cherished dream among many business men and farmers of Lamesa and Dawson County, will be the opening of the regular weekly Auction Sales of the Dawson County Auction and Commission Company here next Monday.

For the past several months, interested citizens have sought a business of this kind for Lamesa, and several meetings were called by the Chamber of Commerce to arouse interest in the project. Several offers from out of town concerns to open here were rejected, because it was felt that if competent local men took hold of the deal it would be better for all parties concerned.

Several weeks ago E. E. Barron, Leonard Breeding and Sol Cleveland were appointed on a committee following one of these meetings to investigate the interest in such a move. Following a survey of many of the cattle breeders of the county, they decided they would

If you have cattle to sell, bring them in Monday. If it's horses and mules, bring them in on Wednesday. These Wednesday sales will be held until further notice.

sponsor the movement themselves. They immediately set to work to build a plant adequate to handle the needs of a much wider territory than Dawson County embraces.

On the highway in South Lamesa, they have just completed a large auction barn, with some four dozen pens. Next Monday at eleven o'clock they will begin their first sale. Kenneth Bozeman, widely known auctioneer, will handle the sales.

Inside the big barn, upon entering, the business officers are at the left, with a cafe on the right next to the front door. Immediately in the center at the back is the auction ring. On either side of the ring, seats have been erected for buyers, sellers and spectators. They can easily seat three hundred in these seats which are pyramidically up from the auction ring. After the cattle are sold, they are turned to the south, where they cross the Fairbanks-Morse scales for weighing, before leaving the building through a large door on the south side.

The pens have been so arranged, that cattle from any pen on the entire

With a normal head, the body separated to form two complete bodies, each with two hind legs and a tail. The front part of the body has two normal legs and feet, while another leg comes out of the back where the two bodies join and on this there are two perfectly formed feet.

Sales Show Increase Chevrolet Truck

Border strips will be used by many farmers in the Lamesa area this year to protect their fields against wind erosion damage and also to provide food and shelter for wildlife, according to SCS Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service demonstration area located here.

Acres where border strips will be planted usually are those especially subject to wind erosion. A narrow strip of sudan grass or grain sorghum along the field borders will check soil blowing from adjacent fields or roadways and at the same time will favor the development of a desirable species of birds and animals.

The clean cultivation of large areas of farm land has been an important factor in the depletion of wildlife, and thus favored the increase of insect pests which native birds and animals on the farm tend to keep under control.

From a wildlife standpoint, the development of border strips of protective vegetation is more desirable than the same area of vegetation in a compact block. Such strips provide travel lanes for birds and small animals and afford more extensive range into adjoining fields.

Gullies and other severely eroded areas also provide ideal sites for the use of plants and shrubs that will serve the dual purpose of controlling erosion and improving wildlife environment on the farm or ranch.

Strip cropping used with border strips also make ideal travel lanes for wildlife, such as quail and permits them to range over the entire field. If wildlife continues to increase for five years as rapidly as it has in the Lamesa area the past two years, it will be a big factor toward the eradication of insects.

Never beat dough for cakes or bread because this will separate the starch from the gluten, thereby making a tough stretchy dough. EVENING AND PART TIME CLASSES OFFER OPPORTUNITY FOR ADVANCEMENT

A young man recently asked an old-

er friend: "I wonder what the future has in store for me?" The friend replied: "What the future has in store for you will, to a considerable extent, depend what you put in store for the

future— what you are doing with your time, interest, energy and ability to make the future produce something worthwhile for you."

The friend being anxious to help the young man inquired into his thinking and habits. He found that since being graduated from high school the young man had not spent a minute of study of anything he had thought that all that in business all one did was to work and by some process of hit or miss be later selected for an executive position. But it doesn't work out that way in business, any more than it does in any other vocational or professional field.

The local high school, realizing the need of further study for advancement is offering evening and part-time classes.

Evening classes meet after 6 p. m., usually 7 or 8, and hold for one or two hours. Any person 16 years of age or over who is employed is eligible to take part in such classes that relate to their occupation. Courses may include any subject that will add to occupational efficiency. Subjects taught, for example, include such subjects as: carburetion, electrical principles, business management, salesmanship, meat cutting, lubrication, trade mathematics, building codes, etc. Courses are organized to meet the needs of different occupational groups such as auto mechanics, electricians, retail salesmen, service station operators, butchers, carpenters, plumbers, etc. At least twelve persons must enroll to operate the class. Those interested in studying their occupations should let their desires be known to Mr. Chas. T. Hatchett, local coordinator.

An evening class in salesmanship is now in progress, meeting Tuesday and Friday evenings at 8, room 110, High School. Eighteen persons are enrolled in this class and there is room for several more. Any person employed in selling who is 16 years of age or over is eligible to take part in the class.

Part time classes have the same age and employment requirements. The classes are held between 4 and 6 p. m. in rooms 207 and 208, High School. Miss Commie Zell Barnes is in charge of these classes in short hand, typing, and bookkeeping. Those employed in office work, who wish to review may enter these courses at any time.

Robert Fehner, the director of the CCC, states that in recent years these open house celebrations have served a very useful purpose. "They have aided in the development and maintenance of good relations between the CCC Camps and surrounding communities. They have also furnished the public with an opportunity to inspect the CCC Camps and to look over the work which the enrollees are doing."

The purpose of the CCC as originally conceived by President Roosevelt is to conserve the natural resources of

this great country of ours, build the youth of the nation, and relieve unemployment. The initial CCC legislation was enacted on March 31, 1933. Five days later, on April 5, President Roosevelt issued the executive order creating the CCC organization and arranging for the appointment of a director and the cooperation of government departments in the administration of the program. The first man was selected on April 7 and the first camp established on April 17.

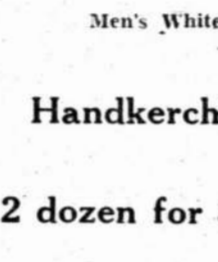

red in daylight than in darkness, and 56 per cent of all accidents were in clear weather. Twilight is a very dangerous period.

Passenger cars were involved in 70 per cent of all accidents, and head-on collisions and angle collisions top the list in manner of collision. Male drivers involved outnumbered female drivers nearly 8 to 1, and 77 per cent of all drivers were white. The age of drivers varied from 17 drivers under 14 years, to 403 from 19 to 25 years.

Many accidents were caused by passing on hills; passing on right-hand side; drivers not having right-of-way; and a large number showed no improper driving—they just happened. The driver may have been dialing his radio, looking at an advertising sign, or trying to avoid hitting a chicken or animal crossing the road.

The majority of accidents occurred when the drivers were apparently normal. 176 had been drinking, 41 were fatigued or asleep, and 38 were blinded by glaring lights. In 21 per cent of all fatal accidents, the driver had been drinking, and 21 per cent of the fatal accidents were head-on collisions with another vehicle.

No matter how good a driver you are, you may be involved in an accident through no fault of your own. So be careful—don't take chances; respect the other fellow's rights; dim your lights at night; see that your car is under control; and don't try to mix drinking and driving.

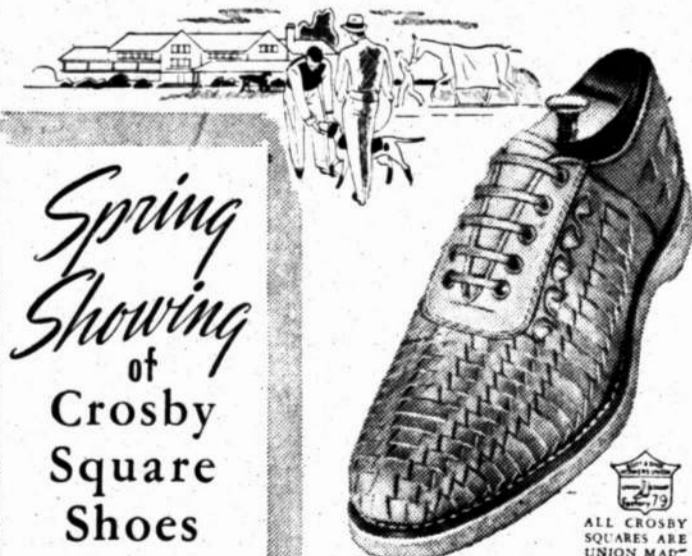
Less Accidents Reported in Texas During January

The Traffic and Safety Division of the Texas Highway Department has just issued a summary of accidents for the month of January 1939. This summary includes only such accidents as are reported to the Department, and while 100 per cent of the fatal accidents are reported, only 15 per cent of the non-fatal are reported. There were: 1,287 accidents, a reduction of 68 over January 1938. 131 persons killed, a reduction of 13 deaths, and 1,218 persons injured, a reduction of 160 injuries.

While the reduction over January 1938 is encouraging, there were actually 41 accidents, 4 deaths and 39 persons injured every day. They occurred at all hours of the day and night, with a low of 19 accidents between 5 and 6 a. m. and a high of 95 between 6 and 7 p. m., and 95 between 7 and 8 p. m. Wednesdays were low with 115, and Sundays high with 290. Saturdays ran second with 241. More accidents occur-

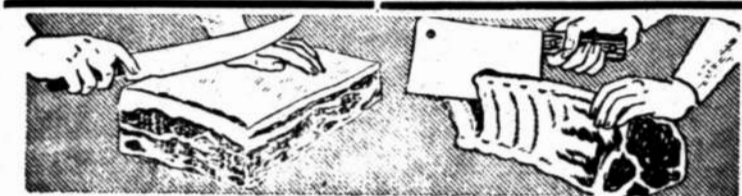

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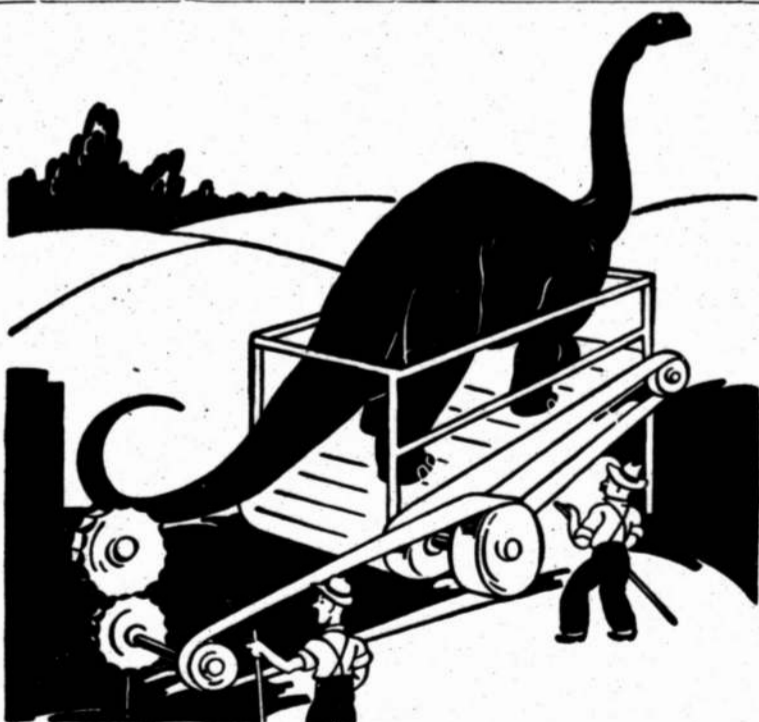

Remodel Building For Stuart-Sublett Dry Goods Company

EMERGENCY SHELF FOR MEALTIME SECURITY

Famous last words of many a funny paper husband have been "I've brought a couple of fellows home with me for dinner." In drama and fiction, too, authors have fairly well exhausted the embarrassing possibilities of having unexpected guests for a meal.

In real life, the situation is somewhat different. It isn't exactly funny, of course, to the woman who has to get the meal on the table. Neither, if she is foresighted, does it call for any kitchen heroics. Rather it is an intriguing challenge—a trial by fire—of her cooking imagination and skill.

At such times a homemaker can come off with colors flying if she has a well-stocked emergency food shelf on which to draw. This investment in mealtime security should be planned with an eye to the preparation of attractive meals on short notice.

One the shelf will be foods that keep well—some that can be adapted to many dishes. Mostly these foods will be those that can be prepared quickly. It should be possible to get almost a whole meal from the shelf. But usually it will be resorted to only to supplement what's on hand.

Charter members of any collection of emergency foods are cereals like macaroni, spaghetti, cornmeal, and rice that form the basis of many cheese and meat dishes. There also should be some form of dried or evaporated milk—a jar of salad dressing—some canned soup. And several kinds of canned meat or fish—vegetables—and fruits should be on hand.

In addition to these staples there may be some kind of the prepared quick-bread mixtures that have only to be mixed with liquid, then baked. Olives and pickles, jars of jelly or jam, a can of mushrooms, tins of crackers and cookies, some cheese in the ice box

or other foods that will add zest and variety.

A hostess might do well to imagine herself in a position where she is called upon to get a company meal in an hour or less—think what she'd have to eat—then stock the shelf with other supplies she'd need.

An emergency meal, like any other, to be substantial and satisfying, needs to center around meat or other protein food. Home-canned meats and canned fish of all kinds are ideal for getting ready in a hurry, because they have already been cooked during the canning. Like all meat cookery, the re-heating of them should be at a moderate temperature.

One substantial main dish made out of home-canned meat is a meat and onion sandwich. First cook sliced onions tender in water, broth or gravy. Thicken slightly with flour. Cook for a few minutes, then stir cut up meat into it. Heat thoroughly. Season with salt and pepper, celery seed—maybe some parsley and catsup. Use this as a filling for sandwiches of bread or with hot biscuits as shortcake. Pour gravy over the top.

A well-seasoned mixture of chopped canned meat and mashed potatoes or boiled rice, moistened with gravy, milk or tomatoes, may be used to stuff peppers or to roll up in green leaves of cabbage. Bake either of these for about half an hour in a moderate oven.

If there are no peppers or cabbage on hand, the same mixture with the meat ground up instead of chopped may be shaped into croquettes. These are dipped in diluted beaten eggs, then in bread crumbs, and fried in deep fat.

Canned tuna, salmon, mackerel, crab, may be scalloped quickly. Make a thin sauce of fat, flour, salt, and rich milk. Put fish in layers into a greased baking dish. Pour sauce over the fish, layer by layer. Cover with buttered crumbs, and cook in a moderate oven until the sauce bubbles through the crumbs.

Sardines, grilled and served on toast is a tasteful dish for a rush meal. Tuna fish creamed and served atop a fluffy pile of rice is another. Chipped beef on toast—scrambled eggs with mushrooms cut up in them—Welch rarebit—macaroni or spaghetti with cheese are a few old-time favorites.

There should be several cans of versatile tomatoes on any emergency shelf. These are invaluable for adding flavor as well as vitamin C to a number of dishes—canned meat in croquettes, for instance—or with cheese, eggs, and seasonings in a tomato rarebit. With onions, salt and pepper, cloves, and other suitable seasonings they may be thickened into a sauce to serve over spaghetti—on eggs baked on a bed of boiled rice—over lima beans.

They're good stewed with celery. And they may be heated, then flavored with crisp pieces of bacon and onion browned in butter. Sometimes they can even double for a salad—just served cold as they come from the can garnished with chopped parsley.

Other canned vegetables at home on an emergency shelf are corn, green beans, asparagus, green peas, beets. These may be served as an extra dish—battered—or a combination of them scalloped. Or one of them may be combined with a vegetable the homemaker has planned to serve to her family—so that there will be enough for 2 or 3 extra persons.

Tomato, corn, and cheese on toast is a dish that needs little cooking. All the makings can be from the emergency shelf.

Tomato, Corn, and Cheese on Toast
Brown three tablespoons of flour in a skillet. Remove from the skillet and blend with 2 tablespoons of melted butter or other fat. Brown one sliced onion in one tablespoon fat. Mix together in the skillet, the onion, the

flour and fat mixture, two cups canned tomatoes, two cups canned corn, two teaspoons salt. Cook for about 10 minutes. Stir in one-fourth pound of sharp cheese, shaved thin. When the cheese is melted, serve on thin toast.

Canned vegetables may be used to supplement fresh in salads. Or, if the necessity arises, it is possible to make a whole salad from the emergency shelf. An absence of lettuce doesn't mean that there needn't be a salad green. Green cabbage makes just as good a background. Watercress, dandelion greens, tender inside leaves of spinach are all good in salads.

Just a twist of the can opener will yield many good fruit desserts. With a little trouble, halves of canned apricots or peaches can be turned into a rousing meal finale. Drain the syrup from them. Place, pit side up, in a shallow baking dish. Pour a little melted butter over them, and salt. Broil under a flame or bake in an oven until the fruit is lightly browned. Serve hot.

Fruits may be made into shortcakes too, by the use of the prepared biscuit mixtures on the market. Or gingerbread may be baking during the main part of the meal—be hot and ready to serve with whipped cream or chocolate sauce for dessert. If cheese hasn't been served during the meal, crackers and cheese may be the final touch.

Dr. Cox Says:

One often hears about the good old days when grandfather was a boy but according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer, now are the good days for babies. A baby born today can expect to live until he is 62 years of age. This is almost twice the expectancy of babies born 100 years ago. There has been a gain of 14 years since 1900.

While still somewhat below the biblical promise of "three score and ten" Texans can look forward to reaching that goal within a few years.

The fact that a child born in 1938 who weathered the infantile storms of the first year could expect to live 62 years in contrast to the boy born in 1850, who could live only 38 years is a tribute to the American medical profession and the preventive technic of public health, Dr. Cox believes.

Vaccination is a preventative measure that saves thousands of lives annually. Prophylactic measures against typhoid, diphtheria and smallpox have greatly reduced the incidence of these diseases in Texas. Widespread sanitation efforts safeguard the water we drink, the food we eat and our environmental surroundings to lessen the spread of communicable disease germs.

Semi-annual physical examinations which have become a health habit for many of our citizens check illnesses at their onset and allow for simpler cures. Science has provided us with effective drugs to combat the spread of syphilis and gonorrhea, diseases which take an annual toll of blindness, insanity, locomotor ataxia, bone infection, enlargement of the arteries and deformity of infants.

Tuberculosis and cancer have been brought into the curable classification of diseases. All and all the last twenty years have seen the medical and public health professions making this a safer nation in which to live and at the same time a nation in which to live longer.

40 BANDS TO COMPETE IN BIG FESTIVAL

Nearly 2,000 Texas high school bandmen from all parts of the state will take part in this year's spectacular marching band event which is scheduled as a part of the annual Fiesta Week program and which will take place at Tech Field in San Antonio on Thursday night, April 20, according to Mrs. Cecile Logan, chairman of the

Marching bands festival of the Battle of Flowers Association.

The event will be participated in by 6 classes of bands and separate awards are to be made to the winning band in each classification.

Two well known band directors approved by the Music Educator's Association will be selected from out of the state to act as judges. All bands taking part in the event will also march in the world-famous Battle of Flowers parade which will take place the following afternoon.

Local high school bandmen will act as hosts to visiting bandmen and the San Antonio group will stage a massed performance in the field in which more than 500 will appear on the field in intricate maneuvers at the same time.

This is the fifth successive year that the marching bands event has been staged as a part of the Fiesta Week program and numerous schools from all over the state are sending bands and drum and bugle corps that have never before participated in the festival.

The marching band festival is only one of the many spectacular events scheduled for each day of the glamorous Fiesta Week program. Full details of the week's program may be secured free of charge by writing to the Municipal Information Bureau, located in the Municipal Auditorium in San Antonio.

Fiesta Week will begin this year on Monday, April 17, and extend through Saturday, April 22.

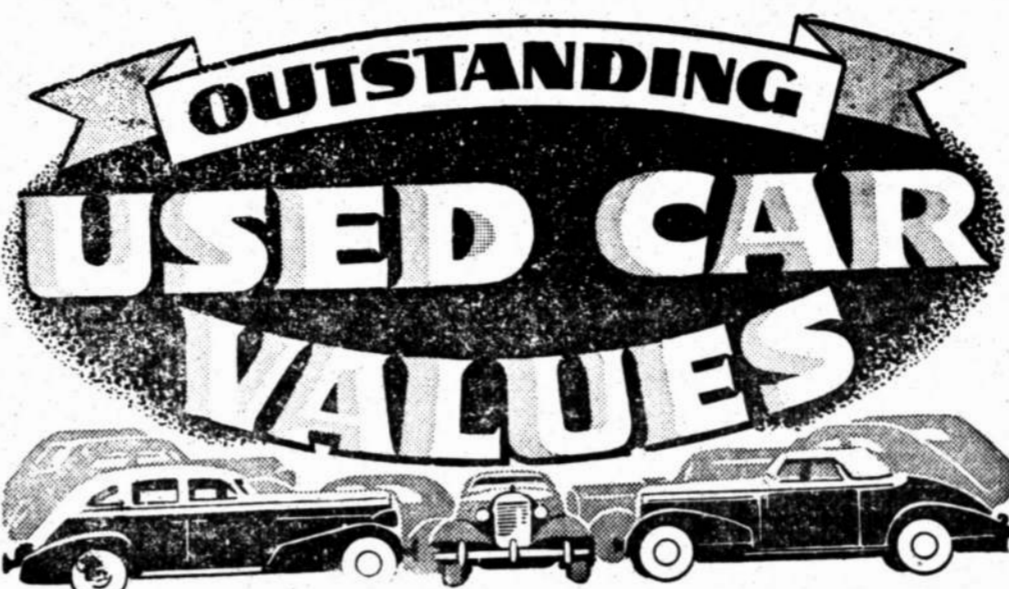
