DEATH LIST IN LAKE TRAGEDY IS INCREASING

27 BODIES TAKEN FROM LAKE AND BOAT AFTER SUDDEN SQUALL

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 29.—A sudden off shore squall that passed in a few seconds to leave the lake as smooth as a mill pond capsize a small pleasure steamer late yesterday, carrying at least 27 of the passengers, mostly women and children, to their deaths.

The tragedy came almost twelve years to a day from the date of Chicago's greatest water disaster, the sinking of the steamer Eastland with a loss of 812 lives. The two resulted from the same cause—the rush of passengers to the portside of the ship.

### ENTIRE TERRITORY IS UNDER GOOD FALL DURING FRIDAY

Bringing the total precipitation for the year of 1927 to 6.81 inches, a rainfall of 32 inches which started shortly after 7 o'clock this morning continued slowly till noon today and added an effective moisture to an already good season.

AUSTIN, July 29 (AP)—Sam Houston Terrell, state comptroller, in a statement today urged "every taxpayer—owner to give the most careful consideration to this unusual proposal" as he characterized the tax amendment to be voted on by the people Monday.

He is against it.

He said he is profoundly impressed with the wisdom of the fathers who, with "infinite foresight and care, framed our great charter of freedom and protection, our present state constitution.

"It especially occurs to me that permit the levying of ad valorem taxes at varied rates upon different classes of property would indeed be a very dangerous experiment," he continued.

### NEWS AND VIEWS OF OIL OPERATIONS ON THE SOUTH PLAINS

#### FIVE NEW TESTS WILL BE DRILLED ON SOUTH PLAINS

PLAINVIEW, July 28.—The Exploration company of Texas is under contract to drill five test wells on the South Plains, and already three of the tests have been spudded in. Fox and Cope have the drilling contracts on four of the tests and Lewis and Slagle the contract on the fifth.

Exploration's Goodman, No. 1, 15 miles due west of Plainview was spudded in on July 19. It is located on the S. E. 1/4 of section 1, block 6 Hale county.

Crawford No. 1 location has been made on section 17, block c-3 Hale county 6 miles northwest of Plainview and will be spudded in within sixty days. Fox and Cope have the drilling contract.

The S. H. Boone No. 1, east of the Callahan school lands, 17 miles southeast of Plainview has been spudded in. In Floyd county one and a half miles northwest of Mickey and Sandhill school.

Dinwiddie No. 1 will be the first test of the Exploration company in Swisher county and the location has been made on section 70, block M-11, 17 miles northwest of Plainview.

Lewis and Slagle have spudded in on the Exploration's first test in eastern Floyd county, Matador No. 1, on the west 1/2 of section 19, block D-2.

Other tests are planned by the Exploration company of Texas in this territory. The test, Goodman No. 1 which was spudded in a week or ten days ago, is about 10 miles north of the Mulliken No. 1 in southwestern part of Hale county which is standing in all within 40 feet of the top.

#### LONE STAR IS BUSY

Construction work is well under way on the Lone Star Gas Company's 7 1/2 mile line from Coleman county to San Angelo and Winters, Texas. The line starts with a 10 inch line from the wells north and a little west of Valera in Coleman county. The 10 inch line runs to a point northeast of Ballinger, where the line is tapped by a 12 mile, 4 inch line running north to Winters. The 10 inch line will run on south to San Angelo.

The entire line will be welded and several towns along the line expect to be supplied with gas from it. The capacity of the line is estimated to be about 10,000,000 cubic feet daily. Well pressure will be used at present to push the gas through the line. It is expected that

the system will be connected in the near future to the Lone Star Company's recently purchased gas system in West Texas. The system was bought from the Texas Company several weeks ago.

Construction on the Lone Star company's southern system is nearing completion. The system is being extended south from Waco to Temple with a 16 inch line and 3 inch pipe is being used to extend the line from Mexia to Marlin.

#### GAS STOCKS REDUCED

Though crude runs were maintained at a high level, and shipments were somewhat less, gasoline stocks at 124 refineries through the Mid-Continent were reduced roundly 1,200,000 gallons last week.

This was shown by the weekly copyrighted statistical report of the National Petroleum News.

During the past four weeks stocks at the same plants have been reduced nearly 13,000,000 gallons. Kerosene stocks have also been reduced during the same period and fuel oil stocks have held about even. Gas and oil stove distillate stocks have undergone slight increases.

#### NEW CRANE FIELD SEEN

Promise of a new oil pool in Crane county is seen in the Gulf Production No. 2 Waddell in the northeast corner of section 16, Block B-25, which ins reported to be making between 50,000 and 100,000 feet of gas 19 feet below the Big Line.

This well is located about 15 miles northwest of Church and Fields production in Crane county, and is about the same distance from the Cosen wells on the Conwell ranch in Ector county.

It is in the middle of a 25,000 to 30,000 acre block held by the Gulf Production Company. A well would mean a repetition of the Gulf's great strike on the McElroy ranch in Crane. While the Waddell No. 2 is not as yet a well the line was

topped at the same depth as the nearest production.

The No. 2 was started as a core test going to the top of the salt when the salt was found at a high depth it was decided to make a deep test. Top of the salt was found 137 feet higher than in a previous core test two miles east of this location.

The top of the Big line as jumped at 438 feet, which corrected top surface elevation is 325 feet below sea level. This is two feet higher than the same formation in the Gulf's No. 3 State-Lassiter in the Church Fields pool in Crane county, which is on the edge.

The ranch on which the strike was made belongs to W. N. Waddell of Fort Worth, all of which is under lease to the Gulf, Marland Employees Royalty Company, the Humble and the Magnolia are owners of royalty under the block.

Twenty-one bodies were recovered before the steamer was raised to be towed ashore. The others were found after the craft was brought to the surface.

#### Crew Aids Passengers

The five members of the crew escaped and these, all experienced sailors, saved many from drowning by tossing life preservers and rafts to those in the water. The Favorite's two life boats also were unleased and into these clambered a number of the survivors.

accident was under way. One was an inquest, the other investigations by Michael Hughes, chief of police, and States Attorney Robert M. Crowe. Olson and his crew were arrested shortly after the tragedy.

#### Many Acts of Heroism

Out of the sudden disaster came acts of heroism and devotion. Olson, at the wheel of the boat, leaped through a cabin window, into the water, turning back to drag several of his passengers from the boat. Pulling himself along the side of the boat he also cut away preservers, tossing them to persons floundering near the steamer. His daughter, Katherine, 9, also assisted several children to gain rafts or boats.

Leo Sobota, an army officer, whose hand was mangled, told of throwing four children into a boat. Sobota related his experience as his hand was being dressed:

"I got four kids and a woman. The boat was full of water and we couldn't get any more in. A girl started bailing out with a straw hat. I was dizzy. When the Favorite went down she hated—" And he swooned.

#### Girl Holds Two Afloat

Opal Hellen, 18, of Hugo, Okla., visiting in Chicago, dragged two little girls through a window and held them afloat until a member of the crew pulled them into a life boat.

was terrible and I had only recently spent a lot of money improving the Favorite.

Sixteen year old George Holmes, of Berwyn, Ill., saved his father and attempted to remove his mother but she had died from shock and heart disease. A mother of five children, Mrs. Gertrude Berndt, who also was aboard the Eastland when it capsized in the Chicago river, again escaped death on the "Favorite." Four members of her family, a married daughter, a grand daughter, nephew and sister-in-law were drowned.

#### Sportsman Goes Below

As rescue work got under way, Commodore Eugene McDonald, sportsman and sailor, reached the scene and he was one of the first to don a diver's helmet and go below to explore the submerged craft. Throughout the night he remained aboard his yacht and aided in raising the Favorite.

"It seems too bad that such a catastrophe should happen to the best boat and the best pilot in the excursion service around Chicago," was the comment of the coast guards and life saving crews who are often called upon to go to the rescue of these little vessels.

Brass bands and demonstrations greeted the party in route and on arrival.

### Fruit Shipments In June Are Boosted

AUSTIN, Texas, July 29. (AP)—Shipments of fruits and vegetables from Texas during June were sharply advanced over May loadings, the University of Texas business research bureau here announced.

During June 5, 443 cars were shipped, in May 372 cars and in April 3,466. Watermelons and tomatoes, it is said, account for the bulk of shippings, although some onions and early potatoes still are being freighted out.

Carrots of celery, peppers and grapes were reported last month for the first time this year, the bureau said.

Growers' chief trouble was the "generally downward price," explained by the bureau as resulting from competition from other parts of the country. The watermelon was classed as one of the best selling Texas crops.

### Many Banks To Install System Against Robbers

AUSTIN, Texas, July 29.—One hundred and forty systems of "tear gas" for bank and postoffice vault doors to flabbergast enterprising cracksmen and robbers have been ordered for installation in Texas and Oklahoma within the last few weeks, it was learned here with the announcement that two banks and the Austin postoffice will be so equipped.

The postoffice is to have three systems put in. Locking devices containing tear gas are placed in the vault doors so when cracksmen break in the gas is liberated. Its effects is reputed to be unfailing. Robbers are said to have left their tools and coats in front of cracked vaults in their hurry to escape the fumes.

Gas masks will avail ingenious burglars little, because an auxiliary smoke screen is liberated also

when vault doors are cracked, leaving the prowlers unable to see their way about their operations.
