Look To The East

Now's the time to be extra careful!

This "punch line" should have been carried last week, really.

Then it was that children locally, all over the county and much of the state, entered the public schools for the beginning of the 1977-78 term.

Last week was the time, too, just ahead of the Labor Day holiday and long weekend, a time when safety officials make an estimate of traffic deaths and issue their regular holiday warnings to "be careful".

This was done in great fashion by our Texas Department of Public Safety ahead of the weekend. If motorists failed to be careful, it was not because they were not forewarned.

Our own former Munday man, John Brown, safety officer for the DPS, made regular appearances on newscasts on television and radio programs, and he always ended his plea for safety with the admonition: "Drive Friendly, the Texas Way!"

Although the holiday is over, the school term is yet just in its beginning, and it behooves us to be "extra" careful or the remaining nine months of the year.

During the school vacation period, we perhaps become lulled into the habit of hawking care to the four winds as we pass school buildings and grounds. The idea of extreme care is lessened, since school is in recess and there are no children around the premises.

But we need to come out of the would-be dilemma with a ready solution to the problem - that of safety.

Classes are going on five days a week, now. This means that children are warming the school grounds and buildings in great numbers at least five times during the day - when school opens in the morning, during the morning and afternoon recess, during the noon hour, and at the close of school when they wind their ways homeward.

Children's minds are not as mature as those of older people; therefore, their alertness to danger ahead is not as great as ours should be.

They may dart out in front of a vehicle, totally oblivious to the danger involved. They may run from in front of a vehicle without the usual "stop, look and listen". They may chase a ball into the street without thought of perhaps being the victim of an accident.

It's up to we motorists to carry the safety banner to those we would protect.

There are traffic laws and signals to be observed around the school campus, the school bus, and loved ones waiting to pick up their children as classes end for the day.

To drive pell-mell along the street in the face of such impending danger should be a "no-no" in the language of everyone behind a steering wheel.

We've been very fortunate in Munday, we believe, in that no lives of children have been lost due to carelessness in the vicinity of our schools.

Near-tragedy has occurred a number of times, and the memory of these should awaken us to the fact that he who can best prevent tragedy is the one behind the wheel.

Let us observe all safety precautions and not leave it up to the child to try to make amends for our carelessness!

Munday Schools Register Slight Decline From 1982

Munday Public Schools opened with 386 students present in high school, junior high, elementary and kindergarten classes, but several more have enrolled late, causing the figures to change almost daily. As of Monday, August 29, with each school reporting, enrollment totals 410 students, just 4 down from last year's first week total.

Tickets Available On Bus To Forsan

The Munday Mogul Booster Club is planning to secure a charter bus for fans who want to make the trip to Forsan for the Munday-Forsan football game on Friday, September 23. The round-trip distance to Forsan is approximately 350 miles.

A minimum of 39 riders must sign up for the bus trip, and the cost will be \$16.50 each. If more than 39 sign up, a waiting list will be started until a total of 46 is reached. Money will be refunded to those who have signed up if the minimum is not obtained.

Local fans will have until Wednesday, September 14, to buy their tickets, which are available at the West Texas Utilities office in Munday. The bus will leave at 3:15 p.m. from the high school on the day of the game. School will be dismissed early that day.

District 3 4-H Leader Association To Meet

The 4-H leaders and parents of Knox County are urged to attend the District 3 4-H Leader Fall Meeting in Windthorst on Wednesday, September 7. Registration will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the program should be concluded by 3:00 p.m. The workshops at this meeting are:

High School principal Doug Donoho reports 128 students settling down to classes. The sophomore class is the largest, with 43 students. There are 27 seniors, 21 juniors and 37 freshmen.

84 students attend Munday Junior High. The eighth grade has a total of 35 enrolled, the seventh grade has 25 students, and there are 24 in the sixth grade.

Elementary school has gained the most students during the past week, showing 198 enrolled as of Monday. Broken down by grade, there are 40 fifth graders, 23 fourth graders, 34 third graders, 33 second graders, 35 first graders, 32 in kindergarten and one in pre-kindergarten. These figures came from elementary and junior high principal A. B. Martin.

Donoho stated that the average daily attendance last year was 398. Current enrollment figures may still increase somewhat, as new students move into the school district.

Diapause Program To Begin

The Knox County Boll Weevil Association met Monday, August 29, to discuss the feasibility of having a diapause program in Knox County this year. The purpose of a diapause program is to reduce the number of overwintering boll weevils which survive to damage cotton crops during the next year.

There has been a significant increase in the number of boll weevils reported in cotton fields, and some producers have already made chemical applications to control boll weevil populations. A good diapause program would help reduce this number in future years.

In order to insure the success of the program, as high a percentage as possible of the cotton acreage in this area needs to be included. This is an excellent opportunity for producers to obtain an effective, low cost program to reduce the boll weevil population in this area.

After much discussion and several reports from scouts and other interested people which confirmed the tremendous pressure to area producers from the boll weevil, it was agreed by association members to conduct a diapause program in Knox County.

Sign-up for the program will begin on Thursday (today), September 1, at the Rhineland Coop Gin office and will continue through Saturday, September 10. The schedule for sign-up dates and times in various sections of the county is as follows:

Munday Gin and Seed, 8 a.m. - 12 noon, Tuesday, September 6.

Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., 1-5 p.m., Tuesday, September 6.

Knox City ASCS office (entry at southeast door), 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Wednesday, September 7.

Gilliland Gin, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Thursday, September 8.

Goree Gin, 8 a.m. - 12 noon, Friday, September 9.

Rhineland Coop Gin, 1-5 p.m. Friday, September 9 and 8 a.m. - 12 noon, Saturday, September 10.

Producers are urged to sign their acreage up for this program at the earliest possible time so the spraying can be started. The future of cotton in Knox County depends on participation in the diapause program.

may have a tough time bagging their limits.

"On the whole, it looks real scarce," Lowry said Monday. "There are some birds in spots, but outside of that, I just haven't seen very many, and I've been looking the county over for the last four or five days. Because of the dry weather, any tanks with water in them will be good hunting spots."

Lowry also added a note of caution. "The rattlesnakes are really moving," he said, "and hunters need to be real careful and watch out for them."

Knox County is in the Panhandle Zone created by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife. This zone runs from El Paso to Abilene, Dallas and Texarkana.

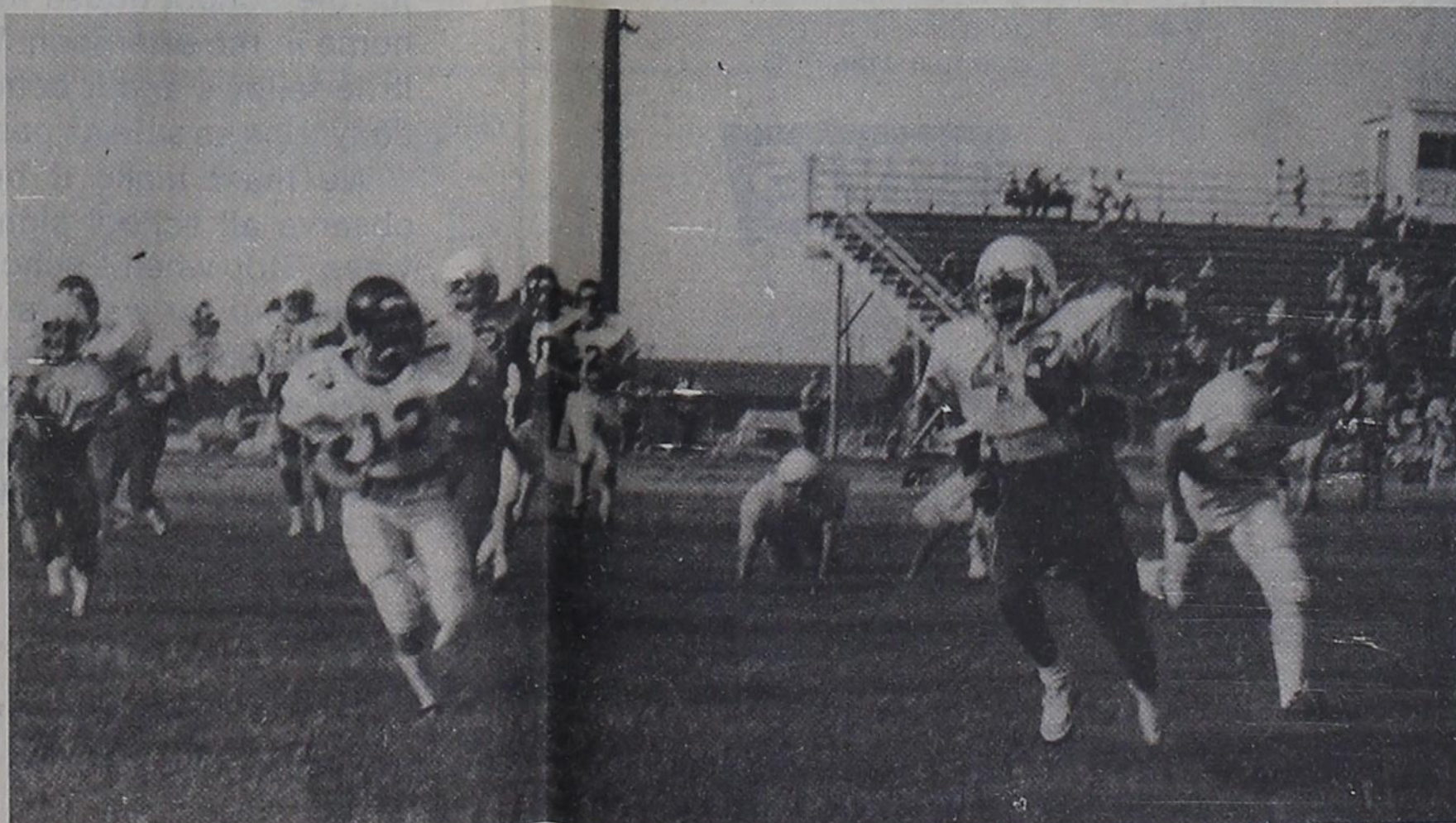
The seventy day season in the Panhandle Zone will continue through November 9 this year. There will not be a split season this year for dove hunters.

Daily bag limits will be twelve birds, with a 24-bird possession limit. Hunting times remain from thirty minutes before sunrise until sunset.

Persons hunting doves in the county of their residence need not have a license. Anyone over the age of 17 and under 65 must have a valid license to hunt outside their own county.

In Knox County, licenses can be obtained at either hardware store in Knox City and at the County Clerk's office in Benjamin. No one in Munday handles hunting licenses.

Anyone hunting birds outside his county without a license, unless exempt, is in violation of the law and can be fined for a Class C misdemeanor. Those who exceed the bag and possession limits can also be fined for misdemeanor violations.

Through Monday, August 28, the department had issued 15 traffic citations and 5 warnings, escorted two funerals, arrested two subjects for driving while intoxicated, made three motorist assists and investigated two accidents.

The Knox County Peace Officers Association continued to support fellow members. The Department of Public Safety officers, Knox City Police Department and Knox County Sheriff's Department all work with us at times, and this department assists the others in various cases.

Our uniform crime report listed one vandalism incident, six disturbance calls, one prowler call, two burglaries reported and one cleared by arrest; two forgery cases reported, both cleared, one by arrest and a warrant will be issued for the other; three assaults reported, all cleared by arrest or no charges filed by complainant; one subject arrested for public intoxication; two missing juveniles found; one reported suicide attempt investigated and proved false; three emergency messages delivered and one burglary of a vehicle reported and cleared.

Services For 'Doc' Clark Held Tuesday

T. H. (Doc) Clark, 73, a longtime Munday resident and retired law enforcement officer, died at 10:15 p.m. Sunday, August 28, at Bethesda Hospital in Wichita Falls after a lengthy illness.

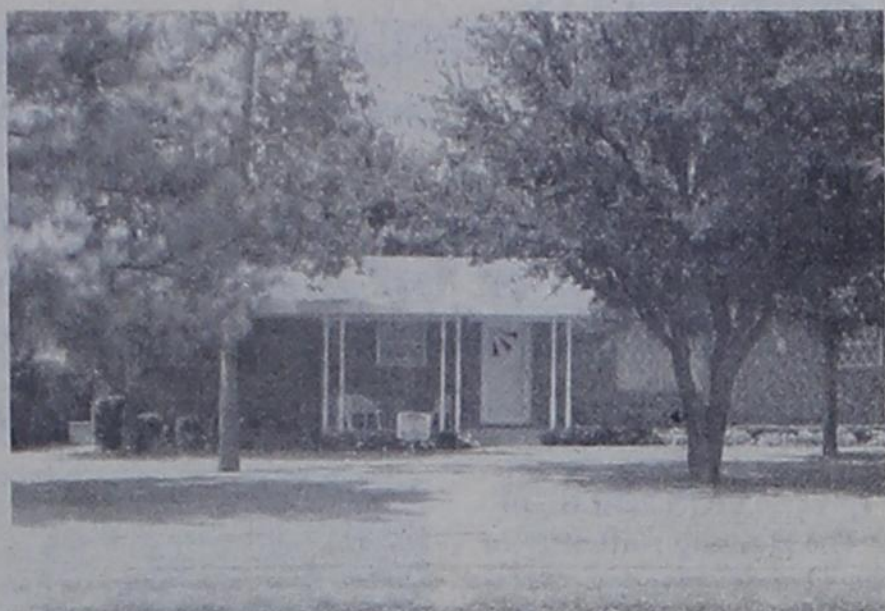

SCS Offers Advice To Gardeners

Should home gardeners worry about erosion? This question was put to Judy Fairchild with the Soil Conservation Service headquartered in Knox City.

"Absolutely," she replied. "Erosion is bad even in small amounts. It means that some of your limited topsoil is lost. But erosion does more than steal your topsoil. As soil leaves your home garden or town lot, it moves into ditches and streams, where it becomes mud and a pollutant."

"Undoubtedly mulching is the best conservation practice for the home gardener," Fairchild said. "Mulching has many benefits, and often eliminates the need for ditches, terraces, or walls that home gardeners often use."

According to Fairchild, a mulch on the surface will:
-Break the force of beating raindrops, and protect soil from erosion.

-Retard growth of undesirable weeds and grass.

-Help soak up and hold moisture from irrigation or limited rain during dry periods, and prevents the formation of a crust.

-Reduce soil temperature during hot weather.

-Add organic matter to the soil, which helps keep earthworms and other soil organisms happy.

-By protection, prevention of erosion, and adding organic matter it actually improves the workability, or tilth, of the garden's soil.

"A mulch can be almost any organic material," Fairchild said. "Compost, straw, cotton hulls, or lawn clippings are all ok. Those who want more information on mulching can get a leaflet called 'Mulches for Your Garden' by calling 658-3526."

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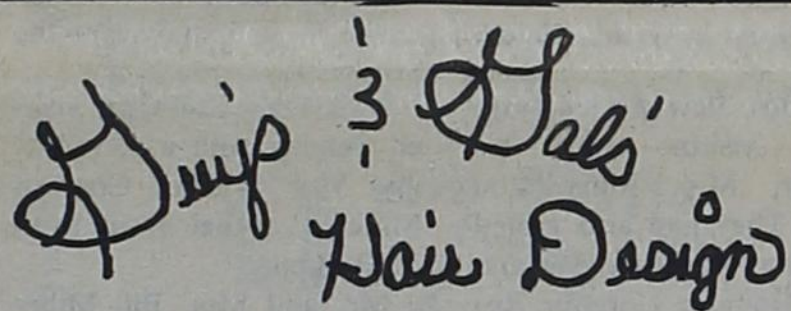
