### Black News Briefs

#### "Fatherhood" Focus of New Book by Bill Cosby

New York, N. Y. -- Prime-time television superstar Bill Cosby has authored a new book entitled "Fatherhood". The book is reportedly full of Cosby insights on both the joys and responsibilities of being a father. Nine different paperback publishers entered bids for rights to the Cosby book. Bidding started at \$1.5 million. Berkely won the battle but it is not known how much they paid. The hard-cover edition will be published by Doubleday. The book is not expected to hit store shelves until June.

#### Jesse Jackson Aims At The Networks

Chicago, Ill. -- Fresh from a successful boycott of a leading Chicago television station, the Rev. Jesse Jackson is said to be considering a campaign aimed at getting more Black representation at the top levels of network television. After Jackson pressure apparently influenced CBS to name the first Black general manager of a network-owned station (WBBM-TV), Jackson said "The other networks are next." Jackson also said that his aim was to capture "appraisal power" - the media's ability to shape

public debate.

#### Cross Burning Aimed At Black Sorority

Tuscaloosa, Ala. -- Black fraternities and sororities at the University of Alabama are upset over a recent cross burning incident. The Ku Klux Klan-style cross was burned outside a house that the predominantly Black Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was planning to move into. The house is located on the previously all-white sorority row. University officials have attempted to play down the incident labeling it a "prank." However, the seven Black fraternities and sororities on the 16,000 student campus have labeled the incident a "threat."

#### Senate Expected To Reject Sessions Nomination

Washington, D. C. -- The U. S. Senate appears to have pretty much killed the nomination of the controversial Jefferson Beauregard Sessions III to be a federal judge. The Reagan nominee had drawn opposition from civil rights groups and liberal senators because of what they believe was his attempt to restrict Black voting rights as the U. S. attorney in Mobile, Alabama. Sessions also admitted he once referred to the Ku Klux Klan as an "okay" organization.

#### Campaign Helps Black Farmer Reclaim Farm

Atlanta, Ga. -- A fund-raising campaign launched by a grocery store chain has helped a 68-year

-old Black farmer reclaim his foreclosed farm. Oscar Lorick gained national attention last fall when several neighboring farmers, most of them white, armed themselves are prevented the Bleckley county sheriff from evicting Lorick. Lorick, who cannot read or write, said he did not understand the loans that led to the foreclosure. The fund-raising campaign that helped Lorick reclaim his farm was aided by a \$18,500 check from Kroger Co. grocery chain.

#### Anti-Black Arsonist Convicted

Philadelphia, Pa. -- A federal jury has convicted a 23 year-old white man of violating the civil rights of a Black family. George Stewart had set fire to the home of the family after they fled the house because of hostile incidents from whites who did not want the Blacks moving into their neighborhood. Two other men pleaded guilty in the case.

#### Dartmouth Students Suspended For Attack

Concord, N. H. -- Dartmouth College's disciplinary board has upheld the suspensions of 10 conservative students involved in the destruction of some anti-apartheid shanties which had been erected on the campus. The students had denied that they were in favor of South African apartheid. They said they had only wanted to clean up the campus. The shanties had been erected by other students as a protest against Dartmouth's refusal to end \$63 million of investments in South Africa.

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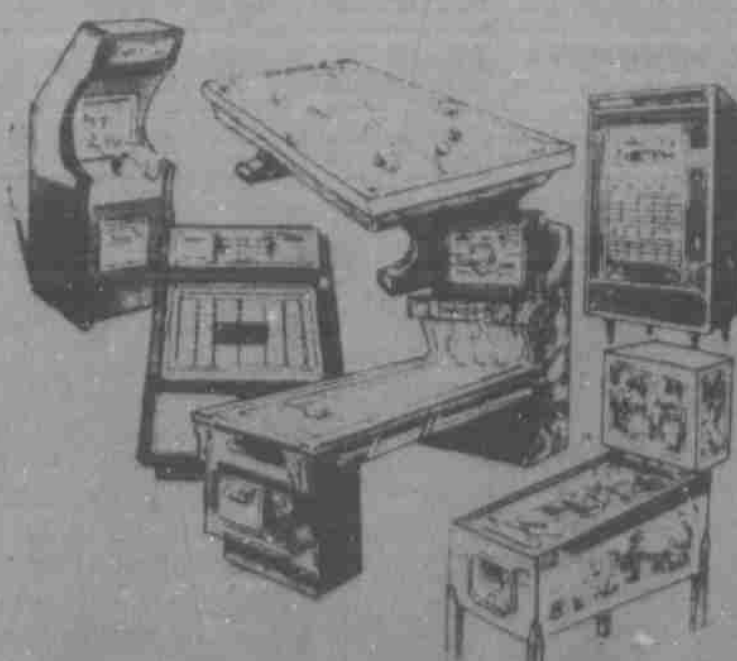

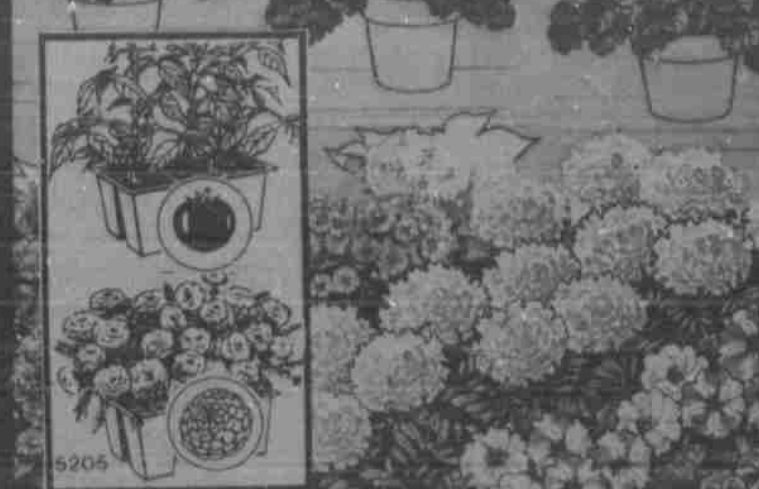

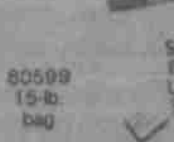

### IMPROVING YOUR CHANCES WITH THE OPPOSITE SEX

### Top Organizations Send Delegates To Leadership Summit

(WASHINGTON, D. C.)—Over 100 key delegates from 300 invited, predominantly black organizations were among the representatives drafting proposals for collective action this year at the second annual National Black Leadership Roundtable conference here. The three day sessions were held March 14-16 at the Howard University of Law campus with Dr. James E. Cheek, H. U. president, welcoming the participants.

According to Rep. Walter E. Fauntroy, District of Columbia congressman and NBLR president, conferees outlined plans for action in the areas of Newmarket Development (establishment of state Black Leadership Roundtables); political Empowerment (voting rights enforcement and election of more black officials in city and municipal offices, congress and statewide posts); media accountability through advertising and publicity; Youth Development; International Affairs (African Relief and South African Liberation); Senior Support for Black elderly with "Crime Watch" and "Adopt a Senior"; Drug Treatment and Prevention; A National Campaign to Save Black Owned Land, and Enhancement of the Annual Congressional Black Caucus Weekend.

Although all sessions were closed to the public and the press, Atty. Lezli Boskerville, NBLR executive director, said that numerous representatives of the following major activities presented reports: Civil Rights, Labor, Black Elected and Appointed Officials and Voter Organizations, International Affairs, Black Business Economic and Corporate Organizations and Blacks in Prison.

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## BLACK BEAUTY QUEEN SUES FARRAH FAWCETT

### Blacklisted by Industry After "Jealous Suspicions"

A former Miss Michigan who claims that actions by Farrah Fawcett caused her to be blacklisted from the television industry and fired from the hit TV series "Emergency" has sued the actress for \$165-million dollars.

Sonja Dunson, a Black beauty queen who enjoyed a successful movie and television career after studying at the Estell Harmon School of Acting, has filed a multi-million dollar lawsuit against actress Farrah Fawcett, Universal Studios and Mark VII Productions charging them with conspiracy to keep her from working as an actress because Fawcett thought Dunson was having an affair with Lee Major's, then Farrah's husband.

"Sonja and Lee, both former

schoolteachers, had been friends for years before Majors and Fawcett were married," said a spokesman for Dunson. "Lee had only been married for about six months when Farrah became suspicious and was determined to put an end to the relationship."

Dunson's suit, which asks \$165 million in damages from each defendant, also names Jacob Shearer, an agent for Mark VII Productions; his daughter, Hannah Shearer, agent Donna Dockstrader, Mark VII Limited and Universal, and charges that when she refused to stop associating with Majors she was fired from her television series and repeatedly slandered.

"The friendship between Lee and Sonja continued when both

were working on the Universal Studios lot—Sonja in "Emergency" and Majors in "The Six Million Dollar Man," the spokesman added. "They would frequently

have dinner together, and she would visit Lee in his dressing trailer during breaks." However, the spokesman insisted they were not romantically involved.

Dunson also charges that Jacob Shearer, alluding to the fact that Sammy Davis, Jr. wears a glass eye, once physically threatened Dunson, telling her: "The same thing that happened to Sammy Davis' eye could happen to you — or worse — if you continue your relationship with Majors."

Dunson claims that since 1974, she has been unable to get work as an actress. The suit continues: "She has not even been able to obtain an interview or audition through normal channels of casting roles for actresses or actors."

Dunson's spokesman said that because she couldn't get work, she decided to develop her own motion picture project, and began seeking prospective investors. "It was at that time that Sonja approached an investor who

informed her that she was on an industry blacklist. She even got a letter from another executive producer who had accepted her property for funding, but who pulled out after learning she had been blacklisted. He notified Sonja by mail that because of the blacklist, he was pulling back."

Dunson claims that because of Farrah Fawcett's illegal actions, she has suffered for more than 11 years. "I had to give up a mansion and a Roll Royce for a one-bedroom apartment and an old Plymouth," Dunson said. "My career has been ruined. I have been called every dirty name under the sun, and nobody seems to know anything about my situation."

"Because one paranoid woman thought I was having an affair with her husband, I have lost everything."

We believe (a) that in order to be saved, sinners must be born again; (b) that the new birth is a new creation in Christ Jesus; (c) that it is instantaneous and not a process; (d) that in the new birth the one dead in trespasses and in sins is made a partaker of the divine nature and receives eternal life, the free gift of God; (e) that the new creation is brought about in a manner above our comprehension, not by culture, not by character, nor by the will of man, but wholly and solely by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the gospel; (f) that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance and faith and newness of life.

... (a) John 3:3. "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

... (b) II Cor. 5:17. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

... (c) Luke 5:27,28. "He said unto him, Follow me. And he left all, rose up, and followed him."

2. Being in Christ, we are new creatures.

a. "Creature... from create... I. that which is created; anything created, animate or inanimate." - Webster

b. In the Scripture "Create, Creation, Creator and Creature" - all come from the same Greek word. In N.T. only God creates. It is used both of natural and spiritual creation. See Eph. 2:10,15; 4:24; Col. 3:10; Gal. 6:15; and II Cor. 5:17.

3. Being in Christ - marvelous changes are wrought. Note the "old things" and the "new". (b)-I II Cor. 5:17

III. THE SUDDENNESS OF THE NEW BIRTH.

(c)... "it is instantaneous and not a process."

1. A sinner may have heard the gospel once or many times, before believing and being saved.

2. It is not through a process of works, but through believing the message as God speaks to the heart. See all of the Scriptures under (c). Luke 5:27,28; I John 5:1; John 3:6,7; Acts 2:41 and Acts 16:30-33.

IV. THE BLESSINGS OF THE NEW BIRTH.

1. The spiritually dead, receive life. (d)-3 Eph. 2:1; (d)-5 Col. 2:13

2. Trespasses and sins forgiven. (d)-1 II Pet. 1:4; (d)-4 II Cor. 5:19; (d)-5 Col. 2:13

3. Eternal life received as a gift. (d)-2 Rom. 6:23

4. Made partakers of the divine nature. (d)-1 II Pet. 1:4

V. THE MYSTERY OF THE NEW BIRTH.

1. The new birth not produced by culture, character, baptism, church membership, keeping of the law, nor by the will of man.

2. The new birth cannot be explained by human wisdom. (e)-1 John 3:8

3. The new birth brought about by the power of the Holy Spirit in connection with divine truth. (e)-2 John 1:12,13

VI. THE EVIDENCE OF THE NEW BIRTH.

1. It is manifested by the fruit of the Spirit. (f)-1 Gal. 5:22; (f)-2 Eph. 5:9

2. It is manifested by hearing the voice of and following the shepherd. John 10:27

3. It is manifested by a changed life. I John 2:28, 3:9; 4:7, 5:1,4,18

Many people today seem to think that the evidence of the new birth is walking a church aisle, being baptized, etc. However, the Scriptures teach quite differently. Certainly a saved person should do this, but many unsaved people have done the same thing. However, an unsaved person would find it impossible to duplicate the above three things.
