ONE OF RUNNELS COUNTY'S BEST CITIZES GONE.

After an illness covering about one year, J. R. Holliday, died at noon Tuesday at his home near Hatchel. Arrangements are being made for the funeral and interment will be made some time Wednesday in the Runnels cemetery.

Notwithstanding that Mr. Holliday had been very low for some time, and his death had been expected for some time the news that he was dead caused sadness in Ballinger, where he has so many friends. He lost his health about a year ago, and went to Mineral Wells with the hopes of regaining it. For awhile he improved and was able to attend to his business affairs and made several trips to Ballinger. He was a faithful member of the Baptist church, and his life was an open book, and in keeping with the teaching of Christ.

This death robs a home of a good husband and father and this county of one of its best citizens, and many hearts are made to grieve and tender sympathy goes out to the grief stricken family.

REFUSE TO GRANT PROHIBITION ELECTION

Belton Aug. 11.—By a vote of three to two the Bell county commissioners court today declined to order a local option election in precincts 1, 2, 5, and 7, as petitioned for by prohibitionists. The vote stood as follows:

Against the election, Judge Shipp, Commissioners Denman McLain, those voting in favor of the granting of the election were Commissioners Dickey and Hall.

The petition was presented by Judge John B. Burrett who discussed the legality of the election asked for and cited the decisions of the higher courts in similar cases. The petition was signed by 1291 votes.

ORIENT ENGINEER LOSES HIS LEFT LEG.

San Angelo, Aug. 12.—While talking to a fellow engineer Sunday afternoon, a few minutes after arriving on his run from the west, Arthur L. Seay, an Orient passenger engineer, was run down near the passenger station by his own engine, his left leg being almost severed from his body. The injured man was rushed to St. John's hospital, where immediate amputation was necessary. Reports from attending physicians as to his condition today were to the effect that Mr. Seay rested well during the night.

An Orient engineer with headquarters here since the building of the road, Engineers Seay is well known by all the road's employees. The accident of Sunday afternoon happened but a few seconds after the engine had been detached from the northbound train, it being on its way to the roundhouse at the time.

FIRST BALE BRINGS HUNDRED DOLLARS

First Bale 1913 Cotton Received in Ballinger Tuesday 12th. Comes Week later.

W. H. Moncreath, who farms on the W. C. Wheelis place South of Ballinger, was the first to show up on the streets of Ballinger with a bale of 1913 cotton. Mr. Moncreath came in early Tuesday morning and soon had his bale ginned and ready for the buyers.

The bale weighed 480 pounds at the C. W. Toler gin, where it was ginned, and classed out as good middling. Quite a number of the local buyers bid on the cotton, but it remained for a "dark horse" to win in the bidding and the cotton was sold to the Walker Drug Co., for 12 cents per pound.

A number of the merchants and business men chipped in and soon had a premium amounting to \$35 made up, and this was presented to Mr. Moncreath. The price paid together with the premium and seed money run the receipts for the bale to the one hundred dollar mark.

The first bale in 1911 was received on Aug. 6th; 1912 bale on Aug. 7th.
