Sixty-Three Blocks Added To City Mail Service Terrific Typhoon Strikes Heart of Philippine Islands

Twenty-Five Lives Are Lost In Worst Storm In History

Property Damage Mounts to Millions and Partially Restored Communication Gives Report

Equals Hurricane

Governor Stimson Declares Storm Is Greater Than Porto Rico Disaster; Aid Is Being Sent

(By Associated Press)
MANILA, Nov. 27.—(Tuesday)—Reports over partially restored communication facilities indicate that the typhoon which struck the central islands of the Philippine Archipelago was the most severe in the history of the islands. At least twenty-five lives were lost and the property damage amounted to millions of dollars.

The typhoon was widespread, its fury being manifested in the islands of Luzon, Samar, Romblon, Tablas, Masbate, Mindoro, Cebu and Panay. The roar of the tempest continued from Thursday until Saturday at many places, but it swept to the southwest of Manila.

Spanish Bitter Hurricane
Governor-General Henry L. Stimson sent a cablegram to the war department at Washington last night stating that the storm was equal in force to the recent hurricane in Porto Rico. He said that assistance might be needed from American relief agencies.

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Moody's Highway Group Meet Today

Governor Plans Permanent Policy for State Improvement and Maintenance of Highways

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 26.—Governor Moody's committee of 31, selected from each of the senatorial districts in Texas by legislators in their respective districts, to consider and recommend highway legislation, will hold its first meeting here tomorrow.

The Governor will call the meeting to order and explain his purpose in asking that the committee be formed. The body will elect its own chairman. The Governor's idea is to have the committee recommend legislation which would shape a permanent policy for improvement and maintenance of a connected system of highways in Texas. He is expected to communicate to the legislature his ideas of legislation.

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County Club Boy Has Good Profit

James Potts, 17 year old Lubbock County 4-H club boy, residing on rural route number 1, Lubbock, near the Canyon school came out in second place this year in the grain sorghum division of the Santa Fe's annual contest among club boys. County Agent D. F. Eaton announced Monday.

James scored a total of 40 1-2 points in the contest, but his achievement in producing hedges tells a bigger story than that.

On three acres, James produced 21,000 pounds of hedges, or 10 1-2 tons. Total value of the crop was \$237.60, cost of production being \$37.20, giving him a net profit of \$200.40 on his three acres.

THREE MEN ARE GASSED

Fumigating Gas Is Fatal To Sailors Aboard Steamer

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Harry Wolfberg, a seaman on the steamer P. J. Luchembach, one of whose jobs it is to awaken sleeping members of the crew each morning, went about his task today only to find that three men aboard and all were dead in their bunks.

Investigation disclosed they had died from effects of fumigating gas which had not been cleared entirely from the ship after a fumigation Sunday.

Texas Accidents Claim 10 Lives In Thirty-Six Hours

Five-Months-Old Lubbock Baby Is Crushed Under Truck Sunday; 8 More Injured Over State

Wrecks Kill Seven

Gun Accidents Claim Two Victims; All Die During Sunday and Monday; Cars Overturn

(By Associated Press)
Taking stock of fatalities occurring during the past 36 hours in widely separated sections of the state, Texas found tonight that death had claimed seven persons in automobile crashes and three in accidental shootings, and that the injured toll caused by both types of mishaps stood at ten.

One of the latter victims, Will Schultz, 14-year-old Lagrange boy shot accidentally by a companion while hunting yesterday, was not expected to recover.

Lubbock Baby Killed
Betts Jo Wood, five months old, died from injuries received when run over by a delivery truck at Lubbock.

Frank Morgan, 43, Austin, was killed instantly and two youths, Dayton Casper, 18, Johnston City, and Bob Coker, 21, Burnet, were hurt seriously when an automobile turned over near Johnson City today.

Romer B. Kolmer, 35, San Antonio, just death when his car overturned in a ditch near Lagrange today and Mrs. Laura Williams, 35, was struck last night by a Houston police emergency car, she succumbed to injuries some time later.

6-Year Old Dies
Near Kyle, Milton O. Ackerman, Jr., 6, was killed, and his mother, Mrs. M. O. Ackerman, Cibola, and another son, Hugo, 4, were injured yesterday when their car overturned. Lee Welch, 29, of Josephine, was

Illness Of King George Is Serious

Daily Mail Comments Upon Condition As Being Very Grave Due To Age Of King

(Special To The Journal)
LONDON, Nov. 27.—(Tuesday)—The Daily Mail in its second edition this morning displays prominently the following comment on the condition of King George:

"We regret to state that hopes entertained two days ago have not been fulfilled and that up to the present there has been no progress toward recovery. It is realized that the king is engaged in a hard uphill fight and that his constitution is being put to a severe test.

The original infection, persists, and, in the most favorable circumstances, the battle must be of a prolonged and anxious nature. The condition of anyone at the age of the king, (63 years) suffering from such an illness must be considered serious.

The cost to the tax payers, 53 cents on each \$100 valuation, if all of the bond issue were assessed at one time, was explained, as was the kind of roads to be built.

Governor Al Smith Bests Bobby Jones by Twenty-Nine Strokes

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 26.—(AP)—It was a lucky chance for Bobby Jones that he had Governor Alfred E. Smith as a golf partner today. And it was a stroke of fortune for the New York executive that Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi kept score.

For the governor, radiant in lavender and gray accessories, won every hole but one in an uncompleted 18-hole match in which he and Jones were paired against the Mississippi senator and William M. Meehan of New York.

The score card showed Governor Smith went to the first nine holes in the astounding total of 37 strokes, and that he played the four concluding holes in 14 strokes.

Jones, on the other hand, was credited with the unheard-of total of 56 strokes for the outward trip and took, according to Senator Harrison's figures, 24 strokes for the four holes of the unfinished inward journey.

County Judge J. F. Jordan of Motley county, who was in Lubbock Monday, is authorized for this information, stating the raids were the most successful in this part of that county the latter part of last week when he and his men arrested two men arrested by Gonzales and Russell, the men being Homer Seales and Bill Hogland. Seales' bond was fixed at \$2,000 and Hogland's at \$1,000, both of them making bond, according to Judge Jordan.

Seale was arrested about sundown last Thursday, Judge Jordan said, when Gonzales and Russell raided a filling station on the Lee highway, about 1-2 miles east of Matador. Here they captured over 500 gallons of whiskey. A few hours later they raided a still about a mile north of this filling station, on U. L. Wille's ranch, and captured the 500 gallon copper still complete, with about 300 gallons of whiskey and 5,000 gallons of mash. At this place those in charge were not found, as they had made a hasty retreat, evidently, a partially prepared supper being found when the officers arrived.

The following day, says Judge Jordan, the officers raided Bill Hogland at his place east of Roaring Springs, where they got 4,000 gallons of mash and about 300 pints of beer, the still having been moved, they said, as had the whiskey.

Property Damage Is Great
In England the lives lost ashore were so great number, but the property damage was great over wide areas. CONVICTS CAPTURED

Texas Prisoners Arrested In St. Louis Monday

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Two escaped convicts from the Huntsville, Texas, prison, were arrested here today in a stolen automobile after a three block chase by police. They gave their names as J. T. Parker, 30, and G. T. West, 28, and both admitted escaping September 19, from the Texas institution, where they were serving sentences of six years for forgery and four years for burglary, respectively.

Texas Man Recommends 9-Foot Channel In Mississippi System

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 26.—Roy Miller of Corpus Christi, Texas, active vice-president of the Intracoastal Canal association of Louisiana and Texas, recommended tonight creation of a nine-foot channel in the Mississippi river as far north as Minneapolis, and a similar depth on the Missouri river to Kansas City.

Speaking before the annual convention of the Mississippi Valley association here, Miller declared the development of inland waterways is being carried forward with a lack of uniformity and standardization. He said he did not want to recommend that a nine-foot channel be started over the entire Mississippi Valley system now, but the main trunk lines should be so constructed at the outset.

Are Absolutely Essential
"It should be patent to anyone," Miller said, "who views the matter in a business way that these two improvements are absolutely essential as a basis for, and as a basis of, an

adequate and fully serviceable system of waterways for the Mississippi Valley. Later standardization of feeders will come, but main arteries should be similarly constructed without delay."

Texas, the speaker declared, will participate in inestimable benefits from completion of the waterway system. The state consumes 800,000 tons of steel pipe annually, one-half of which could be moved by the Mississippi river system when it is finished at a saving of approximately \$2,500,000 annually.

Add To Production
"Since Texas produces sulphur obtained in the United States and a large percentage of the world's output, the waterways will save consumers of the Mississippi Valley no less than \$2,500,000 yearly," Miller said. The production cost of chemicals, insecticides, paper, automobile tires and other products would be reduced proportionally, according to the speaker.

Dr. W. S. Sutton, Leading Educator Of Texas Is Dead

Prominent Texas Educator Is Stricken At Home In Austin Monday; Founded Department Of Education

AUSTIN, Nov. 26.—Dr. W. S. Sutton, 68, founder of the department of education at the University of Texas and former acting president, died suddenly at his home here this afternoon.

The aged educator was talking with members of his family shortly after noon when stricken. His health had been failing for some time. Dr. Sutton began his career as an educator shortly after having been graduated from the University of Arkansas in 1878. He became professor of education at the University of Texas in 1897 and in 1909 became dean. He was also dean of the summer session from 1898 until 1918.

He became acting president of the University upon the resignation of Dr. Robert E. Vinson, in 1923, and continued to serve until 1924, when Dr. Walter Splan was appointed.

Election Probe Gets Under Way

House Committee Splits On Evidence Offered In Hidalgo Investigation; Boycott Is Hinted

MCALLEN, Nov. 26.—The House campaign expenditures committee split later today after a near hour of a question of evidence in its investigation of alleged South Texas election irregularities and squelched attempts of Rep. Loring Black, Democrat, New York, to learn what "outside" influence supposedly intimidated Democratic voters in Hidalgo county's general election.

By 4 to 1 vote the committee refused to permit Black, to pursue questions as to identity of the "financiers," hinted at by County Judge A. W. Cameron in a list of reasons as to why the Weslaco box was thrown out, giving the district judge's victory to J. E. Leslie, Democratic incumbent, over the "citizens' Republican" candidate, Gordon Griffin.

Were Delivered Unsealed
The judge and four county commissioners testified that the Weslaco box was not counted primarily because returns were delivered unsealed.

Judge Cameron also testified as further reasons for discarding the box that Weslaco Democratic supporters had been tampered with.

Arizona Governor Struck By Senator

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 26.—(AP)—Police were called to the Arizona state capitol late today when Governor G. W. P. Hunt had a brief fist fight with State Senator Fred Colter. The governor was struck one or two blows by Colter as the climax of an argument in the capital lobby. Interference by J. S. Strode, secretary to the governor, ended the affair.

Extension of Mail Service Goes Into Effect Here Today

Ten Business and 63 Residence Blocks Benefitted By Free Delivery Service In City

Asks Co-operation

No New Carriers Employed For Extension At Present; Postmaster Plans For the Christmas Rush

Sixty-three more blocks in the city of Lubbock will, beginning today, for the first time receive free mail delivery. Ten of these blocks are in the business district, the other 53 being in the residence section of town.

Announcement of the installation of this additional free mail delivery service has come earlier than expected, according to Postmaster John L. Vaughan. The fact is that the new service is due in a great measure to the postmaster. He received notice from the postmaster general's department at Washington, Saturday, to the effect that city delivery extension for Lubbock, as had been applied for recently, was granted, with the understanding that all civic requirements are met here.

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Big Georgia Bank Closes Its Doors

Fourth National Bank of Macon, Has Two-Hour Run and Closes Doors; Deposits Total 9 Million

MACON, Ga., Nov. 26.—The Fourth National Bank of Macon, one of the largest financial institutions in Central Georgia, closed its doors today after a two hour run of withdrawals. Leon S. Dure, president, said the bank's board of directors at a special meeting had decided to close the doors and take steps toward reorganization of the institution.

Deposits Total \$9,000,000
The bank, organized more than 20 years ago, had a capital of \$500,000, deposits of approximately \$9,000,000, and resources listed at more than \$11,000,000. Its building stands at one of the busiest corners in Macon, which is one of the largest cities in Georgia.

Officers declined to comment on the cause of the run, which began soon after the opening hour. At one time about 2,000 persons including depositors, stood in the vicinity of the institution.

City and county squads were called as a precautionary measure, but the run proceeded in an orderly manner.

QUESTION NO. 2

What is the "Lubbock County Good Roads Association"?

The Lubbock County Good Roads Association is an organization of farmers and business men representing every school district and town in Lubbock county. Every school district has one Director, the towns of Idalou and Slaton each have three Directors, and the town of Lubbock has six Directors.

The Association was formed for the purpose of uniting the County in an effort, first, to secure a complete system of hard-surfaced roads; second, to give every district representation in laying out these roads and seeing that they are built as proposed; and, third, to promote a campaign to give the voters of Lubbock County the facts about what is proposed.

Should the proposed bond issue be voted on favorably on December 1st, the Association will continue to act until the roads are built as planned, working at all times directly with the Federal government, the State Highway Commission, and the Lubbock County Commissioners Court.

None of the officers or members of the Association receive any salary or pay of any kind.

QUESTION NO. 3

How is the Association's campaign financed?

ANSWER

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce promoted the organization of the Lubbock County Good Roads Association as above outlined that every district and community in the County might have representation.

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce is supported by dues paying members. It does not receive any support in any way from taxation.

The Chamber of Commerce is financing the educational campaign of the Lubbock County Good Roads Association, the purpose of the campaign being to give the voters of Lubbock County all the facts from the best authorities obtainable—to tell them the truth so that they will absolutely understand and comprehend what is proposed.

QUESTION NO. 4

How much will taxes be increased?

ANSWER

Experts have worked this matter out and are agreed that the tax rate at no time can be over 50c on the \$100.00 or \$5.00 on the \$1000.00 assessed valuation.

Bond buyers and bankers have checked this matter very carefully and are agreed that the bonds can be issued and sold so that the amount to be paid annually will be approximately the same amount each year.

The level tax table prepared by the authorities shows that \$115,610.00 will be paid the first year and \$118,700.00 the last year. Every year in between, the amounts to be paid will be between these two figures.

As a matter of fact, the taxes will never be this much because the bonds can be sold only as the money is needed, and

for the further reason that the assessed valuation of the County is increasing at the rate of nearly \$2,000,000.00 a year. At the present rate of increase in assessed valuations, the tax rate in something like twelve years should be only 26 1/2c on the \$100.00 or \$2.65 on the \$1000.00 assessed valuation.

If a State bond issue, as is proposed, carries, the State will immediately purchase from the counties their State and Federal aid highways, which will stop the tax payers of Lubbock County from paying the interest and principal on the bonds used to build State and Federal highways, which will, in turn, again virtually cut the above tax rate in one-half.

QUESTION NO. 5

What kind of roads will be built?

ANSWER

Engineers of the State Highway Department recommended the types of road needed in the proposed system to carry the traffic and it is on their recommendations that the types of construction to be used are recommended by this Association.

For the State and Federal aid system the highest type of reinforced concrete roads are planned. For the County or market roads the highest type of macadam asphalt roads are planned.

The type of road planned for our County or market roads is the same type that is being built in a number of counties in Texas on the main State and Federal aid highway, with the approval and aid of the State and Federal governments, and for the amount of traffic that will be carried on these County roads this type is more than adequate to carry the traffic that will pass over them.

This type of construction should not be confused with cheap, makeshift gravel or macadam roads that were built years ago in certain sections of the State without the asphalt wearing surface.

QUESTION NO. 6

What will the maintenance of the County Roads be?

ANSWER

The best engineering authorities tell us that these macadam asphalt roads can be maintained for less than it costs to maintain dirt roads.

Approximately \$134,708.35 will be collected in Lubbock County in 1929 for automobile licenses.

The State Highway Department will get \$74,074.77.

The Lubbock County Commissioners get \$64,623.58.

The County fund is divided equally among the four Commissioners to be spent for maintenance.

10c of the County taxes goes to a County road and bridge fund that is paid equally to the four Commissioners for maintenance purposes. This gives the County nearly \$100,000.00 this year for maintenance—\$64,623.58 plus \$32,375.00 gives a total of \$97,000.00, to be exact.

As engineers are agreed that it will not cost as much to maintain the County or market roads when paved with macadam asphalt as it costs to maintain dirt roads, a certain amount of the above funds will be released for the better maintenance of other dirt roads in the various Commissioners' districts.

DINNER — New England boiled dinner, jellied elder salad, whole wheat bread, Indian pudding, milk, coffee.

Chocolate Tapioca Pudding — Two cups milk, 4 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca, 4 tablespoons grated bitter chocolate, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 eggs.

Heat milk to scalding point. Add tapioca and chocolate and stir until well blended. Cook 30 minutes over hot water. Beat eggs slightly with sugar, salt and vanilla. Add to tapioca mixture and remove from heat. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 30 minutes in a slow oven. Serve warm or cold with or without whipped cream.

The pudding is quite rich enough for children without a sauce but a garnish of whipped cream adds to the festivity of the dish.

Old Man Tuerer, aged 60, who shuffled into New York's Family Court a day or so ago and mildly asked the court if it could not, "in a nice way," persuade his two "well-fixed" married daughters to help him just enough so that he wouldn't starve, is not so heart-breaking a figure in himself as that he symbolizes thousands of old parents left to whistle for what they need by the very children on whom they have lavished everything, with the result that they face their own old age in want.

In fact, the more one observes just what happens in at least half of all families on this subject of "caring for the old folks," one wonders why all parents do not write on the wall, face the fact that their future security cannot safely be left to their children, and, never expecting anything, be prepared for the worst rather than to wander homeless and hungry like an old bear as old man Tuerer of New York did.

CHILDREN FORGET
The answer is that Nature makes this so. As a matter of fact, nature is not only responsible for the fact that parents will shower everything they can make and scrape together upon their children but also for the fact that the children will forget all about returning the favor.

For nature is interested in one thing and one thing only—the next generation—never the last. The grown child must think of his children and not the parents left behind. He, in his turn is playing the old parental game of giving all and taking nothing, and when he himself is old and destitute he will face about the same hand-out which he gave his own parents as his one concern was his own children, his "own life."

LAWS NECESSARY
Many people think it absurd that there should be the necessity for any law about the support of aged parents. "Just human de-

cency will take care of this," they say. But there isn't a prosecutor's office in the country which cannot testify to the thousands of non-support of parent cases that pass through their hands every year. Generally just a word of warning does the business, they say. Few human beings are so devoid of any spark of human decency that they do not at least theoretically assume that helpless parents should be cared for, and if they do not do it will not have their shame published to the world.

"But my children would never be like that," parents have a smug way of thinking an dsaaying when facing some such story as this of old man Tuerer. It's because of this conviction that so many men either die leaving no will, or die with property encumbered so that the widow can make no move, or else without her children's permission and is often forced into dependency which breaks her spirit or means actual want.

MOTHER A NORMAD
We all see this again and again in our "best families." I know the mother of seven children who is "fanned out" from house to house of her offspring while her own lovely home is rented so that the children can divide the rent money. The mother wants nothing so much in life as her own home. She is not too old now to firm to care for it, but she faces a twenty to thirty years hegira from pillar to post, always feeling in the way, unwanted, and always in a strange place which her heart cannot call home.

Her late husband was a man who always believed that his children were square. But he did not realize the power of nature—that, given their own homes and families, children have a strange way of forgetting the past.

One cannot believe that the writer of this squib had seen any one of the District One teams in action, or that he is capable of judging a football player even if he were to see a football contest. 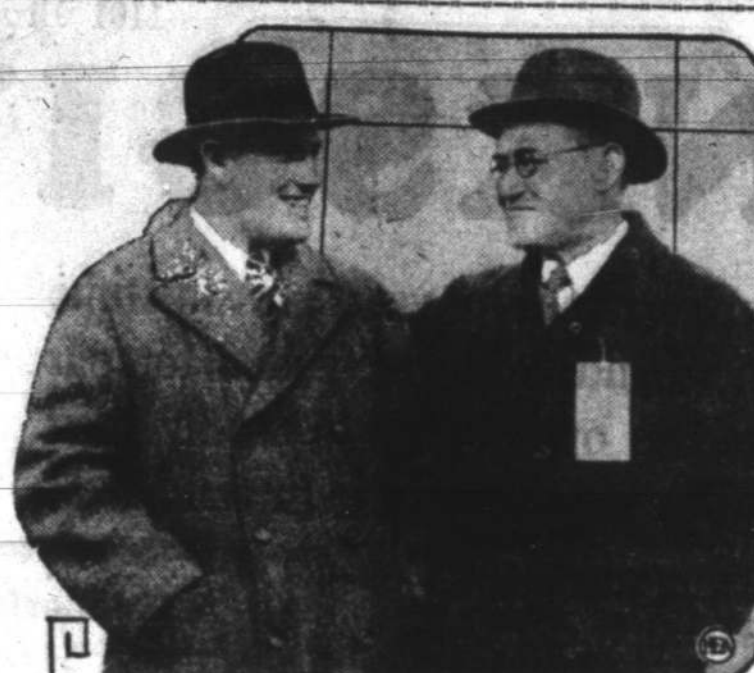

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. (P)—The somewhat celebrated controversy over the famous Chicago long count was never any more heated than the current debate over the relative merits of Red Cagle and Ken Strong, the east's outstanding two delegates to the 1928 all-American convention now being called to order.

It's an argument that won't be settled for some time to come, if at all, for both are great, both are triple threats both are the mainsprings of their respective teams.

Take Cagle, if for no other reason than that he comes first in the alphabetical order. The slim but wiry Army redhead has been the central figure of every big game played by the cadets. His passes beat Harvard, his slashing broken field dashes beat Yale. His brilliant alone almost overcame Notre Dame and his individual work beat Nebraska.

Strong is Stronger

Cagle has come through under any and all conditions, with the white light of publicity upon him and the eager hands of the opposition outstretched to check him, but so has Strong.

Bigger and more powerful, but not quite as shifty as Cagle, the violet star has everything to recommend him, including the whole Carnegie team. Strong is a better kicker, but no more brilliant a passer than Cagle. He gets up tremendous drive carrying the ball.

Like his Army rival, Strong has been consistently the big star of the New York University campaign all season. He was by far the outstanding player on the field even on the day that Georgetown picked the Violets for their only defeat and rose to his greatest heights against Carnegie.

Add to all this that Strong has set up a scoring record by tallying 154 points, with one game to go, and you have a fair idea of his usefulness.

Seven Clubs In American League Go About Winter Scheming To Bolster Attack On Rampaging Gothamites

Hughes Do Their Share Of Fortifying For Next Season; Browns and Senators Head List

NEW YORK, Nov. 26. (P)—American League baseball clubs are busy scheming an offensive against the world champion New York Yankees in next year's campaign.

As the other seven clubs go about their winter scheming, the firm of Ruppert, Barrow, Hughes and company, is actively fortifying its own defenses against the impending attack.

The St. Louis Browns, who came from nowhere to third place last season, and the Washington Senators, with Walter Johnson present, have added more players than any other American league club since the 1926 record was compiled.

Manager Daniel P. Howley has drafted two players, purchased eight, recalled three and signed a free agent who may be the best of the new crop. The Washington Senators got two additions by draft and minor league prospect. Outfielder Dick Porter was bought from Baltimore and Earl Averill, another outfielder, from San Francisco.

Pitchers Clint Brownhoff, Harrisburg, and James Moore of Little Rock were bought as was third baseman Reinhold of Winston-Salem.

Mal Rhyne, former major league infielder, claimed from San Francisco, is the only player snared by the Athletics in the draft, and only pitcher Shorne of Wichita Falls and outfielder Leback of Milwaukee were recalled. Two purchased players are pitchers Bolen of Baltimore and Wingard of Milwaukee.

The Red Sox grabbed two infielders in the draft, Robert Barrett of Buffalo and Jerry Standards of Memphis, and purchased pitcher Durham of Mobile, pitcher Frey of Nashville, and outfielder Dumas of Mobile. Durham did most of his pitching last season for Jackson of the Cotton States League.

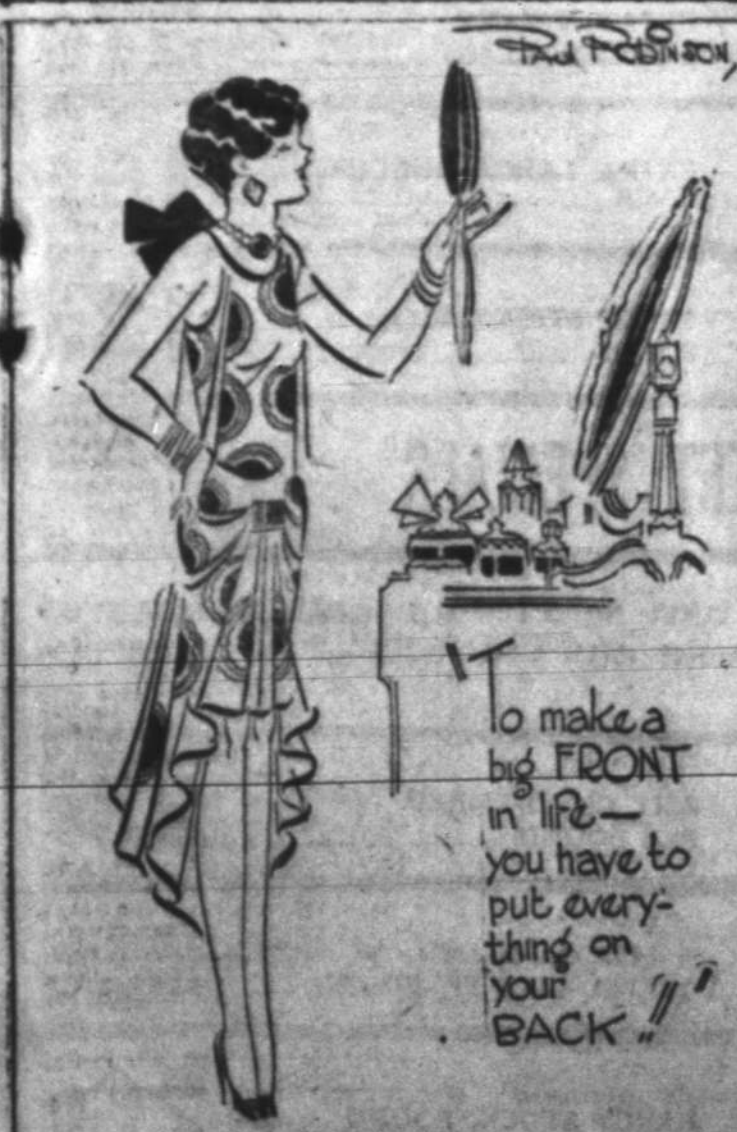

Wedding Bells Ring Third Time For John Barrymore

NEW YORK, Nov. 26.—The romance of America's great lover of the screen, John Barrymore, and Dolores Costello, brings him for the third time before the public in the role of bridegroom and recalls certain points of similarity to his other adventures in matrimony.

Dolores Costello is one of the most beautiful daughters of Hollywood today. But the second Mrs. Barrymore, a poet, actress and playwright as well as a society queen, had an international reputation as a beauty when he married her almost 19 years ago. Paul Helieu, French artist, described her as the most beautiful woman in the United States.

And his first wife, Katharine Harris, whom he married in 1910, was one of the most lovely debutantes of the season, related on her mother's side to the Lydians.

Each romance has had a background of the stage. The first Mrs. Barrymore, though a society girl, had theatrical ambitions and she played with Barrymore in "Believe Me, Xanthippe" and with Ethel Barrymore in "Deceit." She played with John when he made his motion picture.

The second Mrs. Barrymore, known as a writer under the name of Michael Strange, has had a many-sided artistic career. As beautiful Blanche Oelrichs, she was a belle of Newport and New York. She divided her time between society and the arts as the wife of Edward Thomas, her first husband, rich New York society man. After her marriage to Barrymore, she became more interested in the stage and in writing, and less in society.

She published a book of poems for which John himself made the illustrations. For Barrymore is an artist as well as an actor. Her first play "Clair de Lune" was extravagantly produced in New York with both Jack and his famous wife Ethel in the cast. Even the Barrymores could not make the play a popular one.

In spite of his reputation as a great lover, his secure position as the most popular leading man on the state and screen, his extraordinary voice, and his poetic second wife, Barrymore never has found his matrimonial conquests unmarred by the strenuous objections of her father, who considered her too young to marry. His second wife is said to have divorced her husband that she might marry Barrymore. And the romance between him and the lovely Dolores is rumored to have caused so much friction between her parents that they were divorced.

Though his first two wives have been society women, descended from old New York families, Dolores Costello is a daughter of one of the first families of the films. Two decades ago, Maurice Costello, her father, probably was the most adored man on the screen.

Barrymore's devotion to the blonde Dolores has been known since they appeared in their first picture, "The Sea Beast." But also everyone knew that he was married to Michael Strange. The divorce was secured in Paris by Mrs. Barrymore, without publicity and came as a great surprise. There is one daughter, Diana, by the second marriage.

Barrymore has directed and furthered the stage aspirations of each of his wives. It is common talk in Hollywood that the marvelous process Dolores has made as a screen luminary has been due to John Barrymore. Some three years ago, at 19, she went west, looking for a job. She was an unknown chorus girl then. Barrymore saw her and was enchanted by her looks, though he tore his hair at her setting. Under his instruction, she rapidly rose in the film world until she became what she is today—a star.

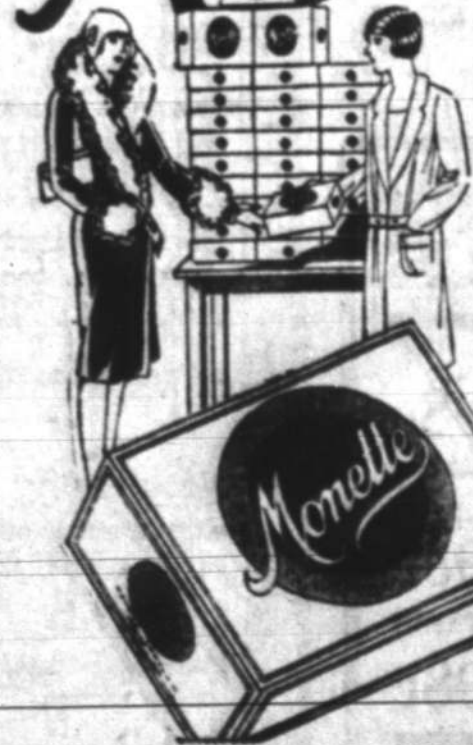

7 Non-Members Send Delegates To Conference

United States Joins Group In Conference On Standardization of Economic Statistics of World

GENEVA, Nov. 26.—Putting economic order into the world has been judged to vital by seven nations and members of the League of Nations, that they sent representatives today to the opening of an international conference by the League on standardization of economic statistics. The non-members represented were:

The United States, Russia, Mexico, Brazil, Ecuador, Turkey, Egypt. All told forty-two governments participated in today's proceedings. Ten of these were from the Western Hemisphere. The League members from that half of the world were Canada, Cuba, Paraguay, Uruguay, Nicaragua and Venezuela. William Rappard, rector of Geneva University, was elected president of the conference. He characterized the gathering as one of many league efforts to prevent war, this one being in line with efforts to obtain world-wide economic cooperation.

Argument Sought For U. S. Participation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Further discussions by the United States with nations composing the world court are in immediate prospect in an endeavor to bring about an agreement for American participation in the court.

While new exchanges are proposed in the Giffet resolution now pending before the senate, it is understood that as a result of President Coolidge's discussion Saturday with republican senators, Secretary Kellogg will immediately initiate the exchanges.

Time Ripe For Entrance Of U. S., Leaders Believe

GENEVA, Nov. 26.—(AP)—Inasmuch as the league of nations is about to take up the question of reorganization of the world court of justice, including the problem of advisory opinions, international circles regard as exceedingly timely the reported decision of President Coolidge to renew negotiations for the admission of the United States. Officials emphasize that the league will welcome an expression of American views and desires.

explains that the matter of marking the streets in these extensions is merely a matter of a short while, as a committee is working out that problem at the present time.

In the business section of town, the 10 blocks to be added to present free mail delivery are as given in following:

One block on Tenth street, between Avenue F and G. Three blocks between Eighth and Ninth streets on Avenue G and J. Three blocks between Seventh and Eighth streets on Avenue G and J. Two blocks between Sixth and Seventh streets and Avenue H and J. One block between Fifth and Sixth streets on Texas and J avenues.

Blocks Are Listed.
The 33 additional blocks in the residence district are given as follows:

The north side of Sixth street, between Avenue J and Avenue N. One and one-half blocks between Avenue N and P, between Fifth and Sixth streets. One block on Seventh street between Avenue U and V. Six blocks on Eighth street between Avenue V and College. Five blocks, Avenue P to alley between Avenue Q and R. One block, south side of Nineteenth street to Avenue. Thirteen blocks, Nineteenth street between Avenue S and X. Twenty-six blocks, Avenue X to El Camino, between Nineteenth and Twenty-Third streets.

Citizens are urged by Postmaster Vaughan to place mail boxes, or suitable receptacles for holding their mail, on their fences, porches or doors. The carriers will give all those residing in the districts which are included in these extensions some cards for them to fill out for changes of addresses. Many of these people have been getting their mail at general delivery, at private boxes at the postoffice, or on rural mail routes.

Present Carriers to Work.
The new extensions may eventually result in one or two more regular mail carriers for Lubbock, but the carriers will be handled for the present by the present force of nine carriers, every district in town having been changed somewhat in redistricting for complete coverage.

As an evidence of what the mail carrier has as a daily matter of routine, it is well to remember that in this city his average district is from 40 to 50 blocks. He makes on an average of about 400 stops for delivering mail each day. Postmaster Vaughan and the local postoffice force have completely redistricted the city to include these additional 63 blocks since last Saturday, when the authority came from Washington to institute this service. It will require several days for the force to become accustomed to the new districts, but Mr. Vaughan said things would be in smooth running order by the time of the Christmas rush, if the folks living in the extension blocks would cooperate with the carriers.

men. Seventy-nine men including sixty-six cadets were taken off by the German tug Heroes when the schooner became helpless near the Isle of Guernsey in the English channel. The heroes fought to reach the men for 12 hours, before also responding to the distress call poured oil on the seas to aid the ship.

Sixty Lives Saved
British life boats between Montrose and Torray during the past ten days have been launched on 34 expeditions and have saved sixty lives from shipwreck.

The German steamer Flora this afternoon rescued the entire crew of the German steamer Kate Grammerston, which was in a sinking condition and now is derelict in the North Sea.

An Italian steamer at first reported to be the Segunto but now believed to be the Salento, was wrecked and all aboard were believed lost.

There was general and widespread suffering with heavy losses in Belgium along the coast between Ostend and Blankenberg where at high tide in the afternoon the waves raced over the dykes. The augmented waters of the Scheldt broke their barriers and covered the lowlands.

Holland Is Ravaged
Holland was ravaged by the winds and large parts of the country were flooded with the rivers still rising. Along the northwest coast, many ships have been in distress. Three men drowned while the Dutch lifeboat President Van Heel was rescuing the crew of the Norwegian steamer Michelsen which had gone ashore.

The British steamer Neath Abbey tonight asked immediate help and reported that it was in a dangerous position off West K. British weather experts tonight believed that the gale had nearly blown itself out and predicted better weather.

VIGO, Spain, Nov. 26.—Three lives were lost when the steamers Montenegro and Andorra were wrecked by Sunday's storm. The others of the crews were saved. At Oron several other vessels were damaged by the storm.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Nov. 26.—The freighter Andorra Mendisank off here last night in a terrible gale. Her crew was rescued after a hard struggle.
