Water meter problems addressed

Recently, City Manager Steve Shutt approached the City Council for permission to purchase 300 new water meters.

This comes as a result of his discovery that there are currently 210 dead water meters within the city, meaning that water is being used but the meter that is supposed to measure it is not working. Residents at these homes have been charged the minimum rate of about \$35 on their bills, including sewer and garbage pick-up.

He added that in addition to the

dead meters there are an unknown number of meters that are not working properly and also need to be replaced.

"We need to keep in mind that when these devices fail, they usually fail in favor of the customer," he said.

Shutt said there has also been a problem with some water meters being estimated because of one reason or another.

"This is a common problem to some degree in a lot of other places," he said. "It was a severe

problem here."

He added that the problem was being dealt with and that a new system of meter reading has been implemented.

"Instead of just one person reading the meters, we have designated three to five days where all of the staff goes out to read meters," he said. "They will also be rotating routes so that everyone will read different meters each time they go out."

Shutt said he felt that this would help provide a better system of

checks and balances.

"We will also be able to get the meters read quicker and the billing will be more efficient," he said.

He added that he understood that a customer may be shocked when the problem becomes corrected.

"The problem is, all of a sudden you get a bigger bill," he said. "It doesn't provide an opportunity for the conservation of water or to identify leaks."

Shutt said the problem with dead and estimated meters has existed for a long time.

"I see no purpose in making excuses," he said. "We've moved to address the problem and correct the inequities and estimating is an absolute no."

He added that replacing the dead and old meters will help the city eliminate a loss of revenue.

"When someone has a meter replaced they will experience an accurate registration of water," he said. "It may be a little more than they anticipated."

Shutt said that letters have been sent to residents who have been or will be affected by these changes.

Security cameras are possible at Colorado High School

The Board of Trustees of the Colorado Independent School District will meet Monday night to discuss several agenda items including the high school's possible need for security cameras.

CISD Superintendent Russell Merket explained that because the main building of the high school is a round structure the cameras are needed for both security and supervision.

If installed, the cameras would operate during and after school hours.

"This would be useful in the supervision of the students and in case we have a break-in at night, we could use the tape to identify [the culprit]," he said.

Merket added that the camera security system could also be used with an alarm that would notify the

Rice said the fund raiser will be a good way to meet two different needs.

"We were having trouble paying for the costs of rebuilding," he said. "And someone out there wants a new truck."

Bluegrass Festival will bring tourists

The City and Chamber of Commerce are currently working together on plans to bring Mitchell County its First Annual Spring Fever Bluegrass Festival next year to the amphitheater at Ruddick Park.

The date has been set for the three-day Memorial holiday weekend, May 26-28, 1995.

A number of bluegrass bands have already committed to perform at the event. Also on hand will be food and arts and craft booths.

City Manager Steve Shutt said that after a discussion with representatives from the Bluegrass Association out of Odessa it was determined that 100 trailer/RV hookups would be needed at Ruddick Park in preparation for the event.

He added that the cost to install the hookups would cost \$2,000 to

\$3,000 and that rent collected would pay back the expenditures.

Last year a Governmental Services Agency report stated that bringing a major annual event to Colorado City would help boost its economy, Shutt said.

"This is exactly what we need because it's a circuit type production and people from all over the state follow these types of things," he said. "This has the potential to become a yearly event."

Because the festival will be held during the Memorial holiday weekend, the city and Chamber hope to attract some of the 12,000 plus people who visit Lakes Champion and Colorado City during the holiday.

"Before, they didn't have a reason to come into town," Shutt said. "Now we have something to attract them with."

The Central Rolling Plains zone includes Archer, Baylor, part of Borden, Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, north Taylor, Throckmorton and Young counties. This zone has approximately 675,000 acres of cotton.

they seem to receive more than just companionship from one another.

The Bulldogs' starting quarterback Jesse Rico said as much when he wrote, "Edith is a person who is special not only to me, but to everyone who loves her...She is a person who says what she means and thinks and puts the things she says in a positive way."

He goes on to describe the feeling he got when Edith told him that the adoptive grandparents had made shirts for their new friends stating that they were Bulldog grandparents.

"When I walked in, I went to talk to her and she said that she had made the shirt for me. It was a nice shirt, but that isn't what made the moment special."

Moffett believes that using class time to visit the grandparents is well spent.

"There's nothing like doing something to help other people," he said. "[The students] begin to realize elderly people are human beings, too."

Krystal Butler, captain for the Lady Bulldogs basketball team wrote, "Having an adoptive grandparent made me realize that growing old is not as bad as it seems. All you need is a special friend."

Moffett added that the benefits and positive influence is notable in both students and grandparents alike.

"The 'trouble makers' will go to the nursing home and totally change their attitude for the better," he said. "There'll be a kid who I'll notice is absent from school, but when it comes time to show up at the nursing home, he'll show up there."

The anticipation and excitement the grandparents feel when they know the students are coming is obvious in their actions, Moffett said.

"They'll get up early and get dressed and comb their hair. They have something to look forward to. They feel special, and needed and wanted again. It makes their lives worth living again."

Moffett said he would like to see Colorado High School begin a similar program.

"This program is about getting involved and doing what we can to make the world a better place," he said.

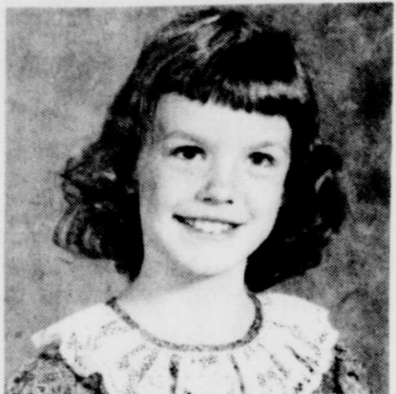

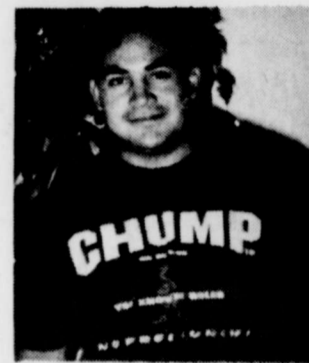

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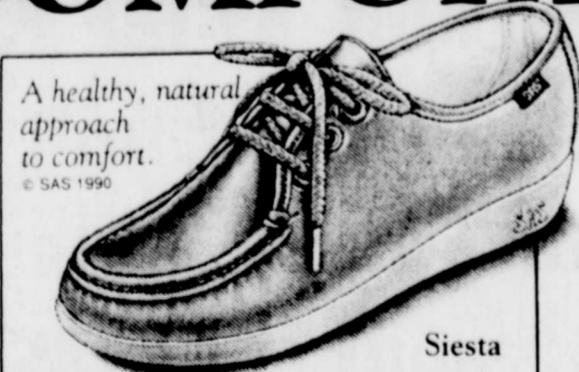

Hunters warned of rabies

State officials are warning deer and quail hunters to be alert for unusual animal behavior in the wild. Rabies cases are spreading at a surprising rate this year in South and West Central Texas.

Extension wildlife specialist Dr. Dale Rollins says the fall hunting seasons are expected to send more than one million hunters into the Texas brush.

Rollins warns that carrying a rifle does not necessarily protect you from a rabid animal. Some hunters have been surprised by a rabid animal that had taken up residence in their deer stand, and others have been attacked while walking to their blinds before daylight.

Rollins says that although the increase in rabies is alarming, hunters can decrease their chances for bites and infection by taking simple precautions.

First, quail hunters should have any dogs they are taking into the field vaccinated before they go hunting.

Second, stay away from animals that appear rabid. Rollins says two red flags indicating the presence of rabies are animals that show no fear of humans and a nocturnal animal that is active during daylight hours.

You may have to shoot the animal, and if there was any exposure to humans, then take it to your local veterinarian or Texas Department of Health Office for rabies testing.

Otherwise, he says, you should never touch a downed animal that may have rabies. And when you open your deer blind for the first time, be on the lookout for venomous creatures such as fire ants, rattlesnakes and Africanized honey bees, as well as small animals that may be rabid.




