HUNDREDS BEG FOR FRIEDMANN'S HELP

**Crowds of Tuberculosis Victims
Hem in Automobile of Doc-
tor; Police Rescue
Him.**

New York, March 19.—Four hundred women and children hemmed in the automobile of Dr. Friederich F. Friedmann this afternoon begging him to treat them for tuberculosis. The crowd surrounded the German physician outside the hospital for deformities and joint diseases and a squad of police reserves had to be called to make a path for him to the hospital door.

Physicians from all parts of the United States earlier in the day gathered at Mount Sinai hospital to watch Dr. Friedmann administer his vaccine, but were refused admission. The only other medical men at the clinic were the representatives of the government at whose request other physicians were excluded. The government physicians feared that premature reports of the clinic would be made before they presented their official report to the government. Dr. Friedmann, it was stated, had not made any request to have the others excluded.

You will observe that this relates only to ciders and other beverages containing alcohol and is not intended in any manner interfere with the sale of non-alcoholic beverages or phosphates.

Should there be any dealer or dealers in your county selling either "apple Cider" or "Apple base Cider," and should you be unable to determine their intoxicating qualities if you will secure a sample and send it to me in Austin, charges prepaid, I will have it analyzed without cost to you, and advise you at once the result of the analysis.

At the time of securing these samples, you will please secure the name of the manufacturers, wholesale dealers, wholesale distributors and retail dealers from whom the Cider was purchased and forward this information to me.

It is necessary that I have this latter information in order that I may call on them for the various taxes due the State.

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WOMAN SUES A. & S. FOR \$100,000

Chick Food

Chicks properly started on a good food are the ones that mature first. Chick Food is the right food for chicks, mixed ready for use, consists of cracked grains, small seeds, grit shells, bones and beef scraps (to take place of bugs and worms.) Directions: Begin feeding Chick Food when the chicks are 48 hours old. It should be scattered in a litter of straw, and the chicks in scratching for their food will get exercise which will keep them in a healthy condition, feed no more than they will eagerly pick up, but every few hours at first, gradually increasing the quantity and not feeding quite so often, until the chicks are old enough to be fed three times a day.

COTS AND TENTS FOR THE REUNION

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 29.—All arrangements have been made for cots and tents to accommodate the Veterans who attend the Reunion of Confederates here May 27-29. An election will be held soon when a complete list of county officers will be elected. Candidates are now numerous and the politics is rife. From three to four candidates have announced for each office.

SMALL POX BREAKS UP SCHOOL.
